September 16, 1951. Professor Sir Frederick Bartlett (Stratford-upon-Avon) Address: 2 Millington Road, Cambridge. He is Professor of Experimental Psychology at Cambridge. He said that two years ago the Foreign Office was interested in this problem. Also at that time the Royal Air Force was interested. Sir Philip Livingston (now in British Columbia) was then the Chief. He has now been succeeded by Air Vice Marshal Kilpatrick (see below) who is Director General, Air Force Medical Service, Awdry House, Kingsway, London. Sir Frederick was told two years ago that the Russians were using ephedrine-like agents. He finds the field interesting. (He was consulted by both the Foreign Office and the Poyal Air Force), but is sceptical of its practical value. He believes that any data obtainable with drugs is also obtainable without them by other means, but agrees that data probably are more readily obtainable with drugs than without and hence of special value if many men are to be interrogated.
