PROPOSAL FOR FOUNDING A MEDICAL LIBRARY; AND INSTITUTING A SOCIETY, TO BE CALLED THE MEDICAL SOCIETY OF

INTRODUCTION.

I T is remarkable, that amongst the different affociations which have been established in this metropolis, a fociety for founding a Medical Library, for the use of its respective members, hath been so little attended to. An institution of this kind is so apparently useful and interesting to those who are desirous of obtaining an easy access to the best ancient and modern authors, that it requires no apology for the promotion of the present one, which is designed to supply that descent.

The intention of this fociety is alfo to give practitioners in the art of healing, public opportunities of frequently meeting together for their mutual improvement in their profession, and of communicating to the fociety any new discoveries in medicine which have been made either at home or abroad; or laying before A_2 them them any medical papers which may tend to the general advancement of the science.

It frequently happens likewife that difficult and uncommon cafes occur, which the practitioner is willing to communicate to his brethren, for their mutual information; by fuch an inflitution as this he will always have an opportunity of rendering fuch cafes either the topic of immediate conversation, or committing them to paper, and laying them before the fociety. And more fully to exercise every part of medical erudition, it is proposed that two evenings in every month be allotted for the disquisition of medical questions, propositions, aphoris, and the like, by way of debate,

Such is the original defign of this fociety, which is fubmitted to the attention of the faculty in general, whose correspondence and encouragement are folicited, in order to render the plan complete, and carry it into immediate execution.

PLAN

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PLAN OF THE SOCIETY,

FOR the better government and conduct of the Society, it is proposed that there be a President, Treasurer, Librarian, Secretary and Council.

Of the PRESIDENT:

1. The Prefident to be chosen annually; and if prefent, to take the chair, at all meetings of the fociety. In his absence, the Treasurer, or Librarian to take the chair; if they be not prefent, one of the Council to prefide; and in their absence, any member may be chosen by a majority of the fociety, to officiate as Prefident for that meeting.

2. The Prefident is to direct the bufinels of the meeting; to regulate all difputes at the evenings of debate, but never to take any part himfelf, till all the members have done speaking, when he may make his own observations if he shall think proper.

3. All members to pay an implicit obedience to the commands of the Prefident, or his representative, while in the chair, on pain of being expelled.

Of the TREASURER:

t. The money belonging to the fociety, to be kept by the Treasurer, who is to be chosen annually.

2. He is to keep a regular account, in a book provided for that purpose, of all receipts and difbursements; and his accounts to be audited, by the Council for the time being, once in three months.

3. He

3. He is not to lay out, or expend, any part of the fociety's money, but what is previoufly ordered by a general meeting of the fociety, or by the Council.

4. Whenever the Council, or a majority of the fociety, defire to fee the Treasurer's accounts, he shall deliver them up, and be at all times amenable to the fociety for any money deposited in his hands, for the use of the fociety.

Of the LIBRARIAN, &c.

1. The Librarian to have the fole care of the library, and to be chofen annually. To have the books arranged in a proper order, the folios together, the quartos together, &cc. and each volume diffinctly numbered. To have an alphabetical catalogue of all the authors, expreffing the edition, place where printed, date, fize, price, and number as it ftands in the library. To keep a diffinct catalogue of the manufcripts, ranged under proper heads; fuch as—Phyfic—Surgery—Materia Medica—Pharmacy —Chymiftry, &cc. The catalogues to be kept in the library, and to be always open for the infpection of every member.

2. To have a book, containing the names of the members with their places of abode; to mark againft each perfon's name the number of the book received from the library, and the time when; and as foon as returned to draw a line through the number, in the prefence of the perfon who brings the book. To have an alphabetical lift of all the names of the members, referring to the pages of the book of *places of abode and books received* from the library.

3. A printed paper to be pasted on the infide of the binding of each book, containing the name of the society, the number of the book, and

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(7) an abstract of the laws relating to the receiving and returning of books belonging to the library; and if such book were prefented to the society, the donor's name to be subscribed by the Librarian.

4. Every member who fends for a book, to write down the title, on a flip of paper, to fign his name thereto, date it, and direct it to "The Libra-" rian of the Medical Society of London." If fuch book should be lent out, when sent for, the per-fon who shall be appointed to attend the library, is to write on a slip of paper, the time when, the person's name and place of abode who is in posfeffion of it, and give it to the meffenger.

5. No member to be allowed to have more, than two volumes at a time, in his possession.

6. The library to be open every day in the week (Saturdays and Sundays excepted) from ten in the morning till eleven, when all books are to be fent for and returned to the library; and none to be given out, or received, before or after those hours.

7. The utmost time for a member detaining a book to be one week for a pamphlet or duode-cimo; two weeks for an octavo; three weeks for a quarto; and four weeks for a folio: after which period to be liable to a penalty of one shilling per week, as long as he stall detain fuch book.

8. The Librarian to have a power to fend for any book, which has been detained longer than the time appointed; and if the party detaining fuch book re-fufe to return it, to be fubject to the penalty of double its value, or be expelled the fociety.

9. No manuscript to be allowed to be taken out of the library.

10. All new publications to remain in the library, for the space of one month, for the general inspection

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of the members, before they be suffered to be given out.

11. All members to have the liberty of vifiting the library, and to read or take extracts from the books, or manufcripts, provided fuch books, or manufcripts, be first applied for to the Librarian or perfon attending the library; but no member to have a right of himfelf to take down from its place any book or manufcript, upon any pretence whatever.

12 All books to be returned to the library in the third week of every December, that the *Librarian elest* may fee whether any be wanting before he enters into his office on the first of January; and that every perfon neglecting to return such book, or books, before the twenty-fifth day of December, to forfeit one shilling for every volume so detained.

13. No books to be purchafed for the use of the fociety but such as treat on medical subjects; the purchase of such books to be proposed at a general meeting, and agreed to by two thirds of the members then present. The books to be in good condition, of the best editions, and a list of them to be always previously drawn up by the Council, and presented to the society for their approbation.

Of the SECRETARY.

1. The Secretary to be elected annually: to minute down all refolutions, &c. at every meeting of the fociety; to read all papers; and to have the immediate care of all books and writings relating to the transactions of the fociety.

2. To be anfwerable for all papers and writings committed to his charge; to keep them in proper order; and to have them prefent with him at every meeting of the fociety.

3. To

3. To be careful in dating all papers, on medical fubjects, at the time he fhall receive them; that no perfon may be robbed of the title to any new difcovery which he might intend to make to the fociety.

Of the COUNCIL.

1. The Council to confift of the officers, for the time being, that is, the Prefident, Treafurer, Librarian, and Secretary, together with nine other members of the fociety, namely, three phyficians, three furgeons, and three apothecaries, who are to be elected annually, and to choofe a Chairman out of their own body: the officers (as chairmen) to be excepted.

2. Five members of the Council to make a quorum; and a majority of voices to be always neceffary to carry any question.

3. The Council, when they have any business to transact, to meet an hour before the usual time of opening the society; or at any other time they shall think most convenient, or as occasion may require.

4. All business, and transactions of the society, to pass through the hands of the Council before they be presented to the society.

5. The Council to put down in writing the heads of the bufinefs of each meeting, and deliver the fame to the Prefident, or his reprefentative for the time being; for the better regulation and quicker difpatch in their proceedings.

6. The Council may propose new laws, or amendments, but are not to have it in their power to make any; but refer them to a General Meeting of the fociety.

7. No paper, upon medical fubjects, to be brought or read before the fociety, till fuch paper has paffed through

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through the Council; and all fuch papers to be laid before the fociety, as nearly as circumstances will allow, according to rotation; that is, according to the time they shall have been received by the Secretary.

8. The Council to have a power to fupprefs any paper, or part of any paper, which they fhall judge improper to be laid before the fociety.
9. To be fole judges of any queftion, or paper, which is defigned for the fubject of debate, both

as to the time and propriety of its admission to the fociety.

10. All complaints to be made to the Council, who are to fettle the fame, if in their power; if not, to refer them to the General Meeting for their final determination.

Of electing MEMBERS.

1. All Candidates, for becoming Members of the fociety, to be recommended by three Members, and their names to be fixed up and remain in the room where the fociety meets, two weeks before they are ballotted for.

2. The candidates to be ballotted for after read-ing the minutes of the preceding Meeting. 3. No perfon to be admitted a Member of this

fociety, who is under the age of twenty-one years. 4. Each Member, upon admission, to pay one

guinea into the Treasurer's hands, which subscription is to be continued annually.

Of HONORARY MEMBERS.

1. No perfon to be chosen an Honorary Member till two weeks after he has been proposed; his name to be be fixed up in the room where the fociety meets, and to be recommended by five members.

2. An Honorary Member not to be liable to any fubfcription, unlefs by his own voluntary choice.

3. No perfon refident in London, or within feven miles thereof, to be elected an Honorary Member.

Of PAPERS for PUBLICATION, &c.

1. Any Papers, relating to Medical fubjects, will be acceptable to the fociety, and are to be directed to "The Secretary of the Medical Society of London."

2. Such Papers as are deemed worthy of Publication, are to be carefully preferved by the Secretary, till fufficient matter for a volume be collected.

Of expelling OBNOXIOUS MEMBERS.

1. If any member appear obnoxious in any refpect, complaint is first to be made to the Council; if the matter cannot be adjusted there, the complaint is to be brought before the society, and if two thirds of the members ballot against the offending party, he is to be expelled the society.

2. No member, when expelled, shall be entitled to any part of his subscription-money, or receive any benefit from the library.

GENERAL LAWS of the Society.

1. All elections to be by ballot, and the candidate having two thirds of the members then prefent, in his favour, to be declared duly elected.

2. The annual election of the Officers of the fociety, and of the Council, to be held on the first Tuesday Tuesday of every December, who are to enter upon their respective offices on the first of January following.

3. A General Meeting of the fociety to be held on every Tuesday evening, and the business of the meeting to begin at seven o'clock precisely.

4. The business of the first and third Tuesdays of every month to be confined to the reading of papers, receiving intelligence, and the current transactions of the society, such as the electing of members, voting for the purchase of books, $\mathfrak{S}c$, and all altercation and debate, unless necessity require it, to be immediately filenced.

5. The meetings of the fecond and fourth Tuefdays of every month to be entirely confined to the difcuffion of Medical Queftions, Propositions, Aphorifms, Cafes, and the like, by way of debate; fuch queftions, &c. being previously laid before the Council for their approbation, and to be fixed up in the fociety-room the Tuefday night preceding, for any member to peruse or transcribe.

6. All fpeeches to be made to the Prefident, for the time being: and in addreffing the chair, the perfon who fpeaks to ftand up, and continue in that pofture till he fhall have done fpeaking.

7. Only one perfon to fpeak at a time: and if two members fhould ftand up at nearly one and the fame time, and a difpute arife who fhall fpeak firft, the Prefident, is finally to decide it, by mentioning the name of the perfon he would have to fpeak.

8. No person to speak more than thrice to the same question, or subject.

9. Any member who gives in a paper to the fociety may if he pleafes, when it comes to be prefented by the Council, read it himfelf to the fociety; otherwife it is always to be read by the Secretary.

10. Any person giving in a paper to be debated upon, may if he chooses, have the liberty to explain

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fuch paper more fully to the fociety, before the debate begins; and after he has done fpeaking, any member is at liberty to rife up, and make his obfervations on the fubject.

11. Each member is requested to give in to the Council, such useful questions, or subjects fit for difquisition, as may occur to him.

12. No refolutions to be valid, which are made at any meeting of the fociety, unless fifteen members are present.

13. All forfeit-money to be paid into the hands of the Treasurer, for the general use of the society.

14. Any member who is defirous of introducing a vifitor, is to write down his name on a paper, which is to be kept for that purpofe, entitled, "the Vifitor's "Lift," and put his own name oppofite to it; which lift, after obtaining the fanction of the Prefident, is to be publickly read at the opening of the meeting by the Prefident.

15. The donation of any fingle book, or parcel of books, pamphlets, or manufcripts, treating on Medical fubjects, to be gratefully received, and the thanks of the fociety to be given to the donor.

16. The laws and rules of the fociety to be figned, by every member, on his admission.
