

REMARKS



1. ANNOUNCER: Uncle Sam's Forest Rangers!
2. MUSIC: THEME
3. ANNOUNCER: Last year, nurseries maintained by the U. S. Forest Service  
4. produced 168 million trees for planting on lands within  
5. the National Forests. Planting covered more than 165  
6. thousand acres of lands which have long lain idle as a result  
7. of early-day fires and other abuses. It was a noteworthy  
8. step toward restoring some of our idle and wasting lands to  
9. productivity. But the Forest Service points out that there  
10. are nearly two million acres within the National Forests and  
11. some 25 million acres of private and state lands which  
12. literally cry out, right now, for such planting to restore  
13. them to worthwhile service. If we are to accomplish this  
14. huge job of reforestation in the United States, we'll have to  
15. get busy in a big way, and the work must be backed by a  
16. public consciousness for need of forest restoration, plus  
17. wholehearted cooperation between all landowners, private and  
18. public.....
19. And now to the Pine Cone National Forest with our friends  
20. Ranger Jim Robbins, his wife Bess, Jerry Quick, the assistant  
21. ranger, and Mary Halloway, Winding Creek school teacher. As  
22. we look in today we find Ranger Jim in the office of the  
23. ranger station tuning the Forest Service radio.
24. SOUND OF RADIO SQUEALING AND CRACKLING BACK
25. SOUND OF DOOR OPENING AND CLOSING



1. BESS: (COMING ON) Haven't you been able to make contact with Jerry  
2. yet, Jim?
3. JIM: Not yet, Bess.
4. BESS: That cloudburst and flood at Stevens Point must have been  
5. terrible. Jerry's probably been so busy directing the CCC boy  
6. in their rescue work up there that he hasn't had time to call  
7. back.
8. JIM: M-m-m. May be. This flood has played Ned with our plans all  
9. the way around.
10. BESS: What do you mean, Jim?
11. JIM: I'm thinkin' about those 20,000 trees that came in from the  
12. nursery yesterday.
13. BESS: You mean they'll go to waste?
14. JIM: If we don't get 'em in the ground by tomorrow or next day they  
15. will. Sendin' Jerry and the CCC boys to help out over there  
16. Stevens Point had to be done, but gettin' those trees in the  
17. ground is kind of an emergency too.
18. BESS: You mean those are the trees that were supposed to be planted  
19. on that land up above the new Three Forks irrigation reservoir?
20. JIM: Uh huh. And there won't be any chance to get any more trees  
21. for that piece this spring either. Let it go unplanted much  
22. longer and the reservoir's liable to be silted up so bad it'll  
23. be ruined.....H-m-m, I sure wish Jerry would call. If he  
24. could pull out over there and get back here by tonight.....
25. SOUND OF RADIO CRACKLING UP



1. DAVE: (FILTER) Eye twenty-two calling M four. (CRACKLE) Eye twenty-two calling M four.
2. BESS: There he is, Jim. But that isn't Jerry.
4. JIM: No that's Dave Parsons - he's up there on the job too --
5. DAVE: (FILTER) Come in, Jim, if you can hear me.
6. SOUND OF SWITCH CLICK
7. JIM: M four to Eye twenty-two. This is Jim. You're comin' in okay, Dave. Where's Jerry? Go ahead. (SWITCH CLICK)
9. DAVE: (FILTER) Jerry's out right now--asked me to call you--Jim, this place was really hard hit. There's a clean-up and relief job here that's gonna keep us busy three or four days at least. Got two searching crews out lookin' for five people still unaccounted for. Sides of houses caved in by rocks and logs. Streets, stores and houses full of mud and debris.
15. Go ahead.
16. SWITCH CLICK
17. JIM: What about food and water and housing for the people flooded out of their homes. Go ahead. (SWITCH CLICK)
19. DAVE: (FILTER) Red Cross from Willow Glen and local ranchers are takin' care of that. Ours is mainly a cleanup and searching job. Go ahead.
22. JIM: (SWITCH CLICK) Okay, Dave you and Jerry know what needs to be done. Keep the boys there 'till the town can take over.
24. Go ahead. (SWITCH CLICK)

1. DAVE: (FILTER) Oh, Jim. Jerry wants to know what about all  
2. those trees that came in before he pulled out yesterday, Jim?  
3. Those trees for that planting job up there at Three Forks.  
4. Gosh! Those trees'll be ruined if they have to wait 'till we  
5. finish up here.. How about splitting the camp and sending half  
6. the boys back to plant? Go ahead.  
7. JIM: (SWITCH CLICK) Can half the boys be spared? Go ahead.  
8. (SWITCH CLICK)

17. JIM: (SWITCH CLICK) Good luck, Dave. (RADIO SWITCHED OFF)  
18. BESS: JIM, it must be terrible. All those poor people's homes  
19. flooded and some of them lost... probably washed away and won't  
20. be found for days. It's terrible.  
21. JIM: H-m-m. We can't pull any men out of there, that's certain.  
22. BESS: Could you hire some other tree planters, Jim?

24. SOUND OF DOOR OPENING
25. MARY: (COMING UP) Good morning, Mr. Robbins.



1. JIM: Mary! What're you doin' here at this hour of the mornin'?

2. MARY: You said people wouldn't turn out, Mr. Robbins. Remember?

3. BESS: Here's your hat, Jim, and out there's your planting crew.

4. Come on, Mary (FADING) You can help me carry out the lunch.

5. MARY: Hurry up Mr. Robbins. We're all anxious to get started.

6. JIM: Well, I'll be blessed! Say Bess....Mary....you....you....

7. By George! You two are.....

8. BESS: Hurry, Jim.

9. JIM: (SHOUTING, GOING OFF) Okay, Okay, everybody! I'm comin'!

10. (HORNS UP)

11. MUSIC: FINALE

12. ANNOUNCER: Uncle Sam's Forest Rangers comes to you on the National Farm
