


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

1. Military occupational specialties have been established in the Scientific Services Career Field for identification of scientific and professional personnel in several educational areas. (See Change 1, SR 615-25-15.) Identification of scientific and professional personnel, however, will not be limited to these specialties. Individuals having prerequisites for identification as scientific and professional personnel in any of the major areas included in Appendix II, SR 615-25-38, which do not come within the military occupational specialty structure set forth in SR 615-25-15, as changed, may be identified by an appropriate title. For Example: An individual with a college degree in personnel management may not be identified by any of the Scientific Services Career Field MOS's contained in Change 1, SR 615-25-15, but he may be identified as a "Personnel Management Research Assistant", or any other appropriate title, because personnel management is one of the authorized scientific and professional areas covered in Appendix II, SR 615-25-38.

2. In order that this Command may secure its proportionate share of the enlisted personnel with scientific and professional backgrounds who are entering the Army and that proper initial assignments may be made within this theater, it is necessary that the needs of all units for this type of personnel be known. Accordingly, commencing with the month of December 1951, each of the above addressees will submit a monthly requisition for scientific and professional enlisted personnel to CINCFE, Attn: AG-RR, so as to arrive not later than the 15th of each month.

a. Requisitions will reflect the number of personnel required, by military occupational specialty (see Change 1, SR 615-25-15) or by educational category, will indicate the unit to which assignment is desired, and will be prepared substantially as indicated in the sample form contained in the inclosed Appendix, which is furnished as a guide only.

b. Requisitions will reflect requirements for scientific and professional personnel for the second subsequent month. For example, requisitions submitted as of 15 December 1951 will reflect requirements for the calendar month of February 1952, and requisitions submitted as of 15 January 1952 will reflect requirements for March 1952.

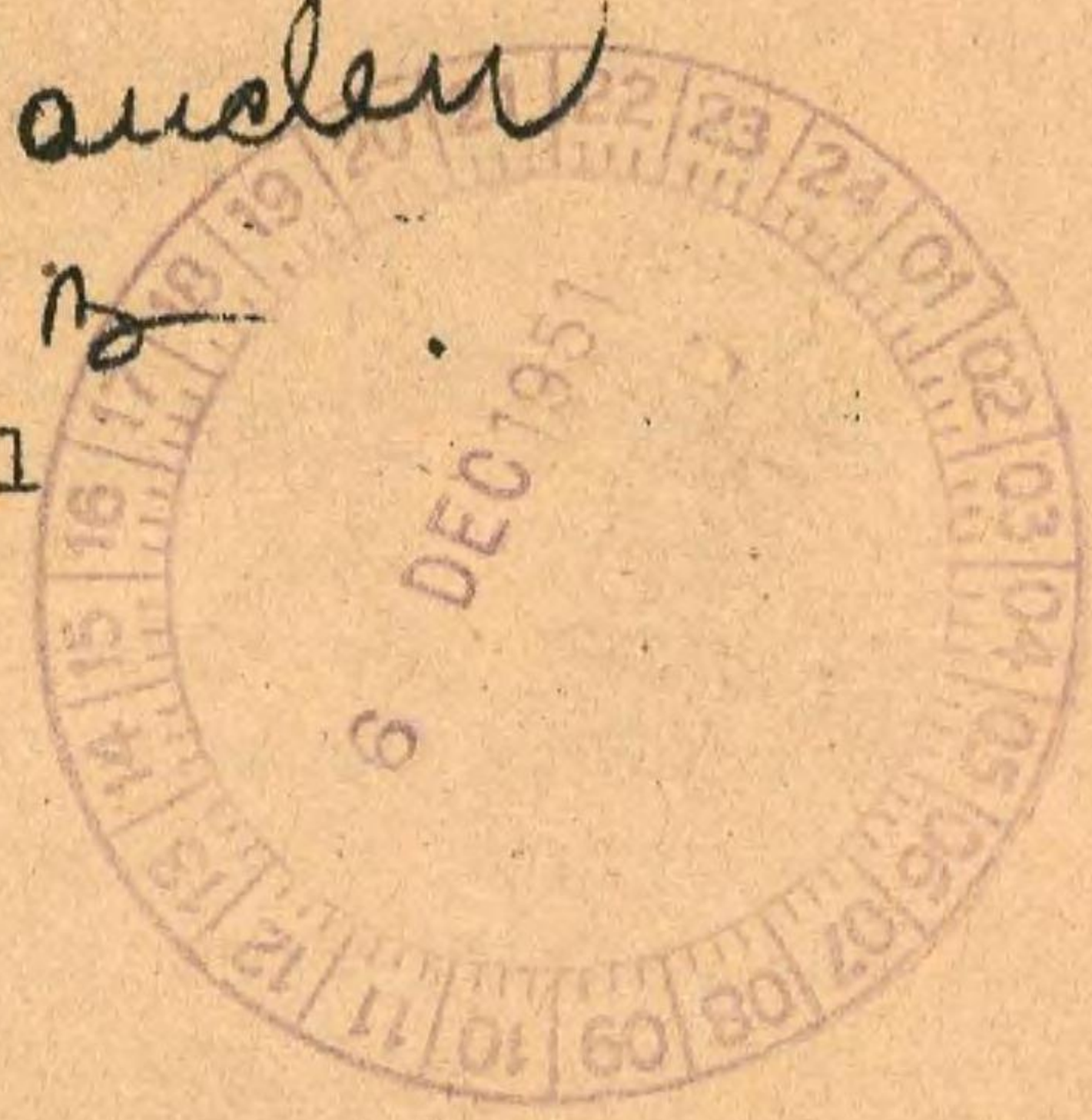
c. The unfilled portions of requisitions or requests previously submitted will be cancelled as of the last day of the month in which a new requisition is received.

3. These requisitions for scientific and professional personnel are exempt from Reports Control under the provisions of para 4b, AR 305-15.

2. Effective 1 September 1951, the provisions of paragraph 3, Far East
Command Circular 51, dated 24 September 1949, pertaining to the marriage of
military or civilian personnel serving with the Occupation Forces, will be
amended to include the following paragraph:

"Army personnel whose marriages to non-United States citizens have
been, or are approved, under the provisions of this Circular will not be
authorized extensions of foreign service tours in the Far East Command."

3. Personnel of this category will be reassigned to the zone of
interior or territory of residence upon becoming eligible under current
rotation criteria or upon completion of 36 months actual service in current
foreign service tour, whichever is sooner. Personnel now stationed in Korea
will be reassigned to the zone of interior or territory of residence only
upon becoming eligible for rotation from Korea.

4. Personnel, married to foreign nationals, who are processed through
the Japan Replacement Training Center or the Sasebo Replacement Depot on
rotation will not be reassigned within the Far East Command; enlisted
personnel returning to the zone of interior for discharge or release from
active service will not be enlisted or reenlisted in any component of the

Army for further service in the Far East Command.

5. Personnel returned from Korea who are married to foreign nationals, or who desire to marry foreign nationals, will upon arrival in Japan be authorized by Commanding General, Japan Logistical Command, the minimum period of temporary duty to accomplish marriage and/or initiate action toward obtaining immigration visas as provided in reference b.

6. CIC, linguist, and other personnel specifically authorized by Commander-in-Chief, Far East are exempt from the provisions of this directive.

1. It is requested that the attached form be completed and returned through your division chief to G2 Administration not later than 8 August 1951.

2. Reference attached form:

a. In the upper left hand corner of the form the section will be entered as G2 or CIS, whichever is appropriate.

b. Under paragraph 5, officers who were in Korea, prior to 1 July 1950, on present tour of overseas duty, with or without dependents will enter the necessary information and receive credits at the rate of 1.5 credits per month.

c. Bachelor officers will enter all time served on current tour in Japan under paragraph 3 of the attached form at the rate of 1 credit per month.

3. It will be noted that the attached form is to be filled out as of 31 August 1951 and that major portions of a month in excess of fifteen (15) days will be computed as a full month.

4. Personnel who have been on TDY from GHQ to Korea at any time on current tour in excess of fifteen (15) days, will receive credit at the rate of 1.5 credits per month.

1. In order to determine the eligibility of officers in General Headquarters for return to Zone of Interior under newly announced rotation criteria, it is requested that the attached form be completed by each officer of your section. Upon completion, and not later than 10 August, the forms will be returned through your office to the Adjutant General, GHQ, (Attn: AG-PA).

2. In the event that a discrepancy is disclosed after comparison of the officer's statement and records on file in the Adjutant General's office, it is requested that the officer be made available for interview upon call to your Administrative Officer.

3. Forms for those officers of your section who are now on indefinite TDY or a period in excess of 15 days in Korea will be completed insofar as information is available to you and forwarded to the Adjutant General, GHQ, (Attn: AG-PA) not later than 10 August.

4. Any information as to eligibility for constructive credits may be obtained by calling CWO Baker, Room 246, Dai Ichi Building, (Tp 26-7342).

MEMORANDUM FOR: Chief of Staff

SUBJECT: Rotation *plan for F.E.C.*

1. Attached as Tab A in CINCFFE message CX 57304, dated 9 March 1951, which established the present FEC combat rotation plan based entirely on rotation out of Korea after a minimum of six months service in combat type units or 12 months service elsewhere in Korea since 1 July 1950.
2. Normal rotation was suspended by CINCFFE message CX 57102, dated 2 July 1950, attached as Tab B, after approval by DEPTAR.
3. Attached as Tab C is DEPTAR message DA 95360, dated 1 July 1951, which points out the following facts concerning rotation:
 - a. DEPTAR can not support man-wise or logistically a plan that permits rotation after six months in combat.
 - b. DEPTAR's resources indicate possible support of rotation after a longer period, perhaps nine or ten months.
 - c. CINCFFE has authority to assign combat veterans to stations elsewhere in the Far East Command.
 - d. Deployment of 40th and 45th Divisions will initiate intra-theater unit rotation and aid in solution of rotation problem.
4. An examination of the factors coincident with the present rotation situation is contained in Tab D, which briefly indicate:
 - a. A backlog of 55,000 eligible enlisted rotantees existed in Eighth Army on 1 July 1951, which should be dissipated on or about 1 September 1951.
 - b. A backlog of 4,500 eligible officer rotantees existed in Eighth Army on 1 July 1951, which can not be cleared prior to 1 November 1951.

c. A backlog of 2,400 eligible officer returnees existed in the Far East Command outside Korea on 1 July 1951, which can not be eliminated prior to 1 April 1952.

5. A new rotation plan to go into effect 1 September 1951 is proposed in Tab E which:

a. Establishes rotation to the Zone of the Interior on a theater-wide basis.

b. Provides for intra-theater rotation.

c. Authorizes added constructive service credit for combat personnel.

d. Directs rotation to the Zone of the Interior those having the longest periods of service, actual or constructive, before those having less service.

e. Should permit return to a reasonable fixed tour of duty in the Far East Command (36 months) by 1 April 1952, provided there is no major reduction in projected shipments of replacements or large scale redistribution of personnel and shipping.

6. Attached as Tab F is the directive to the major commands to implement the plan proposed in Tab E.

7. Tab G advises the Department of the Army of the major details of Tab E and the date the plan will be announced in the Far East Command.

8. Tab H is the planned public release of the revised rotation plan outlined in Tab E.

9. Tab I revises certain details of current policy regarding rotation of individuals on emergency leave outside the Far East Command.

10. Recommendations:

a. That the proposed plan (Tab E) be approved.

b. That the following be approved:

(1) Tab F, message to Major Commands.

(2) Tab G, message to DEPTAR.

(3) Tab H, press release.

(4) Tab I, message concerning emergency leave.

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REVISED ROTATION PLAN

1. Current combat rotation criteria are rescinded.
2. Normal foreign service tours in FEC, as specified in SR 600-175-1, as changed, continue to be suspended until otherwise directed by DEPTAR or this Headquarters.
3. Rotation out of FEC will be governed by the following principles:
 - a. Rotation out of FEC to another theater or the CONUS is based on the amount of time served on current foreign service tour, with those having the longest period of actual or constructive service being rotated first.
 - b. There will be no rotation to the XI from a subordinate command in FEC until a FEC tour of duty is completed, or the individual is surplus to the requirements of FEC and cannot be further economically employed.
 - c. Intra-theater rotation will be encouraged, and when necessary, directed, e.g.:
 - (1) Individuals may be rotated from Korea after a specified period of service to another command in FEC to complete their FEC tour of duty in the command to which assigned.
 - (2) Individuals initially assigned outside Korea will, if necessary, prior to a specified period of time, be rotated to Korea to serve a portion of or complete their FEC tour therein.
 - d. Insofar as is practicable, all replacements arriving in FEC will be assigned to Korea.
 - e. A replacement must be present to relieve a rotatee regardless of the command, except when the rotatee is in excess to the requirements of the command and no replacement is required. In Korea, the replacement must be present in the Division Replacement Company or comparable replacement unit prior to the departure of the rotatee from his parent unit.
 - f. When an individual completes his FEC tour of duty he will be rotated within 30 days subsequent to becoming eligible for rotation unless he voluntarily extends his tour of duty. In the case of critical specialists for whom no replacement is immediately available, rotation may be suspended an additional 30 days, and then only upon approval of the major subordinate command concerned (Eighth Army, JCS, etc.).
 - g. Certain categories of oriental area-language specialists will continue to operate on an intra-theater rotation plan only.
4. For control purposes, FEC will be divided into three (3) rotation zones:

- a. "A" - Close Combat Zone (Divisions and separate combat type units in Korea).
- b. "B" - Combat Zone (All Korea except Zone "A").
- c. "C" - Communications Zone (Japan, RYCOM, PHILCOM, and MARBO).

5. All time served in a zone will have a constructive service value based on the following ratio: Close Combat Zone "A", 4 to 1; Combat Zone "B", 2 to 1; Communication Zone "C", Japan 1 to 1, RYCOM, PHILCOM, and MARBO 1.5 to 1. Officers serving in the Communication Zone "C" without their dependents subsequent to 1 July 1950 will receive .5 additional constructive service per month served therein regardless of the area. (Japan 1.5 to 1; and RYCOM, PHILCOM, and MARBO 2 to 1). The total service time an individual accrues in FEC will be computed on the basis of the above constructive service ratio for the zone in which he is serving or has served. Thus, an individual will receive constructive service credit for one (1) month's service in zones and under conditions indicated as follows:

a. Zone "A"	- - - -	- Four (4) months.
b. Zone "B"	- - - -	- Two (2) months.
c. Zone "C"	Japan	
	Without dependents	One and one-half ($1\frac{1}{2}$) months.
	With dependents	One (1) month.
	RYCOM, PHILCOM, MARBO	
	Without dependents	Two (2) months.
	With Dependents	One and one-half ($1\frac{1}{2}$) months.

6. Rotation out of FEC will be on the basis of the individual with the greatest number of months service, actual or constructive, served on current tour being rotated first, regardless of the zone. (Incomplete current tours, a portion of which was served outside FEC will be computed on the ratio of normal tours established in SR 600-175-1.) The number that would be rotated during any period would be equal to the number of replacements received for rotation purposes during the period. For example, 38,500 enlisted replacements are scheduled to arrive in FEC during July. Considering that the battle and non-battle casualties remain stable, 10,500 would be deducted to cover their loss, plus ERC and BTS returnees. 28,000 enlisted personnel with the greatest number of months' credit would then be selected for rotation during July. The number of months service that would constitute eligibility might be 36 or 42 or more. The out-off service time, i.e., the number of months service that would constitute eligibility for rotation, would be determined by taking the number of individuals to be rotated from the top of the length of service list and noting the least number of months service represented in the group. For example, machine records would tabulate from field reports the number of men completing 39,

40, 41, and 42 months service in July. Assume there are 5,000 completing 42 months service, 10,000 completing 41 months service, 15,000 completing 40 months service, and 20,000 completing 39 months service. If the number to be rotated is 5,000, the cut-off service would be 42 months. If the number to be rotated is 30,000, 40 months service would be the cut-off score, etc. This plan is based on the premise that replacements will continue to arrive in the number promised by DEPTAR, which will progressively lower the out-off score until the time served in FEC commands is equal to the normal foreign service tours established by DEPTAR.

7. a. Rotation out of Zone A to Zones B or C, or Zone B to C would constitute intra-theater rotation and would require less service time than for FEC - ZI rotation. This will permit the combat weary soldier to get relief prior to mental or physical collapse. The number of months service required for intra-theater rotation will be a fixed time, will have no relation to the FEC - ZI rotation score, and would represent a "zone of consideration" only. Intra-theater rotation from Japan to Korea would be encouraged and in some instances directed. It would apply principally to officers and specialists that can be effectively employed both in Japan and Korea.

b. Number of months constructive service within the theater to be considered for intra-theater rotation would be as follows:

	<u>Not more than</u>	<u>Not less than</u>
(1) From Zone C to Zones A or B	20	--
(2) From Zone B to Zone C	30 (12 months actual service if all in Zone B.)	24
(3) From Zone A to Zone C	30 (6 months actual service if all in Zone A.)	24

c. Intra-theater rotation would be voluntary for the most part, but could further be controlled by command levies based on MOS requirements, when the requirement is not filled by volunteers, or when overstrength can be reduced by shifting personnel to vitalize rotation.

d. CINCPAC would continue to take final action on all applications for transfer, and upon approval the individual would be rotated.

8. Extensions of tours of duty in Zone C would be limited to one (1) of six (6) months duration subsequent to becoming eligible for rotation. Once an extension is granted, months credited are no longer considered as a basis for rotation, and regardless of the rotation criteria applicable at the time the individual completes his extension, he is returned to the ZI.

9. *(Including Koreans)* CIC and Oriental linguists would continue on intra-theater rotation only. Certain other critical categories of personnel (CID, Doctors, light Aircraft Pilots, etc.) would have to be placed solely in intra-theater rotation pending arrival of suitable replacements from the ZI. Each category so eliminated from regular rotation would require Chief of Staff approval.

10. This plan would be implemented 1 September 51 by the following procedure:

a. Direct CG Eighth Army to continue to rotate only those individuals who were eligible for combat rotation prior to 1 June 51. (Eighth Army has already initiated this measure.)

b. Enlisted personnel eligible for combat rotation prior to 1 June 51 would be excluded from the new rotation plan and would be rotated prior to 1 Sep 51, insofar as practicable. (This can be accomplished provided combat losses are not excessive, and DEPTAR ships the replacements promised in DA 95360.)

c. Begin at once to compute constructive service for all personnel in FEC except b above, projected to 1 Sep 51 based on the above plan assuming no major changes in personnel distribution will result in the interim period.

d. Require a report be submitted to CINCPAC not later than 15 Aug 51 indicating the months service credited all personnel in the command as of 1 Sep 51, except individuals included in b above.

e. Based on the projected number of replacements allocated to major commands in September and subsequent months, issue quotas to major commanders for the rotation of personnel with longest periods of service.

f. Commensurate with operational requirements and maintaining full strength in all FEC major commands, allocate maximum number of personnel by quotas to major commanders for rotation.

g. Monthly quotas will be accomplished by announcement of the cut-off score for accumulated service. Cut-off score to be based on strengths, operational requirements, and scores of personnel eligible.

11. In the event hostilities are terminated, the close combat Zone ("A") would cease to exist and henceforth all service credits for Korea would be based on Zone "B". All service credits credited prior to the cease-fire date would remain valid, regardless of the zone in which the individual is serving.

12. In the event cease-fire is of a temporary nature and hostilities are resumed, the period of cease-fire, if of short duration, would not cause the elimination of the close combat zone "A" as indicated in paragraph 11 above. If the duration of cease-fire were of a month or more in duration, that period would be counted as time served in the "B" zone.

13. The impact of the deployment of the 40th and 45th Divisions in Korea would initially have no major effect on the rate of rotation. After the division they relieve is redeployed to Japan, if the replacement flow from the EI remains constant, rotation would be speeded up for approximately seven or eight months because no replacements would be required in these divisions to support rotation.

14. While dependent travel is a separate problem, and is being studied as such, constructive credits for service in FEC could be considered among

other factors for the establishment of priority for dependent travel. The proposed rotation plan will not mitigate against the officer making his decision whether to request dependent travel. He will know his constructive service score. Based on this and the cut-off score for rotation in effect at the time, plus the current waiting time for dependent travel at his station, he can decide whether he wants to complete his tour in his present status or request travel for his dependents. If he is joined by his dependents, he loses the .5 constructive credit factor and remains in the theater until his tour is completed, or for one year subsequent to the arrival of his dependents, whichever is later. Individuals rotated from Korea to Japan could not apply for dependent travel until arrival at new duty station. Resumption of dependent travel would materially increase voluntary intra-theater rotation, particularly from Korea to Japan.

15. Initially it would not be stressed, but an element of the plan should include a maximum tour in FEC for all personnel. This is not included in the present plan because the intent of this initial plan is to rotate those desiring rotation as soon as possible. To force rotation of those with long periods of service in FEC not desiring rotation would prolong the rotation of those desiring to rotate. After the backlog of eligibles is dissipated, a 48 month maximum tour could be established in FEC. This would preclude enlisted men from reenlisting to fill their own vacancy and thus prolonging their foreign service indefinitely.

1. The term "Linguist Personnel" as used in this letter includes only Chinese, Japanese, Korean, and Russian linguists.
2. Military personnel are classified as linguists if records of the individual indicate one or more of the following:
 - a. Graduate from an Army Language School.
 - b. Received a grade of "Fair" on the Department of the Army Fluency Test.
 - c. Received an ATIS language score of 8.0 or higher in the language concerned.
3. Chinese and Korean linguists will not be rotated from Korea until further notice, as replacements are not available from the Zone of the Interior or the Far East Command at this time.
4. Japanese and Russian linguists who would normally qualify for rotation under the provisions of paragraphs 3 and 5, letter, Headquarters EUSAK, file 210.31 KGP, Subject: "Officer and Enlisted Rotation", dated 3 May 1951, may be reassigned within the Far East Command under the following conditions:
 - a. Linguists occupying authorized linguist positions may be returned after arrival of replacements, and completion of necessary orientation.
 - b. Replacements for linguists occupying non-linguist positions in Korea will be obtained from non-linguist personnel in the replacement stream.
 - c. Linguist personnel as defined above may be returned for reassignment within FECOM without regard to rotation quota.

1. Request that the 441st CIC Detachment be authorized to canvass units in Japan and Korea for CIC replacements.

2. At the present time there is a shortage of forty-three (43) CIC warrant officers (or Co grade officers in substitution) and three (3) enlisted men in the FEC. The Chief, CIC has advised that CIC officer, warrant officer and enlisted replacements are not available for shipment to the FEC (Incl 1).

3. 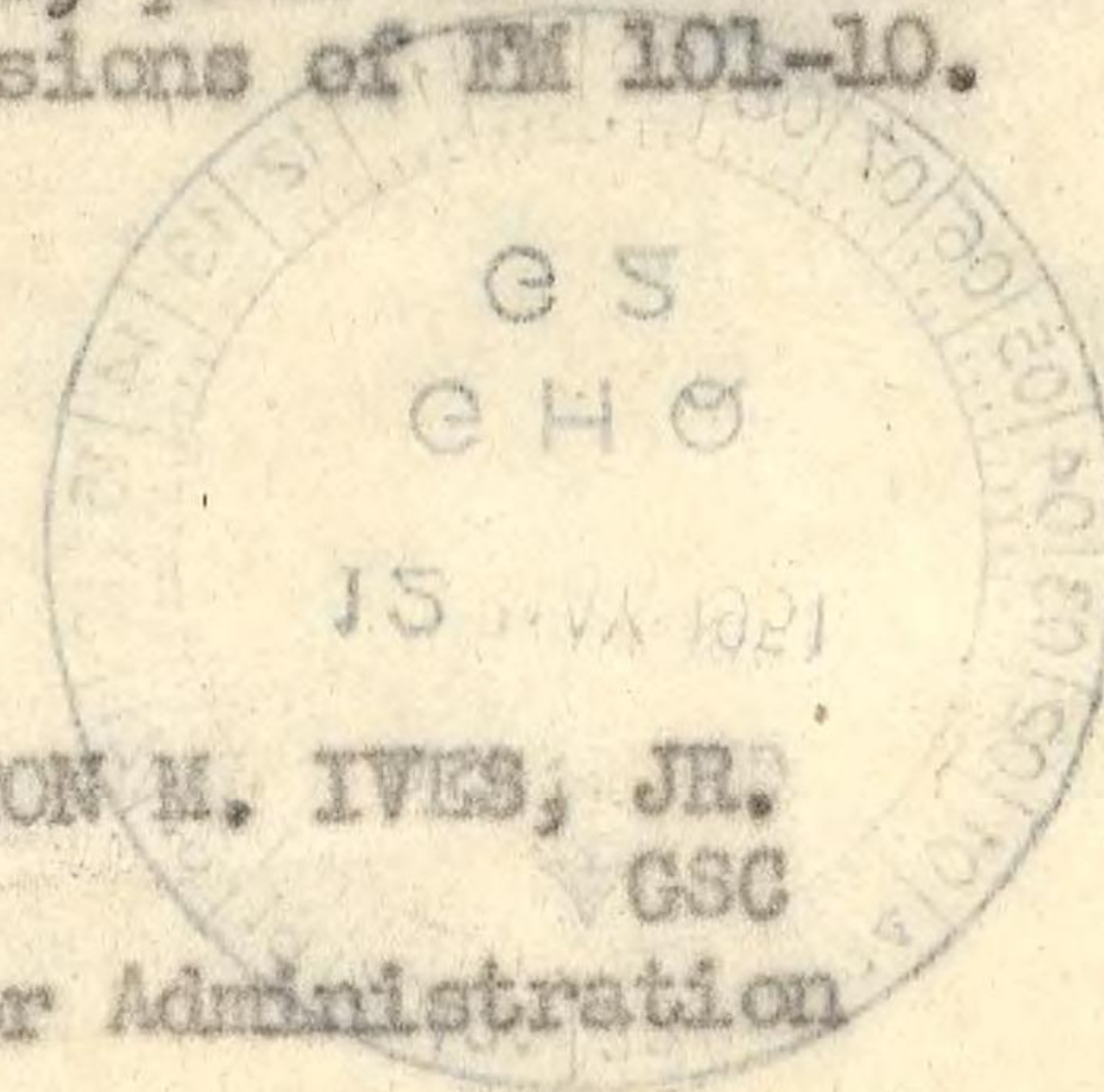

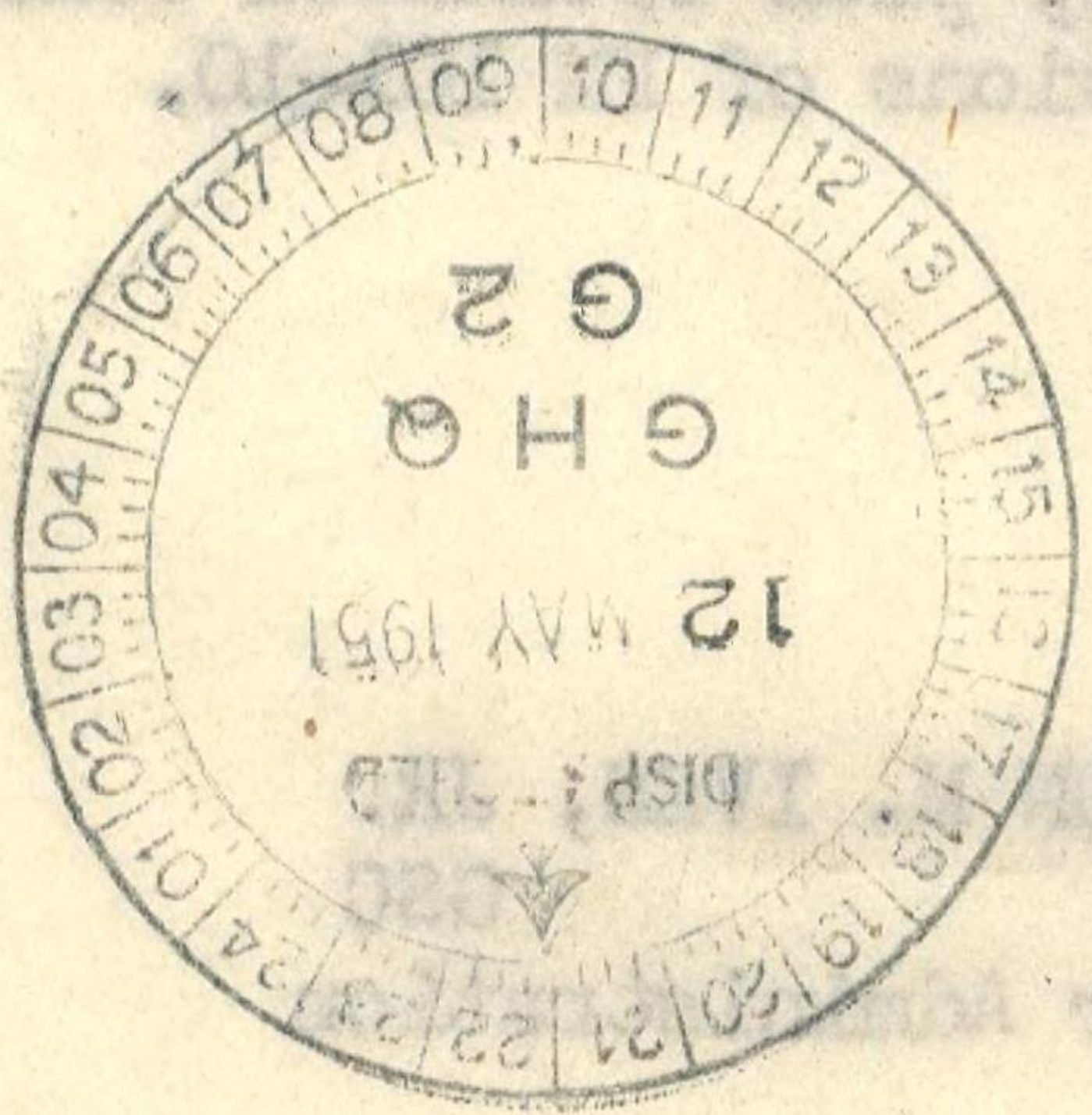

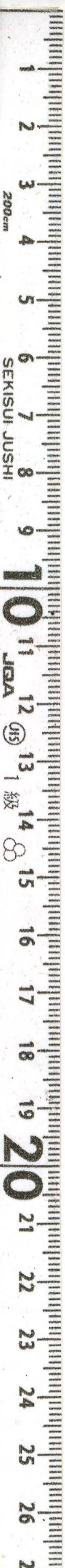

Reference CINCPAC message CX56953 dated 5 March 1951; DA message 23913 dated 9 March 1951; CINCPAC message CX58326 dated 22 March 1951; DA message 87126 dated 30 March 1951; and DA message 32663 dated 7 April 1951 (Incl 1), concerning CIC replacements for CIC detachments in the FEC. The CINCPAC messages requested CIC replacements to which DA replied that CIC officer, warrant officer and enlisted replacements were not available.

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2. In view of the current shortage of CIC personnel in the FEC (45 warrant officers and 3 enlisted men) together with the CIC rotation policy now in effect for CIC personnel in Korea (Incl 2), there will be an immediate and continuing need for CIC replacements.

3. There are approximately three hundred forty (340) CIC personnel assigned to CIC detachments in Korea. Under the present CIC rotation policy, 35% of these CIC personnel are immediately eligible for rotation. The others will become eligible as indicated in inclosure 3. CINCPAC message CX 58675 (Incl 4) establishes procedure whereby personnel in Korea may elect to return to the ZI or request further service in the FEC. Approved plan for rotation of CIC personnel in Korea prescribes the return of CIC rotatees to the 441st CIC Det for duty pending arrival of CIC replacements from the ZI for those CIC personnel desiring return to the ZI. It is estimated that 75 - 85% of the CIC personnel rotated from Korea will desire return to ZI. The 441st CIC Det will furnish CIC replacements for CIC personnel eligible to be rotated from Korea. CIC replacements for those CIC personnel desiring return to the ZI must necessarily come from CIC sources in the ZI. CINCPAC message C59507 dated 7 April 1951 (Incl 5), advised Chief, CIC of rotation program and number of CIC personnel immediately eligible for rotation. 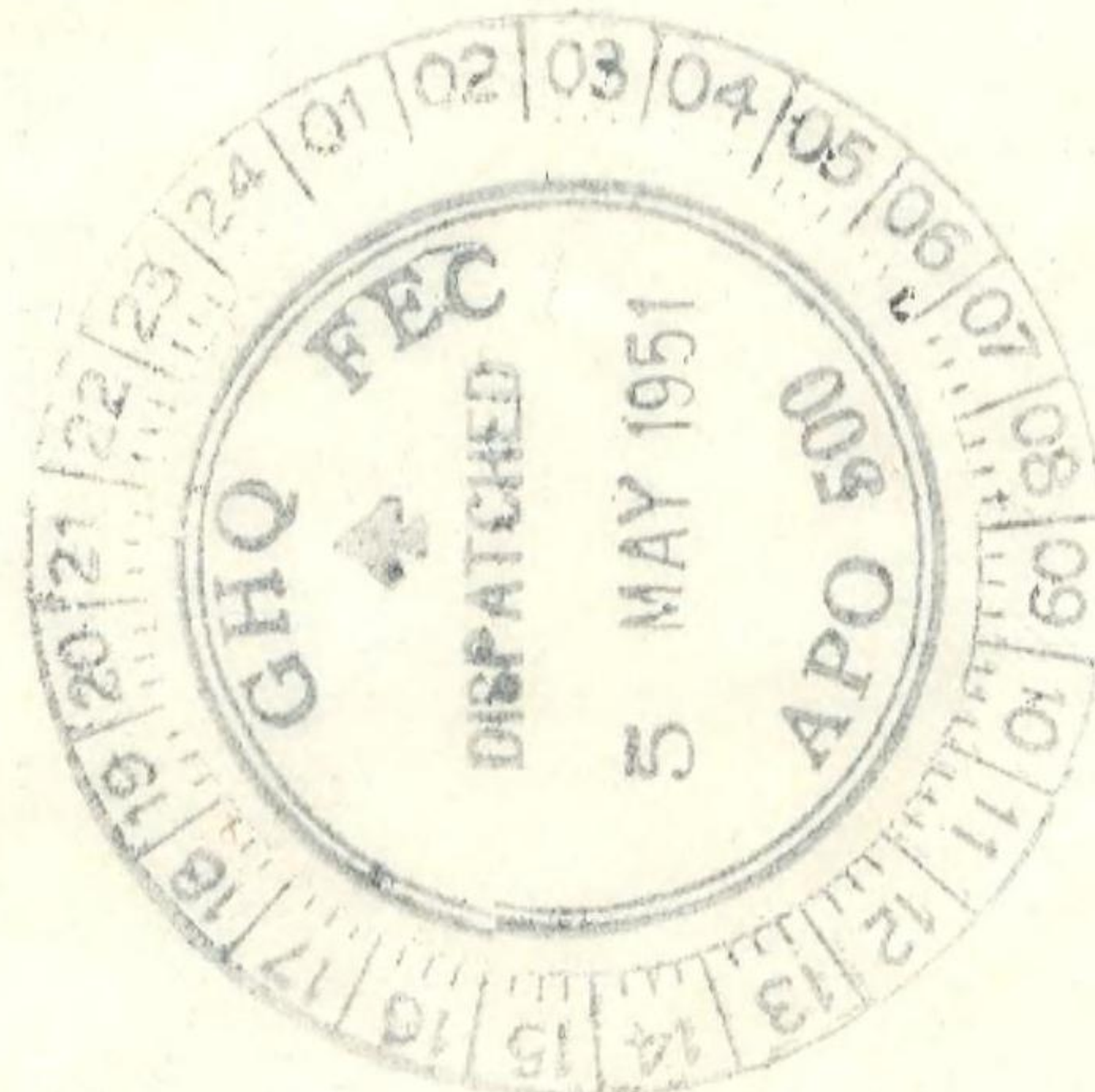

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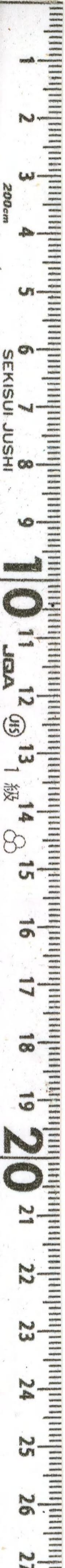

SUBJECT: Obese Personnel

TO: Unit Commanders and Chiefs of Staff Sections,
Headquarters and Service Command.

1. I am very much concerned about the number of obese, obviously overweight and excessively corpulent, personnel throughout the Command. Specifically, I refer to those individuals of the flabby, soft, seam-bursting, bulging-at-the-middle type, who obviously are eating and drinking too much or are not getting sufficient exercise, or both.

2. Except for those who have been officially designated otherwise, all individuals of this Command must be physically qualified for combat or emergency duty. I will not permit this Command to become a haven for gluttons and lounge addicts.

3. Each immediate Commanding Officer is expected to take prompt and positive corrective action with reference to any obese personnel under his control. Such action should include special physical exercises (to include pushing away from mess and refreshment tables at the proper time); regulated diets, and in appropriate cases, consultation with medical officers as to appropriate remedial action. Particular attention should be paid to those individuals occupying positions of a sedentary nature or those with considerable spare time on their hands. Inactivity and idleness both breed obesity.

4. As I observe individuals of your command or section from time to time who appear to be too corpulent, I will expect a report from you as to progress being made in corrective action directed by this letter of instructions.

Brief on Military Intelligence Specialists

25 June 1951

In addition to the general categories of intelligence officers, there are six groups of MIS specialists which should be considered in an analysis of the personnel situation. These groups are:

Photo Interpreters
 Interrogators
 Translators
 Order of Battle Specialists
 Equipment Identification Specialists
 Intelligence Analysts

Each of these categories of specialists presents a different problem to the Eighth Army. Each will be discussed separately.

The most difficult and pressing problems lie in the Photo Interpreter situation. Although the authorized strength is 44 officers and 112 enlisted men, and increases have been requested which would raise this to 55 officers and 140 EM, present actual strength is only 28 officers and 65 EM. The problem is further complicated by the fact that approximately half of these are already eligible for rotation. A recent survey revealed that the phasing-out of enlisted reservists recalled to active duty will eliminate an additional number of EM. Rotation and phasing-out of reservists will result in an almost complete turnover in EM by November of this year. Twenty officer replacements have been promised during June and July, and it is anticipated that the officer situation will adjust itself. As for enlisted photo interpreters, only seven are reported to be available in the ZI. No more are expected until October, by which time the training program is expected to provide a flow of trained photo interpreter replacements.

G-1 has been requested to declare photo interpreters essential so as to keep the ERC personnel who would otherwise be lost.

Today's requirement is 30 officers and 110 enlisted men, with an additional 26 EM by 15 November. A replacement flow of ten officers and 25 EM is recommended each month until our requirements are met.

Linguist personnel (interrogators and translators) present no problem at this time. The present authorized strength is 44 officers and 170 EM. All units are up to strength. Replacements are coming in as rapidly as they can be placed. There is a very real problem, however, as to their training. More than 80% of the replacement personnel are untrained as interrogators. On-the-job training is the only method available for turning these replacements into qualified interrogators.

Present replacement requirements are shown on the attached chart. The phased release of enlisted reservists, which must be completed by 15 November will affect the linguist situation only slightly -- 17 men falling within this category. Four officers and 35 enlisted men are now eligible for rotation.

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Order of Battle

Order of battle specialists number 19 officers and 36 enlisted men throughout the command. Since most of our order of battle specialists arrived in February the replacement problem has none of the urgency of the photo interpreters. At the present time approximately 3 officers and 6 enlisted men are eligible for rotation. Approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ of enlisted men will be affected by the phasing-out of the enlisted reservists.

No order of battle specialists are coming through the pipeline.

We need an immediate monthly flow of 2 officers and 4 enlisted men to meet replacement requirements for order of battle personnel.

Equipment Identification Personnel

The Technical Intelligence Coordinator teams operating at Corps and Army levels number 6 officers and 12 enlisted men. Half of our enlisted men will be lost to us by 15 November and the balance on 1 December. As far as is known none of this type personnel are coming through the pipeline.

Intelligence Analysts

Intelligence analysts are used in G-2 sections; 2 per division, 6 per Corps (new TO/E), 7 at EUSAK, total 37 enlisted men. The recommended flow is 3 per month until November then 2 per month.

Technical Intelligence Collection in Korea May 1, 1951 to Date

a. Armor and Motorized Vehicles - - On 3 June five US M-46 tanks were knocked out by Russian 57mm AT Guns firing what was at first thought to be a new type of ammunition. Investigation by Ordnance and Armor technical intelligence experts revealed that the ammunition involved was APC-HE, APC-I and HVAP (Arrowhead), all of which have been encountered previously.

b. Infantry weapons and artillery - - The following significant identifications of weapons were made during the month of May: Chinese copy of Mauser rifle; Chinese light machine gun, M79; Soviet 76mm gun, M1902/30; Japanese 150mm howitzer; Japanese 105mm howitzer, M91. In addition, an assortment of rifles, machine guns and mortars of German, Swiss, Belgian and Japanese manufacture were identified.

c. Ammunition - - Capture, reported and evacuated were the following new types of enemy ammunition: Chinese copy of US 60MM mortar round; Chinese 57mm HEAT recoilless rifle ammunition.

d. Engineer Equipment - - The following new items were captured and evacuated to the ZI: Soviet AT mine, TM-41; Japanese mine, type 88; Soviet igniter, MUV.

e. Markings and Nameplate Data - - A considerable amount of marking data is being secured by Ordnance, Signal and Engineer technical intelligence teams. An Ordnance team has been placed at the CEM depot at MASAN to record markings from enemy equipment and prepare technical reports on newly identified ordnance materiel. Other Ordnance teams are presently engaged in the collection of markings from approximately 200 T-34/85 tanks and SU-765 located along the old PUSAN perimeter.

A team from the 524th Technical Intelligence Coordinator Detachment spent approximately 10 days at the Ordnance Ammunition Depot at HEUNDA recording markings from Chinese and Soviet ammunition. A report on these markings has been submitted to GHQ.

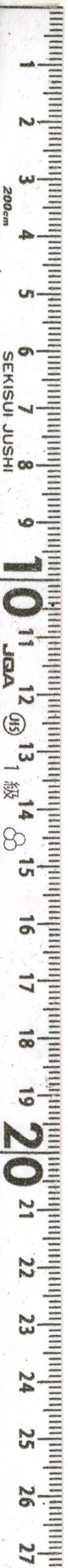
f. Miscellaneous - - Bombs dropped by enemy aircraft in the 25th Division area on 19 June were identified by fragments and tail assemblies as being 44lb fragmentation bombs of Soviet manufacture.

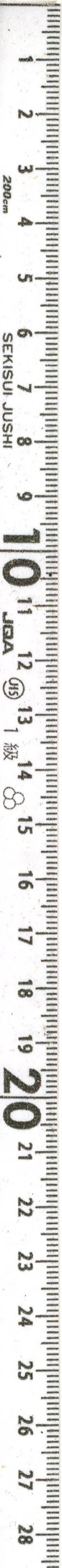

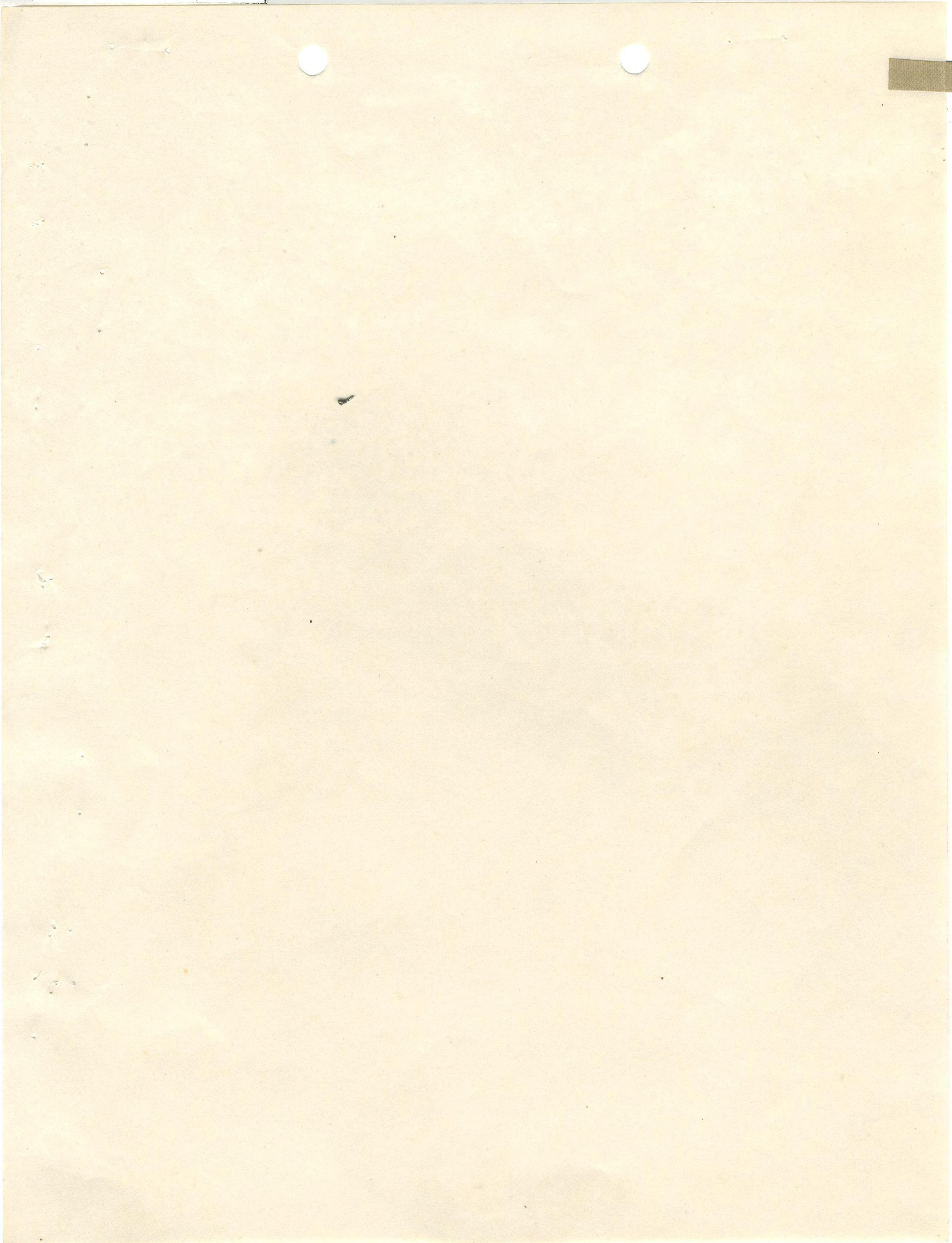
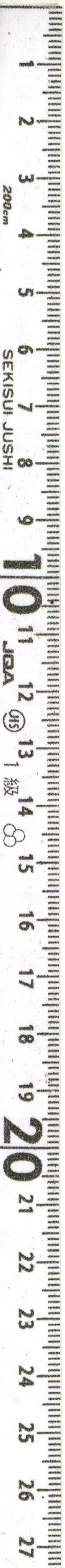

1. There is still a paramount need for an Army re-production unit capable of mass producing aerial photographs for use by Army units. Lack of adequate aerial photography is a serious detriment to the accomplishment of the intelligence mission of this Command. It is requested that the necessary equipment be obtained and shipped to Korea at the earliest practicable date. While the automatic printers, reputedly used in Europe during World War II, are highly desirable, manually operated printers are acceptable if they can be provided at an appreciably earlier date.

2. The unit visualized in the attached T/O&E (Incl 2) appears to be capable of accomplishing the desired results. The addition of one phototopographer (MOS 0004), and one draftsman (MOS 0076) is considered advisable. Preliminary action to procure necessary personnel from this Command indicates that some specialists are not available. When requirements are ascertained, this will be the subject of separate correspondence.

TO: Commanding General, Eighth Army, APO 301

1. By separate letter 24 September 1950, 30 copies of the manual "Joint Training Directives for Air-Ground Operations" were furnished your headquarters. This manual, published 1 September 1950, represents the latest doctrine for the conduct of air-ground operations and was prepared jointly by office, Chief of Army Field Forces, and Headquarters, Tactical Air Command.

2. There is no T/O&E organization presently designed to perform the ground force's function in the Joint Air Photo Center. The Engineer Officer, General Headquarter, Far East Command, prepared a draft of a proposed organization with a recommended list of equipment for such a unit, a copy of this proposed T/O&E is inclosed for your information. After consideration by your headquarters if it is determined that the capabilities of this proposed unit adequately meet your requirements, it is desired that the necessary action be taken to establish such a unit within your command. New improved equipment to perform the necessary photo reproduction for ground units is presently in the experimental stage with an estimated six months delay before delivery to using units. The necessary action to obtain this equipment will be initiated by General Headquarters, Far East Command, when it becomes available for issue.

3. a. The estimated time of arrival in the Far East Command for the remainder of the 20th Signal Air-Ground Liaison Company is 3 October 1950.

b. No information has been received from the Department of the Army concerning the arrival of photo interpreter teams requested by Commander-in-Chief, Far East, message CX59942, 12 August, and Commander-in-Chief, Far East, message CX60715, 20 August 1950.

c. At a conference held at Headquarters, Far East Air Forces, 21 September 1950, it was determined that the Air Force tactical air control parties presently with ground units are capable of controlling Naval and Marine carrier-based aircraft used in close support missions if the necessary

communications are established by prior planning. It is not considered necessary to duplicate these control parties in order to utilize carrier-based aircraft.

1. The procedure outlined in FM 31-35 and in pamphlet "Conduct of Air-Ground Operations" are the basis of joint air-ground operations in Korea. A pamphlet "Fire Support Coordination Center" published at the Field Artillery School, Fort Sill, May 1950 is the basis of setting up centers in the corps, divisions, and lower levels of this command.

2. a. The effective operation of JOC requires that the ground force component be adequately staffed, have fast, reliable communications, and have a photo interpretation team of experts to exploit the possibilities of aerial photographs.

b. Within a few days the staffing of the JOC should be completed from personnel now available or expected.

c. An Air-Ground Liaison Signal TO&E 11-547 Company is urgently required. With no hostile air opposition the 5th Air Force "Mosquito" planes supplemented by the ground force Dragonflies have supplied the means to provide in some measure a substitute for the lack of ground communications. The appearance of hostile air or of flak could vastly curtail mosquito and dragonfly operations. Consequently it is recommended the shipment of the Air-Ground Liaison Company requested of the Department of the Army be expedited.

d. The need for an Army Photograph Interpretation and Reproduction Center cannot be over emphasized. The establishment of such a center in Korea would permit full utilization of Air Force photographic capabilities and more complete and rapid exploitation of photographic intelligence. This headquarters has been advised that 15 photo-interpreter teams have been requisitioned from the Zone of the Interior. The early arrival of these teams, together with the necessary equipment for the establishment of a photographic Interpretation and Reproduction Center is urgently requested.

3. Neither FM 31-35 or the pamphlet "Conduct of Air-Ground Operations" makes provision for exploiting the possibilities of carrier-based aircraft in joint operation on land. In Korea to use available naval gun power it is recommended that the Navy provide land-based planes with Navy spotters to control Navy gun fire in close support missions and that Ground Liaison parties be provided to supported divisions when naval gun fire support is furnished.

4. It is requested that COMNAVFE be instructed to furnish this headquarters, daily, a brief summary report for the period 2000 - 2000 and prior to 0600 next day of close ground support air and gun missions and results.

It is considered that the procedures outlined therein, together with FM 31-35, represent the latest accepted doctrine in Air-Ground Operations and are in consonance with the concepts envisioned in the attached letter.

1. The Fifth Air Force air operations, in coordination with Eighth Army operations since the Korean action started, have been based on procedures prescribed in FM 31-35, dated August 1946. The organization for effective intergration of air action with that of the ground forces, as outlined in this manual, is based on World War II experience and refinements derived from subsequent field exercises and maneuvers.

2. Every effort is being made to provide the Fifth Air Force with that specialized means required to permit close cooperative action. However, in order that the Eighth Army can take fullest advantage of the air effort available, it also should be provided with certain specially trained personnel and equipment.

3. It is believed that more effective use can be made of the air effort available to the Eighth Army if an air-ground operations system were established within the Army to provide the commander thereof with the means of receiving and processing requests of subordinate ground commanders for air missions, and a method of rapid exchange of battle information. An estimate of personnel and equipment required is as follows:

a. One senior officer with G-2 air experience to supervise the operation of the air-ground system.

b. At the Joint Operations Center at Headquarters, Fifth Air Force in Korea: nine (9) G-3 Air Duty Officers, six (6) G-2 Air Duty Officers, and sufficient clerks to process requests from Divisions, exchange information with Air Combat Operations Officers, and to keep ground liaison officers at each air combat group advised of current battle information for pilot briefing.

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Letter from CG, FEAF, to CINCPAC, dtd 13 Aug 50, Subj: "Air-ground Operations"

c. One ground liaison officer team at each Fifth Air Force combat group to brief pilots who are assigned missions which are closely integrated with ground action and to interrogate these air crews subsequent to each mission.

4. The Fifth Air Force is capable of photographing enemy front lines daily in addition to other specific areas of interest to Army Headquarters and its subordinate units. However, the facilities furnished photo reconnaissance squadrons are not intended to be, nor are they sufficient to interpret and reproduce photography as required for ground force purposes. If an Army Photo Interpretation Center were furnished as contemplated in FM 31-35, full advantage could be taken of Air Force photographic potential.

5. Communications of a mobile type to connect the components of the air-ground operations system mentioned above make up the equipment of a Signal Company, Air Ground Liaison (Army). This unit links the G-3 Air and Air Liaison Officers at Divisions and the Ground Liaison Officers at airfields, with the Army Commander's air-ground operations section at the Joint Operations Center. The provision of such a signal company to the Eighth Army would assure maximum effectiveness in joining together the air and ground effort.

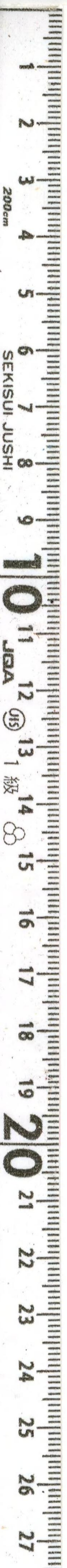

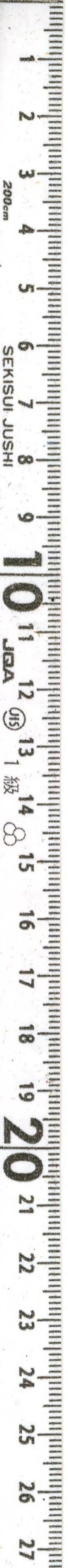

MEMORANDUM TO: The Secretary of the Army.

SUBJECT: Need for Air Photo Reproduction Personnel and Equipment.

1. The following deficiencies, if corrected, will aid materially in providing needed air photos to tactical units in Korea:

a. Shortage of photo reproduction equipment for Provisional Air Photo Interpretation and Reproduction Center (See Tab "A" for action taken to provide equipment).

b. Non existence of TO&E field army type Air Photo Reproduction and Interpretation Company has necessitated the organization of a Provisional Interpretation and Reproduction Unit which meets the minimum requirements. This provisional organization is dependent on personnel and equipment of existing Air Force reproduction facilities to meet the minimum requirements for reproduction of air photos for using tactical organizations.

2. A definite need exists for a TO&E field army type Air Photo Reproduction and Interpretation Company designed for the following:

To interpret air photos taken for the Army by the Air Forces, to provide reproduction in quantity of these air photos required by Army units and to deliver such material to combat units of the Army.

MEMORANDUM FOR: A C of S, G-2, Hq EUSAK

SUBJECT: Vital Aspects of Equipment for Engr Photo Reproduction Detachment.

1. The provisional Engr Photo Reproduction Detachment organized at this Hq in accordance with authority granted by GHQ contains standard items of Engineer photographic equipment and supplies. It has been determined that many of these items lack suitable characteristics essential to mass production of aerial photoprints. Further, several of the most essential items were not available in Japan at the time of unit activation. Through experience gained by working in close cooperation with the Air Force Photo Tech unit it was found that the highest production could be accomplished by using certain Air Force items of equipment until such time as newly developed Engineer items can be procured from the ZI. Radio request to GHQ FECOM (EUSAK Radio G-3-1671) reflects the particular items which were requested to be procured from Air Force sources. These items are listed below:

2. Action is being taken by JLCOM Engr to procure all the above items which are available from Air Force. Proposed substitutions for the Washers and Dryers have been found to be inadequate for efficient operation. It is desirable that the items requested be procured if maximum production of prints is to be guaranteed. It is not known to what extent the equipment list of this unit is patterned after the new Engr T/O & E type Photo Reproduction Units being organized in the ZI but for the immediate problem at hand it

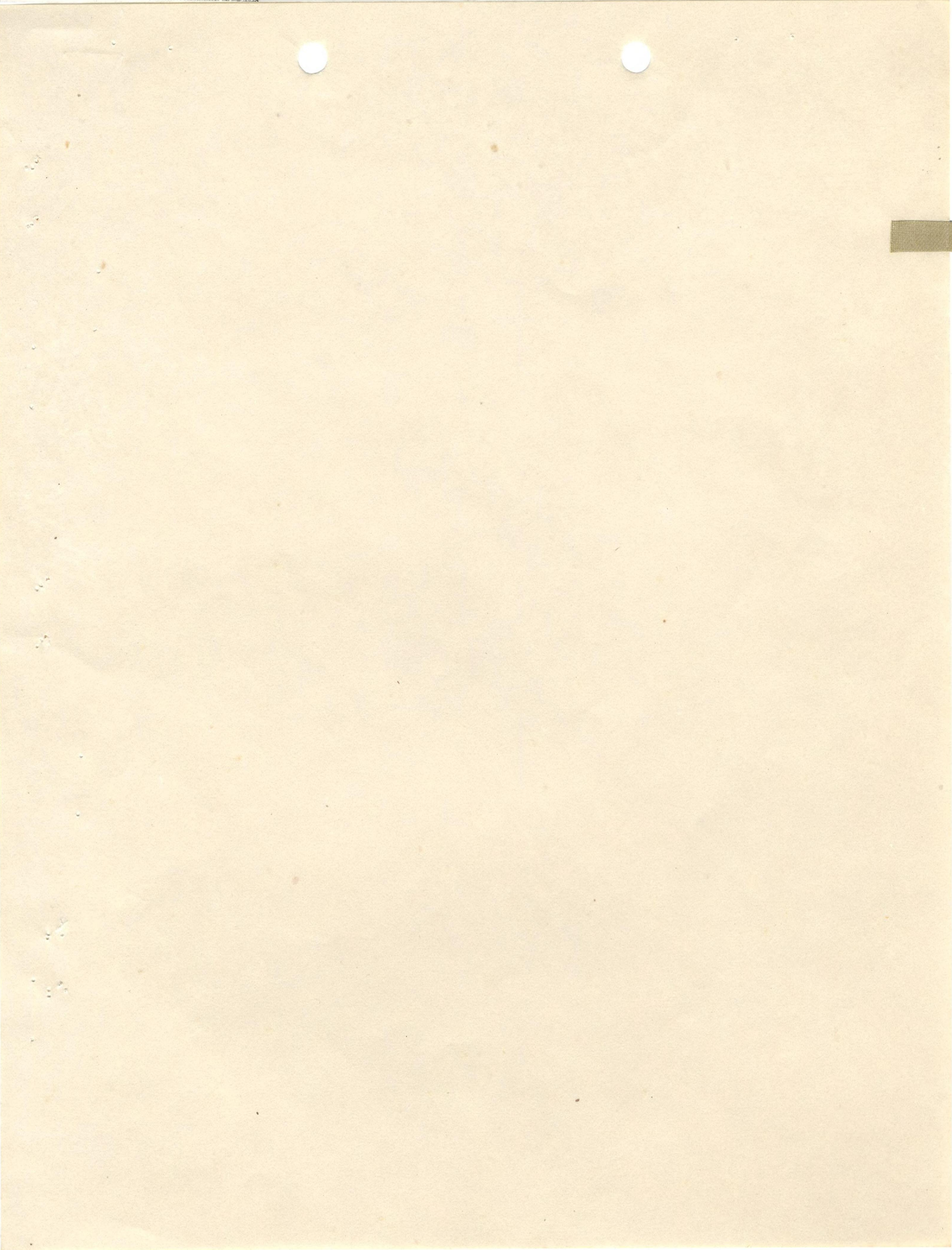
At present time EUSAK has the following photo interpreter personnel, 29 officers, MOS 8503, and 73 enlisted men, MOS 1890. Present T/O authorizes 39 officers and 104 enlisted men in Eighth Army. Present requisitions for T/O vacancies 10 officers and 38 enlisted men. With present limited aerial photo capability of Fifth Air Force, Corps and Divisions have immediate need for a total of 3 officers and 6 enlisted men. The Eighth Army Photo Center has immediate need for 4 Officers and 15 enlisted men. Any increase in photo capability will require additional personnel. In addition to above requirements there will be a need for 28 officer photo interpreter replacements and 78 enlisted photo interpreter replacements every 6 months to meet the needs of the rotation program. Currently no photo interpreters are known to be in the replacement pipe line. Request availability of photo interpreter personnel to meet present needs and the rotation program.

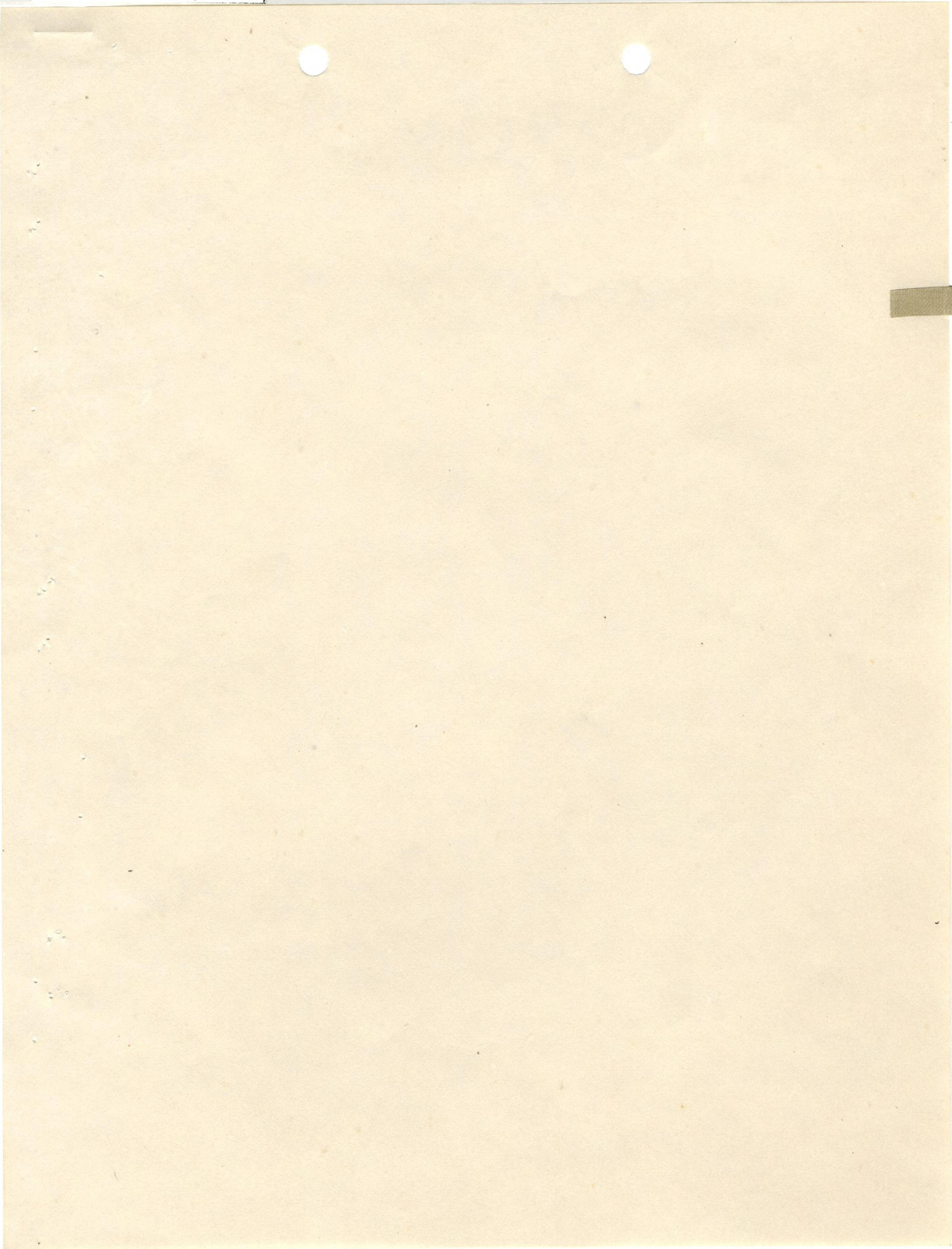
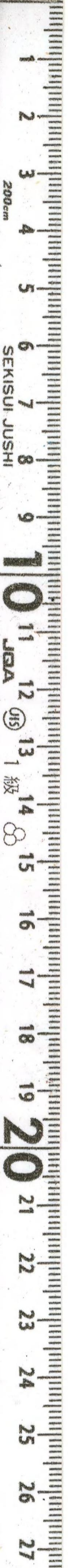

SUBJECT: Photo Reconnaissance in Support of Ground Operations

HQ EIGHTH UNITED STATES ARMY KOREA, (EUSAK), APO 301

TO: Commander-in-Chief, Far East, APO 500

1. It is generally understood that upon entry into combat in Korea both the Eighth Army and Fifth Air Force had many difficulties to overcome in the rapid transition from occupational duties in Japan to combat in Korea. One of these difficulties was the lack of adequate personnel and equipment for the procurement, reproduction, interpretation and dissemination of aerial photographs and information contained on photographs.

2. Although much progress has been made in overcoming these photographic difficulties, it is fully realized that the maximum benefits have not as yet been achieved owing to inadequate reproduction equipment for Army use; inadequately trained photo-interpreters; the lack of an Army type T/O&E Photo Reproduction and Interpretation unit. All these problems were met with the means available and improved as experience and facilities permitted. The Army problem was referred to higher echelons for assistance in obtaining personnel and equipment with which to overcome these difficulties. Some of these difficulties continue to exist to some degree; however, all have improved tremendously in direct proportion to experience gained and receipt of personnel and equipment. It is a fact, however, that the existing Army photo interpretation and reproduction facilities remain provisional and inadequate.

3. The inclosed memorandum is particularly applicable to the technical aspects of photo-interpretation in which field Mr. Belcher has had undoubted experience, and, within the means available, those pertinent technical aspects of his report have been utilized wherever possible or considered advisable. Other aspects of his report which pertain to intelligence as a whole are considered as not being pertinent, since Mr. Belcher was in no position to examine the entire effort devoted to collection, collation, evaluation, interpretation, and dissemination of intelligence in Korea nor did he make any known attempt to examine the analysis and application of intelligence material as a whole as prescribed by pertinent regulations and practiced by Eighth United States Army in Korea.

4. The writer apparently concentrated on his technical experience and organization which existed in some areas during World War II. The term "Operations" in the Joint Operations Center appears to have been interpreted as including only the G-3 Phase of Air-Ground coordination. The functions normally assumed by a Joint Intelligence Center include not only photo intelligence operations but also collation and evaluation of information from many varied sources. Besides producing and disseminating intelligence of all types, it normally acts as a clearing house for auxiliary agency activities.

SUBJECT: Photo Reconnaissance in Support of Ground Operations

In Korea those functions relating to joint activities involving aerial reconnaissance and photo-intelligence are now assumed by the Joint Operations Center. This organization functions under the principles set forth in the Joint Training Directive for Air-Ground Operations, dated 1 September 1950. In the Joint Operation Center there is a lateral transfer of all air and other pertinent intelligence, which includes all information from the Photo Interpretation and Reproduction Center.

5. In conclusion, it is believed that the present system followed in the JOC is capable of producing the same results as the proposed JIG. Until such time as a joint command is established in Korea all joint operations must be based on the concept of mutual cooperation.

6. It is recommended that no action be taken at this time to change the present Joint Operations Center system for the coordination of Air-Ground Operations.

1. In his letter, subject: "Aerial Photographs for EUSAK", dated 22 March 1951 and passed to your headquarters by check indorsement on 29 March 1951, the Commanding General, Far East Air Forces questioned the soundness of subject program as currently executed.

2. Inclosed memorandum, prepared by Donald Belcher and concurred in by the Director Operations Research Office, provides a technical study of the entire issue and, in particular, of the efficacy of present measures. A Joint Intelligence Center at army/air force/fleet level, specifically established to handle all aspects of photo intelligence related to combat operations, is proposed as the most readily adaptable means to improvement of current efforts.

3. As it appears that some modification of existing procedure is in order, it is requested that the feasibility of inclosed proposal be carefully examined. Your recommendations are desired on this or any alternative solution which promises more economic or remunerative employment of our photographic potential.

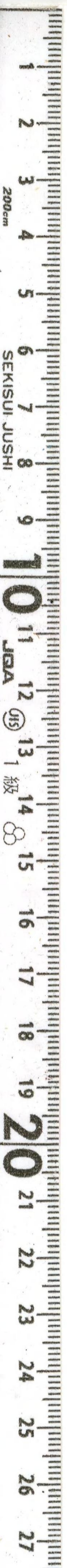
