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### Introduction

In beginning the third year of the minor league independence it is a pleasure to find every league in the country under organized ball and working under one set of playing rules.

The National Association has now over twenty well organized leagues under control, all working under an agreement with the major leagues, thus being able to control the players and give the business a substantial flavor.

Until the minor leagues commenced to operate independently of the National League the wrecks strewn along the base ball highway were discouraging. Now all has changed, until a good minor league franchise is preferable to the uncertainties of a major league club with large risks and poor returns.

The base ball public have learned that all the ball players are not tied up to the big leagues. In fact, the games of the well-matched small leagues are much more attractive than the ill-matched teams of the major leagues.

Base ball has grown until it is a weak, outcast city or town that is not represented or working hard to get a foothold in some organization.

The land is full of ball players, and the number are mostly well-educated compared to the men who were the pioneers of the game and really developed the fine points so well executed by clever imitators of the present time.

Mr. Ban Johnson has done much for the game at large by forcing players to respect the umpires and play the game in a sportsmanlike manner without delays. Johnson's success has caused other officers to follow his example until the time has nearly arrived when the umpires will be respected and the players forced to take the good with the bad. Another gentleman who has done much good for the minor leagues is President James A. Hart of the Chicago club. Mr. Hart has been a loyal and liberal friend to the minors since they declared they would handle their own affairs and no man was more pleased than he when the men from the Golden Gate closed the only break in the ranks of organized ball.

The minor leagues have a splendid future before them in base ball and should allow no petty disappointments to shake their faith. In union is strength, and should the minors ever lose sight of this fact, all the good of the past would be a case of the fat in the fire.

The ball club that ignores the salary limit is a handicap to the league; the manager that works under the limit is

the one who keeps the fire alive.

Players are always well paid, for good men cannot be held down. The big leagues are ever on the hunt for the best and a player that can do the work must naturally come to the front and be promoted with a raise in salary. To the great players belong the spoils.

The successful money makers in the minor league field are the clubs managed by old players with a financial interest in the club. Millionaires are a detriment to the sport and soon kill any league they are allowed to dominate over. Base ball leagues are only as strong as the second division clubs. The winners never divide up with the losers, so that clubs should never be allowed to engage players above the salary limits for the purpose of forcing the other clubs to do the same.

By a revision of the circuits all over the country thousands of dollars could be saved that now go toward

traveling expenses.

With the cities growing in population and the railroad facilities increasing yearly the game should prosper accordingly and no doubt will if order is maintained on the field.

### Birth of the Minors

The struggle of the minor leagues that now go to make up the National Association was a long one and a most

interesting one.

Until the minors built up their own organization it was a continual struggle to get people to back the game. Now all has changed, for men and money are ever ready to back the game in every city in the land where there is a

chance to put a club into organized ball.

The American Association and Eastern League, as well as the Southern League, can now afford to pay as good salaries as did the National League but a few years ago; while several of the smaller leagues pay salaries that would have staggered the club owners twenty years ago.

### THE EASTERN LEAGUE.

The Eastern League was organized at the Bingham House, Philadelphia, on January 4, 1884, with the following cities represented: Reading, Allentown, Newark, Har-

risburg, Baltimore, Trenton and Richmond.

This league went out of commission during the season of 1890, and for several years found it a difficult matter to hold the circuit together until this season. For the first time, the Eastern stands for the highest in minor league baseball.

Looking over the list of players who came to the front from this league we find Bastian, who became a fine second baseman for the Philadelphia League Club; Tom Burns, who was a member of the Brooklyn Club, under McGunnigle; Dick Johnson, the most finished outfielder the game ever produced, later with the Boston League Club; Dan Casey, a splendid left-hand pitcher for the Philadelphia Club; Kilroy, another famous left-hand pitcher.

The Eastern League has endeavored to make their organization international, and have therefore done much to help the game in Canada when they have carried off

the championship.

### THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION.

The American Association is a trade mark that base ball men love to cling to. The first organization of this name



was started in '82 for the purpose of fighting the National League. It was known as the popular-price venture, and held out for ten years, when the National League swallowed up the young member in the tweleve club amalgamation. After two failures to reorganize, Thomas Hickey, President of the Western League, in the winter of 1901, picked out Louisville, Columbus, Toledo, Indianapolis, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Kansas City and Milwaukee for the makeup of a brand new American Association. As the territory of Milwaukee and Kansas City was disputed and a stubborn fight made for it, the Association was not the success it would have been otherwise. This season, with a clear field and good ball teams, success should be at hand.

### SOUTHERN LEAGUE.

The Southern League first came into prominence in 1885, with the late lamented Henry D. Grady, of Atlanta, as the President.

The Southern League had a way of finishing with two clubs. In 1887, Birmingham, Mobile, New Orleans, Savannah, Nashville and Memphis started the season; Birmingham and Charleston alone finishing. All are now in the game once more.

It was not until the present Southern League was organized that base ball was handled properly in the Southern country, and the umpire's life was not worth a shilling


when the home team lost.

Judge Kavanaugh, of Little Rock, has instilled confidence into the business end of the game, and now can point with pride to one of the very finest base ball organizations in the land, not excepting the major leagues. They love the old game in the South.

### THE NEW ENGLAND LEAGUE.

The New England Association was organized in the spring of 1884, and shortly after changed the name to the New England League, with William H. Moody, the present Secretary of the Navy, as the first President, and the following cities represented: Biddeford, Haverhill, Lawrence, Portland, Newburyport and Gloucester. A. G. Doe, the present owner of the New Bedford club, was owner of the Gloucester club, and a director in the Association.

This league has gone several seasons without protection,



and at times had hard work to keep alive, stopping after Fourth of July games and closing the season with as few as three clubs, but never failing to start a season since once launched. But two new cities have been taken into this league during the last three years, viz., New Bedford and Fall River, which took the places of Lewiston and Portland. With a compact circuit and a close attention to the salary limit, the New England league has been a fine success of late years.

### THE NEW YORK LEAGUE.

The New York League started out in 1885 with clubs in Rochester, Syracuse, Utica, Albany and Binghamton. No effort was made to run the New York League until 1898, when John H. Farrell called together Rome, Utica, Cortland, Binghamton, Oswego, Albany, Troy and Schenectady. Since then this league has changed around considerably, but finishes always strong, and is noted for the quality of ball players turned out for the major league clubs.

### THE CONNECTICUT LEAGUE.

The Connecticut League came into existence in 1898, with New Haven, Waterbury, Derby, Bristol, Meriden, New London, Bridgeport and Norwich for a circuit.


By keeping close to the salary limit and expense of travel very low this league has prospered up to date. It was not until two years ago that the league took in a club outside the State, but now Massachusetts is well represented, and the name Connecticut League is hardly the proper thing.

### THE WESTERN LEAGUE.

It was in 1883 when the Western League first appeared in the field, with clubs at Cleveland, Indianapolis, Milwaukee, Kansas City, Toledo and Omaha. Since that time the Western League has included about every city in the West, and many times it has had to quit long before the season was over, in this respect much resembling the Eastern League, both having a poor record for holding clubs for the entire season.

The Western League started with six clubs, and will start this year with the same number. The salary question has been the great stumbling block to this western concern, and with long jumps the expense of running

clubs has been very large.



### THE NORTHWESTERN LEAGUE.

This Minor League can date its birth back to 1883, with Bay City, Fort Wayne, Grand Rapids, Quincy, Peoria, Springfield, O., Toledo and Saginaw for a circuit. This league has gone out of existence several times, but now seems in shape to remain for a long time.

### THE TEXAS LEAGUE.

In 1895 the Texas League was organized with the following circuit: Galveston, Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, Shreveport, Sherman, San Antonio and Austin.

This little Southern league has seen some grand, good base ball and comes up smiling after a knockout with great

courage.

### THE CENTRAL LEAGUE.

This league was first organized in 1899, with the following circuit: Bloomington, Danville, Peoria, Terre Haute, Decatur and Jacksonville.

### Third Annual Meeting

St. Louis, Mo., October 21, 1903.

The third annual convention of the National Association of Professional Base Ball Leagues convened at the Southern Hotel, St. Louis, Mo., October 21, 1903, P. T. Powers presiding, with the following present:

Meeting was called to order by President Powers at

2:30 P. M.

Roll call by Secretary showed sixty-four delegates present, representing twelve leagues.

### ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Mr. Powers requested Mr. O'Rourke to take the chair. Mr. Sexton nominated P. T. Powers for President and moved election be by acclamation. Carried.


Mr. Powers resumed chair.

Judge Kavanaugh nominated J. H. Farrell for Secretary and Treasurer and election was made by acclamation.

Mr. Griffith moved that a committee of three be ap-

pointed by the Chair to draft in our Agreement what changes seemed wise, and report at a future meeting.

Mr. Kavanaugh amended that the election of the National Board be postponed until after the matter of the



revision of the National Agreement. Seconded by Mr. Mack.

Mr. Sexton spoke against the motion to postpone.

Mr. O'Rourke did not like the motion to interfere with the regular order of business, and was decidedly opposed to any postponement.

Mr. Kavanaugh withdrew his amendment.

Mr. Mack withdrew his second.

Mr. O'Rourke moved to proceed to the election of officers. Adopted.

For members of the National Board of Arbitration:

Mr. Mack nominated W. M. Kavanaugh. Mr. Burns nominated T. H. Murnane. Mr. A. Frank nominated M. H. Sexton. Mr. Doe nominated J. H. O'Rourke.

Mr. Dugdale nominated W. H. Lucas.

No other nominations were made and the above Board

was elected without a dissenting vote.

Mr. Griffith of Jersey City arose and said: "The Class 'A' Clubs are not represented on the Board, and I ask that they follow me and leave the room."

Several delegates from the American Association and

Eastern League thereupon left the room.

Mr. Farrell stated that there had been a general understanding as long ago as the Chicago meeting of November 17, 1902, when the American Association was admitted to membership, that the American Association was to be extended representation on the National Board at this meeting.

Mr. Fisher moved that Messrs. Kavanaugh, Farrell and Sexton be named a committee to learn the wants of the gentlemen who retired. Mr. Sexton asked to be excused

from the committee.

The motion was adopted and an adjournment taken until g o'clock Friday morning.

### SECOND DAY, OCTOBER 22.

Mr. Kavanaugh arose and stated that he spoke as an individual and he had ascertained what the Class "A" leagues desired and wanted. He said the Class "A" leagues wanted representation on the Board and he recommended that a committee be appointed to meet with them and ascertain what was wanted.

The President stated that the joint meeting between the



American Association and the Eastern League was for

the purpose of agreeing on a salary limit only.

By Mr. Burns: That a committee of four be appointed to meet a committee of the American Association and Eastern League to find out just what was wanted. Carried. Messrs. Kavanaugh, Farrell, O'Rourke and Burns named.

A recess was then declared until 12:30 P. M., at which time the delegates gathered and proceeded to the fair

grounds.

The committee of four immediately went into session with a similar committee of the American Association and Eastern League.

### THIRD DAY, OCTOBER 23.

The Conference Committee reported back from the joint committee session as to the desires of the American Association and Eastern League Committee. The meeting then resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole and took up the National Agreement, section by section, amending the same. The Conference Committee shortly thereafter, again meeting the committee of the two leagues.

### FOURTH DAY, OCTOBER 24.

The Conference Committee of Messrs. Kavanaugh, Farrell and Burns read report of result of conference with the two leagues committee.

Mr. Kavanaugh favored the clause prohibiting exhibition

games.

Mr. Wheatley thought the matter should be left to each

league to settle.

On the territorial rights section Mr. O'Rourke opposed it vigorously, calling attention to the effect it might work on two leagues in the East, one the Connecticut League and the other the New York League.

Mr. Farrell considered it vicious and bad in principle, and such being admitted, it should be stopped at the door of our Association and not be permitted to extend through-


out the entire Association.

President Powers assured all that the Eastern League would not invade the circuit of either of the two leagues referred to in the East.

The amendments were then, on motion of Mr. Palmer,

adopted.

By Mr. Palmer: That Mr. Kavanaugh wait on the East-



ern League and American Association committees and invite them to take seats in the room. Adopted.

Mr. Kavanaugh entered with the two delegations.

By Mr. Watkins: That Mr. Kavanaugh and Mr. Griffith be appointed a committee to complete National Agreement on lines of amendments already adopted. Carried.

Mr. Frank asked that the committee provide penalty for

breaking of salary limits.

By Mr. Burnham: That from December 1, 1903, all contracts made with players shall be filed with the Secretary for record and approval, that the first record of "Terms Accepted" received by wire, or otherwise, shall have precedence and shall be binding; that evidence of proof of such terms accepted must be forwarded to the secretary immediately. Adopted.

### SECOND SESSION, OCTOBER' 24.

Mr. Kayanaugh called up the promotion of Southern League to Class "A."

Mr. Murnane said he did not favor the advancement of


Southern League to Class "A."

Mr. Sexton said that he believed that the Southern League was entitled to membership. The question of whether the Southern League contained the requisite aggregate population for a Class "A" League was raised. right to compute suburban population was discussed. Article 7 of National Agreement was quoted, showing that the compilation must be "according to the last published official census."

Mr. Fisher of Nashville stated that he was not in favor of advancing the Southern League to Class "A," increasing salary limit, etc., and stated all the members of the

league were not unanimous on the question.

On the roll call on the motion to suspend the constitution the vote resulted as follows: The American Association, nay; the Eastern League, nay; Western Leagues, aye; the New York League, Mr. Farrell asked to explain his vote saying that while he would like to accommodate the Southern League, still in view of the division of sentiment in the league on the question, and the fact that the National Board had twice passed upon the question, and each time had voted nay on the ground that the requisite population did not exist, he must vote nay; the Connecticut League, aye; New England, aye; "I. I. I.," aye;



Southern League did not vote; Central League, aye; Pacific National, aye; Missouri Valley, aye.

As the motion did not receive the necessary 4-5 vote

it was declared lost.

By Mr. Murnane: That the Southern League and Pacific National League be permitted to increase their respective salary limits to \$2,000 by a suspension of the constitution. Unanimously adopted.

Mr. Packard moved a vote of thanks to the World's

Fair Commissioners for courtesies. Adopted.

Mr. Kavanaugh moved vote of thanks to newspapers of

St. Louis. Adopted.


A communication was announced from Mr. Dreyfuss extending invitation to National Association to meet in Pittsburg in 1904.

By Mr. Murnane: That next annual meeting be held

in New York City. Adopted.

Editor Flanner, of the Sporting News, paid the new officers the following graceful compliment:

The re-election of P. T. Powers as president, J. H. Farrell as secretary and of M. H. Sexton, W. M. Kavanaugh, W. H. Lucas, T. H. Murnane and James H. O'Rourke as members of the National Board, assures to the National Association a successful administration of its affairs for another year. Powers, able, alert, affable, makes an ideal presiding officer and his record is proof of his executive qualifications. Farrell, industrious, courteous and penetrating is the wheelhorse of the minor leagues. Sexton, shrewd, well-balanced and fearless; Kavanaugh, never obtrusive, but always prominent; Lucas, reticent but reliable and zealous; Murnane and O'Rourke, both graduates from the players' ranks, and as prominent in their present professions as when popular idols, constitute a tribunal that any organization could be proud of. Every case presented to this Board is decided on its merits and rarely is there a division of opinion. As a rule, the points submitted by Secretary Farrell for decision are passed on only by three members. The papers are first sent to Murnane and are transmitted without endorsement to O'Rourke, who forms his conclusions and forwards them to Kavanaugh or Sexton. It is a compliment to both gentlemen to say that during their long service, there has never been a variance in the views of Murnane and

O'Rourke on questions submitted to them. Each without consulting the other mails his opinion to Secretary Farrell, who refers to the uniformity of their findings in complimentary terms. Changes will be made in the personnel of the Board in 1904, as the Amended National Agreement provides that three of the members shall be representatives of Class A clubs and Mr. Sexton alone possesses this qualification. None is desirous of another term, but the delegates to the next annual meeting will find it difficult to decide which of the Class B officials shall be retained.



# The Position of the Minor Leagues

In re, Inquiry of National Commission.

Attached to the decision of your honorable body, in the Lucia case, appealed to the Commission from our National Board of Arbitration, we notice particularly the following

language:

"You will notice in our findings in the Luica case, we rule that this case should be first tried by your Association. Let me know whether your decision is final that this player is reserved, or whether you want to go over the matter again."

We decided that Section 4 of the reserve clause of the Lucia contract was in full force, and this decision was

affirmed by the Commission.

This appears, however, to be an invitation of the Board to define its position, and we therefore take occasion to do so.


In the Lucia case, or in any other similar case, which comes before our Board for decision, our contention is this: That in all cases concerning the internal affairs of the National Association the decision of the National

Board must be supreme.

We base this claim upon Article 2 of the Agreement which reads: "Each party to this agreement retains the right to conduct its affairs and govern its players according to its Constitution and By-Laws;" and upon that portion of Article 4 which reads: "A Commission of three, to be known as the National Commission, is hereby created with the power to construe and carry out the terms of this Agreement, excepting when it pertains to the internal affairs of the National Association."

In our view, the language of Section 2 is so clear and explicit that its meaning and intent sticks out prominently, and cannot be misunderstood. It was intended to secure forever to the National Association absolute final control of its own affairs. Had not Section 2 been enacted at the very threshold of the Agreement no other section of that instrument by which the Commission seek to affirm, reverse, or criticise our decisions could ever have been enacted or even discussed, and was to be forever inviolable.

Any article or section following Section 2, which may seem to modify or be at variance with said Article must be,

Photo by Cornish. as a matter of proper construction, controlled by Articles 2 and 4, since they are the very life of the Agreement.

As a proof of our contention that both parties to the Agreement understood clearly the meaning and intent of Article 2 we submit that Article 2 as originally drawn read as follows:

"Article 2. Each party to this Agreement retains the right to conduct its affairs and govern its players according to its constitution and by-laws, and there shall be no conflict between such constitution and by-laws, and the objects and terms of this agreement."

This was strenuously objected to, and, as finally adopted, the words: "And there shall be no conflict between such constitution and by-laws, and the objects and terms of this agreement," were stricken out, and the article was adopted as it stands at present in the Agreement.

The meaning and intent of each of the two parties to the Agreement being to express in as clear and as brief language as possible the supreme authority of each party in its internal affairs, we find that Article 2 reads: "Each party to this Agreement retains the right to conduct its affairs and govern its players according to its constitution and by-laws." We fail to find where we have agreed to any article reading thusly: "A Commission shall be appointed with jurisdiction over National Association clubs and their players, on appeal."

We refer to Article 4, which creates the Commission. It reads: "Article 4. A Commission of three, to be known as the National Commission, is hereby created with power to construe and carry out the terms of this agreement, excepting when it pertains to the internal affairs

of the National Association."

It creates the Commission. Without it the Commission could not decide nor suggest anything, because it would not be in existence. Yet this section distinctly declares that the Commission shall never attempt to construe any matter "pertaining to the internal affairs of the National Association."

What is a dispute between player, manager or clubowner in the National Association? It is an inward, interior, domestic and internal affair, in the National Asso-


ciation family.

In contending for absolute control of our own affairs we did so in the spirit that that control secured us by the Agreement should not in any manner be infringed upon or diminished.



# National Agreement

# For the Government of Professional Base Ball

#### PREAMBLE.

This Agreement, made and entered into by and between the National League and American Association of Professional Base Ball Clubs, and the American League of Professional Base Ball Clubs, known and designated herein as Major Leagues, parties of the first part; each with the other and both, jointly and severally, by and with the National Association of Professional Base Ball Leagues, known and referred to herein as Minor Leagues, party of the second part, shall be styled the National Agreement, and shall have for its objects:

- (1) Perpetuation of base ball as the national pastime of America, by surrounding it with such safeguards as will warrant absolute public confidence in its integrity and methods, and by maintaining a high standard of skill and sportsmanship in its players.
- (2) Protection of the property rights of those engaged in base ball as a business without sacrificing the spirit of competition in the conduct of the clubs.
- (3) Promotion of the welfare of ball players as a class by developing and perfecting them in their profession and enabling them to secure adequate compensation for expertness.
  - (4) Adoption of a uniform code of rules for playing base ball.

#### ARTICLE I.

Section 1. This Agreement shall be indissoluble except by the unanimous vote of the parties to it, and if any of said parties withdraws from it, or violates any of its fundamental principles, the party so withdrawing or offending shall be treated as the enemy of organized base ball.

#### ARTICLE II.

Section 1. Each party to this Agreement retains the right to conduct its affairs and govern its players according to its constitution and by-laws.

#### ARTICLE III.

Section 1. On or before March 1st of each year, a committee of three from each of the Major Leagues to this Agreement—the National and American Leagues—shall meet and adopt a code of rules to regulate the playing of the game of base ball for the ensuing

season, a majority vote being required to adopt, revise or repeal a rule.

#### ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. A commission of three members, to be known as the National Commission, is hereby created with power to construe and carry out the terms and provisions of this Agreement, excepting when it pertains to the internal affairs of the National Association. One member shall be the President of the National League and one the President of the American League. These two members shall meet, on or before the first Monday of January in each year, to elect by a majority vote a suitable person as the third member. The third member so chosen shall be the Chairman of the Commission for one year from the date of his election, and shall preside at all meetings. Each member shall have a vote on all questions which may come before it, except as hereinafter directed. A Secretary shall be elected yearly. The salary of the Chairman shall be \$..... per annum, in addition to living and traveling expenses incurred in the discharge of his official duties. Other members of the Commission shall serve without compensation. The salary of the Secretary shall be \$..... per annum. Immediately after the election of a Chairman and Secretary, the Commission shall proceed to the transaction of such business as may properly come before it.

Section 2. Sessions of the Commission, in addition to the annual meeting on the first Monday in January of each year, shall be held at the call of the Chairman, or at the request of the two other members of the Commission.

Section 3. The National Commission shall have the power to inflict and enforce fines or suspensions, or both, upon either party to this Agreement, who are adjudged by it to have violated the letter or spirit of this Agreement.

Section 4. Whenever a National League Club or an American League Club claim the services of the same player by selection, reservation or contract, the right to said player shall be established by the decision of the Chairman of the Commission, who shall determine the case on the law and evidence without the aid of either of his associates.

Section 5. Whenever a National League Club and a Minor League Club cannot amicably arrange differences over a player, the testimony shall be heard and the case adjudicated by the Chairman of the Commission and the representative of the American League. If the contention be between an American League Club and a Minor League Club, the decision shall be made by the Chairman of the Commission and the representative of the National League. If the Chairman of the Commission and the Major League member entitled to vote on any question arising between a Major and Minor League Club, shall not agree, the Chairman's findings shall determine the case.

#### ARTICLE V.

Section 1. The circuits of each Major League shall consist of the following cities: National League—Boston, New York, Brooklyn, Philadelphia, Pittsburg, Chicago, St. Louis and Cincinnati. American League-Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Washington, Cleveland, Detroit, Chicago and St. Louis. Neither Major League circuit shall be changed without the consent of the majority of the clubs of each Major League. It is further provided that there shall be no consolidation in any city where two Major League Clubs exist: nor shall any club transfer or release its players for the purpose of injuring or weakening the league of which it is a member; provided, however, that the circuit of either Major League may be changed by transferring either of the above-mentioned franchises to some other city on consent of the majority of the clubs of each Major League. Provided, further, that if either of the Major Leagues in changing their circuits shall choose a city in which a club of the National Association is located, such Major League shall then be required to pay to the league in the National Association of which such city may be a member, the sum of \$2,500. Provided, further, that when a Major League shall change its circuit and choose a city in which a club of the National Association is located, such club shall be compensated for any assets that they may have by the club desiring to locate in such city; and upon failure to agree upon such compensation, the matter shall be determined by arbitration, the arbitration committee to consist of three members, one of whom shall be the President of the National Commission, one a member of the Major League, other than the one desiring to locate in such city, and the third a member of the National Association. The finding of a majority of said committee to be final.

Section 2. The party of the second part hereby guarantees that none of the leagues in its membership shall establish or maintain a club in a city on the circuit of either Major League, or within five miles of the limits thereof, without the consent in writing of the Major League Club or clubs located therein and recorded in the office of the Secretary of the National Commission, Jersey City excepted.

#### ARTICLE VI.

Section 1. All parties to this instrument pledge themselves to recognize the right of reservation and respect contracts between players and clubs under its protection.

Section 2. Any club or league which harbors a player who refuses to observe his contract with a club member of any party to this Agreement, or to abide by its reservation, shall be considered an outlaw organization, and its claims to contractual and territorial rights ignored.



Section 3. The right and title of a Major League Club to its players shall be absolute, and can be only terminated by release or failure to reserve under the terms of this Agreement by the club to which a player has been under contract. When a Major League Club serves notice of release on one of its players he shall be ineligible to contract with a club of another league if, during ten days after the service of such notice of release, a club in the league in which he has been playing shall demand his services.

Section 4. The practice of farming is prohibited. All right or claim of a Major League Club to a player shall cease when such player becomes a member of a Minor League Club, and no arrangement between clubs for the loan or return of a player shall be binding between the parties to it or recognized by other clubs.

Section 5. The National Association shall have the classification of its leagues, and the adoption of a salary limit for its clubs according to such classification, and it agrees to withdraw protection from any league which allows any of its clubs to exceed the salary limit prescribed for leagues of its classification.

Section 6. The right of a Minor League Club to its players shall be absolute, except that from September 1st to October 15th of each year, Major League Clubs shall have the privilege of selecting players from the National Association Clubs for the following season, upon payment of \$750 for each player so selected from clubs in Class "A" leagues; \$500 for each player so selected from clubs in Class "B" leagues; \$300 for each player so selected from clubs in Class "C" leagues; and \$200 for each player so selected from clubs of a lower class, the payments to be made to the Secretary of the National Association, through the Secretary of the Commission, as follows: One-half of the amount when the selection is made, and one-half of the amount on June 1st following, the player to revert to the club from which he was selected if the selecting club defaults on any of the payments, the player also to revert to the club from which he was selected, if when released he is not signed within ten days by a club of a Major League; provided, however, that not more than two players shall be selected from any Class "A" club during any one year.

Section 7. Any club entitled to make selection of a player, and desiring to do so, shall notify the Secretary of the National Commission, stating the name of the player and of the club to which he is under contract and reservation, and enclosing the amount specified in the preceding section to be paid for such release or draft. The Secretary shall thereupon notify the Secretary of the National Association, who shall thereupon immediately notify the club and league from which such selection shall be made, and shall order the transfer of the player to the selecting club at the close of the gurrent season. Such selection and transfer shall thereupon be

promulgated, and if such selection is revoked, or default made in payments, immediate notice thereof shall be given to the clubs of all parties to this Agreement, and any other club in the same league may be subrogated to the rights of the club defaulting in said payments, by paying to the club defaulting the sum so advanced.

Section 8. A Major League Club may at any time purchase the release of a player from a Minor League Club, to take effect forth-with or at a specified date, provided such purchase is recorded with the Secretary of the Commission and Secretary of the National Association for promulgation within five days of the date of the transaction.

Section 9. If a selected player is released within the year of, or the next year after his selection, by a Major League Club, and no other Major League Club claim him prior to the expiration of his notice of release, the Minor League Club which lost him by selection shall have the priority of right to him over all clubs.

Section 10. The selection of a player made by a Major League Club under an arrangement with a Minor League Club for the return of the selected player after the expiration of the period of selection, shall be vold, and the National Commission shall impose a fine of \$500 on each club which becomes a party to a conspiracy to prevent a player from advancing in his profession, or in any way abusing the privilege of selection.

#### ARTICLE VII.

Section 1. On or before the 25th day of September in each year the Secretary of each party to this Agreement shall transmit to the Secretary of the Commission a list of players then under contract with each of its several club members for the current season, and in addition thereto, a list of such players reserved in any prior annual reserve list who have refused to contract with such clubs. Such players, together with all others thereafter to be regularly contracted with by such clubs (namely, those whose releases have been secured for future services by purchase or selection by draft under this agreement), are and shall be ineligible to contract with any other club of any league during the period of time between the termination of their contracts and the beginning of the next season. Secretary of the Commission shall thereupon promulgate such lists. No club shall be permitted to reserve any player while in arrears of salary to him. Failure of a club to tender a contract to a player by March 1, shall operate as a release.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

Section 1. All contracts between clubs and players in the Major League shall be in a form prescribed by the National Commission.

Section 2. Any agreement between club and player for service, evidenced by written acceptance, whether by letter or telegram or receipt from player for money advanced to him to bind such agreement, shall be construed to be a contract and held to be binding, provided the player declines to enter into a formal contract, but his refusal to sign such formal contract shall render him ineligible to play with the contracting club for more than a period of ten days, or to enter the service of a club of any party to this Agreement unless released.

Section 3. When a player of a Major or a Minor League Club shall be suspended for a stated period or indefinitely in accordance with his contract and the constitution and by-laws of the league of which his club is a member, the secretary of such association shall give notice of such disqualification to the Secretary of the National Commission, who shall at once promulgate the same, and such disqualified player shall not be eligible to play with or against the club of any party to this Agreement until such disqualification shall have been removed and notice of such revocation promulgated by the Secretary of the National Commission.

Section 4. In all cases before it for adjudication the National Commission shall have the right to require affidavits from parties in interest and other witnesses, and may demand the production of documentary evidence. Failure to furnish testimony under oath or affirmation or documentary evidence by a party in interest, within such time as may be specified by the Chairman of the Commission, shall result in the award of the case against the delinquent party.

Section 5. A player suspended by a club or league for a term longer than ten days shall have the right of appeal to the National Commission, which is given authority to order his reinstatement if it deems the punishment excessive or not merited. This and other questions may be determined by a mail vote by members of the Commission.

#### ARTICLE IX.

Section 1. The Secretary of the National Commission, who shall act as treasurer in addition to his other duties, shall furnish a sufficient bond for the faithful performance of his duties and the safekeeping of all moneys which come into his custody in the administration of his office. He shall keep the minutes of each meeting and preserve a correct record of all contracts, releases, reservations, selections, suspensions and reinstatements of players, and shall provide himself with an official stamp for certifying the time of receipt by him of all official documents.

Section 2. On the receipt of a notice of selection he shall note upon it in ink the amount of money accompanying it, the date and hour of its arrival, and adopt every precaution possible to prevent compli-

cations over the priority in time of the filing of selections of players by different clubs, and the club which first registers its selection of a player with the Secretary, as provided herein, shall be entitled to the services of such player.

Section 3. The Secretary shall prepare and promulgate all decisions and rulings of the National Commission, unless the chairman assigns the duty to himself or another member.

Section 4. The expenses of the Commission herein provided for shall be paid by the Major Leagues, share and share alike. Each Major League shall pay to the Secretary of the Commission \$500 for current expenses at the time of the adoption of this Agreement.

#### ARTICLE X.

Section 1. Every league shall strictly enforce the provisions in its constitution against open betting on its grounds and club officials are required to cause the arrest and prosecution of those who engage in the practice.

Section 2. No game or series of games shall be played for a stake between clubs of any party to this Agreement, nor shall any player of a club accept or agree to accept a sum of money or present of great value as an inducement or reward for special effort on his part in winning or trying to win a game.

# Rules of the Association Governing Minor Leagues

### FEE FOR PROTECTION AND MEMBERSHIP.

ARTICLE 9. The fee for membership and protection under this Agreement, with the right of reservation, subject to Articles 10 and 11 shall be:

For each Club in Class A the sum of \$100. For each Club in Class B the sum of \$50. For each Club in Class C the sum of \$25. For each Club in Class D the sum of \$15.

Such payments to be made within thirty days from the date of filing the written application for membership and annually thereafter on the twenty-fifth day of September in each year.

#### SELECTION OF PLAYERS.

ARTICLE 10. For the purpose of enabling players to advance in their profession, the leagues may at any time after the fifteenth of October of each year, and prior to the fifteenth of January following, negotiate with any player then under contract or reservation to a league under this Agreement, and shall have the right to select such player, upon payment to the Secretary of the Board the sum specified in Article 12.

#### SELECTION OF PLAYERS BY LEAGUES.

ARTICLE II. For the purpose of enabling players to advance in their profession and to assist in building up leagues, a club of a higher class shall have the right, after October 15 of each year, to select players from a league in a lower class during the following period:

Class A between Oct. 15 and Nov. 15, Class B between Nov. 15 and Dec. 15, Class C between Dec. 15 and Jan. 15.

upon payment to the Secretary of the Board the sum specified in Article 12.

#### TERMS FOR SELECTION OF PLAYERS.

ARTICLE 12—Sec. I. Clubs from a higher class selecting players from leagues of a lower class shall pay to the Sec-

retary of the Board for the benefit and account of the club from which the selection is made the following sums, viz.:

For players in Class B, \$500. For players in Class C, \$300. For players in Class D, \$200.

One-half of the amount when the selection is made, and one-half of the amount on June 1st following, the player to revert to the club from which he was selected, if the selecting club defaults on any of the payments; provided, however, that not more than two players shall be selected from each club of such classes.

SEC. 2. Players drafted by Major League clubs may be drafted by Class A clubs upon payment to the Secretary for the benefit of the club from which selection was originally made, one-half of the draft price of the class in which such club may be embraced, before such player can return to the

club from which he was drafted.

SEC. 3. Class A clubs shall have the right to purchase any player sold by a club in Classes B, C or D, to any Major League club when released by such Major League club upon payment to the Secretary for the benefit of such club, of the draft price, in full, of the class in which such club may be embraced, before such player can return to the club from which he was sold; provided, however, that should such player be released by such Major League club, prior to June 1st, such sum aforesaid may be paid, as herein provided, in two installments: one-half at the time of such purchase, and the balance on June 1st.

Sec. 4. Any club entitled to make selection of a player and desiring to do so, shall notify the Secretary of the Board, stating the name of the player and of the club with which he is under contract and reservation and enclosing amount specified in Section 1, Article 12, to be paid for such release. The Secretary shall thereupon notify the club or league from which such selection is to be made and shall order his transfer to the selecting club. Notice of such selection and transfer shall thereupon be promul-

gated.

### SALARY LIMIT.

ARTICLE 13. The monthly maximum salary limit of the several leagues, per club, classification of which is to be governed by Article 34, shall be as follows:

For Clubs in Class A, \$2,400 monthly on a basis of

Provided, however, that any league may fix its monthly salary limit at an amount lower than the maximum herein provided for such class; and

Provided further, that nothing contained in this section shall abrogate any contracts executed prior to September

11, 1903.

SEC. 2. Upon presentation to the National Board by any player of any league under this Agreement of satisfactory evidence that the club to which he was under contract is maintaining a salary limit in excess of the maximum herein provided of the class in which such club may be embraced, the National Board shall release unconditionally such informant from his contractual obligations to such club, and in addition thereto such club shall be fined the sum of five hundred dollars, which amount shall be paid to the Secretary of the National Board within ten days, and if said amount be not paid as herein provided, the National Board shall immediately withdraw the protection of this Agreement from such club; and

Provided further, that the National Board shall have the right to compel such club against which charges have been presented, to produce its books before them, and that any failure so to do shall be construed by them as an evi-

dence of guilt; and

Further, that the penalty herein provided shall be applied to any club in any league which shall exceed the limit fixed by such league and theretofore recorded with the

Secretary of the National Board.

SEC. 3. Clubs under the protection of this Agreement are strictly prohibited from advancing any money to players on account of salary, except for the purpose of transportation.

ARTICLE 14. Any club member of this Association may at any time between April 1 and October 1 negotiate with a club member of another league, party to this Agreement, for the release of a player from another league, to take effect after October 1 of the same year, or for an immediate release if the Constitution of such league permits, and such release shall at once be filed with and promulgated by the Secretary of the Board and become binding upon both clubs party to the transfer.

ARTICLE 15. Any club member of a league, party to this

Agreement, may at any time during its championship season negotiate for the immediate release of a player from a club member of another league where the league constitution of the releasing club permits, and such release, if secured, shall, when filed with the Secretary of the Board, become binding upon both clubs party to the transfer, providing the salary of the player so transferred during the championship season shall not be reduced during the balance of the season, unless he be given an unconditional release.

SEC. 2. The practice of "farming" players is hereby prohibited. Any club employing the services of a player "farmed" from a club of a higher class shall at once be penalized by the National Board of Arbitration.

#### CONTRACTS.

ARTICLE 16. Contracts between clubs and players shall be in writing in the form approved by the Board. An informal contract, whether evidenced by telegram or other writing, shall be valid for a period not exceeding thirty days, but a formal contract must be tendered by the contracting club to the contracting player within said thirty days. The failure of the club to so tender such formal contract will release the player from all contractual obligations thereunder, and the refusal of the player to execute such formal contract, when so tendered, shall extend the validity of his informal contract until he shall execute said formal contract.

SEC. 2. All blank contracts used by league members of this Association shall be uniform as to phraseology, each class having a distinguishing color as follows: Class A, white; Blass B, blue; Class C, pink; Class D, gray. All blank contracts shall be procured by the Secretary of this Association and furnished to the various leagues, free. All signed contracts with players shall be made a matter of a record kept on file in the office of the Secretary of this Association. The respective President of leagues shall furnish the Secretary with a list of the players' contracts in each league.

SEC. 3. Any Class A league may adopt its own form of contract, notwithstanding any of the provisions contained

in this Article.

penalties as the Board may inflict.

SEC. 2. All clubs under this Agreement are strictly prohibited from playing an exhibition game during their schedule season, and all players under contract to any club under this Agreement are prohibited from playing with any club not under the protection of this Agreement; and the National Board shall immediately withdraw the protection of this Agreement from any club violating the terms hereof, and shall fine any player violating the terms hereof the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200).

#### RESERVATION.

ARTICLE 21. On or before the twenty-fifth day of September in each year, and prior to the expiration of their players' contracts, the secretaries of leagues, parties hereto, entitled to the privilege of reservation, shall transmit to the Secretary of the Board a reserve list of players, not exceeding fourteen in number, then under contract with each of its several club members for the current season, and in addition thereto a list of such players reserved in any prior annual reserve list who have refused to contract with such clubs and of all ineligible players. Such players, together with all others thereafter to be regularly contracted with by such clubs (namely, whose releases have been secured by purchase or draft under this Agreement for future services), are and shall be ineligible to contract with any other club of any league during the period of time between the termination of their contracts and the beginning of the next season. The Secretary of said Board shall thereupon promulgate such lists, provided that no club shall be permitted to reserve any player while in arrears of salary to him.

# RELEASE FROM RESERVATION.

ARTICLE 22. The Board may also release from contract or reservation any player or manager when the club with which he has contracted, or by which he has been reserved, shall be in arrears to him for salary for more than fifteen days after such salary became due, or when the reserving club has failed to tender to any player, on or before the first day of March after such reservation, a formal contract, with a salary of at least such an amount per month as the Board may fix as the salary to be paid to such player; or

### INDIVIDUALS AND ORGANIZATIONS IN CON-FLICT WITH THE NATIONAL AGREEMENT.

ARTICLE 23—Sec. I. Any club member of any league or association, a party to or identified with the National Agreement, that shall enter into any negotiation to become a member of or in any way co-operate with any organization of professional base ball clubs whose existence will in any manner conflict with the letter and spirit of this Agreement or the interests of any of the clubs operating under it, shall forthwith forfeit all rights and privileges conferred by this Agreement, said forfeiture to include its membership in any association a party to this Agreement, and all rights of reservation to players reserved during the current or any preceding season. The penalty herein imposed shall be positive and final and shall not be revoked unless by the unanimous consent of the Board or upon appeal by a three-fourths vote of the National Association of Professional Base Ball Leagues.

SEC. 2. Any officer, manager or player who shall enter into any such negotiations as referred to in Section 1 of Article 23, or who shall agree or contract to play with any club a member of such organization, shall be declared ineligible and subject to all the disabilities referred to in


the preceding section.

#### SUSPENSION OF PLAYERS.

ARTICLE 25. Any player who has entered into a contract with any club of an association party hereto, may be suspended without pay or fined by such club or association, for breach of contract or breach of any of the rules of such club or association, and he shall thereafter be ineligible to sign or play during the remainder of the current season with any of the clubs of any association acting hereunder, unless such disability shall have been sooner removed by the club or association by which he was suspended, or by the Board.





But the services of such players shall at once be subject to the acceptance of such association for a period of ten days, for the purpose of supplying the vacancy in its membership.

# What They Did in the Minor Leagues

The American Association had twenty-four men in the .300 class and forty-eight players with batting averages of .275, showing the organization to be well up in the batting department of the game. Geier led the league with a bating average of .364. Among the first basemen to play regularly, White led in fielding with the excellent average of .989. Childs led the second basemen with .970, a grand record. Sullivan came in first as a third baseman with .944, a good record. Lewee led the shortstops with .940, a fine record, and W. Owen played twenty games in the outfield without an error.

Shannon proved the best base runner, and Fox the best

rungetter.

The Eastern League had twenty-four men in the .300 class and thirty-five players with batting averages of .275 or better.

Doolin led the second basemen with .967, a grand per-

formance.

Stafford led the third basemen with .931 and Bean the shortstops with .923. McIntyre led the outfielders with .963. Joe Bean led the rungetters and Devlin was first with stolen bases. Thielman won the largest percentage of games, .821. The figures indicate some clever ball in this league.

The Southland enjoyed a fine article of base ball last season, and under the able management of Judge Kavannaugh, of Little Rock, the Southern Association was an all-round success. J. Delehanty of Little Rock was the real batting leader with an average of .382. The organization had twenty-six players in the .300 class and forty-one with a record of .275 or better, showing exceptional strength with the stick. Stafford led the first basemen with a fielding average of .992, a remarkable showing. Henegan led the second basemen with .964, a great record. O'Brien led the third basemen with .945-another clever record—while the record of Atz at short of .968 was exceptionally fine. Lynch led the catchers with .985. Smith led in stolen bases with 48. Norcrum led in rungetting with 105, a splendid showing. Leidy played the outfield without an error in forty-three games, an impossibility if

the player took all the chances that are open to an out-fielder.

The Pacific Coast League enjoyed up-to-date ball, Lumly leading with the stick with .387, showing that he is one of the finest batsmen in the business. Twenty men reached the .300 mark and forty got as high as .275. Dillon led the first basemen with .984. Casey was first as a second baseman, with .961, a fine record. Jud Smith led the third basemen, with .923, and Franks was first as a short-stop, with .932. Hemphill is credited with playing the outfield with a clean record for 70 chances. Hoy was the rungetter, with 156, and Shea the base runner, with 83. The figures show clever work in every department.

The Western League contained a large number of average batsmen, Congalton being the real leader with the stick with an average of .363. Twelve men reached the .300 mark and forty-one reached the .275 mark. Everett led the first basemen, with .988. Joe Quinn led the second basemen with .976, a remarkable fielding performance, but owing to Quinn's disposition to refrain from taking long chances the record is not so remarkable. At third base Hartzel led with .937. O'Leary of Des Moines was the real leader at short, with .927. Starnagle led the catchers with .974 for a fielding average, and Kenna was first among the pitchers by winning three out of every four games pitched. Hemming was the best rungetter, scoring 107; O'Neill was the king base runner with 43. The records kept by President M. H. Sexton were by all odds the best turned in by any base ball organization in the country.

The New York League had fourteen men in the .300 class and thirty-four among the .275 players, showing a light hitting brigade. Earl led the first basemen with a fielding average of .901, a fine record. Dougherty led the second becomen, with .961. Daly was first among the third base players with .926, and Zimer was first as a fielding shortstop, with .934 for a fielding record. Payne did the best catching, with a fielding record of .984. Betts did the best outfielding, as far as records show, with .975. Marshall was the best rungetter, with 90 for a record, and Peartree pulled in 47 stolen bases.

The "Three Eye" League had twelve men in the .300 class and twenty-six that passed in .275 or better for a record. Hines led the batting, with .339. Dickey led the first basemen, with .990, a fine record. Hines landed the honors for second basemen with .952, another good showing. Bewer led the third basemen, with .931. Berle was the best shortstop, with .937 for a fielding record. Donnelly was the leading rungetter, with 97, and Lippert was the speediest base runner, turning in 69. Moore was the weakest batsman in the West, with two base hits in fifteen games.

The New England League was short with men over the .300 mark, but eleven men qualifying, while thirty-two went to the .275 mark. Hamilton led the league with an average of .446. The weakest batsman was Bowden, who hit safe five times out of 112 chances. Carney led the first basemen, with .994, a phenomenal record. Connors led the second basemen, with .949. Murch was first as a third baseman, with .915. Morehead led the shortstops, with .944. Cote led the catchers, with .987. J. O'Hara was first among the outfielders, with .990. Rapp made the most runs, 86; Eustice stealing the greater number of bases, 54. In all-round work and evenly matched players and clubs this league was a shining success.

The Connecticut League had but eight men in the .300 class, and but thirty-four as good as .275, showing a very weak lot of batsmen. Yale led the first basemen with an average of .990. Fitzpatrick led the second basemen, with .064, fine work. O'Rourke led the third base players with a fielding average of .937, splendid fielding. Larkin led the shortstops, with .924. Russman led the batting with .385, a good record. Batch led the rungetters and Bannon the base stealers, with 73. This league was successful, as the teams were well matched and the players held down to splendid discipline.

The Pacific National League went up against a sea of trouble and the records are not reliable. Hulsman led the batters with an average of .392. Thirty-one men were given better than .300 averages, while fifty-five went into the .275 class. LaRoque led the first basemen with .983. Hullen led the second basemen, with .964. Reilly was first among the third basemen, with .923, and Rourke led

the shortstops, with .930 for his figures. Stanley led the catchers, with .966. Donahue was the king rungetter, with 114, and Hurley, the big base runner with 81. Weed played eighteen games in the outfield without a mistake. The league was not evenly matched, having great and small class players scattered about.

The Northern League saw some very clever playing for the class, but two men saw the .300 mark in batting, while but thirteen went to the .275 mark. Kennedy led the first basemen, with .946. Upge led the second basemen, with .948. Bradley led the third basemen, with .924, and Wilkes the shortstops with .924. Rodgers was the best catcher, with a record of .985. Wilkeson led the outfielders, with .955. Tingley was the best rungetter, with 67, and Hoffmiester the base runner, with 71 in 41 games.

In the Cotton States League three men reached the .300 mark, sixteen players went as high as .275 at the bat. Shelton led the league with a batting average of .440, only a few points below Hamilton.

The Texas League turned out some clever young players. Seven men hit for .300 or better. Bonehill led the league with .347. The averages were not kept in a proper shape to give out the information usually looked for by base ball people.

The Southwest Washington League had ten players as high as .300 in batting. Harmon led, with .341. Schwarts led the first basemen, Phipps the second basemen, Philbrick was the dean at third and Brwyette cleared the ring at short. Culton was the base runner and Culton—the same man—the rungetter. The young member promises some real lively base ball for next season and stands high in the National Association.

If the smaller leagues would pay more attention to their club and individual averages they would be given ample space in this screed yearly, as it is our desire to give the smallest and youngest members a shade the best of things in the way of notice.—The Editor.


# **Kentucky-Illinois-Tennessee League**

# The Official Playing Rules

OF PROFESSIONAL BASE BALL CLUBS

As adopted at the meeting of the Joint Playing Rules Committee of the National League and the American League, held at National League Headquarters, New York City, March 2, 1904.

These Rules have also been adopted by The National Association of Professional Base Ball Leagues.

#### The Ball Ground.

RULE 1. The ball ground must be enclosed and sufficient in size to permit the players of the team not at bat to be stationed at the positions respectively assigned to them by their captain. To obviate the necessity for ground rules, the shortest distance from a fence or stand on fair territory to the home base should be 235 feet and from home base to the grandstand, 90 feet.

## To Lay Off the Field.

RULE 2. To lay off the lines defining the location of the several bases, the catcher's and the pitcher's position and establishing the boundaries required in playing the game of base ball, proceed as follows:

## Diamond or Infield.

From a point, A, within the grounds, project a straight line out into the field, and at a point, B, 154 feet from point A, lay off lines B C and B D at right angles to the line A B; then, with B as a center and 63.63945 feet as a radius, describe arcs cutting the lines B A at F and B C at G, B D at H and B E at I. Draw lines F G, G E, E H, and H F, which said lines shall be the containing lines of the Diamond or Infield.

## The Catcher's Lines.

With F as a center and 10 feet radius, describe an arc cutting line F A at L, and draw lines L M and L O at right angles to F A, and continue same out from F A not less than 10 feet.

## The Foul Lines.

RULE 4. From the intersection point, F, continue the straight lines F G and F H until they intersect the lines L M and L O, and then from the points G and H in the opposite direction until they reach the boundary lines of the ground.

## The Players' Lines.

With F as center and 50 foot radius, describe arcs cutting lines F O and F M at P and Q; then, with F as center again and 75 feet radius, describe arcs cutting F G and F H at R and S; then, from the points P, Q, R and S draw lines at right angles to the lines F O, F M, F G and F H, and continue the same until they intersect at the points T and W.

## The Coacher's Lines.

RULE 6. With R and S as centers and 15 feet radius, describe arcs cutting the lines R W and S at X and Y and from the points X and Y draw lines parallel with the lines F H and F G, and continue same out to the boundary lines of the ground.

## The Three-Foot Line.

RULE 7. With F as a center and 45 feet radius, describe an arc cutting the line F G at 1, and from 1 to the distance of three feet draw a line at right angles to F G, and marked point 2; then from point 2, draw a line parallel with the line F G to a point three feet beyond the point G, marked 3; then from the point 3 draw a line at right angles to line 2. 3, back to and intersecting with F G, and from thence back along the line G F to point 1.

## The Batsman's Lines.

RULE 8. On either side of the line A F B describe two parallelograms six feet long and four feet wide (marked 8 and 9), their longest side being parallel with the line A F B, their distance apart being six inches added to each end of the length of the diagonal of the square within the angle F, and the center of their length being on said diagonal.

## The Pitcher's Plate.

RULE 9. Section 1. With point F as center and 60.5 feet as radius, describe an arc cutting the line F B at line 4, and draw a line 5. 6, passing through point 4 and extending 12 inches on either side of line F B; then with line 5. 6, as a side, describe a parallelogram 24 inches by 6 inches, in which shall be located the pitcher's plate.

SEC. 2. The pitcher's plate shall not be more than 15 inches higher than the base lines or the home plate, which shall be level with the surface of the field, and the slope from the pitcher's plate to every base line and the home

plate shall be gradual.

#### The Bases.

RULE 10.

Section 1. Within the angle F, describe a five-sided figure, two of the sides of which shall coincide with the lines F G and F H to the extent of 12 inches each, thence parallel with the line F B 8½ inches to the points X and Y, a straight line between which, 17 inches, will form the front of the home base or plate.

SEC. 2. Within the angles at G, I and H describe squares, whose sides are 15 inches in length, two of such sides of which squares shall lie along the lines F G and G I, G I and I H, I H and H F, which squares shall be the location of the first, second and third bases respectively.

The Home Base at F and the Pitcher's Plate at 4 must each be of whitened rubber, and so fixed in the ground as to be even with its surface.

RULE 12. The First Base at G, the Second Base at E, and the Third Base at H must each be a white canvas bag filled with soft material and securely fastened in place at the point specified for it in Rule 10.

The lines described in Rules 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 must be marked with lime, chalk or other white material, easily distinguishable from the ground or grass.

#### The Ball.

RULE 14. Section I. The ball must weigh not less than five nor more than five and one-quarter ounces avoirdupois, and measure not

less than nine nor more than nine and one-quarter inches in circumference. The Spalding National League Ball or the Reach American League Ball must be used in all

games played under these rules.

Two regulation balls of the make adopted by the league of which the contesting clubs are members. shall be delivered by the home club to the umpire at or before the hour for the commencement of a championship game. If the ball first placed in play be batted or thrown out of the grounds or into one of the stands for spectators or in the judgment of the umpire, become unfit for play from any cause, the umpire shall at once deliver the alternate ball to the pitcher and another legal ball shall be supplied to him, so that he shall at all times have in his control one or more alternate balls to substitute for the ball in play in any of the contingencies above set forth. Provided, however, that all balls batted or thrown out of the ground or into a stand, shall when returned to the field be given into the custody of the umpire immediately and become alternate balls and so long as he has in his possession two or more alternate balls, he shall not call for a new ball to replace a ball that has gone out of play. The alternate balls shall become the ball in play in the order in which they were delivered to the umpire.

SEC. 3. Immediately upon the delivery to him of the alternate ball by the umpire, the pitcher shall take his position and on the call of "Play," by the umpire, it shall become the ball in play. Provided, however, that play shall not be resumed with the alternate ball when a fair batted ball or a ball thrown by a fielder goes out of the ground or into a stand for spectators until the base-runners have completed the circuit of the bases unless compelled to stop at second or third base in compliance with a ground

rule.

The Spalding League Ball has been adopted by the National League for the past twenty-seven years and readopted in 1902 for five years, and is used in all League contests.

For junior clubs (clubs composed of boys under 16 years of age) we recommend them to use the Spalding Boy's League Ball, and that games played by junior clubs with this ball will count as legal games the same as if played with the Official League Ball.

## Discolored or Damaged Balls.

SEC. 4. The ball in play shall not be intentionally discolored by rubbing it with the soil or otherwise damaged. In the event of a new ball being intentionally discolored, or damaged by a player, the unpire shall upon appeal by the captain of the opposite side, forthwith demand the return of that ball and substitute for it another legal ball, as hereinbefore described, and impose a fine of \$5.00 on the offending player.

#### Home Club to Provide Balls.

SEC. 5. In every game the balls played with shall be furnished by the home club, and the last in play shall become the property of the winning club. Each ball shall be enclosed in a paper box, sealed with the seal of the Secretary of the League and bearing his certificate that he has examined, measured and weighed it and that it is of the required standard in all respects. The seal shall not be broken by the umpire except in the presence of the captains of the contesting teams after "Play" has been called.

## Reserve Balls on Field.

Sec. 6. The home club shall have at least a dozen regulation balls on the field during each championship game, ready for use on the call of the umpire.

## Unfit Ball for Play.

Sec. 7. Should the ball become ripped or in any way damaged so as to be, in the opinion of the umpire, unfit for use, he shall, upon appeal by either captain, at once call for a new ball and put the alternate ball into play.

#### The Bat.

RULE 15. The bat must be round, not over two and three-fourth inches in diameter at the thickest part, nor more than 42 inches in length and entirely of hardwood, except that for a distance of 18 inches from the end, twine may be wound around or a granulated substance applied to the handle.

## Number of Players in a Game.

RULE 16. The players of each club, actively engaged in a game at one time, shall be nine in number, one of whom shall act as captain; and in no case shall more or less than nine men be allowed to play on a side in a game.

## Positions of the Players.

The players may be stationed at any point of the field their captain may elect, regardless of their respective positions, except that the pitcher, while in the act of delivering the ball to the bat, must take his position as defined in Rules 9 and 30; and the catcher must be within the lines of his position as defined in Rule 3 and within 10 feet of home base, whenever the pitcher delivers the ball to the bat.

## Must Not Mingle With Spectators.

Players in uniform shall not be permitted to occupy seats in the stands, or to mingle with the spectators.

## Uniforms of Players.

Every club shall adopt two uniforms for its players, one to be worn in games at home and the other in games abroad, and the suits of each of the uniforms of a team shall conform in color and style. No player who shall attach anything to the sole or heel of his shoe other than the ordinary base ball shoe plate, or who shall appear in a uniform not conforming to the suits of the other members of his team, shall be permitted to take part in a game.

## Size and Weight of Gloves.

RULE 20. The catcher or first baseman may wear a glove or mitt of any size, shape or weight. Every other player is restricted to the use of a glove or mitt weighing not over 10 ounces and measuring not over 14 inches around the palm.

## Players' Benches.

RULE 21.

SECTION I. Players' benches must be furnished by the home club and placed upon a portion of the ground not less than twenty-five (25) feet outside of the players' lines. One such

bench shall be for the exclusive use of the visiting team and the other for the exclusive use of the home team. Each bench must be covered with a roof and closed at the back and each end; a space, however, not more than six (6) inches wide may be left under the roof for ventilation. All players and substitutes of the side at bat must be seated on their team's bench, except the batsman, baserunners and such as are legally assigned to coach baserunners. Under no circumstances shall the unpire permit any person except the players and substitutes in uniform and the manager of the team entitled to its exclusive use to be seated on a bench.

## Penalty for Violation.

SEC. 2. To enforce this rule the captain of the other side may call the attention of the umpire to its violation by his opponents, whereupon the umpire shall immediately order such player or players as have disregarded it to be seated. If the order be not obeyed within one minute the offending player or players shall be fined \$5.00 each by the umpire. If the order be not then obeyed within one minute, the offending player or players shall be debarred from further participation in the game, and shall be obliged to forthwith leave the playing field.

## A Regulation Game.

RULE 22. Every championship game must be commenced not later than two hours before sunset and shall continue until each team has had nine innings, provided, however, that the game shall terminate:

(1) If the side first at bat scores less runs in nine innings

than the other side has scored in eight innings.

(2) If the side last at bat in the minth inning scored the winning run before the third man is out.

## Extra-Inning Games.

RULE 23. (9) innings for each team, play shall be continued until one side has scored more runs than the other in an equal number of innings, provided, that if the side last at bat score the winning run before the third man is out in any inning after the ninth, the game shall terminate.

#### Drawn Games.

A drawn game shall be declared by the RULE 24. umpire if the score is equal on the last even inning played when he terminates play on account of darkness, rain, fire, panic, or for other cause which puts patrons or players in peril, after five or more equal innings have been played by each team. But if the side that went second to bat is at the bat when the game is terminated, and has scored the same number of runs as the other side, the umpire shall declare the game drawn without regard to the score of the last equal inning.

#### Called Games.

If the umpire call "Game" on account RULE 25. of darkness, rain, fire, panic, or other cause which puts patrons or players in peril, at any time after five innings have been completed, the score shall be that of the last equal innings played, but if the side second at bat shall have scored in an unequal number of innings, or before the completion of the unfinished inning, one or more runs than the side first at bat, the score of the game shall be the total number of runs each team has made.

## Forfeited Games.

A forfeited game shall be declared by the RULE 26. umpire in favor of the club not in fault, at the request of such club, in the following cases:

Section 1. If the team of a club fail to appear upon the field, or being upon the field, refuse to begin a game for which it is scheduled or assigned, within five minutes after the umpire has called "Play" at the hour for the beginning of the game, unless such delay in appearing, or in commencing the game, be unavoidable.

SEC. 2. If, after the game has begun, one side refuse to continue to play, unless the game has been suspended or

terminated by the umpire.

Sec. 3. If, after play has been suspended by the umpire, one side fail to resume playing in one minute after the umpire has called "Play."

Sec. 4. If a team employ tactics palpably designed to

delay the game.

Sec. 5. If, after warning by the umpire, any one of the rules of the game be wilfully and persistently violated.

Sec. 6. If the order for the removal of a player, as authorized by Rules 21, 58 and 64, be not obeyed within one minute.

Sec. 7. If, because of the removal of players from the game by the umpire, or for any cause, there be less than

nine players on either team.

Sec. 8. If, when two games are scheduled to be played in one afternoon, the second game be not commenced within ten minutes of the time of the completion of the first game. The umpire of the first game shall be the timekeeper.

Sec. 9. In case the umpire declare the game forfeited, he shall transmit a written report thereof to the president of the League within twenty-four hours thereafter. However, a failure on the part of the umpire to so notify the president shall not affect the validity of his award of the game by forfeiture.

#### No Game.

RULE 27. "No game" shall be declared by the umpire if he terminates play on account of rain or darkness, fire, panic, or any other cause which puts the patrons or players in peril before five innings are completed by each team. Provided, however, that if the club second at bat shall have made more runs at the end of its fourth inning than the club first at bat has made in five completed innings of a game so terminated, the umpire shall award the game to the club having made the greater number of runs, and it shall count as a legal game in the championship record.

#### Substitutes.

RULE 28. Section I. Each side shall be required to have present on the field during a championship game a sufficient number of substitute players in uniform, conforming to the suits worn by their team-mates, to carry out the provisions of this code which requires that not less than nine players shall occupy the field in any inning of the game.

SEC. 2. Any such substitute may at any stage of the game take the place of a player whose name is in his team's batting order, but the player whom he succeeds

shall not thereafter participate in that game.

SEC. 3. A base-runner shall not have another player whose name appears in the batting order of his team run for him except by the consent of the captain of the other team.

## Choice of Innings-Fitness of Field for Play.

RULE 29. The choice of innings shall be given to the captain of the home club, who shall be the sole judge of the fitness of the ground for beginning a game after a rain; but, after play has been called by the umpire, he alone shall be the judge as to the fitness of the ground for resuming play after the game has been suspended on account of rain.

# THE PITCHING RULES. Delivery of the Ball to the Bat.

Preliminary to pitching, the pitcher shall take his position facing the batsman with both feet squarely on the ground and in front of the pitcher's plate; and in the act of delivering the ball to the bat he must keep one foot in contact with the pitcher's plate defined in Rule 9. He shall not raise either foot until in the act of delivering the ball to the bat, nor make more than one step in such delivery.

## A Fairly Delivered Ball.

A fairly delivered ball is a ball pitched or thrown to the bat by the pitcher while standing in his position and facing the batsman that passes over any portion of the home base, not lower than the batsman's knee, nor higher than his shoulder. For every such fairly delivered ball the unpire shall call one strike.

## An Unfairly Delivered Ball.

An unfairly delivered ball is a ball delivered to the bat by the pitcher while standing in his position and facing the batsman that does not pass over any portion of the home base between the batsman's shoulder and knee. For every unfairly delivered ball the umpire shall call one ball.

## Delaying the Game.

Section 1. If, after the batsman be **BULE 33.** standing in his proper position ready to strike at a pitched ball, the ball be thrown by the pitcher to any player other than the catcher when in the catcher's lines and within 10 feet of the home base

(except in an attempt to retire a base runner), each ball

so thrown shall be called a ball.

Sec. 2. The umpire shall call a ball on the pitcher each time he delays the game by failing to deliver the ball to the batsman for a longer period than 20 seconds, excepting that at the commencement of each inning, or when a pitcher relieves another, the pitcher may occupy one minute in delivering not to exceed five balls to the catcher or an infielder, during which time play shall be suspended.

## Balking.

A balk shall be:

Section 1. Any motion made by the **RULE 34.** pitcher while in position to deliver the ball to the bat without delivering it, or to throw to first base when occupied by a base runner without completing the throw.

Sec. 2. Throwing the ball by the pitcher to any base to catch the base runner without stepping directly toward such base in the act of making such throw.

Sec. 3. Any delivery of the ball to the bat by the pitcher

while either foot is back of the pitcher's plate.

Sec. 4. Any delivery of the ball to the bat by the pitch-

er while he is not facing the batsman.

Sec. 5. Any motion in delivering the ball to the bat by the pitcher while not in the position defined by Rule 30.

Sec. 6. Holding of the ball by the pitcher so long as, in the opinion of the umpire, to unnecessarily delay the game.

Sec. 7. Making any motion to pitch while standing in his position without having the ball in his possession.

Sec. 8. Making any motion of the arm, shoulder, hip or body the pitcher habitually makes in his method of delivery, without immediately delivering the ball to the bat.

SEC. 9. Delivery of the ball to the bat when the catcher is standing outside the lines of the catcher's position as

defined in Rule 3.

If the pitcher shall fail to comply with the requirements of any section of this rule, the umpire shall call a "balk."

#### Dead Ball.

RULE 35. A dead ball is a ball delivered to the bat by the pitcher, not struck at by the batsman, that touches any part of the batsman's person or clothing while standing in his position, or that before passing or getting beyond the control of the catcher touches any part of the clothing or person of the umpire while he is on foul ground.

## Ball Not in Play.

RULE 36. In case of a foul strike, foul hit ball not legally caught, dead ball, or a fair hit ball touching a base runner, the ball shall not be considered in play until it be held by the pitcher standing in his position, and the umpire shall have called "Play."

#### Block Balls.

RULE 37. Section 1. A block is a batted or thrown ball that is touched, stopped or handled by a person not engaged in the game.

SEC. 2. Whenever a block occurs the umpire shall declare it, and base runners may run the bases without liability to be put out until the ball has been returned to

and held by the pitcher in his position.

SEC. 3. If the person not engaged in the game should retain possession of a blocked ball, or throw or kick it beyond the reach of the fielders, the unpire shall call "Time" and require each base runner to stop at the base last touched by him until the ball be returned to the pitcher in his position and the unpire shall have called "Play."

## THE BATTING RULES.

## The Bataman's Position.

RULE 38. Each player of the side at bat shall become the batsman and must take his position within the batsman's lines (as defined in Rule 8) in the order that his name appears in his team's batting list.

## The Order of Batting.

The batting order of each team must be delivered before the game by its captain to the umpire who shall submit it to the inspection of the captain of the other side. The batting order

delivered to the umpire must be followed throughout the game unless a player be substituted for another, in which case the substitute must take the place in the batting order of the retired player.

## The First Batsman in an Inning.

After the first inning the first striker in each inning shall be the batsman whose name follows that of the last man who completed his "time at bat" in the preceding inning.

## Players Belong on Bench.

When a side goes to the bat its players must immediately seat themselves on the bench assigned to them as defined in Rule 21, and remain there until their side is put out, except when called to the bat or to act as coachers or substitute base runners.

## Reserved for Umpire, Catcher and Batsman.

No player of the side "at bat," except the batsman, shall occupy any portion of the space within the catcher's lines as defined in Rule 3. The triangular space back of the home base is reserved for the exclusive use of the umpire, catcher and batsman, and the umpire must prohibit any player of the side "at bat" from crossing the same at any time while the ball is in the hands of the pitcher or catcher or passing between them while standing in their positions.

## Fielder Has Right of Way.

RULE 43. The players of the side at bat must speedily abandon their bench and hasten to another part of the field when by remaining upon or near it they or any of them would interfere with a fielder in an attempt to catch or handle a thrown ball.

## THE BATTING RULES.

## A Fair Hit.

A fair hit is a legally batted ball that settles on fair ground between home and first base or between home and third base or that is on fair ground when bounding to the out-

field past first or third base or that first falls on fair territory beyond first or third base or that touches the person of the umpire or a player while on fair ground.

#### A Foul Hit.

RULE 45. A foul hit is a legally batted ball that settles on foul territory between home and first base or home and third base, or that bounds past first or third base on foul territory or that falls on foul territory beyond first or third base or touches the person of the umpire or a player while on foul ground.

#### A Foul Tip.

A foul tip is a ball batted by the batsman while standing within the lines of his position, that goes sharp and direct from the bat to the catcher's hands and is legally caught.

#### A Bunt Hit.

RULE 47. A bunt hit is a legally batted ball, not swung at, but met with the bat and tapped slowly within the infield by the batsman with the expectation of reaching first base before the ball can be fielded to that base. If the attempt to bunt result in a foul, a strike shall be called by the umpire.

## Balls Batted Outside the Ground.

RULE 48. Section 1. When a batted ball passes outside the ground or into a stand the umpire shall decide it fair or foul according to whether the point at which it leaves the playing field is on fair or foul territory.

SEC. 2. A fair batted ball that goes over the fence or into a stand shall entitle the batsman to a home run unless it should pass out of the ground or into a stand at a less distance than two hundred and thirty-five (235) feet from the home base, in which case the batsman shall be entitled to two bases only. The point at which a fence or stand is less than 235 feet from the home base shall be plainly indicated by a white or black sign or mark for the umpire's guidance.

#### Strikes.

A strike is:

Section I. A pitched ball struck at by **RULE 49.** the batsman without its touching his bat; or,

SEC. 2. A fair ball legally delivered by the pitcher at

which the batsman does not strike.

SEC. 3. A foul hit ball not caught on the fly unless the batsman has two strikes.

SEC. 4. An attempt to bunt which results in a foul. Sec. 5. A pitched ball, at which the batsman strikes but

misses and which touches any part of his person.

Sec. 6. A foul tip, held by the catcher, while standing within the lines of his position.

#### Foul Strike.

A "Foul Strike" is a ball batted by the batsman when either or both of his feet is RULE 50. upon the ground outside the lines of the batsman's position.

#### When Batsman is Out.

The batsman is out:

RULE 51. Section I. If he fail to take his position at the bat in the order in which his name is on the batting list unless the error be discovered and the proper batsman replace him before a time "at bat" is recorded, in which case, the balls and strikes called must be counted in the time "at bat" of the proper batsman. But only the proper batsman shall be declared out, and no runs shall be scored or bases run because of any act of the improper batsman. Provided, this rule shall not be enforced unless the out be declared before the ball be delivered to the succeeding batsman. Should the batsman declared out under this section be the third hand out and his side be thereby put out, the proper batsman in the next inning shall be the player who would have come to bat had the players been put out by ordinary play in the preceding inning.

SEC. 2. If he fail to take his position within one minute

after the umpire has called for the batsman.

SEC. 3. If he make a foul hit other than a foul tip, as defined in Rule 46, and the ball be momentarily held by a fielder before touching the ground; provided, it be not caught in a fielder's cap, protector, pocket or other part of his uniform, or strike some object other than a fielder be-

fore being caught.

SEC. 4. If he make a foul strike, as defined in Rule 50 SEC. 5. If he attempt to hinder the catcher from fielding or throwing the ball by stepping outside the lines of the batsman's position, or in any way obstructing or interfering with that player.

Sec. 6. If, while first base be occupied by a base runner, three strikes be called on him by the umpire, unless two

men are already out.

Sec. 7. If, while attempting a third strike, the ball touch any part of the batsman's person, in which case base runners occupying bases shall not advance as prescribed

in Rule 55, Section 5.

Sec. 8. If, before two hands are out, while first and second or first, second and third bases are occupied, he hit a fly ball, other than a line drive, that can be handled by an infielder. In such case the umpire shall, as soon as the ball be hit, declare it an infield or outfield hit.

Sec. o. If the third strike be called in accordance with

Rule 49, Section 5.

## Batsman Must Obey Call.

SEC. 10. The moment a batsman's term at bat ends, the umpire shall call for the batsman next in order to leave his seat on the bench and take his position at the bat, and no player of the batting side shall leave his seat on the bench until so called to bat, except to become a coacher or substitute base runner, to take the place of a player on his team's batting list, to comply with the umpire's order to leave the field or to make way for a fielder.

#### BASE RUNNING RULES.

## Legal Order of Bases.

The Base Runner must touch each base in legal order, viz., First, Second, Third and Home Bases; and when obliged to return while the ball is in play, must retouch the base or bases in reverse order. He can only acquire the right to a base by touching it, before having been put out, and shall then be entitled to hold such base until he has legally touched the next base in order, or has been legally forced to vacate it for a succeeding base runner. However, no base runner shall score a run to count in the game ahead

of the base runner preceding him in the batting order, if there be such preceding base runner who has not been put out in that inning.

#### When the Batsman Becomes a Base-Runner.

The batsman becomes a base runner:

Section 1. Instantly after he makes a fair hit.

Sec. 2. Instantly after "Four Balls" have been called by

the umpire.

Sec. 3. Instantly after "Three Strikes" have been de-

clared by the umpire.

Sec. 4. If, without making any attempt to strike at the ball, his person or clothing be hit by a pitched ball unless, in the opinion of the umpire, he plainly make no effort to get out of the way of the pitched ball and purposely permit himself to be hit.

Sec. 5. If the catcher interfere with him in or prevent

him from striking at a pitched ball.

#### Entitled to Bases.

The base runner shall be entitled, without liability to be put out, to advance a base in the following cases:

SECTION I. If, while the batsman, the umpire calls "Four Balls," or award him first base by being hit by a pitched ball or for being interfered with by the catcher in striking at a pitched ball.

Sec. 2. If, while the batsman, a fair hit ball strike the person or clothing of the umpire or a base runner on fair

ground.

Sec. 3. If the umpire award to a succeeding batsman a base on four balls, or for being hit by a pitched ball, or being interfered with by the catcher in striking at a pitched ball and the base runner be thereby forced to vacate the base held by him.

Sec. 4. If the umpire call a "Balk."

Sec. 5. If a ball delivered by the pitcher pass the catcher and touch the umpire or any fence or building within ninety (90) feet of the home base.

Sec. 6. If he be prevented from making a base by the obstruction of a fielder, unless the latter have the ball in

his hand ready to touch the base runner.

Sec. 7. If the fielder stop or catch a batted ball with

his cap, glove or any part of his uniform, while detached from its proper place on his person.

## Returning to Bases.

The base runner shall return to his base

RULE 55. without liability to be put out:

Section 1. If the umpire declare a foul tip (as defined in Rule 46) or any other foul hit, not legally caught by a fielder.

SEC. 2. If the umpire declare a foul strike.

Sec. 3. If the umpire declare a dead ball, unless it be also the fourth unfair ball, and he be thereby forced to take

the next base, as provided in Rule 54, Section 3.

Sec. 4. If the person or clothing of the umpire interfere with the catcher in an attempt to throw or the umpire be struck by a ball thrown by the catcher or other fielder to intercept a base runner.

Sec. 5. If a pitched ball at which the batsman strikes

but misses, touch any part of the batman's person.

Sec. 6. In any and all of these cases the base runner is not required to touch the intervening bases in returning to the base he is legally entitled to.

## When Base Runners are Out.

The base runner is out:

RULE 56. Section I. If, after three strikes have been declared against him while the batsman, the third strike ball be not legally caught and he plainly attempts to hinder the catcher from fielding the ball.

SEC. 2. If, having made a fair hit while batsman, such fair hit ball be momentarily held by a fielder before touching the ground or any object other than a fielder; provided, if it be not caught in a fielder's hat, cap, protector,

pocket or other part of his uniform.

Sec. 3. If, when the umpire has declared "Three Strikes" on him while the batsman, the third strike ball be momentarily held by a fielder before touching the ground; provided, if it be not caught in a fielder's cap, protector, pocket or other part of his uniform, or touch some object other than a fielder before being caught.

Sec. 4. If, after three strikes or a fair hit, he be touched with the ball in the hand of a fielder before he shall have

touched first base.

Sec. 5. If, after three strikes or a fair hit, the ball be securely held by a fielder while touching first base with any part of his person before such base runner touch first hase.

Sec. 6. If, in running the last half of the distance from home base to first base, while the ball is being fielded to first base, he run outside the three-foot lines, as defined in Rule 7, unless he do so to avoid a fielder attempting to field a batted ball.

Sec. 7. If, in running from first to second base, from second to third base, or from third to home base, he run more than three feet from a direct line between a base and the next one in regular or reverse order to avoid being touched by a ball in the hands of a fielder. But in case a fielder be occupying a base runner's proper path in attempting to field a batted ball, then the base runner shall run out of direct line to the next base and behind said fielder and shall not be declared out for so doing.

Sec. 8. If he fail to avoid a fielder attempting to field a batted ball, in the manner described in sections 6 and 7 of this rule, or in any way obstruct a fielder in attempting to field a batted ball, or intentionally interfere with a thrown ball: provided, that if two or more fielders attempt to field a batted ball, and the base runner come in contact with one or more of them, the umpire shall determine which fielder is entitled to the benefit of this rule, and shall not decide the base runner out for coming in contact with a fielder other than the one the umpire determines to be entitled to field such batted ball.

Sec. 9. If at any time while the ball is in play, he be touched by the ball in the hands of a fielder, unless some part of his person be touching the base he is entitled to occupy; provided, however, that the ball be held by the fielder after touching him, unless the base runner delib-

erately knock it out of his hand.

Sec. to. If, when a fair or foul hit ball (other than a foul tip as defined in Rule 46) be legally caught by a fielder, such ball be legally held by a fielder on the base occupied by the base runner when such ball was batted. or the base runner be touched with the ball in the hands of a fielder, before he retouch such base after such fair or foul hit ball was so caught; provided, that the base runner shall not be out in such case, if, after the ball was legally caught as above, it be delivered to the bat by the pitcher before the fielder hold it on said base, or touch the base

runner out with it; but if the base runner, in attempting to reach a base, detach it from its fastening before being

touched or forced out, he shall be declared safe.

SEC. 11. If, when the batsman becomes a base runner, the first base, or the first and second bases, or the first, second and third bases be occupied, any base runner so occupying a base shall cease to be entitled to hold it, and may be put out at the next base in the same manner as in running to first base, or by being touched with the ball in the hands of a fielder at any time before any base runner following him in the batting order be put out, unless the umpire should decide the hit of the batsman to be an infield fly.

SEC. 12. If a fair hit ball strike him before touching a fielder, and, in such case, no base shall be run unless necessitated by the batsman becoming a base runner, but no run shall be scored or any other base runner put out

until the umpire puts the ball back into play.

SEC. 13. If, when advancing bases, or forced to return to a base, while the ball is in play, he fail to touch the intervening base or bases, if any, in the regular or reverse order as the case may be, he may be put out by the ball being held by a fielder on any base he failed to touch, or by being touched by the ball in the hands of a fielder in the same manner as in running to first base; provided, that the base runner shall not be out in such case if the ball be delivered to the bat by the pitcher before the fielder hold it on said base or touch the base runner with it.

SEC. 14. If, when the umpire call "Play," after the suspension of a game, he fail to return to and touch the base he occupied when "Time" was called before touching the next base; provided, the base runner shall not be out, in such case, if the ball be delivered to the bat by the pitcher, before the fielder hold it on said base or touch

the base runner with it.

## Overrunning First Base.

Sec. 15. The base runner in running to first base may overrun said base after touching it in passing without incurring liability to be out for being off said base, provided he return at once and retouch the base, after which he may be put out as at any other base. If, after overrunning first base, he turn in the direction of or attempt to run to second base, before returning to first base, he shall forfeit such exemption from liability to be put out.

SEC. 16. If, before two hands are out and while third base is occupied, the coacher stationed near that base shall run in the direction of home base on or near the base line while a fielder is making or trying to make a play on a batted ball not caught on the fly, or on a thrown ball, and thereby draws a throw to home base, the base runner entitled to third base shall be declared out by the umpire for the coacher's interference with and prevention of the legitimate play.

Sec. 17. If one or more members of the team at bat stand or collect at or around a base for which a base runner is trying, thereby confusing the fielding side and adding to the difficulty of making such play, the base runner shall be declared out for the interference of his team

mate or team mates.

SEC. 18. If he touch home base before a base runner preceding him in the batting order, if there be such preceding base runner, lose his right to third base.

## When Umpire Shall Declare an Out.

RULE 57. The umpire shall declare the batsman or base runner out, without waiting for an appeal for such decision, in all cases where rules, except Sections 13 and 15 of Rule 56.

## Coaching Rules.

The coacher shall be restricted to coach-RULE 58. ing the base runner only, and shall not address remarks except to the base runner, and then only in words of assistance and direction in running bases. He shall not, by words or signs, incite or try to incite the spectators to demonstrations, and shall not use language which will in any manner refer to or reflect upon a player of the opposite club, the umpire or the spectators. Not more than two coachers, who must be players in the uniform of the team at bat, shall be allowed to occupy the space between the players' and the coacher's lines, one near first and the other near third base, to coach base runners. If there be more than the legal number of coachers or this rule be violated in any respect the captain of the opposite side may call the attention of the umpire to the offense, and thereupon the umpire must order the illegal coacher or coachers to the bench, and if his order be not obeyed within one minute, the umpire shall assess a

fine of \$5.00 against each offending player, and upon a repetition of the offense, the offending player or players shall be debarred from further participation in the game, and shall leave the playing field forthwith.

## The Scoring of Runs.

FULE 59.

One run shall be scored every time a base runner, after having legally touched the first three bases, shall legally touched the first three bases, shall legally touched the home base before three men are put out; provided, however, that if he reach home on or during a play in which the third man be forced out or be put out before reaching first base, a run shall not count. A force-out can be made only when a base runner legally loses the right to the base he occupies and is thereby obliged to advance as the result of a fair hit ball not caught on the fly.

## UMPIRE AND HIS DUTIES.

#### Power to Enforce Decisions.

RULE 60. The umpire is the representative of the League and as such is authorized and required to enforce each section of this code. He shall have the power to order a player, captain or manager to do or omit to do any act which in his judgment is necessary to give force and effect to one or all of these rules, and to inflict penalties for violations of the rules as hereinafter prescribed.

There shall be no appeal from any decision of the umpire on the ground that he was not correct in his conclusion as to whether a batted ball was fair or foul, a base runner safe or out, a pitched ball a strike or ball, or on any other play involving accuracy of judgment, and no decision rendered by him shall be reversed, except that he be convinced that it is in violation of one of these rules. The captain shall alone have the right to protest against a decision and seek its reversal on a claim that it is in conflict with a section of these rules.

## Must Not Question Decisions.

RULE 62. Under no circumstances shall a captain or player dispute the accuracy of the umpire's judgment and decision on a play.

## Clubs Can Not Change Umpire.

RULE 63. The unpire can not be changed during a championship game by the consent of the contesting clubs unless the official in charge incapacitated from service by injury or illness.

## Penalties for Violations of the Rules.

RULE 64. In all cases of violation of these rules, by either a player or manager, the penalty for the first offense shall be a fine by the umpire of \$5.00, and, for a second offense, prompt removal of the offender from the game or grounds, followed by a period of such suspension from actual service in the club as the president of the League may fix.

## Umpire to Report Violations of the Rules.

RULE 65. The umpire shall within twelve hours after fining or removing a player from the game, forward to the president a report of the penalty inflicted and the cause therefor.

RULE 66. Immediately upon being informed by the umpire that a fine has been imposed upon any manager, captain or player, the president shall notify the person so fined and also the club of which he is a member; and, in the event of the failure of the person so fined to pay to the secretary of the League the amount of said fine within five days after notice, he shall be debarred from participating in any championship game or from sitting on a player's bench during the progress of a championship game until such fine be paid.

RULE 67. When the offense of the player debarred from the game be of a flagrant nature, such as the use of obscene language or an assault upon a player or umpire, the umpire shall within four hours thereafter forward to the president of the League full particulars.

## Warning to Captains.

RULE 68. The umpire shall notify both captains before the game, and in the presence of each other, that all the playing rules will be strictly and impartially enforced, and warn them that

failure on their part to co-operate in such enforcement will result in offenders being fined, and, if necessary to preserve discipline, debarred from the game.

#### On Ground Rules.

RULE 69.

Before the commencement of a game the unpire shall see that the rules governing all the materials of the game are strictly observed. He shall ask the captain of the home club whether there are any special ground rules, and if there be he shall acquaint himself with them, advise the captain of the visiting team of their scope and see that each is duly enforced, provided that it does not conflict with any of these rules.

#### Official Announcements.

RULE 70. The umpire shall call "Play" at the hour appointed for the beginning of a game, announce "Time" at its legal interruption and declare "Game" at its legal termination.

## Suspension of Play.

The umpire shall suspend play for the

In suspending play from any legal cause

RULE 71. following causes:

I. If rain fall so heavily as to cause the spectators on the open field and open stands to seek shelter, in which case he shall note the time of suspension, and should rain fall continuously for thirty minutes thereafter he shall terminate the game.

2. In case of an accident which incapacitates him or a player from service in the field, or in order to remove from the grounds any player or spectator who has violated the rules, or in case of fire, panic or other extraordinary

circumstances.

## Call of Time.

the umpire shall call "Time"; when he calls "Time," play shall be suspended until he calls "Play" again, and during the interim no player shall be put out, base be run or run be scored. "Time" shall not be called by the umpire until the ball be held by the pitcher while standing in his position.

### Decisions on Balls and Strikes.

The umpire shall call and count as a "ball" any unfair ball delivered by the **RULE 73.** pitcher to the batsman. He shall also call and count as a "strike" any fairly delivered ball which passes over any portion of the home base, and within the batsman's legal range as defined in Rule 31, whether struck at or not by the batsman; or a foul tip which is caught by the catcher standing within the lines of his position. within 10 feet of the home base; or which, after being struck at and not hit, strike the person of the batsman; or when the ball be bunted foul by the batsman; or any foul hit ball not caught on the fly unless the batsman has two strikes, provided, however, that a pitched ball shall not be called or counted a "ball" or "strike" by the umpire until it has passed the home plate.

RULE 74. If but one umpire be assigned, his duties and jurisdiction shall extend to all points, and he shall be permitted to take his stand in any part of the field that in his opinion will best enable him to discharge his duties. If two umpires be assigned to a game, the assistant umpire shall decide all plays at first and second bases.

### Field Rules.

RULE 75. No person shall be allowed upon any part of the field during the progress of a game except the players in uniform, the manager of each side, the umpire, such officers of the law as may be present in uniform, and such watchmen of the home club as may be necessary to preserve the peace.

RULE 76. No manager, captain or player shall address the spectators during a game except in reply to a request for information about the progress or state of the game.

RULE 77. Every club shall furnish sufficient police force to preserve order upon its own grounds, and in the event of a crowd entering with the play in any manner, the visiting club may refuse to play until the field be cleared. If the field be not cleared within 15 minutes thereafter, the visiting club may claim and shall be entitled to the game by a score of nine

runs to none (no matter what number of innings has been played).

### General Definitions.

- "Play" is the order of the umpire to begin the game or to resume it after its suspension,
- RULE 79. "Time" is the order of the umpire to suspend play. Such suspension must not extend beyond the day.
- "Game" is the announcement of the umpire that the game is terminated.
- RULE 81. "An inning" is the term at bat of the nine players representing a club in a game and is completed when three of such players have been legally put out.
- RULE 82. "A Time at Bat" is the term at bat of a batsman. It begins when he takes his position, and continues until he is put out or becomes a base runner. But a time at bat shall not be charged against a batsman who is awarded first base by the umpire for being hit by a pitched ball or for the illegal delivery of the pitcher or on called balls or when he makes a sacrifice hit.
- "Legal" or "Legally" signifies as required by these rules.

### THE SCORING RULES.

RULE 84. To promote uniformity in scoring championship games the following instructions are given and suggestions and definitions make all scores in accordance therewith.

### The Batsman's Record.

RULE 85. SECTION I. The first item in the tabulated score, after the player's name and position, shall be the number of times he has been at bat during the game, but the exceptions made in Rule 82 must not be included.

Sec. 2. In the second column shall be set down the runs, if any, made by each player.

Sec. 3. In the third column shall be placed the first base hits, if any, made by each player.

### The Scoring of Base Hits.

Sec. 4. A base hit shall be scored in the following cases: When the ball from the bat strikes the ground on or within the foul lines and out of the reach of the fielders.

When a fair-hit ball is partially or wholly stopped by a fielder in motion, but such player can not recover himself in time to field the ball to first before the striker reaches

that base or to force out another base runner.

When the ball be hit with such force to an infielder or pitcher that he can not handle it in time to put out the batsman or force out a base runner. In a case of doubt over this class of hits, a base hit should be scored and the fielder exempted from the charge of an error.

When the ball is hit so slowly toward a fielder that he cannot handle it in time to put out the batsman or force

out a base runner.

In all cases where a base runner is retired by being hit by a batted ball, the batsman should be credited with a base hit.

When a batted ball hits the person or clothing of the

umpire, as defined in Rule 54, Section 2.

In no case shall a base hit be scored when a base runner is forced out by the play.

### Sacrifice Hits.

Sec. 5. In the fourth column shall be placed the sacrifice hits.

A sacrifice hit shall be credited to the batsman who, when no one is out or when but one man is out, advances a runner a base by a bunt hit, which results in the batsman being put out before reaching first, or would so result if it were handled without error.

### Fielding Records.

SEC. 6. The number of opponents, if any, put out by each player shall be set down in the fifth column. Where the batsman is given out by the umpire for a foul strike, or fails to bat in proper order, the put-out shall be scored to the catcher. In cases of the base runner being declared "out" for interference, running out of line, or on an infield fly, the "out" should be credited to the player who

would have made the play but for the action of the base

runner or the announcement of the umpire.

SEC. 7. The number of times, if any, each player assists in putting out an opponent shall be set down in the sixth column. An assist should be given to each player who handles the ball in aiding in a run out or any other play of the kind, except the one who completes it.

An assist should be given to a player who makes a play in time to put a runner out, even if the player who could complete the play fail, through no fault of the assisting

player.

And generally an assist should be given to each player who handles or assists in any manner in handling the ball from the time it leaves the bat until it reaches the player who makes the put-out, or in case of a thrown ball, to each player who throws or handles it cleanly, and in such a way that a put-out results, or would result if no error were made by a team-mate.

Assists should be credited to every player who handles the ball in the play which results in a base runner being called "out" for interference or for running out of line.

### Errors.

SEC. 8. An error shall be given in the seventh column for each misplay which prolongs the time at bat of the batsman or allows a base runner to make one or more bases when perfect play would have insured his being put out. But a wild pitch, a base on balls, a base awarded to a batsman by being struck by a pitched ball, an illegal pitch, a balk and a passed ball, each of which is a battery and not a fielding error, shall not be included in the seventh column.

An error shall not be charged against the catcher for a wild throw in an attempt to prevent a stolen base, unless the base runner advance an extra base because of the error.

An error shall not be scored against the catcher or an infielder who attempts to complete a double play, unless the throw be so wild that an additional base be gained.

In case a base runner advance a base through the failure of a baseman to stop or try to stop a ball accurately thrown to his base, he shall be charged with an error and not the player who made such throw, provided there were occasion for it. If such throw be made to second base the scorer shall determine whether the second baseman or shortstop shall be charged with an error.

### Stolen Bases.

SEC. 9. A stolen base shall be credited to the base runner whenever ne advances a base unaided by a base hit, a put-out, a fielding or a battery error.

SEC. 9. The number of times, if any, the pitcher strikes out the opposing batsmen.

Sec. 10. The number of times, if any, the pitcher gives

bases on balls.

SEC. 11. The number of wild pitches, if any, charged to the pitcher. SEC. 12.

The number of times, if any, the pitcher hits a batsman with a pitched ball.

Sec. 13. The number of passed balls by each catcher. Sec. 14. The time of the game.

### Base Ball Records

Throwing.—John Hatfield, at Brooklyn, October 15, 1872, threw a ball across the wind 133 yards 1 foot 7½ inches. The measurement was made with a steel tape.

Longest Game.—The Grand Forks and Fargo teams played twenty-five innings without a run at Devil's Lake, N. D., July 18, 1891.

Longest League Game.—At Cincinnati, July 30, 1892, Chicago and Cincinnati played twenty innings, when darkness stopped the game, each team having seven runs.

Defeats in One Season.—The Pittsburg National League club lost 114 games in 1889.

Batting Average,—Hugh Duffy in 1894 led the National League, with an average of .438,

Strike Outs.—Charley Sweeney struck out nineteen of the Boston players at the South End grounds in 1884.

Pitching.—Luby won twenty straight games for Chicago in 1890.

Largest Score.—At Buffalo, 1868, Niagara, 209; Columbias, 10.

Base Running.—Harry Berthrong ran the bases in 1444 seconds at Washington, D. C., July 10, 1868.

Hitting.—In 1894 there were 94 players who hit for over .300. Winning Home Games.—In 1875 the Boston club won every game played on the home grounds.

The first person to use the box score for reporting ball games was A. II. Wright of New York.

Robert Lowe made four home runs in succession off pitcher Chamberlain, the ball going over the left fence each time, at the Congress Street grounds, Boston, 1894.

The Cincinnati Red Stockings, with Harry Wright in command, went through the season of 1869 without losing a single game, although playing from Maine to California.

Duncan F. Curry, of New York, drew up the first code of playing rules. The size of the diamond was never changed from the first one used at the Elysian Fields at Hoboken.

Buck Freeman has a record of four home runs and a double in five times at the bat, made July 30, 1894.

The New England League was in existence in 1884.

The most remarkable piece of work by a ball player was by Paul Hines at Providence in 1878, when he saved a game for Providence against Boston by making a phenomenal catch in center field and turning in a triple play.

Harry Wright suggested the rule allowing a man to overrun first base.

In the fall of 1888 A. G. Spalding organized an All-America team, and with his Chicago league club made a tour of the world, visiting Australia and England.
