Forests in relation to soil and water; Wood in the national economy; World-wide needs of woods as a land conservation crop; America's role in meeting world timber needs; Forest conservation; Public control of cutting practices on private timberlands; Role of federal, state, and local governments in promoting forestry; American Philosophical Society and the early history of forestry in America — these are the chapter headings of papers read before the American Philosophical Society at the autumn general meeting in November 1944. Several of the papers are by Department personnel.

and administrative aspects, Efficiency and economy, Irrigation of different crops

Perry, Enos J. ed. ARTIFICIAL INSEMINATION OF FARM ANIMALS. 265 p. 1945, New Brunswick, Rutgers university press. 40 P42

This is the first complete book on this subject in the English language. Animals included are Cattle, Sheep, Horses, Birds, Swine. Among the headings included are History, Advantages and limitations, Systems, Sires, and Cooperative associations.

Phelps, Earle B. STREAM SANITATION. 276 p. 1944, New York, John Wiley and sons, inc. 292 P51

Life history of a stream; Biology of growth and decay; Aerobic decomposition: Oxidation. Digestion; Oxygen balance; Public health aspects: Bacterial pollution; Stream microbiology. These are the contents of the book in which it has been attempted "to set down some of the principal interests that have been developed in streams from the single viewpoint of sanitation."

- Schilletter, Julian C. and Richey, H. W. TEXTBOOK OF GENERAL HORTICULTURE. 367 p. illus. 1940, New York, McGraw-Hill book company, inc. 90.4 Sch3
 Concerned with the cultivation of fruit, vegetable and ornamental plants, the first part of this book deals with broad aspects of the subject as horticultural enterprises of the world, of the United States, of the home. It then takes up fundamental plant processes as structure, function, and growth; relation to temperature, moisture, light, soil; propagation; pruning; training; pests and their control; and harvesting and storing the products.
- Schultz, T. W. FOOD FOR THE WORLD. 353 p. 1945, Chicago, University of Chicago press. 389 Sch8

 Contents of this book are: Part I. "The Food movement." Part II. Population. Part III. Nutrition. Part IV. Food supplies. Part V. International relations. Part VI. Consequences and policy. Among the authors are a number of names well known to Department personnel. Will the demand for food stay abreast of agricultural production? How are the subjects of nutrition and population related to the problem? What are the international connections? These are some of the phases:

 This is one of those books which are full and running over with information and readable besides. Particularly local chapters are: Expansion of prairie agriculture; Special problems of prairie farmers; Livestock frontier and the Great Plains farmer; Finance and marketing problems of the range country. Also of interest are: Progress of farm mechanization; Governmental activity in agriculture; the Agrarian uprising; and Farmers' cooperative movements.
- Shepard, Ward. FOOD OR FAMILE; THE CHALLENGE OF EROSION. 225 p. illus. 1945, New York, Macmillan. 56.7 Sh4F
 Erosion and hunger; Natural and human forces in the soil crises; Democratic revolution in soil conservation; Organization of forest management; Public controls over land use; Land reconstruction work corps; Public acquisition of lowgrade land; Financing land reconstruction; Our lands control our rivers; Integral watershed development; Agricultural science and aducation; Toward world conservation. These are the chapter headings. The book is well illustrated, many of the photographs being by SCS. It also has a 15 page index.
- Teele, Ray P. ECONOMICS OF LAND RECLAMATION IN THE UNITED STATES. 337 p. 1927, Chicago, A. W. Shaw company. 281 T22

 The reclamation of land for agricultural purposes is here discussed mainly from the economic viewpoint rather than from that of engineering or of cropping. It may not be advisable to reclaim a particular piece of land for such use. Irrigation, drainage, water rights, rate of utilization, cost and returns, federal and state policies are among the headings treated.
- West, James. PLAINVILLE, U.S.A. 238 p. 1945, New York, Columbia university press 280.12 W523

 This is a study of the life in a small contemporary American rural community. It was "undertaken to attempt to learn specifically and in detail how one relatively isolated and still 'backward' American farming community reacts to the constant stream of traits and influences pouring into it from cities and from more 'modern' farming communities." All place names and personal names, includ-

ing that of the author, have been withheld or altered for the protection of anonymity. Chapter headings are: Plainville; social structure: General; Social Structure; the Class System; Religion; From Cradle to Grave; Conclusion: Plainville and the Future.

- This book tells how to select, finance, stock and develop such a place. It points out mistakes to avoid as well as methods that assure success; it emphasizes the importance of good water, sanitation, drainage and irrigation; it tells how to enhance crop yields while also improving soil conditions; it explains how to treat neglected orchards already on the place, how to start and care for new ones; how to plant berry patches and vineyards. It discusses the pros and cons of fruit and vegetable crops, dairy cows, hogs, poultry, and bees. A fund of information.

 To be neither confusingly long or to be oversimplified is the intent of the author in writing this book. It is his aim to offer specific instructions and suggestions to the bee husbandryman "for a maximum amount of pleasure and a modicum of profit." The hive, the bees and their management and manipulation, swarms, honey comb and extracted, queens, diseases, and forage plants are some of the topics.



The 'bureaucrats' of the nation's public colleges and universities will also find much of interest and value in Appleby's personal insight into the Do's and Don'ts of public administration." The various topics of analysis have been grouped according to analytical tools used. Advanced mathematical knowledge is not required.


- LOAN PERIODS 1. Usual -- two weeks; renewable upon request if not needed elsewhere,







- NEW LIBRARY BOOKS

AMTRICA IS WEST, ed. by John T. Flanagan. 677 p. 1945. (145 F61). The subject of this book is the heartland of America, the region loosely called the Middle West. In this book are the writings of natives and residents alike, and also the writings of neither, but the literature selected gives some of the pageant of regional life for almost four hundred years—the frontier, the woods, the farm, the river, the small town, the city, the middlewesterners. Willa Cather describes Nebraska, and Carl Becker, Kansas.—Frederic Jackson Turner has a few pages about the Middle West as such. Hamlin Garland gives you "Color in the Wheat", and at the end Paul Engle's nine-page poem "America Remembers" is a fitting finale to the collection:

"... And while you front
Your fate between the ocean and the ocean
Let the American quality, the dream
Of a land where men shall work their destiny
Deeply as they will, give you the power
To realize with proud and reverent heart
The strange identity of man as man
And fling it up against the dark of time
Where it may loom forever as the bright
Image of godhead in the simple man
That now has risen from this American earth
And shall but with the bitter end of things
Go back again into the humble earth..."

The WORLD'S HUNGER, by Frank-Pearson and Floyd Harper. 79 p. 1945 (389 P313W)

This small book was written primarily for those interested in the world food problem. The authors make no special claims as authorities other than to appraise widely divergent views on the basis of the scanty information available. "There is no scarcity of land with favorable topography," says the author, "or adequate sunlight and carbon dioxide, or favorable temperature, or reliable rainfall, or fertile soil. There is however a serious shortage of land with the proper combinations of these factors that are so necessary for food production." The book is not a compendium of geological, biological, and phyciological knowledge—an attempt has been made to relate this technical material to the world food problem so that it can be understood by the ordinary reader.

- SEAMAN A. KNAPP; SCHOOLMASTER OF AMERICAN AGRICULTURE, by Joseph Cannon Bailey. 280 p. 1945 (120 K72B) It is a long lag between the discoveries of the scientists and the conversion of their dynamic findings to the people's use that creates the most pressing problems of our time. Seaman Knapp worked out an educational instrument that is the swiftest and most effective method yet contrived of getting badly needed technological and sociological knowledge from the colleges and laboratories to the groups farthest from the sources. The invention: the County Agent System--Extension Service. This book is the record of the teacher, preacher, editor, banker, stockbreeder and plant explorer, and what this man has done to keep farmers on their land, beginning with his homespun childhood, carrying through his ventures into various farm problems and emergencies, and ending with the passage of the Smith-Lever Act.
- COOKING WILD GAME, by Frank G. Ashbrook and Edna N. Sater. 358 p. 1945 (389.25 As3) Meat from forest, field and stream and how to prepare it for the table, including 432 recipes. "The beautiful mystery of cooking is an art which does more than any other to make life if not beatific, at least desirable." This book is the authors' attempt to reduce the ratio of gastronomic illiteracy of a world filled with people whose No. 1 Project since the dawn of their first hairy ancestors has been the search for something good to eat.
- HOW TO READ STATISTICS, by R. L. C. Butsch. 181 p. 1946 (251 B98) The chief purpose of this book is to enable the reader to become an intelligent "consumer" of statistics, in so far as that can be done without asking him to become acquainted with the mathematics involved in carrying out statistical computation. The emphasis is on "Why is it done?" and "What does it mean?" rather than on "How is it obtained?" It is for the large number of teachers, social workers, personnel directors, and industrial executives, who through lack of opportunity or inclination have failed to acquire the minimum of statistical techniques implied for those trained in the ordinary courses in statistics and in interpreting results so obtained.
- PHOTOGRAPHIC SURVEYING, by B. B. Talley and P. H. Robbins. 223 p. 1945 (325.2 T14P) Photogrammetry is the tool of modern mapping, the science of measurement from photographs. Since the advent of the airplane as the carrier photographic surveying techniques have increased by leaps and bounds. The chapters in this book cover photographic equipment, interpretation of aerial photographs, principles of stereoscopy, plotting instruments, mosaics from aerial photographs, applications of photographic surveying, etc., and is well illustrated.
- TREE-RING ANALYSIS AND DATING IN THE MISSISSIPPI DRAINAGE, by Florence Hawley.

 110 p. University of Chicago Publications in Anthropology, Occasional Papers,
 no. 2. 1941 (463.36 H31) The study of tree-rings as a means of establishing
 exact chronologies in the mound-builder area of the Mississippi Drainage was
 begun in 1934, primarily as a development in archaeological method. Since that
 time, tree-ring analysis has been developed and carried on as a research project for application to similar dating problems and to movements of prehistoric Indians in the mound-builder area. Men have left records from time to
 time in the past of their knowledge of counting the rings of a tree to discover
 its age, but no one of these visioned the concept of tree-ring analysis. The
 story as told in this book of how the studies were made, who took part, where
 the specimens came from, as well as the chapters on ring identification,
 cross-dating, and chronology building, etc. makes very interesting reading.

WHEN SENDING IN A REQUEST for a book it is well to note thereon the date of impending vacations or other anticipated absence from office so that we will not send the book at that period.

BOOKS AND PERIODICALS should not be held in an office to await the borrower's return. Keep the publications moving-other persons may be waiting for them. Just note on the date-due slip: "Return later."

EACH PERSON who reads library periodicals in an office should check and sign one of our periodical lists, instead of reading what comes to the office charged to some other person in the office. The reason? So that our circulation statistics will be more accurate; so that two days reading time can be allowed for each reader; so that each person can drop titles or add titles as he chooses; and so that the library can have accurate and up-to-date records of each person served.

LET US KNOW when your address changes.

ASK US for a list of our periodicals any time you feel the need of one. We do not necessarily circulate these lists each year.

"MAY I HAVE A LIST of the books in the USDA Branch Library?" Often we are asked this question. At present we have no such list. If enough field people feel the need of such it may be that we can compile a basic list. We would like you to consider first whether the Bibliography of Agriculture, kept as a set in your office, together with the monthly Library Newsletter will not give you more than sufficient coverage of material available to you. Use the Newsletter to select from at random; use the Bibliography to select from specifically. The Bibliography of Agriculture is one of the periodicals which we can circulate to you monthly. After you have gotten acquainted with it you may wish to get on the mailing list at the issuing office (The USDA Library in Washington) so that you may have it on your shelf as a working tool for frequent reference. Let us hear from you on this subject.

NEW LIBRARY BOOKS

CITIES ARE ABNORMAL, by various authors (edited by Elmer T. Peterson) 263 p. 1946 (280.12 P44) "Empires and commonwealths are born of farms. Must they die of cities? ... Nature has never given notice that she has set mankind apart, to be governed by a set of rules wholly different from those governing all other living things. Within the city, intensity of conflict, the dangers of pestilence and of economic disaster have been multiplied. Our scientific advances in agriculture have not been able to offset these consequences..." An eminent array of writers in this book offer further interesting and instructive pages protesting our centralized trends. Dr. Jonathan Forman mentions that the city is not a place for health, long life, and sanity, and that it must import nearly one-half of the next generation in order to maintain its size and satisfy its civic pride. Louis Bromfield has a good word for the TVA way of life -- developing an area simultaneously along both agricultural and industrial lines, allowing inhabitants the natural privilege of keeping "one foot on the soil." Paul B. Sears writes of the ecology of city and country; Ladd Haystead takes a look ahead from his viewpoint as farm reporter; H. C. Nixon in his "Government of the People" discusses how rural government must change and how a diversification of government, operating on all fronts or levels makes for our best security.

HIDDEN HUNGER, by I. G. Macy, Ph. D. 286 p. 1945 (389.1 M252) "The ultimate goal of agriculture is the production of food in sufficient quantity and quality to satisfy the bodily needs of the people of the earth. The fundamental and primary tool of the agriculturist in this food producing process is the soil... For years the primary focus of both agricultural research and production has been on tons per acre, but today this is not enough..." and Dr. Macy goes on to show how misfeeding is a much larger problem than underfeeding; that we can no longer consider weight and height as good indices of nutritional status; and that recognition of nutrition as the requisite to far more than satisfying hunger has focused worldwide attention upon the problems of hidden hunger. "Whether the potentials of nutrition are fully employed will influence the course of civilization, for in this respect man's destiny can be self-determined."

- THE LAND RENEWED, by Wm. R. Van Dersal and Edward H. Graham. 109 p. 1946. (56.7 V28) This little book has had high praise from the reviewers in the agricultural periodicals. True, it is written for youngsters, but, says a reviewer in Soil Conservation, it's too good a bet for the busy adult who would like to get a broad understanding of soil and water conservation in an hour's interesting reading. "Anyone at all interested in the land will be fascinated by his unpretentious little book. But the chances are that it will be most admired by the professional conservationist. Knowing his complex specialty as he does, he will be amazed at how completely soil and water conservation has been set forth in a hundred odd pages of simple prose, in large type, and dramatic photographs. It's all here—never technical, always thorough, accurate, and fast moving."
- THE ART OF PLAIN TALK, by Rudolf Flesch. 210 p. 1946 (200.4 F63) In these days when nearly everybody must "write" and often about routine matters, the one virtue that is important is to be understood. It's fun to read this book, if you really listen to what the author is saying. For instance the chapter on "How to read the Federal Register" -- you're probably gratified to learn it isn't even supposed to be read! Even the chapter headings are intriguing: Gadgets of Language; The Grammar of Gossip; Live Words; Empty Words; The Glamour of Punctuation; The Trouble with Textbooks; The Future of Plain Talk. But the book isn't written to entertain; it's meant to really be of help in improving your written product, no matter whether you write letters or reports or articles or books.
- STREAM SANITATION, by Earle B. Phelps. 276 p. 1944 (292 P51) "The science of rivers" seems to include the knowledge of the expert biologist, the chemist, the botanist, the geologist, and a few others. In this book the author attempts to set down some of the principal interests that have been developed in streams from the single viewpoint of sanitation. "The student need not be surprised if he here finds himself studying biology and chemistry and their offspring, biochemistry, some bacteriology, and a bit here and there of physics and even of astronomy and of law—the whole blended with what I hope will not seem to be too strong a dash of 'the queen of the sciences', mathematics. Of such is sanitation, and in these terms only can we hope adequately to express our present—day scientific knowledge of the sanitation of streams."
- MANUAL OF CULTIVATED TREES AND SHRUBS, by Alfred Rehder. 900 p. 1940 (452 R26) A reference book giving systematic and descriptive enumeration of the cultivated trees and shrubs hardy in North America and providing identification by means of analytical keys.
- THE NATURE OF THE BEAST, by Ruth Crosby Noble. 209 p. 1945 (411N66) A popular account of animal psychology from the point of view of a naturalist. The author had shared largely in her husband's field investigations and had had training in natural science, so after her husband's death she was urged by Roy Chapman Andrews to write this book. It is primarily a natural history discussion, "based largely on field work and with a minimum of rats, brains, and laboratories." The world is becoming increasingly psychology conscious and bookstores are crowded with volumes concerning the human mind, yet there has been virtually nothing of a popular nature on the psychology of animals other than apes. This book is not offered as a textbook, but as an informal introduction to the subject of animal behavior.

MEW LIBRARY BOOKS

AN AGRICULTURAL TESTAMENT, by Sir Albert Howard. 242 p. 1940 (56.6 H83A) Agriculture has become unbalanced; the land is in revolt; diseases of all kinds are on the increase; in many parts of the world Nature is removing the worn-out soil by means of erosion-these consequences the author points out as the result of increased crop and animal production over the years with nothing done to replace loss of fertility involved. Sir Albert Howard has ... an ambitious project founded on the work and experience of forty years for maintaining soil fertility by the manufacture of humus from vegetable and animal wastes. The Indore Process for the manufacture of humus (devised at the Institute of Plant Industry, Indore, Central India) is thoroughly ex-*plained as to materials and techniques and as to practical applications, with related chapters on grass-land management, soil aeration, diseases of the soil, and soil fertility and national health. He deplores the "slow poisoning of the life of the soil by artificial manures" as one of the greatest calamities which has befallen agriculture and mantind. The land must be got into good heart to begin with, says the author, and a fertile soil must be the base line of the investigations of the future by whatever agricultural research agencies are to assist the land to come into its own.

NEW WCRLD TO WIN, by C. J. Van Rensburg and E. M. Falmer. 199 p. 1946. (56.7 R29) This is the book that Mr. Van Rensburg said he didn't write for Americans to learn about South Africa. He wrote so that young people and children of a land where there is no country-wide soil conservation program and where there is no way to spread the word of conservation can have a beginning of education about the conditions of their country. But our reviewers feel that American readers can learn more about South Africa from this book than from a dozen others—scientific, travel, and otherwise. The book is full of spirit—and of simplicity. The chapters are short and pertain to such points as pastures, good animals, rotation of crops, good seed, irrigated land, contour farming, food habits, veld management, planning a farm, and agricultural clubs.

MANAGING YOURSELF, by Milton Wright. 313 p. 1938 (140 W93M) Milton Wright seems to know what to do in case you need to pep up and get something done. His chapters are: Mental energy; How to concentrate; That tired feeling; Strengthening your memory; Organizing Mourself; Using your imagination; Establishing confidence; Physical fitness; How to think straight; Managing other people.

- FARMING AND MECHANISED AGRICULTURE. 1946. 481 p. This is an annual reference book with emphasis on British agriculture and agricultural agencies, but having too general articles, for instance "Global Soil Resources," by Hugh H. Bennett; "World-Wide Needs of Woods as a Land Conservation Crop," by W. C. Lowdermilk; "Meteorology and Agriculture," by Gordon Manley; "Agriculture in the U.S.S.R.," by I. Benediktov. About half the book is devoted to an annotated directory of the agricultural associations and agencies in Britain, official and unofficial, including various councils, laboratories, Ministries, institutes, and unions.
- SOIL AND PLANT ANALYSIS, by C. S. Piper. 362 p. 1944 (56.4 P66) A laboratory manual of methods for the examination of soils and the determination of the inorganic constituents of plants.
- DYNAMIC BIOLOGY TODAY, by A. O. Baker & Lewis H. Mills. (Edited by Wm. L. Connor) 761 p. 1943 (442 B17) Biology texts don't usually start off with a Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer technicolor reproduction for a frontispiece, but this one does. And beginning here you examine practically every page that follows just to see in what an interesting manner the subject of biology can be presented to present-day students. Since scientists and teachers have discovered that certain phases of the subject are more important to man's welfare than others, facts and principles once taught in isolation are now presented in relation to the problems of living, and the student is helped to acquire something of the scientific attitude himself, and to have fundamental concepts in life science. The text is presented in units. For instance unit 12: "What is the scope of conservation as it applies to the field of biology?" and "What special techniques in the field of biology apply to conservation?" Not the least interesting part of the presentation are the illustrations.
- INSECT PESTS OF FARM, GARDEN, AND ORCHARD, by L. M. Peairs. 523 p. 4th edition, 1941 (423 Sa51) Well illustrated text with chapters devoted to insects injurious to leguminous crops, to solanaceous crops, to garden crops, to grasses and cereal grains, to fruits, to stored products and household goods, to man and domestic animals. Control is discussed, chemical, mechanical, cultural, climatic and biological. Also a chapter on classification of insects, and on structure and development.
- HOUSEKEEPING HANDBOOK--HOW TO DO IT, by Lydia Ray Balderston. 100 p. 1944. (321 B19Hou) Gives detailed procedures on caring for floors, furniture, floor coverings, heating appliances, and household equipment; information on kitchen and bathroom care, dishwashing, care of metals, how to launder and remove stains from fabrics; methods of storing garments and household goods; and directions for preventing and exterminating insect pests. Not written in text-book fashion; under each topic the directions are listed in one-sentence statements right down the page.
- MICROBES OF MERIT, by Otto Rahn. 274 p. 1945 (448.2 R12Mi) "Microbes are an essential part of our civilization. To them we owe many articles of our daily life, such as bread and cheese, pickles and sauerkraut, linen towels and hemp ropes, explosives and automobile lacquers, plastics and penicillin." The whole story of the microbes and their interrelation with our living is presented attractively in this thin book by Mr. Rahn.

(57.24 Sa83) "General information for fertilizer salesman, county agent, agricultural teacher, farmer and fertilizer dealer." The author states that this booklet was written to answer such questions as: The comparative composition of the various grades of commercial superphosphates; the relative merits of rock phosphates and superphosphates; or the question involving organic phosphates.
