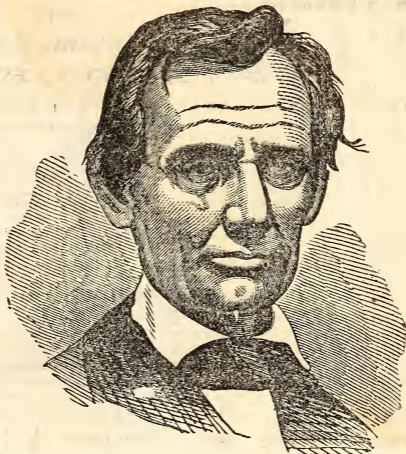

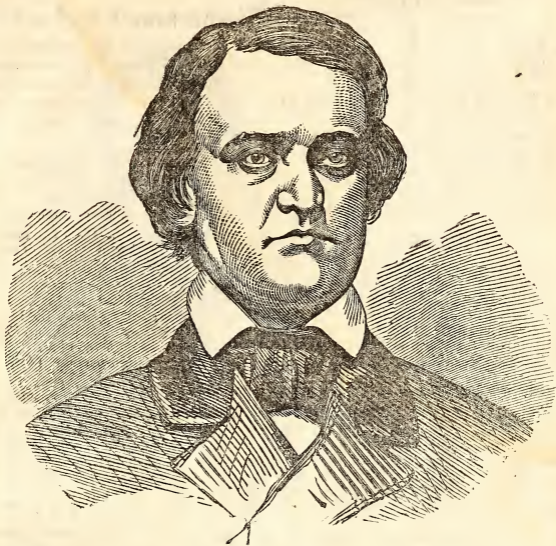

GENERAL GARIBALDI.



This is a correct portrait of GENERAL GARIBALDI, who has proven himself so far the hero of the Italian Revolution. He was born at Nice fifty-two years ago, of a good family. He entered the naval service of Sardinia while yet a lad, and distinguished himself by several acts of bravery.

Being obliged to fly the country in 1834, he is next heard from among the revolutionists in South America, winning golden opinions for daring courage.

In 1848, the cry of Italian liberty reached Garibaldi in South America, and in a few weeks he was on Italian soil. During the brief but disastrous war of 1848-49, Garibaldi achieved wonders, but the day came when the gallant partisan was compelled to lay down his arms—the French cohorts were too much for his

brave band of faithful followers, and he was obliged to seek refuge in Genoa. After a brief stay at Genoa, he set sail for New York; thence, after an unsuccessful business enterprise in the latter city, we hear of him in California, the "promised land" of that time. He took the first opportunity of returning to his early vocation, the sea.

His exploits during the late war in Northern Italy are well known, as he contributed not a little to its success. His present career in Sicily is too well known to require repetition here. His landing at Marsala—his enthusiastic reception—the flocking to his standard of the down-trodden subjects of that despot, King Bomba, by which title he is generally known—his subsequent march, and taking of Palermo, the chief city of Sicily—all conspire to place him in the front rank of modern liberators; and it is to be hoped he may lead the Italian Revolution to the same successful termination as our own Revolution under the leadership of WASHINGTON.

CIRCULATION OF THE BLOOD.

The following extract is from Blackwood's Magazine, Aug., 1858. The facts stated, have been well known to every student for many years, but I have never before seen them stated so concisely and clearly.

"The heart, as the great center, shall be our point of departure. It is composed of four cavities; two ante-chambers, or *auricles*, and two chambers, or *ventricles*. Into the right auricle the blood is poured by the veins; it passes thence into the right ventricle, and is driven therefrom, by a strong contraction, along the *pulmonary artery** into the lungs. Here it comes in contact with the oxygen of the atmosphere, and changes from venous into arterial blood. It now passes along the *pulmonary veins* into the left auricle of the heart, thence into the left ventricle, from which it is driven, by a powerful contraction, into the arteries. The pulsing torrent rushes through the arteries to the various tissues, where it passes into the network of capillary vessels described in our last Paper. Having served the purposes of Nutrition, the blood continues its course along these capillaries into the veins. Here the stream is joined by that of the lymphatics, which, like the roots of a plant in the earth, absorb lymph from the organs in which they arise. This confluence of streams hurries on till the blood is emptied into the right auricle, from which it originally started; and thus is the circuit completed.

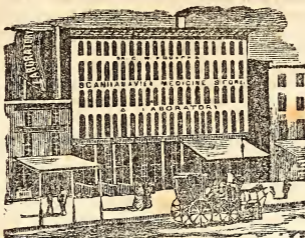

AN EXTENSIVE MEDICAL ESTABLISHMENT.
