LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—Hon. S. L. Tilley, Charles Watters, James Steadman, G. L. Hatheway, and John McMillan.

Isaae Woodward, Esquire, Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New Brunswick, and also of those belonging to Nova Scotia which are partly supported by this Province.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin.—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House. This Light bears from the Light house on Brier Island, N.N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W. $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W. S. W. 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W and by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N. 13 miles.

Note.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the BuN. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. $18\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable, Seal Islands S. and by W. $\frac{3}{4}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed white lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American) Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge. (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.

- " Gannet Rock Light E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 13 miles.
- " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E
- " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Light House, (American.) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

It is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should be well compared and adjusted (particularly in new ships), before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, or ($\frac{1}{3}$) points) It will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay (South Channel) between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello; and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed white light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white light and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed white light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving white light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can

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be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain white light. The house is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43° 39', N. long, 66° 8'. W. It exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

Grindstone Island Light.—An Octagonal Tower, sixty feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island in Chignecto Bay, in Lat. 45° 43' 13" N. Long 64° 37' 25" W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's house, one story situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House, as follows:

Cape Enrage Light by compass S. 61° W. 10 1-7 miles.

Highest point of St. Mary's Ledge by compass N. 40° W., 6-10 mile.

The point of low water off the light house by compass, S. 78° W., 2-0 mile. Jones' Ledge, N. 10° W., 3-10 mile, it dries at low springs and has about 2 1-2 fathoms on it at half tide.

A Sand Bank S. 15° W., 6-10 mile, it has 1 1/2 fathoms on its shoalest part at lower water springs.

Grand Manan.—There is a Light House and Keeper's House at the "Swallow Tail" on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 103 feet above high water making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Brier Island and Grand Manan. Both Houses are painted White.

 A white ditto, [without a ball.] for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John—passed 3d August, 1848.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point Lepreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.

Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan—or North Channel as aforesaid—to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, or Brier Island bearing South South East, Eight Shillings and Nine-pence per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Ten Shillings per foot.

HARBOUR MASTER'S FEES.

On Vessels of 30 Tons and under 50, 2s. 6d.; Vessels of 50 Tons and under 75, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150 and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200 and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300 and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; Decked Vessels, under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British Vessels under that tonnage trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from Ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any Port in Nova Scotia, to pay annually as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s. 9d.; over 30 and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50 and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75 and under 80 tons, 10s.

RATES OF WHARFAGE, established by Act 5 Vict. cap. 49, in the City of Saint John and Parish of Portland.—For every decked vessel, or wood boat, of the burthen of 40 tons and under 1s. 6d. per day; above 40 tons, and under 50, 1s. 9d.; above 50, and under 60, 2s.; above 60, and under 70, 2s. 3d.; above 70, and under 80, 2s 6d.; above 80, and under 90, 2s 9d.; above 90, and under 100, 3s.; above 100, and under 120, 3s 6d.; above 120, and under 150, 4s.; above 150, and under 180, 4s 6d.; above 180, and under 200, 5s.; above 200, and under 220, 5s 6d.; above 220, and under 240, 6s.; above 240, and under 260, 6s 6d.; above 260 and under 280, 7s.; above 280, and under 300, 7s 6d.; above 300, and under 320, 8s.; above 320, and under 340, 8s 6d.; above 340, and under 360, 9s.; above 360, and under 380, 9s 6d.; above 380, and under 400, 10s.; above 400, and under 450, 11s 3d.; above 450, and under 500, 12s 6d.; and 1s 3d for every additional 50 tons.

RATES OF SLIPPAGE AT THE CORPORATION SLIPS.

All Decked Vessels, same rates as for Wharfage; Wood Boats, and other Boats, or undocked Vessels, having standing Masts, and all Scows, and not lying at the wharves on either side of Slips, to pay the following rates:

Every Woodboat of sufficient burthen to carry 10 Cords of Wood, or under, 1s. 6d.
ditto ditto upwards of 10 Cords, and not more than 15, 2s. 6d.
ditto ditto upwards of 15 Cords, and not more than 20, 3s. 9d.
ditto ditto upwards of 20 Cords, 5s.

The above to be paid each trip, and if any such Vessel remains over six days, an additional duty to be paid of from 2s. 6d. to 5s. daily, according to the burthen. Other Boats and Vessels without decks, and having fixed or standing masts, and all Scows, to pay 1s. 6d. each trip and 1s. 6d. additional per day, if suffered to remain over three days.

RATES OF FERRIAGE ACROSS THE HARBOUR OF ST. JOHN—Foot passenger, 2d.; Child under twelve years, 1d.; Horse, 3d.; Ox, or other large animal, 3d.; Elephant or Camel, 1s. 3d.; sun-

Waggon, not loaded, 2d.; single waggon, with horse and one man, 6d.; single waggon, with horse, load and man, 7d.; double waggon, not loaded, 7d.; double waggon, with horses and man, 9d.; double waggon, with horses, load and man, 1s. 3d.; barrel, 1d.; bag, containing two bushels, 1d.; firkin, keg, or box of the same size, 1d.; cask of lime, 2d.; pipe, hogshead, or puncheon, whether in waggon, cart, sled; or other vehicle or not, except containing molasses, vinegar rice, or sugar 9d.; every cwt. of iron, steel, or copper, whether in waggon, cart, or other vehicle or not, 1d.—Carts, sleds, drays, and carriages, same as waggons.

RATE OF TOLLS FOR CROSSING THE SAINT JOHN SUSPENSION BRIDGE.—For every foot passenger, (excepting children under five years of age,) 2d.; horse, mare, gelding, mule, ass, ox, cow, or other large animal, 4d. each; elephant or camel, 2 6d.; carriage, sleigh, waggon, cart, sled or other vehicle, drawn by one horse or beast of draught with one person, with or without a load, 7 1-2d.; horse or beast of draught, more than one, with a carriage or other vehicle, 4d. each; sheep, calf, hog, or goat, 1-2.

BATES AT THE PUBLIC WEIGHING MACHINES—Every load not exceeding One Thousand Pounds Weight, One Shilling; and One Penny for every additional Hundred Weight; payable, half by the seller, and half by the purchaser.

HACKNEY COACH FARES—For conveying one passenger from any public stand to any part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, ls.; and for every passenger exceeding one, 6d. additional; and if any driver of any Carriage or other vehicle, shall be detained at any place by any passenger, or shall make any agreement for carrying any passengers by the hour, he shall be entitled to ask, and receive the following rates, viz:—For any time not exceeding half an hour, 1s. 3d.; and in that proportion for every half hour that such Carriage, or other vehicle shall be detained or employed. Provided always, that in case any driver shall be required to cross the Ferry to Carleton, he shall, in addition to the foregoing fares, be entitled to demand and receive the ferriage for himself, his carriage and horses, both going and returning.

PUBLIC PORTERS AND HAND CART MEN—For loading carrying, and housing any goods, or any other article on any Hand Cart, from the Market Slip in King's and Queen's Wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several Five districts, the rates of prices are as follow:—For the first district 3d.; second district 3½d.; third district 4d.; fourth district 4½d.; fifth district 5d.

MARKET TOLLS.—Beef, per quarter, 2d.; Calf, Sheep, Hog, Goat, Lamb, Kid, or Shoot 2d.; Tub, Pail or Jar of Butter, 1½d.; Firkin, 3d.; every 10 lbs of Roll Butter, 1d.; Cheese, 1d.; load of Potatoes under 15 bushels, 3d.; ditto over 15 bushels, 6d.; load of Oysters in shell or tub, 6d.; Turkey, Goose, or dozen of Pidgeons, 1d.; pair of Ducks Fowls or Partridges, 1d.; bag of Flour, Meal, Oats, Peas, or Beans, 1d.; Ham or Shoulder, 1d.; Eggs, per 10 dozen, ½d.; and all other articles in like proportion.

FISH MARKET DUES.—For every Salmon, 1½d.; Codfish, Pollock, Bass, or Shad, each 1d.; Halibut, not exceeding 20 lbs. 1d.; exceeding 20 lbs., and for every 20 lbs.. 1d.; every Lobster, 1d.; dozen of Haddock, 1½d.; every 100 of Gasperaux, Alewives, Herrings, or other small fish, 1d.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS—(near Saint John.)—The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood; and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of the sea.

AGRICULTURAL.

How to RAISE EARLY POTATOES.—About six weeks previous to the usual time of planting in the open ground, mark out a piece, say five or six feet wide, and as long as required, on a dry and sheltered piece of land; dig out the surface to a depth of five or six inches; place boards around, to keep up the loam or sand; then fill to the depth of six inches, with horse or some manure which has been thrown over to produce heat; tread it down lightly, as for a hot-bed, and cover the manure with four inches of loam. I keep some in my barn cellar through the winter, to be ready at any time. It is also well to keep the ground covered through the winter, where the bed is to be made, with straw or something to keep out the frost. Then pack your potatoes as close as you can, over the surface, a single thickness; cover with four inches of loam, or what is better, sand, as the sprouts are tougher and do not separate so easily from the potato in lifting. I cut my potatoes a day or even weeks before, and place them cut side down. At night cover with straw or coarse hay; in the morning, if mild, and no rain, rake off the covering and replace at night. In case of continued dry weather a slight watering may be of service, though seldom necessary. When the time for planting arrives, land manured and furrowed, take up the front board, and with a dung-fork lift as many as it will hold; give them a shake, and separate each plant carefully by hand, placing them in a basket or box; then drop them, either for hills or in rows, and have a person follow to cover as fast as possible, placing an inch or two of earth over the tops, through which they will break in a few hours.

If planting has been delayed from any cause, and the plants should have attained considerable growth, (I have planted them when a foot high and had them do well,) lay them down and cover as above. If your field is not too far from your dwelling, make the bed there, as it saves exposure in carrying the plants to a distance. With a few boards and stakes a shelter can be made to keep off the cold winds.

By sprouting potatoes in this way you can have them ready to dig at least three weeks earlier.

ECONOMY OF FODDER—“MANAGING IT RIGHT.”—What strange ideas of economy are often entertained, and by farmers as frequently as by other people. The true economy of wintering stock, for instance—wintering in the best order and at the least expense of fodder—needs a good deal more thought than it gets from a large class of those closely interested in the subject. Let us try an illustration:

“Do you want to buy any young stock? I believe I must sell off some. I’m afraid I shall be short of fodder before spring,” says one farmer to another.

“Hardly think I do; though I have a good supply of hay, etc. If I have much over, I can sell at good prices in the spring. Have as much stock now as my pastures will carry—don’t care about increasing the number.”

"Do you keep your sheep shut up this warm weather? I have had mine out three or four weeks most of the time."

"I hardly think it pays; sheep always look lank after running out to grass in winter."

"But it saves a good deal of fodder. If we have an open winter, I don't know but I'll still get along—I've got two good straw stacks, besides a fair supply of hay and corn-stalks."

"I should think you might if you *managed it right*," was the answer; and we will give some thoughts on the subject, as there are many who are selling stock very low—economizing fodder very wastefully—who need do neither if they only "managed it right."

A great deal of fodder is wasted for want of proper places for feeding it out. Mangers and stalls for neat stock are provided by every one who studies the true economy of feeding. *Manger's* are needed that the stock may not get under their feet that which we put before them for eating, and *stalls*, that each animal may eat its food without fear of disturbance from, or power to disturb, others feeding around it. Cattle will not, unless starved to it, eat the fodder which they have trodden into the mud or manure; nor can they thrive very economically, when they are in constant fear, as they snatch each mouthful, of being gored by some stronger animal. *Feeding-boxes* answer an excellent purpose, and are best suited to those who winter their stock in yards surrounded by open sheds. Our best farmers, however, provide both these conveniences, and think the saving of fodder pays well for doing so.

The same facts hold good in regard to sheep. They must have racks and mangers under shelter, and where they will not be disturbed unnecessarily at any time. Sheep will not eat fodder which has been wet by rain or melting snow, nor that which they have trodden upon on unfrozen ground. Proper attention in this respect will secure a large saving of fodder—we believe that five sheep can be better wintered in this way on a given amount of fodder, than four without these conveniences.

Another large amount of fodder is wasted for want of other means of keeping up the animal heat in severe winter weather. It has been demonstrated again and again, that exposure to cold and storm taxes severely the flesh and vital forces of the animal economy. Food, which if consumed in a comfortably warm stable would fatten an animal, may be fed to the same while unsheltered without causing any increase in flesh, or even preventing loss of the same. No farmer who studies economy of fodder, would attempt to winter stock without ample shelter for every member of his herd—without plenty of straw or other litter to furnish good bedding for the same.

Let us look, in passing, at the best use of straw in wintering stock. We hold it of high value—but not nearly so much for feeding as for litter. We have seen cattle kept upon their feet a large share of the time, because they could find no place fit to lie down upon, and when finally *tired* down, they were covered with mud and manure for want of bedding. Such cattle, we need not

say, were not in thriving order. Straw would come into economical use in such a case—would go farther towards sustaining thrift than if fed ever so profusely. It is a fact which farmers ought to know and remember, that there is very little nutritive value to straw—that its greatest use as consumed by stock, is for filling the stomach, allaying hunger in some measure, yet, without other food, giving little sustenance to an animal. But used for littering stables and yards, it is a real comfort to stock, and thus keeps them more quiet and lessens the demand for food in any form. It is also of value as an absorbent of liquid manure, and for this purpose alone may be economically employed. We would venture to decide upon the crops of a farm, by a glance at the condition of the barn-yard and its tenants at this season—it is the time above all others, for liberal expenditure to secure economy, and to sustain without loss or waste the resources of the farmer.

All the fodder saved by allowing cattle and sheep the range of our meadows and pastures whenever the ground is bare in winter, costs more in waste of strength, flesh, milk, wool and manure, than double the hay would cost in market. And yet many close calculating farmers will not believe this. We have good authority for our assertion, nevertheless, and practical experience in wintering stock, shows us that no provocation of mild weather or bare ground, should tempt us to allow our yards to be open for the egress of stock. That farmer, we would remark in conclusion, though the subject is far from being exhausted, can best study economy of fodder, who has the barn and yards, the stables, stalls and mangers, which will enable him to feed his stock without waste, and with every attention of regularity, cleanliness, water, and comfortable shelter and bedding which "right management" demands.

FLOWERING OF POTATOES.—Mr. MANBY of England, in his prize essay on the cultivation of Early Potatoes, says that "a flower to an early potatoe is considered a sign of deterioration—the first symptom of *growing out*—it being contended that all the strength of the plant should be thrown into perfecting the tuber and not into the opposite extreme." He would therefore eradicate them as soon as they appear, and save seed from plants which have shewn no indication of flowering. Experiments have shewn that potato plants beginning to shew a tendency to flower, perfect their tubers less early and perfectly than before that tendency was developed.

AN EXPERIMENT IN DRAINING.—When we witness the change of a sterile soil into a fertile one through the influence of draining, it is conclusive evidence of the value of labor so applied. Such has recently come under our notice, and we shall recall it for our readers.

It not unfrequently happens in hilly or gently undulating districts, that intervals and damp springy soils abound, requiring draining before it can be brought into profitable cultivation. The instance in question, was a field of fair surface, quite free from

stone, but receiving from more elevated land a continual supply of clear, cold, soft spring water, which ran over nearly the whole surface. The owner, faithless of reclaiming the lot, was yet desirous of collecting the water to supply a reservoir for cattle. This was mainly accomplished by cutting a drain across the slope of land near the upper side of the field, for about a hundred rods in length, which did so much for draining the surface that other ditches were cut completing the work. The drains were finished with the flat stone usual in such districts, carefully laid and covered with a good coat of straw, before replacing the dirt. Now of the change produced.

A crop never grew upon this lot from the time it was cleared until after it was drained. Water grasses and weeds were the only product; but since draining, it has produced annually over two tons of good hay per acre, without any manure. The appearance of the soil is wholly changed, from a tenacious blue clay, adhering to one's boots like tar—it has become a clear, black, clay loam—just such a soil as always produces remunerative crops to the farmer.

DRAINING WITH BOARDS.—Our way of underdraining with boards, is to have the boards sawed an inch thick—one five inches wide at one end, and six inches wide at the other. The other board that we nail to that, (hog-trough fashion,) is one inch narrower, so as to make the troughs lap over each other as we lay them in the drains. We generally lap them about six inches. Some farmers say put them down two feet, some more; but our plan is, more or less to suit the situation; in some situations two feet would be plenty; others, six feet little enough. The object is to go down until you come to the spring. The meadow where we have been draining, is black mud about two or three feet deep; then comes gravel. I had an experienced drainer putting in a few drains where was a miry place of a few rods square that could not be ploughed; I paid no attention to him, having so many other things to attend to, and considering that he knew more about the business than I did; but he did no good; horses would mire through the sward. I went down after the ploughman had given the job up, and with a boy, in four hours we put in an underdrain that dried the piece, so that I had better corn there than any where else in the whole field. We went through the mud with our drain, and as soon as we struck on the gravel the water boiled up as from a fountain, and in such a situation sap pine boards will never rot; all you have to do to preserve them is to keep them always wet.

TEMPERATURE OF CREAM FOR CHURNING.—As to the temperature at which the churning should be done, in the statements which I have read, some have thought the finger and others the thermometer, was the best way to test the proper warmth of cream for churning. To say that the temperature should be between fifty-five and sixty, as some have said, or between sixty and sixty-five degrees, as others have said, is very indefinite. I think there is a degree exactly right, at which butter will separate from

the milk and gather quickly, without being too soft, and that I have fixed in my own mind, by my own experience, at sixty-five degrees. In the summer season, when the atmosphere is warmer than the cream, I want it to be at sixty-three degrees at the commencement of churning, and if the cream is in good condition it will bring butter in about twenty minutes. Cream that is warmer than sixty-five degrees will make butter too soft; and any temperature that is below sixty-three until it comes to sixty, will increase the time of churning about five minutes for each degree; and when it is below sixty, it will lengthen the time of churning about ten minutes for every degree until fifty-five, when I hardly believe it will come at all.

As for using my finger to determine the warmth, I would as leave depend on using my finger to tell when the atmosphere was below zero.

Low vs. High Roosts.—Hens always seek to place themselves upon the highest roosts—as a writer in the *N. E. Farmer* says, “It is the height of their ambition.” Heavy hens, he says, often injure themselves in coming down—as they generally fly the whole distance at once, hitting hard upon the floor. By changing the height of the roosts from seven to four feet, his hens have become healthy, lay no more soft-shelled eggs, and come down readily and without injury.

MISCELLANEOUS.

A SMART FOX—OR A TOUGH STORY.—In a recent lecture upon the subject of his experience in Arctic life, Dr. Rea said: “On the journey I saw a very curious instance of the sagacity of the Arctic fox. Conscious that I was aiming at him, he tucked his tail under his legs, cocked up his ears, and endeavored to make himself look as much as possible like a hare, (which is an animal comparatively worthless.) Another fact of the kind occurred to me. Whilst being detained at a particular place, our favorite amusement was trapping wild animals. Our mode of doing this was by a spring gun connected with the bait, which, when touched produced the explosion. One instance shewed us that a fox, either from observation of a companion’s fate, or from hard-earned experience, had gone up to the gun, bit off the cord connected with the bait, and, the danger being averted, went and ate the meat in undisturbed comfort. And it is a common occurrence for the fox to make a trench up to the bait, seize it, and calmly permit the charge to pass harmless over his head.”

LARGE FAMILIES.—To the instances of unusually large numbers of children by one mother may be added that of a lady Elphinstone, who is said, by tradition, to have had not less than 36 children, of whom 27 were living at one time. There is a story told of this lady and her husband, Lord Elphinstone, which seems to corroborate the tradition: it is that they once asked a new and somewhat bashful acquaintance to visit them, telling him that he

should meet no one but their family circle. Their guest arrived shortly before dinner, and being shewn through the dining hall on his way to the drawing room was much disconcerted at seeing a long table laid out for about twenty people. On remonstrating with his host and hostess for having taken him in, as he thought, he was quietly informed that he had been told no more than the truth, for that their family party, when all assembled, only fell short of thirty by one. I believe that John, eighth Lord Elphinstone, and his lady, a daughter of the Earl of Lauderdale, who lived in the latter part of the 17th and beginning of the 18th centuries, are the pair to whom this story refers; and, though the Scotch peerages make no mention of any such phenomenon in the Elphinstone family, yet I am strongly inclined, from the goodness of the authority from which I derive the tradition, to believe it to be true.—*Notes and Queries.*

REASONS FOR LIKING BRIGHTON.—Papa likes places for such odd reasons. One gentleman likes Brighton, because you come tearing down from town in less time than it takes an omnibus to get from the City to Hampstead. Another, because BRILL's bath is the finest plunge he knows. Papa likes Brighton because the Parade is, he says, a great shelf on which all sorts of types of past days are put away. I don't pretend to understand all his historical allusions, (though I flatter myself I do know rather more history than little CAPTAIN WELWYN, who objected to go to LADY L-ND-ND-RRY's *bal costume* as *Edward the Black Prince*, because he did not like a character which, he considered, required him to blacken his face,) but it is very amusing to hear papa point out the people who have figured in times gone by. There are old, wicked-looking men, with thin faces, long-noses, and quaint hats, who have drunk Regent Punch with KING GEORGE THE FOURTH at the poor Pavilion, and have seen the King make his coats fit in the wonderful manner they did, by snipping off every wrinkle with a pair of scissors, and having the holes fine drawn.—*Punch.*

BREAD WITHOUT YEAST OR MILK.—By attending to the following directions you can make excellent, light, sweet bread, without yeast, salt, milk, saleratus, or soda—with nothing in fact, save water and flour:

Take boiling water; let it stand until the temperature is reduced below the scalding point; then stir in flour as thick as you can well beat it with a spoon. Set in warm water kept at proper temprature to promote fermentation, which will usually be completed in from three to four hours. If it should become thin after standing a while, stir in a teaspoonful or two of flour, beating it occasionally until it commences to rise. When light, put it with the flour, mixing up with water and kneading thoroughly; then make into loaves, and put it on tins to rise, keeping warm, and bake as usual.

To DRIVE AWAY RATS.—It is stated in the *Boston Cultivator*, that cotton batting sprinkled over with pulverized potash, will drive rats from premises infested by them, if crowded into their holes.

To PREVENT POTATOES SPROUTING.—Some advise to put potatoes for summer use in barrels, and occasionally empty them from one barrel to another, but I have found that a much more effectual way to prevent their growth, is to shake them in a basket. Take a common basket that will hold a bushel or more; fill it half or two-thirds full, and after giving a good shaking, if the sprouts are long, you will find most of them at the bottom of the basket, and the remainder completely "scotched." It is a more *pleasant, certain, and vastly more expeditious* way than sprouting by hand. Try it:

SCOURING KNIVES.—A small, clean potato, with the end cut off, is a very convenient medium of applying brick dust to knives, keeping it at about the right moisture, while the juice of the potato assists in removing stains from the surface. You can get a better polish by this method than by any other we have tried, and with less labor.

WHITE CAKE.—One cup of melted butter, one cup and a half of white sugar. Stir the butter and sugar together. Half a cup of sweet milk, two teaspoonfuls of cream tartar, and one of soda. One teaspoonful lemon essence. Whites of four eggs beat to a froth. Stir in flour sufficient to form a thick batter. Bake in a quick oven.

YELLOW CAKE.—One cup of melted butter and one of good brown sugar, stirred together. Half a cup of sweet milk, two teaspoonfuls of cream tartar, and one of soda. Yolks of four eggs. Flavor with nutmeg. Add sufficient flour to form a thick batter.

To PREVENT Cows FROM KICKING.—Take a rope or strap about three feet in length, and make a loop at one end, then carefully place the loop end around the hind legs just above the knee, run the other end through and draw the legs together as close as possible, then wrap the remainder of the rope around the part encircling the legs, and fasten. When properly adjusted it is impossible for a cow to kick.

A Good CHEAP COFFEE.—Take coffee and peas of equal quantities; roast them well, separately, taking care not to burn them; grind them together, and serve up according to taste. By the addition of the peas, the coffee clears itself, and settles perfectly without any other addition, and moreover makes a much cheaper and more wholesome beverage. I think the large, rich kinds of peas, such as the Blue Imperial, are preferable, which can be raised very easily by any good, frugal housewife, in her garden. Sow about the 10th of June and they will be free from bugs.

INDIAN BREAD WITHOUT YEAST.—Three tea cupsful of Indian meal, two of rye or wheat flour, one-fourth of a tea cupfull of molasses, one tea spoonful of salt, and one and a half tea spoonfuls of saleratus. Mix in one quart of sour milk. Bake two hours. The family pronounce this excellent, especially when first made.

How to PICKLE PLUMS.—For seven pounds plums, take four and a half of sugar, one quart vinegar, four ounces cinnamon, two ounces cloves—put the spices in a bag—scald the sugar, spice and vinegar together—then pour over the plums—cover tight—let them stand on the stove and keep hot—but not boil, for four hours.

FRENCH HONEY.—One pound of white sugar; six eggs, leaving out the whites of two; the juice of three or four lemons, and the grated rind of two, and a quarter of a pound of butter. Stir over a slow fire until it is about the consistency of honey.

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A TABLE
For Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year
forever.

FORMED BY DR. HERSCHELL, AND REVISED BY DR. ADAM CLARKE.

This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will by simple inspection shew the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail.

If the new moon, the first quarter, the full moon, or the last quarter, happens	IN SUMMER.	IN WINTER.

Observations.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to *midnight*, the fairer will be the weather during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to *midday* or *noon*, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the *wind*, as is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.


7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the *wind* is concerned, the observer should be in sight of a good *zone*, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
