

SITUATION

- CHAN-HOM, after having passed Miyako islands (Japan) late on 9 July, injuring 23 people, is moving over the East China Sea, as an intense Typhoon.
- Over the next 12 h, it is forecast to continue moving north-west towards the Chinese province of Zhejiang, slightly weakening, but still remaining an intense **Typhoon**. According to the data of 10 July 15.00 UTC, it is forecast to make landfall along the coastal area of Zhejiang province between Wenzhou and Ningbo early on 11 July (UTC), as a Typhoon with max. sustained winds of the order of 150-160 km/h (gusts
- up to 190 km/h). Strong winds, very heavy rains and a large storm surge may affect Zhejiang, Shanghai, Jiangsu and Fujian on 10-12 July. Heavy rains may also affect northern Taiwan on 10-11 July. According to China Meteorological Administration (CMA), up to 250-400mm of rain may affect eastern Zhejiang. Moreover JRC calculations (using as input the data of 10 July 9.00 UTC) indicate a storm surge of the order of 2.5 m in the coastal area near Taizhou and up to 3 m in western Hangzhou Bay in the morning of 11 July.
- As of 10 July morning (CMA), a Red Warning for Typhoon and an Orange Warning for Rainstorm are in effect in eastern China.
- Media (as of 10 July morning) reported approx. 60 000 people evacuated in the province of Zhejiang, while evacuation orders have been issued also in Fujian.
