

WEATHER BULLETIN. Daily Report Furnished by the Victoria



HIS MAJESTY REQUESTS CELEBRATION BE ADJOURNED

Recent Proclamation Asks Official Date of King's Birthday Be May Twenty-Fourtb.

His Majesty the King does not wish any public celebrations on the actual date of his birthday, next Friday, aceording to a recent proclamation issued by the federal government. This being the case neither of the patriotic societies in the city, the Sons of England and Sons of St. George, will take any steps towards recognizing the event. His Majesty wishes to perpetutive of the company of the comp ate the memory of his mother, the late queen Victoria, by requesting the offi-cial celebration of his birthday on that of the late Queen, May 24th., The Sons of England will continue to hold their annual church service on the Sunday preceding that date. Accordingly the

next celebration of the King's birthday

will not occur until May 24th, 1907.

The department of education has received a large number of letters asking if the schools would be closed on that date, and the superintendent of that department has requested the Times to announce that the public schools in all parts of the province will remain open on Friday next in deference to the wishes of His Majesty.
