This was taken as an indication that the company does not intend to meet the men on that ground.

OUSLY DISCHARGED.

The bills emboding the rallway policy of the McBride government have passshort discussion considering the momentous character of their provisions. Liberal in the House, covered the ground of obvious criticsm most thoroughly. But it is apparently quite futile to attempt to reason with the government and its overwhelming following. The bills will be rushed through committee with no amendments and passed into law, prorogation following as speedily as possible. The disability under which the province has placed itself by electing such a weak opposition numerically will be more fully demonstrated when the ultimate effects of the so-called railway policy become apparent. John Houston—and it would be an interesting one. He was a Canadian, having been born at Caledon West, Onteresting one. He was a Caladian, having been born at Caledon West, Ontario, in November, 1850, but a considerable portion of his early life was spent in Texas, where he no doubt imbited the spirit of the "wild and woolly" West which became so prominent a characteristic of his career in later years. He first appeared in this province, shortly after the opening of the C.P.R., having in 1888 established the Truth, a weekly newspaper, at Donald, then an important divisional point on the great Canadian railway.

A few years later, with the decline of husiness at Donald, he removed to New Westminster, where the Ledger, another weekly newspaper under his editorship, shortly appeared.

All the world's greatest rubles come from the mines of the Mogok Valley Itidia. There are four principal mines in the valley, in each of which modern tools and machinery are used, which facilitate the proper examination of a large amount of byon or ruby-bearing clay every day. In adjacent valleys the Burmans etil prosecute their searches in the old way, digging and washing by hand labor, but often with

astonishing results. In the large workings the system reduced to a science, with correspon-ing results. The work goes on day ar night. The byon is extracted by the the surface down to the ruby-bearing clay, which is then dug up, carried on trollers to the steam cleansing mill, washed, passed through the sieves and then examined for rubles and spinels The byon stretches almost everywhere along the Mogok Valley, and wherever this rich old gold crumbling clay exists rubles are to be found.

Besides the pure ruby spinel or bala rubles are found in large quantities at Mogok, Wherever the ruby is found the spinel is certain to crop up close be-side it. They are both crystals of alumina but of different shapes. While the true ruby is pure corundum only, the spinel has a minute quantity of magnesium, which lessens its hardness one-fifth. Except in a few rare cases the expert can distinguish readily be-

At the mines the rubies are separated to a certainty from the spinels by the use of the dichrofscope. The gem is placed in the instrument so that a ray seesion of the outfit.

(Gigun). Asked concerning his ideas on the independence of Korea he spoke at great length to the effect that he had embodied the idea several years ago, but he was especially struck by the proposal at the time when the Japan-Korean conventions were concluded as a result of the Russo-Japan-see war. The Koreans were delicated to learn the imperial rescript of Japan concerning the peace of the Far East as well as the independence of Korea and many of them worked for Japan. But after Prince Ito went to Korea, the prince concluded the treaty by force, which could not have been the real intention of the Emperor of Japan. He believed that Prince Ito used the military power for his private purposes and that if the prince were killed the independence of Korea would be ensured. His intention of assassinating the prince was evolved at the time c war. The Koreans were delighted the prince was evolved at the time when the convention of seven articles was concluded, and his plan to kill Prince Ito was always foremost in his thoughts. The adjacent land between the street and the shoreline is divided mostly into lots 60 feet wide whose street. All these lots have right of access to the water with all facilities

pertaining thereto.

The trade of the port, as the most westerly port in the Dominion, is rapidly increasing; the C.P.R. has a large fleet of constwise steamers of considerable tonnage. The Grand Trunk Pacific propose constructing extensive wharfage to meet a large developing trade to the north; the Canadian Northern are also seeking harbor facilities, and others may follow.



PRAIRIE FARMERS SOON TO RESUME FIELD WORK

Saskatchewan's Product for 1909 Over Hundred and Thirty Million Dollars

Writing from Regina the western orrespondent of the Globe says:
The agricultural outlook for 1910 is

TWENTY-ONE YEARS IN RUSSIAN FORTRESS

Woman Physician Released After Serving Sentence-Cruelty of the Guards

Out of the notorious Schlusselburg ortress, on the Neva river, has just an, who has actually spent fwenty-

years of solitary confinement in this dungeon, where most prisoners die or go insane in a few months. She was ondemned in 1889 for teaching radical doctrines. She was betrayed by one of ner associates, who received \$5,000 from the government. The political convicts in Schlusselburg are treated with great severity. Their cells are damp and cold, and they never receive sufficient food to satisfy their hunger.

Here is the story of Mme. Figner's experience from her own lips: "We were taken to the prison by steamer, clothed in sackcloth and chained hand and foot. Inside the chained hand and foot. Inside the fortress we were separately consigned to harrow, stone cells, painted a dull leaden gray, exactly like coffins. The windows were thick and opaque, so that we never saw a sunbeam or a star. An iron chair-bedstead, chained up flat against the wall during the day, was the only furniture. When the political prisoners hear the key turned on them in those gloomy cells they know their lives are left behind. Their relatives have no notion whether they relatives have no notion whether they are alive or dead.

"For twenty years I never saw a creature except the jailers and it was only after twelve years that I was allowed to write two letters a year. Food was insufficient, merely watery soup and some porridge or black bread. Nevertheless we were compelled to fast two days a week, in compliance with the rules of the Greek church. Not even a comb was provided, except once a week. Only the Bible and a few antiquated books of travel were allowed as reading. Pacing backward and forward in the narrow cell was the sole relaxation. "For twenty years I never saw

from want of food, but the bedsteads were chained up by the wall and the only rest was to be found by lying on the cold, bare floor. To save themthe cold, bare floor. To save them-selves from madness the prisoners con-trived a code of knocks on the wall, but when this was heard several were brutally punished. Guards rushed in and gags were forced into the mouths of prisoners while they were beaten most savagely. Several soon yent wed-sto be left utterly unattended in nost savagely. Several soon went mad—to be left utterly unattended in

most savagely. Several soon went mad—to be left utterly unattended in their cells.

"We were unable to sleep owing to their shrieks. The dying were similarly left, without even a glass of water. Some one died every night. One night I heard my companion in the next cell being dragged to the Black Hole' because he had knocked on the wall. I began to hammer on the door. The governor looked in, and I protested that I had also knocked and should be sent to the Black Hole' too.

"Very well,' he said. I presently found myself in the passage, gazing at forty dark, leaden gray doors, like coffins standing on end. We walked into a yast rourtyard, and I saw, for the first time in five years, the stars above that white-walled pit of doom. The sight of that shimmering light made me forget, for a moment, all cise. There was no soap or towel, moldy black bread and water were given as food. An iron bedstead was there, but the irons cut into the fiesh, for no bed-The Right Hon, J. G. Talbot, the father the irons cut into the flesh, for no bedding was allowed. On the second night, the governor decided on a further refinement of torture. He had the beds chained up flat to the wall, so that the prisoners had to sleep on the floor. On returning to daylight Mme. Figner found her face quite changed and aged.
