November 2017 – May 2018 Collect / publish case studies and resources; survey; evaluate and share learnings

What do public library staff want?

- Increase information literacy
- Improve access to authoritative information online
- Support research and critical thinking skills
- Raise visibility of their libraries, communities
- Enrich community programs



70% of participants have never edited Wikipedia



Librarians rocked the course!

By the numbers*

- The 236 active participant editors
 made over 5900 edits
- and 369 Commons (photo) uploads
- to improve **799** articles
- and create 6 new articles!

Since the start of the course, there have been **36.1m** views of improved articles *as of 13 February 2018





Survey questions	Pre-course	Post-course
I understand how Wikipedia works and can explain to others	18%	77%
I do not know how to edit Wikipedia	61%	2%
I do not know how to organize an engagement program involving Wikipedia	69%	4%
I have helped patrons evaluate information on Wikipedia	22%	61%
I have helped a colleague with Wikipedia	12%	48%
