

PLEASE USE ORDER SHEET found in the catalog in making out your order and retain a copy of the order. If you have occasion later on to write us about the order give post-office address under which it was mailed. Orders are filed by post offices, so if you give a different post-office address in writing it is difficult for us to find the order.

WE ACKNOWLEDGE ORDERS when received unless the order, or some part of it, is to be sent at once or within a day or so. If any part is mailed right out that answers as an acknowledgment or if goods can be sent at once or very soon by freight or express we send acknowledgment and notice of shipment at the same time, enclosing Bill of Lading.

WE SEND LARGE SHIPMENTS BY FREIGHT unless otherwise instructed. See table of freight rates below. We have three railroads here at Madison, Chicago and Northwestern, Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul and Illinois Central.

CUSTOMERS PAY TRANSPORTATION CHARGES on all goods unless offered postpaid. Small shipments will be sent by express. There are special express rates on seeds, in the main, 25 per cent less than the merchandise rates.

NO CHARGE FOR PACKING OR CARTAGE. Everything will be securely packed and labeled and delivered free at the Freight, Express or Post Office. All express rates have been reduced since the Parcel Post law went into effect.

ORDER EARLY. Do this for two reasons. We can give your order more careful and prompt attention if received before we get into the rush, and then we will not have to write for permission to substitute for varieties sold out.

OUR THREEFOLD GUARANTEE.

1. QUALITY. We guarantee the quality of the seeds, plants, bulbs and potatoes we send out to the extent that should they not prove as represented we will refill the order or return the money; but we give no further warranty, express or implied, as to description, purity, quality, productiveness or any other matter of any seeds, potatoes, bulbs or plants we send out and will not be responsible for the crop. Goods may be returned if not satisfactory.

2. SAFE ARRIVAL. We guarantee everything we send out to arrive in good order. If potatoes freeze on the road we will refill the order if the time of shipping is left to our discretion. If any goods arrive in bad order, however, bags torn or anything else wrong, have this noted on the freight expense bill which must be sent us so that we can make proper claim. The bill of lading must be returned also. Therefore do not lose the bill of lading.

3. RECEIPT OF MONEY. We will be responsible for all money sent us through the mails, if remittance is made by P. O. or Express Order, Draft or Registered Letter. We will accept personal checks at face value. They look good to us. Small amounts, less than \$1.00, may usually be sent safely in postage stamps or coin.

THE CLOVER SEED SITUATION. Farmers Should Not Sow Imported Seed.

The clover seed situation as our catalog goes to press is rather a critical one. The 1923 crop in this country is way short. In fact only half a crop. Dealers all over have been snatching up the seed just as fast as the farmers who grew it were willing to sell. We have bought all that we could get of good seed here in Wisconsin, over the state from top to bottom. Our Wisconsin crop was fair. Better than in most states. And we have quite a bunch of seed on hand. BUT, we know we have not enough and it looks as if American grown clover seed would be out of the market entirely long before seeding time. What then?

There is a big crop of European seed. Our friends across the water want to sell this seed to us here in America pretty bad, as they need the money. And it is coming over right now in immense quantities and will continue to come. Most of this seed contains buckhorn or dodder or both. But more serious than that, it is not adapted to our conditions. It winterkills here. It may do in the east and south although even that is questionable. But here in the middle west it will not do.

Here are some opinions from those who know.

Prof. Hughes of Iowa says: "It is entirely evident from our tests here, as well as in other states, that imported red clover seed should never be seeded anywhere in the cornbelt. Money spent for imported red clover seed is money thrown away." thrown away.

Prof. Arny of Minnesota: "Foreign grown seed, particularly from Chile, France and Italy was distinctly inferior and cannot be recommended in the northern states."

Prof. Wiancko of Indiana: "We are convinced that at least most of the clover seed that will come from Europe will not be suitable under our conditions, and if native seed is not obtainable the farmer might as well keep his money or use something else."

Do you want American grown seed to sow? If so, you must buy early, buy of a dealer in whom you have confidence and insist on a statement from him as to where the seed grew.

Buy our seed and get genuine American grown clover, seed that is pure and seed that is hardy. We do not intend to handle imported seed at all, whatever other dealers may do. But our only anxiety is that some of our customers will wait too long before ordering and find us with stocks exhausted.

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SWEET CLOVER. (The Great Fertilizer and Hay Crop.)

Sweet Clover is no longer an experiment. It has become a staple crop and is grown now in nearly all sections.

A few of the reasons why sweet clover is

valuable:

It grows readily on most all soils and locations.

It has the same sort of bacteria laden nodules as alfalfa and inoculates for that crop.

Sweet Clover brings land up rapidly and fits it not only for alfalfa but all crops.

It can be pastured while alfalfa cannot.

All stock relish is when once taught to

eat it.

It makes a profitable hay crop, while the second crop may be harvested for seed.

Sow 10 to 15 pounds of seed per acre either

Sow 10 to 15 pounds of seed per acre either spring or fall but preferably in spring. The white blossomed variety is usually considered the most valuable. Hulled seed is preferable to unhulled and in fact is the only seed to sow. Scarifying the seed also makes it germinate better. We have a machine for scarifying and are using it on all our seed this year. The seed should always be inoculated for best results. See page 5.

GRUNDY COUNTY SWEET CLOVER.

We have the special strain of Sweet Clover to offer again this year known as "Grundy County Sweet Clover." This strain is earlier, more dwarf and more leafy than the common sweet clover.

It seems that Grundy County, Illinois, is a great sweet clover center. In fact the last census report shows that this county had the largest per cent acreage of sweet clover as a forage crop of any county in the United States. They grow there common white blossom, yellow blossom, Grundy County and Hubam but by far the greatest acreage now is Grundy County as the farmers all prefer it.

Third, it is finer and more leafy than the common and branches thickly about a foot above the ground. Fourth, it yields more seed than the common, several farms in Grundy County the past season producing as high as 8 to 15 bushels per acre.

Grundy County Sweet Clover is perhaps more like Alfalfa than Sweet Clover. It grows like alfalfa only faster and the hay is like alfalfa hay so that it is in fact almost a "White Blossom Alfalfa."



The seed is apt to contain bad weed seeds and it does not do as well as American grown seed anyway. A lot of Argentine seed is being shipped into this country. Look out for it. "The best is the cheapest."

Insist on knowing where the seed grew before you buy. If you buy of a Wisconsin dealer he will have to give you that information as the Wisconsin seed law requires it. Insist also on knowing what it tests both for purity and germination. Our seed all shows high tests. Buy from samples showing tests. Use Nitragin for inoculating.







Prof. Moore says it is great for the northern counties as it ripens up so early. He says it holds the same size as the common Golden Glow, can be planted two weeks earlier and will keep right on growing in spite of cold weather. If frost hits it, it will come right along again. Prof.

"This corn is selected from the high producing Golden Glow corn bred at the Wisconsin Experiment Station. Selection was made for hardiness so that the corn could be planted a week or 10 days earlier than the usual corn planting time and thus lengthen the corn growing season. This corn produces a large stalk averaging as large as the common Golden Glow. It matures a few days earlier and high yields are reported from growers. It is the best silage corn we know of for central and upper Wisconsin."


A year ago after making an inspection trip through the northern part of the state, Prof. Moore estimated that there were nearly 12,000 acres of Cold Resistant corn in Wisconsin. He said: "This is a great year for the new Cold Resistant corn. The new strain has made fine growth and is in many cases taller than the native varieties. The cold season is proving the worth of Cold Resistant corn. A June frost failed to affect the new corn. A few leaves sloughed off and then the growth continued normal. There should be a great quantity of seed for distribution."

Prof. Moore says further: "In regard to the Cold Resistant corn I wish to state that I have great faith in it. Through several years of breeding work at the Wisconsin Experiment Station, cold resistance has been bred into the famous high yielding Golden Glow corn. This has enabled the Golden Glow area to be pushed further to the north, thereby enabling farmers to grow and mature a larger variety of corn where they were not able to succeed before."

We have two main stocks of Cold Resistant Golden Glow to offer this year, one stock grown by W. W. Suttie of Trempealeau County, who furnished us such a fine lot of this variety last year, and the other stock grown in Eau Claire County on a large seed corn farm fully equipped with drying houses and all the other modern equipment for producing seed corn in quantity. This Eau Claire County stock may be preferred by many of our customers because grown further preference in ordering.

P. V. Becker, also of Trempealeau County, thinks this variety is even larger than the original Golden Glow. He says: "The Cold Resistant Golden Glow corn averages a little larger than the common Golden Glow and will mature about the same time. Under favorable conditions will mature by August 25th. It is a heavier yielder, both stalk and grain, making it a very desirable variety for ensilage purposes." purposes.




Cold Resistant Grown in Shawano County, Northeastern Wisconsin.

Ears just the right length, averaging 8 to 9 inches, always filled out averaging 8 to 9 inches, always filed out clear to the tips, and very uniform in size and type. The corn is pure snow-white in color with white cob. It has a decided double ear characteristic, one reason for its yield records. It is a very popular corn with Wisconsin farmers for filling silos, and probably the very best variety for that purpose, because of its leafiness and heavy growth of fodder and heavy growth of fodder.







We sold twice as many bushels of State's Pride last year as of any other variety of oats. Its extreme earliness and heavy yielding qualities make it very desirable.

History. State's Pride is of Kherson origin. It came originally from the Kherson district of Russia to the Nebraska Experiment Station. In 1911, breeding work was begun on it at the Wisconsin Station. It was grown in the test plots for 5 years, and during that time showed some remarkable yields, several times over 100 bushels per acre and one year as high as 111 bushles per acre.

Description. State's Pride is a small yellow oat, bright and shiny, with a very thin hull. In fact it is about all meat, very heavy and a great oat for feeding. It is very early. Indeed the earliest of all varieties, some 25 or 30, grown at the Wisconsin Station. This is of great importance as it escapes the rust so apt to hit oats just before harvest. Owing to its earliness it is one of the best for a nurse crop.

It has a short stiff straw and has stood up the best of all oats at the Wisconsin Station Farm. This means a great deal. Even when it lodges some in unfavorable oat years it fills out the kernel well. For this reason it is recommended for very rich soils.

Another thing about this oat is its hardiness. Prof. Leith says it is the hardiest of anything, resists heat and withstands unfavorable conditions. He recommends it for sandy land especially, as well as for rich black soils. At the same time it seems to be a very satisfactory oat for clay soils and all other soils and is really an all-around good variety.

Mr. H. E. Krueger, Wisconsin's famous grower of pedigree grains has been a constant booster for this variety. We show above a photograph of a 100 acre field of Mr. Krueger's that yielded over 10,000 bushels.

In yield per acre at the Wis. Experiment Station, State's Pride stood first of all varieties in 1914, 1915, 1917, 1918, 1920 and 1921.

This oat has increased in popularity each year since its first introduction. We grow more each year than the preceding year but never have enough, always running out before the season is over.



White Cross or Wisconsin Pedigree No. 19 is a new oat that we are cataloging this year for the first time. The stock is still limited and ours is, we believe, about the only seed house offering it this year.

History. Prof. B. D. The Big Four is a high yielding mid-season oat and the Sixty Day is an early, yellow, small-kerneled oat. The object of the cross was to produce a high yielding early white oat, with a taller straw and a larger kernel than is usually found in early oats. A very careful selection was made for several years, several hundred individuals being discarded in this process. Nothing was saved unless it seemed to measure up to the standards set and was given the name of White Cross. The larger kernel and white color make it more attractive than the ordinary early white oat, and the tall straw is particularly desirable in localities where the oat straw is apt to be short."

In yield per acre, field tests, White Cross headed the list of all varieties of oats at the Wisconsin Experiment Station last year, 1923, and it did the same in 1922. Before that for 6 years straight State's Pride was at the top.



Wisconsin Pedigree Barley is the result of 12 years of painstaking breeding work carried on by Prof. R. A. Moore, Agronomist at the Wisconsin College of Agriculture. Prof. Moore started with 10 varieties of barley as the foundation. After 3 years of comparative trials only 4 of the most promising were retained from which to establish pedigreed strains. These were grown in small plots for several seasons, the best plants being selected for seed each year. In 1902 motherbeds of 2500 plants were planted for each of the 4 varieties. In 1909 the pedigreed stock was finally sent out for trial over the state through the members of the Wisconsin Experiment Association. 

SOY BEANS. (Great For Feed and For Enriching the Soil.)

Soy Beans are being raised with increasing success now in all the northern states as well as in the central and southern states. Many northern farmers are planting with corn for silage. In Iowa they grow with corn for "hogging" down. 

MINNESOTA GROWN SEED.
The most important thing in raising sorghum is to have the right kind ing sorghum is to have the right kind of seed. We have an improved strain of Early Amber to offer this year, grown in Minnesota. This strain has been developed by selective breeding through a term of years for hardiness and early maturity. With this seed it is not necessary to plant as early and the most of the work, so far as handling weeds is concerned, can be done before planting time by thorough disking and harrowing.

Culture. Plant about the middle or last of May, after the ground becomes warm, preferably on fall plowed land, in rows 3 to 4 feet wide, hills 2 to 3 feet apart, putting 10 to 15 seeds in a hill and later thinning to 6 or 8 stalks. This is for syrup making purposes and requires about 4 to 6 pounds of seed per acre. For

making purposes and requires about 4 to 6 pounds of seed per acre. For fodder purposes drill thicker in the row, 15 to 18 pounds per acre. 



The (f) diameter of potatoes of round varieties shall be not less than one and seven-eighths (1%) inches and of potatoes of long varieties one and three quarters (1%) inches."

Asparagus is native to Europe. It was known to the Greeks and Romans, and has been cultivated for at least 2,000 years. It is one of the earliest and most delicious of spring vegetables and one of the easiest to grow. The extraordinary increase in the consumption of asparagus in recent years has lead to the planting of a very large additional acreage, until now it is an important market-garden and canning item throughout the United States, and large quantities are sold fresh in the spring, and in cans throughout the year. However if you would enjoy the full richness of its flavor and succulence, you must use it fresh from the garden. Then only, does one get its real delicacy. If you have none in your garden, plant some this spring. The commercial development of bean growing on a large scale is comparatively recent. The modern seed supply now comes from Wisconsin, Michigan, New York, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Washington and California.

WISCONSIN DISEASE RESISTANT CABBAGE SEED.

The accompanying photograph of a field at Racine, Wisconsin shows a test row of cabbage from good commercial seed in the center of a field of disease-resistant cabbage. A very few plants out of hundreds set out, survived in this row. No clearer demonstration of the value of resistant seed in districts affected by yellows could be given. Racine and Kenosha are in the heart of the oldest cabbage section in Wisconsin, but a few years back, cabbage growing had been practically abandoned there because the soil had become so badly infected with this destructive fungus, that a satisfactory stand could no longer be secured. Then, after years of experiment and study, Professor L. R. Jones of the Departmnt of Plant Pathology of the University of Wisconsin, selected three strong heads of the Danish Ballhead or Hollander variety, which were apparently immune to yellows. The seed from these were planted, and extensive field tests proved the plants from this seed to be as resistant as were the first three. Thus, after years of effort, was Wisconsin Disease Resistant Seed established. By its use many infected districts, abandoned for cabbage growing, are now producing again. Many large cabbage farms near Racine were inspected by us last fall, and so strongly resistant is this seed that only a few isolated cases of yellow wilt did we find, while adjoining fields set with plants from ordinary seed showed only about a 10% stand. We now have two varieties of resistant seed, developed by the same methods:




Field of Alabama Sweet Watermelons.



The soil best adapted to flowering plants is generally a light friable loam, containing enough sand to make it porous, thoroughly pulverized and enriched with liberal amounts of bone meal or well rotted manure. Make the seed bed as fine, smooth and level as possible, except that a slight rounding of the bed is desirable that it may be well drained; do not plant when the ground is wet; cover each lot of seeds to a uniform depth which should not be more than four to six times the diameter of the seed; press the soil firmly over the seed; plant in rows so that the plantlets may be easily seen; thin to prevent crowding; keep entirely free from weeds; and keep well watered. If you will do this and will use Olds' choice flower seeds, you may confidently look forward to spring, summer, and autumn enriched by the beauty and fragrance of your own flowers. 


