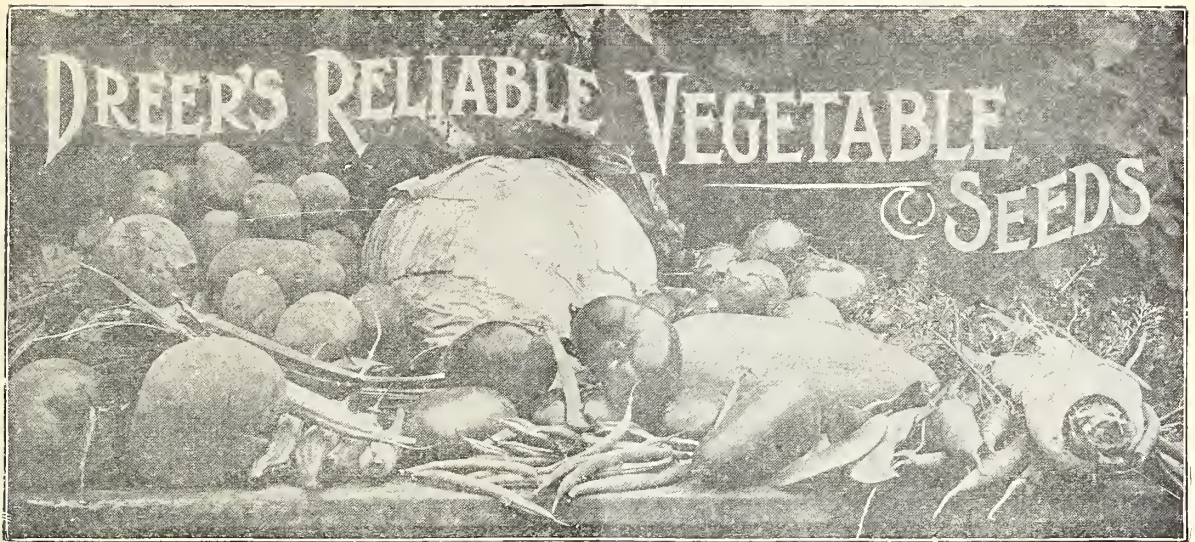
Packing. We give special care to packing all orders and make no charge for boxes nor for delivery to freight depots or express offices in Philadelphia.
