

One Ounce For Sixty Feet of L -tw

ASPARAGUS is a favorite vegetable with all; almost every rural family have a patch or bed of it in their garden, and there is generally great combition among neighbors in cutting the first bunch of the season. The seed should be soaked and sown early in spring, two inches deep, and eighteen hes from row to row and be kept clean by frequent hoeing. When two years old transplant into permanent beds, which should be well and deeply nured and trenched to the depth of eighteen inches. On the approach of winter cover with manure or compost; fork the beds early in spring, and oly a dressing of salt or kainit at the rate of 600 lbs. an acre. Cut for use the second year after planting.

Culture. A succession of sowings can be made every two weeks from the first week in May until September. These dates are for the latitude of Philadelphia. Further south the first sowing must be done earlier; further north, later. Plant in drills about two inches deep, and from eighteen inches to two feet apart, according to the richness of the soil; the poorer the soil the closer they can be planted. The seeds should be dropped about two inches apart in the drills.

-The soil best suited for the culture of the Beet is that which is rather light than otherwise, always provided that it is thoroughly enriched with well-rotted manure. For an early supply sow in spring, as soon as the ground is fit to work, in drills about one foot apart and two inches deep. For main crop, sow the first week in May, and for winter use sow in June. These dates are for the latitude of Philadelphia. For the South, sow earlier; for the North, later. When the plants have attained three or four leaves, thin out so that they may stand five or six inches apart. In October, the roots may be taken up and stored in cellar or pits outside.





The early varieties of Cabbage are cultivated more extensively than any other vegetable. In latitudes where the ther mometer never indicates twenty degrees below the freezing point, seed may be sown in the open border in October and planted out on the first opening of spring; but in our Northern States they must either be sown in hot beds in February, or, what is still better, wintered over in cold frames; for this purpose the seed is sown from the 10th to the 20th of September. Attention to date is important; if too soon the plants might run to seed, and if too late they would be too small. In four or five weeks from the time of sowing they will be fit to transplant into the cold frames. In planting it is very important with Cabbage or Cauliflower that the plant is set down to the first leaf, so that the stem is all under ground, for, if exposed, it will be split by the action of the frost, and will be injured in consequence. The plants are usually set out from the middle of March to the middle of April, in rows about two feet apart, and eighteen inches between the plants in rows. This earliest crop matures in June. For second early the early kinds should be sown first week in April and planted out in May. This crop should mature in July and August. The late varieties are usually sown in the early part of May, and the plants are set in July, at distances of three feet between the rows, and two feet between the plants. This crop matures September, October or November.



Celery Culture. Celery can be successfully grown with but little labor in any good garden soi?, by using plenty of well-rotted manure with a liberal sprinkling of coarse salt worked into it, and this mixture should be put into the trenches, working it well into the soil.

Growing the Plants. Sow in the open ground as soon as it is fit to work in April. Sow in rows, so that it can be kept free from weeds, until the seed germinates. After coming up, the plants should be partially shaded for a week or ten days, and see that the soil does not get too dry. When two inches high, thin and transplant to three inches apart. To insure good "stocky" plants, the tops should be cut back to within, say, two inches of the crown, when about four inches high.

Transplanting. The evening is the best time, and especially if after a shower; otherwise give them a good watering and you will lose but very in a dry time; the old method of setting in deep trenches is a thing of the past. Some of our most successful growers set on the level surface, while others prefer a broad, shallow trench, only three or four inches deep. These trenches should be at least three feet apart for the dwarf, and not less than four feet for the larger sorts; set plants in single rows not over six inches apart in the trench. Transplanting is done about the middle of June for the first (arly, and as late as the middle of August for the latest. Keep well cultivated, and in about six weeks "handling" should begin (never do this when wet from rain or dew). This is done to make the celery grow upright. The soil is drawn to the row from each side with an ordinary hoe. Now take at leaves of the plant in one hand and with the other draw the soil around it, pressing firmly, being careful that no soil gets between the leaves, as it is apt to cause rust, or rot the plant. In about two weeks, or as often as it is necessary to keep the leaves in this upright position, more soil should be drawn to the row.

Culture. This seed should be sown early in March in a hotbed, greenhouse, or inside the window or sitting room, where a night temperature of not less than sixty degrees is kept, in drills five inches apart and half an inch deep. When the plants are about two inches high they should be set out three inches apart in boxes three inches deep or potted into three inch pots, allowing a single plant to a pot. They are sometimes shifted a second time into larger pots, by which process the plants are rendered more sturdy and branching. About the middle of May, in this latitude, the plants may be set in the open ground. They are planted for early crops on light, sandy soil at a distance of three feet apart, in hills in which a good shovelful of rotted manure has been mixed. On heavy soils which are not suited for an early crop, they should be planted four feet apart. Water freely at the time of transplanting, and shelter from the sun a few days until the plants are established. Tomatoes will always produce greater crops and be of better flavor when staked up, or when trained agains walls or fences.



About Lawns and Lawn Grass Seed FORMATION OF LAWNS FROM SEED

It is a well-ascertained fact that a thicker and more prolonged growth is produced by a mixture of many sorts of grasses than by only one or two. For every different kind and condition of soil there are grasses that are especially suitable. Some sorts do best on high ground and in dry weather; others prefer plenty of moisture. Some mature so early, and others so late, that from the beginning of spring until winter sets in there is no time when one species or another is not at its best. The quantities given are the minimum, and may often be increased to advantage.

The ground should be thoroughly drained and well prepared. The soil ought not be too rich, as a rapid growth is not wanted in the grasses of a lawn; but the surface should be as much alike in quality as possible and thoroughly pulverized. After sowing, the ground should be rolled in order to press the seed firmly into the soil. The proper time to sow grass seed depends, of course, upon the latitude. In the Central and Eastern States from March 15th to the middle of May is the best time, but in favorable seasons the sowing may be done up to July 1st. Seed may also be sown in the fall, provided it is done early enough to secure a good, strong growth before winter sets in. The sowing should be done when the ground is moist, or before an expected rain, and a subsequent rolling is always advisable.



The wondrously beautiful and interesting Nerines are now beginning to receive the appreciation they deserve. For really choice effect in the autumn nothing can surpass them. They are bighly useful as cut flowers and make beautiful and interesting pot plants for conservatory, window or table decoration. Large bulbs produce under the simplest conditions one, two or even three spikes, two feet or more high, which are crowned with large and gorgeous umbels of bloom which last a long time. They should be potted as soon as received in pots of a size about one inch larger in diameter than the diameter of the bulbs; several bulbs can be planted together in a pot or pan, in fact this method is advised. Any good garden soil will grow them, but preferably use two parts of good, fibrous ioam to one part of well-decomposed cow manure, and add if the soil is clayer, sufficient sharp sand to make it loose and friable. Water sparingly until active growth begins, but after the plants are in full leaf they must be very liberally supplied with water, taking care at all times to provide ample drainage.







Dig the holes wide enough to admit the roots in their natural position without cramping, and deep enough to allow the tree to staud the same depth it stood in the nursery, throw the surface and the subsoil in separate piles; cut off smoothly from the under side all broken or bruised roots and cut back the past season's growth of top one-half to two-thirds, leaving two to three good buds to each branch—except for fall planting in cold climates, when it is best to defer top-pruning until spring, in a little water and press firmly with the foot, filling all the cavities and air spaces with earth so that it will come in contact with all the roots; continue to fill up and keep pressed until the hole is full, when it should be covered with loose dirt to prevent baking, being careful not to get too deep.

NEVER PUT ANY MANURE IN THE HOLES. A little bone dust is best in the bottom of the hole, and the fertilizers applied to the surface and worked in. A covering of coarse manure, straw, litter, hay, or even stones the first season, will retain the moisture, prevent injury from drought, and be of great benefit during the dry season.

SMALL FRUIT PLANTS should be set in a pail of two or three inches of water and taken out one at a time as planted, and not allow the roots to be exposed to the sun or air. If not ready to plant strawberries on arrival, do not pour water on them in the packages or in the bunches, as they will surely heat and spoil. They may be spread out thinly in shallow trenches with their crowus even with the surface, and heeled-in as advised for trees, and sprinkled with water and shaded for a few days.






Front section taken out so the interior can be seen




Fig. 76, showing the Double Wheel Hoe set up as a Single Wheel
