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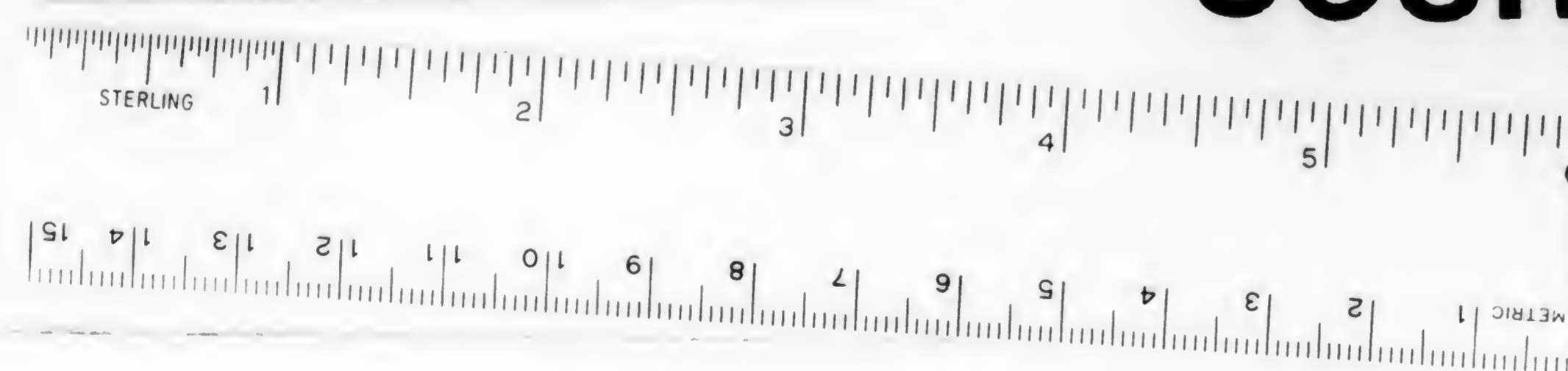
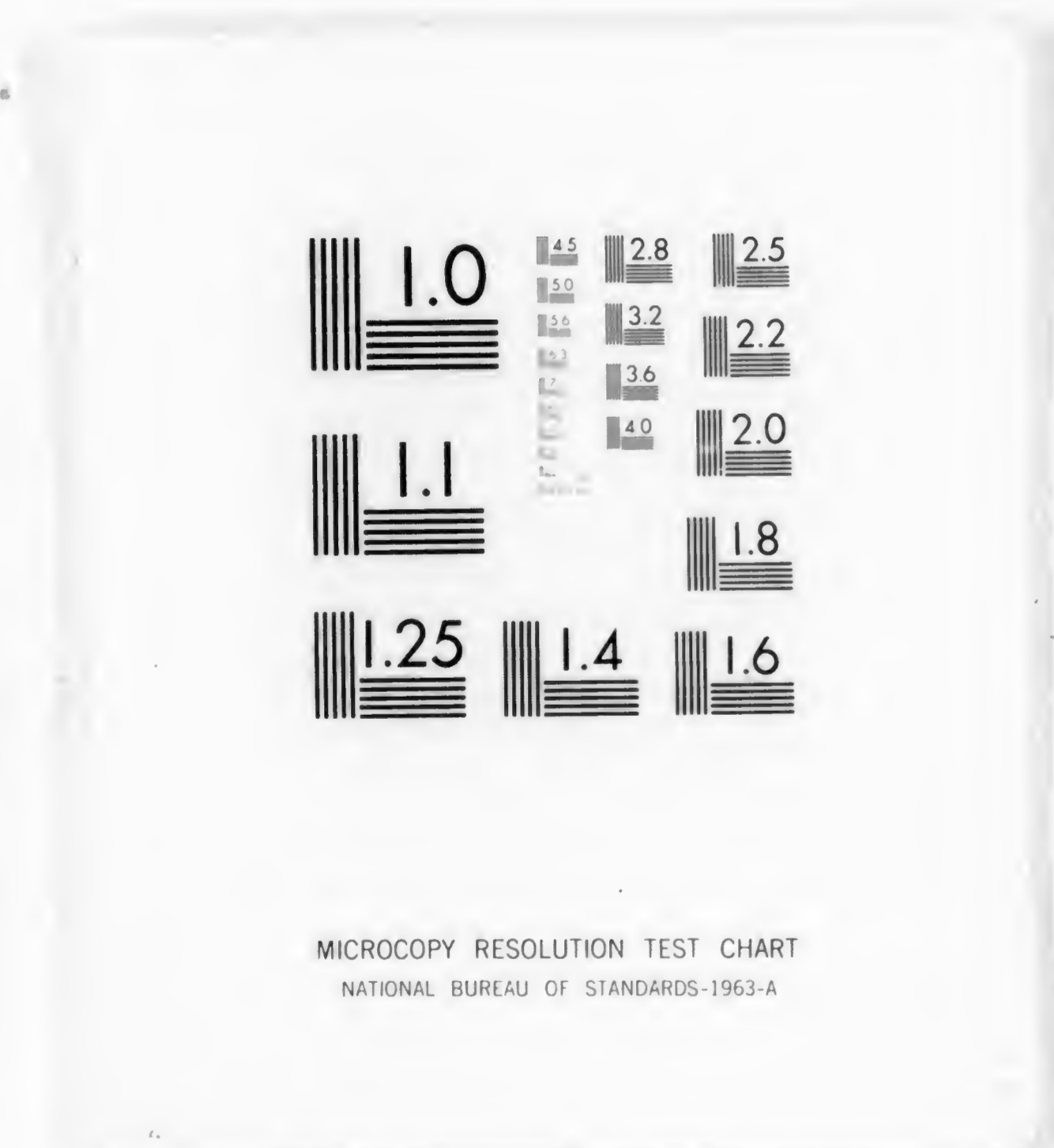

- Ya se tiene significado en el informe pasado a Bot. de q^o no se toma Razon de la caballada de la Hacienda existente en Monterey hace años q^o haerse abrado y mediane el perjuicio q^o resulta p^o su demacia. en los dos ultimos años se havran matado como a diez a doce mil Cabezas sin conocerse halla habido tal matanza.
- El año ha sido benigno no se ha experimentado epidemia alguna pero ha sido sumam^{te} escaso de aguas p^o cuya raxon en varias partes ha causado mortandad de Ganado y caballada.

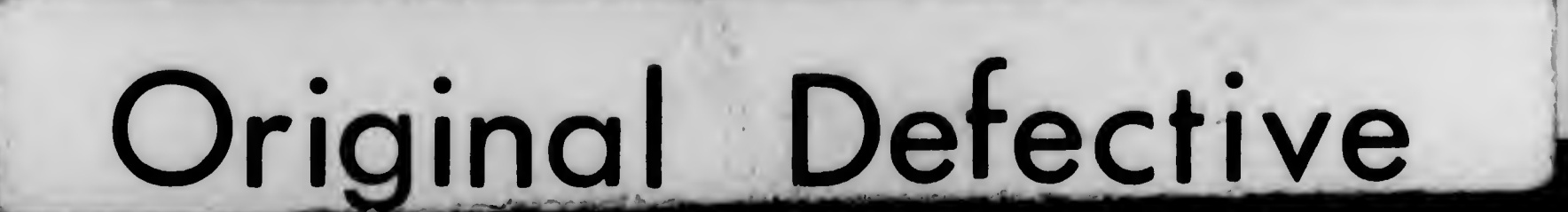



Your kind letter of the 24th ulto came duly to hand and would ere this have been replied to but for the multiplicity of business which has monopolized my time. I sincerely congratulate you on the favorable settlement of your concerns with the ~~company~~ in which you ~~are~~ so much ~~interested~~, and that ~~your~~ ~~share~~ ~~is~~ ~~not~~ ~~unimpaired~~, remaining with any of that ~~integrity~~ ~~and~~ ~~firmness~~, our life is a mixed state of good & ill, pleasures & pains, success & ill-luck alternately diversify our existence, and we generally observe that there is nearly an equilibrium in our real joys & sorrows, but the preponderance of our ideal sufferings is weighty, we too often by cherishing anticipated ills become our own enemies & stab at our own peace as deeply as if we were really beset by trouble & misfortune, for as Lord Kames observes "when we sum up the miseries of life, the grief bestowed on trifles makes a great part of the account." Excuse my digression I am eternally moralizing, without much benefit or any ostensible cause for the employ, and you sailors generally care as much for sermonizing, as for a rope-yarn or a sky-sail.

My opinion as it regards Genl Jackson is diametrically at variance with yours, I think his conduct in seizing Pensacola & executing those incendiaries Ambroses

and but not deserves the eulogium of his countrymen the
gratitude of all, nor would I wish to see the gallant
preserver of New Orleans, the veteran whose life has been
devoted from boyhood to his country's service, in his
declining years sacrificed for having, resolutely freed
the world of two relentless ruffians, for having dared
to follow the dictates of a noble ardour; but the

long, tedious & contentious debate in the senate & house of

Dear Cooper

Yours of the 8th inst is just before me and I observe with much pleasure that you are so mindful of the duties of friendship - although your pen has so long reposed in silence - although months have passed into oblivion since you last addressed me. It is grateful to the feeling to know you could not leave the country without presenting to your absent friend some memorial of your continued regards - for your protracted delay I had assigned no other reason than your great aversion to letter-writing - as Ellen has frequently assured me you were not very partial to the employment - and from experience I know how very arduous & unpleasant it is to perform a task which one dislikes.

I am truly happy to hear you have obtained so good a situation and doubt not but that your voyage will be pleasant & prosperous - should your Captain be possessed of more politeness & honesty than the last you sailed with. In addition to the other agreeable anticipations which fancy may suggest you may subjoin the expectation of becoming a pure devotee of religion & an enthusiast for missionary exertions. The host of champions who are to be the partners of your voyage will doubtless endeavour to convert you round jackets into bona fide saints and if you are so fortunate as to cleave their efforts it will be a miracle indeed - although I have heard satirical remarks

that they would sooner sail with the d - than a black coat
yet I cannot but presume you have a higher opinion of
these pious gentlemen - in fact where there are so many
saints we may safely conclude that the vessel which bears
them on the deep is safe without insurance, the crew secure
without a doctor (except a black one which is always requisite)
and the doctor efficient without physic, - so without the

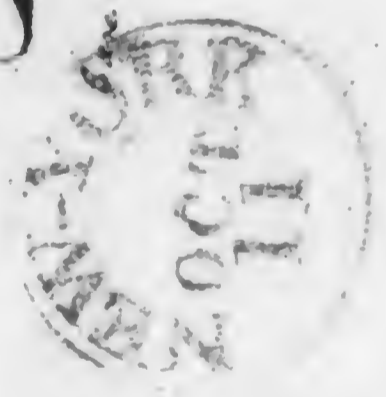

gos de Ciriales con sus cruces, y por decirlo de una vez, toda
la plata que estaba halapada a quella Iglesia (que no era poca) se
robaron estos

Día 8. Despachó el Comandante de la Corbeta p. q. por tierra fueran a la Misión
de todos Santos aun teniendo con ocho hombres, con el mismo depra-
vado intento de saqueos, y con orden de no dexar al S. Ministro en
aquella Misión, y recoger toda la plata que le encontrasen, y de
echar a pique la Poleta recientemente construida, en caso de que
estubiese en el agua, y si estaba en tierra de quemarla.

Día 9. Fueron a la Playa, a executar la orden arriba dha, como en efecto lo
isieron echándole vaxeno a la Poleta, que aun no estaba acabada de
aparejar por averla echado al agua el día anterior.

Día 10. El teniente de esta expedición fue a reconocer si la Poleta se avia
ido a pique junto con dos Soldados, y al llegar a la Playa quicieron
forzar dos mugeres, lo que visto por los nuestros echaron mano
a las armas que no eran más de piedras, y les acometieron, matando
al teniente y aun Soldado, y apoderandose los nuestros de
las armas de los muertos, acometieron y mataron al otro que venia
con ellos, pasado esto los nuestros se fueron para la Misión, aco-
metieron a los seis que hayi estaban, matando a dos, hiriendo a tres

de muerte, y aprisionaron al Centinela que voluntariamente se rindió. El mismo día en la tarde se adquirió noticia de que un contador, y dos Soldados más de la Corbeta, venían con la contra-orden de que no destruyeran a la Soleta, y si que pusieran cuidado en conservarla, y que al V. y carga de Alata no lo defaen. Inmediatamente que se adquirió esta noticia, salieron los nuestros a recibirlos, haciendo leve menuda de una lancha al que asía defabo, el que junto con los otros dos se rindieron, y estas ordenes de que ago mencion, las vio el mismo que abla sobre esta materia y las conserva en su poder el J. J. Gobernador de esta Provincia.

Día 21. Los Guaranos del Sur condujeron a los prisioneros al Puerto de S. Antonio ignorando si los gravemente heridos que quedaron en la Misión de Todos Santos han fallecido o no, pero aseguran, que desde esta Misión fueron conducidos por los Milicianos a la de S. José del Cabo.

Día 22. No ubo novedad alg. y no omitiré el decir que el Alcalde de S. José llamado D. José M. Castro, luego que supo lo acaecido, en Todos Santos, y que los nuestros avian matado, y echo prisioneros, al S. J. y de más Soldados de la expedición, dio parte al Comandante de la Corbeta, y al Abante de la Misión de S. José 12 leguas se puso en camino como lo executó ablando con el J. J. Comandante. Este mismo Alcalde es el que auxiliado a los piratas con Sabaladuras, quinquina y 200. Pies, aguardiente y quanto han querido, de lo que se impide que este tal castro, con casi la decima parte de la Misión de S. José, es más pirata, q. los más piratas.

Día 23. Llegó por eso a S. Antonio de que los Insurgentes desembarcaban, y se examinaban para S. Antonio, resolvieron los Avatales de salir Salidos a reconocer, y conociendo de que estos pudieran ser que vinieran con el Objeto de quitar a los prisioneros, se determinó que esos mismos fueran conducidos para el Residuo de Todos, lo que así se verificó. Los Milicianos y Guaranos resolvieron el salir inmediatamente aver el rumbo que tomaban esos Insurgentes, y ver si podían atacarlos, lo que no pudo verificarse por la noticia que el J. J. Castro comunicó al Com. de la Corbeta, diciendole que tropa, Milicianos, y demás Vecinos, estaban alarmados, y recibían con toda fuerza a los que enconaban por el camino. Con esta noticia los Insurgentes doblaron su centinela, echaron gente a tierra, y hay se

se fortificaron, en el día de la Misión de S. José que adonde han permanecido permanecen esos Insurgentes, pusieron un Cañon, y en la Casa del Padre que es adonde se aguantaban pusieron más cañones.



Did I cause you desert, my dear John, instead of my own feelings, I should not make this attempt to send across the hand-^led. sea, over the pathless ocean (and against stormy seas) to inform you of the welfare of your friends in these regions, to tell you that we all remain as you left us, in health, to tender you our sincere wishes for the prosperous, happy and successful issue of your present voyage, for your continued health while engaged in it, & for your safe return in due season laden with wealth & honor, laboriously, but honorably & honestly won, for in good truth, my dear brother, you must acknowledge yourself most lamentably deficient in performing your epistolary duties, indeed your reputation for verisimilitude in the employment has become proverbial, & leads us to believe that there is a letter of three lines extant in your handwriting! and yet more than half your time for the last fifteen years has been spent abroad! you have, in that period, traversed more than half the globe, met with a variety of incidents, seen many of the wonders of nature and in the habitable world & of course have never been at a loss for materials for your letters, had I been so long absent, how I need so much of the world & been so much exposed to its vicissitudes, the paper - makes want to have grown rich in the profits of my exertions, & much of paper would have been consumed & much of ink wasted, but whether the world would have benefited is another question - I can which I shall ^{not} presume to answer - As I am as usual & more used to the operations of the hand-^led pen than those of the goose quill (and as I know sealing would be of



Next to her mission to remain in the country, your fortune will depend on your own exertions, in which we have every confidence that nothing will be wanting to crown them with success - The introductory letters which you carry we hope will secure you a good reception & pave the way for the extended operations which we contemplate. — We apprehend that you will at first have difficulty in collecting produce in any quantities at the commence of that country as our consumption is confined to a very limited extent and the Imports have been proportioned to it - you will consequently find that to force it beyond its usual limits you will require the aid of ready money which is the only medium to supply the balance of Trade - You will bear in mind that a loss will undoubtedly be sustained by exchanging money for Tallo at 26 + 99 which would bring it to 52% to 55% of Cost, but down in

Deer Horn we should think might be sent to England with advantage. To save storage should be cut into pieces, but care should be taken in cutting them that the valuable part be preserved.

Horse Hair if enough of the tail can be had take none of the mane or short hair as the longest is preferred - the white hair is the most valuable and should be kept separate. The last I wrote you was from St. Gabriel, in which I mentioned several things, that I don't recollect nothing about at present, only respecting the necessity of my going in the Brig for this ship for the purpose of getting a craft for this Coast as without one we can't do nothing & to see that every thing is brought that is suitable for this Country - As you come along the Coast get from the Missions patterns of such things as can be well explained, sell of the Cows as much as you can & get as much tallow as possible as after passing the Perismond, you will get very little, as there is well be so many vessels to be had by the time you come, that hardly a skin will be had. If I go in the Brig we will require to look out for some trusty persons for St. Barbara & the Pueblo, to sell ^{in lieu} & receive hides & tallow &c. In coming to land you better take out of each case patterns so when any person comes on land, you know what to do & how to say, this is the size & quality of this & the other, that I know you will do without my telling about it. If I go in the Brig I hope to be able to pick up enough of staves for the Coopers, barrels &c. as ^{things} will come cheaper that way than cutting up wood in this Country & loads of skins. There are one or two Coopers Englishmen in this Country that want employment & I should think the Salting of beef, ought to be a very profitable business in particular when the Bullock is fat so as to get enough of Tallow out of him, ^{or} God hide

On my arrival at St. Juan Capistrano I found
the Lady Blackwood's Supercargo on shore, & that
account I had very little opportunity of speaking to
the Padres & what little I did they appeared to be
very independent saying that they could not nor would
enter into our contract & as to hides that they would
require them all to repair their church which was
destroyed some years ago by an earthquake, however
I expect to see the day that they will be glad to get
a purchaser for both their hides & tallow - The above
ship is expected here tomorrow & in a few days Sr. Andres &
Sr. Henrique, this is the Devils own hole I think with
all Monterey is the best place yet - At St.
Luis Rey you may calculate on 1,500 hides yearly as to
this year they can't give us any tallow, as they as
well as several others has ordered things from St.
Blas, which they expect very soon & if the doubt was
this year they would take them as they know they
can get them cheaper from other parts -
The last mentioned mission is the Iron @ eleven
which you will keep for them - From the Mission of
St. Diego you may expect 700 or 800 hides likely 1,000 yearly
so that from the Salidas here without including St. Ermites
St. Ferrnando & St. Juan Capistrano you may at least
calculate on 16,000 hides yearly & if you have succeeded
any they will to the Northward & with the Particulars

All your three favors from Sr. Gabriel ^{or letters} has come duly to hand & make their contents, I think the terms with the Mission of Sr. Gabriel will do - One of the two documents you have enclosed & the other will be presented to Mr. Puff, I am happy to hear that you have succeeded so well, or is likely to do ^{so} at Sr. Gabriel. As to the wheat of Sr. Diego it has all turned out so bad that after, clearing it for two days ^{we} were obliged to get the Padres to take it back again, therefore don't calculate on getting any here, & if you do go to Sr. Luis Rey be very careful as they have wheat 3 years old there, however they have got plenty of this years wheat, examine your wheat & see that it is not the least picked, as if it is your better leave it over board than send it to Lima. As to Jose Anko I am at a loss he is not worth much more the best bargain say from 3 to 400 yearly. I believe he is a very honest man.

Attached you have 3 bills of Lading one to go by the San Francis & another by the Clendenin & keep the other with me by the Brig & stop. Give me all the particulars, you ^{have} also copy of disbursements.

In view of Cargo shipped on board - a signal has been made that is a gun fired from the Brig that all is ready for sailing, therefore I must conclude by wishing you well as well as my countryman



Dear, Howtnell. I have before me yours of 22nd Webster received 9th inst of Sir, Francis Baring, and note with much disappointment the small progress you have made in the disposal of my adventures of John Begg, however, I am satisfied you have used your endeavours for my interest, and I only have to say I hope you will on receipt of this fell off any thing that may be on hand and remit me the proceeds in a bill on John Begg with the regular premium given for cash with you. - I have received from Mr. McCulloch as of your order, one hundred and fifty five dollars, and I hope to receive a like sum of Colonel Young's duty expected from your quarters.

By the John Begg I did not receive a word from you, and I consider myself ill used, as you must remember promising to write me. - Mac says the reason was because I did not write you by the Baring, now this appears strange indeed to me, as we never expected you to live the passage down - however I will not dwell on this subject, but as I before told you if you wish to keep up a regular correspondence

with me as far as regards our business and domestic affairs
I shall always be proud in informing you of all the novedades which
may take place with us — but you on the other hand, must do the
same, and not as you have began in sending seven lines — and
sign in haste — as we know you went down from Montez
to San Diego to despatch the Brig, and if in that space you could
not find time to write me fully, how can you suppose I in my
situation can find time.

You say you sent me some small presents of John Begg, and
I beg leave to state I never received them — Mac brought me
a skin and three bows and arrows for which he gave himself
credit, as returns for shot powder &c. given him on leaving
this, I have mentioned the circumstance to him, and you must
touch him up for breach of promise to deliver your presents —
In future should you send any trifles be sure to put my name
on them, if not — he who gets first on board takes them —

Since your departure from this many changes have taken
place in Government, of which you would be informed of by
Mr Logan, and of those taken place since his departure I must
beg to refer you to Mr Hugh Mc Culloch, who we have made
quite a polished gentleman, of since his arrival — I assure

you he cuts it fat in our city and his company is esteemed
by every British merchant, he wears the title of "California Au-
:hapador," and believe me your situation and prospects are looked
upon by all adventures to this side, and no doubt if you succeed
in procuring two or three good cargoes of hides, and can get them
safe home your fortunes are made, and from all appearances
it seems clear, the way is well paved, and although you have
been unfortunate in the first attempts, it will all be covered if you
succeed in the hides - the proverb says "a bad beginning brings
a good ending" and you have my prayers that you and your
company may soon be able to return home highly repaid
for your labours - having got so far, I will turn to a new subject -
the penon which Castro gave you previous to your departure, and
afterwards demanded payment for, and which you ordered me to pay
has died a natural death, as I laughed him out of it, and he has
now forgot it - Our establishment since the arrival of the
Calidonia has increased, having received a Mr Boardman & a
Mr Wallace, the latter a regular Scotch skin flint, & the former
a good fellow and jovial companion - (with traps & good connections)
Our Patron has us plenty to do, but at our present rate your

departure we were completely at a standstill - he enjoys most
excellent health as well as the whole of us -

Our latest accounts from England are twentieth August when
nothing new had taken place more than the horrible cir-
cumstance of Lord Castlereagh's cutting his throat, and of the
Marquis of Wellesley being appointed Prime Minister.

Our Government have at length taken a step towards the
acknowledgement of the Independence of these Countries, by
allowing their vessels to enter into the Ports of Great Britain and
paying the same duty as English bottoms - A loan of one million
pounds sterling has been granted by individuals in London
to the State of Chile, on paying six per cent interest - the price
of this is to push the growth of hemp, as it is rumored a war
is likely to take place between England and Russia, per last
accounts it was selling at $79\frac{1}{4}$ and the Columbian $83\frac{1}{8}$ - in my
opinion these prices are very high when we take into consideration
the very disturbed state in which these Countries are still in.

By Mail you will receive a doz bottles Soda powders & a copy
of which I beg your acceptance - and I beg if ever I can be of service
to you in procuring you any thing from England that
I will only name it, this is not a compliment my friend for I am
earnestly for I am aware of your situation, & pray name at any time
I can serve you - some work has been out of policy but I hope you will not

To endeavour to amuse you and to lay a foundation for a
continuance of our friendship and correspondence. I will tell you
how we pass our times on high days and holidays.

Picnics have been introduced as a most excellent remedy
for killing Sundays, when we all go out to some Chaera
where we send our dinner the day previous, and remain there
till evening when we return tired with the effects of generous
wine, which makes some of our companions perch their shops
in which you used to spend so much of your time. — On
Xmas day we had rather a grand dinner when 104 Porters
sat down to beef and pudding, and after taking a small
portion of wine (say six bottles each) we retired to the race
ground when hunting and racing became the sport, but
the ground was so covered with tulips, that it was dangerous
to ride
to ride about, amongst whom was "Sturdy Mac laying on
his back" old Read the same, and many more of our neighbours.
The young men of this no longer dull city have also their pa-
ses, and we enjoy our Picnics regularly. Wyba and myself
gave one some time since when only two arrived in Lima
that day, poor Armstrong fell off his horse 17 times
and myself only 7, and the rest of our friends averaged

each 13 falls in a distance of five miles.

The buffonian society is not carried on here, but the Poetic Society is the talk of the day - a meeting over a good supper is held once a month when no one can appear but with poetry, and that on any subject he may wish to write, and we have fine gaying & aping you - in short we spend our time far better than when you left us - - Where am I wandering to, you will think I have little command indeed over my pen to allow it to write so much nonsense -

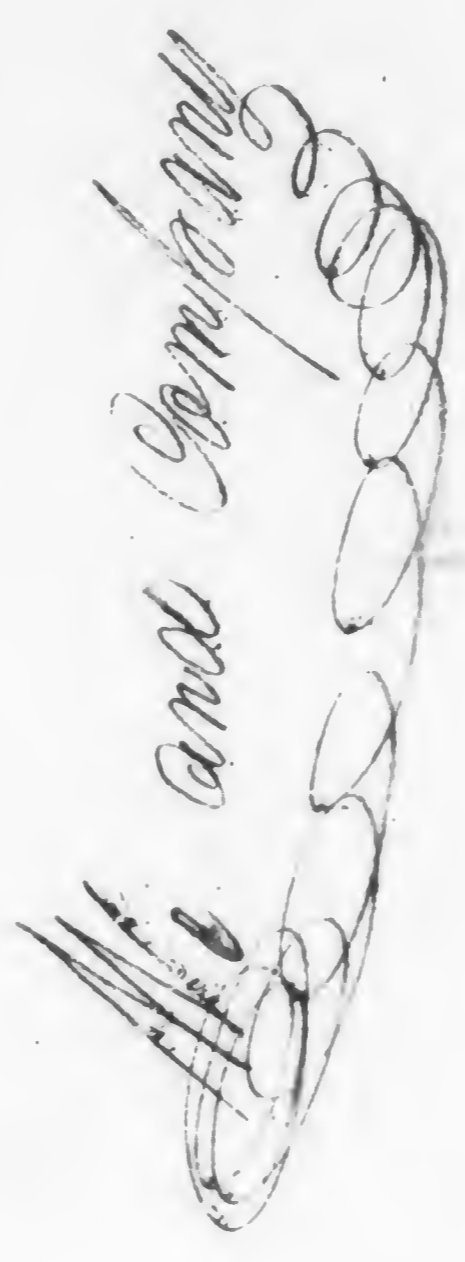

have felt ourselves very unawordly situated here - The
Spaniards entered this 18th Ultmo, and again abandoned
it 17th inst - and during their stay behaved in such
a manner as you would hardly imagine, respecting all
property and giving protection to every one who put them-
selves under their power - indeed we have all been
surprised at their conduct, but no doubt it would
have been very different had they entered under any
other circumstance; than what they did - Our Troops
some 5000 Columbians went out to meet them on the
Chorillo's Road, but retreated before them to the
Castles as they advanced and they broke up their Camp
without fighting a battle - they took up their possessions
between this and the Donk, and only made one advance
to their foes, which was 25th Ultmo, when they were drawn
up in number some 3000 men, which behaved in the most
gallant manner - You will remember a ~~conf~~ between 254

Cullas & Bella Vista, and this was in the occupation
of Canteras and a few infantry, while the main body
were stationed all round the Castles, however pending
they could ^{not} bring their enemy to a battle retired in the
greatest order with a very small loss, a little skirmishing
took place in which the Spanish Patents were the greatest
losers - Indeed had a general action been fought
no doubt but they would have beat us - their force is
some 7300 a 8000 men in excellent discipline and full
of fight - It is said they were not aware of Santa
Cruz's expedition to the Intermedios before they came
to Surinam, and it is natural to suppose that expedition
is now doing great things - Miller & Howard have
gone on a second expedition with 3600 men, their
destination is supposed to be between Pisco & Huila - we
entertain great hopes of the success of these expeditions,
but still if a general battle is fought, I think it will
be a hard one if the Spaniards are beaten - Bolivar
has not yet arrived nor do we now entertain any hopes
of his presence - - We got most of our Goods down
to Cullas & left such as we got could get no means
for their transportation - Bourne & Mallum remain

here, and all we run away (Begg Bend Wyo & —) made the best of our way to the Park - I was up in time most of the time they were here & it was a pleasure to see their Camp in such excellent order -

In Domestic affairs I have nothing new to communicate - Our house affairs going on as usual & as for office business it is in a bad way - I wish you were here to get DON Florentino Castro's Customhouse accounts into some order in their present state I would defy Ned Nick to make any thing out of them - I am still labouring at the Cash, and accounts for England but my next will inform you I am no more in the employ of your good partner - My time is out tomorrow, and I have now in Callao some thousands of Pounds of Goods, and every reason to expect full encouragement - I might have been connected with John Begg & Co but put no confidence in their speculations with Government - the Span has all ended in smoke & how are they to get paid? they have speculated in much more ²⁸⁶ to their own ruin had to leave however John

My dear Maec - It is now, near ten o'clock and we are all grumbling for our breakfasts. I wish you were here to give our Good Man a pull. I will do my best - I have written Hartnell of this conveyance giving him an account of our political situation and to him & your letter of his conveyance I beg to refer you - the Captain I am afraid will be able to give you little news - from appearances he seems a stupid fellow - and his vessel is certainly kept in a very dirty state - I have several letters from Murphy he wishes much to get out here again - his wife has been very ill, or he would have been out here long since - he wishes me to give him a description of your quarters, and he has I think some notion of going to you - I am not aware what produce or Goods might be sold with you, therefore cannot write him on the subject - neither can I beg the favour of

your addressing him - as you would imagine he would
be doing your bidding - by having any opposition - and do
you intend to monopolize the whole of the trade it would
be useless his endeavours to do any good - I had written to
him to stay where he is, and be content - but if you have
any respect for an old friend I think you might
write him - by so doing you would not only be
incensing the persons on him - but also by your old
friends - We have nothing new in domestic affairs
we go on in the old way - but our prospects are
not very flattering & unless the Intermediate expectations
turn up well - I was just going to enter into a
long detail upon the War between France & Spain
but bringing to mind the great inclination you
have for doing business in a superior style (that

may pick up there over in your quarters, and for

We beg to enclose you dup. of our
receipts of 2 May which we directed to
you of Stephens and now repeat the
pleasures by the Hebe which we send
with the object of placing for the
Coast. It was our intention to have
sent you the Hebe but she has
been employed as a transport for
the last 3 months and has not yet
returned from Ithaca. The Hebe
will be expected carry off all the
provisions you have collected, for
altho she measures only 225 tons she
will carry nearly 400 -

We enclose you Copy of the original
Charterparty and also of the agreement
of the Captains to use the Vepels boat
and the discharge & loading of cargo - also
of our Instructions by which you were
ordered that she touches at Valparaiso
on her return and from thence
comes to this place or proceeds to
Liverpool as Circumstances may
point out

The prospect of a war in Europe
which will likely interrupt our relations
with Russia in any matter follows an
object worth attending to. That we
fear of a rupture with Russia shall
prevent that your operations will be
materially retarded if it day not entirely
break up your Establishments - By accounts
from England of April last war between

France & Spain was considered inevitable
and as the England had not openly espoused
the Cause of the latter yet there is little
doubt she will be drawn into it.
From Mr Prothertons letters we infer the
apprehension of a General Continental
war - and perhaps you may be better
able to judge how the Independence
of the California will be effected
if Russia enters into hostilities with England
that she would endeavor to take
possession of that Country may be
questioned - But how far she might
impede our trade is a subject for
our mutual consideration - By the
enclosed dup^s you will gather our
sentiments as to the line of conduct
you ought to pursue in regard
to forcing the trade to its utmost

extent and we hope that the measures you would immediately adopt will secure a very large increase of produce for next year. If you can alarm the reverent fathers, do not allow their zeal to cool but urge them to plan beyond the reach of contingency the property which can be converted into any thing like articles of commerce - If during the winter season you can act upon this. Let your time be employed in salting down Hides and pelting ^{them} in such a way that the water will run from them and that they be in a dry and good condition for shipment of the first of April. The funds for these operations will be at your command and by the return of the Hides you will be able to inform us to what amount you will require. But we expect

that for a great portion of them you will be able to negotiate Hides pay well in Spain as you have already done in two instances -

We enclose extracts of letters from J. Brotherton Esq. relative to the curing of Hides by which you will see the necessity of attending particularly to the manner of salting them - Also as to salted hides you will observe they are exposed to ferment and those you do salt be careful they be not shipped in a wet state - By exposing them the salt will dry and incrustate and in that state we should suppose they would be perfectly safe - You have also extracts of a letter from Wm. Harrison Esq. of 9 April

on the subject of the Vessels from you
touching at Rio for the purpose of re-
arranging into the state of their Cargo.

If the Neptune has not left the
Coast on receipt of this you will
give the Captain the necessary
Instructions.

The letters accompanying this will
inform you of our political situation
and also how our goods from Pais
de Estrella & Baystones &c. we would
have shipped to a larger amount
but as they would arrive at an
advanced season we thought it
better to defer it until the first
Spring Ship when we can get
our information from you.

The Schoon of Joes Joff & Darling
we have sold at 124 & 90/- It is

rehauling a screw at a time at 134/-
Considerable imports have arrived from
Buenos Ayres both of Sallors & Candles
which have tended to depress prices.



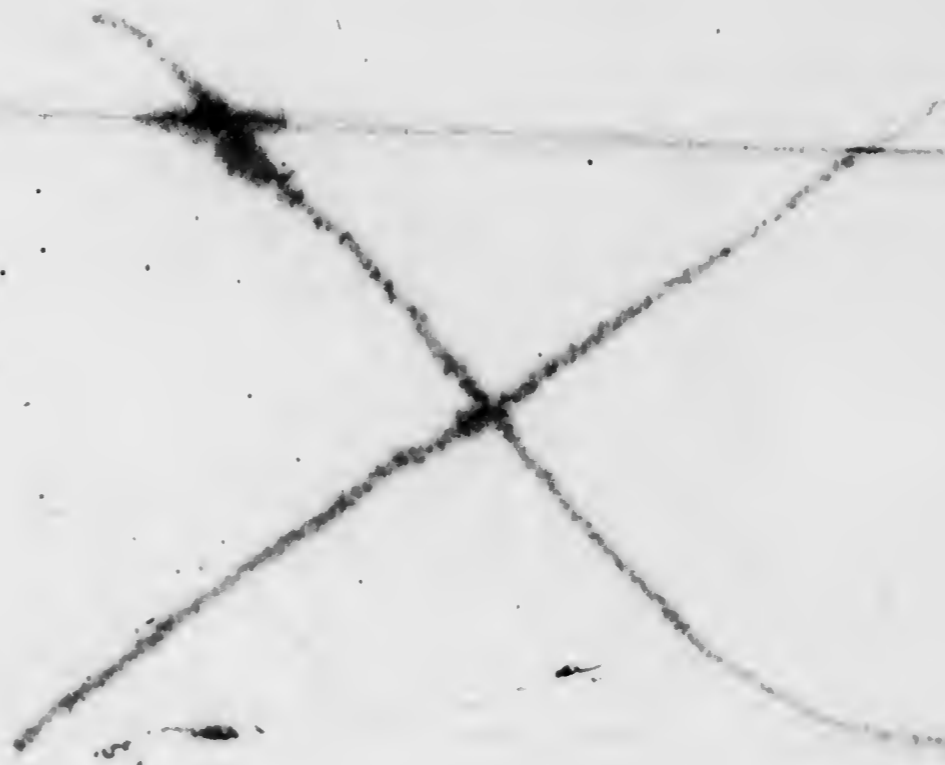

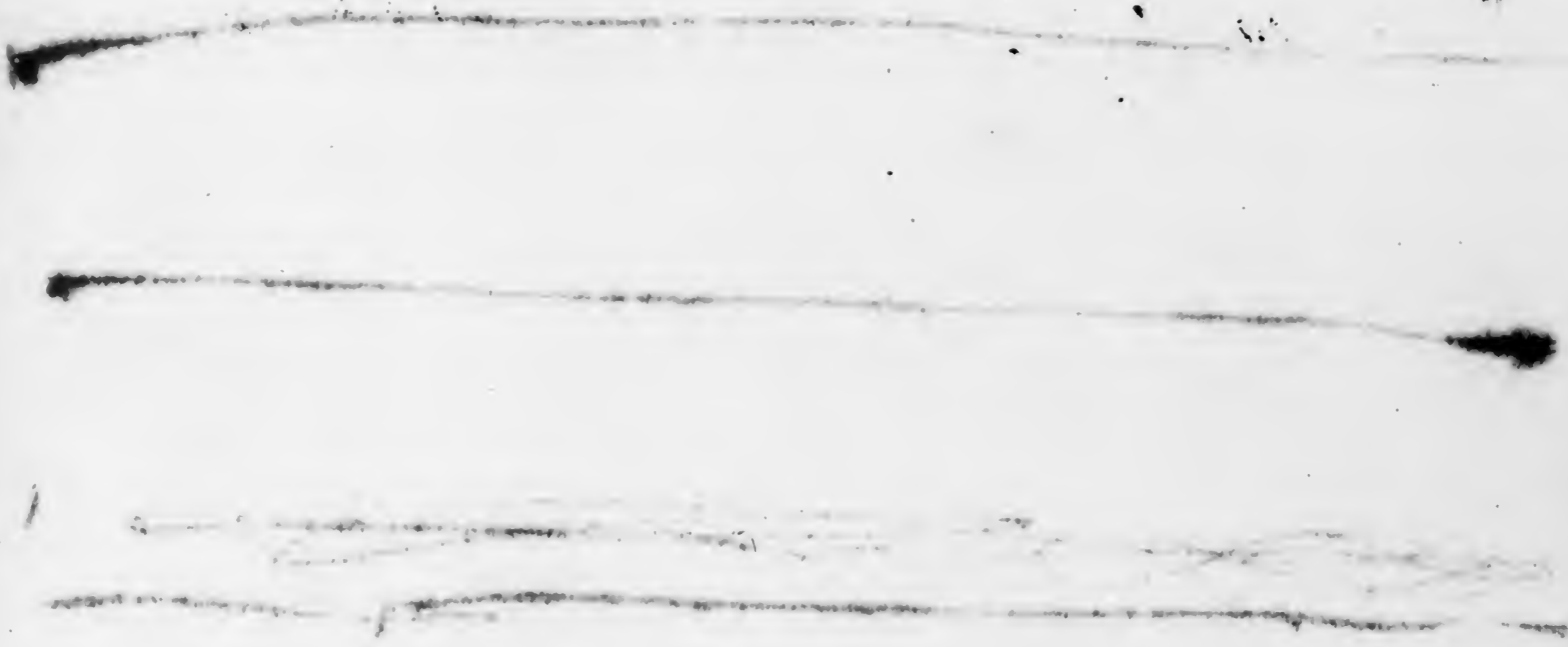
