STUDENT ASSEMBLY MEETING WILL BE TELEVISED ON OCT. 26 -- RIT Students will have the opportunity to see their student government in action when a special "instructional, educational experience" planned by the Student Association and RIT Television Center is telecast over RIT-TV, Channel 7, on Monday, Oct. 25 at 8 p.m.

The Student Assembly, the main student legislative body, will be featured in a regular meeting titled "Student Association in Action," the purpose of which is to introduce the student representatives to their constituents.

Members of the RIT Television Center production staff, including Thomas L. Russell, TV Center director, are donating their services to the special project.

"The cooperation we have received has been fantastic," notes Greg Enos, Student Association secretary of public relations, and coordinator for the program. "The people at the television center are as enthusiastic about this experiment as we are and that could be one of the keys to success."

Dr. Richard Zakia, director of Instructional Research and Development, gave approval for the program within a week after the proposal was made, Enos noted.

"Elaborate preparations are being made so that the entire Institute community will be able to participate in the program," Enos said.

Thomas Tyberg, a senior printing major and interpreter for the deaf, will serve as student coordinator for students of the National Technical Institute for the Deaf (NTID). NTID interpreters will be stationed at various locations in the dormitory area.

Television center telephone lines, manned by Student Association personnel, will be used to accept questions, which will be answered during the show. Interpreters for the deaf will phone the questions for the non-hearing students.

"This first show is an experiment, with programs on other sections of student government a possibility if this one is successful," Enos said.

<u>UNITED NATIONS HEARINGS SET FOR OCT. 26</u> -- Miss Edwin Hogadone, dean emeritus of RIT's College of Business, is urging RIT students to attend the United Nations Public Hearings, scheduled for Monday, Oct. 26, 9:15 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., at the Nazareth Arts Center, 4245 East Avenue.

Sponsored by the President's Commission for the Observation of the Twenty-Fifth Anniversary of the United Nations, the public hearings are being held to encourage all interested groups and individuals to present their criticisms and constructive ideas on the United Nations in order to assist the Commission in making strong, persuasive recommendations to the President on the future policy and participation of the United States in the United Nations.

Although formal testimony will be scheduled, Miss Hogadone states that one hour in the afternoon, probably 3:30 to 4:30 p.m., would be devoted to comments from the audience.

"Here's a chance for students to participate, if they wish," Miss Hogadone said, "by requesting time to testify or by attending all or part of the Hearing and commenting from the floor, if they so desire. I think the Commission is anxious to hear from College students," she said.

Rochester is one of four cities in which the hearings will be held. Sen. Cooper (Ky.) will serve as chairman of the hearing with assistance from other commission members including Paul Miller, chairman of the Board of Gannett Company, and a member of the RIT Board of Trustees.

CROSS COUNTRY MEET IS FIRST ICAC EVENT FOR RIT TEAM -- The beginning of Independent Colleges Athletic Conference (ICAC) competition for RIT will take place on Saturday (Oct. 24), when Pete Todd's highly scucessful cross country team runs in the ICAC championships at Renssalaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, N.Y. Todd hopes to have his record-breaking captain, Dave Kosowski, recovered from a knee injury in time for the meet. Even without Kosowski, however, Todd still expects to come home with the team trophy.
