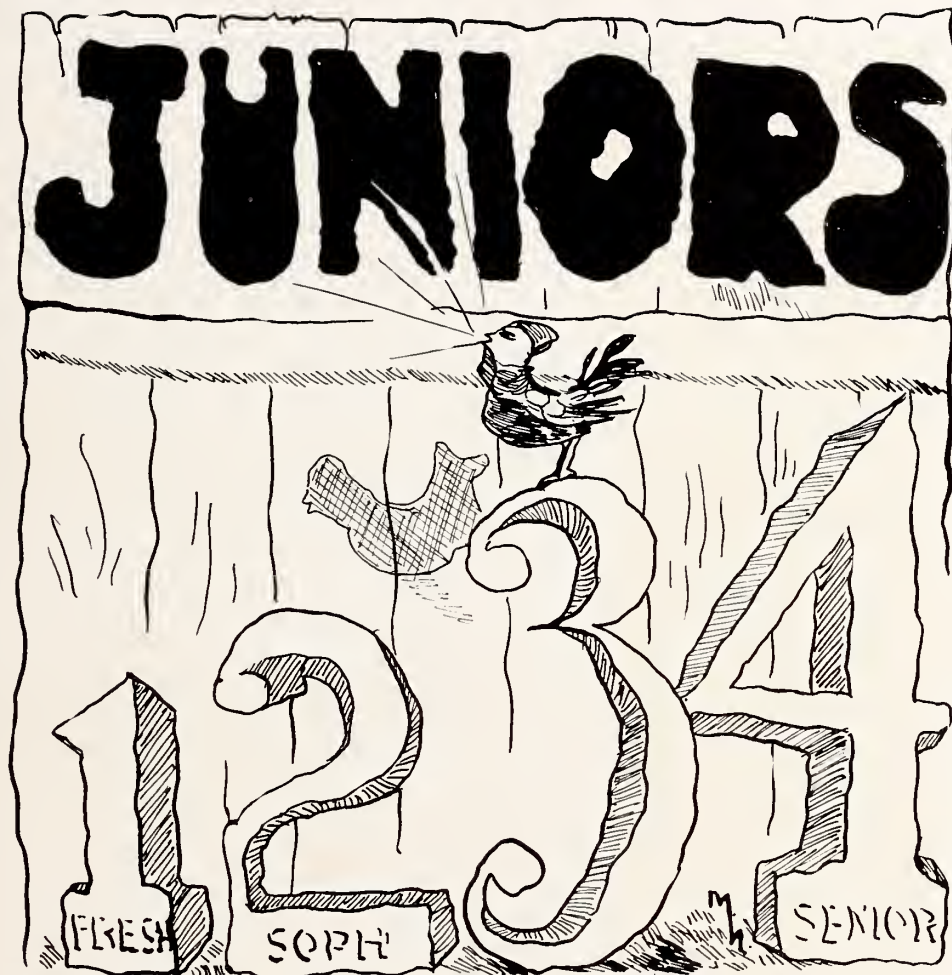


MELVIN PRESTON WHITLEY

The Triangular Debaters



HAVING two such splendid literary societies in our school, viz: the Archer and the Moser, we have developed among the students a greater desire for self-improvement. It has been the aim of both of these organizations to exert a lasting influence over the literary career of each individual.

As a result of the practice of debating in society we have been able to have worthy delegates to represent Selma High School in the Triangular Debates. Last year Nashville, Spring Hope, and Selma were in a triangle—the latter being represented by Lucy Talton, Mable Nordan, Carr Whitley, and Harry Candler.

Many participated in the preliminary this year—not merely to win, but to gain experience—from which were selected Lucy Talton, Mable Nordan, Hazel Smith, and Harry Candler—with Gibson Blackman and Claiborne King as substitutes.

The query this year is, as usual, one of national importance: Resolved, *That the Inter-Allied War Debts Should Be Cancelled.*

In the contest this year Selma won in the debates with Enfield and Nashville. Our representatives will now go to Chapel Hill for the finals on April 10 and 11, and in these Gibson Blackman will take the place of Lucy Talton.



Our Contests



IT has been customary for the Selma High School to send representatives to Trinity, Wake Forest, and Guilford Colleges each year to participate in declamation contests. This creates an interest among the students and gives them an opportunity to speak in public. Nothing is more helpful, more required, and more admired than to be able to speak fluently and with ease before a large audience.

Last year Floyd Lee, Jesse Barden, Ruth Fulghum, and Carr Whitley had the pleasure of representing Selma High School in declamation contests at Trinity, Wake Forest, and Guilford Colleges respectively. Their trips were both pleasant and beneficial.

Last year at Commencement nine of the high school students participated in an oratorical, an essay, and a reading contest, a gold medal being offered for the best of each. Jesse Barden was the successful winner of the oratorical medal, the subject of his oration being, "Carolina—The Land of Opportunity"; Rosa Richardson Pope received the essayist's medal, her subject dealing with nature—"The Hidden Palace of Art"; and Esta Lee, by her interesting reading on "The Jiners," won the reciter's medal.

The Eko-L organization of Trinity College is offering a ten dollar gold piece this year for the best essay on any local subject, and Selma has entered the contest. A similar prize was offered year before last for the best short story. This was won by Miriam Brietz, then a Senior in our high school here.

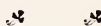
