



In 1917 only 191 of these subterranean little factories were detected by the revenue sleuths, but in 1919-20 that total had grown to 985. We are grieved to learn that our great and good sister, Ontario, shows the most development in this surreptitious branch of the nation's manufacturing industry, with a growth in the number of stills of 50 to 296 in three years.



Manitoba had none three years ago and now has 136. Quebec shows an increase of 11 to 43. New Brunswick had none in 1917 and now has eight! Nova Scotia has advanced from one to twenty in the last three years and Prince Edward Island has only one against none three years ago.
