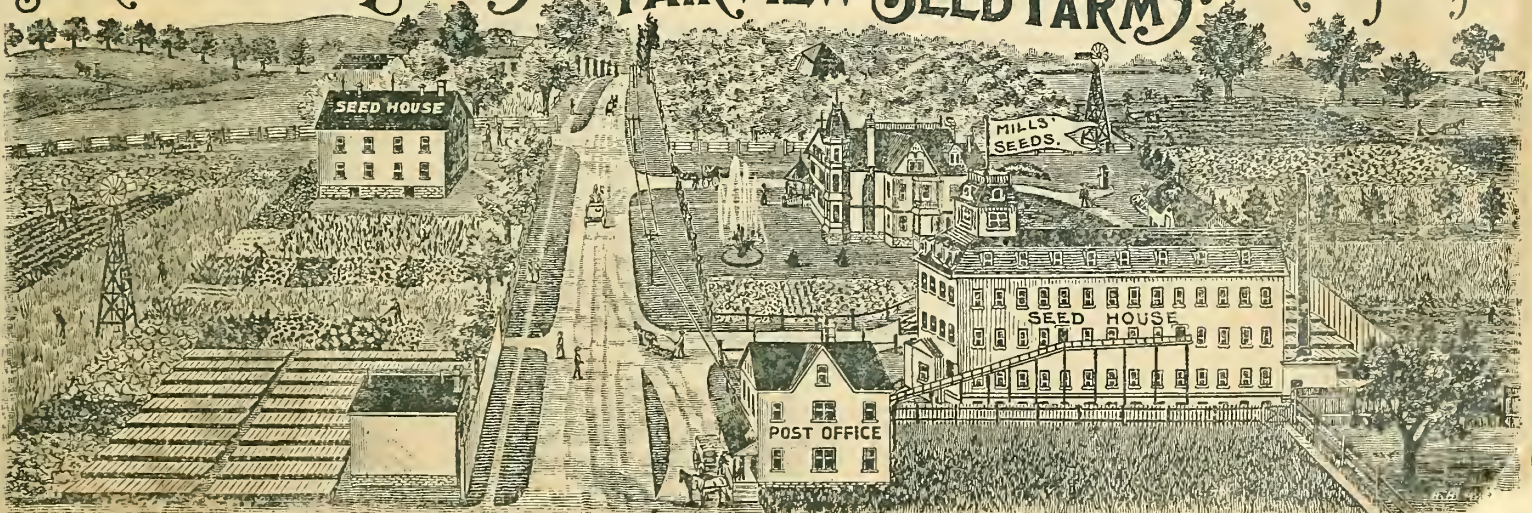

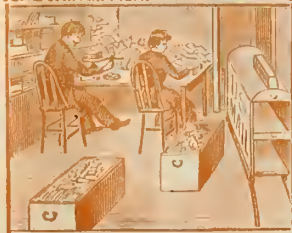

My printing department is fitted up with all the latest machinery for printing catalogues, circulars, etc. There are many other departments not mentioned that are required for a seed business.

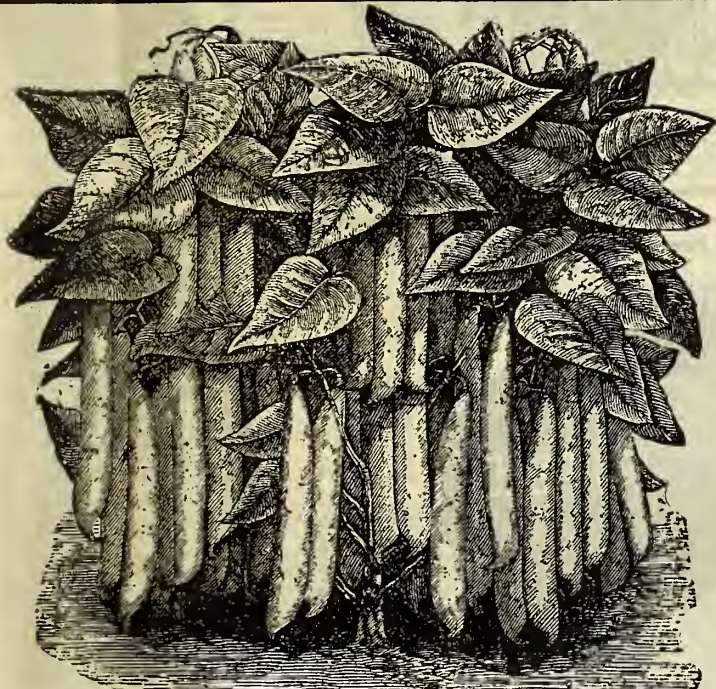

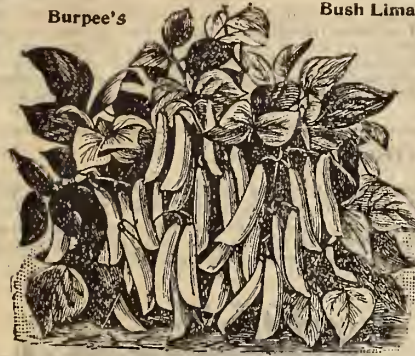

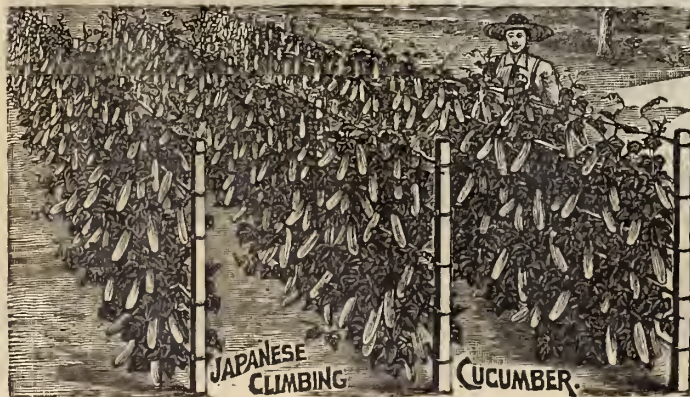

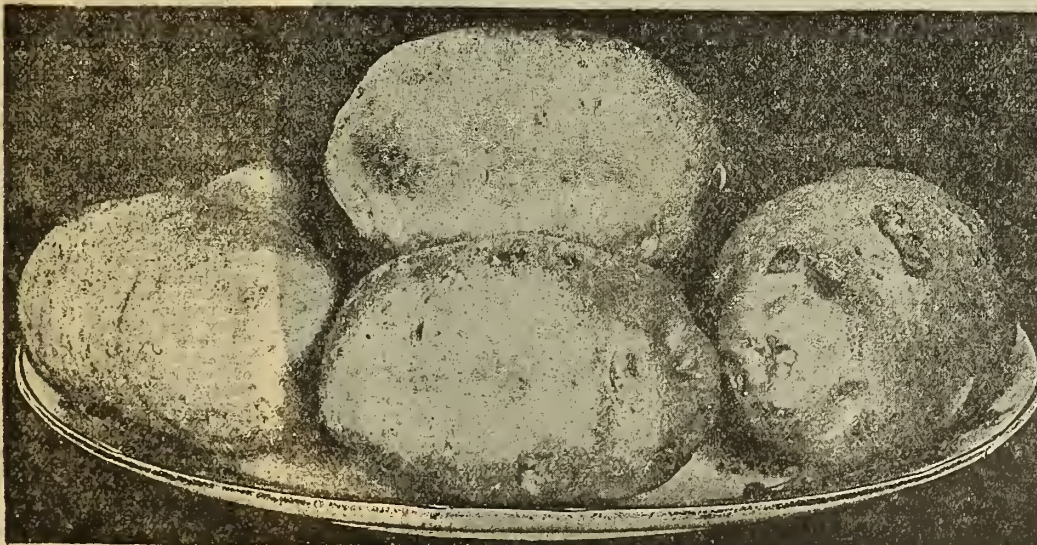

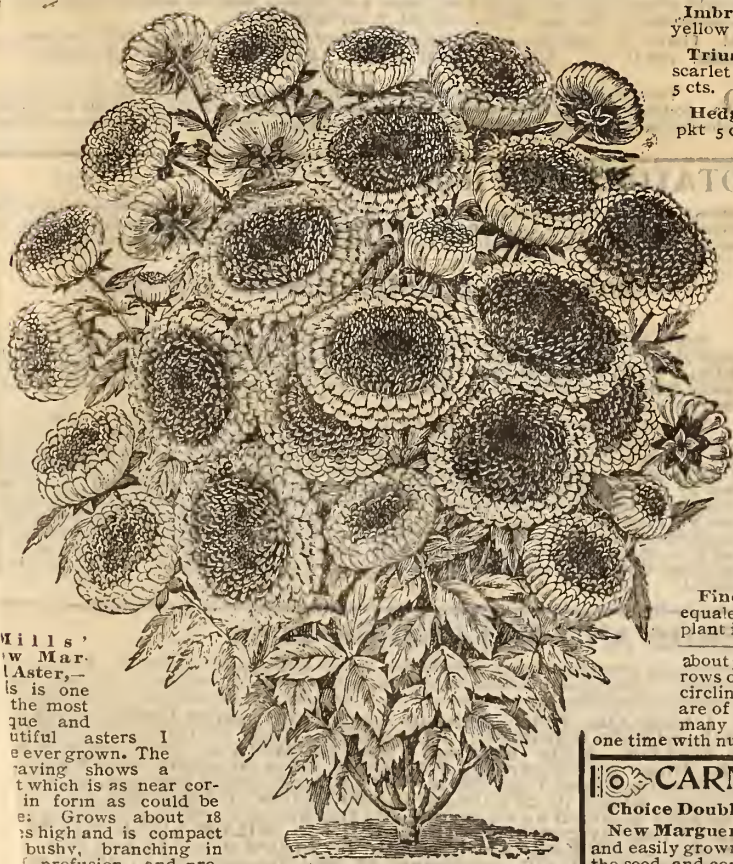

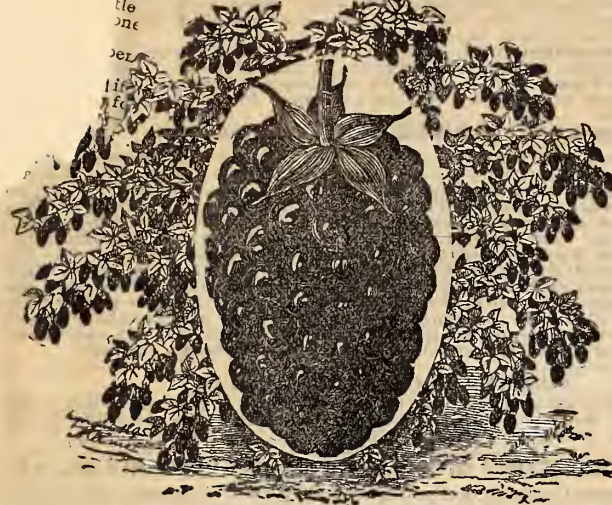

For Success With The Garden.

Diseases of Plants.

It has been but a comparatively few years since when our speaking of "plant diseases" would have been open to general ridicule. However, the growth of the newer phases of the science of agriculture and the art of gardening has of late been so rapid yet gradual in its degrees that it is generally accepted that plants both cultivated and wild, like animals, are subject, in nature, to real diseases. Some of these are such as are consequent upon starvation or disproportionate nutrition resulting in abnormal physiological conditions. Thus it may be clearly seen that an excess of heat, moisture, light or of certain chemical food elements, as nitrogen or lime, may result in injuries to, or repression of growth and development which may be looked upon as disease. Likewise a deficiency of any such normal elements of the plant environment may cause equally serious troubles.

Again plants also are subject to really infectious diseases in the same sense as the term infectious is applied to diseases in animal life. In these cases it is often more readily open to prevention or remedial means. Each such disease is usually characteristically marked in its appearance and physiological effects upon the plant attacked, as, for example, rusts, smuts, mildews, bacterial species, etc. Such diseases, too, are quite often specific or limited in the range of plants which they may attack; that is, may be confined to attack upon but a few or even but one variety of host plant as in case also of certain animal diseases; or, again, the range of attack may be very extended as to different types of host plants.

These differences as to disease features as they may, the whole bearing of the matter with reference to success in the growth of plants, whether for garden or orchard is one which demands clearer insight into the nature of the plant, which is diseased and of the cause of the trouble than is usually assumed necessary. Treatment or method must have its rational foundation in reason, based upon facts. These facts I would, in general, define as being those which relate chiefly to environment of the plant diseased, and the physiology of the same in their relation to the cause of disease. These facts clearly in hand upon which to reason, methods of culture and treatment become evident. Much expense is attained in the use of fertilizers through lack of any real thought of what a particular plant or a particular soil really needs. Indeed, often the very opposite substance is used to that in demand, thus practically introducing through ignorance a condition for the advent of disease through disproportionate nutrition.

Much spraying and washing is done with our proper time, place or purpose, and the valued results of the method for a particular disease is lost. Desirable results can

be obtained only, by careful methods based along the lines of thought indicated in the foregoing.

Per request of the managing editor of SUCCESS WITH THE GARDEN, I am now and then to offer some suggestions upon plant diseases, and it is my wish at such times to point out with reference to the diseases under consideration those salient points most necessary to have in mind, in order to deal with a certain diseased condition or plant disease. For Success With The Garden Digging Decayed Potatoes.

So many of my neighbors are wondering if with present prices of potatoes it paid to expend so much labor in digging those where the rot had shown itself very perceptibly. We are all on high ground and but very few potato fields had any wet or low land in them. I can only attribute the rot to a form of blight referred to in the experimental garden department of this paper for April, 1896, viz., Downy Mildew (*Phytophthora infestans*).

This fungus disease began in my field with about such indications as are noted in the article referred to. First, the leaves began to turn yellow and later changed to a dirty brown. Two weeks later and when more than half the tops were dead from the disease I found the first decayed tuber. This confirmed my suspicions that the rot was due to the disease, and as the rot increased I noticed that a dozen rows treated with the Bordeaux mixture for prevention of blight were comparatively free from it, not more than a score of decayed tubers being found in the product from these rows while I lost fully one-third of my crop in the remainder of the field.

But this doesn't answer the question as to whether digging such a crop would pay. Had the rot been the result of some other cause, say excessive moisture or something of that nature, I should have dug them just as early as possible and perhaps have saved a large percentage of them. Coming from this fungus disease, I think the rot is communicated from the tops to the tubers and this being the case, they would have rotted fully as much in storage as in the hill, besides involving so much extra handling as otherwise. 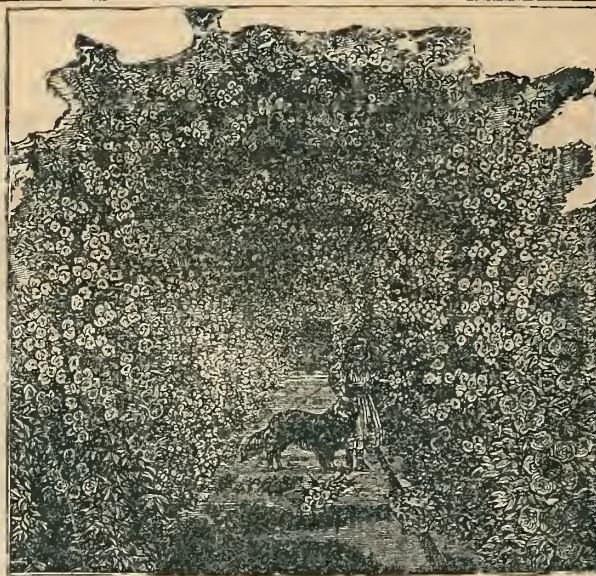
