## Household Hints

If you happen to burn your hand in removing the bread from the oven, take the white of an egg, spread it over the burn, cover with a soft cloth, and you will be surprised to see how soon the smarting pain will cease.

To remove furniture dents wet the scar with warm water. Soak in warm water a piece of heavy brown paper, double it about four times, lay it over the dent and press with a hot iron. Leave the iron on the paper until all moisture is absorbed. If the dent is not then removed, repeat the process.

To singe chickens hold them over a saucer of burning alcohol. It does not leave soot on the flesh.

Grease stains on leather may be removed by carefully applying benzine or perfectly pure turpentine. Wash the spots over afterward with well beaten white of an egg or a good leather reviver.

When you wash your lamp chimneys lift them out of the water and set them on the hot stove. No, they will not break. Let them steam, then wipe on a clean cloth and they will be clear as a crystal. Turn your enamel ware up side down in the dish pan while you dry the dishes and they will clean easily.

Don't scrub the nice new oilcloth with hot water and soapsuds; wipe it off with skim milk and warm water, and it will continue to wear a bright face for weeks to come.

There are few things more repulsive to the sight than a sink that has lost its original luster by the accumulation of grease and grime on the surface. Try this little experiment: Dip a flannel cloth in coal oil; rub the sink well with it. Take it patch by patch until there is a shimmer and shine that reminds you of better days; now rinse with hot soda water, and insist upon the sink being kept in that condition.

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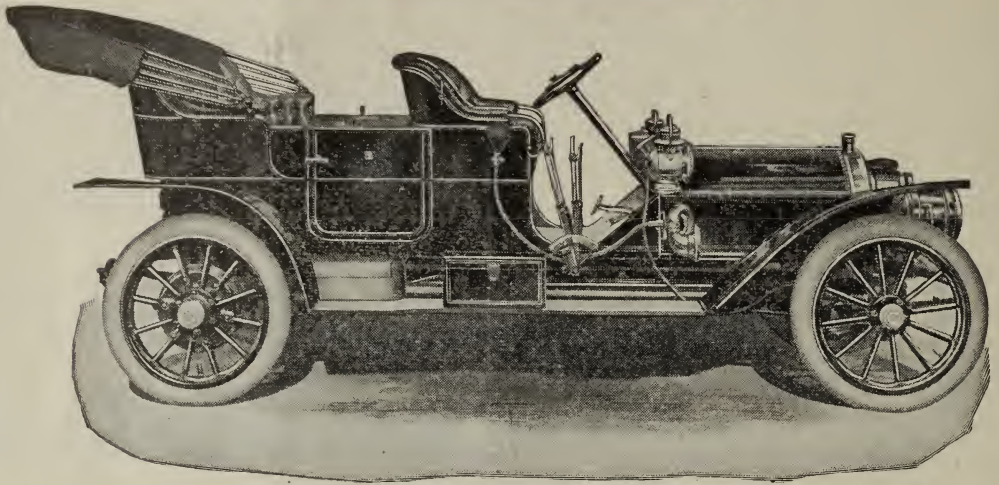

## Fall Cravats

For fall there will be, with some few notable exceptions, very little change in the general style of the cravattings which have been prevailing for the past six months, although, naturally, allowance must be made for the effect of the season, heavier silks, and stronger, darker tones being much in evidence. Stripes will continue to be seen in all their glory—wide stripes, narrow stripes, multi-color stripes—but it seems to be rather a toss-up whether these stripes shall run vertically or diagonally, although the long, diagonal variety would seem to be the favorite.

Some very elegant Jacquard patterns will be introduced this fall, unique in design and very rich in their effect, while in the finer lines the silks are often sprinkled with swivels or crossed by art figures of various kinds. In spite of the fact that some of the more exclusive houses make the statement that the satin season is over, there is, a great deal of satin and satin effects being used in the tie of the moment.

Nevertheless, in spite of the great diversity of silks from which the coming season's ties are being made up, the prevailing note—the stripe—is an insistent one and, in a general impression of the new scarfs, an all pervading one.

So far as the shapes are concerned there is little that is new to be recorded. A slight addition in width will be about the only vagary noted in the fall's offerings.

There never was a time when such a variety and number of colors have been shown in the silks designed to adorn milord's neck. Not only every possible color, but every shade imaginable of that color, is now to be found in the neck-wear that is to be put on the market for the coming season.
