Terms: The prices quoted in this Wholesale Catalogue are subject to no further discounts excepting for cash as noted below. To parties of approved credit, accounts are payable net on June 1st and December 1st, for goods invoiced between these dates or 3 per cent. can be deducted for payment within 30 days from date of invoice—or 5 per cent. for remittance with the order. It is, however, distinctly understood that Potatoes, Onion Sets, Grass, Grain, Clover and Bird Seeds, Tools, Implements, Fertilizers and Insecticides are not subject to any discount and are sold strictly *net cash*.

Orders from unknown correspondents, without remittance, should be accompanied by New York City references, to save delay.

Remittances should be made either in the form of an Express Money Order, or a P. O. Money Order, Bank Draft or Registered Letter.

If Goods are wanted C. O. D., 25 per cent. of the amount must accompany the order. Such orders can only be sent by express.

While we exercise the greatest care to have all Seeds, Plants and Bulbs pure and reliable, we do not give any warranty, express or implied. If the purchaser does not accept the goods on these conditions they must be returned at once, and the money that has been paid for same will be refunded.—P. H. & Co.

While we no longer supply dealers, yet, as heretofore every package, large or small, of our seeds will bear our **Red Trade-Mark** a fac-simile of which is here shown.

ADVANCE ORDERS.

Conditions of Acceptance: All advance orders, for growing crops are booked by us previous to harvesting and receipt—subject to crops permitting—and accidents or delays beyond our control. Should shortages necessitate it, we reserve the right to fill such orders *pro rata*.



WHEN WE EXECUTE ORDERS.

Every order is filled immediately on arrival, or is acknowledged if under rare circumstances its shipment is likely to be delayed for a day or two. If goods, notification of shipment or acknowledgement of order is not received by the customer after a reasonable lapse of time, it may be assumed that the order has miscarried, or that the name or address was omitted from the order. We will, when notified of such a case, use our best efforts to trace it without delay.

Give full shipping instructions on each and every order you send. To avoid chance of error, never write letters on the same sheet as your order.

We fill orders of all values from the smallest to the largest, and all receive the same careful and prompt attention.

ABOUT PACKING AND SHIPPING.

When goods are ordered from both seed and greenhouse establishments, we always combine, where practicable, the orders and make one shipment.

We make no charge for packing, cases, baskets, packages or barrels and pack as lightly as possible, consistent with safety so as to reduce the cost of carriage when paid by purchaser. In fact, we assume extra expense in supplying light, strong cases and, where possible, we pack in baskets covered with waterproof covers which greatly reduces weight.

Cloth bags only we charge for, and these at cost, viz: 1 peck, 10c; 1/2 bush, 12c.; 1 bush, 15c.; 2 bush, 20c. **All grass seed bags**, excepting bags for Timothy and Clover, are furnished free.

Special packing of seeds for foreign shipments when necessary, in lined cases or double sacks we charge for at cost.

We make no charge for cartage or delivery of goods to any railroad station, steamship line or express office in New York City.

The safe arrival is guaranteed of all goods sent by express to any part of the United States or Canada. We ship plants at all seasons of the year, even in the coldest weather.

When shipped by freight we deliver all bulbs and roots properly packed and in good condition, into the hands of transportation companies. After that our responsibility ceases. Consignee then assumes all risks of heating, freezing and delays.

SPECIAL IN REGARD TO THE SALE AND SHIPMENT OF PLANTS.

All plants sent by express, unless specially ordered otherwise.

Plants will be sent by freight if requested, but at purchaser's risk. Plants will be sent by mail if so ordered, and it is practicable to do so, but only at an advance of twenty-five per cent. on the prices quoted.

The plants are offered in this list at the rates per 100 provided (except

where they are otherwise offered) that not less than five of each class or variety are taken.

The varieties must be our own selection of sorts unless otherwise offered. Any one wanting special kinds, not offered in this wholesale list, can order from our retail Descriptive Catalogue (The Manual of Everything for the Garden) at the prices quoted therein, from which we allow a discount of one-third.

This rate means a reduction of 20 per cent. from the regular merchandise rates to all points where no "General Specials" exists. To points where a "General Specials" rate is in force the companies made a special reduction. Shipments weighing less than 100 lbs. receive the benefit of the rate per 100 lbs., but the minimum charge is 35c. For instance, where the regular merchandise rate is \$4.00 per 100 lbs., a box of plants packed closed, weighing 100 lbs. will be carried for \$3.20, a saving of 80c on one shipment.

[GOLDEN SUN.]

The forerunner of a new race of Roses, the above variety is in a class by itself and, in honor of the raiser, the new species has been named *Rosa Pernetiana*. Soleil d'Or, or “Golden Sun,” is the result of a cross between *Persian Yellow* and *Antoine Ducher*. It retains a good deal of the character of the former in the wood and bark, but the foliage is vastly improved, being very plentiful, large, and a beautiful clear green, closely resembling that of the *Crimson Rambler* at its best. The habit of the plant is robust, producing vigorous shoots in abundance, branches straight and of good size; the bark is reddish brown, making a charming contrast for the vivid green foliage. The coloring of the flowers is very rich, the buds are conical, a marvelously rich shade of chrome yellow, with a glint of coppery rose in the centre. The expanded flower is full, large and globular, the centre petals being well incurved, forming a perfectly double bloom. The coloring in the fully expanded flower is gloriously superb. Turneresque in its blending of reddish gold, orange-yellow, nasturtium red and opaline pink. Words are inadequate to fittingly describe the almost riotous luxury of rich, warm color contained in each bud and open flower. Pages could be filled without doing justice to this peerless variety. A **Hardy Yellow Rose**, one that is really hardy in the North in this country, has been the goal for which the world's best hybridizers have been striving for years. Thousands of seedlings have been obtained in which the blood of the *Persian Yellow* was present, but none of them was of sufficient merit to offer, when at a bound this perfect variety appears upon the stage amid the enthusiastic applause of all who have seen it. Already six first-class prizes have been awarded to it, one at Paris last summer, and its career has hardly yet begun. Considering the great merit of this variety, and its scarcity, we are able to offer it very low.

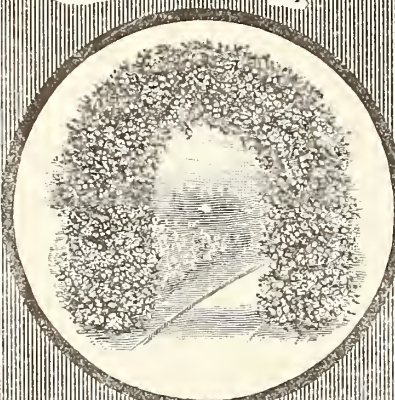

For use in Cemeteries.—It is difficult to conceive anything more appropriate, beautiful and enduring for covering graves and plots in cemeteries than the **Hardy Memorial Rose**. It creeps along the ground almost as closely as an Ivy, growing ten feet in one season and forming a dense mat of very dark green, lustrous foliage.

The Flowers are produced in lavish profusion, in clusters, on the ends of the short side branches, after the June Roses are past, from the first week in July throughout the month, and sparingly for the rest of the season. They are single, pure white, with a golden yellow disc, five to six inches in circumference, and have the strong fragrance of the Banksia Roses. The contrast between the satiny white of the petals and the golden yellow disc is sharp and pleasing, and is one of the distinctive charms of the beautiful **Hardy Memorial Rose**, and they fairly cover the entire plant when in bloom, a mass of great snowflakes with the rich, dark green showing here and there.

But its use is not confined to Cemeteries.—Planted in the Rose garden, alone or among other Roses, and trained upright to a stake, it may be had from three to six feet high as desired, and it will send sprays of flowers drooping downward, making the prettiest sight imaginable. Trained over a gateway it forms a perfect bower, or it can be trained to a fence or house with equal success. As a pot plant it is unique and beautiful; in short, it is the most useful and unique of all Roses. It has been largely used throughout the famous park system of Boston for covering rocky slopes, embankments and such places as it was desirable to cover quickly with verdure. It quickly adapts itself to all conditions of growth, whether barren soil, rocky ledge, fertile garden, shady nook or sun-kissed slope, and no more fitting place can be found for it than running through the grass.

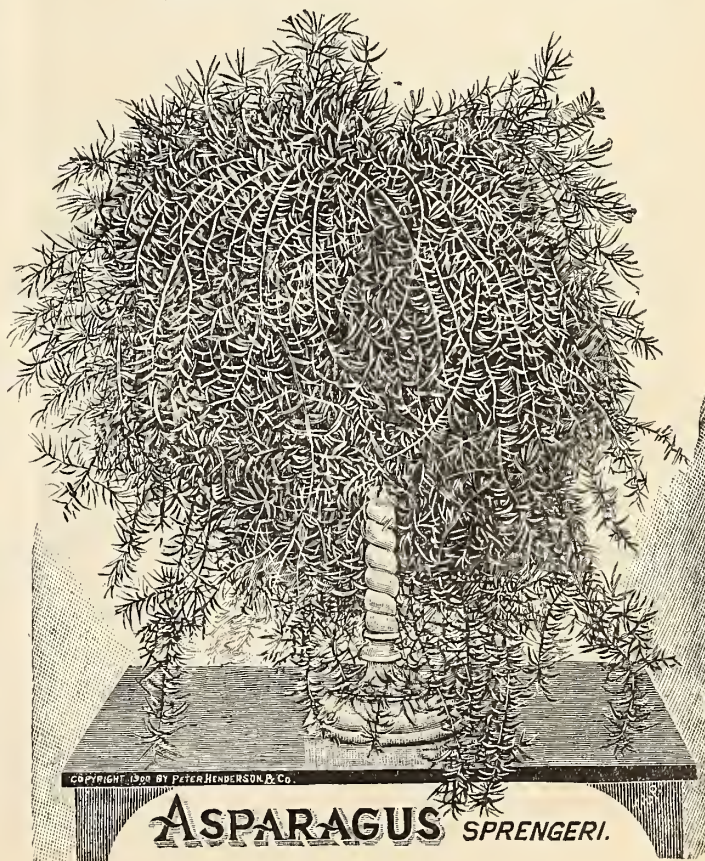

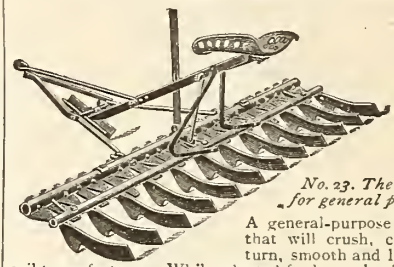
