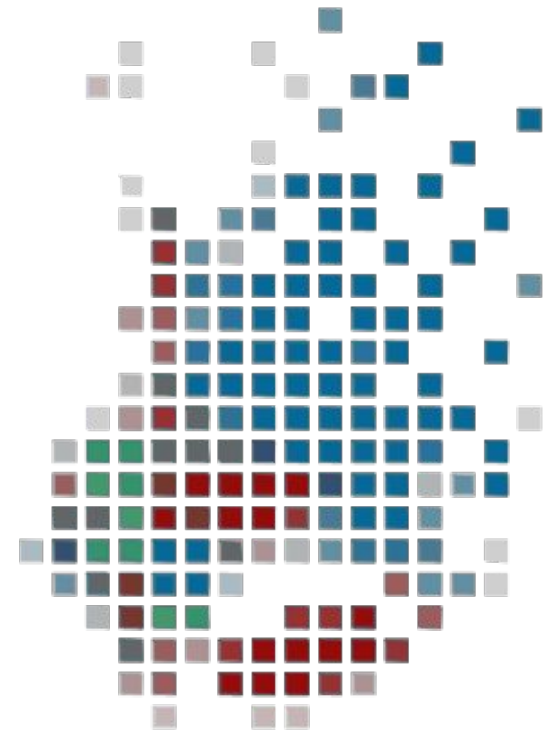

# Why

- Rather chaotic organisation last year, need for more structure
- International grant
  - Grant smaller communities easy access to grants
    - The grant proposal and grant report get handled by the international organisers
    - The money processing gets handled by a large experienced chapter with staff
  - Nurture a binding of the international community with a project everyone participates at



# International team

- A single organisational entity cannot organise the largest article writing contest
- Grant proposal and report
- Promotion and contact with local organisers
- Back office: payments and buying of prizes
  - Smaller communities do not need to risk their own money
  - Silent members of the team with the hard task of reimbursing many local participants
  - Knowledgeable, considerate and experienced
  - Simplified the process as much as possible



# Local teams

- Responsible for
  - Define the local rules, e.g. categories, topics in the article lists
  - Communication with the local community
  - Send prizes to the winners
- Free to shape the local contest in order to support the reach of the project aims, e.g. gender gap

# Communication

- In the international team
  - A half serious Facebook chat
  - Mutual trust
  - Google Documents for protocols
  - Drafts in the blog
  - Europeana 280 joined the communication, positive side effects in other projects like WLE
- International team with the local teams
  - The core team handles the communication with the local teams
  - The back office and the local teams speak via the core team
  - Mass messages are better than private chats
  - The local contest pages are very well suited for information, because everyone has their watchlists
  - A mailing list and a Facebook group would enhance the communication next year

# Aims

- Not only quantity, but also quality
- Content gender gap
- Fair distribution of articles per country and topic
- Regional cooperation

# Promotion

- Social media
  - Facebook: main social network where the contest gets promoted
    - Interesting articles
    - Mentions, which get used as ideas
    - A way to find appreciation
  - Twitter
  - VKontakte
- Blog
  - Aim: motivate a small number of readers to participate more actively in the contest
  - Content: news, statistics, exception biographies, interesting articles
  - Multilingual, so that communities without own blogs can use it in their own language
- Press work
  - Sample press releases
  - Interviews



# Prizes and rules

- Rules should be kept simple on international level
- Prizes should not be the main reason for participation
- The contest is mostly for experienced Wikipedians
- Wikipedians like books
  - Defined by the international team only for non-APG-funded chapters
  - Richer, larger chapters may offer larger prizes if suitable for their communities

# Statistics and other helpful stuff

- Article lists per country
  - Define the most important articles for each participating community
- BaseBot: 9111 articles, 3580 biographies, 34% about women
- Botik: 5920 to 2838 for this year
- Wikidata

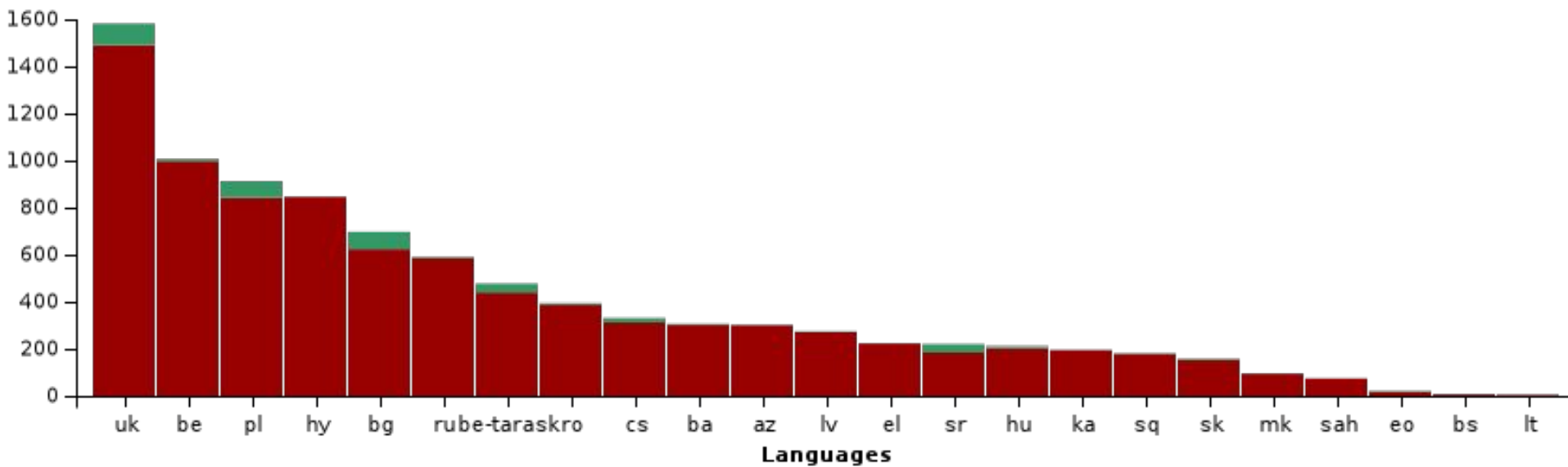
# Programmers

  - Implementation of every wish of the international and national organisers

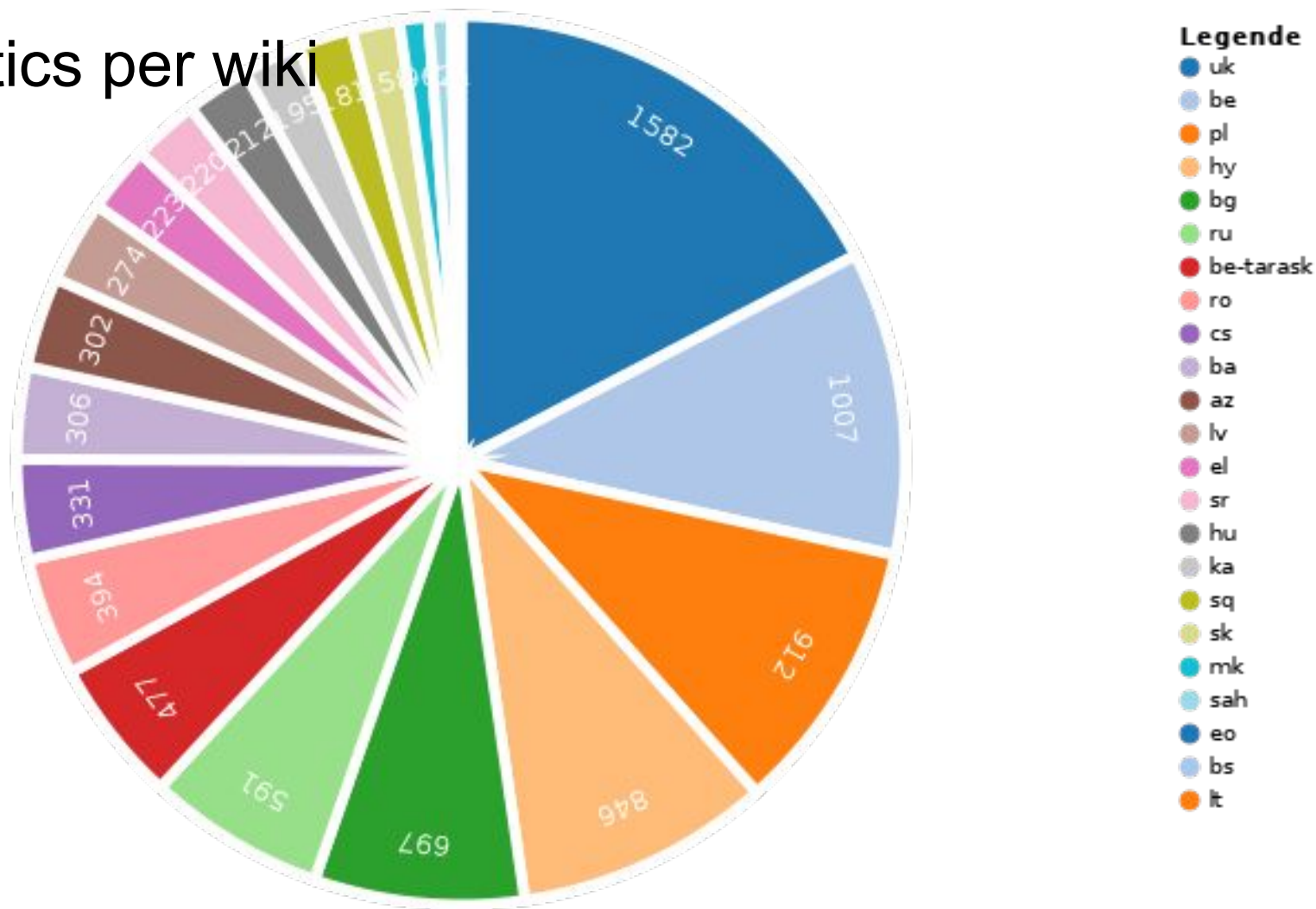
