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



This Circular letter to the States, on the necessity of raising revenues for the general government, was reported by a committee consisting of James Madison, Alexander Hamilton and Oliver Ellsworth, and was largely the work of Mr. Monroe. The two official Philadelphia editions are the same in matter, with some typographical variations, up to the ninth page of the last division, where a foot-note, partially filling pages 9-16 is added. The accompanying papers include Hamilton's Report on the finances, in criticism of the reasons given by the State of Rhode Island for refusing compliance with the recommendation of Congress for a duty on imports; the French, and Dutch Contracts; the Address to Congress from the officers of the Continental army; the "Newburgh Addresses," written by John Armstrong; and the Congressional Resolutions of September 6, and October 10, 1780, December 16, 1782, and February 17, 1783. These documents, including the Newburgh addresses, are included in the reprinted editions, except that the Boston edition does not contain the Address and petition of the officers of the army. They were also reprinted in London this year. Regarding these papers the Monthly Review states: Should we now think ourselves interested in the subject of these American State papers, we may however be much gratified in perusing them, as pieces of fine writing and masterly eloquence. It would be a curious speculation for the philosophical inquirer to account for the perfection to which the English language has been carried in our late Colonies, amidst the clamors and horrors of war.

Bowen continued its publication alone, with a slight change in the title, to 1793, when he formed a partnership with William Primrose Harrison, and with J. Carey as editor, publication was continued as The Columbian Herald, or Southern Star. Bowen apparently retired in 1794, and in July of that year the paper was issued daily by Harrison & Co., as the Columbian Herald, or new daily advertiser. The General Assembly of Pennsylvania selected it as the organ for publishing its proceedings, an action which Melchior Steiner, publisher of the Gemeinnutzige Philadelphische Correspondenz objected to, on the ground that Leibert and Billmeyer had not supported the cause of the Colonies during the Revolutionary War, as he had done. The Zeitung was generally circulated in Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York, having one hundred and sixty subscribers in the latter city.


