JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS.

The Ninety-fifth Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina was held in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount, on Wednesday, May 17, 1911, and the two following days.

At 10 o'clock on Wednesday morning the Litany was said by the Rev. Cyprian P. Willcox. At the conclusion of this service the Rt. Rev. Jos. Blount Cheshire, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese, called the Convention to order. The roll was called by the Secretary and a quorum was found to be present.

A recess was then taken until 11 o'clock, when certain recent additions to the church building were consecrated by the Bishop, the deed of consecration being read by the Rev. Alfred R. Berkeley, Chaplain to the Bishop.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Evan A. Edwards, the Bishop reading the Lessons. The Holy Communion was then celebrated by the Bishop, the Rev. E. A. Osborne reading the Epistle, and Rev. Julian E. Ingle, the Gospel. The Rev. R. Bruce Owens, the rector of the Parish, assisted in the distribution of the elements. The sermon was preached by the Bishop from the texts: I Kings, viii, 27: "Will God indeed dwell on the earth? Behold, the heaven and heaven of heavens, can not contain Thee; how much less this house that I have builded!" St. John, ii, 17: "His disciples remembered that it was written, The zeal of Thine house hath eaten me up."

The offerings of the Congregation were received for the New York Bible and Prayer Book Society.

The Convention took a recess until 3.30 o'clock, at which time it was called to order by the Bishop.

The election of officers being in order, the Rev. Walter J. Smith nominated as President of the Convention the Rev.

A. Burtis Hunter, and, as no other nomination was made, moved that the Secretary cast the vote, which being done, Mr. Hunter was declared elected. Mr. R. H. Battle nominated as Secretary the Rev. Julian E. Ingle, and the chair, having been requested to cast the vote of the Convention, declared him elected.

On motion of Mr. R. H. Battle, it was

Resolved, That the Convention shall meet in the church for daily Morning Prayer at 9:30 o'clock, and adjourn at 6 p. m.; and that a recess shall be taken from 12:30 to 3:30 o'clock; but for this day only the Convention shall adjourn at 5:30.

On motion of Mr. G. C. Lamb, it was

Resolved, That clergymen of this Diocese not being members of the Convention, clergymen present from other Dioceses, candidates for Holy Orders, and Mr. J. A. E. LeBlanc, a lay missionary of the Diocese, be invited to honorary seats.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee elected by the Convention of 1910 met May 13th, and was organized by the election of the Rev. I. McK. Pittenger, D.D., as President, and the Rev. A. B. Hunter as Secretary.

September 20th, the Committee gave counsel to the Bishop to consent to the secular use of St. Barnabas' Church, Greensboro. Counsel was also given to the Bishop and Trustees of the Diocese to grant a request of St. Paul's Church, Monroe, to mortgage one-third of the church lot on which their Rectory stands.

December 5th, Lewis N. Taylor and Josephus McDonald were recommended to the Bishop to be received as candidates for Holy Orders.

December 13th, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Rogers Israel, D.D., to be Bishop of Erie, and on December 30th consent was given for the consecration of the Rev. Charles Sumner Burch, D.D., as Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of New York.

March 22d, 1911, consent was given to the election of the Right Rev. Sydney Catlin Patridge, D.D., Bishop of Kyoto, as Bishop of the Diocese of Kansas City.

March 26th, Henry Alpheus Willey was recommended to the Bishop to be received as a candidate for Holy Orders.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESE.

The Trustees to Hold Property for the Diocese of North Carolina respectfully report:

First. That since the last Convention they have received and filed

in the box kept in the Citizens National Bank, containing other deeds, etc., the following deeds for real property:

1. A deed from N. A. Jeffreys and wife to J. D. Glenn and others, Wardens and Vestry of St. Andrew's Church, for a lot on Walker Avenue in South Greensboro (50 x 150 feet), dated March 8, 1898, and duly recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds of Guilford County, book 131, page 462.

2. A deed from the Vestry and Trustees of St. Andrew's Church, to the Trustees of the Diocese, for said lot (No. 1 above), dated March 11, 1911, and recorded in said office, in book 224, page 615.

3. A deed from Mrs. Mary Galloway and John M. Galloway (of Madison, N. C.), to the Trustees of the Diocese, for a lot in Beaver Island Township, Stokes County, adjoining Knowlhurst Church lot in the Stokes and Rockingham County line (40 x 120 feet), dated December 10, 1910, and recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds for Stokes County, in book 54 at page 524.

4. A deed from C. P. McNeely, Paschal S. Boyd and wife, and others, to the Trustees of the Diocese, for a lot in the town of Mooresville (Eastern Heights) on Maple and First streets (100 x 200 feet), dated January 17, 1911, and recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds of Iredell County, in book 43 at page 408.

Second:

1. That about the first of April last the Trustees, on the recommendation of Archdeacon E. A. Osborne, the Priest in charge, conveyed to Geo. C. Jones, of Mooresville, the lot belonging to the Church in Mooresville, and described in the deed from Paschal S. Boyd and others to the Trustees of the Diocese, dated September 20, 1907, and recorded in the Register of Deeds' office of Iredell County in book 36 at page 278. This was in practical exchange of this lot for that described as No. 4 above, which is considered as more eligible for a church lot.

2. That about the same time, upon the petition of the Building Committee of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Monroe, and the recommendation of Archdeacon Osborne, the Trustees of the Diocese executed a deed of mortgage on the rectory lot of said church for the purpose of indemnifying the members of said committee against their liability on notes in bank for \$2,000, given to raise money for the erection of a new church building. The mortgage contains a special warranty only, so as to bind no other church property to which the title is vested in them. The said petition is duly filed.

Dr. R. H. Lewis read the following

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF ST. MARY'S SCHOOL.

To the Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

The report of said Trustees, in accordance with the requirements of the act of incorporation, respectfully shows:

That during the past year the School has had a large attendance of pupils, and that the Rector, with his staff of assistants, has brought up to a high degree of efficiency the internal economy of the School, both as to administration and as to teaching, and that the School is prepared, as never before, to answer the high purposes of its founders and benefactors. In the number of pupils we understand that it is at the head of the list of all our Church schools of like character in the country; and we believe that in all respects it deserves our confidence and support.

The faculty and officers during the past year have numbered twenty-eight, and the total enrollment of pupils has been two hundred and forty-four; of whom eighty-eight were day pupils and one hundred and fifty-six were boarders. Of the boarders twenty-nine were from families not members of our communion. Reckoned by States, there were ninety-two from North Carolina, seventeen from South Carolina, fourteen from Georgia, nine from Virginia, six from Florida, five from Alabama, and one or two each from eight other States and Territories, Canada and Mexico. This wide distribution of patronage seems to give a prospect of such a field from which to draw pupils, that the School should soon be filled to its utmost capacity.

In response to the reasonable demands of its patrons, and to meet the necessities of the situation, the Trustees have incurred a debt of \$40,000, and by doing so have been able to put the School in such a condition as fully to meet every proper requirement for the comfort and welfare of the pupils as well as for their training, in all that is demanded by the high standards now prevailing in the educational world.

This debt of \$40,000 is bonded, and the financial situation, so far as the Trustees' special responsibility is concerned, is reduced to the simple condition of meeting the semi-annual payment of the interest coupons and providing for the ultimate payment of the principal. Hence, no financial statement is included in this report. But the Trustees now appeal to the Churchmen of the Carolinas to sustain the School by co-operation with the Rector in extending and increasing the benefits of the School among our people; and they further appeal for a generous response to the efforts of the Trustees and the Rector to raise funds to

meet the ultimate payment of the principal of the bonded debt; and also to provide an endowment adequate to the noble purposes of its founders, and to the broad field of opportunity before it; for without a permanent endowment no institution of higher education can hope for successful continuance.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE THOMPSON
ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION.

The Board of Managers held their twenty-fifth annual meeting in the vestry room of the Orphanage Chapel of St. Mary the Virgin, on Thursday, April 27, 1911, at 10:30, the Bishop of the Diocese presiding.

The annual reports of the Superintendent and Treasurer, Rev. Walter J. Smith, and Mr. J. C. Shannonhouse, Trustee of the Endowment Fund, were read and accepted.

It being the occasion of the Bishop's annual visitation to the institution, a recess was taken at 11 o'clock for divine service, at which the Bishop preached and confirmed a class of nine persons.

At 1:30 the meeting was reconvened, and after the election of officers, etc., for the ensuing year, the architects' plans for the proposed new buildings were carefully considered, and accepted, with certain modifications.

It was decided to undertake the erection of the first of the six cottages at an early date, and it is hoped that nothing will occur to impede the progress of the work.

The Superintendent reports an income of \$12,556.89, including a balance of \$1,438.69 from the year previous, and expenses amounting to \$10,419.58, thus beginning the new year with a balance of \$2,137.37, which is indeed most gratifying.

The Endowment Fund, invested in certain securities, amounts to \$12,418.47, as per statement hereto appended.

The Board is pleased to report that there has been no serious sickness among the children during the past year, and the Superintendent deserves great commendation for the very efficient manner in which he has administered the affairs of the institution, considering the meagre facilities at his command.

It is hoped that the clergy throughout the State will keep their respective congregations thoroughly alive to the responsibility, as well as the privilege that is theirs, to provide an adequate support for the fatherless and motherless little ones that must be cared for in our Orphanage, which is one of the essentials of our most holy religion.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE REV. WALTER J. SMITH, SUPERINTENDENT OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION.

To the Board of Managers—Greeting:

We close another fiscal year with many causes for thankfulness and encouragement. The health of the children has been remarkably good, and the contributions have been better than ever before, due in a great measure, no doubt, to the envelope system adopted in the Diocese of East Carolina, and also to the increased number of Sunday Schools making regular monthly offerings. The Woman's Auxiliary, too, has done a noble part by us. We close the year practically without a dollar of debt, and with a credit balance of \$2,137.37, the largest amount with which we have ever begun a new year.

The expenses of the farm seem to be excessive, but when we take into consideration that wages are higher, and that the farmer does not devote all of his time to the farm, together with the fact that a considerable sum was expended in repairs and improvements, the difference will not seem so great. Adding the cash receipts to the products consumed, the account about balances, and the fresh vegetables and the training of the boys may be put down as the net profit. We have started out with the intention of doing better this year, and the first month's sales will amount to nearly, if not quite, a hundred dollars.

Mrs. Campbell, our capable housekeeper, left us in May, and her place was filled in July by Miss Lou Hall Hill, of Brooklyn, N. Y. In the meantime Mrs. Morton, the Matron, with the assistance of her daughter, Miss Alice, looked after the housekeeping, in addition to her duties as Matron. Wishing to make a home for her children in Richmond, Va., Mrs. Morton, after several years of faithful service, left us in August, and her place was at once filled by Mrs. Mildred Wooldridge, of Richmond, Va. The other members of the faculty have remained the same as last year, doing their duty faithfully and regularly. During the year we have received twenty-eight children: twelve from the Diocese of North Carolina, eight from the Diocese of East Carolina, five from the District of Asheville, and three of our old children that came back to us. Seventeen have returned to their homes, eight have been placed in homes, four have entered industrial schools, and two are taking a hospital course in order to become trained nurses. The present number is sixty-two, thirty-four being from North Carolina, eighteen from East Carolina, and ten from the District of Asheville.

The Tri-State Conference of Orphanage Workers, which met in Charlotte last week, was a pleasure and an inspiration to the Superintendent and his associates.

Through Mr. Benjamin R. Huske, of Fayetteville, I have received from the estate of the late James C. Stedman, of Fayetteville, the sum of \$3,645.00 in stocks and bonds, and \$855.00 in cash, all of which has been deposited in the First National Bank of Charlotte to await the action of the Board of Managers. A small cash payment is still due, making in all about five thousand dollars as the full amount of the legacy, which might very appropriately be put into a memorial building. During the past year the amount of \$159.27 has come into my hands from various sources for the Building Fund, which I have turned over to Mrs. M. M. Murphy, the Treasurer of the Federation of Orphanage Guilds.

In closing my report I wish to thank our physician, Dr. Wm. Myers Hunter, the other physicians and dentists of the city, Mr. Frank H. Shannonhouse, our attorney, the Standard Ice and Fuel Company, and the railroad companies for their continued favors.

On motion, the report was referred to a Special Committee consisting of the Rev. Alfred R. Berkeley, Rev. Wm. J. Gordon, Rev. Samuel M. Hanff, and Messrs. Thos. H. Webb, J. C. Hales and A. L. Purrington, to report on Thursday afternoon on the assembling of the Convention.

The Rev. Milton A. Barber read a statement of the General Clergy Relief and urged larger contributions for its work.

The Rev. R. B. Owens presented an application from St. John's Church, Battleboro, for admission as an organized Mission into union with the Convention, and on his motion it was referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

The Rev. Mr. Owens also presented the following report of the Secretary of the Sunday School Commission:

The Secretary of the Sunday School Commission begs leave to report that on account of the large and scattered membership of the Commission, it has been found impossible to hold a meeting thereof during the year. But this does not mean that nothing has been done for the betterment of Sunday Schools. Different members of the Commission have said and done what they could as occasion offered, seeking to arouse a greater interest in the work on the part of those who are now indifferent; to cheer and encourage those already interested (a task no less important than the first); and to devise new methods of teaching and administration, and suggest their adoption when it was felt that such advice would be welcomed.

There has been no remarkable growth in the Sunday Schools during the past year, but progress has been nevertheless sure and steady. A new Sunday School is opened here and there, a new scholar enrolled now and then, a new teacher put to work, a new book read or an old one reread, and thus fresh inspiration gained.

Perhaps the most encouraging sign, paradoxical as it may seem, is the almost *general* dissatisfaction that we find concerning Sunday Schools. If we were satisfied with them as they are, there would be but small hope of improvement, but just because we are dissatisfied we look forward to a better day that is coming. Many earnest Churchmen have discovered that their Sunday School is a sick man, and they are asking what is the matter with him. When they finally discover the disease, they will also find a remedy or make one. Just what that remedy is in any particular case depends of course on the disease.

While no meeting of the Commission has been held, we must not forget to mention another meeting that took its place and was in some ways

even more helpful than a meeting of the Commission would have been. I refer of course to the Conferences on Sunday Schools that were held during the Conference at St. Mary's in June of last year. Meeting day after day as we did, and conferring with one another and with our brethren of East Carolina who are trying like ourselves to solve the Sunday School problem, we "took sweet counsel together" and in the interchange of theory and experience taught and learned many things.

The Rector of St. Mary's informs us that at the approaching Conference we are to have four lectures on phases of Sunday School work by Rev. L. N. Caley, who is one of the editors of the *American Church Sunday School Magazine* and an expert on the subject. Here we have a splendid opportunity, and we can not do better than to avail ourselves of it, and to urge others to do the same. Let us at least undertake that those of our people who are interested in Sunday Schools shall know of this opportunity that is brought to our very doors.

There is one other matter of which I would speak. Our experience has shown that the fears of those who thought our present Sunday School Commission machinery too complicated and cumbersome were well founded. There seem to be too many wheels within wheels and the responsibility is too much divided for effective work.

Therefore, after consultation with a number of our clergy and laity who have the matter at heart, and finding that many of them agree with me, I respectfully offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Sunday School Commission as at present constituted is hereby dissolved, and the Bishop is requested to appoint annually a Committee on Sunday Schools, to consist of three clergymen and two laymen actively engaged in Sunday School work, to whom all matters that concern Sunday Schools may be referred; and that this Committee shall make a report to each Convention of such matters as they shall deem proper.

Hunter, the resolution was amended by striking out the words *Committee on Sunday Schools* in the third line, and *Committee* in line 6, and inserting instead thereof the words *Sunday School Commission* and *Commission*, respectively; and the resolution so amended was thereupon adopted and referred to the Committee on the State of the Church.

The Bishop appointed the members of the Sunday School Commission, as follows: Rev. N. Collin Hughes, Rev. Isaac

W. Hughes, Rev. Samuel M. Hanff, Messrs. Thomas H. Webb and Robert J. Kittrell.

On motion of Dr. R. H. Lewis, the consideration of a forthcoming report on church work at the State University was made a Special Order for Thursday morning immediately after the reading and disposition of the Bishop's address.

The Rev. Sidney S. Bost presented the Annual Report of the Treasurer of the Convention. (See Appendix C.)

The Rev. A. B. Hunter presented his report as Principal of St. Augustine's School, which was, on his motion, referred to the Committee on the State of the Church. (See Appendix B.)

The Rev. E. A. Osborne presented his report as Archdeacon of Charlotte, with the report of the Treasurer of the Convocation.

The Rev. H. B. Delany, D.D., presented his report as Archdeacon for work among colored people, with the report of the Treasurer of the Convocation.

The Secretary presented the report of the Rev. N. Collin Hughes, Archdeacon of Raleigh, with the report of the Treasurer of the Convocation.

These reports were, on motion, referred to the Committee on the State of the Church. (See Appendix B.)

On motion, the Convention then adjourned to meet on Thursday morning at 9.30 o'clock.

After Evening Prayer at 8.15 o'clock, addresses on Christian Education were made by the Rev. Wm. S. Claiborne, Rev. Bertram E. Brown and Rev. Francis M. Osborne.

A service for Colored people was held in a public hall on each evening of the Convention, at which sermons were delivered by the Rev. Messrs. James E. King, Robert J. Johnson and Robert N. Perry.

SECOND DAY.

CHURCH OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD, ROCKY MOUNT,
THURSDAY, May 18, 1911.

The Convention met pursuant to adjournment.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Messrs. R. Percy Eubanks and S. J. M. Brown.

At 10 o'clock the Bishop took the chair and called the Convention to order.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The Rev. H. T. Cocke presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES.

The Committee on New Parishes having considered an application of St. John's Church, Battleboro, for admission into union with the Convention as an Organized Mission, and having found that all Canonical requirements have been complied with, beg leave to offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Organized Mission of St. John's Church, Battleboro, be admitted into union with the Convention.

H. T. COCKE, *Chairman*.

The resolution was, on motion, adopted, and Mr. J. B. Philips, the appointed delegate, appeared and took his seat.

On motion of the Rev. E. A. Osborne, the reports of the Hospitals of St. Peter and the Good Samaritan were referred to the Committee on the State of the Church. (See Appendix B.)

On motion of the S. S. Bost, the consideration of the report on the Thompson Orphanage was appointed to follow immediately after that of the work at Chapel Hill.

The Bishop then read his Annual Address. (See Appendix A.)

On motion of Mr. R. H. Battle, the statistical portions of the Address were referred to the Committee on the State of the Church.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Pittenger, the reference to the President's movement for the promotion of peace among the nations of the earth was referred to a Special Committee which the Bishop appointed, as follows: The Rev. Dr. Pittenger, Rev. B. S. Bronson, Mr. Thomas H. Battle, Mr. C. H. Herty.

On motion, Special Committees were appointed on other portions of the Bishop's Address as follows:

On the General Missions of the Church and the Apportionment: the Rev. Milton A. Barber, Rev. I. W. Hughes, Mr. James Ker, Jr., Mr. Henry Perry.

On the Colored Work of the Diocese: Rev. Thos. G. Faulkner, Mr. B. C. Sharpe, Mr. Geo. H. Nash.

The Rev. Francis M. Osborne presented the report of the Committee on Church Work at the University of North Carolina, as follows:

The Committee on Church Work at our State University begs leave to make the following report:

During the past year your Committee has not been able to meet together since the last Convention, but by correspondence our work has been carried on and we are glad to report that up to the first of May we have been able to meet our financial obligation to the work at Chapel Hill. On the whole, the response of the parishes in the Diocese and of the parents of students has been satisfactory. However, some of the strongest parishes in the Diocese have undertaken to do nothing during the past year for the work and some of the parents and alumni who have been appealed to have not made any response. This last fact leads your Committee to infer that considerable emphasis must be laid upon this work by those who have it at heart, and some method must be adopted by the Convention to put the financial support of this work on a firmer footing.

We have just been informed of the fact that the present Rector of the Chapel of the Cross, Rev. R. W. Hogue, has resigned this work to accept the rectorship of a large parish in Baltimore. Appreciating the tremendous value of the work which Mr. Hogue has done at Chapel Hill, we desire to put on record a word of appreciation. We feel that we have been unusually fortunate in having had the services of Mr. Hogue since the time that the Diocese of East Carolina, the Diocese of North Carolina and the District of Asheville formally undertook to assist the Chapel of the Cross parish in the support of this work. Mr. Hogue has

exhibited exceptional tact and power in his presentation of the Church and its opportunities to the students of the University. He has been fortunate in winning the confidence and support not only of his vestry and the students but also of the faculty of the University. We feel that he has made a distinct and permanent contribution to the work which we have undertaken; and such a valuable beginning having been made, we feel it our duty to urge a continuation of the policy of a progressive work along the line that has been inaugurated. We regret that Mr. Hogue finds it his duty to leave us, and we wish him God-speed and success in his new field of usefulness.

Your Committee desires that this Convention consider the important work at Chapel Hill as a part of our work towards the Christian education of the young men of our State, and as we have said we hope that this Convention will adopt some method for making the financial support of the work more stable and secure. This responsibility has been generally accepted, but the novelty of the effort and the inspiration which always comes with the undertaking of a new task having been somewhat lost, as is the case always even with the very best of undertakings, it is incumbent upon us to make provision for the carrying out of our duty in a regular and orderly way. This is absolutely necessary if we hope to secure the co-operation of the Diocese of East Carolina and the District of Asheville, or invite the acceptance of a successor to Mr. Hogue.

In view of the ideas expressed above we offer the following resolutions:

I. *Resolved*, That we renew our Diocesan pledge of \$600 a year for the support of Church work at the University of North Carolina.

II. *Resolved*, That the \$600 voted by the Convention for this purpose be apportioned by the Finance Committee among the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese, to be collected and disbursed by the Treasurer of the Diocese for this work.

III. *Resolved*, That a Committee of the Convention on Church Work at the University be appointed each year to further in our Diocese the interest of this cause.

The Convention then took a recess.

THURSDAY, May 18, 1911, 3:30 p. m.

The Bishop took the chair and called the Convention to order.

Elections being in order, nominations were made as follows:

For the Standing Committee, the Rev. Messrs. I. McK. Pittenger, D.D., A. B. Hunter, and Julian E. Ingle, and Messrs. R. H. Battle, LL.D., and R. H. Lewis, M.D.

For Treasurer of the Convention, Mr. Charles E. Johnson.

For Delegates to the Missionary Conference of the Fourth District, the Rev. Messrs. Milton A. Barber, A. B. Hunter and Isaac W. Hughes; Messrs. Thos. H. Battle, Wm. A. Erwin and G. C. Lamb.

For Trustees of the University of the South, the Rev. Francis M. Osborne, Mr. J. C. Buxton and Mr. Albert L. Cox.

For Trustee of St. Mary's School, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the Rev. Dr. Francis J. Murdoch, the Rev. Harris Mallinckrodt.

In each several case the election of the person or persons so nominated was made by the vote of the Secretary, cast under instruction of the Convention, and they were declared elected.

The hour for the Special Order having arrived, the consideration of the report of the Committee on Church Work at Chapel Hill was resumed, and the second and third resolutions were adopted. Under the third resolution the Bishop appointed the following as members of the Committee for the ensuing year: the Rev. Francis M. Osborne, Rev. John B. Gible, Mr. Joseph H. Pratt, Mr. Chas. E. Johnson, Jr., and Mr. Hyman Philips.

The Rev. Dr. Pittenger presented the following

REPORTS OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

The Committee on Canons having been requested by the Convention of 1910 to prepare and present to this Convention any amendments which they might deem advisable in the Constitution, Canons, and Rules of Order, have given the subject careful and extended consideration, and as a result, present the following report:

And first they offer, and urge for immediate adoption, the following new Rule of Order, to be numbered VI, all rules following to be renumbered to correspond:

RULE VI. On any motion pending, no member may speak more than ten minutes, nor more than once without special permission of the house; save that the mover of a resolution may have five minutes in which to close the discussion.

[The Rule was, on motion, adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 1.—On amendment to the Constitution, proposed by Mr. Buxton, as follows:

Resolved, That Article IX, Section 3, of the Constitution, be amended by the omission in line 2 of the words “males of the age of twenty-one years.”

[By permission of the Convention this resolution, which was not approved by the Committee, was withdrawn.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 2.—The Committee present, without recommendation, the following resolutions referred to them at the instance of the late Committee on the State of the Church:

1. *Resolved*, That Chapter I, Canon XIV, Section 1, be amended by omitting the words, “American Church Building Fund” and “Theological Department of Sewanee.”

2. *Resolved*, That the name of this fund be changed to “Fund to Aid Candidates for Holy Orders.”

3. *Resolved*, That the “American Church Building Fund” and “Theological Department at Sewanee” be printed on the last page of the cover of the Journal under “Other Objects Recommended.”

[The first and third resolutions proposed by the Committee on the State of the Church were not adopted. The second resolution was adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 3.—The Committee on Canons offer the following resolutions:

1. *Resolved*, That Article III of the Constitution be amended so that Section 2 shall read as follows:

SEC. 2. The Bishop of the Diocese, or in his absence the Bishop Co-adjutor, or Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, or any Bishop in charge, as representing the Ecclesiastical Authority, shall in the order named above, if present, preside at all meetings of the Convention, and shall appoint all committees unless it is otherwise ordered.

2. *Resolved*, That Article V of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows:

To constitute a quorum for the purpose of ordinary business the presence of one-third of all the Clergy entitled to vote, and of delegates from ten Parishes entitled to representation in the Convention, shall be necessary. Any less number shall be competent to receive reports and to adjourn.

3. *Resolved*, That Article VII of the Constitution be amended in Section 1 by omitting the words, “A President (who shall be a Presbyter of the Diocese),” so that the section shall read:

SECTION 1. The Convention shall elect annually a Secretary and a Treasurer.

4. *Resolved*, That Article IX of the Constitution be amended in Section 4 by changing the words, “Parochial Clergy,” in line 5, to “Clergy present and entitled to vote.”

5. *Resolved*, That Article X of the Constitution be amended in Section 2, by inserting the words, "to have a vote," after the word "same," in line 7.

6. *Resolved*, That Article XII of the Constitution be amended by the omission of Section 2.

7. *Resolved*, That Article XIV of the Constitution be amended in Section 1, in the second paragraph, by inserting after the word "present," in line 3, the words "and entitled to vote."

[These resolutions being offered by the Chairman of the Committee were separately approved in a vote by orders, and referred for ratification to the next Convention, with the exception of the fifth, which, on motion, was laid upon the table.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 4.—The Committee offer the following resolutions:

1. *Resolved*, That Canon V, Chapter I, be amended so as to read as follows:

PRESIDING OFFICER.

In the absence of the Bishop of the Diocese and of any other Bishop who is qualified by the provisions of the Constitution to preside, the President of the Standing Committee, as representing the Ecclesiastical Authority, shall act as Chairman of the Convention, unless the Convention itself should otherwise provide.

2. *Resolved*, That Canon VI, Chapter I, be amended by inserting after the word "President," in line 7, the words, "of the Standing Committee."

3. *Resolved*, That Canon VII, Chapter I, be amended in Section 1 by substituting the word "Convention," for the word "Trustees," in line 8, and after the word *bond* inserting "to be approved by the Committee on Finance and."

4. *Resolved*, That Canon VIII, Chapter I, be amended by the omission of the first paragraph and by changing the second paragraph so that it shall read as follows:

SECTION 1. There shall be appointed annually, by the Bishop, or in his absence by the Presiding Officer of the Convention, a Committee on Canons, a Committee on the State of the Church, and a Committee on Education, each to consist of three Clergymen and two Laymen; also, a Committee on Finance, a Committee on Elections, a Committee on New Parishes, and a Committee on Unfinished Business, each to consist of two Clergymen and three Laymen.

5. *Resolved*, That Canon VIII, Chapter I, be amended by the omission of Section 3, and that the subsequent sections be renumbered to correspond.

6. *Resolved*, That Canon VIII, Chapter I, be amended in Section 4 by changing the name, "Education Committee," to "Committee on Education."

7. *Resolved*, That Chapter I, Canon X, be amended as follows: Strike out the five lines following the word "Diocesan" in line 7, and insert in lieu thereof the words "There shall be elected four alternate clerical and four alternate lay deputies, subject to the same provisions as the deputies above mentioned, to serve if any vacancies occur, in the order of their election."

8. *Resolved*, That Section 4, Canon VI, Chapter III, be amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 4. The Parochial Reports, or such parts of the same as the Bishop may deem fit, shall be printed in the Journal of the Convention.

9. *Resolved*, That Canon VII, Chapter III, entitled, "Memorials," be amended by changing the phraseology after the word, "*Provided*," so that it shall read as follows:

Provided, That when there is no Rector, or Minister in charge, the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, with that of the Vestry, shall suffice; and if there be no Vestry, the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, with that of the Minister in charge, must be obtained.

[These resolutions being offered by the Chairman of the Committee were separately adopted.—SECRETARY.]

THIRD DAY.

CHURCH OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD, ROCKY MOUNT,
FRIDAY, May 19, 1911.

The Convention met at 9.30 o'clock for Morning Prayer, which was said by the Rev. Messrs. F. H. T. Horsfield and R. Percy Eubanks.

The Bishop took the chair and called the Convention to order.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The Rev. Milton A. Barber presented the report of the Special Committee on the General Missions of the Church and the Apportionment, as follows:

The Committee to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's Address dealing with our obligation as a Diocese to the General Missionary work of the Church, submit the following report:

The larger vision of service and duty that has, in the good providence of God, come to the Church through the "Laymen's Missionary Movement" and the "Forward Movement," challenges our love and loyalty to Christ and His kingdom. Never was the outlook brighter for the Church's future, nor the signs more promising of winning the world for our Risen Lord. The door of opportunity stands open to the Church, and the great Head of the Church bids us enter in and carry the glad tidings of salvation to those who are living in darkness and the shadow of death.

The members of the Board of Missions are our representatives, and we must hold up their hands and further their plans. The Diocese of North Carolina is an integral part of the great Church. We can not afford to sacrifice our honor as a Diocese, nor stultify ourselves as individual Christians by refusing to do the part that the General Board assigns to us.

Therefore, in compliance with the request of the Board and of the Bishop of the Diocese, we offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, That a Committee of two clergymen and two laymen be appointed by the Bishop to co-operate with him in making apportionments to the Parishes and Missions and in collecting the same.

Resolved, That a Missionary Committee be appointed by the minister in charge or elected by the vestry in every Parish, and the congregation in each Mission in the Diocese, to co-operate with the said minister in collecting the apportionment assigned to his Parish or Mission.

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint alternate Delegates to the Missionary Conference in case those elected by the Convention shall for any cause fail to attend.

On motion of the same, it was

Resolved, That the Church in this Diocese acknowledges with profound gratitude the generous legacy bequeathed by the late Mr. James C. Stedman, of Fayetteville, amounting to about \$5,000, for the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution.

On motion of the same, it was

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to appoint Committees to prepare suitable memorials of the late Rev. Primus P. Alston and Rev. Hardy H. Phelps, the same to be spread upon the Journal of the Convention.

The Bishop appointed on the Committees, respectively, the Rev. E. A. Osborne, Rev. H. B. Delany, D.D., Mr. Wiley J. Latham, and the Rev. N. Collin Hughes, Rev. R. Percy Eubanks, Mr. Marshall DeL. Haywood.

The memorials as expressive of the sentiment of the Convention in regard to our deceased brethren are here presented as ordered by the Convention. The Rev. Archdeacon Osborne presents the following:

The Committee appointed to prepare a memorial of the late Rev. Primus P. Alston respectfully report that

WHEREAS, It hath pleased the Lord to call to rest our deceased brother, whose labors have been greatly blessed, the fruits of which bear witness to a life wisely and faithfully spent in loyal and self-denying devotion to the service of God, and the general well-being of his own race and good of the Church,

Therefore, be it

Resolved, That we cheerfully and cordially place on record this expression of appreciation and approval of the good example and faithful labors of this most dutiful and loyal servant of God, as well worthy of imitation on the part of us all.

The Rev. Archdeacon Hughes presents the following:

The Committee appointed to prepare a minute relative to our brother, the late Rev. H. H. Phelps, respectfully submit the following:

On January 9th of the current year the Rev. Hardy Hardison Phelps, having finished his course in faith, found rest from his labors.

The circumstances of his childhood and early youth limited his opportunities for study, and so he had virtually to begin his preparation for college several years after he attained his majority. But in spite of this handicap, with determined will he completed the full course at college and seminary, manifesting throughout his entire career an unusual thirst for knowledge and the ability to digest it and assimilate what was of real and permanent worth.

During the earlier years of his ministry he was the Evangelist of the Convocation of Edenton in the Diocese of East Carolina, and made there his record as one acceptable to the people and a persistent and tireless worker, a record which, in the several Dioceses where he la-

bored, he maintained unbroken to the end of his life. It was while Evangelist of the Convocation that he projected the *Mission Herald* and was its first editor. This paper, originally only a publication of the Convocation, was later made the official organ of the Diocese of East Carolina.

Mr. Phelps loved to teach and preach, showing in these functions that same power of comprehension and sense of relative value which he had shown in his studies. He had that large view of the Church's mission which, quickened by his devoted love for his work and his people, made him a steady, reliable, solid builder. With most positive convictions of the Church's unique and commanding position, he coupled such kindly charity for his fellowman that he was ever honored and beloved by Christians of every name. Strong in the faith, consecrated to the work of his ministry, charitable in heart, and of blameless life, he has, as we believe, earned his place among those whose victorious and godly conversation in the world are fit examples to us who still strive in the Church militant.

We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That in the death of the Rev. Hardy H. Phelps the Church on earth has lost a faithful priest whose labors will long be felt for good, his brethren of the Clergy a valued co-worker, his flock a faithful pastor, his family an affectionate and devoted head, and his Bishop a loyal supporter.

Resolved, That a page of the Journal be devoted to the memory of our brother, and that a copy of this memorial be sent to his family with assurances of our deep sympathy in their affliction.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

In undertaking its work your Committee is, as usual, confronted with the difficulty of presenting a satisfactory report, owing to the neglect of the Clergy to send in their reports on time.

The present Canon requires that parochial reports be sent in not later than April 20th. On April 29th our excellent Diocesan Secretary, says: "On April 20th, less than one-third of the reports were in hand; and even now, nine days later, thirty-three of the reports are lacking." Such laxness in sending in reports causes great annoyance and inconvenience, and makes the work of tabulation needlessly slow and trying. Even at the opening of the Convention seven reports were still lacking.

So far as is possible with incomplete records we submit the following: Comparative statistics (the comparison being between this year and last) show approximately the following slight gains:

Families 274, congregations 43, communicants 398, Sunday School pupils 466, church edifices 5, church property \$98,428.

In the following items there is little or no gain, and in some instances a slight loss: Baptisms, Sunday School teachers, Parish school teachers and pupils.

Parochial receipts increased \$10,777, Diocesan \$542, General \$180, total \$11,501.

The missionary work of the Church, of course, is first in importance. We call attention to the notice from the General Board of Missions that apportionments to their fund are to be increased forty-five per cent, and we urge upon clergy and laity the duty of rising to the requirements of the occasion.

The work of the Convocations demand and deserve our more generous support.

Especially do we call attention of our white brethren to the duty of contributing to the Colored Convocation as recommended by the Convention last year. Our colored brethren look to the rest of us for help, encouragement and guidance, a yearly offering given, some help, and also calls attention to our wider and higher duty.

White churches last year gave only \$41.54 to our colored work, less than was given to the Jews. Our Bishop asks for \$200.

We recommend and urge at least an annual offering in every church in the Diocese for this work.

There are now no Diocesan missionary officers. The list of Diocesan officers in the Journal shows none appointed for the missionary work, the work for which the Church primarily exists. We therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to print in the list of Diocesan Officers and Committees the officers of each Convocation.

We note with pleasure and gratitude the interest shown in this Convention in the cause of Christian Education. The welfare of the Church of tomorrow depends on the training of the young people of today. The University of the South, our work at the State University, and St. Mary's School, we cordially commend to the hearty and intelligent support of all our people.

The failure of our Church work can not be laid at the door of the laity when the clergy disobey the Canon law and neglect to take up collections as ordered, a matter entirely in their own hands. We urge upon them a more conscientious obedience to laws which they assisted in making.

But we believe that more frequent and timely information would help in this matter. We therefore offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed, resident in Raleigh, whose

duty it shall be to prepare, print, and issue a quarterly statement giving the names of all congregations, and also, in parallel columns, all annual apportionments and the total offerings to date for the year for all purposes required and recommended.

Resolved, That the expenses of printing and mailing be paid by the Treasurer of the Diocese out of the Episcopal and Contingent Fund.

The resolutions offered by the Committee were, on motion, adopted, and the Bishop appointed as the Committee called for by the second resolution, Messrs. Jos. B. Cheshire, Jr., and Francis A. Cox.

The Rev. S. M. Hanff, from the Committee on the Endowment Plan for the University of the South, made a verbal report, and the Rev. W. S. Claiborne having, in response to an invitation by the Convention, explained the so-called "Nelson Plan" for raising an endowment for the University of the South, the Rev. S. S. Bost moved that an apportionment of 4 per cent be made on the congregations of the Diocese, on the basis of the assessment for the Contingent Fund. The Rev. Geo. W. Lay moved as a substitute the following resolutions, which were adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention cordially endorses the Nelson Plan for the support of the University of the South.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to raise at least \$1,488 as the share of this Diocese for this year by such means as shall seem best to them.

The Bishop appointed the Committee called for as follows: The Rev. Bertram E. Brown, Rev. Francis M. Osborne, Rev. S. M. Hanff, Mr. W. L. London, Mr. Albert L. Cox, Mr. Geo. H. Nash, and Mr. J. Cameron Buxton.

The Rev. A. B. Hunter, from a Committee appointed by the last Convention on a certain bequest of the late Judge Wm. P. Bynum, presented the following preamble and resolutions which were, on motion, adopted:

WHEREAS, The Trustees of the Diocese hold in trust for our Education Fund a valuable building and premises in Salisbury, admirably

situated and adapted for a center of missionary work in that important missionary field; and,

WHEREAS, The Diocese is in possession of a fund of \$2,000, bequeathed by the late Judge Bynum for missionary work in the Diocese; therefore,

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Diocese be instructed to hold the said Bynum legacy in trust for the Education Fund, to be used under authority and direction of the Convention; any income therefrom to be at the disposal of the Bishop for the support of young men preparing for Holy Orders.

Resolved, That in consideration of the said \$2,000 being thus transferred to the Education Fund, the Trustees of the Diocese are instructed to hold the said building in Salisbury, with so much of the premises as the Bishop may think necessary, as a center of missionary work; and that the missionaries there employed be charged to pay special attention to the inmates of the County Homes and jails within the territory served by them.

WHEREAS, It is proposed that a school for Postulants or for the education of young men for the ministry be established on lands owned by the Trustees of the Diocese at Chestnut Hill, near Salisbury; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Diocese be authorized to use the W. P. Bynum fund of two thousand dollars, with the interest thereon, for the establishment and maintenance of said school, on such terms as the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese may deem advisable.

The Rev. Dr. Pittenger, of the Special Committee on the International Peace Movement, mentioned in the Bishop's Address, presented the following report which was adopted unanimously by a rising vote:

The Committee to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's Address in which he voiced so fittingly his sympathy with the desire for peace which is now pervading the civilized world, would report:

WHEREAS, The Honorable William H. Taft, President of the United States, has by his patriotic utterances and philanthropic efforts in the interest of permanent and universal peace awakened a deepening and widening sentiment in the hearts of the people of the civilized world; and,

WHEREAS, As the result of his influence there has been inaugurated an international movement for the formation of a treaty of peace between the two great English-speaking races of the world; and,

WHEREAS, In response to this humanitarian call the Archbishop of Canterbury has invited and offered the support of the Church of England toward the accomplishing of that great aim; and,

WHEREAS, the Bishop of New York has given utterance to a hearty desire for the American Church to give its influence and support in the same direction; and,

WHEREAS, the Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina has given expression in earnest and eloquent words to his interest in and sympathy with the same cause, and has requested some indication of the opinion and feeling of the people in this part of the country upon this most vital and pressing question:

Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, the ministers and members of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina in Convention assembled, do most heartily welcome the official declaration by our honored and beloved Diocesan of his feeling toward this important and momentous undertaking, and do promise to all who are laboring in this cause our cordial and substantial support in any steps that may be taken in the furtherance of the high and noble purpose of bringing together in the bonds of a treaty of peace the peoples of the two great nations that are striving towards that end.

Resolved, That the Convention recommends that on one Sunday in each year the rector of each Parish shall bring this work before his people.

Resolved, That one-third of the Easter offering of every Parish and Organized Mission be asked for the work of the Colored Convocation of the Diocese.

The Rev. E. A. Osborne read the following communication from Mr. Wm. A. Smith, a Trustee of the University of the South and a Manager of the Thompson Orphanage:

To the Very Reverend Father, the Bishop, and Brethren of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese of North Carolina in Convention Assembled—Greeting:

Owing to bodily infirmity, I ask you to accept my resignation of any position with which the Convention has so kindly honored me heretofore by reason of the trust and confidence reposed, through its partiality and favor, of which I am duly sensible. I am constrained by a realizing sense of my duty to Christ and His Church to this action. May I ask that you select other, more able mentally and physically, and more zealous and efficient?

May the acts of the Convention redound to the glory of Christ and His Church; and praying God's blessing to rest upon each and singular every member of the Convention, and beseeching your prayers,

The Secretary was, on motion, instructed to acknowledge the receipt of this letter, to convey to Mr. Smith the thanks of the Convention for his long and faithful service to the Church in the Diocese, and to assure him of our loving appreciation of the same, and our wishes and prayers in his behalf for many years of health and happiness.

The Rev. Francis M. Osborne, on behalf of the Diocesan editors of *The Carolina Churchman*, presented the following

report of the Business Manager of *The Carolina Churchman*, with appended resolutions proposed in view of the withdrawal of the Diocese of East Carolina from a share in its management, that Diocese finding it necessary to maintain its separate Diocesan organ:

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS MANAGER OF THE CAROLINA
CHURCHMAN.

MAY 1, 1910, TO MAY 1, 1911.

The Business Manager of *The Carolina Churchman* begs to report as follows, for the fiscal year ending April 30, 1911:

During the year twelve monthly issues of the paper have been sent out, averaging 1,925 copies to the issue, making a total of 23,100 copies.

There are now on the books of *The Carolina Churchman* 1,645 subscribers, of which 1,433 are marked "paying subscribers," the remaining 212 going gratis to advertisers, exchanges, clergy, and editors. Of the paying subscribers, East Carolina has 510, North Carolina 544, the District of Asheville 144, miscellaneous 235.

Comparing this report with the corresponding report one year ago, we note that the total circulation for the past year was 23,100 copies, against 19,500 the year before. This increased circulation is due in part to an increased subscription list, partly to a large special edition for St. Mary's School, and partly to a large number of sample copies sent out with a view to increasing the number of subscribers. Comparing subscribers reported one year ago and now, we note that the present list is 1,645 against 1,684 last report; with 1,433 paying subscribers against 1,493 last report. Of these paying subscribers, East Carolina has 510 against 612 last year; North Carolina has 544 against 531 last year; the District of Asheville has 144 against 178 last year; miscellaneous 235 against 172 last report.

These figures show a decided loss in East Carolina and the District of Asheville, with a gain of only 13 in North Carolina, and a gain of 63 in the miscellaneous list. This loss is due in the main to the necessary striking from the list, by requirement of the post office law, approximately 300 subscribers for nonpayment of subscriptions, these having been counted last report as paying subscribers.

The Convention has laid upon this Committee the duty of making an equitable apportionment upon the Parishes and Missions for the support of the Church's work at the State University. The amount to be so apportioned for this year is six hundred dollars. Believing that the two items of minister's salary and current expenses are the fairest basis upon which to make this apportionment, we offer the following resolution:

(1) That the Finance Committee be authorized to levy an apportionment of two per cent upon minister's salary and current expenses in all Parishes and Missions for the support of Church work at the University of North Carolina: *Provided*, that in no case shall such apportionment be less than fifty cents.

(2) That the usual assessment of twelve per cent upon minister's salary and current expenses be made to meet the requirements of the Episcopal and Contingent Fund. If minister's salary has not been fully paid, twelve per cent of the amount promised; if the Parish or Mission be vacant, twelve per cent of the amount previously promised. To find out what the assessments should be for this year, refer to parochial reports in Convention Journal of 1910.

(3) That all arrears against Christ Church, Milton, be remitted; also, to remit all arrears against Chapel of Hope, Charlotte; and all against St. Mary's, High Point.

(4) We recommend these special assessments: Church of the Transfiguration, Smithfield, \$15; Emmanuel Church, Southern Pines, \$20; St. Stephen's, Duke, \$25; Mayodan, Church of the Messiah, \$25; Littleton, St. Alban's, \$24; Roanoke Rapids, All Saints', \$10; Reidsville, St. Thomas', \$22.50; Charlotte, St. Andrew's, \$2.50; Charlotte, St. Mary's, \$5; Raleigh, St. Augustine's, \$25; Raleigh, St. Mary's School (voluntary), \$20; Greensboro, Holy Trinity, \$200; Cooleemee, Good Shepherd, \$12.

(5) That we, again, remind ourselves of the obligation laid upon us by Canon to make quarterly payment of the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, on the first day, respectively, of July, October, January and April. We recommend that the same rule apply with reference to the apportionment for Church work at Chapel Hill.

On motion, the report was adopted.

On motion of Mr. James Ker, Jr., it was

Resolved, That a Committee of five be appointed by the Bishop to evolve some system or method of organizing a Layman's Auxiliary in aid of the construction of new buildings for the Orphanage, to co-operate with the Federation of Thompson Orphanage Guilds.

The Bishop appointed as members of this Committee the Rev. H. T. Cocke and Messrs. Marshall Staton, Thos. H. Battle, James Ker, Jr., and Albert L. Cox.

Mr. R. H. Battle offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this body are hereby tendered to the Rector and congregation of the Church of the Good Shepherd and the citizens of Rocky Mount generally, for their generous hospitality to the members of the Convention, the Woman's Auxiliary, and the visitors in attendance upon our sessions.

On motion of the Rev. Sidney S. Bost, the thanks of the Convention were tendered to the Rev. W. S. Clairborne and Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., for their addresses in regard to the matters which they presented to the Convention.

The Secretary was, on motion, authorized to have printed 1,000 copies of the Journal of the Convention.

On motion of the Rev. E. A. Osborne, Mr. Robert S. White was elected a Manager of the Thompson Orphanage in place of Mr. Wm. A. Smith, resigned.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Diocesan Association of the Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society:

The Treasurer of the Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society reports an increase of \$8,000 within six months in its invested funds, now standing at more than \$311,500. Nearly \$19,000 was paid out in annuities in November last, more than ever before coming to members of our Diocesan Association.

On motion of the same, the Bishop was requested to appoint a Committee of Five to promote in the Diocese the work of raising the \$5,000,000 Fund for Clergy Pensions.

The Bishop appointed as members of this Committee the Rev. S. S. Bost, the Rev. H. T. Cocke, and Messrs. Lawrence S. Holt, Sr., D. Y. Cooper and Wm. A. Erwin.

On motion of the same it was

Resolved, That the Diocese of North Carolina, in Convention assembled, desires to record its hearty sympathy with the efforts of the Five Million Dollar Clergy Pension Fund Commission to raise a suitable fund for the automatic pensioning of the clergy at the age of sixty-four.

Resolved further, That having heard with much satisfaction the stirring appeal of the Rev. J. J. Wilkins, D.D., Financial Secretary of the Commission, we commend him and his cause to the people of North Carolina, and pledge him our hearty sympathy and support.

Resolved further, That every clergyman in the Diocese be urged to make his pledge, however small, to this fund, in order that the Diocesan Committee in their appeal to the laymen may have behind them the united and active endorsement of the clergy.

On motion of Mr. R. H. Battle, the Treasurer was authorized to pay the traveling expenses of clergymen of the Diocese present not entitled to seats in the Convention, and also those of Mr. LeBlanc.

The members of the Woman's Auxiliary having come into the Church, the Rev. Alfred R. Berkeley read their annual report. (See Appendix B.)

On motion of Mr. R. H. Battle, the thanks of the Convention were extended to the good women of the Church for their noble contributions to the missionary work.

The Convention then took a recess.

FRIDAY, May 19, 1911, 3.30 p. m.

On the reassembling of the Convention the Bishop took the chair.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Secretary of the General Convention, giving notice of sundry amendments to the Constitution of the Church as adopted by

the late Convention and referred for ratification to that of 1913. (See Appendix B.)

The Rev. R. Percy Eubanks, from the Committee on Unfinished Business, reported that there was nothing requiring further action on the part of the Committee.

There being no more business before the Convention, the minutes of the day's proceedings were read and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That after Divine Service this evening the Convention shall stand adjourned.

A recess was then taken until 8.15 o'clock, when Evening Prayer was read and addresses on Mission Work were made by the Rev. Cyprian P. Willcox and Mr. J. A. E. LeBlanc. The Bishop offered Prayers, pronounced the Benediction, and declared the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

APPENDIX A.

ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP.

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

We meet again in annual council for the interests of God's Kingdom. For the first time this particular community entertains our Diocesan gathering. May God be with us, to bless our deliberations and determinations to the advancement of His cause throughout the field especially committed to our care; and may He make our meeting a help and a blessing to this congregation and to this whole community, whose generous hospitality ministers to, and is doing so much for, our comfort and enjoyment.

We look about us, and greet our brethren in this annual reunion; and that reminds us that from time to time God takes one and another to the rest which remaineth after labor for the faithful servant.

October 18, 1910, the Rev. Primus Priss Alston, of St. Michael and All Angels, Charlotte, a most faithful and efficient colored Priest of the Diocese, fell on sleep upon a brief and sudden call. He had told me, when I had last seen him, that he was not in good health, but I thought him mistaken. He looked the picture of mature and vigorous manhood. I was inexpressibly shocked by the announcement of his death, which came to me while I was in attendance upon the General Convention in Cincinnati. He was one of the early graduates of the Theological class at St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, and was ordained to the Diaconate by Bishop Lyman, May 13, 1883. Soon after his ordination Bishop Lyman sent him to me, that I might make use of his services in the Mission of St. Michael and All Angels, which I had begun among the colored people of my parish. He continued in that work until his sudden call last October. I have no time or space here to give a history of that work, but today, with its beautiful brick church, its large and admirably appointed Industrial School, and its congregation of zealous workers and worshipers, it is one of the best specimens of a church institution among our colored people, and it stands as his monument. He was a man of excellent mind, of good

judgment, of rare devotion, of an unswerving faithfulness to the work undertaken, which knew no turning back or turning aside, but went straight on to the end; and the end usually meant the accomplishment of his purpose. We have had, and we have still, upon the rolls of this Diocese, some of the best clergymen in the Church in the United States. We have been singularly fortunate in the character of our colored Priests bred in our own Diocese. I do not think we have had a poor one among them; and among them all our brother lately departed holds a very high place. His death is a distinct loss to the Diocese and to the Church.

The Rev. Hardy Hardison Phelps was also one of our native clergy, though he had served some years in other Dioceses. He came to us from West Virginia not quite two years ago, though he was not formally transferred to me until a few months before his death. In the summer of 1909 I put him in charge of the work in the upper part of Halifax County, and he greatly endeared himself to his people, and won the affectionate regard of all who came into personal contact with him, by his faithful performance of his duty and his sympathetic and kindly ministrations to all who would receive them. I felt greatly encouraged at the prospect of seeing that part of our diocesan field so well supplied, and could already discern precious fruits of his labors, when he suddenly developed symptoms of the fatal malady which carried him off. He gave promise of much good service, but was called to lay it down and to face the fact that his work in this world was ended. He bore with great patience the burden laid upon him, and through some months of waiting grew strong in spirit, committing himself without a murmur to the will of his Master and Saviour.

I can not refrain from giving at least a very brief and inadequate mention of another, whose tragical end sent a thrill of pain and grief through all our hearts. The Rev. McNeely DuBose, for four years Rector of St. Mary's School, retained his canonical connection with the District of Asheville, but in fact he was one of us, and with us during those years, as he had been connected with the Diocese before the creation of the Missionary District. I think I never knew a more faithful and godly priest and pastor, and he had few equals in the oversight and administration of a parish. The Church in our State has suffered a grievous loss in his

removal, and many of us have felt that his place in our hearts can not be filled.

The total of services held during the year covered by this report is 185. I have administered the Holy Communion forty-two times, preached ninety-eight sermons, made forty-two addresses, baptized one adult and five infants, married six couples, officiated at four funerals, ordained two priests, consecrated one church, and confirmed 476 persons.

September 7th, in the Church of St. Michael and All Angels, Charlotte, I advanced to the Priesthood two of our young colored Deacons, James King Satterwhite and Robert Josiah Johnson. The sermon was preached by Archdeacon Delany, and the candidates were presented by the Rev. Walter J. Smith. The priests above named, together with the Rev. Primus P. Alston, James E. King, Chas. H. Male, of this Diocese, and the Rev. Jacob Jones, of the Diocese of South Carolina, united in the Imposition of Hands.

May 11, 1910, at the opening service of our last annual Convention, I had the pleasure of consecrating the new and beautiful stone church, St. Paul's, Winston, which is a material addition to the work of the Church in that growing city, and equally a credit to the faith and liberality of the people, and to the zeal and practical efficiency of the faithful rector.

The Rev. Edward L. Ogilby has resigned the parish of St. Athanasius, Burlington, and has been placed in charge of Emmanuel Church, Southern Pines.

The Rev. Geo. M. Tolson, having given up the work at Leaksville and Spray, has accepted the rectorship of St. Thomas's Church, Reidsville, and has been given the care of St. Mary's Church, High Point.

The Rev. Wm. J. Gordon, transferred from East Carolina, has taken the work at Leaksville and Spray.

The Rev. Frank J. Mallett, transferred from the Diocese of Pittsburg, has become rector of St. Luke's Church, Salisbury.

The Rev. John B. Gible, transferred from East Carolina, has accepted the rectorship of St. Athanasius' Church, Burlington.

The Canons require the Bishop to make, at every annual Convention of his Diocese, a statement of the affairs of the Diocese, giving detailed information of his acts and services, such as is contained in the foregoing pages of this Address. Heretofore I have been accustomed to read this statement and these details in full, following the unbroken custom of my predecessors, Bishops of North Carolina. But I have felt for some years that this was uninteresting and unedifying, seeing such information may be more readily and more effectively conveyed by submitting the printed statement to the Convention. I therefore omit at this time the reading of the details of my official acts, and ask the members of the Convention to consider my canonical duty sufficiently performed by submitting to them printed copies of those parts of this Address.

The Canons also require the Bishop to include in his annual statement, "all matters tending to throw light upon

the affairs of the Diocese." This I understand as requiring me to lay before you all matters of special importance relating to the duties, opportunities, and obligations of this Diocesan Convention, with reference to the general work and welfare of the Church. And this part of my annual statement I think it most proper that I should read publicly in the Convention.

OUR GENERAL WORK.

First of all when we come together we are reminded of our oneness in Christ. That is what every Christian assembly means. And the one great note of life and power in our American Christianity of today is this increasing sense of the relation of the individual Christian to the whole Body. No one who remembers our General Conventions for the last thirty years can have failed to note how the small matters of our domestic trials and difficulties have fallen out of notice in that great meeting, and how the great things of the Church's world-wide commission, and its relations with all Christian people, have come to occupy the time and thought of our Bishops and deputies. And if we would align ourselves with this advance, we must place first in our thought and action our duty and relationship to the general work of the Church.

I therefore ask the attention of this Convention to our General Missionary work. In no part of our activities have we greater cause of encouragement than in the work of our Board of Missions. Beginning with the action of our General Convention at San Francisco in 1901, in laying out its annual work, and apportioning among the Dioceses the sum to be raised for that work, there has been a steady advance in the extent and effectiveness of the work of the Board of Missions, and in the systematic and generous support given to it throughout the Church. Up to that time this Diocese had so imperfectly realized its relationship to the Board that it had never done anything at all commensurate with its duty to our general Foreign and Domestic work. Since our duty was pointed out to us, and our part of it assigned in the suggestion of a definite proportion of the obligation, I am proud and thankful to say that this Diocese has never failed, up to the present time, to give more than the amount asked for.

But the work still moves forward, and the circumference

of our enterprises expands. The Convention of 1910 effected a most important reorganization of the Board of Missions, and it is more than likely that we shall find the new Board disposed to push on the work with increased vigor. Indeed, since I first sent these lines to the printer, the Church papers inform us that the Board of Missions, at its meeting this month, resolved to increase the apportionment by an addition of 45 per cent. to the amount asked of the Church last year. This calls for increased faith and liberality, and for increased diligence on our part. Heretofore the Clergy and people have kindly and generously responded to the appeals which, as their Bishop, I have made to them, and our apportionment has been promptly and generously met. But I have received communications and suggestions from the Board of Missions, looking to the more active participation of this Convention and of the vestries of the several parishes in the distribution of the obligation and the collection of the funds. I therefore ask that a committee of this Convention be appointed to take into consideration the obligations of our Diocese and people to the missionary work of the Church and the best methods to be recommended for the prompt and systematic performance of the same.

In this connection I can not refrain from asking your serious consideration of our duty with reference to what has been called the "Forward Movement," and the "Men's Missionary Movement," of which we were thinking and talking so much at this time last year. We were stirred up to much interest and zeal, and made large promises to ourselves of more devoted service and more generous gifts for the bringing of the world to Christ. I called together some of our prominent laymen, and endeavored to secure their more active participation in the work of the Church at home as well as increased efforts abroad. I trust that we have not forgotten the good resolutions then made. May I hope that the committee, above suggested, may take up the whole questions of arousing our people, and putting them in the way of more effective and persistent co-operation in all the activities of diocesan and general work?

ST. MARY'S CONFERENCE.

The reference to our "Men's Meeting" of January, 1910, reminds me that that meeting adjourned to meet again in connection with the Conference of clergy and laity to be

held at St. Mary's School. The Conference was held as appointed, June 20-24, 1910, and no one who had the privilege of participating in it can have failed to experience in some degree the benefits, spiritual, intellectual, and social, of its sessions. The addresses of Bishop Kinsman were its chief feature, and of themselves abundantly rewarded all who heard them for the time devoted to the meeting. But the more informal conferences and discussions were most interesting and helpful, and calculated to be of great advantage to our Church people of the Carolinas, if we can so excite their interest as to attract in future a general attendance from different parts of our associated Dioceses. It is planned to repeat the Conference this year, June 5th-9th, and I most earnestly press upon our clergy and laity the importance of attending this meeting. I trust that every clergyman of the Diocese will endeavor to be present, and that one layman at least, or two if practicable, may be induced to attend from each parish. With such a general attendance much may be done in securing a better understanding of many practical problems of our Church life, and better co-operation in dealing with them.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The mention of St. Mary's School naturally suggests the subject of Christian Education. I do not, in this Address, discuss particularly the interests of St. Mary's School, since the report of the Trustees, and the presence of the Rector of St. Mary's sufficiently assure us of its adequate consideration by the Convention. We have done something towards putting St. Mary's upon a proper foundation, but very much remains to be done. You are well assured of my deep interest in that school, and of my readiness to co-operate to the utmost extent of my ability in its behalf.

At this time we have another of the institutions of the Church, and of the Diocese, demanding our most serious attention.

The University of the South at Sewanee is in a peculiar manner the child of the Church in the South. I will not at this time discuss its history, or enlarge upon the very strong claims it has upon us, more than barely to mention them. This Diocese is one of those responsible for its existence, and bound in honor, as it seems to me, to respond to its

appeal for loyal sympathy and support. It exists by our act; it is carried on by our authority, and under our direction. Its responsibilities have been assumed with our sanction. We made it; we are responsible for it. And nobly has it justified its existence, and repaid a thousand-fold all that has been done for it. I have, during the past twelve or fifteen months, been devoting some degree of special attention and study to the history of the Church in the South since the year 1859. The growth of the Church since that time has been truly marvelous, more than three hundred *per cent.* in the clergy, and more than six hundred *per cent.* in communicants, taking the Southern Dioceses south and west of Virginia, and the Carolinas. And, leaving out of account the element of immigration, I am satisfied that in these Dioceses the most important factor in the life of the Church has been the influence and work of the University of the South. In proportion to the means at its command it has exerted an intellectual and spiritual power in the country far beyond that of our oldest and most amply endowed universities. We, in North Carolina, have come but little within its influence ourselves on account of the closer identification of our people with our State University at Chapel Hill; but with the few men we have sent, and the meager contributions we have made, we have yet received incalculable returns in the character and work of both clergymen and laymen of our Diocese educated and trained at Sewanee. We have with us at this Convention a commissioned representative of the University of the South, to whom I have felt it my duty to assign a special place upon our program, and a set hour for speaking to us in behalf of our own institution. This Convention should attend carefully to what he and others shall lay before us, and we should determine what our duty demands of us in regard to this work. I have received from the Bishop and Diocese of Atlanta a communication on this subject, which I am asked to lay before this Convention, and also other papers from the Commissioner of Endowments of the University of the South, which shall be at the command of any committee which the Convention may see fit to appoint for the further and detailed consideration of this important matter. In the meanwhile I ask your intelligent and sympathetic attention to what the representatives and advocates of our own institution may have to say to us.

DIOCESAN WORK.

In many respects the work of the Diocese at large is going on vigorously and well. There are many signs of growth and development in our large towns. I am much gratified at finding that in many of our parishes there is a disposition to provide a more adequate support for the clergy; and most of our stronger parishes are fairly alive to the duty of pushing the work of the Church in their immediate vicinity. A great deal of excellent work of this kind is being done, in Charlotte, in Raleigh, in Henderson, in Durham, in Tarboro, and in other places. And the Diocese still maintains its admirable work in the new manufacturing towns and suburbs, which is of much importance, and in which I believe this Diocese leads among all the Dioceses of the South.

Our greatest weakness, and our consequent greatest need, at this time, are in connection with the work in our smaller parishes in towns and in the country. Many of these are dependent upon outside assistance to maintain even infrequent services. And in the missionary work of our Convocations we need renewed and increased interest and co-operation of our people—both the clergy and the laity of our stronger parishes. This work, formerly carried on under an Executive Missionary Committee of this Convention, is now remitted wholly to the three Convocations. This change has fully justified itself in the results of the work. I believe that quite twice as much is expended for Diocesan Missionary work under the new method as under the old. But we are still far below the measure of our duty. And I make here an earnest appeal to the clergy and laity to remember their duty to our Diocesan Missions, and to remember that that duty can only be discharged through the medium of our Convocations. Our people have not come to realize the importance of attending the meetings of the Convocations, and of co-operating with our faithful Archdeacons in the good work which they are doing. We have heard the reports of these Archdeacons, and have been shown the opportunities which lie open before us. Let me ask you to remember that, to the missionary work of our own Diocese, attendance by laymen as well as clergymen upon the annual meetings of the Convocations, in the summer or autumn, when these meetings are held, is more important than attendance on our annual Conventions in May. There has been much im-

provement within the last two or three years. Let us work for more. We must have these meetings better attended if we are to do our work successfully.

In concluding this part of the subject, I can not refrain from mentioning three new enterprises which have marked the year covered by this Address, namely: the hopeful beginning we have made upon work in the very important manufacturing town of Spray, where I have been able to put the Rev. Wm. J. Gordon, and a parish visitor and worker maintained by a stipend from the "United Offering"; the Rev. Mr. Bost's admirable enterprise in the interest of diocesan work among the Deaf Mutes, with a faithful woman worker devoting herself wholly to the cause; and Archdeacon Hughes's efforts in behalf of the convicts on the State Farm in Halifax County, and the work carried on there by Mr. LeBlanc. I hope the members of the Convention may be able to hear something more from those engaged in the work; but I can not refrain from recording in this place my own very high appreciation of this work among the deaf mutes, and also that for the people of the State Farm, and my very hearty commendation of both to the sympathy and support of the Diocese.

I would say one word on behalf of our diocesan work among the Negroes. Should not each parish in the Diocese do something in aid of this work? In South Carolina the Convention has asked that the Easter Offering in every parish be devoted to the missionary work of the Diocese, one-half to the white work, one-half to the black. Surely we should do something. I ask this Convention to recommend some method by which all our people may be encouraged to show their sympathy for our colored brethren, and to extend their generous assistance to our own faithful colored Archdeacon and the workers under him, in the efforts in behalf of our colored people.

In conclusion, and looking again at matters of universal concern, I think all Christian hearts must feel a deep sympathy with the widespread sentiment in behalf of Peace and Good Will among all the nations of the earth, which seems to be one of the hopeful signs of the time. And while we are sensible of that fatal weakness and perversity of our fallen nature which still breaks out in public and private contention and strife and bloodshed, yet what the Angels promised as the gift of God in the new-born Christ we, His

people, must continue to pray for and to strive after. The President of this great Country is in many ways showing himself to be a great and a magnanimous leader; and in none more than in his advocacy of Peace on Earth, and particularly in his proposals for the better security of permanent amity and concord between America and our Mother Country, England. This has no party or sectional element, but is intended to express and to develop the mutual good will of all people at home and abroad. Shall not we, as representing one Diocese in the Kingdom of the Prince of Peace, put on record our devout hope and prayer, that God may bless and bring to good effect the efforts of our government on behalf of Peace among the Nations and the Peoples of the Earth?

I have held quarterly meetings generally throughout the year, except the last quarter, when I have been prevented by important ministerial duties in the Convocation, in connection with the Bishop's visitation to congregations where there was no minister in charge, and by other pressing duties.

I was absent from the Convocation four weeks during the meeting of the General Convention, to which I was a delegate.

The year, upon the whole, has been an anxious one, and without much apparent progress, as we have not had sufficient ministerial force to supply all the churches, and there has been much demand upon the Archdeacon's time to supply the vacant places, which he has not been able to do except to a limited extent.

The Treasurer's report, herewith submitted, shows a balance of \$945 now on hand in spite of the fact that a number of congregations have contributed nothing, as shown by said report. This arises from two circumstances—first, we have not been able to procure ministers for a number of vacant missions, and secondly, we have been aided by the

generous gifts of a few individuals. But for these conditions the treasury would have been exhausted. And unless steps are taken to supplement our current resources, it will be impossible to support the ministers needed to carry on the work.

There are several growing towns in the Convocation where the Church should be planted and buildings erected. Among them, I would mention Mooresville, Hamlet, and Albemarle. We have a lot in Mooresville; a lot has also been offered in Hamlet, and funds are being raised in both places for buildings. But nothing has been done in Albemarle. Our people in all these places are poor and need help.

There is great need of rectories in this Convocation; there being only three belonging to missions that are sufficient for a minister and his family, and one of these is in the country, where ministers are not disposed to live. One is greatly needed in Hamlet, which is near the center of a very important line of missions. A rectory there would supply the field, but the people there are not able to build one. A committee of laymen to take this matter in hand and provide rectories for mission fields would help the cause of missions greatly.

The people of Rockingham, Hamlet, and Laurinburg, and those in Statesville, St. James's and St. Mark's, are encouraged with the prospect of having a minister in charge of each of these fields very soon.

The work under the Rev. Messrs. S. J. M. Brown, A. R. Berkeley, and Francis M. Osborne, is growing and promises to become self-supporting in a few years, and I trust the other two fields above mentioned may soon attain the same condition. The Church in the mill towns and country missions will, however, be very slow in this respect, but they will become, and are now to some extent, feeders for city churches.

The new church building lately completed at St. Timothy's, Olive Branch, Union County, has given much encouragement to that Mission, and the people of Monroe are now engaged in building a nice brick church, which will add greatly to the strength of that congregation. These two places are without a minister, since the Rev. Wm. H. Ball resigned that field in March.

Concord and Lexington have been without a minister since the Rev. Dr. Davis retired from the active duties of the Ministry on account of age, last year.

The Rev. Wm. H. Ball took temporary charge of the church at Concord the first of April. He seems to be doing good work there, and it is to be hoped that Lexington will soon be able to procure an active man to build up the church in that growing and prosperous town.

Judging from the general prosperity of the country, the time is at hand for the men of the Church to arouse themselves to a higher standard of activity and generosity in promoting the growth and extension of the Church if it is to keep abreast with the times and with the enterprise and activity of the religious bodies around us.

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON OF THE CONVOCATION OF RALEIGH.

To the Rt. Rev. JOS. BLOUNT CHESHIRE, D.D.,
Bishop of North Carolina:

The summary of the clerical offices which I have performed during the Diocesan year ending March 31, 1911, is as follows:

Within the Convocation: in 29 parishes and missions. Services, 81; sermons and addresses, 79; celebrations, 11; Baptisms, infant 2, adult 26, total 28; candidates for confirmation presented, 14. Without the Convocation: Services, at Milton 5, at Flat Rock 9, total 14; sermons, at Milton 5, at Flat Rock 6, at Boydton, Va., 1, total 12.

Besides these strictly clerical functions, other requirements of my office have caused me to make not less than fifty trips to different towns and neighborhoods, looking after isolated church members, attending

committee meetings, interviewing vestries or clergymen, or in other ways trying to advance the work of the Church in the Convocation.

The month of October, allowed me by the Bishop as vacation, I spent in Henderson County, taking temporary charge of St. John's in the Wilderness, Flat Rock.

Two weeks of the past March I was in the North, visiting Galilee Mission and theological seminaries in search of possible laborers for our part of the Master's vineyard. So far none have been secured, yet I am not without hope that my efforts may eventually be fruitful of good result.

In reviewing the year's work, we can note some steps forward—specially at Elm City, the State Farm in Halifax County, Lillington, and Franklinton. At Elm City, the Rev. Evans A. Edwards, rector of St. Timothy's, Wilson, has revived an all but lifeless mission, taking it under his pastoral care and giving weekly Sunday services. At last accounts his work was finding its reward in increasing congregations and quickened interest.

Last August, Mr. Edgar N. LeBlanc, a former worker in the Galilee Mission, Philadelphia, was secured as a resident worker at the State Farm. He undertook this work at pecuniary loss, and has manifested from first to last a spirit of earnest self-consecration. Board and a salary of \$300 per annum is the meager compensation promised him; the cost of board is kindly assumed by the Directors of the State Prison, the salary it is hoped to raise by personal subscriptions. Nearly all of it has already been subscribed, and so far enough has been paid to meet monthly obligations as they have fallen due. Mr. LeBlanc's work is highly commended by the Superintendent of the State Prison and by the officials at the farm, and he has won his way to the hearts of the prisoners. Already he has presented twenty-four for baptism, there are still others to be baptized, and a goodly number waiting to receive confirmation. A noble work so well begun will, I trust, not be suffered to fail or flag for lack of a workman or means for his support.

On the fifth Sunday in May last I began to hold services at Lillington, and services have been kept up there on every fifth Sunday since. According to the tradition in the town, only twice before my first service had the services of the Church been held there; once long ago by Rev. Wm. Pettigrew, and once about twelve years ago by Bishop Cheshire. Only a few members are here, but a few, if in earnest, make a good nucleus for the gathering in of many.

Quite recently a most hopeful mission has been started at Franklinton. The six or eight of our communicants here have enthusiastically welcomed the Church services and are eager to have a permanent mission and a church building. I am now holding service here one Friday night in every month.

By the removal of Rev. John London and the Rev. J. Coleman Horton, and by the deeply deplored death of Rev. Hardy H. Phelps, nine parishes

and missions in the northeastern part of the Convocation have been left vacant. For these I have been able to do but little, as there are few vacant Sundays at my disposal. But at Kittrell and Middleburg, where week-day services have been acceptable, I have had regular monthly appointments. To Weldon also I have given several services, irregularly, as opportunity was afforded me.

It gives me pleasure to report that, with the faithful help of Rev. Mr. Barber and his assistant at Clayton and of Rev. Mr. Bost and his assistant at Holly Springs, all the missions originated within the period of my Archidiaconate are now served regularly.

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON FOR WORK AMONG COLORED
PEOPLE.

To the Rt. Rev. JOSEPH BLOUNT CHESHIRE, D.D.,
Bishop of North Carolina:

I take pleasure in submitting to you the following report of my official acts for the Diocesan year just closed:

I have made 65 visits to the different mission stations; delivered 121 sermons and addresses; celebrated the Holy Communion 48 times, three of which were in private; conducted, in whole or in part, 126 services; baptized 4 children and 1 adult; married one couple, and buried 3 persons. During this time I have traveled over 5,500 miles—over 4,000 of the same being within the Diocese. I have visited each of our stations from 2 to 10 times, and notwithstanding the fact that in some instances the weight of statistics may be against us, I think I can safely say that with the exception of St. Philip's, Noise (whose troubles are due to a change of conditions rather than their lack of love), there are evidences of life, manifested in devotion to the Church and her services, that may be observed on every hand.

Certain other evidences of growth must not be overlooked. The Rector

of St. Ambrose's Church, Raleigh, is now planning to build a new church. The old church site in the town of Warrenton has been sold, and a new site, better located for our work, has been purchased for \$700 cash, and deeded to the Trustees of the Diocese. We hope to begin the building of a new church this summer.

At the meeting of the Colored Convocation in Charlotte, last September, Rev. Messrs. Satterwhite and Johnson were advanced to the Priesthood. Each of them returned to his charge—the former at Greensboro, the latter at Durham; and in the warmth of the welcome with which they were received, they at once bargained for the purchase of church property. Today each one is holding, for the Church, a desirable piece of property in his city, with fair prospects of paying for the same. In our struggles for the better, we praise God for the assistance, so freely given us by the Priests and their co-workers in different parts of the Diocese.

The care of two mission stations to each missionary is an unwritten law of the Convocation. Through a friend, \$175 were secured for missionary work, and an effort was made in Henderson last summer, through the assistance of the Rev. Mr. Hughes, by sending a catechist from St. Augustine's School to spend four months, as assistant to the Rev. Mr. Johnson. Mr. Johnson could give but little attention to the work at Henderson last year, so we have resolved to renew the effort this year, with the hope that a mission will be permanently planted there under his care. The new mission at Rocky Mount is especially blessed in having some of the best colored citizens of the State connected with it, and will, with the proper pastoral care, easily become one of our strongest missions. I speak from personal knowledge when I say that the Rector of this parish, his congregation and many of the best citizens of this city, welcome the growth of this work among them.

During the vacation which you gave me, I was given a trip to Cleveland, Ohio, to attend the sessions of the Colored Conference. Taking advantage of this chance, I attended the meetings of the General Convention in the city of Cincinnati, also, and returned to the Diocese just in time to attend the funeral of the late Rev. Primus P. Alston, of Charlotte. While willingly bowing to God's divine behest, we nevertheless feel that our Colored work has lost its most conservative representative. The church and school in Charlotte, since the death of Mr. Alston, have been left under the immediate oversight of his former assistant, Prof. A. Myron Cochran, a candidate for Orders. It is hardly necessary for me to say that, with the assistance given him by the Clergy of Charlotte, especially the Rev. Mr. Smith, also Archdeacon Osborne, at Statesville, he will be able to keep things together until help can be secured. The work of the school depended largely upon the energies of Mr. Alston for its support, and unless relief comes to it speedily, it must suffer loss. In this respect you will pardon me if I again plead earnestly to you in behalf of the entire work of the Convocation. I

plead first for the parochial school. More than half of our missions are without schools through lack of funds to pay the teacher, and I doubt if we can afford it. Give us the children to shape until they have caught the true meaning of the Church's services, and if they should leave us, the stay will not be long.

Again my hope is, that the children trained in the mission schools may be especially helpful to those of the community in which they live. Moving along in the lines marked out for us by our St. Augustine's, may be seen already, in miniature, the effort to place the study of domestic science in our schools at Charlotte, Littleton and Louisburg, and we shall not be satisfied until a similar attempt has been made in every one of them.

Allow me to call your attention to an action of the Board of Missions with regard to appropriations, that becomes effective in September next. It reads that their appropriations for other than schools will not be made in excess of \$2 for every \$1 raised for said work within the Diocese. These tidings give us great concern, for some of our new missions without schools and in debt. Some of our priests are pleading now for an increase of salary sufficient to meet actual necessities. In the light of the Church's vision which has always been so full of optimism, we commend to you, again, the great opportunity that is offered to all of us to share in the work that lies just at our doors.

NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GOOD SAMARITAN
HOSPITAL FOR COLORED PEOPLE, CHARLOTTE,
FOR THE YEAR 1910.

The Hospital has made an advance in every way over the past year, which is very gratifying. But the advance would be greater if more

beds could be placed. The rooms are there for eight more beds, and they are urgently needed, but it costs \$300 to maintain each bed, and the managers dare not assume this additional expense. Other needs are pressing. Screens are needed for doors and windows. An enclosed sun porch for convalescents is a necessity. Rooms for nurses in the attic are wanted. All of these items would cost about \$500. And more than anything else the hospital needs a permanent endowment.

Several branches of the Woman's Auxiliary have sent very helpful boxes of household articles, which are highly appreciated.

On Thanksgiving Day the pupils of the colored schools of Charlotte sent a splendid donation of food, which has greatly helped the winter expenses.

The colored people now pay more of their expenses, but for the 3,621 days of treatment, only \$1,918.65 was received for board, so it is emphatically a charity hospital.

The training school is highly commended by the surgeons and physicians, who speak very favorably of the diligence and improvement of the young women under instruction.

This school should also be enlarged if its support could be assured.

Since writing the above report, St. Agnes' Hospital has been damaged by fire caused by the crossing of the electric light lines in a severe thunderstorm. The building was on fire two or three times, and the patients were all removed first to the nurses' home and the Principal's house, and again to Taylor Hall. Forty-two patients remained in the hall four nights. The nurses and the young men of the school behaved heroically, and it was largely owing to their efforts that no life was lost and no one was seriously hurt. Our grateful thanks are due to them all. Thanks are due also to the Raleigh fire companies, who faced the danger most bravely. The nurses' home was also on fire twice, but the financial loss will not be great, the damage to both buildings being more by water than by fire.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Rt. Rev. Father in God:

As the Secretary was prevented last year from making her report, she has been requested to embody the work of both years in the present one.

The past two years have been marked by a great wave of missionary enthusiasm which has swept over the whole Christian world. As our report shows a steady increase in offerings and membership, we trust that the women of our Branch have caught the enthusiasm.

Your Secretary has spent some time in visiting and addressing the different Branches; in reviving small Branches in mission stations, and in forming new ones. For several weeks at a time she has worked in the mill towns of our Diocese; especially in the new Mission at Spray, which at present shows most encouraging signs of growth. If the missionary in charge can only have the earnest support of our members, we shall have there another proof of what great things our Church can accomplish in the important mill towns.

Another work which touches our hearts is that being done by the Rector of St. Philip's, Durham, among the deaf mutes. We have contributed during the past year towards the support of his lay worker and interpreter; and the good results from her work will justify us in increasing our contribution during the coming year.

We have endeavored to show by our offerings the thankfulness we feel that three members of our Branch are laboring in distant mission fields; in the Philippines, in the Diocese of Shanghai, and in the Diocese of Hankow. With our offering has gone our prayer that others of us may follow their example.

One of the most attractive features of our work for the past two years has been the formation of Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary composed of girls too old for the Junior Department. In most of our

larger parishes there are a number of girls and young married women who feel too old for the Juniors and too young for the regular parish Branch, managed by their mothers and aunts; and who, consequently, belong to neither. The formation of these young Branches is a comparatively new departure, but the result of our experiment has been most encouraging. It will help us, too, to realize the ideal for which we strive—to have the infant, the child, the maiden, the woman all united in one great Missionary Body—a mighty force in the present effort to take the world for Christ.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE CHURCH PROPOSED BY THE GENERAL CONVENTION OF 1910, AND MADE KNOWN TO THE SEVERAL DIOCESES WITH A VIEW TO THEIR ADOPTION BY THE CONVENTION OF 1913.

I. Strike out Section 3 of Article I, and insert in place of it the following:

Section 3. Upon the expiration of the term of office of the Presiding Bishop, the General Convention shall elect the Presiding Bishop of the Church. The House of Bishops shall choose one of the Bishops having jurisdiction within the United States to be such Presiding Bishop, by a vote of a majority of all the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, such choice to be subject to confirmation by the House of Deputies.

His term and tenure of office shall be prescribed by the Canons of the General Convention. His salary as Presiding Bishop shall be fixed and paid by the General Convention.

When, for any reason, a vacancy in the office shall occur, or if by reason of infirmity the Presiding Bishop shall become disabled, the House of Bishops shall elect one of its number to act as Presiding Bishop until the next meeting of the General Convention.

II. Strike out Section 4 of Article I, and insert in place of it the following:

Section 4. The Church in each Diocese which has been admitted to union with the General Convention shall be entitled to representation in the House of Deputies by not more than four Presbyters, canonically resident in the Diocese, and not more than four Laymen, communicants of this Church, having domicile in the Diocese; but the General Convention by Canon may reduce the representation to not fewer than two Deputies in each order. Each Diocese shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen.

The Church in each Missionary District within the boundaries of the United States of America, which shall have been established in accordance with the Constitution and Canons for the government of this Church, shall also be entitled to representation in the House of Deputies by not more than one Presbyter, canonically resident in the Missionary District, and not more than one Layman, communicant of this Church, having domicile in the Missionary District. Each Missionary District shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen. Deputies from such Missionary District, except as otherwise provided in the Constitution, shall be subject to all the qualifications and with all of the rights of Deputies from Dioceses.

To constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, the Clerical order shall be represented by at least one Deputy in each of a majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation, and the Lay order shall

likewise be represented by at least one Deputy in each of a majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation.

On any question the vote of a majority of the Deputies present shall suffice, unless otherwise ordered by this Constitution, or, in cases not specifically provided for by the Constitution, by Canons requiring more than a majority, or unless the Clerical or the Lay representation from any Diocese require that the vote be taken by orders. In all cases of a vote by orders, the two orders shall vote separately, each Diocese having one vote in the Clerical order and one in the Lay order, and each Missionary District within the boundaries of the United States of America having a one-fourth vote in the Clerical order and a one-fourth vote in the Lay order; and the concurrence of the votes of the two orders, by not less than a majority of whole votes in each order of all of the Dioceses and Missionary Districts within the boundaries of the United States of America represented in that order at the time of the vote, shall be necessary to constitute a vote of the House.

III. Strike out Section 6 of Article I, and insert in place of it the following:

Section 6. One Clerical and one Lay Deputy chosen by each Missionary District of the Church established by the House of Bishops, beyond the territory of the United States of America, and one Clerical and one Lay Deputy chosen by the Convocation of the American Churches in Europe, shall have seats in the House of Deputies, subject to all the qualifications and with all the rights of Deputies, except the right to vote when the vote shall be taken by orders.

IV. Amend the new Section 4 of Article II, so that the first sentence shall begin: It shall be lawful for a Diocese, with the consent of the Bishop of that Diocese, the consent of a majority of the Standing Committees of the Dioceses, and the consent of a majority of the Bishops of this Church, exercising jurisdiction in the United States, to elect one or more Suffragan Bishops, etc.—
