#### PRESIDENT COOLIDGE AND THE CAMPAIGN

With a little more than half of his cabinet to assist him President Coolidge appears far more engrossed in the affairs of government these days than in the details of the coming campaign. He is to "carry on" at the White House at a time when other presidents generally have left Washington far behind to seek recreation in cooler climes.

There is absolutely no indication as yet, that Mr. Coolidge is going to take an active part in the campaign, as was at first supposed. Perhaps the death of his son might have something to do with his present state of mind, but there are friends of the chief executive who say he has never believed a president should make a bitterly partisan fight for re-election.

Never of a robust physique, Mr. Coolidge gives his callers these days the impression of a tired man. The lines of his face seem a little deeper than they were a year ago. The weather in the capital during the past few days has been unusually warm, but the president, accustomed as he has been to the bracing atmosphere of New England, has uttered no word of complaint. There is a marvelous amount of grim determination in his wiry, if slight, physique, and the reserve strength of an unemotional disposition is serving him in good stead at this time. The White House physicians report the president in excellent physical condition as the campaign approaches, and make light of the appearance of fatigue which has caused some comment among White House visitors. The party managers say, as the campaign seems to be developing, there will be little occasion for any strenuous effort on the part of Mr. Coolidge. From what they have heard of Mr. Davis' plans, the G. O. P. leaders feel that Mr. Coolidge may "rest on his oars" for a large part of the time. They have heard, for instance, that the Democratic nominee will make taxation and economy in government two of the big issues of the campaign. The leaders say the Republicans already have accomplished a reduction in taxes and have put the most rigid economic plan into effect.

Mr. Coolidge realizes, of course, that the Democrats will attempt to claim full credit for the recent tax reduction because of his stand for the Mellon plan as against the legislation finally passed by Congress and approved by the executive. It will require a great deal of education-more, the Republicans say, than is possible in a two months' campaignto enable the man in the street to differentiate between one tax plan and another. The important fact to the Republicans is that Secretary Mellon and President Coolidge recommended tax reduction and tax reduction was accomplished under the present administration.

The president still believes in the Mellon plan, and is prepared to defend it in such campaign speeches as he will feel called upon to make. Further, Mr. Coolidge intends to recommend the Mellon plan anew to the next Congress, regardless of what the results may be at the polls in November. The president will point to his own record and that of President Harding on all matters of government economy. So, if the Democrats are preparing to stress these issues, as the Republicans now profess to believe, the coming campaign may prove far more exciting and colorful. The La Follette-Wheeler organization is expected to furnish about all the fireworks which may be exploded between now and election day, but it is the Republican plan to ignore this third ticket. That was the meaning of Chairman Butler's statement that the Republican campaign would be uniform in all sections of the country. There is to be no fight against the independents as such. The Republican scheme of campaign is wholly an affirmative one. The effort will be to keep President Coolidge "sold" to the American people. Mr. Coolidge is quietly formulating his speech of acceptance to be delivered the evening of August 14. He has plenty of time and will not rush the manuscript. The president feels that this will be his one great contribution to the campaign. As a matter of fact, it is the only political speech for which he is scheduled at this time. It may be October before he speaks again, except for occasional short addresses by radio. There is no disposition on the part of Chairman Butler or other leaders of the party to urge a more strenuous campaign on the part of the president. They are more than willing to consent to his wishes for as much seclusion in the White House as possible, and they believe Mr. Coolidge is a far more effective candidate sticking to the work of government than the Sun and Venus are all in The substance is fused quartz and he would be flying from place to place about the country talkbenefic aspect. ing politics and thinking of politics only. 'It was the kind of thing there would be a thrill in and we wanted some easy money," said Leopold. "We made a few mistakes. I should have picked up my glasses. I didn't know I dropped them. We thought that we had the whole thing air-tight, but it wasn't. That's all." His companion in crime, Richard Loeb, has slowly slipped from his lofty pinnacle in the ethereal spaces of self-conceit. He is no longer the sure-footed, well-poised steeplejack, scaling the spires of a vagrant imagination and from them glancing downwards to laugh at the clumsy efforts of policemen bent on learning who kidnaped and killed Robert Franks. He seems to have lost his nerve and become jumpy. The fact is that no one can separate himself from the human masses without perversion. No one can become the enemy of society without society taking its revenge upon him. Each of the criminals accuses the other, but both are ready to acknowledge complicity in the crime. Two things seem to have been the operating

motives of these boys-two things that are common enough: Greed and the spirit of adventure. They were out for a prank and had come to regard the lives of their fellow human beings as of no account compared to their own amusement. And they thought they would make some easy money. Their case has broken down and their condition is pitiable. Even more pitiable is that of their relatives. Just as no man succeeds without carrying others up with him, so no man goes down without carrying others down with him. The sufferings of the families of the two boys must be great. Their crime, however, was peculiarly atrocious.

They slew a bright, innocent fellow in the heyday of his youth in an automobile in the midst of a heavily traveled street. First they hit him on the head with a chisel and aftrewards they insured his death by choking him with a gag. In addition to this they put acid on his face in an effort to disfigure him so that his identity would be destroyed. There can be no excuse of poverty in their action, for both boys were sons of well-to-do parents and received from them a liberal allowance. Ransom and the adventure of crime were the motives for the deed. In removing from its pale the two murderers, there should be no vengeance displayed by society, but only the desire to protect itself by the administration of strict justice. Altogether it seems to be an instance of th superiority complex and of the unreliability of the intellect as a substitute for the natural instincts mankind.
