

Urgent Interpellation on the General
Strike of Employees and Workes in the
Newspapers, Communications, Broadcasting,
and Mine Enterprises.

Mr. Takasuke Ikegami (Kokuminto) asserted that the walkout now under way in the business of newspapers, communications, radio and mine, which has had linked up with the former strike of seamen and railroad employees, indicates the existence of the leading body in the background. The situation, being exceedingly prevalent as well as grave, has, at present, become the political problem. Since the House cannot defy the circumstances, the following points will be questioned:

- (1) the real phase of the strike:
- (2) the movement of the body behind the curtain:
the Administration's measures for its anti-parliamentary attitude:
- (3) the soundness of labor movement
- (4) the harmony of State's interests with laborers' ones.

Prime Minister replied: it follows that the prevailing strike under the leadership of some persons mixes up intentionally the aim of the union campaign and that of the political movement and, proceeding forward beyond the scope of the union movement, abuses the right of dispute. In the light of the vicious influence

upon

upon the society, the Government is ready for necessary steps for satisfactory settlement. It is earnestly desired that there would be the prompt solution of the matter, inasmuch as the miners walkout would give to the people's economical life the serious menace.

Finally, Minister of Communications and Welfare Minister, explaining on the true state of the radio employees' strike and on the general situation, expressed the Government's views.

1. Reference: SCAP Memorandum AG 334 (11 Jan 46) GD, subject:
"Appointment of Civilian Merchant Marine Committee."
2. The Civilian Merchant Marine Committee will continue to function
for the duration of SCAJAP operations as per Paragraph 2a of the
reference Memorandum. However, the Ordinances concerning the War-
time Shipping Control and the Mariners Mobilization, which establish
the CMMC expire by 30 September 1946 in consequence of the repeal
of the National Mobilization Law and the War-time Emergency
Measures Law on 31 March 1946.
3. The Japanese Government takes liberty to inform the General
Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, that in order
to provide for the continuance of the CMMC it has been decided to
take an extraordinary measure of extending the enforcement of the
relevant ordinances for another six months - in other words the
Government is to promulgate such an amendment to the Law concerning
the repeal of the National Mobilization Law and the War-time Emergency
Law, that the ordinances which establish the CMMC shall be remained
in force for one year after the repeal thereof. This amendment will
be issued under the Imperial Ordinance No. 542 of 1945 concerning
orders to be issued in consequence of the

Potsdam Declaration.
