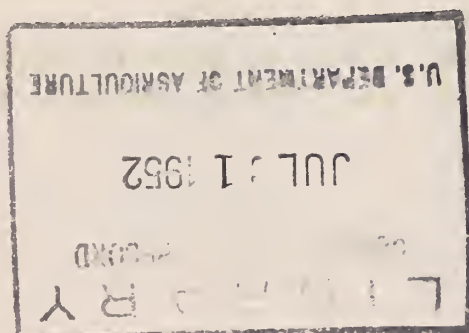

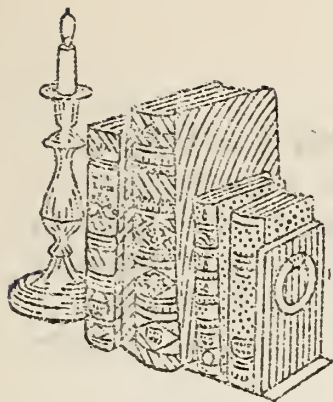

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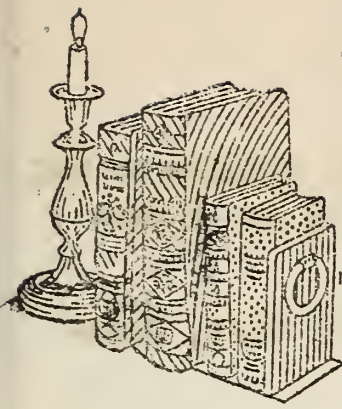

Department of Agriculture, Federal Agencies, Agricultural Experiment Stations, State Colleges and their Agricultural Extension Services, the material is authentic; and the suggestions as to prevention and treatments are practical and proven measures under field conditions.

The Encyclopedia in no way detracts from the indispensable function of the Veterinarian; nor does the author intend that it should. It is for the practical reader who desires to be well informed on livestock health problems; and a well informed client is an asset to any Veterinarian.

In the hands of agricultural leaders, county agents, vocational agricultural teachers, and F.F.A. members it could do much to broaden their knowledge of basic animal health problems.

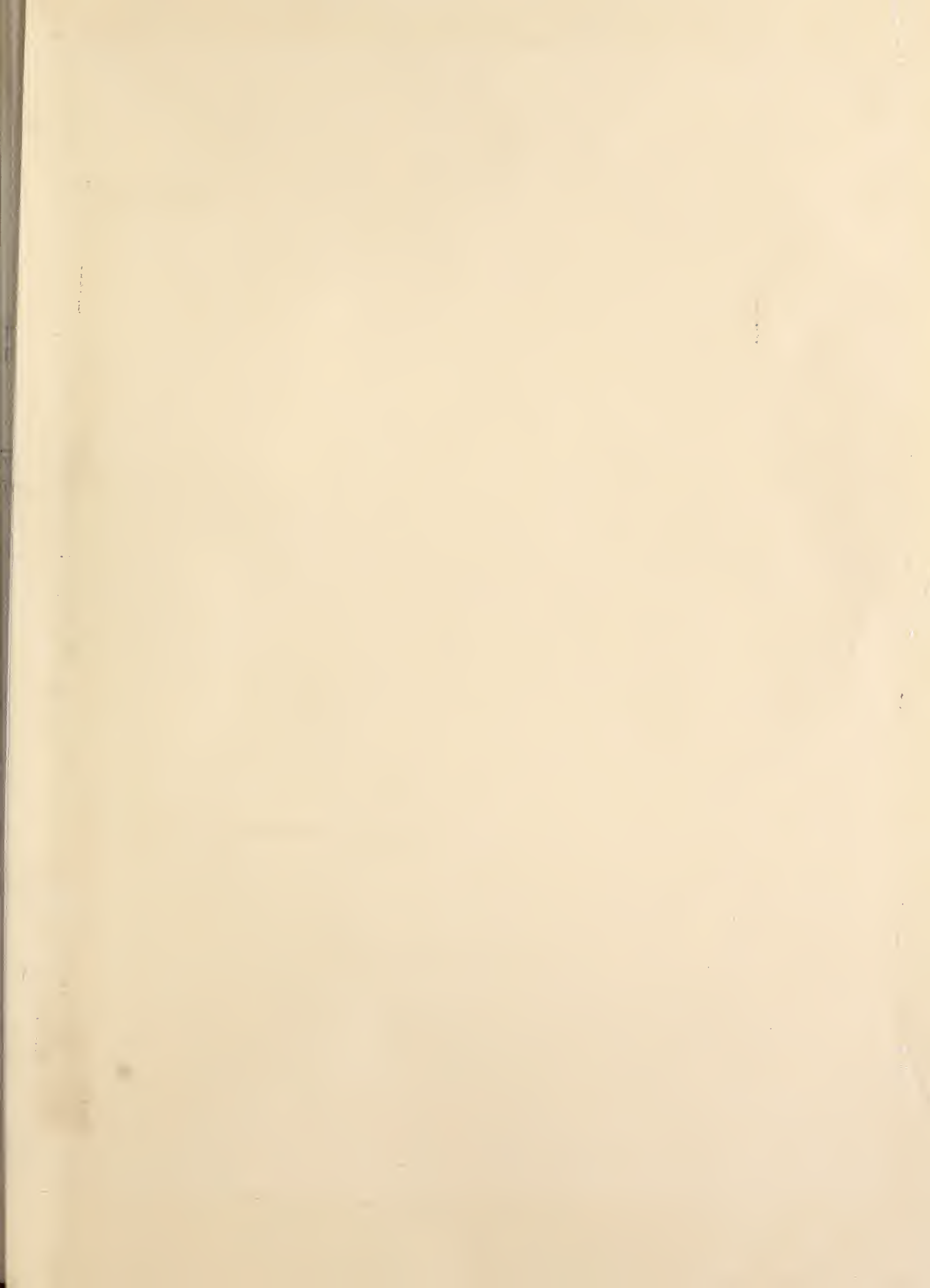

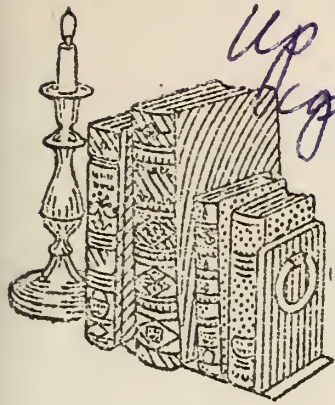

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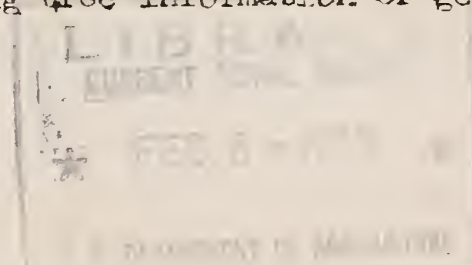
