He noted that the union of Kanto Haiden Power Station, Sakuregicho, has an office within the confines of the substation. Access to the premises affords them an excellent opportunity to commit acts of sabotage, if they were so inclined. He has no reason to believe that sabotage is contemplated, only that the present situation leaves the facilities vulnerable to such action. Communist infiltration at this plant is in evidence but not notably so. From his standpoint, refusal to allow persons admittance, except on official business, is the desirable solution, but he emphasized that he does not want to take any action which is contrary to existing policy. (He was informed that the practice of furnishing unions with offices is common and permissible under provisions of the Trade Union Law. (I promised to check with Labor Branch, CAS, and call him back.

Mr Doherty was consulted:

He advised that available facts do not warrant any action of the nature suggested by Col Dueszenberry. However, if anyone should lodge an official complaint, perhaps something might be done.

1. The Yokohama Proctor
marshal is in the process of
providing security for vital places
such as pumping stations,
electric generating plants and
sub stations.

2. To that end, ¹³⁴⁷ civilian guards
are in the course of being
hired and an identification
Card ^{and Pass} system set up for Japanese
employees who man the
above mentioned installations.

3. The electrical company
has already reported that certain
employees of these installations
are known members of the CP
and this information is substantiated

by the ^{Yokohama} CIC.

4. The YPM seeks a ruling from us to this effect: must the YPM issue identification and pass cards to these known CP members who are in a strategic position to bring about enormous sabotage to important places in Yokohama such as the Port and adjoining facilities.

5. The legal office of your headquarters strongly advises:

(a) That the CIC designate by proper evidence those electrical workers in key places who are known members of the CP.

(b) That where the worker is found to be a known CP member he be transferred to a work site where sabotage would be unlikely or would have little, if any, harmful effect.
