The Hindus have just received word from Lord Hardinge that he can d nothing for them, said Mr. Bird. So far as Ottawa is concerned, the Hindus realize now that the cards are stacked against them, that no matter what evi dence is submitted at the court of inquiry they will not be allowed to enter this country and that they might just as well go back

Vancouver, June 2.—The Japanese steamer Komagata Maru is still anchored in the centre of the harbor with 376 Hindus still aboard. For a short time last evening it looked very much as if there would be serious trouble, and probably a section of the excursion party aboard planned to make a dash for shore in the night.

Two armed guards have been kept by the immigration department aboard the vessel in the daytime since she arrived. At 8 o'clock in the evening the day guards are replaced by four men, and these act in conjunction with an armed party aboard a launch which all night watches the Japanese ship to make sure that none of her passengers leap overboard and swim to the shore of Stanley park, half a mile away.

Early yesterday one of the Hindu leaders aboard sent a letter to the immigration superintendent J. M. Reid threatening reprisal if the guards were not taken off the ship. Half an hour before the change of guards last night two Hindus took Watchman Dense by the arms, and roughly shaking him, waltzed him toward the gangway telling him that if he or any other guards again appeared they would be thrown into the water. The second guard tried to assist Dense, but he, too, was compelled to climb down the gangway to the thunch. The men were not hurt, but they were forcibly ejected and warned never to return.
