TWELFTH LEGISLATURE—1st Session.

JOURNAL OF THE SENATE.

Thursday, 19th Feb. 1835.

The senate met, agreeably to adjournment.

Members present, Messrs Charles Derbigny, President, Bossier, Brownson, Dupre, Hou, Labranche, Lacoste, Maddox, Moore, Nicholas, Porche, Reid, Tenney, Tete and Thomas.

Mr. Hou, on the part of the committee to whom was referred the petition of the Pochchartrain rail road company, reported and introduced a bill entitled 'an act to amend an act entitled an act to incorporate the Pochchartrain rail road company, approved 20th January 1830.' Read for the first time.

Mr. Moore gave notice that on to-morrow he will introduce a bill entitled 'an act to amend the several acts passed for the inspection of flour, beef and pork, approved May, 1805, March, 1830 and April, 1831.'

Mr. Reid gave notice that he will to-morrow introduce a bill entitled 'an act changing the time of holding the sessions of the 3d district court, in the several parishes of that district.'

Mr. Tenney, on part of the committee on public education, to whom was referred the petition of the inhabitants of the parish of Carroll, praying for the sale of certain school lands, reported and introduced a bill entitled 'an act authorizing the sale of certain school lands situated in the parish of Carroll.' Read for the first time.

Mr. Labauve, after leave obtained, introduced a bill entitled 'an act amending the act entitled an act to amend the act entitled an act to establish an explicit fee bill, approved 7th March 1834.' Read for the first time.

Mr. Hou, after leave obtained, introduced a bill entitled 'an act to amend the act entitled an act to take the most effective measures in order to prevent the transportation or carrying away of slave-out of this state against the will of their owners, and for other purposes, approved 13th Feb. 1834.' Read for the first time.

A message in writing from the governor was brought by Mr. A. Forstall, his private secretary.

A message from the house of representatives was brought by Mr. A. Pitot, their clerk, informing the senate that the committee of enrollment of the house had reported as duly enrolled the bill entitled 'an act to revive the 1st and 2d sessions of the act entitled an act to organize the supreme court of the state of Louisiana, and to establish courts of inferior jurisdiction, approved March 22, 1826, and for other purposes,' that the speaker had signed said bill, and that the signature of the president of the senate was requested thereon.

Mr. Labranche, chairman of the committee of enrollment, reported said bill as duly enrolled.

Mr. Hou, on the part of the committee appointed to wait on the President, reported that they had performed their duty, and that the President withdrew his resignation, and would resume his seat in a few minutes.

Mr. Tenney gave notice that on to-morrow he will introduce bills entitled 'an act to incorporate the Louisiana cotton-seed oil factory and insurance company,' 'an act relative to public education in the parish of Concordia.'

Mr. Th. Mass, on the part of the judiciary committee, to whom was referred the bill entitled an act for the relief of John S. Faulk, made a favorable report.

The bill entitled 'an act for the relief of John S. Faulk' was then read for the second time.

Mr. Labauve, after leave obtained, introduced a bill entitled 'an act to amend the civil code.'

Mr. Moore, on part of the joint committee appointed to enquire into the expediency of making laws against gambling, reported and introduced a bill entitled 'an act to prevent gambling,' which was read for the first time.

To the Honorable Senate of Louisiana—The committee to whom was referred the memorial of many citizens on the subject of gaming, by resolution of the 10th Feb. respectfully report:

That your committee are satisfied, for reasons too numerous to be condensed in a report, that it is unwise and impolitic to license gambling houses: that the vice of gaming is producing idleness and immorality to an alarming degree; that it is fatal to the happiness of individuals, and greatly injurious to the property of the state.

They are of opinion that it is now the duty of the legislature to strike at the root of every species of gaming, by penalties sufficiently mild, however, to insure the infliction. Your committee, therefore, in consideration of the legislature submit the following bill.

On motion of Mr. Moore, the bill entitled 'an act to change the time of holding the sessions of the district court of the eighth judicial district, in the state of Louisiana,' was taken up at its second reading, and amended.

Mr. Brownson introduced the petition of D. T. Walker, praying that his natural children be made legitimate by law. Referred to the judiciary committee.

A message from the house of representatives, by Mr. A. Pitot, their clerk, informed the senate that the committee of enrollment had reported as duly enrolled, and that the speaker of the house had signed the bills entitled 'an act to provide arms for the Natchitoches guards,' and 'an act to amend the act to incorporate the New Orleans and Carrollton rail road company.'

The President thereupon signed the said bills; and a few minutes after, Mr. Labranche, on part of the committee of enrollment, reported that he had delivered them to the governor for his approval.

The same message requested the concurrence of the senate in a resolution fixing the adjournment sine die of the legislature; and in a bill entitled 'an act to remove the seat of justice from Van Buren to Springfield, in the parish of Livingston.'

Two messages in writing from the governor, were brought by Mr. A. Forstall, his private secretary.

The senate sat with closed doors on executive business.

On motion, the senate adjourned until Monday at ten o'clock A. M.

MONDAY, Feb. 23, 1835.

The Senate met, agreeably to adjournment.

Members present, Messrs. Charles Derbigny, President, Bossier, Brownson, Dupre, Labauve, Hou, Labranche, Lacoste, Maddox, Moore, Porche, Reid, Tenney, Tete Thomas and Nicholas.

Mr. Moore, agreeably to previous notice, introduced a bill entitled 'an act to amend the act approved May, 1805, regulating the inspection of beef, flour and pork.' Read for the first time.

Mr. Lacoste gave notice that on to-morrow he will introduce a bill entitled 'an act relative to elections in the parish of St. Bernard.'

Mr. Reid presented a memorial from the Clinton and Port Hudson rail road company, praying for amendments to their charter.

Mr. Reid at the same time introduced a bill entitled 'an act to amend the act entitled an act to incorporate the Clinton and Port Hudson rail road company, approved 7th Feb. 1835.' Read for the first time.

A message from the house of representatives by Mr. A. Pitot, their clerk, informed the senate that the committee of enrollment had reported as duly enrolled the bill entitled 'an act to incorporate the Ocean insurance company,' that the speaker of the house had signed the same, and the signature of the President of the senate requested thereon.

The same message informed the senate that the house had concurred with amendments in the bill from the senate entitled 'an act to incorporate the commercial insurance company. The senate concurred in said amendments.

The same message requested the concurrence of the senate in the bill entitled 'an act for the relief of Armand Pitot. This bill on motion of Mr. Hou was taken up, rules dispensed with, read three times and passed.

Reading of messages from the house.—Resolution relative to the adjournment sine die.

'An act to remove the seat of justice from Van Buren to Springfield, in the parish of Livingston.' Mr. Tenney presented a memorial from the inhabitants of the town of Donaldsonville, praying for the amelioration of bayou Lafourche. Referred to the committee on internal improvement.

Mr. Hou, after leave obtained, introduced a bill entitled 'an act to amend an act entitled an act to regulate the administration of the charity hospital of the city of New Orleans, approved March 7, 1834.' Read for the first time.

Mr. Tenney, agreeably to previous notice, introduced a bill entitled 'an act relative to public education in the parish of Concordia.' Referred to the committee on public education.

Leave of absence was granted for a few days to Mr. Porche.

The senate sat with closed doors on executive business.

On motion, the senate adjourned until to-morrow at ten o'clock A. M.
