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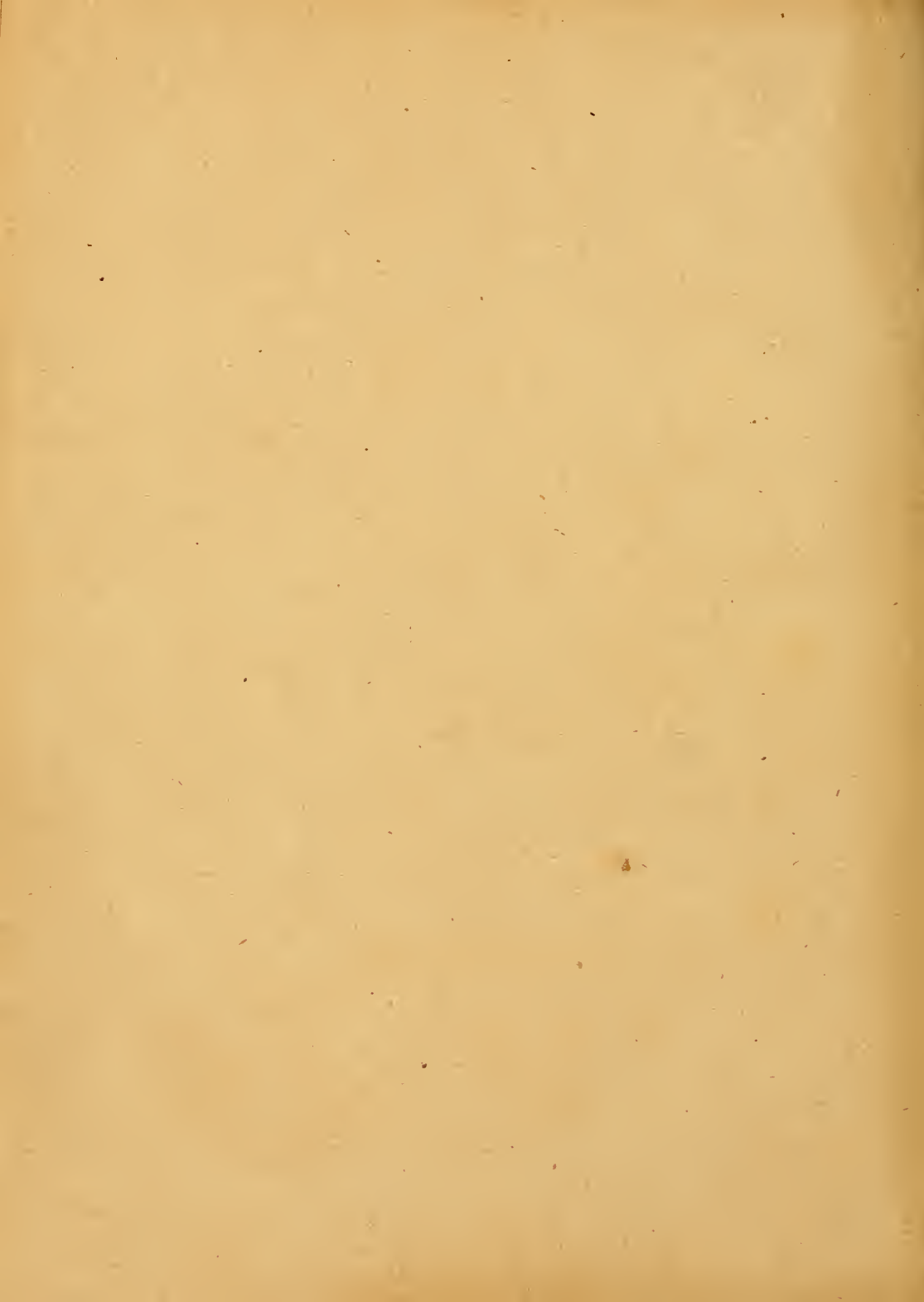

To the reader.



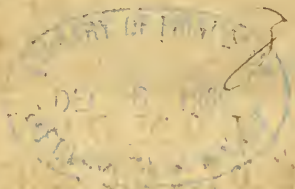
Thou shalt understand (gentle Reader) that I have (for the helpe of those that are desirous to learne to sing) caused a new print of Note to be made with letters to be ioyned to euerie Note: Whereby thou maiest know, how to call euerie Note by his right name, so that with a verie little diligence (as thou art taught in the introduction printed heeretofore in the Psalmes) thou mayest the more easilie by the viewing of these letters, come to the knowledge of perfect Solefayeng: whereby thou mayest sing the psalmes the more speedilie and easilie: The letters be these, V for Vt. R for Re. M for My. F for Fa. S for Sol. L for La. Thus where you see any letter ioyned by the note, you may easilie call him by his right name, as by these two examples you may the better perceiue.

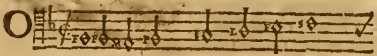

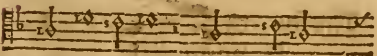

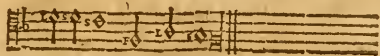

 An other person proper of
 the holy Ghost alone.

 Like the glory coeternall eke,
 the Aequitie likewise.

Such as the father is, such is
 the Sonne (eache degree)
 And such also we do belieue,
 the holy Ghost to be.
 Vncreate is the father, and

 vcreate is each one.

Incomprehensible father is,
 incomprehensible Sonne:
 And comprehensible also is,
 the holy Ghost of none.
 The father is eternall and
 the Sonne eternall so:
 And in like sort eternall is,
 the holy Ghost also.

And yet though we belieue that each
 of these eternall be:
 yet there but one eternall is,
 and not eternals three.
 As ne incomprehensible wi,
 ne yet vcreate three:
 But one incomprehensible, one
 vcreate hold to be.

Almightie so the father is,
 the sonne almightie so:
 And in like sort almightie is,
 the holy Ghost also.
 And albeit that euerie one,
 of these almightie be.
 yet there but one almightie is,
 and not almighties three.

The father God is, God the Sonne,
 God holy Ghost also:
 yet are there not three Gods at all,
 but one God and no moe.
 So likewise Lord the father is,
 and Lord also the Sonne:
 And Lord the holy Ghost, yet are
 there not three Lords but one.

For as we are compelled to graunt,
 by Christian belife:
 Each of the persons by himselfe,
 both God and Lord to be.
 So Catholike religion,
 forbiddeth vs alway:
 That either Gods be three, or that
 there Lordes be thre to say.

Of none the father is, ne made,
 ne creat, nor begot:
 The Sonne is of the father, not
 creat, ne made, but got.
 The holy Ghost is of them both,
 the father and the Sonne:
 Ne made, ne create, nor begot,
 but both proceed alone.

 So Writie in Trinitie,

 And Trinitie in Writie,
 in all thinges we adore.

Therefore what man soeuer, that

 This faith touching the Trinitie,

 it is that every wight:
 Of the incarnating of Christ,
 our Lord believe aright.

For this the right faith is, that we,
 belene and eke do know:
 That Christ our Lord the Sonne of God,

 God of his fathers substance got

19 And then I will giue thanks to the,
before the Church alwayes:
And whereas most of people be,
there will I shew thy praise.

20 Let not my foes pteynale on me,
which hate me for no fault:
Nor yet to winke or turne these eye,
that candleste me assault.

21 Of peace no word they thinke or say,
their talks is all vnttrue:
They still confute and would betray,
all those that peace eniue.

22 With open mouth they run at me,
they gape, they laugh, they siet:

David beyed by the wicked, 'complayneth of thre malice, but cōsidering gods great mercy to all creatures, specially toward his chyldren, by fapth thereof he is comforted and assured of his deliuerance.

Because the goodly should not be daunted to see wicked men prosper, David sheweth that all thynges shall be graunted euen with hartes desire, to them that loue and feare God: but the wicked albeit they loquith for a tyme, shall at length perishe.

forthwith they brake in sunder:
And raynd downe Manna for them to eat,
a foode of miche wonder.

24 When earthly men with angels foode,
were fed at the request:

25 He bad the East winde blow away,
and brought in the South-west.

26 And raynd downe flesh as thicke as dudd

and soule as thicke as sand:
27 In which he did cast amidst the place,
where all the tentes did stand.

28 Then did they rate exceedingly,
and all men had their fill:
Yet more and more they did desire,
to serue their lust and willes.

29 But as y^e meate was in their mouthes
his wrath vpon them fell:
30 And slew the flower of all their youth,
and choyce of Israell.

31 Yet fell they to their wonted sinne,
and still they did him graue:
For all the wonders that he wrought,

 49 He cast vpon them in his ire,
 and in his fure strong:
 Displeasure, wrath, and euil spirittes,
 to trouble them among.
 50 Then to his wrath he made a way,
 and spared not the least:
 But gaue vnto the pestilence,
 the man and eke the beast.
 51 He strake also the first borne all,
 that by in Egypt came:
 And all the chiefe of men and beastes,
 within the tentes of Ham.
 52 But as for all his owne deare folke,
 he did preserue and keepe:
 And caried them through wildernesse,
 euen like a flocke of sheepe.
 53 Without all feare both safe and sound,
 he brought them out of thral:
 Whereas their foes with rage of sea,
 were ouerwhelmed all.
 54 And brought them out into the coastes
 of his owne holy land:
 Turn to the Mount which he had got,
 by his strong arme and hand.

 and did their land diuide:

 they stirred and remyned still:

 And as a balsaint man of warre,
 refreshed after wine.
 66 With Emrods in the hinder part,

13 Who moued by nature,
to hop here and there,
Among the greene branches,
their songes shall excell.

14 The mountaines to moist,
the cloudes he doth ble,
The earth with his workes,
are wholly repleat:

15 So as the byre cattel,
he doth not refuse:
But grasse doth prouide them,
and herbe for mans meat,
yea bread, wine and oyle,
he made for mans sake,
His face to refresh,
and heart to make stronge

16 The Cedars of Liban,
this great God did make,
Which trees he doth nourish,
that grow by so long:

17 In those may birdes build,
and make there their nest,
In firme trees the Stophes,
remaine and abide:

18 The hye hilles are succours,
for wilde Soates to rest,
And eke the rockes stony,
for Conies to hide.

19 The Snowe then is set,
her seasons to runne,
The dayes from the nightes,
thereby to discern:
And by the descending,
also of the Sunne,
The cold from heate alway,
thereby we do learne.

20 When darknesse doth come,
by Gods will and power,
Then creepe forth do all,
the beastes of the wood:

21 The Lyons rainge roaring,
their pray to deuour,
But yet it is thou (Lord)
which giueth them food.

22 As soone as the Sunne,
is by, they retyre,
To couch in their dens,
then are they full saire:

23 That man to his worke may,
as right doth require,
Till night come and call him,
to take rest againe.
The third part.

24 How sundry (O Lord)
are all thy workes found,
With wisdom full great,
they are in deed wrought:
So that the whole world,
of thy prayse doth sound,
And as for thy riches,
they passe all mens thought.

25 So as the great sea,
which large is and broad,
Where thinges that creepe swarme,
and beastes of ech sort,

26 There both mightie ships saile,
and some lye at roade:
The Whale huge and monstrous,
there also doth sport.

27 All thinges on thee waffe,
thou dost them relieue,
And thou in due time,
full well dost they feede.

28 Now when it doth please the,

the same so to gloue,
 They gather full gladly,
 those things which they need.
 Thou openest thy hand,
 and they finde such grace,
 That they with good things,
 are filled we see:
 29 But soze are they troubled,
 if thou turne thy face,
 for if thou their breath take,
 vile dust then they be.
 30 Againe when thy spirit,
 from them doth proceed:
 All things ts appoint,
 and what shall ensue:
 31 Then are they created,
 as thou hast decreed,
 And doest by thy goodnesse,
 the dry earth renue.
 32 The prayse of the Lord,
 for ever shall last,
 Who may in his workes,
 by right well reioyce:
 His loke can the earth make,
 to tremble full fast,
 And likewise the mountaines,
 to smooke at his voice.
 33 To this Lord and God,
 sing will I alwaies,
 So long as I live,
 my God prayse will I:
 34 Then am I most certaine,
 my wordes shall him please,
 I will reioyce in him,
 to him will I cry.
 35 The sinners O Lord,
 consume in thine ire,
 And eke the peruerse,
 them root out with shame:
 But as for my soule now,
 let it still desire,
 And say with the faithfull,
 prayse ye the Lordes name.

Therefore we beseech thy sweet father to turne thy louing countenance towards vs, and impute not onto vs our manifold sinnes and offences, whereby we indly deserue thy wrath and sharpe punishment but rather receiue vs to thy mercy for Iesu Christs sake, acceptyng his death & passion as a iust recompence for all our offences, in whom onely thou art pleased, and through whom thou canst not bee offended with vs. And sayng that of thy great mercies, we haue quietly passed this night: graunt (O heavenly father) that we may bestow this day wholy in thy seruice, so that all our thoughtes, wordes, and deedes may redounde to the glory of thy name, and good ensample to all men, who sayng our good workes, may gloriſie thee our heavenly father. And forasmuch as of thy mere fauor and loue, thou hast not onely created vs to thine owne similitude and likenesse, but also hast chosen vs to bee heyres with thy deare Sonne Iesus Christ of that immortal hyngdome which thou preparedst for vs before the begynnyng of the worlde: wee beseeche thee to increaſe our faith and knowledge, and to lighten our hartes with thy holy spirite: that we may in the meane time liue in godly conuersation and integrity of life, knowing that Idolaters, adulterers, conuocous men, contentious persons, drunkardes, gluttonous, and such like, shall not inherite the kingdome of God.

But forasmuch as they cannot belieue except they heare, nor cannot heare but by preaching, & no ke can preach except he be sent: therefore (O Lord) call thy faithful distributors of thy misse-

ries who setting apart all worldly respects may both in their life & doctrine onely seeke thy glory. Contrarily confound Satan, Antichrist with all hirelings, whom thou hast already cast off into a reprobate sence, that they may not by sects, schismes, heresies, & errors diuier thy litle flock. And because (O Lord) we be fallen into the latter dayes and daungerous times wherein ignorance hath gotten the upper hand, and Sathe by his ministers seek by all meanes to quench the light of thy Gospell, we beseech thee to maintain thy cause agaynst these rauening wolues, and strengthen all thy seruantes, whom they kepe in prison and bondage. Let not thy long suffering be an occasion, either to increaſe their tyranny, or to discourage thy childre: neither yet let our finnes and wickednesse be an hindraunce to thy mercyes, but with speed O Lord consider these great miseries. For thy people Israell many tymes by their finnes prouoked thyne anger, and thou purifiedst them by thy iust iudgement, yet though their finnes were neuer so greivous, if they once returned from their iniquity, thou receiuedst them to mercy. We therefore most wretched sinners bewaile our manifold finnes and earnestly repent vs of our former wickednes and brauely behauiour towards thee: and whereas wee cannot of our selues purchase thy pardon, yet we humbly beseech thee for Iesus Christs sake to heaue thy mercies bypon vs and receiue vs as gayne to thy fauour. Graunt vs deare father these our requestes and all other thynges necessary for vs and thy whole Church, according to thy promise in Iesus Christ our Lord. In whose name we beseech thee as he hath taught vs, saying, Our Father which art. &c.

Euening prayer.

O Lord God, father everlasting and full of pity, wee acknowledge and confesse that we be not woorthy to liue by our eyes to heauen, much lesse to present our selues before thy maiesty with confidence that thou wilt heare our prayers and graunte our requestes, if wee consider our owne deservings: for our consciences doo accuse vs and our finnes doe witness agaynst vs, and wee know that thou art an bright Judge, which doest not iustifie the sinners and wicked men but punishest the faultes of all such as transgresse thy commaundementes: Yet most mercifull father, since it hath pleased thee to commaunde vs to call on thee in all our troubles and aduersities promising euen then to helpe vs when wee feele our felnes (as it were) swallowed by of death and desperation. And albeit wee bee but wormes and dust, yet thou art our Creatour, and wee bee the worke of thy handes: yea thou art our father, and wee thy Children: thou art our Shepheard, and wee thy flocke: thou art our redeemer, and wee thy people whome thou hast bought: thou art our God, and wee thine inheritance. Correct vs not therefore in thine anger O Lord neyther according to our desertes punishe vs, but mercifullly chastise vs with a fatherly affection, that all the world may know that at what tyme soeuer a sinner doth repent hym of his sinne from the bottoome of his heart, thou wilt put away al his wickednesse out of thy remembrance as thou hast promised by thy holy Prophet.

Finally for as much as it hath pleased thee to make þ night for man to rest in, as thou hast ordayned him the day to trauell, graunt O deare father that wee may so take our bodily rest, that our soules may continually watch for the tyme that our Lorde Iesus Christ shall appeare for our deliuerance out of this mortall life, & in the meane season that we not overcome by any fantasies dreames or other temptations, may fully set our minds vpon the, loue the, feare the & rest in thee. Further more that our sleep be not excessive or overmuch after the insatiable desires of our flesh, but onely sufficient to content our weake nature, that we may bee the better disposed to liue in all bodily conuersation to the glory of thy holy name and proкте of our brethren. So be it.

- 10 Thy cholen flocke doth there remaine,
thou hast prepard that place:
And for the poyre thou doest prouide,

- 28 As God hath geuen power to the,
so Lord make firme and sure:
The thing that thou hast wrought in vs;
for euer to endure.
- 29 And in thy temple giftes will we,
geue vnto the O Lord:
For thine vnto Jerusalem,
sure promise made by word.
- The fourth part.
- 30 Yea & strange kynges to vs subdude,
shall do like in thole dayes:
I meane to the they shall present,
their giftes of land and prayse.
He shall destroy the spearmens ranches,
their Calues and Balles of might:
And cause them tribute pay, and daune
all such as loue to fight.
- 31 Then shall the Landes of Egypt come,
and presentes with them bring:
The

22 When they with bags do breake my
I seke for helpe anon: (hart)
But finde no frendes to ease my smart,
to comfort me not one.

23 But in my meate they gaue me gall,
too cruell for to thinke:
And gaue me in my thyrst withall,

they seke to hurt him more.

29 Then let them heape by mischief still,
till they are all peruert:
That of thy fauour and good will,
they neuer haue a part.

30 And raze them cleane out of the booke
of life, of hope, of trust:
That for their names they neuer looke,

 8 What is his goodnes cleane decayde,
 for euer and a day?
 Or is his promise now delate,
 and doth his trust decay?

9 And will the Lord our God forget,
 his mercies manifold:
 Or shall his wrath increase to hate,
 his mercie to withhold?
 10 At last I saide my weakenes is
 the cause of this misruell:
 Gods mightie hand can helpe all this,
 and change it when he list.

The second part.

11 I will regard and thinke vpon,
 the working of the Lord:
 Of all his wonders past and gone,
 I gladly will record.
 12 Yea all his workes I will declare,
 and what he did deuise:
 To tell his facts I will not spare,
 and eke his counsaile wise.

13 Thy workes O Lord are all bright,
 and holie all abroad:
 What one hath strength to match the might
 of thee O Lord our God?

14 Thou art a God that oft dost shew,
 thy wonders euery houre:

 the deepes on trembling fell.

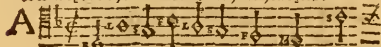

 and teach their seede also.

7 That they may haue the better hope,
 in God that is about:
 And not forget to keepe his lawes,
 and his precepts in loue.

8 Not being as our fathers were,
 rebelling in Gods sight:
 And would not leaue their wicked hearts
 to know their God aright.

9 How went the people of Egiptain,
their neighbors for to spoile:
Shooting their darts the day of warre,
and yet they tooke the traile?

10 For why? they did not keepe with God
the covenant that was made:
Nor yet would walke or lead their lincs,
according to his trade.

11 But put into obliuion,
his counsell and his will:
And all his wordes most magnifike,
which he declared still.

The second part.

12 What wonders to our foyersathers,
did he himselfe disclose:
In Egypt land within the field,
that called is Chaneos?

13 He did denbe and cut the sea,
that they might passe at once:
And made the waters stand as still,
as doth an heape of stones.

14 He led them secret in a cloud,
by day when it was bright:
And in the night when darke it was,
with fire he gaue them light.

15 He brake the rocks in wildernes
and gaue the people drinke:
As plentiful as when the deepest,
doe flow by to the bylake.

16 He drew out riuers out of rocks,
that were both drye and hard:
Of such aboundance, that no flouds
to them might be compar'd.

17 Yet for all this against the Lord,
their sinne they did increase:
And stirred him that is most high,
to wrath in wildernes.

They reuoyd him within their hart
like the people of misdite:
Requiring such a kind of meat,
as serued to their lust.

19 Saying with murmuration,
in their unfaithfullnesse:
What? can this God prepare for vs,
a feall in wildernes?

20 Behold, he strake the stonie rocke,
and founts forthwith did flow:
But can he now giue to his folke,
both bread and flesh also?

21 When God heard this he wared wrath:
with Iacob and his seede:
So did his indignation,
on Israell pcedede.

The third part.

22 Because they did not saythfully,
belene and hope, that he
Could alwayes helpe and succour them,
in their necessitie.

23 Whoe he he did command the clouds,
forthwith they brake in lunder:
24 And raynd downe Manna for them to eat,
a foode of mighte wonder.

25 When earthly men with angels food
were fed at this request:
26 The badde East winde blow away,
and brought in the South west.

27 And raynd downe flesh as thicke as dust

and sonie as thicke as sand:
28 Which he did cast amidst the place,
where all the tentes did stand.

29 Then did they care exceedingly,
and all men had their fill:
Yet more and more they did desire,
to serue their lust and willes.

30 But as y meat was in their mouthes
his wrath vpon them fell:
31 And flew the flower of their youth
and choise of Israel.

32 Yet fell they to their wanted sinne,
and still they did him grieve:
For all the wonders that he wrought,
they would him not beleue.

33 Their dayes therefore he shortned,
and made their honor bayne:
Their yeares did wast and passe away,
with errors and with payne.

43 But euer when he plagued them,
they sought him by and by.
Remembryng then he was their strength,
their helpe and God most hye.

35 Though in their mouthes they did but
and flatter with the Lord: (glose,
And with their tongues and in their hartes,
dissembled every word.

36 For why? their hartes were nothing
to him nor to his trade: (uent
Nor yet to keepe, or to performe
the covenant that was made.

37 Yet was he still so mercifull,
when they defend to dye:
That he forgane them their misdeedes,
and would not them destroy.

38 Yea many a tyme he turned his wrath,
and did him selfe abuse:
And would not suffer all his whole
displeasure to arise.

39 Considering that they were but flesh,

That passeth away, and cannot well

to plague them with his stroke?

41 Yet did they curie againe to sinne,
and reuoyd God elswoone:
Preferring to the holy Lord,
what thinges they would haue done.

42 Not thinking of his hand and power,
nor of the day when he:
Delivered them out of the handes,
of the fierce enemy.

43 How he wrought his miracles,
as they themselves beheld:
In Egypt, and the wonders that
he did in Zoan field.

44 Nor how he returned by his power,
their waters into blood
That no man might receiue his displea-
as riuers nor as floud.

45 How how he sent them swarmes of flies
which

which did them for annoy:
 And did their country full of frogs,
 why should their land desolate.
 The six part.

46 How he did commit their fences,
 into the Caterpillar:
 And all the labour of their handes,
 he gave to the Grasshopper.

47 With hailstones he destroyed these
 so that they were all lost, (vined)
 And not so much as wilde figgetrees,
 but he confunde with frost.

48 And yet with hailstones once againe,
 the Lord their cartell smote:
 And all their flockes and herdes likewise,
 with thunderboltes full bore.

49 He cast upon them in his ire,
 and in his fure strong:
 Wylpleasures, wrath, and evil spirites,
 to trouble them among.

50 Then to his wrath he made a way,
 and spared not the leaf:
 But gave into the pestilence,
 the man and eke the beast.

51 He strake also the first borne all,
 that by in Egypt came:
 And all the chiefe of men and bestes,
 within the tentes of Ham.

52 But as for all his owne deare folke,
 he did preferre and keepe:
 And carried them through wilderness,
 even like a flocke of sheepe.

53 Without all feare both late and sound,
 he brought them out of thall:
 Whereas their foes with rage of sea,
 were overwhelmed all.

54 And brought them out into the coastes
 of his owne holy land:
 Even to the Mount which he had got,
 by his strong arm: and hand.

55 And there cast out the heathen folke,
 and did their land divide:
 And in their tentes he set the tribes
 of Israel to abide.

56 Yet for all this their God most high,
 they did and tempted still:
 And would not keepe his testament
 nor yet obey his will.

57 But as their fathers turned backe,
 euen so they went astray:
 Much like a bow that would not bend,
 but slip and flact away.
 The six part.

58 And grieved him with their hill affares,
 with offerings and with fire:
 And with their Idols, vehemently
 prouoked him to ire.

59 Therewith his wrath began agayne,
 to kinde in his brest:
 The naughtines of Israel,
 he did so much detest.

60 Then he forsooke the Tabernacle,
 of Silo where he was:
 Right come saunt with earthly men,
 euen as his dwelling place:

61 Then suffered he his might and power,
 in bondage for to stand:
 And gave the honor of his Ark,

into his enemies hand.

62 And did commit them to the sword,
 wroth with his heritage:
 63 The young men were deuoured with fire
 maybes had no marriage.

64 And with the sword the Widewes also,
 did perish every one:
 And not a widow left a lone,
 their death for to be none.

65 And then the Lord began to waine
 like one that slepe a tyme:
 And as a ballaunt man of warre,
 refreshed after wine.

66 With Emreds in the hinder parts,
 he strake his enemies all:
 And put them then into a shame,
 that was perpetuall.

67 Then he the tent and tabernacle,
 of Ioseph did release:
 As for the tribe of Ephraim,
 he would in no wise chuse.

68 But chose the tribe of Iehuda,
 whereas he thought to dwell:
 Euen the noble mount Sion,
 which he did loue so well.

69 Whereas he did his temple build,
 both sumptuously and sure:
 Like as the earth which he hath made,
 for euer to endure.

70 Then chose he Dauid him to serue,
 his people for to keepe:
 Which he tooke by and brought away,
 euen from the folds of sheepe.

71 As he did follow the Swes with yong:
 the Lord did him aduance:
 To feed his people Israel,
 and his inheritance.

72 Thus he did with a faithfull hart,
 his flocke and charge did feed:
 And patiently with all his power,
 did gouerne them in deed.

The Israelites complaine to God for the calamities that
 they suffered when Antiochus destroyed their temple

32 He gaue them cold and stony halle,
in stead of milderraine:
And fiery flames within their land,
he sent vnto their paine.
33 He smote their vines and all their trees
whereon their figs did grow
And all the trees within their coastes,
downe did he ouerthrow.
34 He spake, then Caterpillers did
and Grasshoppers abound:
35 Which eate the grasse in all their land,
and fruite of all their ground.

- 36 The first begotten in their land
eke deadly did he smite:
Yea the beginning and first fruite,
of all their strength and might.
37 With gold and siluer he them brought,
from Egypt land to passe:
And in the number of the tribes,
no fable one there was.
38 Egypt was glad and soylfull then,
when they did thence depart:
For terror and the feare of them,
was fallen into their heart.
39 To thoud them from the parching heat,
a cloud he did display:
And fire he sent to giue them light,

to them the fruitfull landes:
The labours of the people eke,

45 That they his holy statutes might,
oblerue for euermore:
And faithfully obey his lawes,
praysye ye the Lord therfore.

Morning prayer.



Almighty God and most mercifull father, we doe not present our felues here before thy maiestie trusting in our own merites or worthines, but in thy manifold mercies which thou hast promised to heare our prayers & graunte our requestes which we shall make to thee in the name of thy beloued Sonne Iesus Christ our Lord: who also hath commaunded vs to asseble our felues together in his name, with full assurance & he will not only be amongst vs, but also be our mediator and aduocate towards thy maiesty, that we may obtayne all thinges which shall seeme expedient to thy blessed will for our necessities. Therefore we beseech thee most tenderly to turne thy louing countenance towards vs, and impute not vnto vs our manifold finnes and offences, whereby we justly deserue thy wrath and sharpe punishment but rather receiue vs to thy mercy for Iesu Christs sake, accepting his death & passion as a iust recompence for all our offences, in whom only thou art pleased, and through whom thou canst not be offended with vs. And saying that of thy great mercies, we haue quietly passed this night: graunt (O heavenly father) that we may bestow this day wholly in thy seruice, so that all our thoughts, wordes, and deedes may rebounde to the glory of thy name, and good ensample to all men, who saying our good wordes, may glorifie thee our heavenly father. And forasmuch as of thy infinite fauour and loue, thou hast not onely created vs to thine owne similitude and likeness, but also hast chosen vs to be heyes with thy deare Sonne Iesus Christ of that immortal kynngdome which thou preparedst for vs before the beginning of the worlde: we beseeche thee to encrease our faith and knowledge, and to lighten our hartes with thy holy spirit: that we may in the meane time liue in godly conuersation and integrity of life, knowing that Idolaters, adulterers, concetuous men, contentious persons, drunkardes, gluttons, and such like, shall not inherite the kingdome of God.

And because thou hast commaunded vs to pray one for another, we doe not onely make request (O Lord) for our felues & for thee that thou hast already called to the true vnderstanding of thy heavenly will, but for all people, and nations of the world, who as they know by thy wonderfull workes: that thou art god ouer all, so they may be instructed by thy holy spirit, to beleeue in thee their onely saviour and redeemer. But forasmuch as they cannot beleeue except they heare, nor cannot heare but by preaching, & we can preach except we be sent: therefore (O Lord) send by faithfull distributors of thy mysteries, who setting apart all worldly respectes

may both in their life & doctrine onely seeke thy glory. Contrarily confound Sathe, Antichrist with all hirelings, whom thou hast already cast off into a reprobate sense, that they may not by sects, sectines, heresies, errors disquiet thy little flock. And because (O Lord) we be fallen into the latter dayes and dangerous times wherein ignorance hath gotten the upper hand, and Sathe by his ministers seeke by all means to quench the light of thy Gospel, we beseech thee to maintain thy cause against those rauening wolves, and strengthen all thy seruantes, whom thee they keepe in prison and bondage. Let not thy long suffering be an occasion, either to encrease their tyranny, or to discourage thy children: neither yet let our finnes and wickednesse be an hindrance to thy mercies, but with speed O Lord consider their great miseries, for thy people Israell many tymes by their finnes prouoked thine anger, and thou punishedst them by thy iust iudgement, yet though they finnes were neuer so greuous, if they once returned from their inquiry, thou receivest them to mercy. We therefore most wretched finnes bewaile our manifold finnes and earnestly repent vs of our former wickednes and vngodly behaviour towards thee: and whereas we cannot of our felues purchase thy pardon, yet we humbly beseech thee for Iesus Christs sake to shew thy mercies vpon vs and receiue vs as gayne to thy fauour. Graunt vs deare father these our requestes, and all other thinges necessary for vs and thy whole Church, according to thy promise in Iesus Christ our Lord. In whose name we beseech thee as he hath taught vs, saying, Our Father which art. &c.

Euening prayer.

O Lord God, father everlasting and full of pity, we acknowledge and confesse that we be not worthy to lift vp our eyes to heauen, much lesse to present our felues before thy maiesty with confidence that thou wilt heare our prayers and graunte our requestes: if we consider our owne demerits: for our consciences doe accuse vs and our finnes doe witnesse against vs, and we know that thou art an vpright Iudge, which doest not iustifie the finnes and wicked men but punishest the faultes of all such as transgresse thy commaundementes: Yet most mercifull father, since it hath pleased thee to commaunde vs to call on thee in all our troubles and aduersities promisinge thee to helpe vs when we feele our felues (as it were) swallowed by of death and desperation. We therefore remaine all worldly confidence and flye to thy soveraigne bounty, as our onely stay and refuge: beseeching thee not to call to remembrance our manifold finnes

annes and wickednesse: whereby wee continually proucke thy wrath and indignation agaynst vs: neyther our negligence and bnyuencesse, whiche haue wey thy woordes they esteemed, nor in all our iustices sufficientlie expressed the sweete comfort of thy Gospell reuealed vnto vs: But rather to accept the obedience, and death of thy sonne Iesus Christ, who by offering vp his body in Sacrifice once for all, hath made a sufficient recompence for all our finnes. Haue mercy therefore vpon vs O Lorde, and forgive vs our offences. Teach vs by thy holy spirit, that wee may rightly weyde them, and earnestly repent for the same. And so much the rather (O Lorde) because that the reprobate and such as thou hast forsaken cannot praye thee nor call vpon thy name: But the repenting hart, the sorrowfull minde, the conscientie oppressed, hungering and thirsting for thy grace shall euer set forth thy praise and glory.

And albeit wee bee but woynes and dust, yet thou art our Creatour, and wee bee the worke of thy handes: Yea thou art our Father, and wee thy Children: thou art our Shepheard, and wee thy flocke: thou art our redeemer, and wee thy people whome thou hast bought: thou art our God, and wee thine inheritance. Correct vs not therefore in thine anger (O Lorde) neyther according to our desertes punish vs, but mercifullly chastise vs with a fatherly affection, that all the world may knowe that at what tyme soener a sinner doth repent him of his sinne from the boosome of his heart, thou wilt put away al his wickednesse out of thy remembrance as thou hast promised by thy holy Prophet.

Finally for as much as it hath pleased thee to make vs might for man to rest in, as thou hast ordained him the day to trauel in. Grant O deare father that wee may so take our bodely rest, that our soules may continually watch for the tyme that our Lorde Iesus Christ shall appeare for our deliuerance out of this mortal life, & in the meane season that we not overcome by any fantasies dreames or other captiuities, may fully set our minds vpon thee, loue thee, feare thee & rest in thee. Furthermore that our sleep be not excessive or ouermuch after the vnsatisfiable desires of our flesh, but onely sufficient to content our weak nature, that wee may bee the better disposed to liue in all Godly conuersation to the glory of thy holy name and praife of our brethren. So be it.

at all tymes.

Be mercifull (O Lorde) to our offences, and seeing our debt is great which thou hast forgiven vs in Iesus Christ, make vs to loue thee and our neighbors so much the more. Be thou our Father, our Captayne and defender in all temptations, hold thou vs by thy mercifull hand that we may be deliuered fro al inconueniencies, and end our liues in the sanctification of thy honor of thy holy name through Iesus Christ our Lord & onely Sauer.

Let thy mighty hand and outstretched arme (O Lorde) be stil our defence: thy mercy and louing kindness in Iesu Christ thy deare sonne our saluator, thy true and holy word our instruction, thy grace and holy spirit our comfort and consolation vnto the end and in the end. So be it.

O Eternall God and most mercifull father we confesse & acknowledge here before thy diuine maiesty, that wee are miserable sinners, conceived & borne in sin and iniquity, so that in vs there is no goodnes. For thy flesh euermore rebelleth against the spirit, whereby we continually transgress thy holy preceptes and commandementes, and so purchase to our selues throught thy iust iudgement, death, and damnation. For which standing (O heauenly father,) forasmuch as wee are displeas'd with our selues, for the finnes that wee haue committed agaynst thee, and doe vnsatisfiedly repent vs of the same, wee most hartely beseech thee for Iesus Christes sake

to shew thy mercy vpon vs, to forgive vs all our finnes, and increase thy holie spirit in vs: that we acknowledging from the bottom of our hearts, our owne vnrightrousnesse, may from henceforth not onely mortifie our vnfull lustes and affections, but also bring forth such fruites as may be agreeable to thy most blessed will, not for the worthines thereof, but for the merites of thy dearely beloued sonne Iesus Christ our onely Saviour, whome thou hast already geuen an oblation and offering for our finnes, and for whose sake we are certainly perswaded that thou wilt deny vs nothing that we shall aske in his name according to thy will. O Lord God most mercifull father & Saviour, seeing I hath pleased thee to command vs to traunce, that we may relieue our neede, we beseech thee of thy grace to bestee our labours, that thy blessing may extend vnto vs, without the which we are not able to continue: and that thy great fauour may be a witness vnto vs of thy vncircumised and assistance, so that thereby we may know the fatherly care that thou hast ouer vs.

Response (O Lord) we beseech thee thou wouldst strengthen vs by thy spirit, that we may faithfully traunce our estate and vocation without fraud or deceit: & that we may endure our selues to follow thine holy ordinance rather then to seeke to satisfy our greedy affections or desire to gayne. And if it please thee O Lord to ioyntly our labor, geue vs a minde also to helpe them that haue need according to that ability that thou of thy mercy shalt giue vs: and knowing that all good things come of thee: graunt that we may humble our selues to our neighbours, and not by any meanes lift our selues above them which haue not receiued so liberall a portion as of thy mercy thou hast geuen vnto vs. And if it please thee to try & exercise vs by greater poverty and need then our flesh wold desire: that thou wouldst yet (O Lord) graunt vs grace to know that thou wilt neuerthe vs continually through thy boisterfull liberality & we be not so reioyced that we fall into distress: but that we may patiently waite till thou all vs, not only with corporall graces & benefites, but chiefly with those heavenly & spiritual treasures, to the intent that we may alwayes haue more ample occasion to giue thee thanks and wholly to rest vpon thy mercies. A Almighty God and most mercifull father we humbly submit our selues and fall down before thy maiesty beseeching thee from the bottom of our hartes, that thy side of thy word now sowne amongst vs may take such depe rote that neither the burning heate of persecution ca. use it to wither, neither the thorny cares of this life choke it, but that as these sowne in good ground it may bring forth thirty, sixty, and an hundred folde, as thy heavenly wisdom hath appointed.
