FREE TRADE FOR ONE?—FREE TRADE FOR ALL.

WHY IS IT, if England believes in free trade, that she obliges her colonies to live under the rule of protection? Is it not protection of her own free-trade foolishness at the expense of those who cannot help themselves? Something more than a hundred years ago this country was taxed in behalf of the English government, and the result was a revolution. It is a first-rate idea to try tariff experiments when other people have to pay the cost of it, but sometimes it costs more than it comes to.

Mr. Bismarck remarked in effect not long since, are the means to that international exchange of the fraternal emotions which makes the angels clap their wings for joy.

He doesn't assume a love that belongs entirely to somebody else, but goes on his rough and rugged way, tossing off his sweat with apparent indifference to everything but his own suffering. When his assassinating is done nobody can prove that it was contemplated or that he had the meanness to lie about it beforehand.

HOW ENGLAND PROTECTS HERSELF.

ALL party contentions are struggles of selfishness. The ultimate intent, mistaken or otherwise, is to attain the greatest advantage in comfort, food, clothing, shelter and the added embellishments of such luxuries as are attainable to the greatest number.

The two great parties tread two opposite roads, each claiming its own way as leading to this result. It is only extreme partisanship that claims party infallibility. The two great growths of the Anglo-Saxon race, the English and American, are in certain lines in accord, and yet in others in opposition in policy. Great Britain—geographically small, sea-girt and insular—reaches the world by ship and sea. With a closely packed population of cheap workers, it finds the outlet of its mines and manufactories chiefly outside of itself. Every protection enactment formulated by any other nation is its embarrassment, and by wiles or force it is its purpose to overthrow. England's very life depends upon its being the manufacturer, banker and barterer of the world. Its nourishment and sustenance is free trade. Its essential policy is to coerce where it must, and coax where it can, the weak nations, or the gullible ones, to accept as their good that which is selfishly its own. This persistent foreign policy on the part of England, no matter which local party may be dominant, has won it its wonderful success. It is like the western farmer who, after exhausting the fertility of one section, moves to another to suck vitality out of new fields. The English intent to make this continent an area of serfdom, by its interdiction against colonial manufactories and maritime

enterprise, was defeated by the revolution. English persistence, however, accepts no rebuff. Failing with the musket, it hopes yet to waylay with the Cobden club. The overthrow of the confederacy was its second defeat. The anticipation of a split republic, demoralized by division, a free-trade confederacy with a long defenceless line, tempting to illimitated smuggling over its border, would have won for England sooner or later by the help of its southern ally the success of its policy, or have stirred another domestic conflict. It should be remembered that the colonies England plants, the nations it controls, the Egypt it has absorbed, the Hindoostan it has defeated, the China it is leeching, the South America it bleeds, the Ireland it has crushed, nourish and fatten the parent isle; that while its empire belts, it also anacondas the world.

Within a reasonable period the population of the United States will be as large, or larger than that of all Europe to-day. Now, in extent and material resources, it is superior to any civilized quarter of the globe. Between the margin of the two seas, and slanting to the northward, or the sun, spread thirty-eight states, each in itself an empire, and bound together by the ties of a common interest. Between these there exists the most unrestricted free trade. Sixty million people clasp palms with ungloved hands. It is as though a better and a broader Europe were federated under one government, unhampered in intercourse by the absence of national lines, unsmitten by a military footfall and unthreatened by a maritime gun, czarless and kingless, and with all its royal treasures ground to division among its people; with an internal commerce greater than the foreign commerce of any country, a republic of free trade, a republic of internal development and wealth, and enforcing protection only as against aggression from outside.

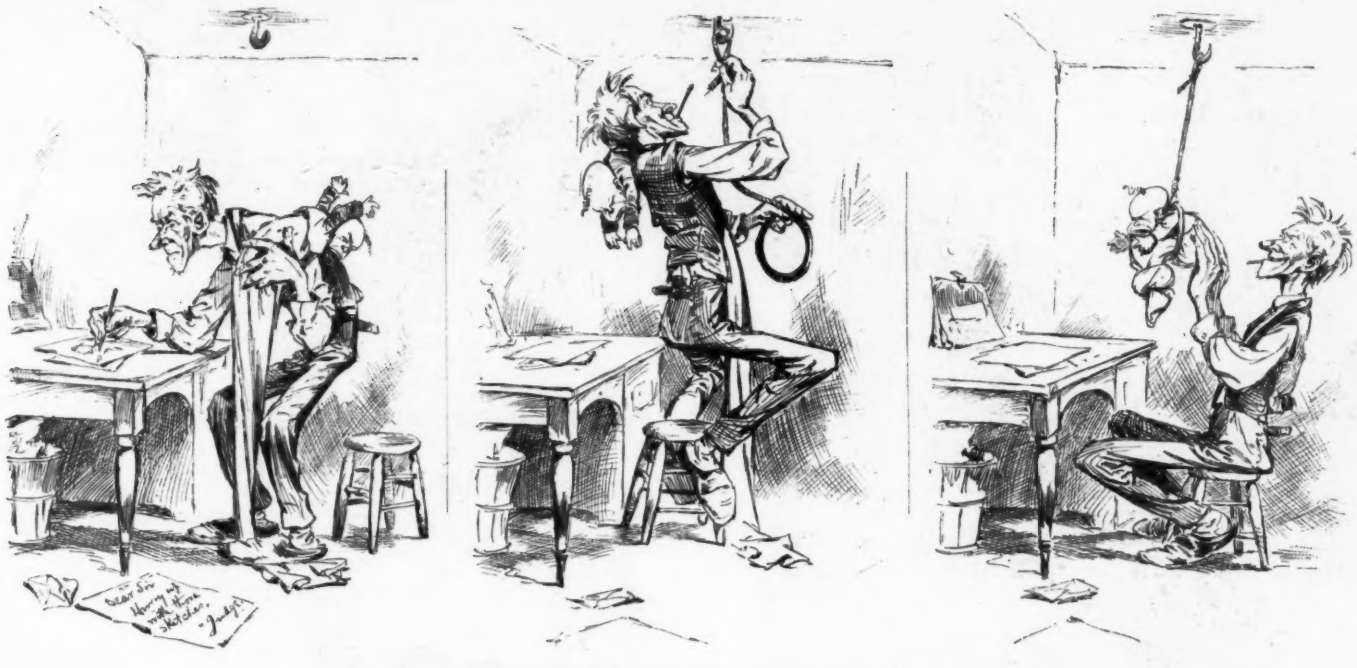

 Pockets are made deep, but are worn sarcastically empty. They are depths that need no fathoming.

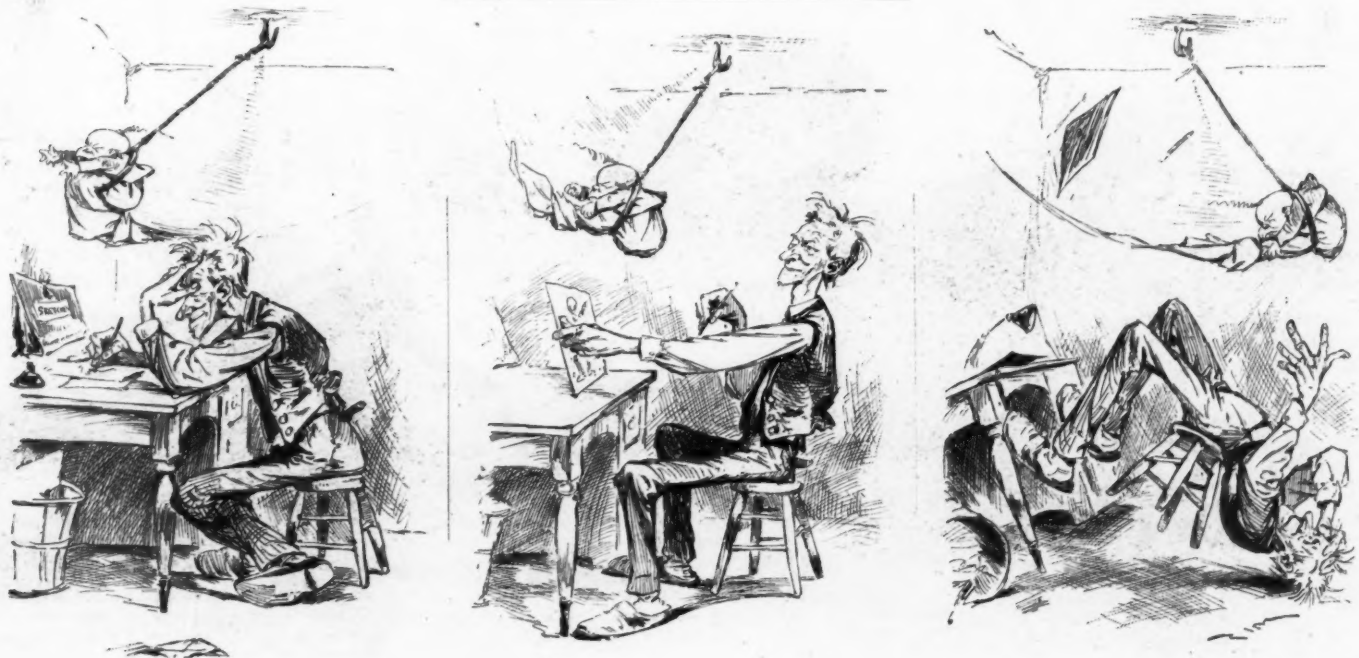
