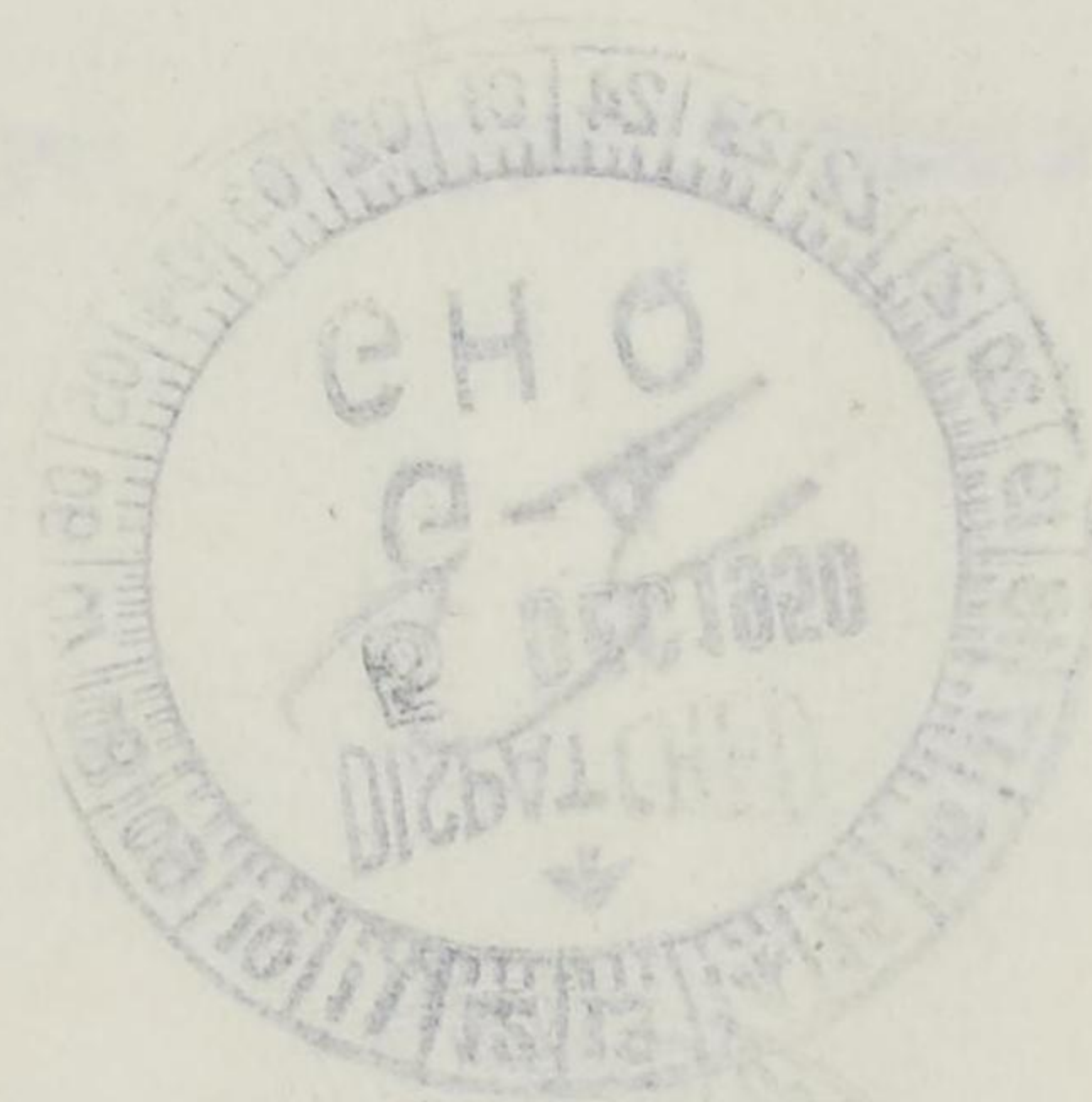

railroad power and cars, particularly box cars. In some cases, such as X Corps and Chinnaapo, this shortage was due to lack of rail connection with the main system. On the main line, some car shortage was due to the inability to discharge quickly at the south side of the river at Pyongyang (this in turn was due to a bad shortage of truck companies there. They had four and needed about eight.)

e. This railroad car shortage, in turn, had effectively congested the ports, particularly Pusan, the piers opposite the working berths being so loaded with cargo that had not yet been cleared, that during my tour of the port with the CG, no vessel was working efficiently. The ferry - Koan Maru - with about 600 tons of "Red Ball" freight in two hatches, had to be placed at a berth where only one could be worked to the landside and the other worked into lighters off side. It took an extra day to turn her around.

4. This report of my visit is a recital of personal observations only. Corrective measures are the subject of separate correspondence.

1. Attached Report, Inclosure 2, mentioned by G-4 in C/N 2 above, is the result of a staff visit, 13 Nov 50 - 24 Nov 50, to principal units in Korea down to and including all U. S. and ROK Divisions.

2. Following comments based on conditions outlined in the report, Inclosure 2, are submitted, reference IG report on cold weather clothing and equipment contained in Inclosure 1:

a. Shortages in boots, underwear, and wool OD trousers had apparently been remedied since IG visit, no shortages of these items were reported during G-4/QM staff visit.

b. Issue of cold weather clothing has been rigidly controlled and issued only when weather conditions dictated. To avert abandonment of these items many commanders have issued instructions that only one type of an item will be issued at a time, for example when shoepacs are issued the combat boot is withdrawn and stored in the individuals "B" bag, only one pair of ski socks are issued at a time, etc.

c. Since the report of deficiencies for ROKA was submitted numerous sizable shipments have been received which definitely present a more favorable position. In connection the KMAG deficiency report on 25 Oct reflected actual shortages of approximately the date of 6 October whereas if current figures had been used the report would not have been unfavorable.

d. Shipments have been made in adequate quantities of tentage, stoves, winter motor oils, anti-freeze, and winterization kits. One item that is in short supply is the Engineer space heater which has not been received from the ZI in adequate quantities. This has necessitated the use of a substitute item, the QM tent heater, as an interim measure.

3. Though not mentioned in Inclosure 1 to C/N 1, the condition of POW camps, insofar as clothing and shelter is concerned was found to be satisfactory at the time of staff visit which was after several large shipments of POW clothing had been delivered.

4. Conclusions: This staff visit disclosed that supplies of clothing for U. S. forces, ROKA and POWs were adequate and that any existing

b. Issue of cold weather clothing has been rigidly controlled and issued only when weather conditions dictated. To avert abandonment of these items many commanders have issued instructions that only one type of an item will be issued at a time, for example when shoes are issued the combat boot is withdrawn and stored in the individual's "B" bag, only one pair of ski socks are issued at a time, etc.

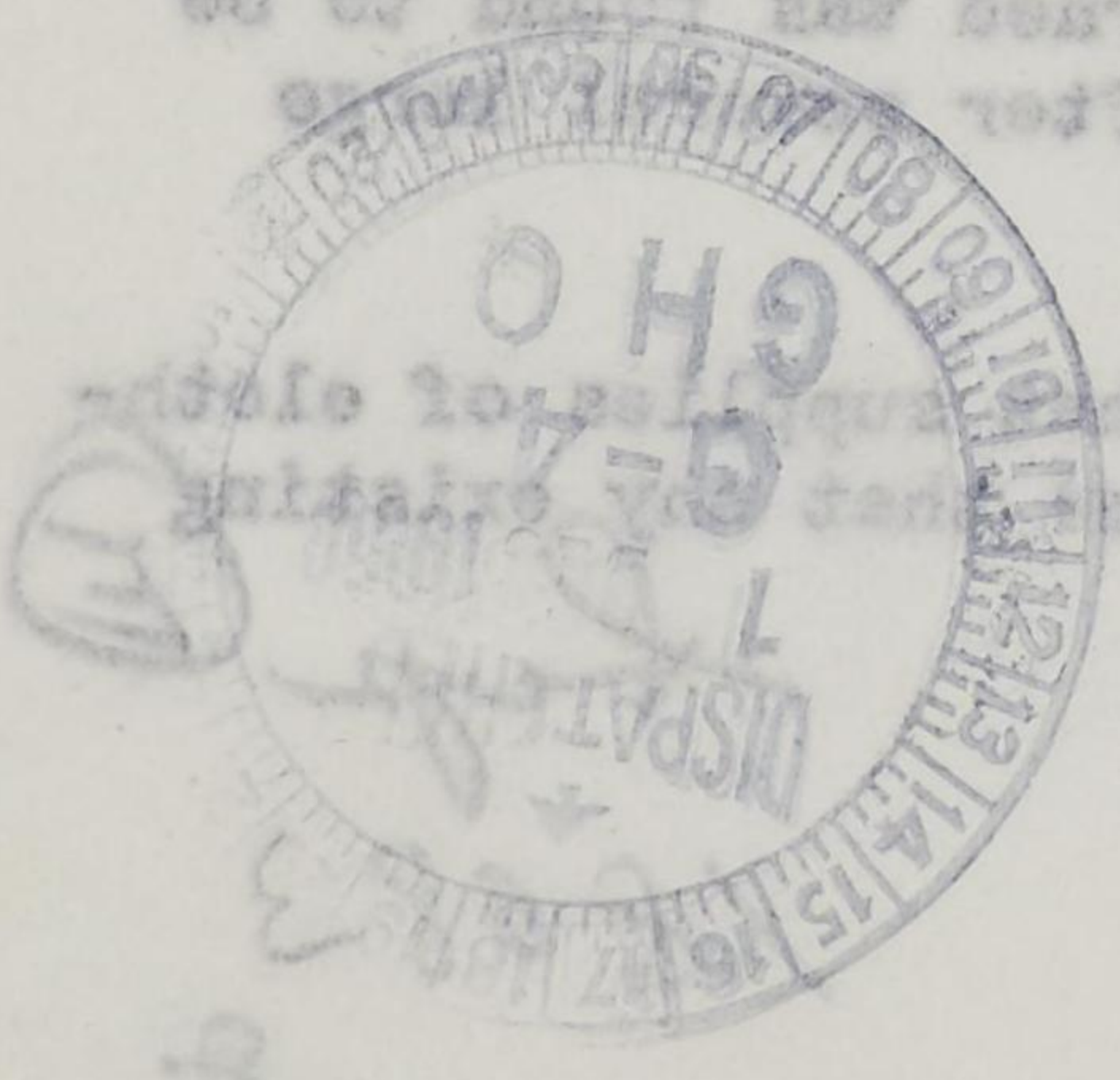
c. Since the report of deficiencies for ROKA was submitted numerous shippable shipments have been received which definitely present a more favorable position. In connection the RMAO deficiency report on 25 Oct reflected actual shortages of approximately the date of 8 October whereas if current figures had been used the report would not have been unfavorable.

d. Shipments have been made in adequate quantities of tents, covers, winter motor oil, anti-freeze, and winterization kits. One item that is in short supply is the engineer space heater which has not been received from the XI in adequate quantities. This has necessitated the use of a substitute item, the GM tent heater, as an interim measure.

3. Though not mentioned in Inclosure 1 to G/N 1, the condition of POW camps, insofar as clothing and shelter is concerned was found to be satisfactory at the time of staff visit which was after shipments of POW clothing had been delivered.

4. Conclusions: This staff visit disclosed that supplies of clothing and shelter for U. S. forces, ROKA and POWs were adequate and that existing

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Report of Staff Visit to Korea on Cold Weather Clothing

On 13 November 1950, the undersigned G-4 G-4 representative (Lt Col E. J. Mohan) together with representatives from QM G-4 (Maj McAlhane), G-4 JLCOM (Maj Haskin) and QM JLCOM (Lt Col Cook) visited Korea on TDY on matters pertaining to distribution of QM clothing and equipment for U. S. forces, ROKA, and POWs in Korea.

The following is a chronological report of the visit - 13 Nov - 25 Nov 1950:

1. Pusan

Persons contacted: CG, G-4 and QM of 2d Log Comd, CO, Pusan POW Camp, Pusan KMAG Advisor, and QMG, ROKA.

a. Clothing for U. S. forces: A detailed list of issues from Pusan to all U. S. units except 3d Inf Div was obtained for the period up to 15 Nov 50 (TAB A). Analysis of this tabulation indicates that generally U. S. units drew all available items in accordance with T/A allowances and availability and in case of controlled items as approved by 8th Army in each case. This tabulation may be reconciled with previous information obtained on stocks shipped from Japan to Pusan.

b. Clothing issued to ROKA: Observation disclosed that there were appreciable stocks of ROKA items in Pusan, that incoming shipments exceeded availability of transportation forward. Majority of the shipments were to Seoul area for further distribution there by KMAG.

c. Clothing for POWs: Observation of the Pusan POW camp revealed that POWs were apparently not suffering from lack of clothing. Shipments from Japan and salvage and reclamation clothing generated in Pusan area were adequate for the present according to the POW Camp Commander. A deficiency of blankets at this POW camp is being corrected by distribution of additional blankets received on the "Cuba Victory" which had a total of 300,000 blankets for POWs. Through lack of information from 8th Army to Pusan, portions of two POW shipments under Requisition Numbers N66 and N67 had been diverted at the Pusan Depot to other channels. This has been corrected and the maximum possible clothing retrieved and placed in proper channels.

2. ASCOM City

Persons contacted: Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4 and QM, 3d Log Comd, and CO, POW Camp.

At this point survey was made of depot stocks and no items were on hand for ROKA. Observation of POW Camp at Incheon revealed no serious shortage of POW clothing and the Camp Commander advised that 6 (six) cars of POW clothing had arrived on 20 November. Here, too, there existed a deficiency in blankets recently off-loaded from the "Cuba Victory" mentioned

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above. Many POWs at this Camp were observed wearing locally made fatigue clothes obtained through the ROK Government. Due to re-warehousing, and rapidity of issues, up-to-date records were not available for the determination of issues to U. S. forces at the 3d Log Comd Depot.

3. Seoul

Persons contacted: G-4 and QM, 8th Army Headquarters, and QM Advisor, KMAC Headquarters.

a. Clothing for U. S. forces: Discussion with G-4 and QM, 8th Army revealed that generally U. S. units were supplied with cold weather clothing and equipment, with the exception of mountain sleeping bags and overcoat parkas. Eighth Army had directed issues of the overcoat field, OD #7 as a substitute item for the parka, on a basis of one to each man, not issued overcoat parka. G-4, 8th Army, further advised there had been some delay in distribution of cold weather clothing to U. S. forces which he attributed to lack of transportation and to necessity of giving priority to shipments of ammo, POL and rations ahead of clothing.

b. Clothing for ROKA: On visit to KMAC, QM Advisor, Seoul, a tabulation was obtained (TAB B) of issues to ROKA through 18 Nov 50 and also stocks on hand as of same date. The KMAC Advisor indicated that supply for ROKA was adequate with the exception of cots, tent stoves, and blankets. This shortage of blankets should be remedied upon distribution of the "Cuba Victory" shipment which contained 106,304 blankets for ROKA and the 96,032 on the "Ponce de Leon" which had arrived at Pusan. The KMAC Advisor also indicated that the current supply problems were aggravated by distribution and transportation bottlenecks. On the basis of informal discussion it was determined that the 18 Nov ROKA Requisition could be substantially reduced in light of apparent adequacy of ROKA clothing and equipment subsequent to receipt of recent large shipments from Japan and the accelerated local manufacturing program.

4. Hankung

Persons contacted: Deputy Chief of Staff, X Corps, G-4 and QM, X Corps and Surgeon Ofo, X Corps.

a. Clothing for U. S. forces: G-4 and QM both stated that the Corps position was good except for mountain sleeping bags and parka overcoats.

b. Clothing issued to ROKA: No stocks of ROKA items were maintained in Corps depots. Recently LST's Nos. 666 and 663 arrived at Hq ROK I Corps at Songjin containing maintenance stocks of winter clothing items.

c. Clothing for POWs: This was no problem at X Corps since POWs when captured generally had adequate clothing and after delousing were sent south to Pusan.

Visit to X Corps Surg Ofc disclosed no reports of deaths or frostbite attributable to lack of winter clothing. The X Corps Surgeon requires reports of deaths through freezing and frostbite cases be submitted by all X Corps units.

5. Wonsan

Persons contacted: CG, C/S, G-4, and QM, 3d Inf Div.

a. Clothing for U. S. forces: QM stated that the only shortage of cold weather items in the 3d Div was the mountain sleeping bag. To offset shortage of mountain sleeping bag, this division was issued 39,000 blankets above authorized allowance. These blankets are in addition to the authorized 2 blankets per man and the authorized wool sleeping bag.

b. Clothing issue to ROKA: 3d Inf Div had one ROKA regiment in its sector which was requisitioning through 3d Inf Div for T/O&E shortages. The principle clothing shortages appear to be combat boots, overcoats and blankets. QM 3d Inf Div was advised of incoming shipments of these items.

c. Clothing issue to POWs: No current problems at 3d Inf Div.

6. Pukchong

Contact with Major Davis and Capt Gebhart of the Div Sup Office at 7th Div Rear, disclosed info that 7th Div clothing supply was adequate in their opinion.

7. Pungsan

Persons contacted: CG, C/S, G-4, and QM, 7th Inf Div.

a. Clothing for U. S. forces: Only 7th Div shortages were mountain sleeping bags and parka overcoats. CG, 7th Div was advised that due to 2I shortage of overcoats, parka, substitution item was being issued by 8th Army, the overcoat field CD #7. CG, 7th Div advised that the cap field pile was not considered appropriate for issue in 7th Div due to the

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difficulty of fitting the helmet over this cap and that the cap field cotton OD with visor (and with ear flaps) was considered adequate for warmth.

b. Clothing issue to ROKA: No current problems at 7th Div.

c. Clothing for POWs: No current problem in 7th Div since POWs were evacuated to the rear as captured.

8. Songjin

Persons contacted: KMAG Advisor to ROK, I Corps, and Assistant Division Commander, 3d ROK Div.

Clothing issue to ROK: KMAG Advisor stated the only serious shortages were for 5 (five) thousand combat boots, 4 (four) thousand overcoats and additional blankets for a total ROK I Corps strength of 26,000. The KMAG Advisor was shown the status of stocks previously obtained from KMAG Advisor, Seoul, and was advised to requisition on Seoul for ROK I Corps shortages. It was noted during visit to nearby ROK Div units that all ROK troops appear to be adequately clothed in either US uniform items or Korean made padded uniforms. KMAG Advisor also mentioned certain shortages of Ord items such as anti-freeze, tire chains and winter oils for 30 Japanese trucks shipped from Japan and 139 civilian type trucks locally acquired by ROK divisions. These latter Ord shortages were passed subsequently to G-4, X Corps for action. KMAG Advisor was informed of the shipments of blankets for ROKA off-loading in Pusan which should correct ROK I Corps blanket shortages.

9. Yonpo

Persons contacted: G-4, Assistant G-4, QM, and CO, Combat Service Group of First Marine Division.

a. Clothing issue to U. S. forces: The first Marine Div appeared to be completely equipped in quantities for initial requirements of cold weather clothing, however, additional quantities will be needed in this division for future maintenance requirements.

b. Clothing issue to ROK for POWs: No current problems in the First Marine Division.

10. Pyongyang

Persons contacted: G-4, 187th RCT; QM, 1st Cav Div; QM, 2d Div; and QM IX Corps.

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In general the status of winter clothing in units in Pyongyang area was good.

a. 2nd Inf Div: Were short 1 pair wool trousers per man of the 2 pair per man allowed. Short also the jacket, field, pile and the cap, field, pile.

b. 1st Cav Div: Short approximately 30% of overcoat, field, OD #7, and approximately 50% of the cap, field pile.

Eighth Army was in process of airlifting 15,000 jackets, field, pile, to 2d Div and also expediting the shipment of overcoats, field, OD #7 and caps, field, pile to make up shortages of these items in both divisions. The 2d Div had a shipment of wool trousers en route from Seoul to complete this issue. 12,000 pair of wool trousers shipped from Pusan to the 2nd Div were never received. Two freight cars of winter clothing arrived in Pyongyang on the 21st of Nov 1950 for the 1st Cav Div; these cars contained wool undershirts; mufflers; drawers, wool; parkas, wet weather; and trousers, field, cotton.

11. Sunchon

Persons contacted: G-4, 2d Div, KMAG Advisor to ROK II Corps; and KMAG, G-4 Advisor to ROK II Corps.

Clothing for ROKA: The supply of winter clothing to ROK units in ROK II Corps area has improved since 1 Nov 50, and only a very few shortages exist, except in the 6th ROKA Div, which lost all of its winter clothing and transportation during the latter part of October. Major shortage in each division was blankets, which should be eliminated with the arrival of 202,336 blankets for ROKA in Pusan on the "Cuba Victory" and "Ponce de Leon".

12. Pukchong-Ni, 8th ROK Div

Persons contacted: KMAG, G-4 Advisor and Asst Dir, G-4.

The major shortages were 6,000 (six thousand) pair combat boots, 6,000 (six thousand) padded uniforms and 3,000 (three thousand) blankets. The clothing for this division has been allocated by KMAG in Seoul and the division had a convoy enroute to Seoul to pick up winter clothing. Seven trucks were expected from Seoul on or about 25 Nov 50. When the supplies which have been sent for in Seoul arrive, these major shortages are expected to be eliminated.

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13. Tokchon, 7th ROK Div

Persons contacted: KMAG advisor to 7th ROK Div, KMAG G-4 advisor and G-4, 7th ROK Div.

This division's position with respect to winter clothing was very good. They had received padded uniforms and overcoats for every man in the division. The major shortage was 4300 pair combat boots and blankets. A convoy was in Seoul picking up the combat boots. Blankets for ROKA had arrived in Pusan and were being shipped north. The division had received 35,000 pair of socks, 21,000 pair of gloves and 11,840 padded caps. Here again the major problem was the long supply line back to Seoul.

14. Keechon, 6th ROK Div

Persons contacted: Chief KMAG Advisor to Div and KMAG G-4 Advisor.

This division was in the worst condition on winter clothing of all the ROK divisions visited. The division was approximately 75% equipped with winter clothing. The reason for this condition was that when the division was surrounded during the last week of October, it lost nearly all of its transportation, which had large amounts of winter clothing. The Div G-4 was in Seoul at the time of visit to secure adequate winter clothing to completely outfit the division. Again, the major problem was the long supply line to Seoul by truck.

15. Between Suncheon and Wonui, 25th Div

Persons contacted: Div QM and Div Supply Officer, 25th Inf Div.

The major shortages in the division at time of visit were 6,000 jacket, field, pile; 7,000 overcoats, field, OD #7; and gloves, shell, leather. Eighth Army was in the process of airlifting jacket, field, pile, and the div QM stated he had railroad cars in Pyongyang which contained winter clothing.

16. Anju, 24th Inf Div

Persons contacted: C/S, G-4, and Ass: G-4, 24th Inf Div.

The division's position on winter clothing was good. 16,368 jackets, field, pile, were received on 20 Nov 50, which were adequate to equip the division. The G-4 advised that their major problem had been combat boots, but during the past two weeks, 10,036 pair had been received.

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Further advised that when the first cold weather began the division had all of its winter clothing except jacket, field, pile, and overcoats. The division started receiving its wool underwear and wool OD's about 29 Sep 50.

17. Pakchon, 1st ROK Div

Persons contacted: KMAC advisor to Div and ROK Div QM.

This div had approximately 95% of its winter clothing. Their major shortage was blankets. When the blankets on the "Cuba Victory" are distributed this shortage should be eliminated.

1. In compliance with LO 305-25 this headquarters a staff visit to United Nations unit commanders in Korea, not United States or Republic of Korea forces, was made between 18 and 27 November. The officer who made this staff visit received verbal instructions to contact these commanders and inform them of CINCFE's personal interest in how they were getting along, and to act in an ambassadorial capacity for this headquarters not restricted necessarily to logistic matters.

2. At Seoul a representative of the 55th QM Base Depot, Pusan, met the CINCFE staff officer and accompanied him as a technical advisor on QM matters. The attached report is presented in narrative form with supporting separate reports for each unit contacted.

3. A report on the 29th British Inf Brigade, the 27th Inf Brigade (UK), the 10th Phil BCT and the 1st Turkish Armed Forces Command, all of which were north of Seoul was made to Gen. Allen, C/S EUSAK, at Pyongyang. Problems encountered were reported to appropriate EUSAK staff officers by personal visit or telephone calls as staff visits progressed.

4. Problems of varying importance were found, all of which were possible of local solution through EUSAK. Typical are components of rations, such as rice for the Filipinos and Thailanders and bread for the Turkish force. A complaint was made by Col Azurin of the 10th Phil BCT that his unit was being broken up and used piecemeal, that great need for supplies of winter clothing existed. These matters are covered in detail in the unit report and were found to be directly related to lack of proper command leadership for which corrective action has been taken, not a result of this staff visit.

5. Conclusions: a. Relations between UN Commanders and EUSAK are excellent. In nearly every unit some operational or logistic problem was encountered. Action to effect a solution to these problems was given considerable impetus since a more complete understanding of problems was developed as a result of the visit of the CINCFE and 55th QM Base Depot representatives.

b. Liaison and advisory personnel from U.S. forces with UN commanders were functioning well. One central source or individual at

c. The Filipinos and Thailanders will require close liaison and supervision for winter and cold weather field operations and supply.

d. Conditions of supply to and in the units is far from ideal but is being bettered within the limits of transportation capabilities.

e. As a result of travel by light aircraft and contact with operational personnel insufficient supplies of 80 AVgas were found to be available to forward elements. A critical situation existed at I Corps strip Sinan-ju 22 Nov 50.

6. Recommendations: a. That experienced Quartermaster Officers, especially qualified for liaison missions, be maintained with the Filipinos and the Thailanders and insofar as possible with all UN combat units, these to be in addition to other liaison officers furnished.

b. That cold weather practical training be continued to maximum extent with all units.

~~c. That additional truck transportation be made available to move winter clothing and supplies beyond the capabilities of organic transportation.~~

d. That a copy of the report be furnished to CG EUSAK for information.

7. G-4 concurs in the above conclusions and recommendations.

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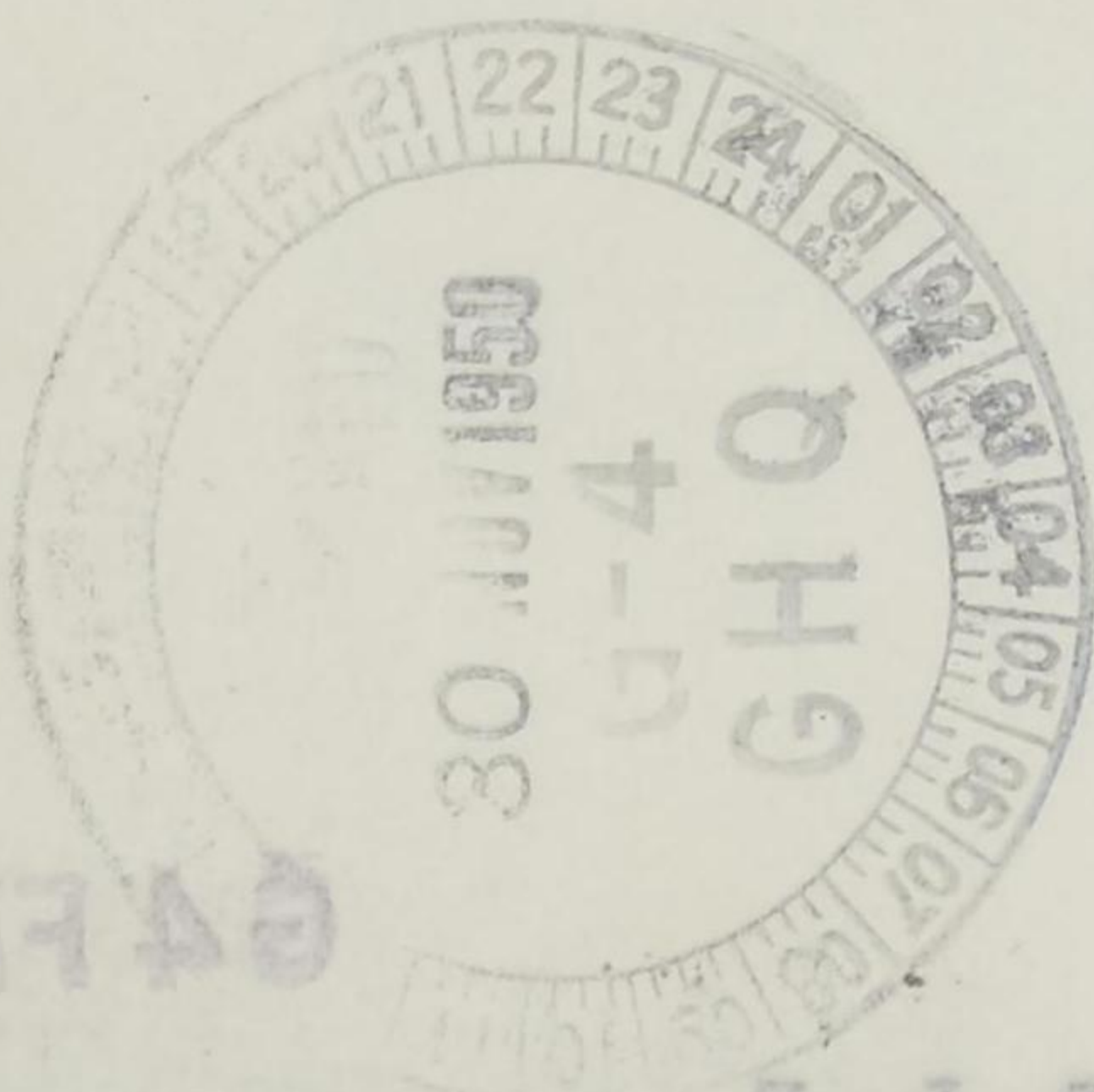

At about 2000 reported to General Allen C/S EUSAK and informed him the results of contacts with UN Commanders, 29th Bde, 27th Bde, 10th Phil BCT and 1st Turkish Armed Force. Gen. Allen received a report in substance as detailed in individual reports except as to exact number and itemization on winter clothing. Gen. Allen advised that he did not think Gen. Walker would desire a further report in person and plans were made to depart K-23 (Pyongyang) at 2200 hours for K-14 (Kimp'o). Arrived Kimp'o at 2330 hours via freighter aircraft. Spent the night at Kimp'o and departed 0800 hours for Pusan, arriving at Pusan proper 1100. Upon arrival at billet advised Col Hamlett G-4 Supply GHQ of my location and that no complaints were made, except for 10th Phil BCT which unit is treated in detail in the unit report. Units visited had some problems requiring solution, but not in the nature of complaints, except with respect to 10th BCT.

1500 Departed K-9 Pusan for Ashiya and returned to GHQ via mail plane arriving Tachikawa 1005 - 27 Nov.

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FINDINGS:

1. In brief I found that UN commanders had no complaint except that with respect to the 10th Philippine BCT concern existed that it was planned to split the unit up and attach it piecemeal to other organizations. As indicated in the notes on this unit I informed that integrity of units was policy - based on exception for military necessity or emergency and for training purposes. Also pointed out that the peculiar supply requirements of UN units was recognized and was further reason of practical nature to support that policy.

2. Rail transportation forward from Seoul to Pyongyang and Sinan-ju is very limited. Gen Allen, C/S EUSAK, stated requirement was 1600 tons daily to maintain units. Capabilities by air are 1000 tons a day plus 200 by truck or a shortage daily of 400 tons.

(As an operational matter it may be observed that no permanent Trans Liaison Officer is with G-4 EUSAK FWD although there is a Trans O in Pyongyang; such a liaison officer with G-4 appears most desirable.)

The evening of 22 Nov G-4 EUSAK reported 189 cars in vicinity of Seoul which could not be moved forward due to transport inadequacy. Almost no facilities exist along the line north of Seoul for spotting trains and cars for unloading, it was reported.

3. At I Corps Liaison Field Sinan-ju operation of light aircraft was closing down, but not yet completely closed due to non receipt of 80 octane Avgas (adequate stocks were reported available in Pusan 25 November by personnel at QM Depot Pusan).

(NOTE: In general QM Depot here very unhappy about receipts of POL products which in some instances have arrived so late as to require consumption of all drum reserves leading to a very dangerous POL situation.)

CONCLUSIONS:

1. a. The Thailanders and the Filipinos will require close liaison and supervision for winter and cold weather field operations and supply.

b. Both of above units should have especially strong Advisory and Liaison personnel to perform the supply and liaison missions.

2. Other units are standing squarely on their own feet and will get along. They have problems -- all units -- but only complaint was from 10th Phil BCT where a leadership problem existed. A change of command which has been made should be helpful. Local impressions of EUSAK personnel are that Phil enlisted men are ready to go with nominally good leadership.

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3. Impetus of supply from Pusan north is good but limitations of LOC have not permitted delivery of necessary supplies. At present (26 Nov) an embargo on rail shipments north of Taegu is in effect due to fact that cars are stacked up in vicinity of Seoul and cannot move forward. Capacity*of Ascom City is 17 cars per day, total for unloading. EUSAK is fully aware of all these problems and making progress by opening of Chinnampo and use of airlift.

4. A Transportation Liaison Officer w/EUSAK G-4 Advance is needed.

5. The additional equipment and winter clothing furnished units will require additional field transportation to maintain units in a mobile status. G-4 Adv. EUSAK estimates one truck per company - for a total of 400 trucks. In consideration of the bulk involved this request seems reasonable.

Capt Sinclair LO 29th British Infantry Bde to EUSAK arranged for meeting with Brig Brodie at Brig Hqtrs - Suwon. Departed EUSAK 1630 by G-4 jeep for Suwon. Arrived 1830, met Lt Col Trevor. Had a cup of tea with him. Met Brig Brodie 1700 and had dinner with Brig and officers.

This unit is inherently logistically self sufficient. Pending arrival of all ships and supplies drawing some Class I and III from US sources. Signal gear not yet received due to non arrival of ship carrying same. This problem troublesome and requires use of expedients to establish minimum command and administrative nets. ETA of vessel with signal gear uncertain.

Tanks of unit arriving Pusan and plan is to move via rail to Pyongyang if bridge at Pyongyang is found capable of carrying tanks. If not unload and ferry is one possibility. Brig Brodie would like to use ISTs from Pusan to Chinnampo - but LSTs may not be available (says Brig Brodie). Not known if this problem has been presented to EUSAK.

Above is substance of Brig Brodie's comments except for detail and he expressed himself as getting along fine --- except of course anxious to get all ships in so force can be assembled with its equipment.

Comment: 1. Other than certain operational and supply equipment, not yet at hand but which is en route, situation, esp. logistically, is ok. In brief, no complaints or requests which are not possible of solution locally. No complaints.

2. Men are 70% reservists called up shortly (month) before sailing, 6 weeks enroute.

Brig Brodie very cordial, impresses as top notch officer.

At BUSAK Advance Pyongyang 0930 21 Nov met Lieut Gen Walton H. Walker and informed him of mission. General informed me he had requested relief of Col Azurin but did not advise that Col Azurin had been relieved. Gen. Walker outlined reasons therefor. I informed Gen. Walker that evening of 20 Nov I had talked to Col Azurin by phone and arranged to meet Col Azurin at Sariwon. Col Azurin sending jeep to Hwang-ju 12 mi north of Sariwon to meet liaison plane and take us (Lt Col Gorman, 55 QM Base Depot, Pusan, and self) to 10th BCT Hq.

At 1030 reported in at 187 BCT Hqtrs to meet Gen. Bowen and inform him of contemplated trip and purpose. Gen Bowen not present so talked to Lt Col Gehart his representative.

At 1400 21 Nov met Col Azurin, CO 10th Philippine BCT, Lt Col G. L. Hanikan, Exec O, 10th Philippine BCT, and Senator Peralta (former Brig Gen Phil Armed Forces) at the Bn Hqtrs Sariwon.

With Lt Col Gorman presented myself and stated my mission. Col Azurin and Lt Col Hanikan discussed warm clothing needs. Lt Col Gorman advised that requests should be made for items not previously requested and gave detailed answers to all problems presented. Aside from clothing needs the problem of following was presented:

- a. Need for litter jeeps and 2 ambulances.
- b. 6 - 30 cal pedestal mounts for 30 cal MGs to be mounted in 6 of 27 jeeps being received.
- c. Prestone - Require 320 gal and rec'd but 25.
- d. SAE #10 oil - all can get is #20.
- e. Rice ration increase from .06 to 1.2 lbs (advised to put request in letter).
- f. PX rations not received since last of Oct (advised to put in letter).
- g. One (1) water purification unit for the Bn - None in the Bn.

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- h. Clothing needs advised to requisition: Handkerchieves, pile jacket, gloves (trigger finger), gloves wool inserts (trigger finger).

Parka overcoat, ski socks, undershirts are now on requisition.

(Note conclusions please as answers to questions contained in above)

The only question of significance raised as I observed and listened came from Senator Feralta and was seconded by Col Azarin, in substance:

"We are most concerned that this unit will be variously attached and not operate as a unit."

To this I replied. CINCPAC is well aware of the problem of all UN unit integrity, and except for training and military emergency integrity of units will not be disturbed. That if any such attachment had occurred it was of temporary nature only. I further said that the problem of special supply requirements dictated the integrity of units and that I considered there was nothing to be concerned about on the use of the unit except as a unit - unless emergency of military nature dictated a temporary attachment.

Both Col Azarin and Senator Feralta indicated understanding and satisfaction with the reply.

CONCLUSIONS:

1. The unit at company level needs training in how to care for the individual in cold weather.
2. Every evidence leads to lack of leadership at highest command level in the BCT.
3. Action has not been taken to make hqtrs livable and reasonably comfortable - maybe lack of "know how" as well as weakness in command.
4. A QM advisor would be good insurance to have with the unit to advise and follow up on actions necessary to effect receipt of appropriate QM supplies and their use. A close contact must be maintained with this unit to advise and support it. Advantage has not been taken of the information and advice furnished to Commander by the Phil Army Liaison Officer - an S A Officer of Philippine origin.
5. The above information on supply and observations was furnished to QM (Col Lamont) 8th A and to G-4 EUSAK Adv (Lt Col Siebert). Gen Allen C/S was advised of contents of these notes by myself and Lt Col Gorsan.

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6. I said to Col Azurin in presence of Senator Feralta that CINCPAC was aware of the high tradition of the PAF as evidenced in World War II and expected great things of the 10th Philippine BCT.

a. Bread is not available and is a principal part of diet - wants 2 lbs per man per day. Because of lack of being accustomed to US Army ration and lack of bread - men sometimes go hungry.

(This matter reported to G-4 EUSAK at EUSAK Advance and also reported to QM channels by Col Gorman of 55 QM Base Depot, Pusan).

Ingredients for bread received but so far no means to bake.

- b. Wish copy of complete menu.
- c. No fresh meat and vegetables.
- d. No PX ration.
- e. Wants 5100 pile caps.
- f. Size 9-10-11 combat boots -- 2000 short.
- g. 600 shelter tent pieces and poles.
- h. 300 wool sleeping bag.
- i. 2000 overshoes.

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1st TURKISH ARMED FORCE COMMAND

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j. No parkas or pile jackets wanted.

k. 30 CP Tents desired.

All of above reported to Lt Col Siebert EUSAK Advance and to QM channels by Lt Col Gorman.

COMMENT:

A QM liaison off should be assigned to represent and follow up on needs of this unit.

Why? Because it is a tradition in the Turkish Army to take what is supplied and not ask where any shortage may be.

Lt Col Gorman went into detail on how to requisition - for replacements weekly - for cleaning and preserving every 15 days - to check receipts against requisitions etc. Lt Col Weaver was present (Liaison O to Turkish) and made notes.

Impression: The Turkish want some bread and they want to fight.

At about noon - 27 Nov I called Col Stebbins office (G-4 EUSAK) and talked to Col Tracy who said he would advise Gen Walker of the request. I requested any further contact on the matter be made thru Col McKee, UNTC Comdr at Taegu 201. I advised Col McKee's hqtrs of action taken.

3. The French Commander was advised to make all requirements known locally (i.e., to Training Center comdr). A representative of EUSAK has visited this unit on supply matters.

COMMENT: On 25 November the unit advance detachment to be oriented by UN Training Center and training program explained.

REPLACEMENTS

The Eighth Army is operating with serious deficiencies in the reinforcement system and lacking adequate organizational support in service type troops.

Infantry battalions were reported to be operating at strength of 54% to 75%. Examination of the Daily Casualty Summary of the I Corps (29 October) showed a shortage of more than 8000 in two divisions (1st Cavalry and 24th Infantry) listed.

All types of service units were reported to be inadequate for the support of the Army. Personal observation gave evidence of shortage in QM truck companies, ordnance, signal, graves registration and military police.
