

REPORTS.

REPORT A.

President's Report.

DEAR BRETHREN:—After another year's work for Christ and the Church, we meet again in Conference session to make our reports and devise plans for the further extension of the kingdom of Christ. Praying that the Holy Spirit may direct us during this session, I herewith present my report.

I have not been able to visit all the charges during the year, because I have had to give more attention than usual to some of the weaker ones. Those that I have not visited, have not suffered thereby.

DEATHS.

The Conference this year had well nigh ended with our ranks unbroken by death. We were all indulging the hope that no name would have to be added to the dead roll, but in this we have been sadly disappointed. Two members of our Conference have died, and the names of three sisters, the wives and faithful companions and helpers of our ministers, must go to the list of those elect ladies deceased, who have passed from the trials and toils of an itinerant life, to the rest that remains for the people of God. "The sting of death is sin." To those whose names are to be officially announced, death has no sting. "Thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory, through our Lord, Jesus Christ."

Mrs. Elizabeth W. Nichols, widow of the late Rev. John R. Nichols, died Oct. 6, 1901.

Mrs. Annie M. Parris, wife of Rev. J. W. Parris, died Oct. 21, 1901.

Mrs. Margaret F. Nicholson, wife of Rev. J. E. Nicholson, died Nov. 14, 1901.

Rev. William J. Floyd, died Feb. 13, 1902.

Rev. Jesse Shreeve, died March 9, 1902.

Obituary Committees were promptly appointed.

During the year we have lost by death, from the lay ranks, many valuable members. They can no longer be seen in their accustomed places. "They are not, for God took them." Their names have been transferred to the dead roll of the churches of which they were members.

UNSUPPLIED CHARGES.

When our last Conference adjourned, four charges were unsupplied. During the year they have been supplied as follows:

Evergreen, by Rev. Philip W. Crosby; Patapsco, by Rev. C. H. Littleton; Jones Memorial, by Rev. S. W. James; Middleway, by Rev. G. J. Sullivan. Epworth Church was placed under the care of the pastor of Crumpton; Fairview

Church after having been closed for a year and a half, was reopened by Rev. W. M. Jett, who has gathered a fine Sunday school and congregation. I recommend that this church be restored to the list of appointments. Ridgely Church has not been regularly supplied. I recommend its reference to the Committee on Church Extension.

CHANGES.

About the first of last December, Rev. B. F. Jester left Cecil charge, to which he was appointed at our last Conference, without permission, and has since taken work in another church. I recommend that his name be stricken from the roll.

On Dec. 12, 1901, Rev. Thomas Wheeler was released from Felton Charge on account of poor health. Since the above date, Rev. E. H. Jones has been supplying this charge.

ORDINATION.

Nov. 5, 1901, Rev. C. M. Compher was ordained. In this service I was assisted by Revs. J. W. Trout and F. C. Klein.

BENEVOLENT AGENCIES.

Mrs. T. A. Reese has continued her generous contributions to our pastors and the various interests represented in our Conference work. She deserves, and, I am sure has, the hearty thanks of all who have been the recipients of her many kindnesses.

The Pipe Creek and Jefferson Benevolent Societies and the St. John's Board of Beneficence have continued their generous assistance to our pastors and churches, and should receive the formal and hearty thanks of this Conference.

MINISTERIAL SUPPLY.

We should exert ourselves to obtain young men for our ministry. expect an annual loss by death and superannuation. Five appointments have been supplied by Seminary students. They have done as well as could be expected under the circumstances. All of these charges need a resident pastor. Our College and Seminary are doing good work for us. They are doing it so well that we ought to feel encouraged to give them more of it to do. We ought to have in these institutions, more young men. I call your attention to the fact that we are not getting many of the young men who are graduated. We will receive no one this year. This is discouraging to our people, in view of the fact that they contribute annually to Ministerial Education and in addition pay by special assessment, the salaries of the Professors. Our failure to receive into our Conference the young men we send, is not chargable to the Seminary authorities. They do all they can to impress the graduates with a due sense of their obligation to the Conference through whose generosity they obtain an education. We should have a more definite understanding with those whom we recommend to the Board, as to their obligation to the Conference. Before any man is recommended he should be made to understand that we do not regard his education complete until he shall have graduated from

the Seminary, passed through the course of study prescribed by this Conference and received orders. Until then he must consider himself under the care of this Conference, and not at liberty to seek employment elsewhere. A man is under everlasting obligation to the church that saves him from a life of sin, and puts his feet in the path of life and glory. Whoever leaves the church that rescues him from sin and trains him into Christian manhood, be he minister or layman, leaves in debt. No church can do as much for us as has been done by the church through whose instrumentality we have been saved. This is one of the fundamental facts upon which true denominational loyalty is based. The young man who has been converted and educated for the ministry is under lifelong obligation to the Conference that does it, no matter whether he receives that education in our schools or in the pastorate.

OUR HYMN BOOK.

Our new hymn book has been published. It is all that anybody could ask and cheaper than anybody expected. Its publication comes nearer giving perfect satisfaction than anything that has been done by the church in many years. It is in use in many of our churches and should be in all of them. There is no longer any excuse for using other hymnals in our regular Sabbath services. Inasmuch as the ritual and selections of the Psalms are in the book, the order of service recommended by the General Conference should be followed, that our services may be uniform.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

The Maryland Conference C. E. Union held, in Washington during Feb. last, a profitable convention. In order that they may better co-operate with this Conference in its various religious enterprises, they propose to ask you to appoint an advisory committee, of which the President of this Conference shall be, ex-officio, a member. This is a wise proposition and should be adopted.

STATE OF THE CHURCH.

You will hear from Western Maryland College, the Westminster Theological Seminary, the Aged People's Home and the Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies through their reports. Pastors' reports will show that we have had a year of progress. For figures I refer you to their reports. A new church has been built on Bedford Circuit, and contracts for two new churches on Heathsville have been given out. A new church is in course of erection on Pittsville Circuit. St. James Church will be rebuilt in the spring. Clinton Ave. Church has bought a valuable lot and built on it a neat chapel. Bethany, Georgetown D. C., Kennedyville, Parksley, Waverly and Westminster Churches have been handsomely and expensively improved. There have been other churches and parsonages greatly improved. Some old and embarassing church debts have been paid in full and others very much reduced. Broadway and North Carolina Ave. are steadily reducing their indebtedness and should continue to receive Conference encouragement. Lynchburg Church has paid \$1500 on its funded debtand met all its current expenses. A new

April 11,

Church has been organized at Federalsburg, Md. and they will purchase or build a suitable house of worship soon. I recommend that Federalsburg be enrolled in our list of appointments and be supplied.

St. John's Church (Canton) has the offer of a fine lot in Highlandtown, free of charge, upon which to build a church. As the location is much better than the one they have, I have advised them to move and build.

Bates Memorial Church, at Snow Hill, which has been commenced, should receive our hearty support. We need the church and ought to honor the man.

Christ Church, Baltimore, has bought a lot in a much better location and have displayed great liberality in the large payment they have made on their purchase. I hope they will have all the moral and financial support that we are able to give them.

We have had a year of great revivals, and large accessions. The net increase in membership should put us well beyond 25,000. There is such a general disposition to drop the names of those who cease to attend and take an interest in the church that the figures reported represent, as nearly as is practicable, our actual membership.

In concluding my labors as President and in presenting my fifth annual report, allow me to thank you for the honor conferred upon me, the confidence reposed in me and the uniform kindness and respect shown me. In all that I have done, I have been conscientious. I have endeavored to act with wisdom, prudence and kindness. I have not spared myself labor nor money in the discharge of my duties. I wish I could have done more to advance the interest of the church. With gratitude to God, for His kind providence in preserving my health and life, and with thanks to the many friends who have so kindly entertained me during these years of travel and toil, I am,

REPORT C.

On Publication of Minutes.

To the Maryland Annual Conference:

Having been appointed by the President of the Conference to act with the Secretary as Committee on Publication of the Minutes, we have taken the matter under consideration with a view to making suggestions to remedy what seems to be considered an unsatisfactory condition.

The Minutes are too expensive, and they are now published regularly on credit; the Minutes of last Conference requiring the greater part of this year's collection to pay for their publication. To remedy this condition we make the following suggestions:

A very considerable saving of expenses as well as advantage of presentation can be made by printing the statistical tables without the totals at the bottom of the page, and the cents, in the financial reports. The totals would be printed as a summary on a separate page. This year's Minutes would account for the whole collection in this summary, but we suggest that the Conference order all assessments to be made in even dollars and that hereafter all collections be returned in the same way. Pastors to distribute the odd cents among the collections to make them all even, or to retain the cents for another year's report. This would save a great deal of labor to the Stewards. In most collections it takes more time to add up the cents than the dollars.

We recommend that the Conference Directory be omitted as a separate page, and that the addresses of ministers be added to their names in the plan of appointments.

We recommend that the Manual be printed this year, but bound separately,

and furnished free to those who want it, and not printed again until the supply is exhausted.

That the Committee be authorized to borrow the money necessary to provide for the publication of the Minutes, to be taken out of the next collection.

REPORT D.

President's Parsonage, No. 42 Parkin Street, Baltimore, Md.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on the President's Parsonage submit the following report:

Having carefully examined the President's Parsonage, we report it to be inconvenient, uncomfortable and unsanitary. Its location is not desirable. Its condition is not satisfactory. The President of the Conference ought to have a better home than the one that has been used for many years.

We recommend that the house on Parkin Street, Baltimore, be sold as early as possible.

We examined the furniture of the President's Parsonage, and found it to be meagre, old, worn-out, and, almost, worthless. It has scarcely any financial value. The home of the President needs to be newly furnished from cellar to garret.

In view of the emergency that is upon us, we recommend that the President rent a desirable dwelling, and that the salary and house rent be fixed at \$2,500; and that \$500 additional be appropriated for furniture, and that these two items be placed in one assessment.

Report of the Faculty of Instruction.

We recommend the passage of the following:

WHEREAS, the Maryland Conference has, during the last few years, recommended some of her young men to the Board of Education, with the expectation of securing their services at the close of their college and seminary course, and

WHEREAS, upon their graduation they have requested permission to enter other Conferences, and these requests have been granted until many of our pulpits are vacant, therefore

Resolved, that the request of Harry H. Price to be released to enter the North Illinois Conference be not granted.

Resolved, that no man be recommended to the Board of Ministerial Education unless he pledge himself to enter into no agreement with any other Conference until he shall have served the Maryland Conference three years in case he be needed.

We recommend John S. Wildridge be continued in the hands of the President. We report of the third year's, class that H. S. Leas was given 100 in theology, W. N. Sherwood was given 100 in theology, that E. P. Perry is continued in the class in Miller's Christian Ministry, that H. S. Leas, B. F. Ruley, W. N. Sherwood, T. R. Woodford and C. M. Zepp are passed through the course.

Of the second year's class we report, that C. M. Compher was given 100 in Drinkhouse History, 100 in Sacred Geography and 100 in Fisher's Church History. That C. M. Compher, J. L. Nichols and F. J. Phillips were passed to the

third year.

Of the first year's class we report, that J. H. Straughn was given 100 in Theology and 100 in Greek, that Thomas Wheeler was given 100 in Nichol's Help and 100 in Drinkhouse's History, that C. C. Baker was not passed in Theology nor in Homiletics, that H. C. Hall has, because of ill health, been discontinued at his own request; that Frederick Phillips passed in Theology and that J. H. Straughn and Thomas Wheeler were passed to the second year. That E. P. Perry was passed in Theology, that Roscoe Strausberg and E. H. Jones were continued in the first year's class.

We report that G. E. Brown and Richard Shipley are dropped from the list of

students because they are taking a course at the Seminary.

At the request of the President of the Conference, we recommend that Edward P. Perry, W. N. Sherwood, F. J. Phillips, James L. Nichols, James H. Straughn and Thomas Wheeler be licensed to administer the ordinances.

We recommend that Harry H. Price be licensed to administer the ordinances. We recommend that graduates of the Westminster Theological Seminary shall not be examined by the Faculty in any of the studies of the course; but such students shall present each year theses on theological subjects, to be appointed by the examiners in Systematic Theology.

REPORT K.

Report of Committee on Temperance.

Your Committee on Temperance begs leave to report that notwithstanding the espousal of the saloon in some form by men exalted in the literary and religious world, exciting a peculiar sense of strange and unexpected danger, we hail with feelings of profound gratitude to God the growing sentiment against the licensed saloon, and the more solid basis upon which this sentiment rests—love to humani-

ty, God and his Christ. Recent developments in the city of New York have done much to give the people at large a knowledge of the real purpose and strength of the liquor forces.

A certain secular newspaper of the city of Baltimore stated in a recent issue that, of thirty bills affecting the liquor question presented to the legislature on the last day of its session, twenty-seven were disposed of in a manner favorable to the cause of temperance, and the present status of the army-canteen question and the favorable attitude of men high in army circles, are sources of much encouragement and exalted hopes.

While we would commend any and every agency having for its purpose the overthrow of the liquor business, we believe the pulpit is the place, the minister the man, and the Gospel the power by which men are to be saved from inebriety, the traffic deposed and the world redeemed from this great blight. We also record our conviction that, by the continued, earnest, faithful preaching of the Gospel of our Lord and Master, responsive chords in the hearts of our people will be touched and they will soon see to it that the strong arm of the law, which has so long upheld this monstrosity upon our body politic, shall cast it away and stamp it out of existence. We therefore urge the ministry to preach the Word, to be instant in season and out of season as to this great question.

To the W. C. T. U. we extend the hand of co-operation and bid them Godspeed. We unhesitatingly condemn any effort to discontinue the Quarterly Temperance Lesson in the International Sabbath-school Lesson System.

PAPER SUBMITTED BY DANIEL BAKER.

To the Maryland Annual Conference:

DEAR FRIENDS:—A conference, at which a number of churches and temperance associations were informally represented, was held in Baltimore on January 30th last, at which a committee was appointed to suggest methods by which an amendment to the State Constitution prohibiting the manufacture and sale of liquor may be obtained.

Realizing the magnitude of the task, and that the working together of all friends of temperance is essential to success, the committee would offer the following proposition for the consideration of your Conference:

That the temperance people of the State of Maryland should unite in the endeavor to secure the passing of an Act of the General Assembly, at its session in 1904, submitting to the voters of the State an amendment to the Constitution, prohibiting the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquor as a beverage.

The adoption of this proposition involves a State-wide campaign of education, the effort to secure the election to the State Legislature of men favorable to such action, the dissemination of a large amount of literature, and the unselfish devotion of many of our people.

We ask that the above proposition be brought before your body at as early a date as circumstances permit, and that it may receive your careful consideration.

If the proposition be approved, we request that you so inform us, and suggest that you appoint two of your number to officially represent your body on the Campaign Committee, which will have direction of the work. If not approved, please report Your co-workers-Provisional Committee. your action.

pastor who has been too poorly paid for his laborious work. We regret that we are not able to report this church in flourishing spiritual condition. We are hopeful, however, and look for better things.

At the last session of 'the Conference, Christ Church was given a relation to our Society. We have striven to do the work entrusted to our care. A Committee of our Society has been in close touch with the pastor and those concerned with the future of this church. All the facts are in our possession. At the last meeting of this Society the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

- 1. Resolved, that we heartily endorse the work of Bro. C. L. Daugherty at Christ Church, and approve the plan of the church to purchase and pay for the lot on which it is proposed to build.
- 2. Resolved, that we heartily endorse and commend the work of Christ Church; and commend the interests of this church to the favorable consideration of the Maryland Conference.

We believe that with careful management and some assistance from the Conference, this band of faithful and industrious and liberal people will soon have a commodious church building in a good location.

A very full statement of the financial accomplishments of this Society was made last year. We have made no debts this year. We have been able to meet our obligations. We desire to express our thanks to Mrs. T. A. Reese and all others whose generosity has enabled us to continue our work.

We most respectfully request that you appoint a pastor to Waverly under the advice and direction of this Society, and believe us to be your servants for the extension of the Master's Kingdom.

REPORT M.

Literature.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LITERATURE.

Your Committee on Literature respectfully submit the following:

We have examined the report of the Book Directory submitted to us, and we find therein much that is both gratifying and encouraging. One part of the report, however, is not so satisfactory. We note with pleasure the increase in the working capital of the Concern, also in the use of our Sunday-school publications, but we deeply regret that there has been no increase in the number of subscribers to the METHODIST PROTESTANT. As our denominational organ, the METHODIST PROTESTANT should be in every Methodist Protestant home. Under the able editorial management of Dr. Tagg, the paper continues to maintain its high standard of excellence, and we are convinced that the reading thereof by our people would be largely helpful both to their home-life and their church-life. The paper needs the support of the Church, but more than the paper needs the support of the Church, the Church needs the connectional stimulus and enlightenment which the paper affords.

We recognize the difficulties arising from the great multiplication of undenominational and secular papers, but we would urge upon both ministry and laity the necessity for more earnest effort to increase the circulation of the METHODIST PROTESTANT. We recommend that the Conference request the pastor of each charge to appoint an agent at each appointment on his charge, and that the Agent of the Book Directory be requested to furnish gratis to each of the local agents thus appointed by the pastors, 25 copies of the first June issue of the METHODIST PROTESTANT for gratuitous distribution, and that on the following Sabbath pastor and agent use a portion of the service in obtaining new subscribers, and that we allow them to take trial subscriptions at fifty cents for four months.

We have also examined the report of the Agent of the Twentieth Century Thank-Offering Fund, and we find that this Fund aggregates to date \$14,716.49. Of

this amount \$2,363.50 are in unpaid subscriptions.

A building for the Book Concern is now assured, but the selection of a suitable location is a work attended with great difficulty. We believe with the Committee that it is better to wait than purchase a place not properly suited to our work, or to attempt the payment of a place beyond our means. We further recommend that the matter of incurring indebtedness in connection with the purchase of the building be left to the discretion of the Committee.

We recommend that effort be made to increase the Twentieth Century Fund to at least \$15,000, and that Dr. F. T. Little be continued as Agent, to serve as opportunity may afford, in connection with his duties as President of the Conference, in soliciting contributions to the Fund. We further recommend that the pastors co-operate with the Agent in collecting the subscriptions yet unpaid.

Our Sunday-school publications, so ably edited by Dr. C. E. Wilbur, are surpassed by none, and we are pleased to know that there is a steady advance in their circulation. This is as it should be. We can only hope to have an intelligent and loyal Church membership as our own literature is used in our Sunday-schools. We therefore urge upon every Sunday-school the necessity and the duty of using our own publications.

Our new Church Hymnal has come from the press and has been received with general favor. It is a beautiful book, an excellent compilation, and at the price at which it is sold, is a marvel of cheapness. We commend the hymnal to our people, and trust that it will soon be in use in all our churches.

REPORT OF THE BALTIMORE BOOK DIRECTORY.

To the Maryland Annual Conference:

DEAR BRETHREN: -The arrangement made last year, by which the Editor of the METHODIST PROTESTANT became also the Agent of the Book Concern and publisher of the METHODIST PROTESTANT, continues. We may properly state again that this arrangement is not intended to be permanent. As soon as our matters can be brought into a condition to justify the change, we hope to be able to select an Agent and business manager to take charge of this part of the work. Having as vet failed to secure a suitable house for the Book Concern, our relation to the W. J. C. Dulany Co. continues unchanged. The business of the Concern, notwithstanding the large purchases which a change in our hymnal has demanded, is in better shape than it was last year. We have made some advance in the circulation of the Sunday-school literature We have lost no patronage in the METHODIST PROTESTANT, which, when we consider that it has five local rivals in its territory, the publishers of which are pressing upon their respective Conferences the duty of "taking the home paper", is not a discouraging showing. We have been able this year to increase our capital nearly thirty-three per cent. Financially, we are \$1,600 better off than we were on the first of March a year ago. The Thank-Offering Fund under the direction of Rev. Dr. F. T. Little, has made all the progress that could be expected, when the field that was previously covered, and his duties as a pastor are taken into consideration. He will doubtless make some statement to the Conference of the present status and the outlook of that work.

We very much regret to report that the Committee of the Conference, whose duty it is to look for a building, suitable as a Book Concern, has not been able up to this time to make a purchase. In most cases owners of suitable buildings asked prices far beyond our ability to pay, and cheaper ones are not suitably situated. The Conference will appreciate the discretion of the Committee in hesitating to purchase. The Committee believes it far better to wait, than purchase a place not properly suited to our work, or to attempt the payment of a place beyond our means This, too, will doubtless be more fully reported by others.

The need of a greater interest in our work by pastors and people, of doing what they can to put the METHODIST PROTESTANT in every home, of using our Sunday-school literature in all our Schools, of purchasing their books through our Book Concern, and of advertising our interests in all the churches is so apparent as to need no argument here.

The second edition of the hymnal has been entirely exhausted. The Church has shown its appreciation of the work of the Committee, and the need of a hymnal all our own, by a most generous and general patronage. This, of course, has increased our book sales far beyond any previous year of our history as a Book Concern. We trust this interest will not abate until the hymnal in sufficient quantities for worship is found in every church in our Conference.

In conclusion, we are happy to state that our business shows a more gratifying increase than for many years.

The expense account of \$352.99 covers every item of expense during the whole period of effort in raising this money, including \$100 paid Rev. C. S. Arnett for two months' services at Starr Church while the pastor, as Agent of the Fund, was in the field prosecuting his work. Brother Arnett donated \$50, one-half of his pay for the two months, to the Fund.

We had hoped to be able to state, approximately at least, the cash value of the unpaid subscriptions still on our books, and long over-due, but we are unprepared to do so. The information in the possession of the Agent shows that about \$200 of the amount cannot be collected. Beyond this we are unable to estimate what shrinkage, if any, there may be.

To enable us to purchase a suitable building it is the judgment of your Agent, and we believe of the Joint Committee as well, that the Fund should be pushed up to \$15,000.

Therefore, be it resolved, that we urge upon our pastors and people the necessity of being alert and uncompromising in their defence of the holy Sabbath day, and that our pastors preach sermons upon this subject and seek in every possible way to induce parents and guardians of the children of our homes to set the proper-example in respect to a proper observance of this day.

Report of Committee on Sunday Schools.

Your Committee beg leave to report the following:

Recognizing the Sunday school to be to the Church what a nursery is to an orchard, therefore be it resolved,

1st. We notice with deep regret that not more than 10 per cent. of our adult members give any personal attention at all to the Sunday school work, not even to the extent of a visit, which is doubtless a pernicious example prompting many of our boys and girls to withdraw from the Sunday school in their early teens.

2nd. We earnestly repeat all previous recommendations in reference to the use of our literature in all our schools, because it is as good as the best and is our

3rd. We would gladly hail the day when the international lessons will present a systematic line of Bible study in place of the disconnected system we now have.

4th. We earnestly urge a constant and strenuous effort upon the part of the officers and teachers be made to lead the children to Christ in their early years, and to aid in the accomplishment of this we advise that the teachers be selected from the ranks of the most pious and consecrated members of the church.

5th. We believe Decision Day is a good thing and recommend its observance

in every church. Also district and county conventions.

REPORT U.

Report of the Christian Endeavor Committee.

While the condition of the Christian Endeavor Society in the District is encouraging, it is not all that could be desired. We are pleased to note that there are over 6,500 members of the Christian Endeavor Societies. With such a host we ought to accomplish more for Christ and the Church.

We are glad to report that over \$1,300 of the \$2,000 of the Twentieth Century Thank-Offering Fund has been raised. While we commend this, yet it is a matter of regret that the entire sum has not been reached, but we wish to call attention to the fact that the Denominational Union did not obligate itself to pay the \$2,000, only promising to do its best to attain this sum.

We regret to report that a number of the churches have no societies, and respectfully and prayerfully call this to the attention of the pastors of churches having no Christian Endeavor Societies, and earnestly pray that they use every means possible in effecting such local organization of Junior and Senior Societies in their churches or on their charges.

A matter of congratulation to the denomination at large is that one of our number, Mr. George K. Mather, of Westminster, has been chosen President of the Inter-Denominational State Union of Maryland. We have also five other members on the Exebutive Committee, and also several county unions have for their executives, members of our denomination.

We call attention to the convention of the Denominational Union recently held in Washington City, which was, beyond doubt, the most spiritual and helpful

convention this Union ever held.

We recommend that the Conference, at the request of the Denominational Convention, recently held in Washington, annually name three ministers and two laymen to be styled "The Board of Advisers", the President of the Couference to be a member ex-officio, to act in connection with the Executive Committee of the Denominational Union, and further that this Board of Advisers be annually named by the President of the Conference.

We recommend that pastors be requested to organize societies in all their churches wherever possible. Frank H. Lewis, Chairman.

REPORT V.

Missions.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

We are gratified with the encouraging reports which we have received from the Secretaries of our Home and Foreign Boards. The information contained in them shows that the work is in a most prosperous condition, and should inspire to greater efforts to furnish the men and means necessary to meet the increased demands of the rapidly enlarging opportunities and opening fields.

Japan is now open for the Gospel as never before. Many hundreds of her college students have recently become interested in Christianity, and thousands of her citizens of all classes, have sought and found saving grace within the past year.

The missionaries are greatly encouraged as they behold with tears of grateful joy, the gracious fruits of years of toil. There are no serious discouragements now in the foreign field, and no obstacles which Christian faith and labor may not overcome.

We have in Japan about 600 members; 23 Sunday schools, with 1000 scholars; a conference of 18 ministers and preachers, and unincumbered property worth \$37,625. Our work and workers in Japan are in good repute with all the missions there, and command general respect. Rev. I. Inanuma, one of our ministers, is General Secretary of the C. E. Society in Japan, and is doing a work of national importance. God's blessing is upon the work.

The Board is entirely out of debt, but the necessary employment of two new missionaries within a few months will involve expenditures which only increased contributions can meet.

We have received communications from both the Maryland Branch and the Washington and Alexandria Branch of the W. F. M. S., in each of which we have the greetings and prayers of these splendid bands of Christian workers. They are still gleaning for the Master and His cause.

Special mention of thanks to the Conference, and the many friends thereof, is made for kindness shown to Miss Kuhns and Miss Forest, Secretaries in this department of the Church work.

The total amount of receipts, during the past year, from the Washington and Alexandria Branch is \$705.85. The amount received from the Maryland Branch is \$2,636.23.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

- 1. For the coming year we recommend that the same amounts be assessed on the District for Home and Foreign Missions as those of the past year.
- 2. That the Easter Service be held for Home Missions in all the Sunday schools of the Conference.
- 3. That every pastor be urged to observe the disciplinary requirements of preaching at least one sermon during the year dealing directly and specifically with the subject of Missions.
- 4. We recommend that every Sunday school be organized into a Juvenile Missionary Society to take quarterly collections and hold the Children's Day Service.

We also recommend that men of means be influenced, as far as possible, to donate or bequeath financial aid to this great work of saving the world.

We would emphasize the fact that the Children's Day collections are to be reported to the Conference separate from the assessments.

REPORT W.

Report of Committee on Church Enterprises.

Your Committee on Church Enterprises beg leave to submit the following report. There appeared before the committee the delegate from Snow Hill, with the pastor, who submitted the following items of interest concerning the progress of the work on the church now in course of construction, known as Bates Memorial. To-wit:

1st. The lot for church and parsonage has been purchased and paid for at a cost of ten hundred and fiftyeight-dollars, on which has been erected a very suitable parsonage, at a cost of three thousand, five hundred dollars, which has also been paid. The foundation of the new church is laid and the walls have been built to the height of seven feet, and the first installment of three thousand dollars has been paid on the work.

The entire cost of building, completed, will be thirteen thousand three hundred dollars.

Arrangements have been made with the Bank of the town for the loan of the amount necessary to meet the payments as they come due, at the rate of five per cent interest.

2nd. We recommend that the request of the pastor that he be permitted to

travel throughout the Maryland District in the interest of the work be granted, and that the President furnish a suitable supply to fill the pulpit during the absence of the pastor.

Your committee heartily recommand this enterprise to the favorable consideration of the Conference. J. E. T. EWELL, Chairman.

REPORT X.

Report of Committee on Official Character.

Your Committee has carefully examined the personal and financial reports of the pastors, and respectfully submits the following:

The personal reports bear evidence of haste and carelessness in preparation. Many items, deemed of importance by this Conference, are ignored altogether by many pastors. Many reports give no answer to the question about subscriptions to the METHODIST PROTESTANT. Some reports are even unsigned by the pastors. Others give no answer in reference to disciplines furnished to new members, and the question about the incorporation of the Board of Trustees in a large number of instances is answered-No.

One brother reports an absence of six weeks from his charge, and another answers with the word, "vacation," leaving the Committee in ignorance whether it was two or six weeks.

We have also examined the financial reports of the pastors, and find that 72 pastors are deficient in the payment of assessments, yet 51 of these received their salaries in full and some were overpaid. We also learn that only about 50 out of 135 churches took a collection for College Endowment, though this interest was commended to the charges by the Conference, and a day appointed for the special collection.

Your Committee regards the pastors as the responsible agents in carrying into execution tle will of the Conference in reference to these special interests. The stewards collect the pastors salary, but the pastor must be held accountable for the presentation of the General Interests and the collection of the assessments. When a charge pays the pastor in full and the assessments are only half paid, we are forced to the conclusion that the fault is with the pastor. It is not inability on the part of the charge, but vant of strenuous effort on the part of the pastor.

We, therefore, make the following recommendations:

First, that, after this year, pastors who report their assessment, paid in part only, will be required to explain in open Conference why they have failed.

Secondly, that pastors who have been absent from their work an unreasonable length of time during the year will be called before the bar of the Conference to account for what appears to be a neglect of duty.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Your Committe beg leave to submit the following report, viz:

The Conference will be greatly pleased to learn of the steady progress made at Western Maryland College, and that its requirements for admission place it abreast of the majority of colleges giving the degree of A. B.

Special attention is directed to the high standard maintained by the student body, proving it to be the safest and best institution for the education of the young of our church.

The high character of the work done by the scientific department has so broadened and increased in importance that a Hall of Science is a growing necessity.

It is a matter of gratification that science is being so admirably taught under Christian auspices, and the generous friends of the College could very wisely direct a share of their benevolences in the interest of science to this Christian college. The Conference having ordered an assessment for College Endowment equal to five cents per Sunday-school member, it is a satisfaction to note that over \$5,000, including the Sunday-school offering of last year of \$726.85, is in hand, and that annually the College proposes to place in the Endowment Fund an amount equal to that secured by the assessment up to \$1,500.

The loan of A. D. Melvin to the College as Endowment Secretary can only be regarded as an advance step in the steady progress of the institution, in that it must result in materially increasing the Endowment Fund, in securing new students, and bringing all of the interests of the college to the attention of the entire Conference District.

We recommend that our pulpits be opened to the Endowment Secretary in the furtherance of his work.

The report from the Theological Seminary shows a healthy state of affairs, as to the number of students representing seven states; the admirable course of lectures delivered during the year by representative ministers of several of our Conferences, and improvements to the property.

We heartily commend to our people the excellent example of the churches and friends who have supported scholarships as one of the best means to aid the institution and recruit our ministry.

The Church will rejoice to hear of the \$500 legacy from the estate of W. H. Starr, and the addition to the Free Scholarship Fund of \$2,000, and the hope is indulged that this will be largely increased during the year.

The deficiency amounting to \$116.62, is less than that of last year. The plan used heretofore to make up the deficiency having objectionable features ought not, in our judgement, to be used, and we therefore emphasize the imperative need of securing in full the Seminary Assessment.

We recommend:

- 1. That the request of the Board of Governors for the assignment of H. L. Elderdice and B. F. Benson for the ensuing year be granted.
 - 2. That \$1,800 be assessed on the District.
- 3. That our churches observe a day of prayer that more young men may be called into the ministry.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF WESTERN MARYLAND COLLEGE.

To the Maryland Annual Conference:

March 26, 1902.

DEAR BRETHREN:—I beg leave to present my report for the sixteenth year as President of Western Maryland College.

I am glad to be able to report a good year. Our student roll has kept up to the average, and the work has improved, I think, in the various departments. The course of study has been enlarging and advancing gradually for several years, until our requirements for admission now place us on an equality with the majority of colleges giving the degree of A. B.

The administration of the year has been exceptionally easy by reason of the attitude of the student body. There has not been even a serious difference of opinion between faculty and students.

It is hard to repress the wish for some generous friends to make a realization out of a hope, which would enable us to take a step of great importance to our progress which the earnestness of our students seems to call for as a response. Our work in science has broadened and increased in importance to such an extent that a separate hall is greatly needed to provide better accommodations for laboratories. We are doing in Chemistry, for instance, work that is accepted by the Johns Hopkins Medical School as equivalent to that done by those taking the A. B. course in the Hopkins University. Yet we have only one small room for this important laboratory.

Other Colleges in this State meet such needs by appropriations from the legislature. I do not think a session of the legislature has been held in this State for fifteen years that has not given some College in the State an appropriation for buildings. Our College has never received and never asked a dollar for such purpose. We have never received any grant, donation or appropriation of any sort, except in payment of the bills for board and tuition of the students sent to us by the State.

But much as we need a Science Hall and some liberal friends to furnish the money to erect it, I feel that the only thing we can now press upon the attention of the Conference is endowment. This will be brought directly to the Conference in a report of a special committee appointed by the Board of Trustees at a special meeting held in February, and I will only mention here some matters of interest connected with it incidentally.

Since the last Conference I have visited and preached in 73 of our churches, and addressed 20 of our Sunday Schools. I took no collections, but tried to emphasize the doctrine and duty of Christian Education. I have received up to the date of this report, collections taken in pursuance of the instructions of the last Conference from 32 pastors, amounting to \$504.28. There will be others to report, no doubt, but it is not at all likely that one-half of the pastors will make any showing of having complied with what the Conference ordered to be done. It seems to me that it is clearly the duty of the Conference to go into this matter with more earnestness if it intends to succeed in it. Some change must evidently be made in the plan. Why do we need to seek out new devices? Is not the plan good enough for all other interests, good enough for this? Or is there any reason why our College should not be admitted to an equal place at our common table with the other children of the church?

And now as to the general idea of endowment, which is to come before the Conference for general discussion, I will not attempt to say anything here, but there are one or two things it will be proper to mention.

A pleasant item will come as a surprise to the Conference. It has been reported that the College has no endowment. This has been and is true in the strict sense. But for the last fourteen years we have been saving up odds and ends

of our finances and putting them away until now we have in the Savings Bank nearly \$5,000. This will do to lay our endowment on and keep the collections warm as they come in.

An effort has been started in another direction that promises further help to endowment. The bonds issued in 1898, bearing 2% interest and payable in 20 years, are very largely in the hands of friends of the College who have had the idea of giving them to the College at some time. We propose to approach these friends and ask them to give them now, promising on our part to pay them in full and turn the money over to the endowment fund. This plan will both pay our debt and create a fund. Already a beginning has been made and several thousand dollars of bonds have been promised. It is believed that it will be possible to acquire in this way at least ten thousand dollars. The College will set aside \$1,000 a year to redeem these bonds and pay it over to the endowment fund.

Another encouragement I would like to add to these, and I hope it may be understood and taken at a fair valuation. We should not go far wrong in saying that few Colleges pay their expenses. When Western Maryland pays it expenses, therefore, it deserves commendation. If in addition to paying its expenses it offers to meet its friends and give dollar for dollar towards creating an endowment fund, what does it deserve? I hope it will be the pleasure of the Conference to assess the charges an amount equal to ten cents a Sunday-school scholar for this purpose. From this assessment we might hope to realize fifteen hundred dollars. Now the College proposes to meet this amount by adding to it fifteen hundred dollars every year out of its current income, \$1,000 in payment of bonds as proposed above, and \$500 to deposit with the Conference collection. If we continue this for twenty years, simple interest at 3% will bring this fund to \$76,000.

REQUEST FROM TRUSTEES OF COLLEGE.

To the Maryland Annual Conference:

The Board of Trustees of Western Maryland College was greatly encouraged by the action of the last Conference in reference to the College. In response to that action, and especially that resolution which assures the Trustees of the willingness of the Conference to co-operate with them in any further plans for the endowment of the College, the Board was called into special session last February for the purpose of taking the whole subject into serious consideration.

The conclusions reached at that meeting were carefully considered and unanimously adopted. Among these were two requests to this Conference which the undersigned were appointed a committee to present:

- 1. To ask the Conference to include among its regular assessments one for the endowment of the College, and that the assessment be laid on the basis of five cents per Sunday-school member.
 - 2. To request the loan of Rev. A. D. Melvin, D. D., to act as Endowment,

Secretary. We shall desire to renew this application for three years, as we think by that time the plans will be in such shape that they may be left to work themselves out without a special agent.

With these two requests granted the Board will be ready to begin active operations for endowment in several directions, and with high hopes of success we earnestly trust the requests may be granted with the same unanimity they are made.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE WESTMINSTER THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

Twelve students have registered during the year. Senior Class, 4; Middle Class, 3; Junior Class, 5. One student comes from Ohio; one from Pennsylvania; one from New York; one from West Virginia; one from New Jersey; two from Virginia, and five from Maryland. The Graduating Class is composed of Philip Waxter Crosby, of Odenton, Maryland; Delmarter Marshall Dibble, of Rockville Center, New York; Harry Heffner Price, of Reading, Pennsylvania; and Silas Wright Rosenberger, of Tiffin, Ohio.

The regular curriculum has been supplemented by special instruction in the shape of a course of lectures: "Visiting the Sick," by Rev. A. D. Melvin, D. D.; "The Lord's Messengers," by Rev. S. J. Smith, D. D.; "I Have Learned —," by Rev. W. Sherman Phillips; "Personal Honesty," by Mr. Daniel Baker; "Nuggets From the Mine of Ministerial Experience," by Rev. F. T. Benson, A.M., B.D.; "The Authority of the Bible," by Rev. J. W. Trout; "The Preacher's Preparation," by Rev. J. H. Lucas, D. D., of the Pittsburg Conference, and "Pygmies and Giants," by Rev. G. E. McManiman, D. D., Secretary of the Board of Home Missions.

For the work of material improvements there has been received: Fairfax, \$12; Harrington, \$14; New Market, \$29.94—total \$55.94. This has been spent in the building of a poultry-house, a stockade wire-fence, the planting of fruit trees and the repairing of rooms.

The Prizes offered this year are: Extemporaneous Debate, Dr. E. J. Drinkhouse; Hebrew, Dr. J. W. Hering; New Testament Greek, Mr. E. O. Grimes; Thesis, Mr. J. Norman Wills, of Greensboro, North Carolina.

The \$100 Free-Scholarship plan is still supported and is awakening interest in new quarters. Our old friends—Trinity Church, Mr. Joseph D. Baker and Rev. N. T. Meginniss—continue their generous aid; and to meet the loss of other friends by death and other causes, new ones have come to the front—Chestertown Church, Dr. Joseph B. Watson, of St. Mary's, West Virginia, and the Alumni Association.

The Library has received gifts from Dr. D. L. Greenfield, Rev. C. S. Arnett and Rev. T. M. Beadenkoff, of Baltimore. From the estate of the late W. H. Starr, of Westminster, there has been received \$500, and from a generous layman who

will not permit the publication of his name, \$2,000. This money is to be invested for the benefit of the Free-Scholarship Fund. The President has visited and enlisted the support of the following Conferences: New York, New Jersey, North Carolina, West Virginia, Ohio, and Muskingum

The Board of Governors desire to express their appreciation of the moral and financial support given the Seminary by the pastors and churches. The Maryland Conference is doing a noble work in sustaining the bulk of the burden of maintaining an Institution which is furnishing educated ministers not only for her own borders but for her weaker sisters. As the Alumni scatter among the various Conferences they awaken interest in and support of the Seminary. The management is doing all possible to make the Seminary do the work you desire it to do, and, with your continued co-operation, it will year by year grow stronger and become, we believe, a source of pride to our denomination. The deficiency this year in the Maryland District is \$112.62. We recommend:

First—the assignment of H. L. Elderdice and B. F. Benson for the ensuing year.

Second—the continuance of the customary assessment of \$1800.

Third—that our churches observe a Day of Prayer that more young men may be called into the ministry.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS.

Your Board of Managers reports that it has carefully looked after the matters committed to its charge by the Society and the Conference.

First, it is our pleasure to state that at the request of the Trustees of North Baltimore Church we transferred to them the lease of the ground on which their church stands on Mt. Royal Avenue in the City of Baltimore. The legal title to that property is, therefore, now in the local board; and we confidently expect that the wise and liberal management of the pastor and people of that church will, e'er long, result in their owning that valuable property in fee.

Second, the Conference at its last session appropriated \$350.00 on the debt of Keen Memorial Church, ordering it to be paid through our Board. This wise action on the part of the Conference has enabled us to meet certain emergencies arising during the year, and has resulted in putting the debt on the property in more manageable shape. The claim against the ground has been refunded at a reduced rate of interest, saving to the congregation \$26.00 annually. One other claim against the church has also been reduced.

Should the Conference see fit to renew the appropriation for the ensuing year, making it payable through this Board as before, we think the Church and Board, po-operating heartily, will be able to show by the end of another year a very decided reduction, if not the entire extinction, of the floating debt.

OBITUARY.

Rev. William James Floyd.

Not long after the organization of the Methodist Protestant Church, and in Centreville, Md., where some of the leading spirits of the new organization made their home, William James Floyd was born, July 9, 1831. His father was a local preacher, and gifted in song-a gift which he exercised with power and effectiveness to the delight of the congregations where he worshipped. His children had such educational advantages only as the schools of that day could afford. At an early age William went to the city of Baltimore and learned a trade, at which he labored industriously for a number of years. He was married August 10, 1851, to Miss Elizabeth McCleary, in which relation he was happy up to the time of his death. Two children survive him, one of whom is Mrs. Alexander Clark, of Pocomoke City, and the other Mrs. W. F. Roberts, of Baltimore, Md.

At the revival held at Starr Church, in Baltimore, in the year 1867, by the late Rev. John R. Nichols, he was converted, and almost immediately began to exercise his gifts in prayer, in public address, and in Sunday-school work. Nature had given him a generous endowment, and when this was quickened by the Holy Spirit, he at once became an active, industrious and successful worker in the church. For a time he was suprintendent of the Sunday-school at Starr Church, but it was not long before his ability as a Christian worker was recognized outside of the local church, and he was invited to go to a place not far from Ellicott's City to organize a mission church. Here he labored for nearly two years without compensation, giving to it as much time as he could, without interfering with his work at his trade. By that time the mission had sufficiently developed to justify its recognition as one of the appointments of the Conference, and Brother Floyd had sufficiently proven his fidelity as a Christian and his competence and call as a minister that he was received into the itinerrouse, and ordained in 1821, and appointed as that he was received into the itinerancy, and ordained in 1881, and appointed as the pastor of Patapsco Mission. From that time to his death he preached faithfully and successfully-sometimes with much eloquence-and labored industriously and efficiently in various charges of the Conference. And to his great credit it may be said he invariably left his charge more aggressive and prosperous than he

His early advantages in education were few, but with a large fund of natural endowment, and a persevering spirit which shrunk from no obstables or difficulties. he made himself, in the province of God, an interesting, useful and effective minister of the Gospel. He made religion his business, and then he carried method, good judgment, conscience and religion into all the business affairs of his pastorate, winning for himself the enviable recognition of a wise, consistent and resourceful pastor. He did not know so much about books, but he knew the Bible, and he knew what a genuine and satisfying religious experience was, and its power in regenerating the life, and it was out of that abundant fullness that he preached, and he preached with power. The churches he served pay a willing and cheerful tribute to his force and effectiveness as a preacher, to his industry and resourcefullness as a pastor and to his fidelity, sincerity and consistency as a Christian gentleman. He went to the charges assigned him cheerfully and hopefully, trusting in God for His blessing, laboring actively and constantly for the upbuilding of Christ's kingdom, often serving some of the most laborious and difficult circuits and stations, and always without murmur or complaint. And he labored until the end. He was faithful unto death. He was a good soldier of Jesus Christ. Not once did he loiter in the ranks nor fall into the rear when the battle was on.

Brother Clark of the committee, says:

Brother Floyd was a very popular man, particularly so on Howard Circuit. He could gain the esteem of those who felt little, if any, interest in religion, and secured the friendship and confidence of all denominations, even the Catholic clergy. He was a great reader of human nature.

He died in the parsonage at Mariner's on Thursday morning, February 13, after an illness of about a week from hemorrhage of the stomach, aged seventy years, seven months and four days, leaving a wife and two children to mourn his departure. He was conscious to the last, and died peacefully and triumphantly. From

his wife we have the following:

"Thursday, February 5, he was taken sick with what was supposed to be a case of indigestion, which continued until the 12th, when he grew suddenly worse, and he suffered intense pain. His wife asked him, 'If the Lord sees fit to take you are you ready?' 'O yes,' he said, 'there is no trouble about that, but I am suffering.' His wife expressed sympathy for him, and sorrow that she could not afford him relief. To this he replied, 'Christ was perfected through suffering.' He continued to sink rapidly until early Thursday morning, at which time his sufferings were much relieved, and in the full possession of all his mental faculties, he said, 'Now, I would like to go to sleep and wake up in heaven,' and that is what actually happened."

A funeral service was held at Mariner's Church on Friday afternoon, February 14. It was held at the urgent request of the people he had served so faithfully, and was attended by seven ministers and a great throng of people. Some tender tributes were paid to his memory and the service was profoundly impressive. The next day the final service was held at Starr Church, Baltimore, under the direction of the president of the Conference. Addresses were made by Dr. Southerland, Dr. Drinkhouse and Dr. Tagg, after which he was buried at Mt. Olivet Cemetery.

Farewell, dear brother, thou hast gone out of the shadow into the sunshine! Many of thy brethren, co-workers, in the flesh, have gone before thee. Now thou hast joined them in their immortal home. After a little while others of us, thy brethren, will join thee in the shadowless land and sing with thee the triumphs which thou hast tasted before us. We sorrow, but we sorrow not as those who have no hope. Thou art absent from the body, but we know thou art with the Lord.

Peace, peace, thou art not dead, thou dost not sleep!
Thou hast wakened from the dream of life.
'Tis we who lost in stormy visions keep
With phantoms an unprofitable strife.
Thou hast outsoared the shadows of our night;
Envy and calumny and hate and pain,
And that unrest which men miscall delight,
Can touch thee not nor torture yet again.
From the contagion of the world's slow stain
Thou art secure, and now can'st never mourn
A heart grown cold, a head grown gray—in vain.

Rev. Jesse Shreeve.

Through fifty-five years this name has been on the roll of the living ministry of the Maryland Annual Conference. Now it must be transferred to the lengtheniug list of revered and honored names on the "dead roll." In his superannuation the church and the world have known little of him, but the name will call up before thousands of good men and women the presence of this gentle, sweet-spirited, saintly man of God. How we will miss, in our Conference gathering, his familiar face and cordial greeting; but how blessed the fellowship he enjoys with the good men who have preceded him to the upper sanctuary.

Brother Shreeve was the son of Joseph and Comfort Shreeve, and was born near Sandymount, Carroll county, Md., January 22, 1824. His mother was a native of Baltimore county, but the father came from New Jersey and belonged to a Quaker family.

He was converted when 15 years old, and became a member of Sandymount M. P. Church, on what was then known as West Baltimore Circuit. From this charge he received his license to preach, and, subsequently, his recommendation to the annual Conference.

He began his public ministry under the direction of the president of the Conference as assistant to Dr. David Wilson on Alleghany (now called Bedford) Circuit in 1846. In 1847 he was received into Conference and appointed as assistant on New Market Circuit. Then his appointments, uninterrupted through fifty years, were in this order: 1848-9, Potomac; 1850-1, Talbot; 1852-3, Jefferson; 1854-5, East Baltimore; 1856-60, Washington street; 1861-3, Broadway; 1864-6, Newtown; 1867-70, Washington street; 1871-3, Susquehanna; 1874-7, North Carolina Avenue; 1878-82, Frederick; 1883-6, Liberty; 1887-90, Howard; 1891-4, Chesapeake; 1895-7, Kennedyville; 1898, superannuated.

There is interesting and thrilling history, never to be fully written in this world, in connection with some of these pastorates. In the midst of the weakness and wickedness of this world he stood heroically for righteousness, purity and peace among men. God gave him some wonderful victories. He did something for God and humanity. The blessed results of his ministry were seen of all men in his day, and we can put our hands on them to-day.

The greatest triumphs of the ministry were in the cities. The rushing tides of humanity about him seemed to arouse in activity all his powers of mind and heart. Hence he seized the opportunity to win men to Christ and enlist them in the work of God's kingdom. And he was eminently successful. While pastor at East Baltimore he reached out in missionary effort toward Southeast Baltimore, and soon he gathered the crowds, who were glad to hear him, in an engine-house. Hundreds were converted and Washington Street Church was organized. Subsequently, while pastor of the latter church, he planted and nurtured Broadway. And to-day these churches stand as monuments to his loyalty to Christ and the church of his choice; to his industry and devotion to the welfare of humanity. The same marvellous power attended his ministry at North Carolina Avenue, Washington. The church would not hold the people. They had to be gathered on the open square under a great canvas. And hundreds were lead to Christ in the meeting. And down to old age his ministry was fruitful. On Chesapeake, and at Kennedyville, his last two charges, he did some of the best work of his life. What was the secret of this wonderful success? We may not understand fully now, but some things are manifest: He was a devout, prayerful man. He lived close to God. Spirituality, humility, intense earnestness were characteristics of his life. Paul's paradox may explain it, "When I am week then am I strong."

As a preacher of the Gospel, Bro. Shreeve was simple, earnest and persuasive. He made no claim to scholarship. He did not attempt oratory, or any attractive declamation. He was, in his own estimation, simply a messenger, with a message

from God to men. And he delivered it so earnestly and lovingly that the people listened and were greatly moved.

In Conference his voice was seldom heard. He was willing that others should

plan and direct, and he would go cheerfully where he was sent.

Bro. Shreeve married early in his ministry, Miss Margaret Hoffman, an estimable lady of Baltimore. She died in less than one year. Nine years afterward he married Miss Emily C. Taylor, of Baltimore county. She was a noble Christian woman, and went a little more than a year in advance of him into the heavenly home. They had four children, two of them died in tender childhood, and the other two are living. The son, Dr. Shreeve, lives and practices medicine in Uniontown, Md., and the daughter, Lula, is the wife of Mr. Laurence Stevens, near Rock Hall, Kent county, Md.

Bro. Shreeve, had, at different times, been the pastor of the three laymen on this committee. They all testify alike to his Godly work among the people, and his earnest, faithful and successful ministry of the Word.

He spent the last few months of his life at the mome of Mr. and Mrs. Chaney.

He was tenderly nursed by Sister Chaney, who was like a daughter to him.

Rev. J. M. Gray and Rev. A. N. Ward, who were near him, saw him frequently and the former administered the sacrament to him in the home. He looked forward to death with perfect composure. He did not talk much about his departure, but one remark that was very characteristic was, "It gives me great comfort now to know that the Lord has been able to use me for His own glory."

He closed his eyes upon all earthly things in the quiet twilight hours of Sunday, March 9th. The funeral services were conducted at North Carolina Avenue Church, on 11th inst. The president of the Conference, and Rev. Mr. Hammond, of the M. E. Church South, and our ministers in the District participated in them. On Wednesday the body was taken to Kent county, and laid by the side of his good wife's remains in the beautiful cemetery of Wesley Chapel. Dr. J. L. Elderdice, the pastor, conducted the burial service.

Mrs. Elizabeth Nichols.

Mrs. Elizabeth Nichols, widow of Rev. John R. Nichols, closed her life on earth the 6th of October, 1901, at the old home, near Odeuton, Anne Arundel Co., Md. She was born near Philadelphia, Pa., June 9, 1820, and was, therefore, in her eighty-second year when she died. She was active in mind and body until a few weeks of the end, and her interest in the church never abated. In the churchyard of Nichols' Memorial, which was hallowed ground to her, we laid all that was mortal of her by the side of her honored husband and their grand-children. maiden name was Wood. There were eight sons and daughters in the family. All the others had preceded her to the spirit world. She was married to Rev. John R. Nichols by Rev. J. W. Everest, January 20th, 1842. More than fifty years the wife of a laborious and faithful itinerant in the Methodist Protestant Church. Her married life, beginning in the days when itinerancy meant long journeys, hard work, small salaries, and few of the comforts of some. A life sacrifice and heroic work for God and the church. Those, however, were the days of power and triumph in the itinerant ministry. She entered heartily into this life of toil and sacrifice, and nobly did the best she could in the environments of such a life. She was a devoted wife and mother. Six children were born to them. Three of them died early in life, and three sons survive the mother. "She looked well to the ways of her household." Her home was always attractive, and she was "given to hospitality." She was ambitious for her husband; she fully appreciated his character and efficient labors, and thought the largest and best work of the church was not too large nor too good for him. She was, like all who are dependent upon Conference appointments, sometimes disappointed, but she was steadfast in devotion to the churches and the work Providentially assigned them. Since the death of Bro. Nichols she has remained on their little farm, with some of her grand-children as companions and helpers. The evening time of life has been quiet and lonely. She held fast to the faith of her youth and active years, and found comfort and hope in it. Her face had long been turned toward the heavenly city, and in these last days there was no wavering in her purpose. Father and mother are now together where the feebleness of age and death are unknown. May the three sons who remain and the grand-children follow them as they followed Christ, and at last constitute an unbroken family circle in the heavenly kingdom. The three ministerial members of this committee conducted the funeral services in the presence of a large congregation of neighbors and friends in the Nichols' Memorial Church.

Mrs. Anna May Donophin Parris, beloved wife of Rev. J. W. Parris, of the Maryland Annual Conference, was taken from earth to heaven on Monday, October 21, 1901, aged 41 years, 8 months and 29 days, having been born January 22, 1860. She professed religion in her girlhood and united in a probationary relation with the Methodist Episcopal Church. She was married September 22, 1880. In 1883 she renewed her covenant with God in the Methodist Protestant Church, and united with Harrington Church on December 12, of that year under the pastorate of Rev. C. S. Arnett.

Never strong and robust, but of a frail, nervous temperament, the last several months of her life here were spent in intense weakness and suffering. Her fatal illness dated from February 6, of this year, when she was attacked with la grippe, a complication of diseases following. All that a loving husband could do was done for her both in seeking the very best medical skill and aid, and in tender care and assiduous attention. But God knew best; for He took her and "she is not." She died in the faith. At the beginning of the end she was not reconciled to go because she said: "I want so much to live for my boys and my husband." But later the true Christian spirit of resignation came, and she left this assuring testimony: "Jesus is going to take me home. He has a much better home for me than this." She is survived by her husband and two sons, several children having preceded her to "that beautiful land."

Rev. J. F. Bryan writes: "Sister Parris was of a quiet and reserved disposition, and had to be known to be appreciated. It has been my privilege to have spent some time in their home on several occasions, assisting her husband in his work.

I shall ever remember those visits with pleasure. She was hospitable and kind, always trying to make one feel at home. She was a true and affectionate wife, and a loving, tender, indulgent mother. As a wife of a minister she was always interested in his chosen work, sympathizing and encouraging him in his labors for the Master and lost souls."

Mr. C. B. Zepp, of Clarksville, where she spent her last days, sends this tribute: "During her last months she was in constant pain, yet she never complained. Always trusting in God, she found His grace equal to her cross. When she had come to the dark valley she assured her loved ones that she had no fear of death, having the comfort of His rod and His staff. Though but a short time on Howard Circuit, and being an invalid, yet the people had learned to love her, and we realize in the fullest sense the great loss we have sustained in the death of such a noble woman." Rev. J. F. Holland and Mr. T. M. Jett also pay tender tributes to her memory. Funeral services were held in Harrington Church, conducted by the chairman of this committee, after which interment was made in Hollywood Cemetery.

Mrs. Margaret Freeman Nicholson, wife of Rev. J. E. Nicholson, of the Maryland Annual Conference, departed this life at Finksburg, Carroll county, Md., at 11 o'clock, P. M., of Thursday, November 14, 1901. The clock on the mantel was striking the hour as the redeemed spirit of this lovely Christian woman took its Sister Nicholson was the daughter of Major W. flight to mansions in the skies Allen, a prominent citizen of Seaford, Del., and was born January 26, 1841. She was married June 29, 1865, and though brought up under Protestant Episcopal influences, she professed conversion at the breaking up of the Shiloh camp-meeting on Friday morning, in the month of August, 1869, and subsequently united with our church in Seaford. She was the mother of seven children, four sons and three daughters, all of whom are still living, but only two daughters were with her at her death, the others being far from home. The distressing malady that terminated her life assumed a dangerous form nearly two years ago, and though everything was done by physicians and specialists and nurses, both in hospital and at home, to alleviate her suffering and effect a cure, still all was of no avail. Her sufferings at times were very severe, but she bore them all with wonderful composure and a confident assurance that these "light afflictions, which are but for a moment, would work out for her a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory." Sister Nicholson was a model wife and companion, devoted to the welfare of her husband and children, a splendid housekeeper, and an admirable hostess in entertaining company. Every guest who entered her house was received with a bright smile, a hearty welcome, and made to feel at home, and many a weary itinerant in traveling to and from their fields of labor, and having occasion to pass through Seaford, almost invariably tarried a day or so for refreshment and rest in her hospitable dwelling. In the church also she was an admirable helpmate to her husband, and in every possible way that she could be useful she was ready to respond, and whereever her lot was cast she won the affection of the membership and people generally by her splendid social qualities and untiring efforts to promote their welfare,

and, as a consequence, her praise was in all the churches. Of this noble woman I will now quote the following beautiful tributes from other members of the committee, who, like myself, knew her so long and well. Rev. D. W. Anstine, pastor of Trinity charge, writes: "She was one of the few about whose Christian character too much cannot be said; what she did and how much she accomplished for the Master will not be known until it is revealed in the great beyond, and the beauty of it all was she did not seem to think she was doing anything. I believe she fulfilled that part of the Scripture which says: 'When ye have done all these things, say we are unprofitable servants.' Sister Nicholson has gone to be with Christ, but her works do follow her, and the sweet memories of her beautiful home life, her devoted Christian life, her charming social life will ever linger with us, and, like the sweet fragrance of the springtime, flowers will continue to sweeten the life of those who were so fortunate as to know her on earth." Rev. H. L. Elderdice, presi ent of the seminary at Westminster, writes: "Her cheerfulness and amiability were sunbeams in which no shadow could linger long. As a wife she was loving, as a mother she was devoted, and as a friend she was constant. When the time came to leave the home in which she enjoyed all the comforts of wealth, to share the uncertain home of the itinerant preacher, her cheerfulness and amiability did not desert her, and to these she added a rare tact which made her, indeed, a helpmeet for her husband on the various fields of labor he served. During the last few months of her suffering I saw her frequently, and found her still thoughtful of others, with all her old-time unselfishness. She has two immortalities, the one she leaves to us, and the other she has entered upon." Bro. Ara P. Bowen, a prominent layman on Snow Hill charge, pays her memory this tribute, "Richly endowed by nature she was a queen in society and a leader in whatever circle she moved, untiring in her devotion to her husband and the cause she served, almost constantly attending him in his pastoral work and bore uncomplaining the trials and privations of itinerant life. Her labors for the upbuilding of the work on Snow Hill charge will long be remembered; none knew her but to honor and love her, and none named her but to praise. She has left her impress upon the hearts of this people that time cannot efface." The following from the pen of Bro. Wm. B. Hartley, of First Church, Washington, is also appended: "Our acquaintance extended over a period of fourteen years, four of them as my pastor's wife. We could truly say she was all that anyone could wish. In the Sabbath school, where she was a successful and much loved teacher, in the primary department, in the C. E. Society, and every place where she could help the needy or relieve the distressed, and who that has met our sister socially, but admired her gracious hospitality. Our whole church sincerely mourns her loss." The closing moments of life were calm and peaceful, retaining her consciousness and thoughfulness for the comfort and welfare of others to the last. To her husband and the children who were summoned to her bed side, loving words of counsel were said, and sentiments of affectionate appreciation expressed for kind attention received, and then gradually drifting out, the end being at hand, the parting spirit at near the midnight hour on that star-lit November night, made its way up to the realms of everlasting day. Her lifeless form was conveyed back to Seaford, the home of her early childhood, and after appropriate funeral services in our church, conducted by Rev. A. D. Melvin, president of the Conference, and Rev. D. W. Anstine and J. W. Balderston, pastor of the church, it was laid to test at near the sunset hour in the Odd Fellows' Cemetery to await the glory and grandeur of the resurrection morning.

MANUAL.

RULES OF ORDER

FOR THE

Government of the Maryland Annual Conference.

ORGANIZATION OF CONFERENCE.

1. Pastors shall send to the Secretary of the Annual Conference the certificate of election of the delegate or delegates to the Annual Conference immediately after the election of the same. He shall also send the name to the President of the Conference and the pastor of the church where the Conference is held.

2. The Secretary shall make a list of the delegates so certified, omitting all contested cases; and this list, together with the list of the ministerial members, shall constitute the roll of Conference upon which the Conference shall organize.

OFFICERS OF THE CONFERENCE.

Rule I-Duties of the President:-

1. To take the chair precisely at the hour agreed on at the last adjournment.
2. Preserve the most rigid order, and confine the members to the subject under consideration.

3. Not allow improper personalities nor reflections upon any religious communities.

4. Announce each person rising to speak as soon as he shall have addressed the chair by declaring him "The minister from —," or "The delegate from —."

5. State a question sitting, but stand when the question is put and taken; also when he states a point of order, and also when he makes any formal communication to the Conference.

6. Is not allowed to vote when a question is taken unless there be a tie, but he may vote in case of ballot.

7. May call any member to the chair when he wishes to participate in debate or for other purposes, but such person shall not be entitled to the chair after adjumment

8. There shall be a meeting on Tuesday evening before the meeting of the Annual Conference in the interest of Temperance. On Wednesday evening (the first day of the session) there shall be a meeting in the interest of Sunday-Schools and Christian Endeavor; on Thursday evening, in the interest of Literature and Education; on Friday evening, in the interest of Missions, and on Monday evening, in the interest of Ministerial Support.

The President shall appoint a chairman for each of these meetings, who shall secure speakers, preside at the meeting and make all other necessary arrange-

9. The office of stationing the ministers and preachers is committed to the hands of the President of the Conference.

10. It shall be the duty of the President to fill blanks in statistical reports for all charges unsupplied.

11. In the event of the death of any ministerial member the President shall immediately appoint an Obituary Committee from any number of the most intimate acquaintances of the deceased.

12. The failure of the President to visit any charge does not vitiate his right to the amount assessed for his salary.

13. The President shall represent the general interests of the Conference, and shall present their claims in such a manner and at such times as in his judgment may be necessary. And he shall use his utmost efforts with the Quarterly Conferences of the various charges to secure a salary of not less than \$600 for the minister with family, appointed as pastor, who has itinerated five years within the bounds of the Maryland Conference, and he shall urge upon the various charges the prompt payment of the salaries of the pastors.

Rule II-Duties of the Secretary:-

1. To perform such duties as are usually required of the Secretary of a delib-

erative.body.

2. Should the President not be in place at the hour of meeting the Secretary, or in his absence one of his assistants, shall announce the fact, and the Conference shall elect a chairman "pro tempore" and proceed to business.

3. Have charge of all the papers belonging to the Conference and be account-

able for them.

4. Be in his place precisely at the hour agreed on at the last adjournment.

5. Keep an accurate list of members of the Conference.

6. Keep correct minutes of the proceedings of the Conference, including all written resolutions, whether adopted or rejected, and the mover and seconder of all written resolutions.

7. Keep a list of business, on which he shall record all business brought before

the Conference and in the order of its presentation.

8. Keep a list of committees, on which he shall record: First, the standing committees in the order of their arrangement in these rules, and second, all other committees that may be appointed, and in the order of their appointment.

9. Keep a correct list of the Circuits and Stations, to be used as occasion may

require.

10. Report to the Conference any unfinished business of the preceding annual session.

11. Be a member of the Committee on the Publication of the Minutes.

12. Supply the pastors with blanks.

COMMITTEES.

Rule III-All committees shall be appointed by the President, except when otherwise directed in the Book of the Discipline, or by special vote of the Con-

Rule IV-Standing Committees:-

Finance—2 Ministers, 3 Laymen.
 Itinerancy and Orders—The Faculty of Instruction.

3. Pulpit Service-3 Ministers.

- 4. Church Extension—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. 5. Superannuates-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. 6. Literature-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.
- 7. Sunday Schools—3 Ministers, 2 Laymen. 8. Temperance—3 Ministers, 2 Laymen.
- 9. Benevolent Agencies—3 Ministers, 2 Laymen. 10. Fraternal Relations—3 Ministers, 2 Laymen.11. Official Character—3 Ministers, 2 Laymen.

12. Statistics—1 Minister, 1 Layman.

13. Obituaries-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. This committee not to be appointed until the death of some minister requires it. 14. Education—3 Ministers, 2 Laymen.

- 15. Committee on Missions-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen. President's Report—2 Ministers, 1 Layman.
 Sabbath Observance—3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.
- 18. Committee on Credentials-1 Minister, 2 Laymen. 19. Christian Endeavor Work-3 Ministers, 3 Laymen.
- 20. Publication of Minutes—The Secretary and 2 Ministers. 21. Committee on Transportation.

22. Committee on Church Enterprises-2 Ministers, 3 Laymen.

Rule V—Any person being a member of two committees shall have the right to decline an appointment to another.

MOTIONS.

Rule VI—Every motion shall be written, signed and read aloud by the mover, handed to the chair and read aloud by the Secretary, before any order can be taken upon it by the Conference; except motions for amendment, to lie on the table, the previous question, or to adjourn.

Rule VII—Any motion may be divided, if the sense will admit of the proposed division.

Rule VIII—When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, but to adjourn, to lie on the table, for the previous question, to commit, to substitute, to amend, or to make the order of the day; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand in this rule; the first three to be taken without debate; and the first always in order. But when the report of a committee has been under discussion, the motion to lay on the table shall not prevail until the chairman of the committee shall have been heard once on the subject, if he desires to speak.

Rule IX—The question under discussion shall be put whenever a call for it is made by five brethren, and sustained by a majority of the Conference.

Rule X—When motions are made for reference of the same subject to a select committee, and to a standing committee, the question on reference to the standing committee shall be first put.

Rule XI—No motion to commit, or to lie on the table, being decided, shall be again allowed, on the same day, at the same stage of the proposition.

Rule XII—A motion, after it is seconded, is the property of the Conference, and the mover has no power to withdraw or have it amended, without leave.

Rule XIII—No amendment shall be in order, further than an amendment to the amendment.

Rule XIV—In filling up blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be first put. In balloting, blanks shall be rejected and not reported by the tellers.

DECORUM.

Rule XV—When a member desires to present any business, or to speak to any question, he shall arise and address the chair, "Brother President," and then pause until he is announced to the Conference; after which he may proceed addressing the chair, and restricting his remarks to the subject before the Conference.

Rule XVI—If two or more members rise at the same time, the President shall determine which of them is entitled to the floor.

Rule XVII—No interruption shall be allowed while a member is addressing the chair, except a call to order by the President or by a member.

Rule XVIII—When a member is called to order he shall take his seat immediately, and be silent, until the President or member who made the call shall state the rule of order supposed to be infringed; after which the member called to order shall have the right to explain, and the President shall decide.

Rule XIX—In deciding a question of order the President shall restrict himself to the rules of order, and any member declared to be out of order by the President may, if he obtain a second, appeal to the Conference. The question on such appeal shall be taken without debate, but the appellant may state the ground of his appeal. If the Conference sustains the chair, the member shall be allowed to proceed only in order.

Rule XX—No member shall speak oftener than twice to the same question, without special leave of the Conference, nor longer than fifteen minutes at any one time, unless by the same special permission.

Rule XXI—No member shall be allowed to explain remarks made in previous speech, except in regular debate, unless the member replying thereto requests it, or unless another member requests.

Rule XXII—Any member shall have the right to call or the reading of the subject under consideration.

Rule XXIII—Every member shall report at roll call of the first day's session, and be present at the daily sessions of Conference.

Rule XXIV—After the affirmative of a question has been put, any member who has not spoken before to the question may rise and speak before the negative is put.

Rule XXV—A member may change his vote at any time before the chair announces the decision of the question.

ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR THE ANNUAL SESSION.

Rule XXVI—At 9 o'clock A. M., on the day to which the Conference adjourned from the last annual session, the President shall open the Conference by reading a portion of the Word of God, singing and prayer.

Rule XXVII:-

1. Examination of the President. The President shall call another minister to the chair and read his annual report. The chairman shall then address the Conference thus: "Brethren, you have heard the report of the President; shall his character pass?" In case of any charge against the official character of the President, it shall be handed to the Standing District Committee; and the chairman of that committee shall answer the question, "Shall his character pass?"

2. Roll Call. The roll shall then be called, including the Dead Roll. In the event of the death of any member of this Conference the President shall appoint some member to formally announce the fact to the Conference, and such announcement shall be made when the name of the deceased is reached in the calling of the Conference Roll, and the same shall then, on motion, be transferred to the Dead Roll by the Secretary in the presence of the Conference, and when the name is reached on the Dad Roll an order of the day shhall be named for memorial services for the deceased.

Rule XXVIII—At 10:30 o'clock on the first day of each session of the Annual Conference the President, or his substitute, shall preach a sermon, and immediately thereafter the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper shall be administered. The President shall also appoint some one to preach the Ordination Sermon at 11 A. M. on Sunday.

Rule XXIX—At 2:30 o'clock P. M. on the first day of the session, the officers of the Conference shall be elected by ballot as follows: 1. President. 2. Secretary. 3. Conference Steward. 4. Church Extension Steward. 5. Superannuated Fund Steward. 6. Foreign Missionary Steward. 7. General Home Missionary Steward. 8. Educational Steward. 9. Our Church Home Steward. 10. Bible and Tract Steward. The Board of Stewards elected at one session to serve the following session of Conference, and the Conference Steward to appoint an assistant. 11. Standing District Committee, consisting of three elders and three laymen. 12. Committee of Appeals, three ministers and three laymen.

Rule XXX—Examination of Official Character. The roll shall be called and the pastors shall deposit their reports, and the collections prescribed by the Conference, each in a sealed envelope, upon which shall be marked the amount, the name of the collection, the name of the pastor and the name of the charge in the box of the Conference Steward. The reports and charges against official character shall be handed to the Committee on Official Character. Pastors, whose official reports are defective in any point, shall be summoned before the committee to explain, and only those cases in which explanation may be unsatisfactory to the committee shall be reported to the Conference, and the characters of all ministers whose names are not reported shall be considered passed.

ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR THE DIURNAL SESSION.

Rule XXXI—The Conference shall be opened each day by reading the Scriptures, singing a hymn, and prayer.

Rule XXXII—The reading of the Minutes of the preceding day for correction shall be first in order.

Rule XXXIII—The President shall then announce that it is in order for delegates to present any business from the churches they represent; when any delegate, upon recognition by the Chair, may present any business, it shall be recorded without debate on the list of business.

Rule XXXIV—The business next in order shall be the Reports of Committees, called for in the order in which they stand on the List of Committees. They shall not report at any other time without special leave.

Rule XXXV—When any business is laid before the Conference it may be made the order of the day for any other day of the session and at a specific hour.

Rule XXXVI—Unfinished business from the last annual session shall have precedence of all business except the order of the day.

Rule XXXVII—Ordinary business shall have precedence in the order in which it stands on the List of Business.

Rule XXXVIII—When any business is taken into consideration it shall not be interrupted by any other business except the order of the day or by adjournment.

Rule XXXIX—When there are present Fraternal Messengers and other visitors to whom the courtesy of formal recognition is due, the Chairman of the Committee on Fraternal Relations shall quietly inform the President, whereupon the President may request the visitors to be brought to him, to be by him introduced to the Conference, either at that time or when the state of business may with more propriety be arrested.

DUTIES OF STEWARDS.

1. The Conference Steward, Church Extension Steward, Superannuated Fund Steward, Foreign Missionary Steward, General Home Missionary Steward, Educational Steward, Our Church Home Steward, and Bible and Tract Steward, shall constitute a Conference Board of Stewards, to whom the Secretary shall hand all reports and collections as received from pastors.

2. The Board of Stewards shall meet on Thursday morning at 10 o'clock and open the envelopes containing the various collections, count the money enclosed, noting its agreement with the statement of the official report, and on the envelope, and prepare a report of collections to the Conference. The money in hand shall then be passed to the persons designated by the Conference to receive it, and the Reports to the Committee on Official Reports.

3. Other duties belonging to the several Stewards shall be performed and reported upon separately as now.

DUTIES OF PASTORS.

1. The pastor shall seek the co-operation of the Stewards in collecting the assessments made by the Annual Conference, admonishing them of their duty in this matter as contained in the Discipline, under the head of "Duties of Stewards," pp. 116-17.

2. It is the duty of pastors to examine and see that suitable deeds be had for all churches, so as to secure them to the Methodist Protestant Church, and, whenever possible, have them incorporated.

3. Pastors are required to apportion the President's salary equitably among the several appointments, and use their utmost endeavors to collect the same before the annual visit of the President.

4. Pastors are required to see that the families belonging to their respective charges are duly supplied with the Catechism of our Church.

5. Pastors are instructed to ascertain of those received into the Church whether they have been baptized, and if not, to administer the ordinance of baptism without unnecessary delay.
6. Every pastor is required to do his utmost to collect the full amount of the

assessments made upon his charge, whatever may be the difficulties that he

may encounter.

7. It is the duty of the pastor to preside on the trial of an accused unstationed

minister or preacher.

8. Pastors are required to report to the Annual Conference the amounts contributed to Foreign Missions by the auxiliaries of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, and due credit shall be given the Minutes.

EXPENSES OF CONFERENCE.

The churches shall be assessed in a sum sufficient to meet the incidental expenses, including the publication of the Minutes-each church receiving Minutes in proportion to the amount contributed.

ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR QUARTERLY CONFERENCES.

The Conference shall be opened by reading a portion of the Word of God and prayer, after which the business shall proceed in the following order:—

1. Call the roll, noting those present and absent.

2. Read minutes of last meeting.

3. Make necessary corrections in official list.

4. Consider objections to official character.5. At first Quarterly Conference elect a Secretary, an Advisory Committee and Committee on Examinations.

6. Hear reports-

a. From pastor and associates.

b. From superannuates.

c. From unstationed ministers, preachers and exhorters.

d. From class-leaders, S. S. Superintendents and Presidents of C. E. Societies.

e. From Trustees and Stewards.

7. Hear and decide on appeals.

8. Inquire faithfully whether candidates for exhorter's and preacher's license for itinerancy and orders pursue the prescribed course of study and reading.

9. Grant and renew licenses.

10. Recommend to Board of Ministerial Education.11. Recommend for orders and itinerancy.

- 12. Consider applications of ministers and preachers who desire to become members of this Quarterly Conference.
 - 13. Hear suggestions from Advisory Committee. 14. Inquire why church property is not insured.

15. Incidental business.

16. Fix place for next Quarterly Conference.17. Adjourn with benediction.

SUFFRAGE AND ELIGIBILITY.

1. Every minister, preacher and member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-one years shall be entitled to vote in all cases.

2. All members in full communion and fellowship shall have the right to vote in the election of their class-leaders; and those who have attained the age of twenty-one years shall be "qualified members" for the purpose indicated in Section 3 of Article IV of the Constitution, and in divisions 1 and 4 of "General Duties of Trustees," found on pages 114 and 115 of Discipline.

3. Every minister, preacher and lay male member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-five years shall be eligible as a rep-

resentative in the General Conference.

4. Every member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-one years shall be eligible as a Steward, Class-leader and Sunday-school Superintendent; and every male member in full communion and fellowship having attained the age of twenty-one years shall be eligible as a Trustee and a Delegate to the Annual Conference.

5. No minister shall be eligible to the office of President of the Annual Conference until he shall have faithfully exercised the office of Elder two years.

ADMINISTERING ORDINANCES.

No person, in virtue merely of a license to preach, or even election to orders, is empowered to administer or assist in administering the Christian ordinances.

UNSTATIONED MINISTERS.

The Conference will not recognize as a minister of the Methodist Protestant Church any man who does not bring credentials from some other orthodox de-nomination, or who has not received suitable testimonials of ministerial character from our own Church. In returning the list of ministers and preachers, pastors shall name no person who does not possess the foregoing qualifications.

LOTTERIES.

The practice of raising funds for church purposes, by means of lotteries and other games of hazard, is disapproved by the Conference, and pastors are enjoined to discountenance their use.

MORTGAGING CHURCH PROPERTY.

The placing of mortgages upon church property, for the purpose, directly or indirectly, of paying the pastor's salary, is, so far as it has authority, disallowed by the Conference.

OBITUARIES.

1. It shall be the duty of the Committee, appointed in accordance with the Rule of Conference, to prepare an obituary, without delay, containing a notice of the place and date of the birth of the brother, the date of his conversion, receiving license to preach, and his reception into the Conference, together with any other important facts connected with his history which their judgment may dictate, in addition to the particulars of his death, and said obituary shall at once be forwarded to the "Methodist Protestant" for publication, and be reported to the ensuing session of Conference.

2. Every ministerial member of this Conference is hereby requested to make

and keep by him a record of his nativity, and of all the prominent acts in his

Christian and ministerial history.

3. The obituaries of wives and widows of the ministerial members of the Conference shall also be published in the Minutes.

MOTIONS TO FIX TIME AND PLACE.

All motions to fix time and place of the meeting of the Annual Conference shall lie on the table twenty-four hours.

MARRIAGES.

The Conference cannot encourage any of its members to expect support as married men until they shall have served at least four years in the itinerancy.

TITLES AND DEGREES.

Inasmuch as the degree of Doctor of Philosophy is the badge of University work and most rigid examinations—a degree which our better Colleges refuse to confer, and Universities do not confer for honor, but only for merit in ad-"anced special studies—we feel sure no worthy institution would confer such a title for work done by correspondence, and the man who consents to bear a title so conferred subjects himself to the ridicule of scholars and involves the ministry in a charge of vanity and insincerity. Therefore, this Conference expresses its disapproval of this method of obtaining degrees, and declines to recognize in any way a title so obtained.

CAMP-MEETINGS.

Camp meetings shall have the sanction of Conference and receive ministerial aid from it on the following conditions:-

1. There shall be no traffic on the Lord's day on the camp-ground or the adjacent territory protected by the laws of the State.

2. The managers or other officers of the camp-meeting shall not bargain for or receive any portion of the money paid to railroads, or to the owner or owners of any conveyance or conveyances, as a consideration for conveying persons

to the camp-ground, or the vicinity thereof, on the Lord's day.

4. No advertisement of the running of trains on the Lord's day shall be made by any of the persons referred to in the preceding paragraphs, nor shall anything be done by their authority or solicitation to contravene the foregoing regulations.

5. Upon receiving from a quarterly conference a request for ministerial supply and a pledge that the above regulations will be faithfully observed, the President of the Annual Conference shall appoint members of this Conference to assist in conducting the camp-meeting.

In the absence of a request and a pledge such as are named above, the President shall not appoint such ministerial supply, nor shall any member of this

Conference conduct such camp-meeting as pastor.

Appointees to camp-meeting service must be given four weeks' notice of their appointment. If they find it inconvenient to attend they shall promptly present their excuse to the President. If the President declines to revoke their appointment, a failure to attend shall be reported to this Conference by the President.

MISSIONARY REGULATIONS.

1. Contributions for church extension shall be sent to the Treasurer of the Church Extension Society, that he may disburse the funds to the missionaries according to their various claims.

2. Pastors are instructed to have the Church Extension collections in the hands of the Treasurer by the end of the second quarter of the conference year.

3. The Committee on Church Extension shall ascertain what amount of funds

may be regarded as available for church extension purposes the ensuing year.

4. Appropriations shall not exceed the amount which may reasonably be ex-

pected from collections and interest on legacies.

- 5. The Church Extension Society of this Conference shall elect seven Trustees for each mission, who shall hold all the property on our mission fields in trust of said Society, and yearly thereafter select a new Board of Trustees as long as the mission relation is sustained. But whenever the mission shall become a circuit or station, the "qualified members," at a meeting regularly called for the purpose, shall have the power to elect their own Trustees, to whom the Trustees appointed by the Church Extension Society shall surrender the church property, together with the books, papers or other valuables held by them as Trustees
- 6. When any number of the members of any of our missions shall, through disaffection or from other causes, form themselves into classes, withholding themselves from the means of grace or suffer themselves to be led by those who refuse to attend the official meetings of the church, or shall in any other way walk disorderly, on a charge being brought against such person or persons, the missionary shall see that the accused are tried according to Discipline trial of members. But should the class, of which the accused is a member, refuse or neglect to select two of their number to serve on the committee of trial, then the missionary shall fill the committee by having them selected from any other class in the mission, or from an adjoining station or circuit, as he may think proper, and should the accused be found guilty he, she or they shall be suspended or expelled, as the committee may direct. And should the entire mission become refractory the missionary shall be authorized to select them according to the provision of the Discipline for trial of churches; provided, however, that the person convicted shall in this, and in all cases where the trial is by jury, have an appeal to the Quarterly Conference of the church from which the committee of trial is selected, at the session next ensuing, whose decision shall be final.

7. Missions shall hold Quarterly Conferences.

8. When a charge is preferred against any member of the church the missionary shall see that the accused is tried in accordance with the regulations of the Discipline for the trial of members.

9. Any mission having a missionary shall be entitled to one delegate to the Annual Conference, provided the missionary have a seat, who shall be elected by the qualified members of the mission, at least two weeks preceding the session of the Annual Conference.

10. No member of the Methodist Protestant Church shall hold membership

in a mission and station at the same time.

11. Until a class is formed in a mission the missionary shall have authority to

receive probationers into full membership.

12. The missionary in charge is invested with authority to receive or reject applicants for membership, as he in his judgment may deem most conducive to the welfare of the mission.

13. When a mission becomes a circuit or station, the property must be so transferred to the trustees elected by the qualified members as to secure it to the

Methodist Protestant Church.

14. The Board of Managers of the Church Extension Society is empowered to appoint or dismiss trustees in missions during the recess of Conference.

15. All qualified members shall be entitled to vote for stewards in missions. 16. The Society shall pay the traveling expenses of such members of the Board

of Managers as do not reside in the city.

17. The Board of Managers has full power to act on all matters pertaining to the Church Extension Society in the interim of Conference.

SUPERANNUATED FUND REGULATIONS.

1. The Committee on Superannuated Claimants shall report to Conference all those names which, in its judgment, properly belong to the superannuated list.

2. The two interests, the collections for Superannuates and the interest on the Superannuated Fund, are blended, and the Committee is instructed to act ac-

cordingly.

3. The Committee in making appropriations shall be governed by the ascertained probable resources of the Conference; they shall discriminate according to the comparative claims of the several recipients, taking into consideration:

1. The time of service in the Conference. 2. The value of said service to the Conference. 3. The size of family. 4. The peculiarities of location, etc. 5. Aprility to contribute to self-support by business capacity or private income.

4. The Steward of the Superannuated Fund shall disburse all moneys coming

from the Superannuated Fund Society.

5. When the Committee shall have completed its report it shall be read to the Conference twenty-four hours before final action thereon, during which time objections to the report must be filed before the committee.

6. The Steward of the Superannuated Fund holds his office from the time of election until his successor is elected, and he is authorized to receive and dis-

tribute collections lifted for this fund at any time during the year.
7. The steward shall make a semi-annual distribution of the funds coming from the Superannuated Fund Society, provided the Treasurer of said Society can make a payment in the interim of Conference.

8. Every pastor is requested to bring to each session of the Annual Conference at least \$5 in addition to the Superannuated Collection, to assist any person

who may be placed on the Superannuated List at that session.

9. The Corresponding Secretary of the Superannuated Fund Society shall furnish Superannuated Claimants with blanks containing the following questions, a neglect to answer which shall deprive the claimant of any portion in the distribution of said fund for the year:

What is your present place of residence? Post office address?
 Do you desire a superannuated relation the ensuing year?

3. What is the number of your family? Ages of your children, respectively?
4. In what business are you now engaged? How much does its product fall short of yielding you a necessary support? What is the amount of your private income from all sources?

5. What is the assessed value of the real estate owned by you?6. Do you attend our church? If not, why not?7. Do your children attend our Sabbath-school? If not, why not?
