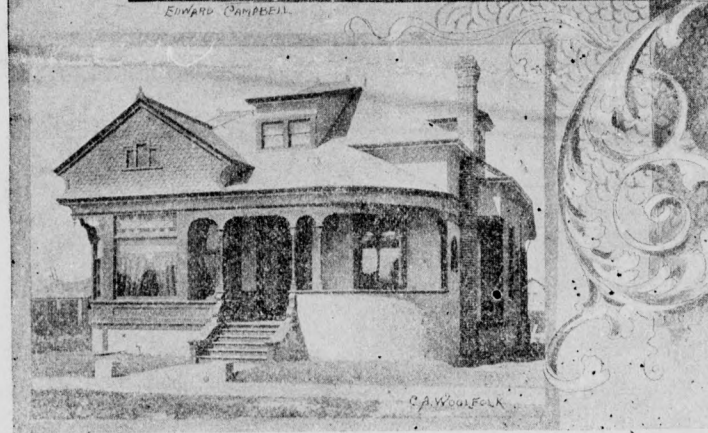

The Carbon Gopher Exterminator.

The explosion of a carbon gopher exterminator at Whitman's hardware store last week should serve as a warning to those who may use this means of getting ride of the troublesome gopher. Two similar accidents have been reported at Mt. View. A young man was smoking a cigarette while handling the box and in some way the fire was communicated to it and an explosion resulted. Another explosion occurred in a tin shop where a hot soldering iron was applied. In the latter case as well as in the instance here the box was supposed to be empty, and probably was very nearly so. The carbon vaporizes, apparently with very little heat and a very small quantity of it will make an immense quantity of vapor. Alfred Smith who was injured at Mr. Whitman's store was using a hot iron to remove the solder from the box and held it about two feet away from the fire in which the iron was heated. Whether it was the fire or the iron that ignited it can hardly be determined to a certainty but the accident proves beyond a question that the material used in the exterminator is extremely combustible. The boy who brought it in to be mended remarked after the explosion took place "they told me to tell you to keep it away from the fire."

Bicycling vs Drinking.

Frances Willard thinks that bicycling is helping to do away with intemperance. In an interview with a reporter some time since she said:

"There never was so much temperance sentiment in England as there is to-day. One of the things that helps it is the bicycle. I am an enthusiast, and, after three years' hard work, have induced Lady Henry Somerset to ride. The bicycle is spoiling the business of the saloons and the low theaters. It is a splendid thing to abolish drink by indirection. I think the bicycle is heaven's way of helping people to have a good time without using stimulants. In England outdoor exercise is more prevalent for women than here.

"Most people have an idea that France is not a good field for temperance work, but we are reaping fruit there. The French people have begun to classify drinks and those of an alcoholic nature they call poison drinks. Lots of distinguished Frenchmen have stopped using intoxicants. I think Paul Bourget is one of the number. You took a drink with him when he was in New York? Well, I guess I am wrong. Oh, I was thinking of Alphonse Daudet. The President of France has strong views on temperance.

Sober Men Wanted.

"No drinking man need apply." This is the fast-growing sentiment of to-day. The great railroad corporations do not want drinkers, for the men who turn the switches, hold the throttles and handle the money must be quick-sighted, clear-headed and reliable. Factories do not want drinkers, for an unsteady man at lathe or loom may cause great injury to person or machinery, the damage of which has to be met by the owners. Merchants do not want drinkers, for a whisky breath, across a counter will drive away the best of customers. Societies do not want drinkers, for respectable people will not associate with citizens engaged in the lowest and most disreputable of occupations.

There is but one class wishing drinkers, and that class is the saloon business.

The liquor traffic is today the heaviest clog upon the progress, and the deepest disgrace, of the nineteenth century.—*New York Tribune.*

The increase in valuation of taxable property gave an income of \$30,000 in excess of the former income from saloon licenses of \$1,000 each.

THE Santa Rosa Republican says there is not much danger of over-production in the olive oil business in California as the figures at hand show that California is not yet in it with Spain and Italy. The government returns of Spain for this year show a total olive oil production of 150,000,000 gallons. Italy is next with 75,000,000 and California shows only 35,000 gallons.

THE winter in Santa Clara county thus far has been a most pleasant one. Enough rain has fallen to make it possible for the farmer to plow or cultivate his orchard, the roads have been watered by the showers just frequently enough to keep them in the best condition and there has been much pleasant sunny weather. Winter Escapes.

The flight of refugees from Eastern winter has already set in. This year evidently the course of these birds of passage will be westward rather than southward, for Florida was not kind to her collection of pilgrims last winter. One of the earliest of the companies to reach California this year dropped down into Sacramento on Monday of this week, coming from Chicago by way of the Central route. The party consisted of 100. The cars were placarded appropriately, one device being, "Good-by blizzards; good-by Jack Frost; we are going to live in the sunshine, with the orange, the lemon, the fig tree and the vine." At Auburn a number of ladies boarded the train and presented flowers to the party. At Newcastle the excursionists were serenaded by a brass band and made the recipients of fresh California fruit. Immediately after the party reached Sacramento the members were given dinner and then escorted to a reception tendered by the Chamber of Commerce. Other entertainments followed. The company came intending to select lands near Sacramento. — *Pacific Rural Press.*

Laboring Saving Machine.

An exchange gives the following with regard to new machinery: "The effect on labor by the introduction of new machinery forms a chapter in the report of the labor commissioner of New York. According to his estimates the number of men employed as carpenters in New York has been decreased 15 per cent by new machinery, the number of button-hole makers 50 per cent, of skirt-makers 35 per cent, of bakers and confectioners 20 per cent, of furniture workers 35 per cent, printers 40 per cent, type-founders 50 per cent. Against such

decreases caused by new machinery are shown increases ranging from 2 to 33 per cent in the number of employed plumbers, gas-fitters, piano-makers, plate printers, pressmen and pressfolders, conductors, motormen, embroiderers and hostlers. As will be seen, the balance is on the wrong side of the ledger."

A Move.

The residence of J. G. Martin which has long stood as a landmark on the banks of the Los Gatos creek was "loosed from its moorings" the first of the week and moved as gently as its immense [?] size would permit to form an annex to Mr. Martin's new residence on First street.
