

1. The subject installation was designated for reparations inventory as a privately owned munitions plant under SCAPIN-1134 of 13 August and is number 37-29 on the list of reparations installations in this prefecture.

2. The management petitions for the exemption from inventory of 477 machines (all but 56 of which were pre-war equipment) to enable the plant to continue in operation in the production of textile machinery (page 5 and 6 of petition).

3. In addition to the machinery in the subject installation, approximately 1493, there are approximately 404 machines at an uncompleted dispersed plant in Futamata (number 37-28). In considering the petition the two groups of machines might be viewed as a whole. Our own investigation has indicated that inventory of this equipment will probably run as follows:

When the machinery is finally inventoried there may be slightly less class III and more class II and salvage items (through salvage of missing parts in class III group). Class I equipment will run approximately 10%, class II 33 1/3%, class III 33 1/3%. The latter has been heavily used and many have suffered from exposure. Much of the equipment is old. Therefore it is evident that the equipment shown as excess in the petition will not contain much high-grade machinery.

4. This company was a highly important figure in the production of textile equipment before the war, especially in the production of looms for the weaving of colored and patterned textiles, and a high percentage of such equipment used in the national textile industry is the product of this company. The company is at present performing an essential function in the rehabilitation of the national textile industry in the rebuilding of war damaged and worn out looms and in the production of new equipment. The company has on hand orders for approximately 1500 pieces of textile machinery, only 50 of which are for export, the balance required by the domestic industry. Potentially the operation of this company can do much to alleviate the distress of the national textile industry.

5. It is the recommendation of this office that such equipment as may be determined to be essential to the continued operation of this company be exempted from reparations inventory.

1. The application of the Suzuki Shiki Shokki Kabushiki Kaisha for exemption of machinery of the Takatsuka Plant from the reparations list, is based primarily on the importance of the factory to the economy of Japan. The parent company has a pre-war record of operation that dates back to 1909, but starting in 1938 the activities of the company were given over to an increasing extent to the production of war munitions. During the final 2 years of the war, this represented virtually the entire output of the company.

2. The dispersal of machinery from the Takatsuka Kojo to the Futamata Kojo in 1944, resulted in the equipment of both factories becoming subject to reparations. The company has requested that the machinery which formerly was in the Futamata Plant (421 pieces) be exempt from reparations, as the plant had not converted to production of war munitions until 1944.

3. It is the opinion of this headquarters that subject application should be denied, and the entire amount of machinery remain subject to reparations. Much of the equipment in the Futamata Factory which is intermingled with the machinery from the Takatsuka Factory, is of class III category, and will not likely be chosen for reparations in any event. It is the recommendation of this headquarters that the machinery of the plant be considered as a whole, and that the application of the Suzuki Shiki Shokki K.K. be denied.





1. The subject installation was designated for reparations inventory as a privately owned munitions plant under SCAPIN-1134 of 13 August and is number 37-29 on the list of reparations installations in this prefecture.

2. The management petitions for the exemption from inventory of 477 machines (all but 46 of which were pre-war equipment) to enable the plant to continue in operation in the production of textile machinery (page 5 and 6 of petition).

3. In addition to the machinery in the subject installation, approximately 1493, there are approximately 404 machines at an uncompleted dispersed plant in Futamata (number 37-28). In considering the petition the two groups of machines might be viewed as a whole. Our own investigation has indicated that inventory of this equipment will probably run as follows:

When the machinery is finally inventoried there may be slightly less class III and more class II and salvage items (through salvage of missing parts in class III group). Class I equipment will run approximately 10%, class II 33 1/3%, class III 33 1/3%. The latter has been heavily used and many have suffered from exposure. Much of the equipment is old. Therefore it is evident that the equipment shown as excess in the petition will not contain much high-grade machinery.

4. This company was a highly important figure in the production of textile equipment before the war, especially in the production of looms for the weaving of colored and patterned textiles, and a high percentage of such equipment used in the national textile industry is the product of this function in the rehabilitation of the national textile industry in the rebuilding of war damaged and worn out looms and in the production of new equipment. The company has on hand 50 of which are for export, the balance required by the domestic industry. Potentially the operation of this company can do much to alleviate the distress of the national textile industry.

5. It is the recommendation of this office that such equipment as may be determined to be essential to the continued operation of this company be exempted from reparations inventory.

1. The application of the Suzuki Shiki Shokki Kabushiki Kaisha for exemption of machinery of the Takatsuka Plant from the reparations list, is based primarily on the importance of the factory to the economy of Japan. The parent company has a pre-war record of operation that dates back to 1909, but starting in 1938 the activities of the company were given over to an increasing extent to the production of war munitions. During the final 2 years of the war, this represented virtually the entire output of the company.
2. The dispersal of machinery from the Takatsuka Kojo to the Futamata Kojo in 1944, resulted in the equipment of both factories becoming subject to reparations. The company has requested that the machinery which formerly was in the Futamata Plant (421 pieces) be exempt from reparations, as the plant had not converted to production of war munitions until 1944.
3. It is the opinion of this headquarters that subject application should be denied, and the entire amount of machinery remain subject to reparations. Much of the equipment in the Futamata Factory which is intermingled with the machinery from the Takatsuka Factory, is of class III category, and will not likely be chosen for reparations in any event. It is the recommendation of this headquarters that the machinery of the plant be considered as a whole, and that the application of the Suzuki Shiki Shokki K.K. be denied.

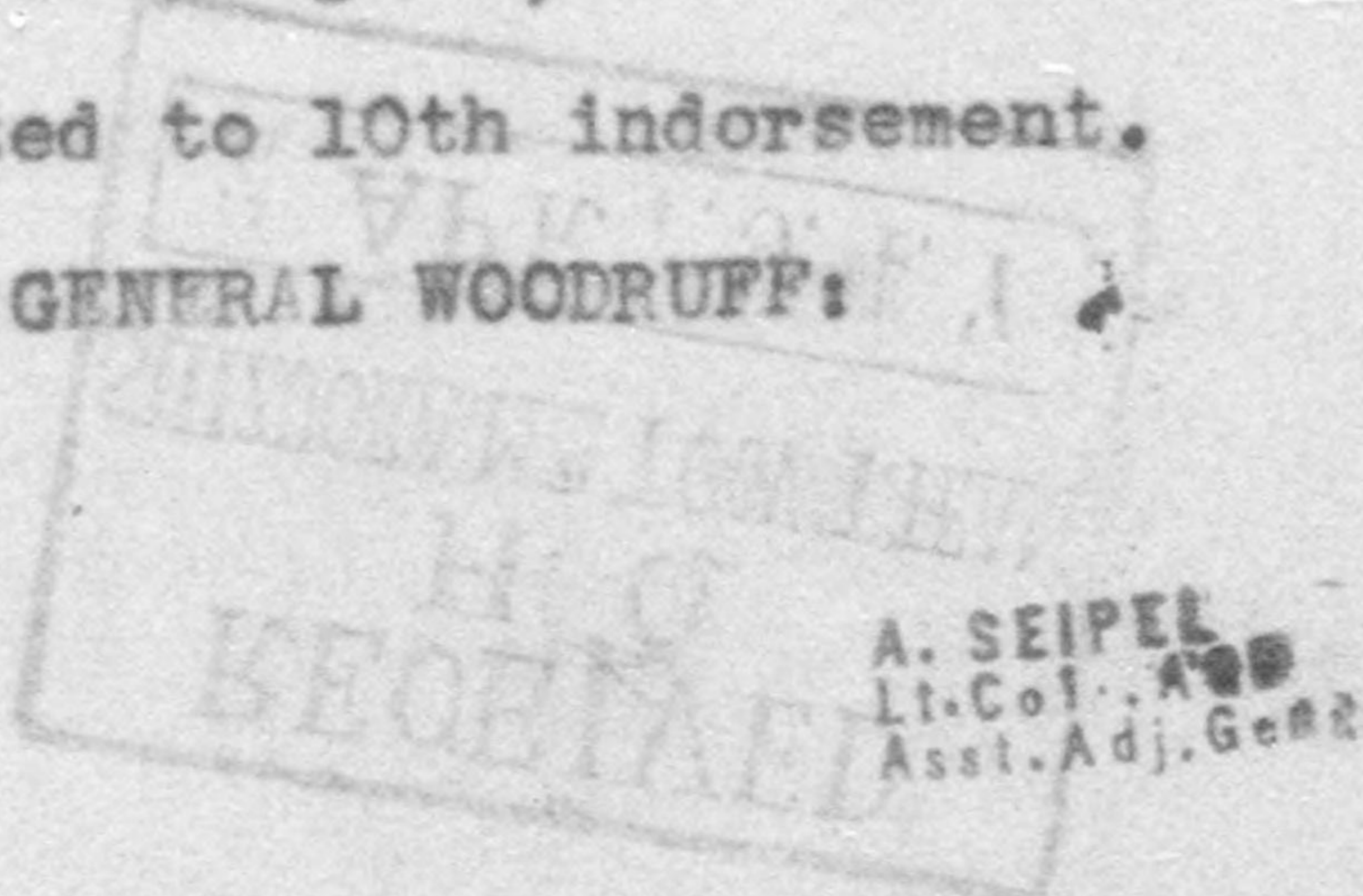

From 1929 to 1941 the looms for sarong, gingham, tablecloth and preparatory, dyeing finishing machines were exported to China, India, Java, French Indo-China and Siam etc. and enjoyed a high reputation. However, owing to the breakout of the Sino-Japanese Incident in 1937, the company was directed to make arms and munitions by the military arsenal, expanding the equipments of the plant but nevertheless the production of textile machines have been carried on until the end of the war.

Unfortunately, on 7th, Dec., 1944, Manamata Plant, historic chief plant since 1909, suffered severely from the earthquake disaster and moreover, meeting war calamities several times, most of the remaining equipments and machines were obliged to be transferred to the Takatsuka Plant, where they are now located.

(K) Reason why the equipments are required to be left :

- (1) The company began to accommodate the machines and equipments in order to produce and repair all type of textile machines as soon as they had the permission from the Headquarters Sixth Army on Nov., 24th, 1945 and it was accomplished in August. At present the company has gradually reached to the condition that they are able to find the high efficiency.

They have an earnest desire in endeavouring to make all types of textile machines, as they did before the war, by using the machines equipped for manufacturing looms, preparatory and finishing machines at Takatsuka Plant.

- (2) Since starting business in 1909, the company has endeavored to make improvements and inventions of textile machines with constant efforts and researches and has obtained 28 patent rights and new design rights for practical uses. Besides, the automatic looms with four shuttle boxes and a single shuttle box were accomplished by excellent engineers in the study of textile machines ever since before the war.

With the confidence that they are looked upon as unique inventions in the world, the company is manufacturing and testing them, together with applying for the patent rights and new design rights for practical use.

(3) The company is supplying the looms as an exporting commodity by order of the Government.

Before the war they exported a large quantity of textile machines to China, India, Java, French Indo-China and Siam etc. and enjoyed a high reputation, especially Suzuki's sarong looms were second to none occupying 95 % of the whole production in Japan. And the rate of preparatory machines was 30 % and dyeing finishing machines 35 % to all.

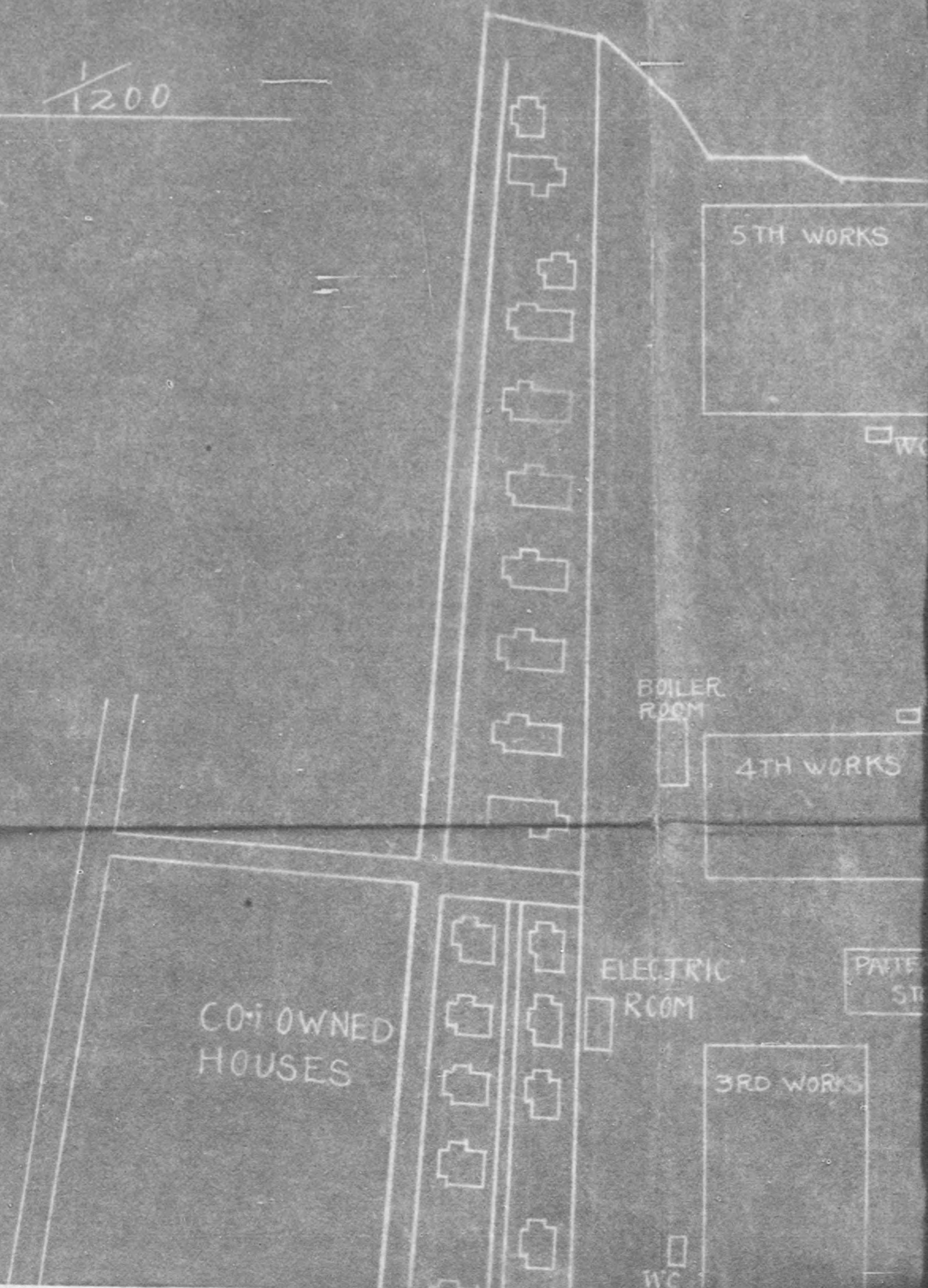
However, they are trying to maintain close relations with foreign customers by the engineer they have, staying at the Vira & Co., in Bangkok, Siam since the war.


In conclusion, on account of the reasons above mentioned, the company desires at least 477 sets of machines necessary to the plant will be remained.

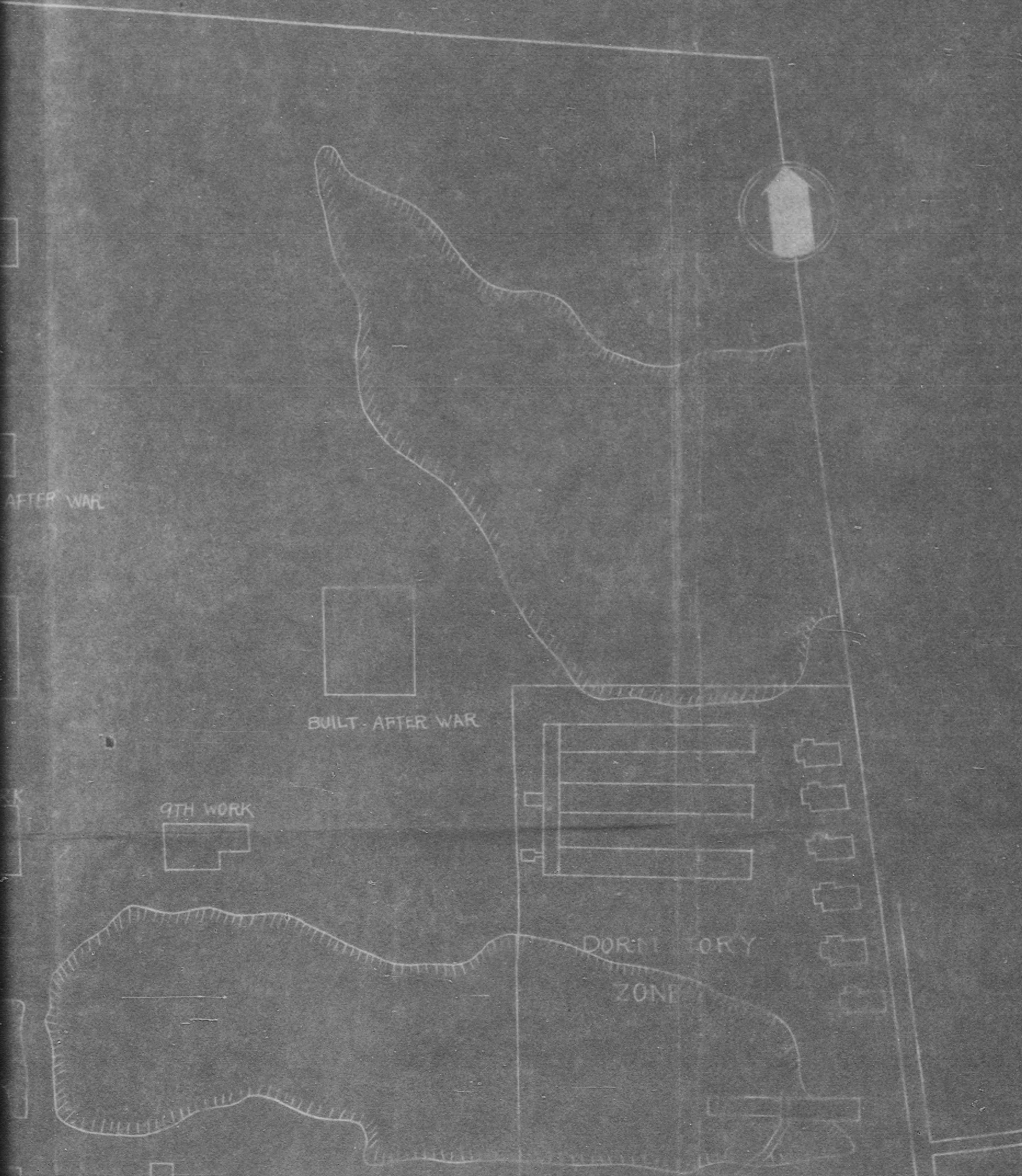
