

learned friend has no more right to a
jury than the rules give him, and
under the rules and authorities this is under the rules and authorities this is clearly a case for a judge, and not for a jury. It could have been brought in the Admiralty court where the plaintiffs could not have had a jury. Then as the cases are now consolidated, and there is the necessity for scientific evidence and investigation as to which capitain failed to exercise proper searcaptain failed to exercise proper sea-manship, are questions for a judge and for inferior work done elsewhere.

SCENE OF DEVASTATION.

Flood Wrought Havoc in the Sno ish Valley-Houses Carried Away.

Snohomish, Nov. 20.—As the flood subsides, and things terrestrial come to view, a scene of devastation is revealed such as has not been seen in the Snohomish valley in thirty-five years. Fences have been swept away, and whole farms, which a few days ago were pastoral pictures screne, are still under water with huge snags and piles of driftwood everywhere. Live stock has been driven to the highlands, or they stand on the knolls shivering

stock has been driven to the highlands, or they stand on the knolls shivering with cold. Some few herds of milch cows, that were in the barns when the flood came, are standing on false floors, hurriedly constructed as the waters rose.

Three houses, that were the happy homes of residents of the beautiful valley a few miles above town, are now far from their former locations, stranded in bleak and strange places for man's habitation.

Men who have inspected the roadbed on the Interurban between Ebybridge and Lowell, say that it is washed away, and that for a distance of a thousand feet great holes have been cut. The work of repairing this stricth of track will he something gigantic. It is probable that as soon as the flood subsides, work crews will be put to work blocking up the track on all the lines, the roadbed to be rebuilt after trains are rupning again.

The water rose to within eight inches of the highest point in 1872, and about five or six inches higher than in 1896. The flood in 1872, however, was not to be compared to that of this week, for the reason that an ice jam formed at the mouth of the river, forcing the water up four feet in a single hour, and when the ice-pack broke, it went down and squickly as it rose. The present flood is a record breaker for high water, without anything to back it up.

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

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST BOMESTEAD REQUILATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion ands in Manitoba c\* the Northwest rovinces, excepting \$ and 25, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any persone sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-qua ter section, of 150 acres, more or less.
Application for homestead entry or in spection must be made in person by thapplicant at the office of the local Agen

or Sub-Agent.

An application for entry or inspect made personally at any Sub-Agent's face may be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-Agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

pers to con-pers the transaction of the entry will less unmarily cancelled and the applicant will forfert all priority of claim.

An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only on application for inspection will be feedived from an individual until that application has been disposed of.

A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation, may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or, sister, if eligible, but to no one else, on filing deciaration of abandonment.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled, as voluntarily abandoned, subsequent te institution of cancellation proceedings.
