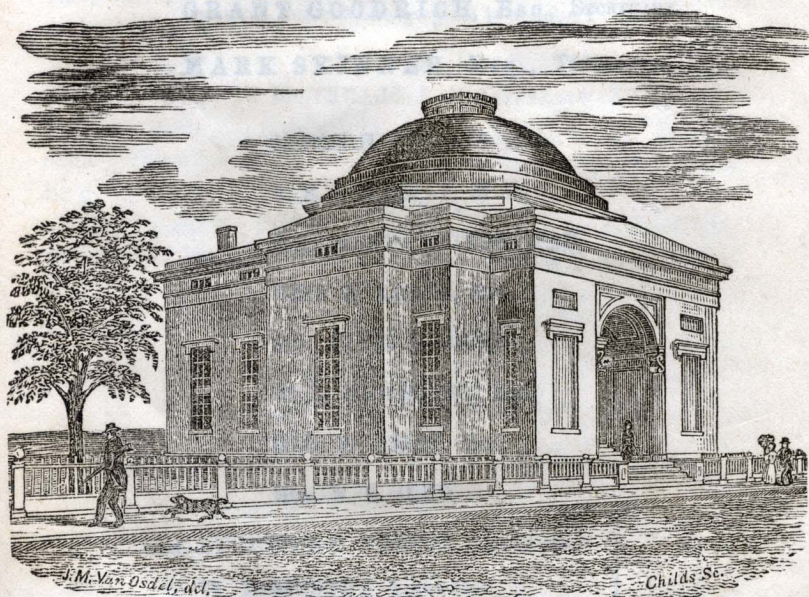

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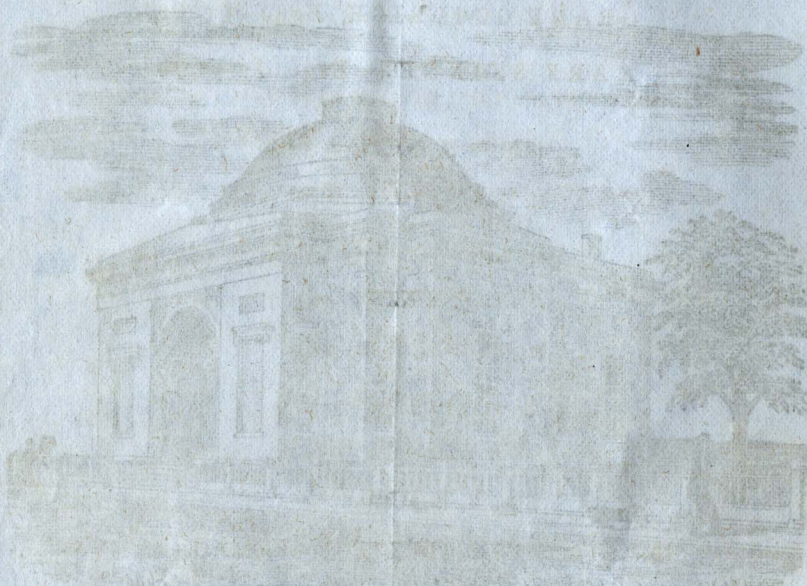

ANNOUNCEMENT.

COMMENCEMENT OF THE TERM.

THE ANNUAL COURSE OF LECTURES, for the Session of 1851-52, will commence on Monday the 3d of November, and continue sixteen weeks.

It is very desirable that every student should be present on the first day of the Session, that he may have the instructions in each department in its completeness and natural order; there being but one general introductory, which will be given on the first day of the course.

The Dissecting Rooms in the College will be opened, and the Clinical Lectures in the Hospital commence on the second Monday of October, and will be regularly attended from that time to the end of the College term.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

The following are the requisitions for the degree of Doctor of Medicine, viz.:-

1st. The candidate must be twenty-one years of age, and give satisfactory evidence of possessing a good moral character.

2d. He must have pursued the study of medicine three years, and attended, at least, two courses of lectures, the last of which must be in this institution. Four years of regular and continuous practice will be considered equivalent to one course of lectures.

3d. He must have taken the Dissecting and Hospital Tickets, during, at least, one College term.

4th. He must notify the Secretary of the Faculty of his intention to become a candidate, and deliver to him a thesis on some medical subject, written by himself, on or before the 1st of February, and at the same time deposit the graduation fee, which, together with the thesis, will be returned to him in case of withdrawal or rejection.

5th. Every candidate must undergo a full and satisfactory examination on all the branches taught in the College.

6th. Graduates of other respectable schools of medicine will be entitled to an *ad eundem* degree, by passing a satisfactory examination, paying the graduation fee, and giving evidence of good *moral and professional* character.

The Hospital fee is regulated by the Trustees of that institution and appropriated exclusively for its benefit.

Good board, with room, fuel, lights, and attendance, can be obtained in Chicago, at from \$2 to \$2 25 per week.

Our own Alumni, and the graduates of other respectable Schools of medicine throughout the country, will be permitted to attend the whole or any part of the courses of lectures, by calling on the Secretary and procuring the Matriculation Ticket, which is free of charge.

Students will find it to their advantage to supply themselves with some good text-book, on the several branches taught in the College; and on arriving in the city, all needful directions can be obtained by calling at the office of the Secretary, No. 65 Lake-street.

TO THE PROFESSION.

IN issuing this, their Ninth Annual Circular and Catalogue, the Trustees and Faculty of the Rush Medical College take pleasure in announcing to their friends, the steady and continued prosperity of the Institution.

This prosperity consists, not only in a gratifying increase in the numbers of those who seek its advantages and honors, but also in the rapid increase of all those facilities requisite for the most thorough instruction in all the departments of medical science and practice. Each Professor is amply supplied with all the means necessary for illustrating and rendering practical the instructions in his own department, and the *materiel* for dissection is as abundant and cheap as could be desired. The anatomical rooms are convenient, and under the immediate care of the demonstrator, whose whole time is devoted to the subject of Practical Anatomy during the course, subject always to the supervision of the Professor of Anatomy.

The Illinois General Hospital of the Lakes, which was opened for the reception of patients in the early part of last winter, is now well established, and under the excellent internal management of the Sisters of Mercy. It occupies the large brick building, well known as the "Lake House," and is located very conveniently for the accommodation of students. The Surgical Wards will be under the charge of Prof. Brainard, and the Medical under that of Prof. Davis, during the lecture term; and the regular Clinical Course by those members of the Faculty, will be given daily in the Wards of the Hospital, directly by the bed-side of the sick.

The United States Marine Hospital, under the charge of Prof. Herrick, will also doubtless be accessible to students so soon as opened for the reception of patients. We are happy in being thus able to present to our students and such

practitioners as choose to favor us with a visit, Clinical advantages, in direct connection with the ordinary College instruction, fully equal to the best Schools in the Union.

Surgery and Clinical Surgery.

PROF. BRAINARD will devote the early part of his course to a consideration of the Principles, Pathology, and Treatment of Surgical Diseases, these coming much more frequently under the care of the general Practitioner than the important Surgical Operations. Subsequently, Operative Surgery, and Surgical Anatomy will be taken up, and every important manipulation illustrated practically, either on the dead subject or the living, and frequently on both; the numerous Surgical cases coming before the class during every term, affording ample opportunities for this purpose. The Professor of Surgery will also meet the Hospital Class in the Surgical Wards, at a stated hour each day, and spare no pains to render the numerous surgical diseases and operations there presented, of the utmost practical value to those in attendance.

Chemistry and Pharmacy.

In the Chemical Department, the means of illustration are sufficiently ample. A full Elementary Course of Chemistry will be given, and the relations of Chemical Science to the various branches of Medicine,—Toxicology, Pharmacy, Physiology, and Pathology,—will receive the attention which their great importance demands.

Materia Medica and Medical Jurisprudence.

The course on Materia Medica, by Prof. McLean, will not only embrace a full consideration of the Properties and Comparative Value of all the various classes of Medicinal Agents, but special pains will be taken to render the class familiar with the distinguishing characteristics of pure articles, and also the botanical characters of such as are indigenous.

His ample Cabinet of Materia Medica and Medical Herbarium affords him all desirable facilities for illustrating this department.

In the latter part of the term, all the more important topics embraced under the head of Medical Jurisprudence will be fully presented, and illustrated before the Class.

Anatomy and Physiology.

The advantages afforded by Chicago for the study of Anatomy are unsurpassed; and the means for demonstration in the Lectures,

and for acquiring a thorough practical knowledge of this important branch in the large and well ventilated dissecting rooms of the College, are ample and complete.

The Lectures on Physiology will be preceded always by exhibitions of the minute anatomy of tissues and organs, through the solar and compound microscopes, in order that the ultimate structure of parts may constitute, as far as possible, the basis of physiological deductions. The material used for dissection, both in the amphitheatre and dissecting-rooms, will be so prepared as to prevent entirely decomposition and all its disagreeable effects.

Obstetrics and the Diseases of Women and Children.

The Professor of Obstetrics, &c., will lecture on the Anatomy and Physiology of the organs of generation; first, in their quiescent condition, in which the new doctrines of Menstruation and Ovulation will be discussed; and secondly, in their active condition, in which Fecondation, Gestation, and Natural Parturition will be treated.

In the second section of the course he will treat of Abnormal Labors; the Diseases incident to Pregnancy and the Puerperal State; and subsequently, of other Diseases peculiar to Women.

The third section of the course will be devoted to a consideration of the Diseases of Children.

Pains will be taken to illustrate the course by demonstrations upon the subject, by Preparations, Plates, &c., and, as far as they present, by cases in the Hospital and in private practice.

Pathology, Practice, and Clinical Medicine.

PROF. DAVIS will lecture daily throughout the term, occupying the first four weeks on the very important and interesting subject of General Pathology, which constitutes the only appropriate introduction to Practical Medicine. The latter, which consists in the consideration of individual diseases, will occupy the last twelve weeks of the term, and will be abundantly illustrated, by Pathological Specimens and Clinical Cases. Prof. Davis will also meet the Hospital Class in the Medical Wards of the Hospital at a stated hour each day, (Sunday always excepted,) and spare no pains to make each member familiar with a systematic mode of examining patients, and practically skillful in all the means of Diagnosis, including Auscultation, Percussion, Analysis of Secretions, &c., as well as in the details of treatment.
