Board of Trustees approves new package of benefits

RIT's Personnel department has scheduled a series of meetings across campus to explain a new benefit package approved by the Board of Trustees and slated to take effect in July.

The proposal for benefit revision was made by the Benefits Review Committee, formed several months ago by Vice-President for Business and Finance James Buchholz. The Committee recommended in its report that the Institute provide expanded Blue Cross/ Blue Shield coverage, increased major medical insurance, and a variety of other increased health and disability benefits.

It also recommended that the tuition waiver policy for employees hired after January 1, 1975, be cut back and that the length of service allowance paid to employees on retirement be gradually phased out.

The expanded benefit program is expected to cost the Institute about \$250,000 above what the current plan costs in Fiscal Year 1976, Personnel Director Everett C. Merritt said.

Merritt said the review committee was asked to make "a comprehensive review" of Institute benefits "to make the program more responsive to employee needs."

There are seven changes in the plan as adopted. They are:

--Blue Cross/Blue Shield: add Prolonged Illness Protection (PIP) to basic coverage now provided;RIT would continue paying full premiums for single employees, but would increase payments for married persons to the equivalent of a full single premium and for the first time add one-half the difference between the single and family premiums. In addition, three alternative health plans will be offered: Rochester Health Network, Genesee Valley Group Health Association, and Health Watch for those who elect an alternative plan.

RIT would pay up to the maximum that would be paid for single or family Blue Cross/Blue Shield.

--Major Medical Insurance: increase maximum coverage from \$50,000 to \$250,000; increase reimbursement from 80 per cent to 100 percent for covered expenses over \$10,000; increase retiree's maximum coverage from \$5,000 to \$50,000.

--Long Term Disability: coverage provisions would remain the same, but RIT would pay full premiums; all full-time faculty and staff with one full year or more of service would be covered (the plan is now voluntary and the individual employee pays for his coverage).

--Annuity, TIAA/CREF (retirement fund): contributions into the plan would be revised from 5 percent employee/7 percent RIT to 4 percent employee/8 percent RIT; an additional option of decreasing the employee's contribution to 2 percent will be offered with RIT's contribution remaining at 8%. Employees 25 years of age or older with three or more years of service would be eligible to join the plan.

-Life Insurance: improve the current program from a decreasing term plan to one which will award benefits based not only on the age of the covered employee but also salary. In many cases the level of insurance will typically double the current coverage

-Length of Service Allowance: this lump-sum payment upon retirement would be discontinued for employees

hired after June 30, 1975. Currently employed persons would get a Length of Service payment based on service through June 30, 1975 at the salary in effect at that time.

-Tuition Waivers: there would be no change in policy for employees currently at the Institute or those hired before December 31, 1974. After that, day college tuition waivers for

employees or dependents would be reduced to 50% of charges (except for courses taken by employees and determined to be beneficial to both the employee and the Institute). The Institute would continue full remission of tuition in the College of Continuing Education for all employees.


"RIT has been liberal with tuition waivers in comparison to other colleges and universities,"

Merritt said. "And it's costing us a lot of money. We feel we'd rather redirect those dollars into benefits that meet more employee needs."

Merritt stressed that there will be no change in tuition waiver policies for anyone already employed at the Institute, or for their dependents.

Winners will be announced in March at the National Paperboard Packaging Council's annual meeting in Chicago.

This year's competition also included a consumer's lunch-time seminar, a problem solvers seminar, and a lecture and film presentation called "What's Happened to the Cracker Barrel." The latter two events were in Ingle Auditorium and drew package designers, purchasing agents and marketing and production managers from across the country.
