INTRODUCTION

- WHAT? A red link, <u>like this one</u>, is an internal link which signifies that the linked-to page does not exist. A redlist is a list of redlinks.
- WHO? Some communities, such as WikiProject Women in Red, have developed an extensive body of redlists.
- WHEN? Women in Red's redlists are available for anyone at any time. Suggested redlists are added to every Women in Red meetup page.
- WHERE? Numbering more than 300 entries, Women in Red maintains its master list in its Navbox template.
- WHY? While we measure our progress by the number of articles created per event and per month, we place an equal value in developing redlists of notable missing articles.

TYPES

- CROWD-SOURCED: Crowd-sourced redlists provide a designated place to add missing articles within a specific scope. Preferably, each contains at least one reference.
- DICTIONARY-SOURCED: Dictionary-generated redlists can be created from dictionaries, anthologies, or other books.
- WIKIDATA-GENERATED: Wikidata-generated redlists can be created using SPARQL and are updated periodically by Listeriabot

CONSIDERATIONS

- Check for systemic bias.
- Provide references whenever possible.
- It is intended to serve as a basis for creating new articles in an important but somewhat neglected sector on the English Wikipedia.
- It is incomplete, under development, and crowd-sourced, so you can help by adding to it.
- If you know of a missing article(s) which belongs on this page, add to the existing sections or start a new section if none of the existing sections is a good fit (it doesn't matter if the new redlink is the only one in a section).
- All new articles must satisfy Wikipedia's notability criteria.
- Some of the "redlinks" listed here have articles in other language
 Wikipedias, but many have not yet been covered in any Wikipedia;
 translation assistance is welcome. Feel free to remove any links that turn
 blue.

EXAMPLE: Crowd-sourced redlist

- This is a Missing Articles worklist for Wikipedia:WikiProject Women in Red for women TED speakers It includes women from various fields of endeavor who have
 participated in TED talks.
- The articles on this list must satisfy Wikipedia's Wikipedia:Notability (academics) criteria; people on these lists may or may not qualify.
