TAX ON COLLYIVATED LAND. It was at a rate of 91 per acre on lands onlyivated in sugar, banause, coffee, and other valuable products, and went down by gradations to Hisen acre on land in wood and romasts. For all these taxes the Property Tax Bill substituted one tax at the rate of 1s 21d on every £10, the gross value of property in bocases and lands. There was a minimum assessment of £40 for boldings of houses on land of the value of £20 and over.
