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INTRODUCTORY.

Some ten years ago I was applied to by the late Edmund D. Halsey, Esquire, of Morristown, New Jersey, for information concerning the Edwards descendants of Rhoda Ogden, he having in hand a Genealogy of the descendants of Robert Ogden, 2d, father of Rhoda. I consulted the Tuttle Genealogy, which includes the Edwards family from the marriage of Elizabeth Tuttle with Richard Edwards, in 1667; also the Dwight and the Stoddard Genealogies; but found all of them deficient and often unreliable for the generations later than Timothy Edwards, of Stockbridge. This called my attention to the importance of preserving our family records while some members of the third generation from Timothy were still living. I myself belong to that generation, and I remember several of the children of Timothy, and knew part of these well.

Thereupon I put myself in communication with Hamilton and Alexander Edwards; with S. Tyler Williams and Mrs. Frances Whiting Mather,—the three last named now gone—and received from all cordial assistance. I found that Dr. Franklyn Ellsworth Edwards had for some time been at work on a list of the descendants of his great-grandfather, Edward Edwards, and he very kindly gave me his material, and thereafter aided me much, even making several journeys to obtain further information. Mrs. Elizabeth Hooker Stanger contributed a list of the descendants of her ancestress, Phebe Edwards, and Mr. Williams took hold zealously, and was at pains to trace the posterity of his grandmother, Sarah Edwards Tyler, by her first marriage with Benjamin Chaplin. From many others I also received aid.

Genealogy of the Edwards Family.

There will, of course, be found errors, both of omission and commission, and I shall feel obliged to any one who will call my attention to them, in order that when the book reaches a second edition, correction may be made.

The descendants here listed number very nearly twelve hundred, and they have lived, or do now live, mostly in Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Ohio, and States west to the Pacific. There have been few in the other New England States, few at the South, and in Canada. The migration from Stockbridge was westerly.

GENEALOGY OF THE EDWARDS FAMILY.

THE ANCESTORS OF TIMOTHY AND RHODA OGDEN EDWARDS.

1. *William Edwards*, who came to this country from England about 1640, was the son of Rev. Richard Edwards, a clergyman of the Church of England, in the time of Elizabeth; and was of Welsh parentage. He married Anne ————. After the death of her husband, she married James Coles, who, with her son, William Edwards, then young, accompanied the mother to Hartford, Conn. Both Mr. and Mrs. Coles died in Hartford. In 1646, William's name appears as a landowner in Hartford. Mrs. Coles' death is recorded as on the 20th of February, 1670, and she left by will her house and land to William during his life, then to her grandson Richard. William Edwards is named with William Tuttle and others as concerned in the East Haven settlement. About 1645, he married Agnes, widow of William Spencer, by whom he had one child, Richard. William died ————.

2. *Richard Edwards*, born May, 1647; was a merchant in Hartford; married (1) Elizabeth Tuttle, daughter of William and Elizabeth Tuttle, of New Haven, November 19, 1667. They had seven children. Mrs. Edwards died, and Richard married (2), 1692, Mary Talcott, daughter of Hon. John Talcott, by whom he had six children. She died at Hartford, April 20, 1718.

Dr. Franklyn Ellsworth Edwards wrote to the compiler of these notes, on the 22d of October, 1900: "I went to Hartford, and found there the grave of Richard Edwards and Mary Talcott, his wife, and one son buried 'on the dust of his mother.' The cemetery is re-graded and turfed, all the

tombstones restored and re-lettered, and a high iron fence incloses it — all the work of the Daughters of the Revolution. His father, William, is probably buried in some other cemetery thereabout, but I had not time to look up his grave.”

In a copy of a Manuscript Memorial of Richard Edwards, written by his son Timothy, I read: (The original of this was in the possession of the late Professor Park, and he read from it at the Edwards Meeting, at Stockbridge, 1870.) “He was of a noble stature, of a straight, well-formed body, and of a comely countenance. His smile had a pleasantcy beyond which I have seen in many, yea, in most others. He

was quick and nimble in his movements, even to old age; and was of a strong and healthy constitution. He had a strong, clear mind, and had a very good utterance. He had a quick fancy; a pleasant, ready wit, with a very good judgment. He could argue in a matter and reason in a case very well. He was a man of considerable reading; both in Law, History, and Divinity; was well furnished for society, and very pleasant in consultation." Timothy adds: "Thus it pleased the Most High to endow and adorn my dear departed Father with many virtues which rendered him very lovely and desirable in his life, and much lamented in his death."

3. *Timothy Edwards*, b. May 14, 1669; fitted for college under Rev. Pelatiah Glover, minister of Springfield, Mass., and entered Harvard 1687; graduated July 4, 1691, receiving the degree of A.B. and A.M. on the same day—"an uncommon mark of respect." He was licensed to preach in 1694, and ordained as pastor of the new church at East Windsor, Conn., 1698; married Esther, second child of Rev. Solomon Stoddard, of Northampton, Mass., by whom he had eleven children—one son and ten daughters. Mr. Stoddard was the son of Anthony Stoddard, who came from England to Boston about 1639, and who married Mary, daughter of Hon. Emanuel Downing, of Salem, and Lucy, his wife. Solomon was born October 4, 1643; died February 11, 1729, aet. 86; graduated at Harvard, 1662; settled at Northampton, Mass., as minister, September 11, 1670; married Mrs. Esther Mather, *nee* Esther Warham, of Windsor, Conn., March 8, 1670; she died February 10, 1736, aet. 93. The tradition is that black hair and black eyes came into the family through the Warhams. Timothy Edwards died January 27, 1758, in his eighty-ninth year, and the sixtieth of his ministry; Mrs. Edwards died January 19, 1770, in her ninety-ninth year. Mrs. Edwards is described as "tall, dignified and commanding in appearance, affable and gentle in her manner, and was regarded as surpassing her husband in native vigor of understanding. Remarkable judgment and prudence, extensive information, thorough knowledge of the Scriptures and of theology, singular conscientiousness and piety,—these are virtues attributed to the mother which reappear in her son

Jonathan. These also came as if by natural descent to a daughter of Solomon Stoddard."

Jonathan Edwards, in a letter, says: "My grandfather Stoddard was a very great man, of strong powers of mind, of great grace and great authority, of a masterly countenance, speech and behavior."

In the spring of 1709, Mr. Edwards was appointed by the Colonial Legislature of Connecticut as the Chaplain of the troops of that State for the expedition against Canada. He left Windsor for New Haven in July, and reached Albany August 13th, with three companies under Colonel Livingston. The country was uncleared, and he camped two nights in the woods. On the 20th of August he left for Wood Creek. At Saratoga, in consequence of exposure, he was taken seriously ill; on the 14th of September, being unable to proceed, he was conveyed in a boat to Stillwater, and then carried back to East Windsor in a wagon, and on a bed. Mr. Edwards was unusually esteemed and beloved as an upright, pious, and exemplary man, and a faithful and very efficient minister of the gospel. His grandson, Rev. Sereno Dwight, says of him:

"He was five feet ten inches high, of fair complexion, strong built frame, of polished manners, particularly attentive to dress and propriety of exterior; never appearing in public but in the full dress of a clergyman. On a visit to East Windsor, in the summer of 1823, I found a considerable number of persons advanced in years, who had been well acquainted with Mrs. Edwards, and two upwards of ninety, who had been pupils of her husband. Mr. Edwards was well acquainted with Hebrew Literature, and was regarded as a man of more than usual learning; but was particularly distinguished for his accurate knowledge of the Greek and Roman classics. He annually prepared a number of youths for college, there being at that time no public schools or academies endowed for that purpose. One of my aged informants, who pursued his preparatory studies under him, told me that, on his admission into college, when the officers learned with whom he had studied, they remarked to him that there was no need of examining Mr. Edwards' scholars. He was, for that period, remarkably liberal and enlightened

with regard to the education of his children, preparing not only his son, but each of his daughters, for college. On the Canada expedition, he writes in a letter, dated August 3d, 1711, that Jonathan and the girls may continue their study of Latin; another letter, dated August 7th, that Jonathan may continue to recite his Latin to his eldest sister. When his daughters were of a proper age, he sent them to Boston to finish their education. He always preached extemporaneously, and until he was upwards of the age of seventy, without noting down the heads of his discourses. His influence on his congregation was commanding; when he heard of any division among his people, he went immediately to see that the parties were reconciled, and when he heard of any improper conduct, his custom was to go immediately and reprove them. At the time of his settlement at East Windsor, his father built for him a house on a farm of moderate extent, which he had bought. It was then considered a handsome residence." "I saw it," continues Dr. Dwight, "in 1803; a substantial house of moderate dimensions; had one chimney in the middle, and was entered, like all houses of that period, by stepping on the sill. In this house, Mr. and Mrs. Edwards lived and died, and here all their children were born. A step-stone that belongs to it is inserted in the foundation of the Theological Seminary at East Windsor." (See Appendix.)

[The Rev. Charles A. Jaquith, of South Windsor, wrote me, November 29, 1902: "The First Congregational Church, of which I am pastor, had as its first pastor Timothy Edwards. It was here that Jonathan Edwards was born, about a mile north of our present church building, and where the cellar of the house can plainly be seen. This parish was set off from old Windsor as East Windsor, but later, the eastern and northern part of the town, east of the Connecticut River, was set off from this, but kept our name; this parish becoming South Windsor. Our church building is the fourth in the history of the church." Mr. Jaquith suggested that as the second centennial of the birth of Jonathan Edwards, "which we hope to celebrate," would occur next year, an Edwards Memorial Window would seem appropriate. A number of

the Edwards descendants responded favorably, and the window is assured.]

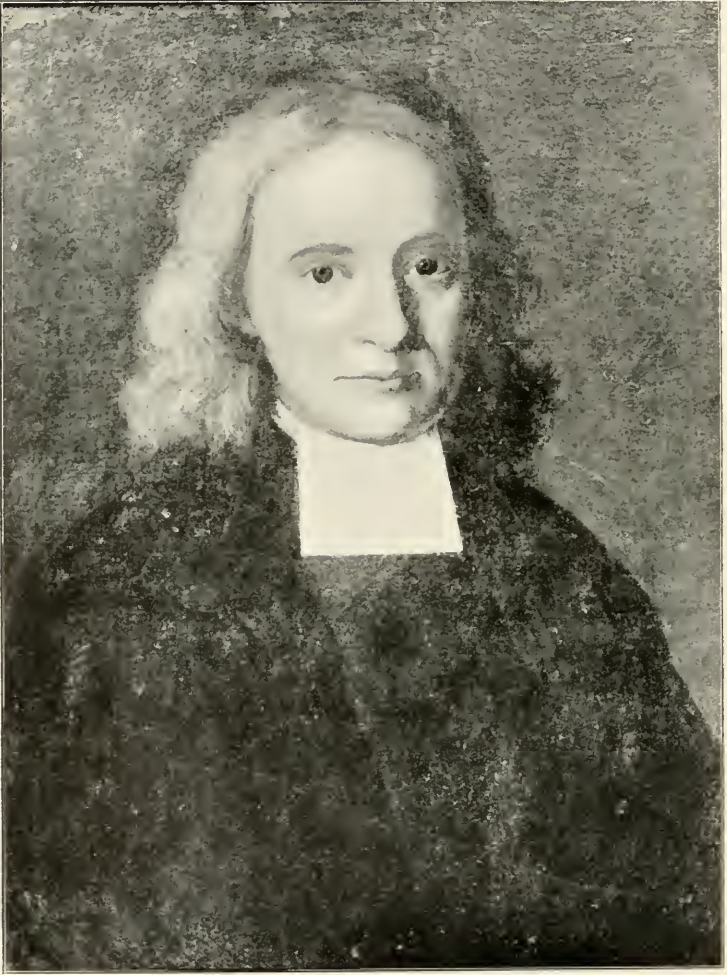

A copy of a letter from Timothy Edwards to his daughter, Elisabeth Huntington, dated January 24, 1725, is here given.

4. *Jonathan Edwards*, born at East Windsor, Conn., October 5, 1703. "Everything points to him as a child of rare intellectual precocity. When not more than twelve years old, he wrote a letter refuting the idea of the materiality of the soul. At about the same time he wrote an elaborate

and instructive account of the habits of the field spider, based upon his own observation." (Allen's Life of Jonathan Edwards.) "He entered Yale College in 1716, and received the degree of A.B., 1720, a little before he was seventeen years old. In his second year at college, he read Locke on the 'Human Understanding' with great delight and profit, though he made good progress in all the arts and sciences, and had an uncommon taste for Natural Philosophy, which he cultivated to the end of his life; yet Moral Philosophy and Divinity were his favorite studies. He lived at college two years after he took his degree, preparing for the work of the ministry. And being pitched upon and applied to by a number of ministers in New England, who were interested, to act in behalf of the English Presbyterians of New York, he complied with their request, and went to New York in August, 1722, and preached there to very good acceptance about eight months. He left them the next spring, and retired to his father's house, where he spent the summer in close study. In 1723, he received his degree of M.A.; about which time he had invitations from several congregations to come among them; but being chosen Tutor of Yale College, the next spring he retired thither, and remained about two years. While he was so engaged, he was applied to by the people of Northampton, with the invitation to come and settle there with his grandfather Stoddard, who, by reason of his great age, stood in need of assistance. He thereupon resigned his tutorship in September, 1726, and accepted the invitation, and was ordained colleague with Mr. Stoddard February 15, 1727. He remained in the work of the ministry to that congregation until June 22, 1750, somewhat over twenty-three years." (Life of Mr. Edwards, Northampton, 1764.)

On the 28th day of July, 1727, he married Sarah, daughter of the Rev. James and Mary Hooker Pierpont, of New Haven, Conn., the bride being seventeen years of age. She is spoken of as possessing rare beauty both of form and feature. She was descended from the Rev. Thomas Hooker, renowned as the father of the Connecticut churches. James

Pierpont was an eminent divine, connected with Yale College in various capacities, founder, trustee, and Professor of Moral Philosophy. His father, John Pierpont, came to Roxbury, Mass., from Holme-Pierpont, in the County of Nottingham, England, and was the youngest of three sons of Sir John Pierpont. At about the time of his marriage, Mr. Edwards is described thus: "He was tall, upwards of six feet in height, slender, and of great seriousness and gravity of manner. His face bespeaks a delicate and nervous organization. The life he had set for himself was that of a student who would not allow his time to be frittered away by useless employment. He visited the people only in cases of necessity. Thirteen hours of study daily is said to have been his rule. His manner in the pulpit is described as quiet exceedingly, with little or no gesture; a voice not loud, but distinct and penetrating."

"Mrs. Edwards proved to be a woman of strong character, endowed with a natural religious enthusiasm, with a decidedly mystic bent to the piety that belonged to her from childhood. As her husband's reputation grew throughout the colony, her name became everywhere associated with his, but also as of a person to be known and revered on her own account. There was nothing morbid or sad about her religion. She made the home at Northampton a center of genial and attractive hospitality. 'A sweeter couple I have not seen,' said Whitefield in his diary, after a visit of several days." (Allen.)

Mr. Edwards was dismissed ignominiously by his congregation January 22, 1750. For the cause of this proceeding, reference is made to any Life of Mr. Edwards. "The Indian missions at Stockbridge being vacant, the Commissioners for Indian Affairs, at Boston, applied to Mr. Edwards. He was at the same time invited by the inhabitants of Stockbridge, and repairing to that place, he was introduced, and fixed as missionary to the Indians there by an ecclesiastical council called for that purpose, August 8, 1751." (Life, 1764.)

"It was at Stockbridge that Mr. Edwards wrote the treatise

on the Will, and that on Original Sin. On September 24, 1757, his son-in-law, the Rev. Aaron Burr, President of the New Jersey College (now Princeton University), died, and at the next meeting of the Trustees, Mr. Edwards was chosen his successor, the news of which was quite unexpected to him. After much hesitation and correspondence with the Trustees, he accepted the position, and set off from Stockbridge in January, 1758, leaving his family, not to be removed till spring. He had two daughters at Princeton, Mrs. Burr and Lucy, his eldest, unmarried. The smallpox was then in Princeton, and by the advice of the physicians, and with the consent of the Corporation, he was inoculated, February 13. He had it favorably, and it was thought all danger was over; but a secondary fever set in, and it put an end to his life on March 22, 1758, in the fifty-fifth year of his age. A little before his death he called his daughter Lucy to him, and addressed her in a few words, which were immediately written down, and were as follows: 'Dear Lucy, it seems to be the will of God that I must shortly leave you; therefore, give my kindest love to my dear wife, and tell her that the uncommon union which has so long subsisted between us has been of such a nature as I trust is spiritual, and therefore will continue forever; and I hope she shall be supported under so great a trial, and submit cheerfully to the will of God. And as to my children, you are likewise to be left fatherless, which I hope will be an inducement to you all to seek a Father who will never fail you.' His last words were: 'Trust in God, and ye need not fear.' He appeared to have the uninterrupted use of his reason to the last, and died with as much calmness and composure as that with which one goes to sleep." (Life of Mr. Edwards, printed in Northampton, 1764.)

His remains, as well as those of his wife, who died seven months later, while in Philadelphia, and those of his grandson, Aaron Burr, rest in the cemetery at Princeton.

On the 22d of June, 1900, just a hundred and fifty years after the dismissal of Mr. Edwards, a Memorial Bronze Tablet to him was unveiled in the First Church (his church)

in Northampton, containing a two-thirds length relief figure of Edwards, life size or larger, represented as if preaching. On the panel beneath the figure is the inscription.

In Memory of

JONATHAN EDWARDS,

Minister of Northampton

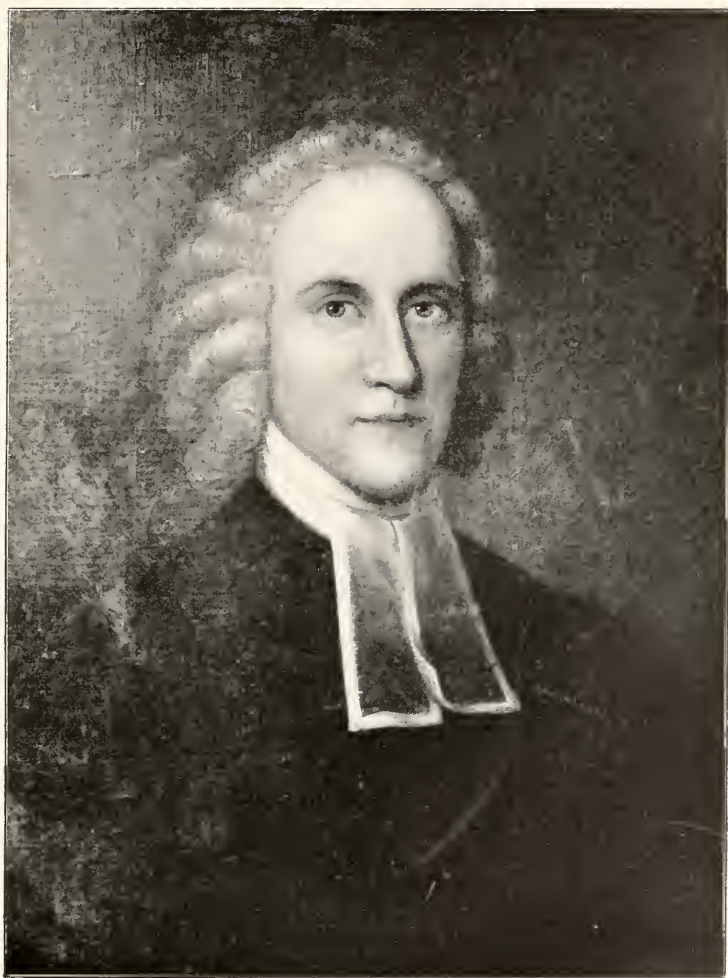
from Feb. 15, 1727, to June 22, 1750.

“The law of truth was in his mouth, and unrighteousness was not found in his life. He walked with me in peace and uprightness, and did turn many away from iniquity.”—Mal. ii. 6.

The original portraits of President Edwards and his wife were, in 1870, in possession of the family of Jonathan Walter Edwards, Esq., of Hartford, Conn. “They were painted about the year 1740, in Boston, at the request and expense, it is believed, of a Mr. Hogg, and were forwarded to him in Scotland. At the decease of Mr. Hogg they passed into the hands of his sister, who presented them to the Rev. John Erskine, of Edinburgh. After the American Revolution, Dr. Jonathan Edwards, the second son of the President, made application to Dr. Erskine to purchase the portraits, and the latter gentleman declined to sell them; but, on learning that no other portraits of the President and his wife existed, he sent them to this country as a present to Dr. Edwards, and they have remained in my father’s family since.” (Remarks of Jonathan Edwards, of New Haven, at the Edwards Meeting, at Stockbridge, 1870.)

of spirits and vivacity, quick tempered, witty, and given to anecdote — fascinating to me as a child.”

2. *Edward Edwards*, born at Stockbridge, Mass., January 20, 1763; married Mary Ballard, of Hadley, Mass., daughter of Joshua and Ruth Ballard, September 4, 1783; she was born January 11, 1764, and died at Chenango, N. Y., February 12, 1824. Mr. Edwards died at Albion, Mich., February 3, 1845. They had ten children. William Edwards' *Memoirs* says of Edward: “When I first engaged in business at Northampton, my brother Edward was in business, and doing well, at Stockbridge. He was kind, and rendered me important aid. He removed to Broome County, N. Y., about the year 1800, and was engaged in making pine lumber on the Chenango and Susquehanna Rivers, and running it to Baltimore. He made it profitable for several successive years, and laid such inducements before me that I embarked largely with him in purchasing timber lands, building saw-mills, establishing a store,” etc.

Mrs. Frances Mather remembered her uncle Edward. He was very tall, six feet and three or four inches, straight, slender, and of an uncommon personal beauty. When his father was commissioner on the boundary line, as before mentioned, Edward, who was with him, was adopted by the Indians, and given an Indian name, which meant “the handsome man.” He came to Bath, N. Y., and was interested in large tracts of land. He necessarily lived the life of a pioneer in that new country; was elected a member of the legislature, and was much respected. His descendants abound in middle New York and in Michigan.

3. *Jonathan Edwards*, born October 16, 1764; married his cousin Lucy, daughter of Jahleel Woodbridge, of Stockbridge, November 20, 1778. He died at Binghamton, N. Y., September, 1832; she died at Youngstown, O., 1848. They had eleven children.

Mrs. Mather remembered Jonathan well. She said he was remarkable for originality and wit. In his early life his father gave him a farm at Stockbridge. Some one who lived where Binghamton now is, offered to exchange land for the farm,

and Jonathan thus acquired a property in the heart of that town. There he lived many years, daily calling upon his sister, Mary Whiting.

Mrs. Mather remembered their talks of early struggles, and of the life at Stockbridge. "He and my mother were mighty in prayer, and prayed for their children's children to the latest generation — not that they might be rich and prominent, but that they might love and honor God." He died and was buried at Binghamton. His descendants mostly live in Western Pennsylvania and in Northern Ohio."

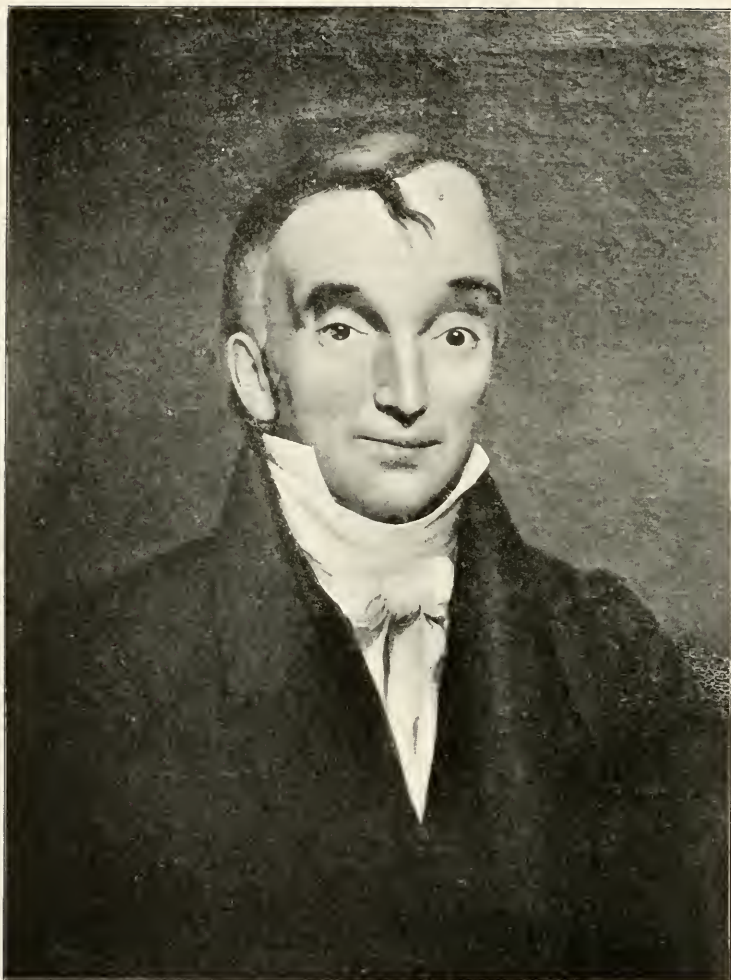
4. *Richard Edwards*, born March 5, 1766; married Alla Visa Griffin, of Abington, Conn.; was a lawyer, and at first practiced in Albany, N. Y., then removed to Cooperstown, N. Y., where he died, in 1805. Mrs. Edwards died in Stockbridge, 1811.

Mrs. Mather spoke of Richard as "a brilliant lawyer." Like the rest of the men of that family, he was tall and fine looking.

5. *Phebe Edwards*, born November 4, 1768; married (1) Rev. Asahel Hooker, June 11, 1792; he was graduated at Yale, 1789; died April 19, 1813. They had four children. She married (2) Samuel Farrer, of Andover, Mass., and died January 21, 1848. Mr. Farrer was born December 13, 1773; died —, —. "Phebe Edwards, as a girl, was fond of reading, and the atmosphere of her father's house was favorable to the cultivation of her taste. She married the Rev. Asahel Hooker, of Hartford. He was descended, in the fifth generation, from the Rev. Thomas Hooker. He was settled at Goshen, Conn.; was an excellent preacher, his aspect and manner winning, and his voice pleasant. There were, at an early day, in Connecticut, a few ministers who instructed young men in systematic theology, preparatory to their becoming preachers. After the death of Mr. Backus, one of the most prominent of these preachers, the importance of establishing a theological school was urged, and Mr. Hooker was fixed on by his brethren as the proper man for the purpose. From 1803 to 1810, he conducted the school successfully. In all, thirty-two young men were his pupils, and lived

in his house. Among these were Noah Porter, of Farmington; Heman Humphrey, Bennet Tyler, Abel McEwen, and Joshua Huntington, all men of eminence in their day.

Mr. Hooker's health failed, and at his own request, he was dismissed from his pastoral charge, in 1810, and removed to Norwich, Conn., where he soon after died.

In 1814, Mrs. Hooker married Samuel Farrer, Esquire, Treasurer of the Theological Seminary at Andover, Mass. This position was much adapted to her habit of thought and feeling. She soon began to take a deep interest in the Seminary, and everything that concerned it. Her influence as an exemplary Christian, full of benevolent sympathies, zealous for the cause of Christ, was felt by all those who came in contact with her. Her regard for ministers and their families, and her large hospitality, were salutary influences at Andover. She retained till the last her taste for reading, and an interest in everything that showed progress in society. She considered all scientific improvements, all inventions, as tending to the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom. The winter in which she died, at the age of seventy-nine, she read new books on astronomy; and on one cold evening, when a gentleman of the neighborhood brought a telescope, and set it up near the house, she went out on the snow and looked at the rings of Saturn. She died, after a short illness, January 22, 1848." (From notes by her daughter, Mrs. Cornelius.)

6. *William Edwards*, born at Northampton, Mass., November 11, 1770; married Rebecca Tappan, of Northampton, November 11, 1793; died at Brooklyn, N. Y., December 29, 1851. She was born July 14, 1775; died at Brooklyn, March 27, 1857. They had eleven children.

William Edwards, in 1847, four years before his death, wrote his recollections, which were printed in 1898, as "Memoirs." From these the following notes are taken: In his fourteenth year, young Edwards went from Stockbridge to Elizabethtown, N. J., to learn the tanning trade from his uncle, Oliver Spencer, and began an apprenticeship, but before the end of the year returned to Stockbridge on account of his health, and remained there until 1787. While at home

the Shays insurrection broke out, and he enlisted in a Berkshire regiment. (For his interesting account of this war, and his experiences connected with it, see the Memoirs.) He returned to Elizabethtown and resumed his duties. He joined a Grenadier Militia Company, and was the fourth of the company in stature, measuring six feet three and a half inches. When General Washington, in 1789, came to New York to be inducted into the office of President, he passed through Elizabethtown, and while at breakfast there, at the house of Samuel Smith, William was one of a guard composed of the six tallest men of his company, placed at the house. The soldiers escorted the General to Elizabethtown Point, and were reviewed by him before he embarked in the barge for New York. This experience, William, in his old age, spoke of as the proudest of his life. In 1789, he went to East Had-dam, Conn., to perfect himself in his trade, and then, by the advice of his father, settled in Northampton, before he was twenty years of age. Aided by friends, he built a tannery, introducing changes and improvements that he had thought out during his apprenticeship. In 1799, the tannery was destroyed by fire. Again his friends stood by him, and he was enabled to put up a much larger building, and to introduce further improvements. During these years at Northampton, he revolutionized the tanning trade. The bark mill, the heaters for boiling the ground bark, the hide mill, and the rolling machine, were but part of his patented contrivances. In 1838, the Honorable Gideon Lee, of New York, in an address before the Eclectic Fraternity, after enumerating the improvements that had taken place in tanning during the last thirty years — in the construction of tanneries and in labor-saving machinery — said: "The invention and application of these important improvements originated chiefly with Colonel William Edwards. I am not extravagant in rating the benefits of his improvements at millions. They have spread, and have been adopted in some sort or measure in all the States where leather is manufactured."

In 1795, William married Rebecca Tappan, daughter of Benjamin and Sarah Holmes Tappan, of Northampton, and

sister of the well known brothers, Benjamin, later United States Senator from Ohio, John, Charles, Arthur, and Lewis Tappan. On her mother's side, Rebecca was descended from Mary Franklin, sister to Benjamin Franklin. During the year 1800, when war with France was threatened, troops were raised in Massachusetts, and a company of sixty men was organized in Northampton. Of this, William Edwards was chosen Captain. When their three months' term expired "we were cordially received into the regular militia of the State, where I was raised, first to the rank of Major, subsequently to that of Colonel. In 1813, when Boston was threatened by the British, I commanded a regiment of artillery, consisting of four companies. Eleven companies were ordered to rendezvous at Boston, and the Governor and Council called me to the command of this body of troops. I was two months in the service."

Mr. Edwards represented Northampton at the General Court repeatedly. He was a Federalist, and his son, William W. Edwards, says of him (Memoirs): "No man exercised more political influence in his town and State than he did in the early years of this century. He was entrusted with various offices in Northampton, was on the Board of Selectmen, and was identified with every measure for improvement in the town."

In the time of contraction succeeding the war, the corporate company which had been organized by Mr. Edwards and friends failed. Aided by New York friends who were in the leather business, he began anew in the wilderness, 1817, in the town of Hunter, Greene County, N. Y., and erected what was for years the largest tannery in the United States. In 1830, this was burned to the ground, but was rebuilt the same year by the assistance of three of Mr. Edwards' sons. He retired from business in 1834. The last years of his life were passed in Brooklyn, at the home of his son Richard and daughter Elizabeth, and he died there in the eighty-second year of his age. Mrs. Edwards survived him a few years. The remains of the two lie in Greenwood Cemetery.

7. *Robert Ogden Edwards*, born September 13, 1772; died May 23, 1773.

8. *Timothy Edwards*, born July 12, 1774; he followed the sea, and was for some years master of a ship between Charleston and Savannah, and Liverpool; married Sarah Haigh, of Huddersfield, England, 1820, and soon after retired from his profession. He settled at first at Augusta, Ga., as a cotton broker; in 1829, removed to Lexington, Greene County, N. Y., and engaged in tanning. About 1835, he went to Jersey City, N. J., and resided there with his children until his death in ——. For some years he was a Justice of the Peace in Jersey City. Mrs. Edwards died in Northampton, Mass., about 1840. They had five children.

The compiler of this record well remembers his great-uncle, Timothy Edwards, both at Lexington and Jersey City. He was six feet three inches in height, slender and straight; of dark complexion, long and straight black hair, and piercing black eyes; aquiline nose; a very fine-looking man, and conspicuous in any assemblage. He delighted to talk of his sailor life; was at St. Petersburg when Napoleon was at Moscow, 1813; had traded at Archangel, and derided the story of the maelstrom off the coast of Norway, which, in those days, cut a figure in school geographies.

10. *Rhoda Edwards*, born May 7, 1776; married Josiah Dwight, of Northampton, March 3, 1798; died November 13, 1864. He died about 1822. They had fifteen children. "Madam Dwight was a wonder and a joy to all who knew her, for intellectual power and brightness, to the end of her very long life, and was held in veneration by the admiring people of Northampton, and by a multitude without that historic town." (Dwight Genealogy.)

April 26, 1800; he was born May 8, 1774; and died at Binghamton, N. Y., January 11, 1849. She died January 23, 1873. They had eight children.

"Full of life and gaiety in her childhood, Mary Edwards could dance with the merriest, turn the house upside down with the girls, run away with the hearts of the young men, and match her cousin, Aaron Burr, in fun and wit. She was a great favorite of her father, who once introduced her to some of his Scotch friends as, more than any member of the family, the image of her grandfather. At the age of twenty-two she removed with her husband, a young Berkshire lawyer, to Chenango Point, at the junction of the Chenango and Susquehanna Rivers, now Binghamton. There were then only two or three houses in the place, and the county was almost a wilderness. She was one of the few original members of the church which, some time after her arrival, was organized. Mr. Whiting was the leading lawyer, and his house, in the absence of hotels, was the resort of the lawyers and judges during the sessions of the courts. Mr. Whiting had a genuine love of nature and of books, and he cultivated in his children tastes for both. Mrs. Whiting was the chief educator of her daughters, and impressed upon them, in an unusual degree, her own mental, moral, and religious character. Her religion was at once a controlling principle and a ruling passion, her daily business and her constant delight. She was interested, to the end of her life, in passing events, in the business and pleasures of her children and grandchildren, in the growth of the town, and the welfare of the nation. Her mind was as clear at fourscore and ten as it was in the prime of life. She died at the age of ninety-two, the last of the children of Timothy and Rhoda Ogden Edwards. The whole city of Binghamton was moved by her death. All classes, all ages, all denominations, all nationalities, crowded to her funeral."

NOTE—In the foregoing pages the name Pierpont is so spelled, nowhere being transformed into Pierrepont, a different name altogether. In the General Catalogue of Yale College, James *Pierpont* is listed as a Fellow from October 16, 1701. In a Latin text-book that was in the possession of the late Rev. John Edwards, of San Jose, Cal., the name “John *Pierpont*” is written by his own hand on the title page, and on the back is written “Mary *Pierpont’s* Book, 1728.” In the General Catalogue of the College of New Jersey, under the year 1768, stands the name of “*Pierpont*” Edwards, which shows how the youngest son of Jonathan Edwards spelled his name. Nevertheless that name of late years is constantly misspelled Pierrepont, when Pierpont Edwards is spoken of.

TEN CO-EDUCATED GIRLS TWO HUNDRED YEARS AGO.

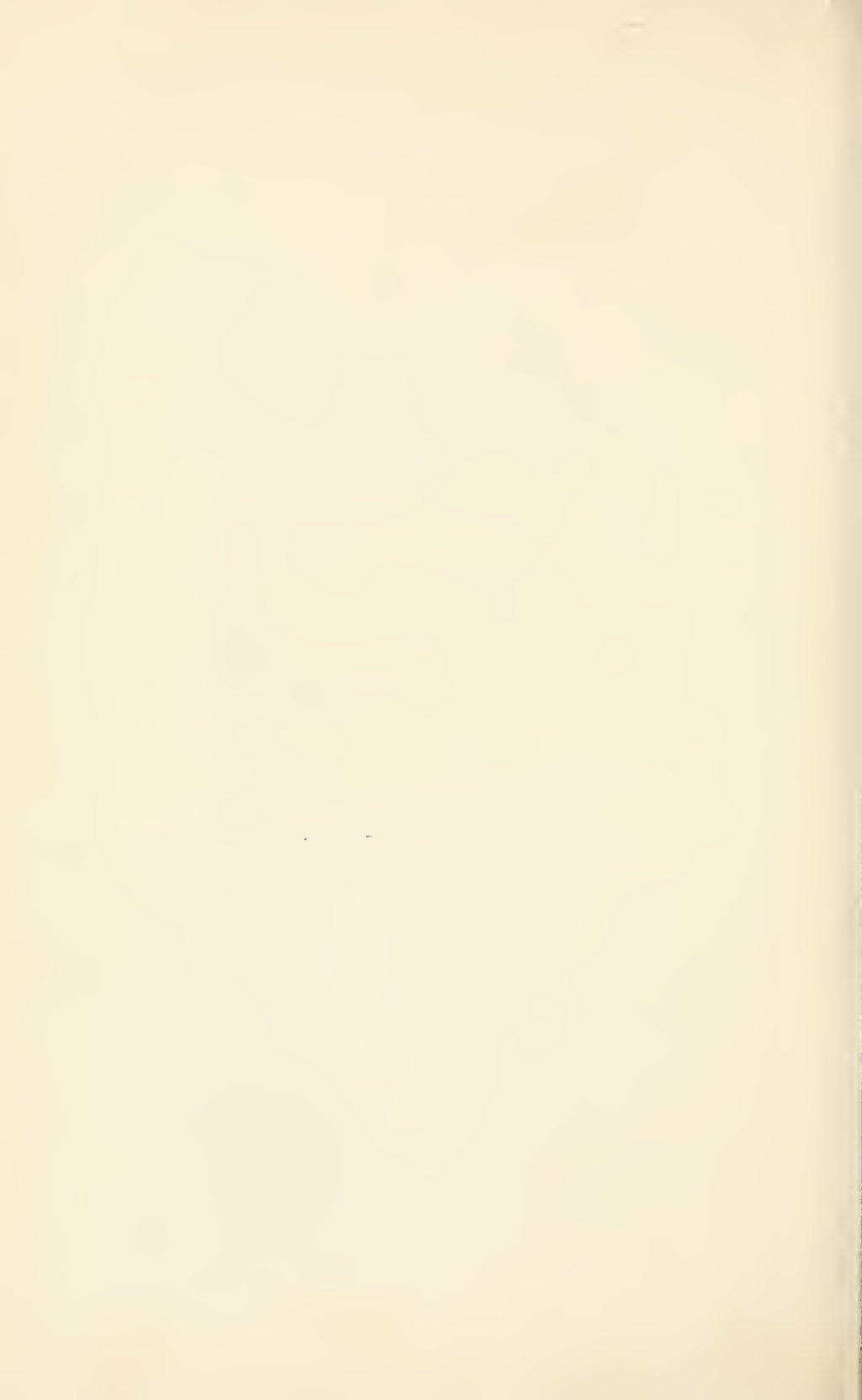

On November 6, 1694, Rev. Timothy Edwards, who had been chosen to become the pastor of a newly formed church in East Windsor, Conn.—sometimes known as Windsor Farms—was married in Northampton, Mass., to Miss Esther Stoddard, daughter of the minister of that town. There is no record of how the lady looked, nor of what she wore on the occasion, the chronicles of that time only noting the fact that Miss Stoddard had enjoyed superior advantages for education, having been sent to Boston for that purpose. The husband was 24, the bride 22. All New England looked to Harvard College, at that time, to stamp the hall-mark on ability, and no doubt Miss Esther was duly proud of the fact that the man of her choice had been endowed with the degree of Bachelor of Arts in the morning, and that of Master of Arts in the afternoon of the same day, an unprecedented act on the part of the college, a tribute to the unsurpassed scholarship of Mr. Edwards—a scholarship that we shall see was always kept bright, and never allowed to lapse into desuetude, during a long life. The wedding journey of the couple, including some family visits, lasted eight days, when they arrived in the town where he was to be pastor for sixty-three years, and where she was to live a beautiful and influential life as his helper, and where, even after her husband's death, it is recorded that she was beloved for her Christian helpfulness in doing all that she could to increase the influence of his successor. Very few parishes could, in that primitive

time, pay a salary adequate to support a minister, without some extraneous assistance—this assistance often taking the form of a farm. In Mr. Edwards's case, his father, who was a successful merchant of Hartford, made him the free gift of a farm and build him a house on it, but as this was not yet completed, the newly married pair occupied at first temporary quarters elsewhere. At length it was done, and it was an uncommonly fine and really "advanced" house, for the period. It stood with its long front to the street, the bare architectural blankness of this front being broken at the center by a projection which formed a porch about the front door on the first story, and in the second, made a room of closet-like proportions, but called the "study"—within the walls of which were produced for sixty-three years the sermons that formed the chief intellectual pabulum of that people, outside the Bible. Few and small were the windows, made of tiny diamond panes set in lead, eloquent of the costliness of glass. Our ancestors held the theory that an air-space under a house made it cold, so this house had no visible underpinning, but seemed planted in the soil. The second story projected beyond the first—tradition has it, so as to be able to shoot Indian marauders, of which, in this vicinity, there were too many for the comfort of the intruding pale faces. The roof was steep—made of "rived" shingles, which were never changed, and still serviceable 118 years afterward, when the house was taken down. The stepping stone was utilized again by the man who built upon its site, but in 1834 it was bought from him, and made the corner-stone of the Theological Institute of Connecticut. The house had some very superior woodwork on the inside, one feature of which was a bench, running round three sides of one of the rooms, and which has an important relation to our theme. As New England parishes were rated, at that time, this of East Windsor was esteemed one of the best. Nearly every parishioner was a farmer; even the owner of the only gristmill and the store-keeper had their farms. An account-book belonging to a deacon, and Rev. Mr. Edwards's "rate-book" (really the parish record) are still extant, and as the latter gentleman had a

habit of making quaint and piquant memoranda in connection with some of the items of cash or produce paid to him, they throw a flood of light on the manners, customs, and ideas of the time. Payments were faithfully, but not always promptly, made, and the minister found it impossible to live on his salary without adding the labor of a tutor; hence he always had young men fitting for college in his family, and his rate-book shows that young men who could not spare time in the day, came to him in the evening to be instructed in penmanship.

The meeting-house was not completed till three years after Mr. Edwards's marriage—the congregation meanwhile assembling in a barn—and although he exercised every function of the Congregational priesthood, he was not formally ordained until the two ceremonies of dedicating the church and the complete induction of the pastor, called ordination, could be combined in one joyful occasion. It occurred in 1698. Previous to this his house had been completed, and two of the young women, whose completed circle is ten, had appeared on this earthly scene. This double ceremonial was the happy goal toward which both pastor and people had been looking for many years, and, accustomed as we are to think of those early Puritans as leading austere and joyless lives, it is a surprise to learn that the religious ceremonies were followed by an Ordination Ball in the minister's house—one of the invitations in the young pastor's handwriting, bearing his autograph, being still in existence. A careful list of "provisions laide in at the house of Mr. Edwards for his ordination," is still extant in the account-book of his accurate deacon. Of actual viands sent, there were eighty-eight pounds of "beefe," fourteen of mutton, eighteen of veal; souger, ten pounds; wheat, meal, cheese, butter, eggs, salt, pepper, sidar, rum, malt, hops, wine, and money distinctly called "wine-money," and also spice-money, while many gave actual cash. We feel justified in believing that "everybody who was anybody" was invited to partake of this generous feast, and we are certain that that parish had at least one "jolly good time" in its life.

Mrs. Edwards had a high ideal of the loftiness of the pastor's vocation, and, that her husband might be free to fulfill its duties, took upon herself the burden of their temporalities—so that her gifted and honored spouse could educate his young men, and care for the souls of his parishioners, unhampered by petty cares. When there was a question of how many and what hides the tanner ought to return to him, he says, "My wife knows"; and other references to her show that she "looked to the ways of her household," notwithstanding the superior Boston education she had received. Of her eleven children the fifth was a son—Jonathan; the rest were daughters, the youngest born when the oldest was 22. It was a busy and no doubt a lively household, and it is pleasant to read that "From the house the land sloped toward the east to a brook that flowed at the foot of a steeper hill, which was then crowned with a beautiful forest of primeval trees. . . . To this spot Mr. Edwards was accustomed to go for seclusion, and there his son Jonathan built the booth wherein he held soul-inspiring converse with God." We can imagine him escaping in desperation from such a girls'-nest as the house must have been to this precursor of the modern "den."

As the minds of the ten daughters began to unfold, and as there were no schools to send them to, the father undertook to train them himself. He did not stop to inquire whether co-educating his girls right along with the fitting-for-college students would lead to atrophy of the muscles, or of the affections, but just did it. He had a school, with a high standard, beneath his own roof. Harvard and Yale Colleges accepted "Mr. Edwards's students" without examination; and that he held his girls to the same standard is proved by the fact that when called away from home, as he often was in his capacity of eminent divine, he left the instruction in Latin and Greek to his daughters, and particularly directs that they shall not fail to hear the recitations of the young men, in the letters that he sends back. In his account-book he records every day's instruction to these young men, which was paid for at the rate of three shillings a week, and makes note of the time given to them by his daughters, for we may be sure that the

(money value of these services by the co-educated ten was not ignored by them. Among the credits in his account-book is a memorandum of a shilling paid by one North to my daughter Mary for covering a fan, and there are other similar entries. That a knowledge of Latin and Greek had not eradicated the fondness for distinctively feminine work is shown by the fact that specimens of Miss Mary's embroidery—a scarf, an apron, and a pair of slippers—now owned by the Connecticut Historical Society, can to-day be seen in the Hartford Athenaeum.

An effort has been made to discover the specific effect of the education above described, or the subsequent character, conduct, and lives of the women whose scholarly father had boldly reared his daughters in scholarly ways. He knew the advantage of travel and contact with other circles than one's own, and one after another they were sent to Boston for some of the superior advantages afforded by that city. As Mr. Edwards had come to be a very influential man in all religious matters—in fact was *the* man to whom other parishes looked for counsel when in difficulties (which was not seldom)—his house was much frequented by ministers, old and young; and not a few were attracted thither by the charms of this galaxy of "Edwards's girls," seven of whom married. Two died—one at 19 and one at 21. Of the seven who married, five lived to ages ranging from 60 to 91, the one whose life was shortest living to 60; so we must infer that the superior education did not tend to shortness of life; but we look again, and note that none of them married younger than 24, and on studying the reason of this, we find that some of them had "long engagements," the fashion then being for a man to build a house before he literally brought a bride "home"; and of the three who married ministers, two had to wait till their lovers had been "called" by some parish, and proved worthy of that "settlement for life" that was then the fashion in ecclesiastical circles.

The one daughter—Mary—who remained single was the support and helper of her father, living to the age of 74, and outliving her sire by five years. Her epitaph reads thus:

Genius, Knowledge, Prudence,
 Joyn'd with Social Words,
 By Grace refined, Adorned her life,
 Deserved a name
 Which few of either sex can claim.

These girls showed uncommonly good judgment in the selection of husbands, for we find them united to men of character and high moral worth, who filled influential positions in their respective towns, even when not ministers, and at that time the minister was the dominant figure in every community. Mr. Edwards's oldest granddaughter—Elizabeth Huntington—was married to Abraham Davenport, of Stamford, of whom we find the following in the pages of Dr. Dwight: "The 19th of May, 1780, was a remarkably dark day. Candles were lighted in many houses; the birds were silent and disappeared, and the fowls retired to roost. The Legislature of Connecticut was then in session at Hartford. A very general opinion prevailed that the Day of Judgment was at hand. The House of Representatives, being unable to transact their business, adjourned. A proposal to adjourn the Council, also, was under consideration, when the opinion of Colonel Davenport was asked; he answered: 'I am against an adjournment. The Day of Judgment is either approaching or it is not. If it is not, there is no cause for an adjournment; if it is, I choose to be found doing my duty. I wish, therefore, that candles may be brought.'"

Of all this group of daughters who are said to have grown up "to fill positions of eminence and usefulness," but one has left any personal memorial. This gives us a true picture of her mind and heart, for at that day it was a common practice to record and communicate spiritual impressions, and states with a frankness which our more reticent time finds it difficult to understand.

This memorial consists of a diary, in her own handwriting, on small bits of paper clipped from the tops and bottoms of letters, sometimes on the back of an entire letter—for paper was a scarce and precious commodity—running through nearly fifty years. The whole is wrapped in a large sheet of actual animal parchment, folded carefully, and

indorsed in her own hand, "Esther Edwards's Diary." There is a tradition that, previous to 1723, when she was 25, she had passed through a season of deep spiritual darkness and doubt, but that upon taking a journey to Boston, she immediately passed into a peaceful and happy state. Some would argue that her trouble was a physical one that "a change of scene" would set right, and, some would say, possibly a Boston preacher had the happiness to present the old truth at a fresh angle. On February 20, 1823, she says: "I am much indisposed in body, and in a very dead frame of mind. Will the second Adam become a quickening spirit to my dead soul? I experienced something I want words to express. It was superior to what I have found these many years, and hope it was that peace of God that passeth understanding."

"February 23d.—I have this morning been refreshed with divine consolations." Somebody has wittily said that the consciousness of being well dressed has a more sustaining power than religion itself for a woman; and the next entry shows a genuine human touch that makes us love her.

"March 7th.—I was this day, upon my looking more comely than ordinary, stirred up in thankfulness to God, whom I saw to be the Fountain of all Perfection, and that I might of His fullness receive every good thing. He appeared to me a God able and ready to help me."

There is much of introspection and a minute record of the states of religious feeling experienced at different times.

The second daughter had been betrothed and married in 1724. One of the invitations to her wedding is still extant, and runs:

"Sr. This comes from myself and wife as an Invitation to y'self and Sister, to my Daughter Betty's Wedding, ye day intended for which is the next Tuesday. I therefore do hereby request you both to be at my house on that occasion that day, at about three of the Clock in the afternoon, whereby you will oblige

"Sr yrs to serve you

"TIMO: EDWARDS."

Whether this precedence over Miss Esther had anything to do with some of her "low," "dull," and "dead" frames of mind is not known, but previous to 1726 there appear frequent allusions to a person who is not indicated even by initials, but certain cabalistic marks are made to do duty for the name of one who had evidently taken the first place in Miss Esther's heart. Every entry contains a petition for the cabalistic gentleman. A clergyman in those times looked for a parish before he allowed himself to think of marrying; and how long before the present date Rev. Samuel Hopkins had been engaged to her we do not know, but on October 2, 1726, we find this entry: "I was enlarged in my thanksgivings because God had wrought the affair of my settling in the world to such a pass as it is. Also encouraged thereby to trust in Him still, yt He would appear and do great things, even as my case should require, in particular in respect to ——" (here the cabalistic mark). She occasionally chides herself for discontent, or pride, but the leading object in all is the cabalistic unknown, ——. She says: "My eyes were to God all day long for ——," and even in reading a treatise on the eternity of God she was pleased to discover "my happiness in ——." In June of 1727 she was united in marriage to Mr. Hopkins, who had been settled as the pastor of West Springfield, Mass. She now records in her diary, especially on a communion Sabbath, that she "was enlarged in my petitions for my dear spouse that he may have all spiritual blessings, and all those ministerial accomplishments that may render him a man of God, thoroughly furnished." She passes forward in life through the experience of motherhood, and, as we should expect, is very earnest in prayers for the conversion of her children. In 1729 she was much reduced by fever and ague, and was advised to take a journey to New Haven. She started when so weak that she could hardly mount her horse, and reached Waterbury, where her husband's relatives lived, so exhausted that she stayed there two weeks, and, no sooner had she reached New Haven than she was met by a messenger bearing the news of the death of her daughter Esther. The entries in the journal

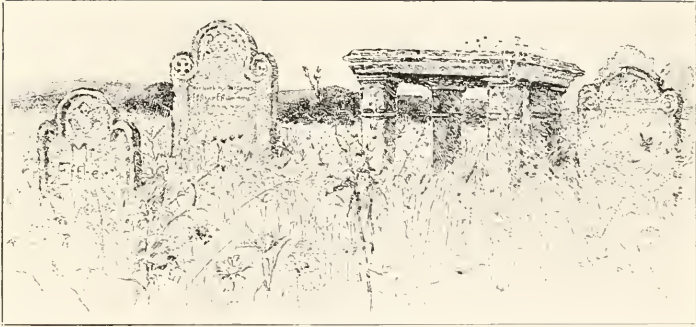
show the tender mother, as well as the truly resigned Christian, and all along are notes of her earnest, anxious prayers for her sisters and children and husband.

In 1741 there occurred a great religious movement, known as the Great Awakening, which had spread from Northampton, where it began under the preaching of her brother Jonathan. Whitefield's preaching had been instrumental in a great religious quickening, and had inaugurated a new style of preaching. Barber—the historian of Connecticut—says: "The religious people were divided into the 'New Lights' and 'Old Lights.' The former were active and zealous in the discharge of everything which they conceived to be their religious duty, and were in favor of Mr. Whitefield and others itinerating through the country, stirring up the people to reform," etc. Whereupon the Grand Council at Guilford said: "That for a minister to enter into another man's parish, and preach, or administer the seals of the covenant, without the consent of or in opposition to the settled minister, is disorderly." Most of the council were "Old Lights," and expelled the "enthusiasts"—as they called them. Rev. Eleazar Wheelock—afterward President of Dartmouth College—when it was established to educate Indians for missionaries among their own people—and Jonathan Edwards were among the "New Lights" who approved of and took part in evangelistic services, supplementary to the regular services in many churches. "Dead" was the word applied to many churches that had fallen into routine. It is easily supposable that the irruption of an evangelistic "son of thunder" is not at all times the most welcome sort of a visit to a peaceful, steady-going pastor. Mrs. Hopkins records, on March 15, 1742, that she "has heard of Mr. Wheelock's arrival in Longmeadow," and the next day says she has "heard of some going round to get subscriptions for preaching in this place," and the next day says, "John Ely came to talk to Mr. H. about Mr. Wheelock's preaching among us; apprehends great danger to this people and much detriment to the interests of religion." One can not repress a smile at the thought of that affectionate sister's requests at

this time being chiefly for her distinguished brother Jonathan—"that it would please God to enlighten him, and show him the way of truth, and that if he had embraced any error, that he might be recovered." On August 3, 1743, she says: "What is the matter? I was last night in company with one of the 'New Lights.' I could hardly bear the room." On March 12, 1744, she writes: "Some things occurred this morning which made it appear very doubtful whether my dear brother would ever come off of some principles which appeared to me were detrimental to religion."

Mrs. Hopkins survived eleven years after the death of the husband, who had remained the pastor of his first and only parish for thirty-six years. The record on her tombstone is: "Mrs. Esther Hopkins, Relict of ye late Revd. Mr. Sam'l Hopkins (in whom a superior understanding, uncommon Improvements in Knowledge, Exemplary Piety, and exalted Virtue combined to form a distinguished female character), deceased June 7, 1766, in ye 72d year of her age." The whole is surmounted by a cherubic face, surrounded by stars—indicative of a beatified spirit.

Mrs. Plunkett is a descendant of Esther Edwards Hopkins.
