

Scores were treated in the dispensary and from ten to fifteen surgical dressings were performed each day. Visits were also made to the Skeem, and many cases were treated; on one occasion during three days stay there being no less than 130 patients. The hospital there was full all the season, and as many as three applicants in one day were turned away for want of room. July was spent on the Skeem, and in August, after a brief visit to River's Inlet, the forces were concentrated at Port Simpson, and through the autumn months the hospital was filled with serious cases. During the winter, cases continued to come from the surrounding villages and the increased traffic along the coast brought in some sailors and miners, who, in sickness and accident, absent from home and friends, found both at the mission, and help and health. In February an epidemic of grippe made extra work. Nearly 7,000 attendances were recorded during the year, and the number of cases treated was 1,000.
