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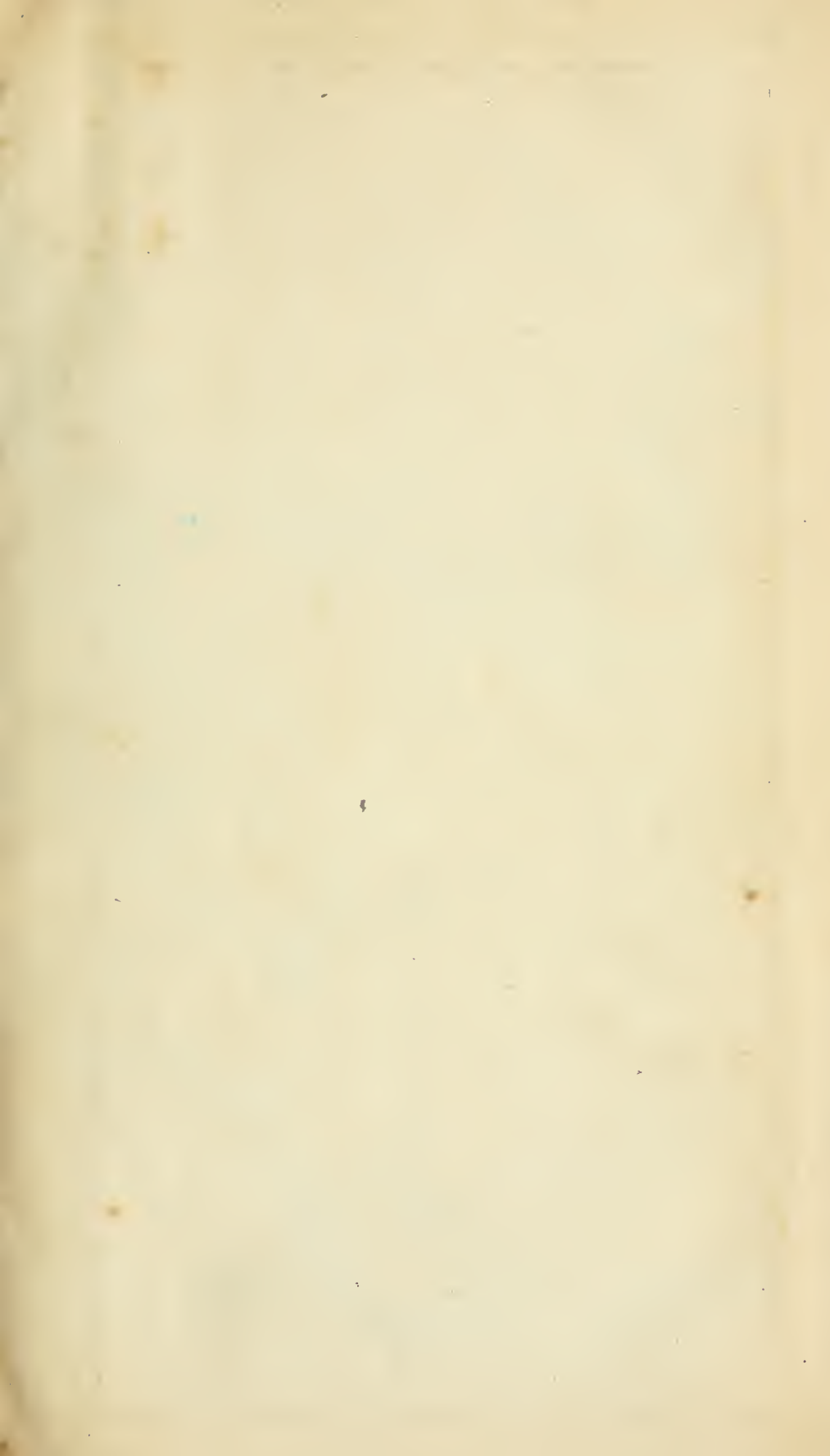

# BEDFORDSHIRE.

**T**HIS is an inland county, bounded on the north-east by Huntingdonshire, on the north-west by Northamptonshire, on the west by Buckinghamshire, which county also, with Hertfordshire, forms its southern boundary; its eastern extremity is met by Cambridgeshire, and its south-eastern by Hertfordshire. The form of the county is an irregular oval, about thirty-five miles in length, twenty in breadth and ninety-six in circumference, comprising an area of four hundred and sixty-three square miles, or 296,320 statute acres. Bedfordshire ranks as the thirty-seventh English county, both in size and population.

**NAME AND EARLY HISTORY.**—When the Romans landed in Britain (B. C. 55,) this part of the country was included in the district inhabited by the *Catueclannii*, or *Cassii*, whose chief Cassibellanus, headed the force of the whole island against Cæsar, and the year following was totally defeated. When the Emperor Constantine divided Britain into five Roman provinces, it was included in the third division, called *Flavia Cæsariensis*. Bedfordshire was the site of two Roman stations—one at Dunstable, the other near the village of Sandy; and it was penetrated by the two great Roman roads, the *Watling-street* and the *Ickneild-street*—and by a military way, and others termed '*vicinal*' ways. The Ickneild-street enters the county on the south-east side, and, crossing at the sixteenth mile-stone on the road from Bedford to Luton, passes along the intermediate hill sides, and through the town of Dunstable into Buckinghamshire. The Watling-street introduces itself near Baldock, and continues its course to *Salinae*, near Sandy; thence across Toppard marsh—passing a *tumulus*, it keeps to the left of Hardwick, and proceeds to the Roman station at Godmanchester; but it is difficult to distinguish between this road and the great one from London to Chester. There is a branch of the Ickneild-street which, diverging from the main line at the Luton road, may be traced through Bravingham and Houghton to the British camp at Maiden Bower, near Dunstable. On a hill near Sandy is a large Roman camp; and near Totternhoe castle, contiguous to Dunstable, are very considerable entrenchments. About a mile from the latter town is the encampment named Maiden Bower, two thousand five-hundred feet in circumference, environed by a ditch and a rampart; near Leighton Buzzard is a similar one, and on the road from Bedford to Eaton Socon a third may be discerned. Roman coins, urns and other relics, have frequently been dug up in different parts of the county. At the establishment of the kingdom of Mercia (one of the divisions of the Saxon heptarchy), it was considered as part of that kingdom, and was known as '*Bedeanford*,' signifying a fortress on a ford; and when Alfred divided England into counties, &c., he applied to this shire the name of *Bedeford*—hence its present appellation. During the reign of Edward the Elder this county was frequently disturbed by the incursions of the Danes. In 919 Edward came to Bedford, and built a fortress on the south side of the Ouse. In 921 the Danes entered and fortified Tempsford, from whence they issued and attacked Bedford, but were put to flight by its inhabitants; Edward, soon after, in his turn, attacked Tempsford, which he captured, and slew the Danish king and his principal chieftains. In 1010 Bedford and Tempsford were burned by the revengeful Danes; next year King Ethelred recovered this territory; but in 1017 the Danes were again its masters, and under Canute it was included in the *Dane lege*, or Danish jurisdiction. After the Conquest but few events of importance occurred in the county, till the capture of Bedford castle by King Stephen (held previously by the Beauchamps, his opponents), in 1138; this family held it afterwards against King John; but his favourite, Fulk de Breaunt, having besieged and taken it, received the prize as a reward of his services: it was again taken, and destroyed by Henry III, in consequence of one of his justice- itinerant having been imprisoned by Fulk. All the other castles in the county followed the fate of that of Bedford; and, owing to the demolition of these fortresses, the county, during the protracted struggle of the '*Roses*,' was preserved from being the scene of any decisive conflict. At the commencement of the great contest between Charles I and the Parliament, Bedfordshire took part with the latter, for Charles never had many partizans in the county, although the royalist forces, in the month of October, 1643, had a transient possession of the town of Bedford. In Prynne's '*Popish Royal Favourite*' it is stated that, from the 1st of Charles I to the 14th, about ninety Popish recusants were convicted in this county; and Archbishop Laud, in his annual report of his province to the King, in 1634, states that his '*visitors found Bedfordshire, from the biggness, the most tainted of any part of the diocese—and, in particular,*' adds the zealous prelate, '*Mr. Buckley is sent to the high commission for non-conformity.*' Of the fourteen religious houses existing prior to the Reformation, the remains of Dunstable Priory and of Elstow Abbey are the chief vestiges existing. An interesting fragment of Newenham Priory, and several of the churches at Bedford, will also gratify the antiquary.

**SURFACE, SOIL, PRODUCE, CLIMATE, &c.**—Bedfordshire, although never romantic, and seldom picturesque, is pleasingly diversified by hill and valley, and some of its prospects combine every concomitant of landscape scenery—for example, the fine view from Totternhoe castle, near Dunstable; those from Millbrook church-yard and Ridgmont are also well harmonised and lovely. The downs between Barton and Streatley, and those of Luton and Dunstable, command a rich scenic picture; the unbragging vicinity of Woburn, too, has often employed the pencil of the artist. The diversified soils common to all the uplands of the kingdom are found in Bedfordshire: chalk prevails in the southern division, beneath which is a narrow stratum of flint, covering a bed of clay—the whole resting on a chalky rock. The high chalky downs of Dunstable and Luton comprise nearly four thousand acres of indifferent pasturage. The vale of Bedford is a very fertile tract; and the meadows on the margin of the Ouse, and other streams, are verdant and luxuriant from the frequent overflows—the land producing every year never failing crops of hay and after-grass without the aid of manure. But the most singular geological feature of Bedfordshire is the belt of sand extending across the county, from Leighton Buzzard on the south-west to Potton on the north-east—its length being twenty-five miles, its breadth varying from three to five: this tract, after deducting the loam and clay abounding in the hollows and around the bases of the sandy hills, and likewise the peat moss interspersed, will include thirty thousand acres of sand: the colour is mostly a brownish yellow, which tinge is caused by the iron it contains; the patches of black, and others of white and grey, which occur, are so barren as to produce nothing but heath, or *ling*, as it is termed here; and many of the sand hills rise to such a height as to render tillage impracticable: still many portions, hitherto sterile, are yielding to the persevering efforts applied for their cultivation. The villages of Sandy and Gritford, with the vicinity of Potton, are indebted to the rich sandy loams of the low lands for the fame they have attained in the culture of culinary vegetables: the onions of Sandy are excelled only by those of Spain; cucumbers are reared in the open air, and so abundant and excellent are these and other vegetables, that they are in great demand for the London market, and are sent around the country to a distance of sixty miles. Large plots of ground adapted to horticulture are also found adjacent to Biggleswade, Campton, Clophill and Maulden. The agriculture of this county owes much to the zeal, the science and the wealth of the late Francis Duke of Bedford; and the sheep-shearing gatherings of Woburn Abbey were mainly instrumental in effecting, also, a great improvement in the breeding of sheep and cattle. The principal woodlands are contiguous to Amphill, but there are considerable plantations in other parts; his Grace of Bedford has extensive ones around his noble seat; so have Lord St. John, at Melchbourn, and Lord Thynne, at Hawnes—the timber of which is occasionally felled, and sent to the sea-coast by the Ouse. Bedfordshire is ornamented by numerous mansions and parks, the chief of which are Woburn Abbey, the seat of the Duke of Bedford;

Amphill Park, Sir James Park, Kut.; Lutonhoo, the Marquess of Bute's; Melchbourn, Lord St. John's; Okeley House, the Marquess of Tavistock's; Cople House, the Earl of Ludlow's; Brogborough Park, Bletsoe Park and Wrest Park. The CLIMATE has no peculiarities: in the lower parts of the county the temperature is mild, and on the elevated chalky downs the air is bracing and salubrious, but when the north-east winds rush in from Cambridgeshire and Huntingdonshire, their influence is keen and ungenial.

MANUFACTURES, TRADE and MINERALS.—The chief manufactures of this county are thread lace making, the plating of straw, and forming the same into hats and bonnets: the principal seats of the straw trade are Dunstable and Luton, in which are several manufactories, and indeed at all the leading markets great quantities of plat are brought for sale. The lace trade has much declined since the Nottingham machinery has been adapted to the manufacture of this article, and may be said almost to have superseded the patient labours of those who produce this beautiful texture for ornamental dress, from the pillow. Bedfordshire enjoys a trade of some importance in corn, timber and seed; besides a material one derived from the culture of succulent vegetables, as before noticed, to which the soil of whole parishes is appropriated. The MINERAL productions of this county are limited in character, and of inferior importance. A bed of hard limestone follows the course of the Ouzel from Turvey to Bedford, and is quarried for the various purposes of building, &c. At Totternhoe near Dunstable is a considerable quarry of freestone; ironstone has been observed in some pits at Bromham; and small quantities of imperfect coal in the parish of Goldington. Near to Woburn that useful cleansing material, fullers' earth, is obtained in considerable quantities, and is conveyed upon the Grand Junction canal to different places on its line. Independent of the declension of its lace branch, this county experiences but little fluctuation in its trade.

RIVERS and MINERAL SPRINGS, CANALS and RAILWAYS.—The principal rivers are the OUSE and the IVEL. The former rises from two sources, near Middleton Cheney, in Northamptonshire, and enters Bedfordshire a mile below Turvey; at Bedford it becomes navigable, and, pursuing its tortuous course through Huntingdonshire and Cambridgeshire (passing the city of Ely), it enters Norfolk, and falls into the wash at Lynn Regis. The Ivel rises from three sources, at Charlton, Toddington Park and Eversholt—and, flowing north-east, passes the town of Biggleswade, from whence it is navigable to its union with the Ouse at Tempsford. The LEA and the OUZEL also water this county: the former has its source near Houghton Regis, and flowing south-eastward through Luton parish, enters Hertfordshire in its progress towards the Thames. The Ouzel rises near Whipsnade, on the southern confine of the county, and takes a north-westerly course by Leighton Buzzard, forming, for a considerable distance, the boundary line between this county and Buckinghamshire. There are several mineral springs in the county, both chalybeate and saline, but none of them are much frequented—their localities are, the parishes of Barton, Bedford, Bletsoe, Blunham, Bromham, Bushmead, Clapham, Cranfield, Holcutt, Milton-Ernest, Odell, Pertenhall, Risley, Silso and Turvey. CANAL.—The Grand Junction Canal passes close to Leighton Buzzard, to which town and the neighbouring country it affords a cheap medium of traffic with the metropolis and with the north-western counties; and previous to the opening of railways was of considerable importance in the carriage of corn and other agricultural produce, coal, iron, &c. RAILWAYS.—The London and North Western Railway passes a short distance to the west of Leighton Buzzard, and between four and five miles west of Woburn. The Bletchley and Bedford branch runs from the former to the latter town, passing between two and three miles to the west of Amphill. There is likewise a branch from near Leighton Buzzard to Dunstable.

ECCLESIASTICAL and CIVIL DIVISIONS and REPRESENTATION.—Bedfordshire is in the province of Canterbury and diocese of Lincoln, is included in the Norfolk Circuit of the judges, and divided into nine hundreds, namely, Barford, Biggleswade, Clifton, Flitt, Manshead, Redbornestoke, Stodden, Willey and Wixan-tree; these collectively contain one hundred and twenty-four parishes, one county town (Bedford) and ten other market towns. Bedfordshire is represented by four members, in the Imperial legislature—namely, two for the borough of Bedford and two for the county at large; the gentlemen at present sitting for the latter, are Viscount Alford, and Francis Charles Hastings Russell, Esq. The following are polling stations at the election of county members—Amphill, Bedford, Biggleswade, Dunstable, Leighton Buzzard, Luton and Sharnbrook.

POPULATION, &c.—By the returns made to Government at the census of 1841, Bedfordshire contained 52,190 males, and 55,746 females—total 107,936, exhibiting an increase over the returns of 1831 of 12,553 inhabitants. The annual value of Real Property, in this county, as assessed to the Poor Rates, in 1815, amounted to £343,685, and in 1841 to £326,684.

AMPHILL,

WITH THE PARISHES AND VILLAGES OF MILLBROOK, MAULDEN, HOUGHTON-CONQUEST, FLITWICK, CLOPHILL, LIDLINGTON, HAYNES, WILSHAMPSTEAD, MARSTON-MORETAINE, AND CRANFIELD.

AMPHILL, anciently spelt *Antehil*, is a parish in the hundred of Redbornestoke—the market town, a small and neat one, is 45 miles S. N. W. from London, 8 S. from Bedford, 7 E. S. E. from Woburn, and 3 from the Marston station on the Bletchley branch of the London and North Western railway. The town is cheerfully situated on and between two gentle acclivities; the two principal streets are regular, and many of the

houses are good and substantial. Near the centre of the town is an obelisk of Portland stone (in which is a pump), presented to the inhabitants by the Earl of Upper Ossory in 1785. The Duke of Bedford, who is possessor of the manorial rights, occasionally holds courts leet in the moot hall, which is centrally situated, and where likewise the sessions and assizes were formerly held. Amphill is included in the thirty-

sixth circuit of County Court towns, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.; and it is a polling station at the election of members to represent the county. The trade of Ampthill is of a confined character, the only manufactures being those of lace and straw plat, which are by no means extensive.

The parish church of Saint Andrew is a cruciform structure, partaking of the decorated and later styles of English architecture, with a square embattled tower rising from the centre: the living is a rectory, in the gift of the Crown. There are places of worship for Independents, the Society of Friends and Wesleyan Methodists. At a short distance from the town are some almshouses, liberally endowed by Mr. John Cross in 1690, for twelve poor men and four women; the Bishop of Lincoln and the vice-chancellor of Oxford are the visitors. There is also a clauity school, endowed by Mrs. Sarah Emery in 1691, for twenty boys and twenty-four girls; and Ampthill annually receives a portion of Mr. Arthur Whicheley's legacy for apprenticing poor children. The chief object of attraction in the neighbourhood is the seat of the Duke of Bedford (now the residence of Sir James Parke), delightfully situate about half a mile from the town, and commanding an extensive view of the fertile vale of Bedford. The park, which is open to the public, is admired for its interesting diversity of scenery, and for its majestic and venerable oaks, clothed with rich and umbrageous foliage; near the centre of the park is an oak, which, according to the inscription on it, has existed one thousand and twelve years. An avenue, planted on either side by lime trees, which by meeting at the top, form a haudsome arch, is a most inviting walk. At this place was formerly a castle or palace, long since demolished, in which Katherine of Arragon, one of the unfortunate wives of Henry VIII, resided during the period her unjust divorce was in agitation, and near the site of the palace stands a gothic cross, erected in 1773 by the late Lord Ossory, with an inscription by Horace Walpole, Earl of Orford, in commemoration of the unjust treatment of that injured princess. The market is held on Thursday; and the fairs May 4th and November 30th for cattle, and September 29th for hiring servants. The parish of Ampthill contained, in 1831, 1,688 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,001.

One mile from Ampthill, is the parish of MILBROOK. The church of Saint Michael stands on a hill, beneath which is the village: the living is a rectory, in the patronage of the Crown. The population of this, and of the following parishes, is stated after the notice of Cranfield.

MAULDEN village is one and a half mile from Ampthill. The parish church of Saint Mary was repaired some few years since, and the chancel beautified by the rector. Adjoining the church is a mausoleum, erected by the Earl of Elgin, in 1657, to the memory of his Countess; the centre is occupied by an oval sarcophagus, from which rises the figure of the lady in white marble: beneath the mausoleum is the burial place of the noble family of Ailesbury. The living of Maulden is a rectory, in the patronage of the Marquess of Ailesbury. There is a place of worship for Baptists, and a Sunday school.

HOUGHTON-CONQUEST is a village, two miles and a half N. N. E. from Ampthill. This place derives its adjunct from the ancient family of Conquest, lords of

the manor prior to the thirteenth century. The parish church of All Saints, contains several monuments of that family, and one to Thomas Archer, a former rector of the parish and chaplain to James I; his figure is represented in canonicals, in his pulpit, with his book and cushion before him; he died in 1629: the living is a rectory, in the appointment of Saint John's college, Cambridge. A free-school and almshouses were founded here by Sir Francis Clerke.

FLITWICK village, three miles south from Ampthill, contains a church which was formerly the chapel to a monastery or cell to Dunstable priory, erected by Philip de Sannerville, in 1170: the benefice is a vicarage, in the gift of the Duke of Bedford.

CLOPILL is a parish in the hundred of Flitt—the village is three and a half miles east from Ampthill; and the parish church, an ancient gothic structure, stands nearly a mile from the village: the living is in the patronage of the Earl de Grey. In the village is a good school, in which one hundred and thirty boys are instructed on Dr. Bell's system; and there is another school in which ninety girls are taught.

The village of LIDLINGTON, about three and a half miles west of Ampthill, contains its parish church of All Saints (rebuilt in 1809), and a Methodist chapel. The living of Lidlington is a vicarage, in the gift of the Duke of Bedford. A charity, by means of which six poor men and women are clothed, and a school wherein a limited number of boys are instructed, are in the parish.

HAYNES or *Haenes* parish is about four miles from Ampthill, in the hundred of Flitt. Haynes House, the superb mansion of Lord John Thynne, is in this parish; and the church of Haynes is the burial place of that noble family. The patronage of this living, which is a vicarage, belongs to Sir George Osborn.

WILSHAMPSTEAD is an inconsiderable village, four miles N. by E. from Ampthill, containing an ancient church, a chapel for Methodists, and a charity school with a small endowment. The church is dedicated to All Saints: the living is a vicarage, in the presentation of Lord John Thynne.

MARSTON-MORETAINE, a parish and village—the latter formerly a market and fair town, is four miles N. W. from Ampthill. The parish church of Saint Mary, is in the later style of English architecture, with a square and massive tower detached from the main building: there are some ancient monumental brasses in the chancel, besides a handsome altar-tomb and other memorials to the family of Snagg. The living is a rectory, in the presentation of the Master and Fellows of Saint John's college, Cambridge.

CRANFIELD is a village, about six miles N. W. from Ampthill. The church is an ancient building, dedicated to Saint Peter and Saint Paul: the living is a rectory, in the patronage of the Rev. James Beard. There are almshouses for three poor widows. Cranfield gives the inferior title of Baron to the Duke of Dorset.

POPULATION, &c.—The foregoing parishes are all of an agricultural character, and possess little or no interest but that connected with the land. MILBROOK, MAULDEN, HOUGHTON-CONQUEST, FLITWICK, LIDLINGTON, WILSHAMPSTEAD, MARSTON-MORETAINE and CRANFIELD are all in the hundred of Redborne-stoke, their population respectively (in rotation) in 1841, was 462, 1,330, 746, 693, 926, 763, 1,150, 1,371. Clophill and Haynes are in Flitt hundred—their population, at the same period, was 1,066, and 913.

**POST OFFICE,** Market place, AMPTHILL, Ann Shaw, *Post Mistress*.—Letters from LONDON and all parts arrive every morning at a quarter before seven, and afternoon at half-past two, and are despatched at twenty minutes past nine in the morning and seven in the evening.

**BEDFORD,**

WITH THE PARISHES AND VILLAGES OF ELSTOW, GOLDINGTON, CARDINGTON, BIDDENHAM, CLAPHAM, BROMHAM, KEMPSTON, OAKLEY, STEVINGTON, WOOTTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**BEDFORD** is a borough both corporate and parliamentary, having separate jurisdiction; it is the county town and the most considerable in the shire, both as respects size and population; situated 51 miles N. from London (63 by *rail*): it is connected with the London and North Western railway by means of the Bletchley branch, and thus a communication is opened up by rail with the metropolis and also the Northern districts. The town, which is seated in the midst of the rich tract of land called 'the Vale of Bedford,' extends along both banks of the river Ouse, which is crossed by an elegant stone bridge of five arches, constructed in 1813; its predecessor was venerable, both in aspect and years. The principal street is a mile in length, intersected by smaller ones, at right angles, and all are well paved and gas-lighted. Great improvements have been effected during the last few years in new buildings and otherwise—among the latter the New Corn Exchange—handsome and commodious, situated on Market hill, stands conspicuous. Bedford is a place of respectable trade, but in manufactures circumscribed, the making of pillow lace being the principal branch. Bricks and tiles are made in considerable quantities, and much lime is burnt in the neighbourhood. There are two iron and brass foundries, several corn mills, maltings and breweries, and a tolerable trade is carried on in coal and timber by river carriage—the Ouse being navigable for barges from hence to Lynn, on the German Ocean. There are some good inns here; the 'George,' in High street, is an excellent commercial house, and posting establishment.

Bedford was incorporated in the 23rd of Edward I. under the title of 'the Borough and Town of Bedford;' at which period the elective franchise was bestowed, and it then, as now, returned two members; the present are, Henry Stuart, Esq. Kempston, in this county, and 18, Hill street, Berkeley square, London; and Sir Harry Verney, Bart. Claydon Hall, and 9, St. James' place, London. A charter of incorporation was granted to Bedford by Charles II, and under this the borough was governed until the Municipal Act, passed in 1835, vested the jurisdiction in a mayor, six aldermen and eighteen councillors, with a town clerk and assistant officers—the corporate body being styled 'the Mayor and Burgesses of the town of Bedford;' the same act divided the town into two wards, and granted to it a commission of the peace. The borough magistrates have jurisdiction of all criminal offences committed within the town and borough. The assizes are held in Lent and midsummer in the shire hall, as are the quarter sessions for the town and county, and a County Court—the latter is held monthly under the new act (passed August, 1846), for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. At the coronation of James II, in 1685, the Earl of Exeter, Sir George Blundel, and Thomas Snags, Esq. 'as seised of several parts of the barony of Bedford, respectively claimed to execute the office of almoner; and claimed, as the fees of that office, to have the silver alms-basin, and the distribution of all the alms therein, and of the cloth spread for their majesties to walk on, as also the fine linen towel and a tun of wine: the king appointed the *pro hac vice*,

with a *salvo jure* to the other two claimants; but the silver dish, and the cloth from the throne to the west door of the abbey, only were allowed as fees.' The barony of Bedford is now possessed jointly by the Duke of Bedford, the Marquess of Exeter, and William Henry Whitbread, Esq.

The five parishes into which the town is divided are, Saint Paul's, in the patronage of Lord John Thynne; Saint Cuthbert's and Saint Peter's Martin, in the gift of the Crown; Saint Mary's, in the presentation of the Bishop of Lincoln; and Saint John's, in the patronage of the corporation: the livings are all rectories, except that of Saint Paul's, which is a vicarage, to which Trinity district church is annexed. The church of Saint Paul is a capacious and venerable structure, with an octagonal spire springing from a noble tower: the chancel encloses an altar-tomb, with a representation of Sir William Harpur and his lady in brass-work. The old stone pulpit has been replaced by one of oak, and the library has been incorporated with that of the new county. The church of Saint Mary, is in the later style of English architecture, with a plain square tower. Saint John's church is a neat structure, with a handsome modernized tower. Saint Peter's Martin is an ancient edifice, with a tower, and a beautiful Norman arch at the southern entrance. There are places of worship for various religions denominations, of which a list is appended to the Directory, with their situations and ministers. In the vestry of the Baptist chapel is the chair once occupied by John Bunyan, and over it an original portrait of this celebrated author, who officiated as the minister: his allegory of 'The Pilgrim's Progress' was written during his twelve years' incarceration in the gaol of this town, in the *tolerant* reign of the second Charles, for the heinous crime, in those days, of preaching and 'holding conventicles'; his confinement was, however, occasionally intermitted by his more humane gaoler, who sometimes allowed his prisoner to depart on his parole of honour for several days together—it is needless to add that his parole was never violated. A new and spacious chapel has recently been erected on the site of the venerated old meeting-house, at a cost of nearly £4,000, and capable of holding a congregation of twelve hundred. The Moravian community settled here in 1745; their domicile is well deserving the stranger's inspection: the higher branches of needlework are beautifully executed; the school attached to the establishment is under admirable regulations, both for moral discipline and high attainments. The charities of Bedford are exceedingly numerous; but those of an educational character are beyond all others, extensive and important—it being computed that at least fourteen hundred children daily receive gratuitous education, and are furnished with every school requisite. The principal scholastic establishment is the 'grammar and mathematical school,' founded by Sir William Harpur, a native of this town, and in 1561 lord mayor of London; the school premises were rebuilt in 1767, and a statue of the founder placed in the front. The revenue of this school, at the period of its foundation, did not exceed £180.—whereas it now realizes upwards of £13,000, per annum; the appropriation of these funds is regulated by various acts of parliament. The masters are of the most respectable and learned class, and their salaries are commensurate with their talent, and the objects to be attained by the establishment. There are eight scholarships, of £80 each, that can be held four years, in either of the universities of Oxford, Cambridge or Dublin; six are restricted to the sons of inhabitants of Bedford—the other two are open to all on the foundation: the Warden and Fellows of New College, Oxford, appoint the master and ushers; the corporation and eighteen trustees are the managers. Besides the education of youth and the placing of others as apprentices, the bestowing of marriage portions upon honest and virtuous maidens is not the least interesting feature amongst the views of the benevolent founder. Supported by the funds of this excellent charity are an English school, in which is taught Latin; a preparatory and commercial school, a girls' school, a hospital for fifty poor boys and girls, and almshouses for sixty-six decayed housekeepers, besides a fund distributed amongst other poor persons. The trustees of the charity have erected a magnificent pile of building, in the later style of English architec-

ture, with a tower of considerable height in the centre: this erection, which adjoins the ancient grammar school, contains the various schools, hospital for the children, house for the clerk, and apartments for holding meetings of the trustees. The house of industry has lately been appropriated to the use of the forty-four parishes which comprise the 'Bedford Union.' For the erudite of Bedford, and the general reader, there are libraries and news rooms, and a literary and scientific institution. The principal public buildings exclusive of those for divine worship are, a handsome shire hall, the county lunatic asylum, a female penitentiary, the town and county gaol, the new corn exchange before mentioned, and the county infirmary; towards the erection of the last named the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq. contributed the munificent sum of £10,000., and the Marquess of Tavistock presented £2,000 towards its enlargement.

Contiguous to St. Paul's church is an ancient building, conjectured to have been one of the prebendal houses mentioned by Leland. A short mile west of the town are the remains of Caldwell Priory, founded in the reign of King John; and a mile east, at Newenham, are the more considerable fragments of a priory founded by Simon Beauchamp, in the time of Henry II, for black canons; but the original site was Bedford, from whence it was removed. This town gives the title of Duke to the noble family of Russell, and has been the residence of some eminent individuals—Howard the philanthropist, resided at Cardington, as did the late Samuel Whitbread, Esq. In 1818 died in this town, aged 106, Mr. Philip Thompson, who a few months before had followed his wife to the grave, with whom he had lived happily upwards of seventy years; Mr. Thompson had been visited by many of the nobility, and even by royalty—by several of the former he was solicited to sit for his picture. With the gratification imbibed from pleasing views and a fertile country, this neighbourhood conjoins other attractions, both modern and ancient:—Oakley House, the beautiful seat of the Duke of Bedford, is but three miles distant; the ruins of Newenham abbey—those of Elstow munnery—and the site of the once highly prized castle of Bedford, which is still to be traced, presents subjects of interest with the admirers of fine scenery, and for the contemplation of the antiquary. The castle, in early days, was frequently the scene of bloodshed, and was at length demolished by Henry III. A monastery also existed here at a very remote period, in a chapel of which was interred Offa King of Mercia; but the river Ouse undermined the fabric, and engulfed both the chapel and the royal tomb. The market days are Monday, chiefly for hogs, and Saturday, for general commodities. Fairs the first Tuesday in Lent, April 21st, July 6th, August 21st, October 12th, and December 19th; these fairs are principally for cattle, except that held on the 6th of July, which is likewise a considerable one for wool. The borough of Bedford (which comprises the several parishes before named), contained, in 1831, 6,959 inhabitants, and in 1841, 9,178—the population at the present time (1850), probably amounts to 11,000.

ELSTOW, or *Elvestow*, a village nearly 2 miles s. from Bedford, was the birth-place of the celebrated and pious John Bunyan, before mentioned. The parish church of Saint Mary and Saint Helen, is chiefly in the Norman style of architecture, and contains several monuments of considerable antiquity: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Whitbread family. There are places of worship for Baptists and Independents. Fairs are held on the 15th and 16th May, and 5th and 6th November, chiefly for cattle. The *population* of this and of the following parishes is stated after the notice of WOOTTON.

GOLDINGTON village is 2 miles n. e. of Bedford. The church is dedicated to St. Mary: the living is a vicarage in the presentation of the Duke of Bedford. A Sunday school, and a chapel for Independents, are in the village.

CARDINGTON village is about 2½ miles s. e. from Bedford. The parish church of Saint Mary, contains several ancient monuments; also a mural tablet to the memory of the great philanthropist, John Howard, who resided some years in this parish; and there is a superb monument, by Bacon, erected in 1799, to the memory of Samuel Whitbread, Esq. The living is a discharged vicarage, in the gift of the Master and Fellows of Trinity College, Cambridge.

BIDDENHAM, two miles west of Bedford—CLAPHAM, the like distance north—and BROMHAM, three miles west by north, are inconsiderable villages and parishes in the hundred of Willey; they have each their parish church, but contain nothing worthy of particular observation.

KEMPSTON, a considerable village, is three miles north-west of Bedford. The church dedicated to All Saints, is a small unpretending building; the present incumbent, who is also patron of the living, is the Rev. John Hamilton Williams. Near the church is a school conducted on Dr. Bell's system; and within the parish, in a delightful situation, environed by grounds and gardens, is 'Springfield House,' an ably-conducted private lunatic asylum.

OAKLEY is a neat village pleasantly situated about three and a half miles N. W. from Bedford, near to the Ouse, on the banks of which river also stands Oakley Villa, the seat of the Duke of Bedford. The parish church of Saint Mary contains an ancient altar-tomb and effigy in robes of the family of Reynes: the living is a vicarage in the patronage of the Provost and Fellows of Eton College.

About a mile and a half west of Oakley is the village of STEVINGTON. The church of Saint Mary, contains a monumental brass of a knight in armour, with the date 1422: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Duke of Bedford. In the centre of the village is an ancient cross, with an ascent of steps. There are almshouses, endowed by Robert Barringer, in the year 1630, for five indigent persons.

WOOTTON is rather a populous village, 5 miles S. W. from Bedford. The parish church of Saint Mary, contains a number of monuments to members of the Monoux family: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Rev. John Jenkin, the present incumbent.

POPULATION, &c.—The foregoing are all agricultural parishes; ELSTOW, KEMPSTON and WOOTTON are in Redbornestoke hundred—their population respectively in 1841, was 562, 1,699 and 1,106. GOLDINGTON is in the hundred of Barford—population 509. CARDINGTON in Wixhamtree hundred contained, 1,466. BIDDENHAM, BROMHAM, and STEVINGTON, are in Willey hundred—their population was 345, 314 and 602. CLAPHAM and OAKLEY are in Stodden hundred, and contained 370, and 561 inhabitants respectively.

**BIGGLESWADE AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

**BIGGLESWADE** is a parish in the hundred of its name—the market town is 45 miles N.W. from London, 20 S.W. from Cambridge, and 11 S.E. from Bedford; situated upon the river Ivel, which was made navigable from the town to its junction with the Ouse in 1758, and up the stream to Shefford in 1823. The Great Northern railway includes Biggleswade in its route, and here it is intended to erect a first class station for the line. The town is surrounded by garden grounds, the produce of which forms a profitable branch of trade with the large provincial towns around, and extends even to the metropolis. In ancient records this place is called 'the Borough and Forcign of Bykleswade,' or *Bicheleswade*; but the derivation of its name is lost in obscurity. The site of the Roman station, *Chesterfield*, and that of the city of *Salena*, spoken of by Ptolemy and Camden, are contiguous to the town;

Roman coins, urns, &c. are frequently dug or ploughed up; and 'barrows' or *tumuli* are still to be seen on the adjacent common. The neighbourhood of Biggleswade is the residence of some families of distinction; and the local trade of the town, and the degree of prosperity it enjoys, have been essentially promoted by the extended navigation and the excellent roads. Some parts of this town have a very ancient aspect; those more modern may be said to owe their present appearance chiefly to the calamity of a fire, in 1785, which destroyed one hundred and twenty-five dwellings, and the only meeting house then in Biggleswade—that of the Baptists, who, however, in the same year erected another edifice. Connected with the town is a well constructed building, in London road, for the several parishes forming the Biggleswade Union. A charter for a market, also defining the municipal government of the town, was

conferred by Edward III; another was obtained from Charles II, under which certain tolls are payable. Biggleswade is a bailiwick and nominally governed by a bailiff, who is appointed at the court leet of Peter Andley Lovell, Esq. the lord of the manor. The county assesses have occasionally been held here; and likewise the petty sessions for the hundreds of Biggleswade, Clifton and Wixamtree; and the town is included in the 36th circuit of towns under the County Court Act, passed in 1846 for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20—this court sits monthly in the town hall. The corn and malt trade is extensive here, and the barley market was formerly considered one of the best and most abundantly supplied in England; but since the practice of selling grain by sample, instead of by pitch, has become so universal, the benefits arising to the town have been materially diminished. The only manufactures by which the less opulent classes are employed are those of lace and straw plat, but neither are so extensive as formerly. The land in the immediate vicinity of the town is flat, but exceedingly fertile; and on one side the sameness is broken by the Sandy and Warden hills, perennially covered with fine firs and evergreens, which, as viewed from the town, have a pleasing effect.

The parish church of Saint Andrew, erected about the year 1230, was originally collegiate: it is a prebendary, and still enjoys its own peculiar ecclesiastical jurisdiction: the Chancellor of Lincoln has the patronage of the benefice, and the Rev. Jos. Douton, M.A. is the present incumbent. There are two places of worship for Baptists and one for Wesleyan Methodists; schools upon the British and National plans, and a free school, moderately endowed by Edward Peake, Esq. in 1555, whose bounty has since been augmented by a descendant of the celebrated Sir John Cotton. A mechanics' institute has lately been successfully established, with classes for mutual improvement—and lectures are delivered occasionally before the members at stated intervals in the town-hall. The market, held on Wednesday, is well supplied with grain and other necessary commodities; also straw plat, for which latter article there is another market on Saturday, attended almost exclusively by females. Fairs February 14th, Saturday in Easter week, Whit-Monday, and November 8th (the latter popularly denominated 'wet-shod fair'); they are all for cattle of every description. The parish of Biggleswade, with the dependent hamlets of HOLME and STRATTON, contained, by the returns for 1831, 3,226 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,807.

## DUNSTABLE,

WITH THE VILLAGE OF HOUGHTON-REGIS AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**DUNSTABLE** is a parish in the hundred of Manshead—the market town is 33 miles S. W. by S. from London, 20 S. from Bedford, and 8 S.E. from Leighton Buzzard—the last named a station on the London and North-Western Railway, to which line and station there is a branch from this town. Dunstable is seated near the entrance of the Chiltern hills, on the great thoroughfare to the north and north-western counties, from which advantageous position it derived, previous to the opening of the great railway line, before mentioned, a large share of prosperity. The town is of great antiquity, and was of importance in the days of the Romans. Henry I built a royal mansion in its vicinity, called Kingsbury, the site of which is now occupied by a good modern house; but the glory of Dunstable was its once celebrated priory—of which nothing remains but the part occupied as the parish church. This priory was the scene of the iniquitous proceedings against Queen Katherine, and where her sentence of disinheritance from Henry VIII was pronounced. Dunstable has been the residence of, and place visited by several of our monarchs. In 1215 King John lay at this place on his journey towards the north: Henry III frequently visited the priory; and in the year 1247 that sovereign, whilst sojourning here with his queen, prince Edward and the princess Margaret, was presented with a gilt cup, and the prince and princess with a gold buckle each. In 1290 the corpse of Queen Eleanor was deposited one night at the priory; a proper spot was selected for the erection of a cross, which was subsequently built, and remained standing until 1643, when it was destroyed by the troops under the Earl of Essex. In 1341 a grand tournament was held here, at which Edward III and his queen were present. Henry VI visited this place in 1457, as did Queen Elizabeth in 1572, when proceeding northward. The town and neighbourhood present many objects of interest to the antiquary and virtuoso. The venerable church, and its many fine monuments, form peculiar objects of attraction; and the vestiges of Roman remains around are numerous and well defined. The ruins of the ancient castle, fosse and citadel of Totternhoe, within three miles' distance, are as remarkable as any in the kingdom; whilst the beautiful and extensive prospect from the downs (embracing the railroad), together with the extraordinary excavations at Chalk-hill, present features of no ordinary interest. Dunstable at one period returned two members to parliament, and was incorporated;

its government is now vested in a high constable. The queen is lady of the manor, and the Duke of Bedford holds courts leet as her lessee. Dunstable is a polling station at the election of county members; and it is included in the Luton circuit of towns under the new act (passed August, 1846), for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. The straw plat and bonnet manufacture forms the chief trade of the town, and in this business a great number of females are employed; whiting is also manufactured in considerable quantities, and there are some millings, and corn mills. At Totternhoe, two miles distant, is a valuable stone quarry, from the produce of which Dunstable priory and church were built. The 'Ousel,' a large pond of spring water, is singularly spread upon the very summit of the downs, three miles distant; it is about thirty feet in diameter, and is never dry, even in the most parching seasons. The Grand Junction canal, which passes about five miles hence, might be rendered beneficial to the town, at no great expense, by a cut from it to the foot of the downs, two miles off. Dunstable still maintains its character with the epicure for its larks, and multitudes of these delightful warblers are yearly sacrificed to pamper his unquenching appetite; the delicate morsel is deliciously cooked at the principal inns: Bingley, in his 'Animal Biography,' says that as many as 4,000 dozens of larks have been caught, in the country around Dunstable, between the months of September and February.

The parish church of Saint Peter is in the Norman style—the ancient priory, of which it is a portion, having been erected about seven hundred years ago: the living is a rectory, in the gift of the Crown; the Rev. Frederick Hose is the present incumbent. Edward Burr, Esq. of this town, possesses a very beautiful and rather large model of this church, well worth inspection. The Baptists have two chapels, and the Wesleyan Methodists one. There are several almshouses for the aged poor, besides an establishment called 'the Maiden Ladies' House,' built and endowed in 1743 for respectable females in reduced circumstances, pursuant to the will of Mrs. Mashe: the number on the foundation is limited to six; they enjoy respectively £20 a year each, with a good tenement; none, however, are eligible for admission but such as possess £10 per annum. A free school was erected here in 1715, called 'Ashton, Carl and Ayncombe's Free School.' The market is held on Wednesday, and the fairs on Ash-Wednesday, May 22nd,

August 12th, and November 12th, for horses, cattle, sheep, &c. The parish of Dunstable contained, in 1831, 2,117 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,582—in 1850 a local authority gave to the parish a population of 3,300.

HOUGHTON-REGIS is a parish in the same hundred as Dunstable—the village being situated about one mile and a half north from that town. Two springs, tributary to the Ouse, rise in this parish. The parish church of

All Saints' contains an ancient and handsome monument, with a highly decorated arch, beneath which is the figure of a man in armour: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Duke of Bedford; the Rev. William Wilson is the present incumbent. The Baptists and the Wesleyan Methodists have a chapel each, and there is a free-school for twenty boys. Population of the parish, in 1831, 1,424; in 1841, 1,661.

## HARROLD,

WITH THE PARISHES AND VILLAGES OF CARLTON, CHELLINGTON, PAVENHAM, ODELL, FELMERSHAM, TURVEY, SHARNBROOK, SOULDROP, BLETSOE, KEYSOE, TILBROOK, PERTENHALL, MELCHBOURN, RISLEY, NETHER DEAN AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**HARROLD** is a parish in the hundred of Willey—the market town, a small one, is 60 miles N. N. W. from London, 9 N. W. from Bedford, and 5 N. N. E. from Olney (Bucks.); situated on the banks of the Ouse, in a fertile and well cultivated part of the county. The river is crossed by a bridge with a long causeway, a peculiarity observable with many of the bridges that beset the Ouse. The only article manufactured here is lace, which gives employment to a few of the female inhabitants. The parish church of All Saints is a handsome structure, with a fine tower and spire; the church contains several memorials to the Boteleys and Alstons, and a monument (with her bust) of the lady Joliffe, who founded six almshouses for as many poor widows. The living of Harrold is a vicarage, in the patronage of Earl de Grey. Harrold Hall, the seat of Major Richard Magenit, is pleasantly situated on the banks of the Ouse, and commands a fine view of the surrounding country. The market (by prescription), held on Tuesday, is little more than nominal; fairs, the Tuesday before May-day (o. s.), July 6th and October 11th, for cattle and pedlary. The parish contained, in 1831, 995 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,007.

**CARLTON**, one mile from Harrold—**CHELLINGTON**, an adjoining parish—**PAVENHAM**, about two miles from the latter—and **ODELL**, rather more than a mile from Harrold, contain little meriting particular notice; they have each their parish church. Odell, however, may be considered an exception, as containing Odell Castle, the residence of the Rev. Adam Brent; behind it is 'Odell Great Wood,' one of the finest and richest wooded ennuences in the county. The parish church of All Saints is a handsome structure: the living is a rectory. The population of these parishes, and the following ones, is stated after the notice of DEAN.

About two miles and a half from Chellington is the village of **FELMERSHAM**, situated on the river Ouse, over which is a stone bridge. The parish church of Saint Mary, externally one of the handsomest in the county, is cruciform, with a tower rising from the centre, supported by four noble arches; and the west end of the church exhibits a fine specimen of the earliest Gothic style. Amongst the monuments that give an interest to its interior is a tablet to the memory of a lady (the daughter of the late Mr. Pain), who was shipwrecked on her passage to England: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Master and Fellows of Trinity College, Cambridge.

**TURVEY** is a considerable village, three miles S. from Harrold, situated on the borders of Buckinghamshire. The church of All Saints, is a very neat edifice—the interior, indeed, may be pronounced beautiful: it exhibits numerous monuments, some of which are of high antiquity; those to the memory of the noble family of Mordaunt are eminently deserving of notice. The living is a rectory, in the patronage of T. C. Higgins, Esq. of Turvey House. There is a well conducted school here, chiefly supported by Charles Lonquet Higgins, Esq. of Turvey Abbey. The school premises, recently erected at an expense of near £2,000., contributed chiefly by Mr. Higgins, are handsome and commodious.

**SHARNBROOK** is a handsome village, between three and four miles N. E. from Harrold. There are some beautiful seats in this parish, which is watered by the Ouse. The parish church of Saint Peter, is an elegant Gothic edifice, with a fine tower surmounted by a spire; the interior is decorated with monuments to the families of Boteler and Antonie: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Crown. Sharnbrook is a polling station at the election of members to represent the county in parliament.

**SOULDROP** is a village, rather more than two miles N. N. W. from Sharnbrook, situated near to the border of the county, on the road to Higham Ferrars, in Northamptonshire, and on lofty ground, commanding extensive prospects: from the summit of the spire of Souldrop church (a pre-eminent point in trigonomet-

rical survey, and where a stage for observation was constructed), upwards of fifty churches, it is asserted, can be distinctly counted. The parish church of All Saints has been rebuilt, but the ancient steeple remains: the living is a discharged rectory, united to that of Knotting.

**BLETSOE** is a village, about 4 miles E. from Harrold; situated on the road to Higham Ferrars. This manor is very ancient, having belonged to Mabel Pats-hull, who founded the monastery of grey friars of Bedford in 1327; and the parish was the birth place of the daughter of Beaufort Duke of Somerset, wife of Edmund Tudor, Earl of Richmond, and mother of Henry VII; she was the founder of St. John's and Christ's colleges at Cambridge. The parish church of Saint Mary is a very neat building, and contains several ancient and interesting monuments, particularly those to the noble family of St. John, and one to Frances Countess of Bolingbroke, &c.: the living is a rectory, in the presentation of Lord St. John.

**KEYSOE** is a rural village, about six miles N. N. E. from Bletsoe and nine N. from Bedford; situated about two miles and a half from the Huntingdon border. The church of Saint Mary is a neat edifice with a tower, from the summit of which springs a lofty spire, of fine proportions, forming a conspicuous object for many miles round: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Master and Fellows of Trinity College, Cambridge.

About four miles N. from Keysoe, also on the borders of Huntingdonshire, is the village of **TILBROOK**. The parish church of All Saints has a tower and spire of considerable altitude; the interior is enriched with a beautiful screen, ornamented with gilt tracery: the living is a rectory, in the patronage of Lord St. John.

**PERTENHALL** village is about two and a half miles N. from Keysoe and somewhat less than that distance S. W. by S. from Kimbolton (Huntingdonshire.) Formerly a preceptory of the Knights Templars was established here, of which only the site, surrounded with a moat, is now remaining. The church is dedicated to Saint Peter and Saint Paul: the living is a rectory. An establishment of the Moravians is located in this parish.

**MELCHBOURN** is a small village, about five miles S. by W. from Tilbrook and 12 north from Bedford; situated about two miles from the Northamptonshire border. The church of Saint Mary contains a monument to the Honble. Colonel George St. John, who, with his lady and four children, perished at sea, on their passage from India to Europe: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Lord St. John, whose seat, Melchbourn Park, is one of the handsomest in Bedfordshire. Leland, the historian and antiquary, was a native of this parish.

**RISLEY** village is about 2 miles S. from Melchbourn and 5 S. W. by W. from Kimbolton (Huntingdonshire.) The parish church of All Saints is a neat building, with a tower: the living, a vicarage, is in the same patronage as that of Melchbourn. A fair is held on Shrove-Tuesday.

**NETHER DEAN** a parish, and **UPPER DEAN** a hamlet in that parish, form a respectable village—the parish church of which is about 2 miles N. N. E. from Melchbourn, 4 N. from Risley and the same distance from Kimbolton; situated at almost the extreme northern verge of the county, and near the borders of those of Huntingdon and Northampton. The church is dedicated to All Saints, and the living is a perpetual curacy, to which the Dean and Chapter of Worcester presents.

**POPULATION, &c.**—The parishes described above are all agricultural ones, and possess little if anything of interest besides that connected with the land. The following are in the hundred of Willey; their population, in 1841, was—**CARLTON**, 441; **CHELLINGTON**, 125; **PAVENHAM**, 600; **ODELL**, 501; **FELMERSHAM**, 531; **TURVEY**, 960; **SHARNBROOK**, 849; **SOULDROP**, 332; **BLETSOE**, 420. The following are in Stodden hundred, and their population, at the same period, was—**KEYSOE**, 757; **TILBROOK**, 319; **PERTENHALL**, 420; **MELCHBOURN**, 274; **RISLEY**, 971; **NETHER DEAN**, 540.

**LEIGHTON BUZZARD,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF LINSLADE, HOCKLIFFE AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

LEIGHTON BUZZARD, anciently written *Leighton Beau desert*, is a parish, in the hundred of Manshead and deanery of Dunstable—the market town, respectable and thriving, is 41 miles N. W. from London, 20 s. s. W. from Bedford, 17 s. E. from Buckingham, 10 N. E. from Aylesbury, and 33 E. N. E. from Oxford; situated on the river Ousel, on the borders of Buckinghamshire, on the London and North-Western Railway, for which line Leighton is a first-class station. Some writers accord to this place a degree of consequence in remote ages—they assert it to be the *Lygean* burgh of the Saxon chronicle, which Cuthwulph took from the Britons in 571; indeed it still possesses a relic of considerable antiquity, in the form of a Gothic cross of stone, beautiful even in decay; it stands in the open area of the Market place, and is supposed to have withstood the operations of time, climate and civil turmoil for more than five hundred years—but by whom, or on what occasion it was erected, even tradition does not attempt to reveal: its form is pentagonal, in height thirty-eight feet; the upper story is divided into five niches, each containing a statue; the first is in an episcopal habit; the second represents the Virgin and Jesus; the third appears to be designed for St. John the evangelist, the others are too mutilated to be defined. Lord Leigh is lord of the manor; courts leet and baron are held twice annually. Leighton is a polling station at the election of county members, and it is included in the thirty-sixth circuit of County Court towns, under the act passed 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount, not exceeding £20.—the court sits monthly in the room of the Free school, Church square, Leighton

Buzzard enjoys a considerable trade in corn, timber, seed, iron, &c.: there are also some very extensive maltings, with other establishments in the lime and brick trade; and the making of straw plat and lace furnishes employment to many females. By its proximity, the Grand Junction Canal affords means of conveyance to all parts; and the railway before mentioned supplies an additional convenience of transit—and of consequence has materially conduced to the prosperity and increase of the town.

The parish church of All Saints, is a handsome cruciform structure, principally in the early style of English architecture; it consists of a nave, chancel, two side aisles, two transepts and vestry, with a plain massive tower rising from the intersection, containing a ring of bells, and is surmounted by a much admired octagonal stone spire, one hundred and ninety-three feet in height: the living is in the presentation of the Prebendary of Leighton Buzzard, in Lincoln cathedral. The Society of Friends (a numerous and respectable class in this place) have a meeting house; the Baptists two chapels and the Wesleyan Methodists one. Matthew Wilkes, in 1630, founded almshouses for eight indigent women, and the Honble. Mrs. Leigh, in 1790, endowed a free school here. A spacious and convenient workhouse, capable of accommodating three hundred recipients, has been erected here for the poor of this Union. The market, which is held on Tuesday, is well attended, and abundantly supplied with cattle, corn, lace, straw plat, &c. Fairs, February 5th, the second Tuesday in April, Whit-Tuesday, July 26th, October 24th, and the first Tuesday after the 10th of

December. The parish of Leighton Buzzard comprehends the chapelrys of BILLINGTON, EGGINGTON, HEATH-AND-REACH, and STANDRIDGE, which, with the township of Leighton Buzzard, contained, by the returns rendered in 1831, 5,149 inhabitants, and in 1841, 5,532; of which last number 3,965 were returned for the township.

LINSLADE is a parish, contiguous to that of Leighton Buzzard, but in the hundred of Cottesloe, county of Bucks. In the thirteenth century this place obtained some note from being the resort of pilgrims to a holy well here, and processions were often formed to visit it, until in 1299, they were prohibited by the then Bishop of Lincoln, as furnishing the means of profit and extravagance to the vicar. The village has latterly much increased in population, size and consequence from its proximity to the great railway line, and warehouses have been erected for the deposit of goods, &c. The parish church of Saint Barnabas is a handsome

structure, erected in 1849: the living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the Crown. The Baptists have a neat place of worship, and there is an excellent national school—both lately erected. The grant of a fair and market, to be held here—the former at Lady-day, the latter on Thursday, was made to William de Beauchamp, in 1251, but they have both for ages ceased to be observed. The population of the parish, in 1841, was 883, but it has since greatly increased.

HOCKLIFFE is a parish in the same hundred as Leighton—the village, a small rural one, is 3 miles E. S. E. from that town, and 4 N. W. from Dunstable; situated at the junction of the Northampton road with that of the London and Birmingham, and to be noticed merely as a posting village. The church, dedicated to Saint Nicholas, is in the gothic style; the living is a rectory, united to the vicarage of Chalgrave. There are chapels for Independents and Wesleyan Methodists. Population, in 1841, 420.

## LUTON,

WITH THE VILLAGE OF CADDINGTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

LUTON, a flourishing and respectable market town,  
giving name to the parish in which it lies, in the hun-  
dred of Flitt, is 31 miles s. w. by s. from London, 20  
e. by s. from Bedford, 10 s. from St. Albans (Herts),  
and 5 e. by s. from Dunstable—the last named a sta-  
tion on a branch communicating with the London and  
North-Western Railway, at Leighton. The town is  
seated near to the small river Lea, from which cir-  
cumstance it is said to have been formerly called *Lea-  
town*; others, however, contend that it derives its  
name, 'Luton,' from *Lowtown*, deduced from the low  
position of the place, it being surrounded by gentle  
eminences. Baron Falk de Bient built a castle here,  
in the early part of the thirteenth century; and John  
Lord Wenlock, in the reign of Henry VI, erected a  
sepulchral chapel on the north side of the church, and  
had commenced building a noble mansion at Sum-  
meries (the portico of which is still standing), on the  
opposite hill to Luton Hoo Park, but the battle of  
Tewkesbury, in which he fell, prevented its comple-  
tion. The manufacture of straw plat, may be con-  
sidered the staple of the place, and this branch is car-  
ried on by several houses, on a very extensive scale: that  
of Waller has stood conspicuous in the trade for many  
years. Exclusive of the plat branch, the business  
here is mostly of a retail and general character; and

there are several maltings and corn mills. The grow-  
ing prosperity of the town may be attested, not only  
by the rapid increase in the number of houses, but by  
the taste displayed in the erection of new and the  
alteration of the old buildings. The streets are gas-  
lighted, and an appearance of respectability and  
general improvement are manifest. The town hall  
erected in 1848, in George-street, is a handsome and  
 commodious building, comprising convenient apart-  
ments for the use of the county courts, and savings'  
bank, with rooms for public lectures, concerts, &c.—  
the entire forming a valuable improvement to the  
town. A mechanics' institute has also been formed,  
and is well attended; and a reading and news room,  
also a scientific institution are supported by respectable  
members. The workhouse of the Luton Union, is a  
convenient building situated near the gas works, on  
the Dunstable road: the board of guardians sit here  
every Friday. Luton is governed by a high-constable,  
appointed at the quarter sessions: petty sessions for  
the division are held here; a County Court, for the reco-  
very of debts to any amount not exceeding £20., sits  
monthly at the town hall; and Luton is a polling  
station at the election of members to represent the  
county at large. John Shaw Leigh, Esq. is lord of the  
manor, and also lord paramount of the hundred of Flitt.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a venerable structure, partly in the decorated Norman and partly in the later English style: an embattled tower, constructed of flint and other stones, in chequer work, rises from the western end; at the corners are hexangular turrets, and the arch of the west door is handsomely ornamented with mouldings: the principal object of curiosity in the interior, is the stone font or *baptisterium*, hexagonal in form, inclosed in a lofty frame of gothic arches, terminated by an elegant tabernacle. The living of Luton is a lay rectory and vicarage, in the patronage of John Shaw Leigh, Esq.; the Rev. William McDonall, M. A. is the present incumbent. The Baptists have two chapels for their worship, and the Independents, the Society of Friends, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists have one each. In the national and British schools several hundred children are instructed; mainly by the contributions of the benevolent; and twelve neat cottages, with ample endowments, afford home and comfort to twenty-four aged widows. The summer of 1828 will long be remembered by the inhabitants of this town: on the 8th of July, in that year, it was visited by an alarming inundation, occasioned by a continued and uncommonly heavy fall of rain, which laid many houses under water, and destroyed a considerable amount of property. On the 1st November, 1753, the water of a pond, in an elevated part of the town, was so violently agitated, that it several times overflowed on one side, and ebbed six feet on the other; the day was unusually calm: the great earthquake at Lisbon happened 29th of September, in the same year. About two miles east from the town, upon an eminence in Luton Hoo Park, which was laid out by the celebrated

'Capability Brown,' stands the mansion of John Shaw Leigh, Esq., formerly in the possession of the late Marquess of Bute; this edifice, a few years since, was nearly destroyed by fire, and is now being enlarged and improved by the present owner. The river Lea courses through the park in a very picturesque manner, and forms in its progress two pleasing sheets of water; the largest contains several small islands, exhibiting lovely and thriving plantations, and presenting a most charming prospect. Luton was the birth-place of the Rev. John Pomfret, a great classical scholar, and author of various beautiful poems; he was born in 1688. The market is held on Monday, and is a very large one for corn and straw plat. Fairs the third Mondays in April and October for cattle, and a statute, in September, for hiring servants. Luton parish comprises the hamlets of EAST AND WEST HYDE, LEEGRAVE, LIMBURY-CUM-BISCOTT and STOPSLEY, containing together, with Luton town, in 1831, 5,693 inhabitants, and in 1841, 7,748, of which last number, 5,827 were returned for the township: the population of the entire parish at the present time (1850), is estimated at 10,000 or thereabouts.

CADDINGTON is a parish partly in the hundred of Flit, county of Bedford, and partly in the hundred of Dacorum, county of Herts,—the village being situated about 2 miles s. w. from Luton. Markgate Cell, more particularly noticed in Market Street, is in this parish. The church of Caddington, dedicated to All Saints, is situated in the Bedfordshire part of the parish: the living is a vicarage, in the presentation of the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's, London; the Rev. William Mellard, A.M. is the incumbent. The parish contained, in 1831, 1,563 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,747.

**MARKET-STREET AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

**MARKET-STREET** is a chapelry, comprised within the parishes of Caddington, Flamstead and Studham—partly in the hundred of Dacorum, county of Herts, but chiefly in the hundreds of Plitt and Manshead, county of Bedford; 29 miles n. w. by n. from London, 3½ s. w. by s. from Luton and 8 n. from St. Albans. The name is said to be a corruption of *Mark-yate* or *Mark-gate* street, derived from *Merk* or *Mark*, a boundary, and *yate*, a gate; for, here it is believed was a gate on the *Walling-street* of the Romans. Previous to the opening of the great line of railway, in the neighbourhood, the town derived some advantage from its thoroughfare situation, on the road between London and Birmingham, which the traffic on the rail has now all but extinguished. The manufacture of straw plat, and of that article into hats and bonnets, may now be reckoned as the prevailing branches of industry, furnishing many females here with employment. The place has nothing to boast of itself; but the vicinity is

very respectable, and enlivened by fertile scenery and tasteful residences—Beechwood Park, two miles hence, and Markyate Cell, near to the town, are the most conspicuous: the latter was formerly an extensive establishment for nuns of the Benedictine order, under the Abbey of Saint Alban, founded about 1145; it was rebuilt a few years since, and is now occupied as a family mansion. The chapel of Saint John, at Markyate Cell, is a plain building, erected by John Coppen, Esq. in 1734: the living is a perpetual curacy, in the presentation of Daniel Goodson Adey, Esq.; the Rev. Daniel Adey is the present minister. The Baptists and Wesleyans have a place of worship each; and there are two public schools, one of which is conducted upon the British plan; the other founded about the year 1660. A fair is held here about Michaelmas, the day being regulated by the September fair at Luton. The population returns are made up with the parishes in which Market-Street chapelry is situated.

**POTTON,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF SUTTON, COCKAYNE-HATLEY, EVERTON, SANDY, EYWORTH AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**P**OTTON is a parish in the hundred of Biggleswade—the market town, small and neat, is 49 miles N. by W. from London, 12 E. from Bedford and 4 N. N. E. from Biggleswade; situated on the main road to Wisbeach, beneath gentle eminences, and watered by a small rivulet: it consists of a good market place, with a number of tolerably spacious streets branching from it. The pleasantness of the vicinage is enhanced by a great number of handsome residences, occupied by opulent individuals, who contribute largely to the traders' prosperity. A great portion of the town was destroyed by fire in 1783; since when it has materially improved in appearance, and its modern buildings have assumed a neat and regular character.

The parish church of Saint Mary, and a chapel each for Baptists, Independents and Wesleyan Methodists, are the places of worship. The living of Potton is a vicarage, in the gift of the Crown. There are two public schools—one conducted upon the National plan, the other supported by bequests of Dame Constance Burgoyne, Alexander Atkinson and John Carrier. In 1781 Mr. Mannington, an attorney, died near Potton, aged 110, he was several years under sheriff for the county; and on November 20, 1787, Mrs. Susannah Greenfield died, aged 105—for forty years her food was vegetable, and her drink wine and water. The market, held on Saturday, was formerly a very large one, and although somewhat declined is still a good one for barley, and tolerably well supplied with different descriptions of grain; much straw plat is also exhibited. Fairs, the third Tuesday in January (old style) for horses; the last Tuesday in April, first Tuesday in July, and October 29th, for cattle in general, pedlery, &c. Potton parish contained, in 1831, 1,768 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,781.

The village of SUTTON, one mile south of Potton, is the seat of the knightly family of Burgoyne, its present

owner being Sir John Burgoyne, Bart. The park is highly picturesque, well studded with trees, and the walks are delightful. Tradition says the estate came to this ancient family by grant from John of Gaunt, duke of Lancaster, and conveyed to them by the following lines:

'I, John of Gaunt,  
Do give and do grant,  
To Thomas Burgoyne  
And the heirs of his line,  
The manor of Sutton, Wrestlingworth and Potton,  
To have and to hold, until the world's rotten.'

The roads both to Potton and Biggleswade are excellent. The church is dedicated to All Saints: the living is a rectory, in the presentation of the President and Fellows of St. John's College, Oxford. The population of Sutton and the following parishes, is stated after the notice of Ewworth.

COCKAYNE-HATLEY village is about two miles east from Potton, situated on the borders of Cambridgeshire, and chiefly to be noticed for its very beautiful little church—the interior of which has been fitted up and embellished with consummate taste by the Hon. and Rev. Henry Cockayne Cust (brother of Earl Brownlow), the rector, as well as owner of the village. The pulpit is elaborately carved, and the furniture, which is of rich purple velvet, formed part of the costly materials used at the funeral of George III; the font is also of great elegance, and the cloth of the communion table is magnificently embroidered: the painted windows, the oaken screens and the stalls, with other suitable decorations, impart to this incomparable country church the similitude to a cathedral in miniature.

EVERTON village is two miles N. W. from Potton, situated close to the borders of the counties of Cambridge and Huntingdon—the parish church of Saint Mary, standing in the latter county: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Master and Fellows of Clare Hall, Cambridge. The Rev. John Berridge, well known

as the author of 'The Christian World Unmasked,' was vicar of this benefice for many years. There is a school, conducted upon the national plan, in which about sixty children receive instruction.

Contiguous to Everton parish is that of SANDY, the village being rather more than two miles s.w. from EVERTON, and about four E. from Potton. The church is dedicated to Saint Swin; the benefice is a rectory. The soil around this village is so naturally favourable to the growth of succulent vegetables, that cucumbers can be cultivated in the open air, and the onions are superior to any other produced in this kingdom; both

these productions are sent in large quantities to the London markets. The Great Northern railway, now in progress, will pass through the village.

EYWORTH is an inconsiderable village, about three miles s. e. from Potton. The church of All Saints contains several monuments, some of which are ancient and interesting: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the noble family of Yarborough.

*Population, &c.*—All these parishes are in the hundred of Biggleswade—their population, respectively, in 1841, was, SUTTON, 415; COCKAYNE-HATLEY, 99; EVERTON, 233; SANDY, 1,094; EYWORTH, 128.

**SHEFFORD AND CAMPTON,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF CLIFTON, HENLOW, SOUTHILL, WARDEN AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

SHEFFORD is a small market town and chapelry, in the parish of Campton and hundred of Clifton, 41 miles N.W. from London, 9½ s.e. by s. from Bedford, and 7 N. by w. from Hitchin (Herts); situated on the road between the two last named towns, and about three miles to the East of the Great North of England Railway. Shefford is a clean little place, its streets wide and well paved, and its general aspect indicative of comfort. The three principal streets are entered by two bridges that cross separate branches of the Ivel; these branches form a junction at the eastern end of the town, from whence the river is navigable to Biggleswade, and thence (after falling into the Ouse at Tempsford) to Lynn. The trade is chiefly in corn, timber, coal and iron, transmitted by means of the navigation to and from Lynn; straw plat, also, in the making of which many women and children are employed, is brought in large quantities to the market. The manorial rights are vested in the Crown, and a court leet is held once in two years.

The places of worship are Saint Michael's chapel of ease, and a chapel each for Baptists, Methodists and Roman Catholics. The parish church is at Campton, about two miles hence: in the churchyard lie interred the remains of Robert Bloomfield, author of 'The Farmer's Boy,' and many other beautiful poems, celebrated for their pathos and simplicity; the poet resided many years at Shefford, where he died in August, 1823. The living of Campton is a rectory, in the gift of Sir George Osborne, Bart. The vicarage of Shefford is studded with numerous seats of the noble and the opulent: the most conspicuous are, Chicksand Priory, the seat of Sir George Osborne, Bart.; Southill Park, W. H. Whitbread, Esq.; Wrest Park, the noble family of De Grey; Henlow Grange, Thomas A. Raynsford, Esq.; Hawnes Park, Lord John Thynne, &c. In the

immediate vicinity of Shefford have been discovered numerous Roman relics, many of which, to the antiquary, are highly interesting—including various urns, a quantity of Samian ware, some beautiful glass vessels, two musical instruments, a gold fibula, lamps, &c. together with a number of coins, both bronze and silver; the whole are in the collection of the Fitzwilliam museum, at Cambridge. The market, held on Friday, is principally for agricultural produce and straw plat. Fairs, January 23rd, old Lady-day, May 19th and October 11th, all for cattle. The parish of Campton contained, in 1831, 1 213 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,390; of which last number about 900 belonged to the town of Shefford.

CLIFTON, one mile and a half east from Shefford, gives name to the hundred: the river Ivel runs through the parish. The church of All Saints, contains some ancient monumental brasses, and a beautiful altar-tomb to the memory of Sir Michael Fisher, once lord of the manor: the living is a rectory, in the gift of the Rev. G. J. Olivier. Population of the parish, 865.

HENLOW is a parish and village, in the same hundred as Clifton, one mile south-east therefrom, and about 4 s. by w. from Biggleswade. The church is dedicated to Saint Mary: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Crown. Population of the parish, 776.

SOUTHILL, two miles north of Shefford, contains Southill Park, the beautiful seat of the Whitbread family. The church, which is dedicated to All Saints, contains several monuments to the family of Byng, among which is one to the admiral of that name, who was executed for an alleged professional crime: the living is a discharged vicarage, with that of Old Warden annexed, in the patronage of W. H. Whitbread, Esq. Southill parish, including the hamlets of Broom and STANFORD, contained, in 1841, 1,379 inhabitants.

**SILSOE,**

WITH FLITTON, PULLOXHILL, BARTON AND WESTONING.

**SILSOE** is a hamlet and chapelry in the parish of Flitton, situated midway between Luton and Bedford, ten miles from either place. Silsoe formerly had a market (granted in 1319 to Ralph Fitz-Richard, then lord of the manor), together with a fair, which is still retained, but the market has for a long time been discontinued. West Park, in this parish, is the ancient seat of the Greys; the present Earl De Grey has erected an elegant mansion near the site of the old house, which had fallen into decay: the same nobleman supports a good free-school in the village. The ancient fair is held on the festival of St. Philip and St. James, and another on the 21st September. The population of Silsoe hamlet, in 1841, was 788.

**FLITTON** is a parish in the hundred of Flitt—the township and village is situated about a mile west from Silsoe. The parish church of Saint John the Baptist, contains several monuments, amongst which is a superb altar tomb of marble, with the statues of Henry Earl of Kent and Arabella his countess; another to Henry, father of the Earl; and some others to the memory of different noble families; also a brass figure of Thomas Hill, who died in 1601 at the great age of one hundred and twenty-eight years. The living of Flitton is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Dean and Canons of Christ Church, Oxford; the present incumbent is the Rev. Alfred Browne. The population of Flitton parish, exclusive of Silsoe chapelry, in 1841, was 575.

**PULLOXHILL** is a parish in the same hundred as Silsoe. **POST OFFICE,** SILSOE, Benjamin Carter, *Post Master.*—Letters from all parts arrive at eight in the morning, and are despatched at six in the evening.

Is a parish in the hundred of Manshead—the market town, a very inconsiderable one, is 38 miles n.w. by n. from London, 5 from Woburn and Dunstable, and 4 from the station of the Dunstable branch, on the London and North-Western Railway. The town is seated on an eminence, and openly built; its houses are irregularly disposed, and of ancient appearance. The straw plat manufacture forms the employment of a

great portion of the inhabitants, and is an article of importance in the market here. The parish church of Saint George is commodious and venerable; its exterior abounds with those whimsicalities of ancient sculptors, grotesque figures of monstrous and imaginary animals; the interior incloses some very ancient monuments, on one of which is an epitaph on Lady Maria Wentworth, who died in 1632; the following lines from it exhibit a specimen of the extravagance of the poetical conceits of that age:—

Her soul grew so fast within,  
It broke the outward shell of sin,  
And so was hatched a cherubim.

The living of Toddington is a rectory. The Baptists and the Wesleyan Methodists have each a place of worship here. A hospital was founded in this town, in 1443, by Sir John Broughton, for three poor men and a chaplain; and there are besides three almshouses for ten poor widows. On Cinger Mount, in this neighbourhood, are the remains of the old manor house of Toddington. The market is held on Saturday; and the fairs April 25th, the first Monday in June, September 4th, November 2nd and December 6th, for cattle and Pedlery. The parish contained, in 1831, 1,926 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,925.

**WOBURN,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF ASPLEY-GUISE, HUSBORN CRAWLEY, MILTON BRYANT, RIDGMONT AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**W**OBURN is a parish in the hundred of Manshead—the market town, hand-some and respectable, is 42 miles s. w. by s. from London, 14 s. w. by s. from Bedford, 6 s. from Leighton Buzzard, and 24 s. e. from Northampton; situated near the Bedford and Bleichley branch of the London and North-Western Railway. This place, spelled by Leland, in his Itinerary, *Ouburn*, was, in the year 1724, nearly destroyed by fire; but this circumstance, though distressing to individuals, ultimately proved generally beneficial, as the houses were soon after rebuilt in a more regular and tasteful style. The market house, which stands in the centre of the town, was much improved by Francis Duke of Bedford. The head of the house of Russell is lord of the manor, and as such holds courts annually, or oftener as occasion may require; and the magistrates assemble here every fortnight, in petty session, upon business connected with the hundred. The manufactures of Woburn are lace and straw plat; an extensive trade is also carried on in corn and timber; there are besides several maltings, and in the immediate neighbourhood are considerable pits of that useful article, fullers' earth.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a neat, convenient and handsome structure, while its ivy-clothed walls present a venerable appearance: the tower, which formerly stood detached from the main building, is now united to it, and the Duke of Bedford has surmounted it with a beautiful spire, and furnished the altar with a fine painting of the nativity: the living is a perpetual curacy, the Duke being patron and proprietor. The church contains a curious monument to the Stanton family, consisting of twelve figures in the attitude of prayer, besides several other ancient sepulchral memorials. The other establishments of religious worship, instruction and benevolence, are chapels for Independ-

ents, Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists, a British school and twelve almshouses for poor persons; these charitable institutions are mainly supported by the munificence of the nobleman before mentioned.

The chief object of attraction, in the vicinity of the town, is Woburn Abbey and Park, the superb seat of the noble family of Russell: it occupies the site of a Cistercian Abbey, founded in 1145 by Hugh de Bolbeck, the revenue of which, at the dissolution, was valued at upwards of £400; the site, with a great portion of the lands, was granted by Edward VI, in 1574, to Lord John Russell. The park comes close to the town, and being generously open to the public, affords to the inhabitants delightful walks, amidst scenery remarkably beautiful and diversified. WOBURN HOUSE was almost wholly rebuilt by Flictoft, for John Duke of Bedford, about the middle of the last century. This extensive and magnificent building, situate in the midst of a fine park, occupies four sides of a quadrangle: the west front is of the Ionic order, with an insulated basement; the principal floor, or suite of rooms on this side, consists of a saloon, state bed room, and drawing and dining rooms; the south comprises the library, breakfast and Duke's rooms; the east, the vestibule, servants' offices, &c.; the north includes the Queen's, Prince Albert's rooms, and various other chambers. The gallery exhibits a large and most interesting collection of portraits, whilst numerous other valuable paintings are dispersed in other rooms. In the sculpture gallery is the beautiful antique vase brought to this country by Lord Cawdor; and an ancient sarcophagus of marble, conveyed hither from Ephesus; the group of the graces, by Canova, &c. This mansion has received many improvements and undergone considerable alterations, particularly under Francis Duke of Bedford; the addi-

tional buildings were designed and executed by Mr. Holland. The park is about twelve miles in circumference, surrounded by a wall; it comprises a pleasing variety of hill and dale, and is enriched with peculiarly fine woods of majestic oaks. Winding through the woods, the visiter arrives at 'the Dutches's Shrubbery,' beautifully laid out in the modern taste; leaving which, and riding over the hill, which commands an enchanting and comprehensive prospect, he comes to the evergreen plantation, of about two hundred acres—a charming ride on a fine dry soil, through avenues of all varieties of evergreens, of luxuriant growth, so that the equestrian is sheltered, in the depth of winter, by a continuous canopy of verdure. Queen Elizabeth made a journey to this seat in 1572; and when Charles I visited Woburn in 1645, he reposed at the Abbey. The public day for viewing the Abbey is Friday, from eleven till four, between Lady-day and Michaelmas, and from eleven till three between Michaelmas and Lady-day. The market day at Woburn is Friday. Fairs, January 1st, March 23rd, July 13th and September 25th. The parish of Woburn contained, in 1831, 1,827 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,914.

ASPLEY-GUISE is a parish, in the same hundred as Woburn—the village is pleasantly situated two miles north of that town. Anselm de Guise, in 1267, obtained a charter for a market to be held here on Friday, and a fair at the tide of St. Botolph—both of which have been

discontinued. The parish church of Saint Botolph, contains several monuments of antiquity and interest: the living is a rectory, in the gift of the Duke of Bedford. The parish contains 1,139 inhabitants.

HUSBORN-CRAWLEY, an adjoining parish to Aspley-Guise, contains a village about two and a half miles S. E. from Woburn. The church of Saint Mary Magdalene occupies an elevated site, and has a lofty tower. A handsome canopied monument, with the figures of an armed knight and his lady, is in the church: the living is a discharged vicarage, in the presentation of the Duke of Bedford. Population of the parish 656.

MILTON-BRYANT is a small village, about two miles S. E. from Woburn, situated a little to the north of the road to London. The church is dedicated to Saint Peter: the living is a rectory, in the gift of the Crown. Population, 382.

RIDGMONT village and parish is in the hundred of Redborne-stoke—the village being about three miles N. E. from Woburn. In old records it is written *Rugemont*—i. e. the 'Red Hill,' applicable to its situation and the colour of the soil. The church of All Saints has, within these few years, received addition of sittings, at the expense of the society for building and enlarging churches and chapels: the living is a discharged vicarage, united with Segenhoe. There is a place of worship here for Baptists and a National school. The parish contained, in 1841, 964 inhabitants.

# BUCKINGHAMSHIRE.

**T**HIS is an inland county, bounded on the east by Bedfordshire, Hertfordshire and Middlesex, on the west by Oxfordshire, on the north-west by Northamptonshire, on the north by the latter county and by Bedfordshire, on the south and south-west by Berkshire, and on the south-east by Middlesex. Its length, from north to south, is about forty-five miles, and its greatest breadth, crossing a slip of Hertfordshire (which intersects it on the east) to the extreme of its western side, nearly twenty-three; its circumference is one hundred and thirty-eight miles, containing seven hundred and thirty-eight square miles, or 472,320 statute acres. In size, Buckinghamshire ranks as the thirty-third English county, and the thirty-fourth in population.

**NAME and EARLY HISTORY.**—The present appellation of the county was given to it by the Saxons, and is supposed to be derived from the beech trees which then grew so plentifully in these parts, and were called *Buccum*; or from the abundance of deer that were found in the woods, with which this county was covered, *Buc.* in the Saxon language, signifying a buck or hart. This part of Britain, together with the adjoining counties of Bedford and Hertford, before the invasion of Cæsar, was inhabited by the *Celticuchlanii*, who were, in the opinion of Camden, the ancient *Cassii*; and there are some remains of the name in *Cashio* hundred, and *Cashiobury*, adjoining Watford, in Hertfordshire. By the successes of Aulus Plautius, this county was reduced under the dominion of Claudius Cæsar, and then formed part of *Britannia Prima*; and was afterwards included in the province of *Flavia Cæsariensis*. The Roman station *Magiovinium* is pretty well ascertained to have been within the limits of this county, near Fenny Stratford; its site is called *Auld Fields*, where numerous coins and foundations of buildings have often been discovered. Several Roman roads pass through the county—namely, the *Ikening-street*, along the northern verge of the Chiltern hills; the *Lower Acknell way* runs parallel with it; the *Portway*, in the vicinities of Stone and Hartwell, and faint traces of other roads in different districts. On the complete establishment of the Saxon Heptarchy the county became part of the powerful Mercian kingdom. On the consolidation, under Canute, of the Danish power in England, it was included in the *Dane-lege*, or Danish jurisdiction. During the war between John and the barons, Hanslope Castle, at Castlethorpe, was fortified by its owner, William Mauduit, against the king, but was taken and demolished by Falk de Brent in 1216. Before the period of the Reformation, Buckinghamshire contained twenty-one religious houses, including four Alien priories, one Preceptory of the Knights Hospitaliers, and a College of Bonhommes at Ashbridge, being the only house of that order in England, except one in Wiltshire. There were besides ten hospitals—including that at Newport Pagnell, re-founded by Queen Anne, and the Royal College of Eton founded by Henry. At the commencement of hostilities between Charles and the Parliament, this was one of the first counties whose inhabitants associated on the side of the latter. In June, 1643, a skirmish which took place in Chalgrave Field, in this shire, is rendered mournfully memorable for the loss sustained by the parliamentarians in the death of the patriot Hampden, who there received a wound which proved fatal six days after. Newport Pagnell, in the same year, was garrisoned by the king's troops; and High Wycombe was the scene of a conflict between the opposed forces, in which Prince Rupert was partially successful. In 1644 the king, for some time, made Buckingham his head quarters. In 1646, Borstal House, the only remaining royal garrison in the county, was surrendered to the forces of the Parliament.

**SURFACE, SOIL, PRODUCE, CLIMATE, &c.**—The face of the county is exceedingly varied, the southern parts are occupied by the Chiltern hills and their appendages, and are chiefly composed of chalk, intermixed with flint; but have been rendered productive by the great attention given to the cultivation and improvement of the land. The prolific vale of Aylesbury spreads through the middle of the county, furnishing rich pasturage to vast numbers of cattle, and supporting a continuity of dairy and grazing farms. The more northern parts are diversified with gentle sand-hills, interspersed with pasturage and meadow land, and a small proportion of arable. The country to the north of the Chilterns abounds with pleasing scenery, diversified with hill and dale, prolific corn-fields, meadows, and woodlands. Between Marlow and Henley the scenery is rendered still more charming by the broad and pellucid current of the Thames, and the picturesque boldness of its banks. Among the seats of the landed proprietors, those most distinguished are, Stow, the magnificent residence of the Duke of Buckingham; Wycombe Abbey, the seat of Lord Carington; and Ashbridge, that of the Earl of Bridgewater. The predominating soils are rich loam, strong clay, chalky mould, and loam upon gravel, all of which however admit of considerable variety. The soil in the Chiltern district is chiefly devoted to the growth of wheat, barley, oats, beans and sainfoin. The northern parts of the county consist of clays and loams, with mixtures of gravel, forming good turnip land, and rich meadows along the course of the Ouse. The county long has been famed for its produce of corn and cattle. 'Buckinghamshire bread and beef' having, in older times, been a common expression. The great weight of butter annually made on the dairy farms is mostly purchased by the London dealers, who contract for it half-yearly; and the skim and butter milk are appropriated to fattening numerous herds of swine. Great assiduity is evinced in the breeding of early ducks, and suckling calves, for the metropolitan market. The southern division of the county produces large quantities of fine beech; nearly a sixth part of the land, on both sides of the road between Oxford and the Thames, is supposed to be covered with that species of wood. The mineral productions are of scarcely any importance: near Newport is a bed of marble; at Olney, freestone; at Wavendon, artificers' earth pits; at Brill, ochre for painting is obtained, and amber is found in the northern part of the county. The CLIMATE has been pronounced to be as favourable to health and longevity as that of any other county in the kingdom: the air, on the Chiltern hills, the experience of ages has proved to be remarkably salubrious, and even in the vales it is much less frequented by endemical disorders than the low grounds of the majority of other districts.

**MANUFACTURES and TRADE.**—The chief manufactures of this county are those of thread lace, paper and straw-plat: the first-mentioned affording employment to a great number of females of the humbler class; many very young children, also, are occupied in this branch—they make the edgings and narrower descriptions of lace; and there are throughout the county schools wherein the pillow bobbin is kept in activity, to the exclusion of the needle. This branch, however, has been severely depressed by the manufactures of Nottingham. The straw plat trade, of which Luton and Dunstable (Bedfordshire) are the principal seats, extends for some distance into this county. Exclusive of its manufactures, the trade of Buckinghamshire is of a general and agricultural nature, having a moderate traffic in various kinds of grain, malt, timber, &c. The Grand Junction canal is of considerable importance to its business—communicating as it does with the metropolis, and, by its cuts, with the principal towns in this and the adjacent counties; while the rail affords additional and more speedy means of transit for persons, produce and merchandise.

**RIVERS CANALS and RAILWAYS.**—The principal rivers from which this county derives advantage are, the THAMES, the OUSE, the COLNE, the OUZEL and the THAME. The first-mentioned forms part of the boundary that divides Buckinghamshire from Berkshire during a course of about thirty miles, and is navigable the whole of that distance: it first touches the county about a mile north of Henley Bridge, and thence, passing Medmenham and other towns, leaves Bucks a short distance above Staines. The navigation of this river is of paramount consequence to the county, as affording a direct communication with the metropolis. The Ouse enters the western side of the shire, and, passing Water Stratford, flows in a devious course to Buckingham; thence winding to the north, pursues its way to Stony Stratford, Newport Pagnell and Olney, and leaves the

county near Brayfield. The Colne forms part of the eastern boundary of this shire, separating it from Middlesex, and falls into the Thames between Ankerwyke and Staines. The Ouzel rises on the eastern confines of the county, at the foot of the Chiltern hills; at Linslade, near Leighton Buzzard, it enters Buckinghamshire, and passing Fenny Stratford, joins the Ouse at Newport Pagnell. The Thames originates in the junction of two small streams near Quarrendon, a few miles from Aylesbury: at the town of Thame it becomes the boundary between the counties of Oxford and Buckingham, the latter of which it entirely quits beyond the village of Ickford. There are no mineral springs of any note in Buckinghamshire. The only canal is the Grand Junction, before-mentioned, which enters the county near Wolverton, and, after passing several of the principal towns, leaves it near the village of Marsworth: there are branches from the main line, communicating with the towns of Aylesbury, Buckingham, Wendover, &c. The Grand Junction canal also connects the Coventry canal, at Brimsdon, with the Thames navigation. RAILWAYS.—The London and North-Western Railway enters this county a short distance to the west of Ivinghoe; runs to within two miles of Wing, and less than that distance from Leighton Buzzard (Beds.); it passes between the towns of Bletchley and Fenny Stratford, close to the former, and about a mile to the west of the latter; it then runs to about two miles to the right (or south-east) of Stony Stratford on to Wolverton, and leaves the county about four miles from that station. There is a branch from Bletchley to Bedford; and the Great Western Railway crosses the south limb of the county, passing the villages of Langley, Slough and Eton—the last named a principal station.

ECCLESIASTICAL AND CIVIL DIVISIONS, AND REPRESENTATION.—Buckinghamshire is within the diocese of Lincoln and province of Canterbury; and is included in the Oxford Circuit of the Judges. For civil purposes it is divided into eight hundreds, namely, Ashendon, Aylesbury, Buckingham, Burnham, Cottesloe, Desborough, Newport and Stoke: these contain two hundred and three parishes and three parts of parishes, six borough towns and nine other market towns. It formerly sent thirteen members to parliament, of whom two were for the county at large, and two each for the boroughs of Amersham, Aylesbury, Buckingham, Great Marlow, Wendover and Wycombe. The Reform Bill gave another member to the county, but deprived Amersham and Wendover of the franchise—thereby reducing the number of representatives from fourteen to eleven. The polling stations at the election of county members, are Aylesbury, Beaconsfield, Buckingham, and Newport Pagnell. The gentlemen at present sitting are Caledon George Napre, Esq.; the Honourable C. Compton Cavendish; and Benjamin D'Israeli, Esq.

POPULATION, &c.—By the returns rendered to Government at the census of 1841, Buckinghamshire contained 76,482 males, and 79,501 females—total, 155,983; exhibiting an increase over the returns of 1831, of 9,454 inhabitants. The annual value of Real Property, in this county, as assessed to the Poor Rates, in 1815, amounted to £643,492, and in 1841, to £674,334.

AMERSHAM,

WITH THE CHAPELRY OF COLESHILL AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

AMERSHAM (formerly written *Agnondesham*) is a parish in the hundred of Burnham—the market town, a remarkably neat one, is 26 miles, w.s.w. from London, 32 s.e. from Buckingham, and 8 s. by w. from Berkhamstead (Herts), a station town on the London and North Western Railway. The situation of Amersham is peculiarly agreeable, being seated in a fertile vale, near the river Misbourne, between wood-clad eminences: it consists of one long and spacious well-paved street, intersected near the centre by a smaller one. Amersham first sent members to parliament in the reign of Edward I; an interruption to the exercise of this privilege occurred from the 2nd of Edward II until the 21st of James I; since that period it continued to be represented until the Reform Bill, deprived it of the elective franchise. The government of the town is vested in a constable and other officers, appointed at the court leet of the lord of the manor, Thomas Drake, Esq. The principal manufactures are those of lace and straw plat, and the making of Windsor chairs and brown earthenware: the lace trade however has greatly declined.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a spacious brick edifice, in the Gothic style, the interior fitted up with great neatness: the living (one of the best in the county) is a rectory, in the gift of Thomas Drake, Esq.; the

Rev. John Drake, is the incumbent, and his present curate the Rev. Charles Smith. The Baptists, a most respectable body here, have two chapels, respectively called the First Denomination and the Second Denomination; and the Society of Friends and Wesleyan Methodists have a place of worship each. The town has the advantage of a free grammar school, founded by Dr. Robert Chaloner, in 1621; another for teaching writing and arithmetic, founded in 1728 by William Lord Newhaven; a school conducted upon the British plan, and one for infants. There are almshouses for six poor widows, founded by Sir William Drake—who also erected the town-hall. Edmund Waller, celebrated as a poet, who for years resided at COLESHILL, in this parish, sat in two parliament, in the reign of Charles I, for this borough; and the patriot Algernon Sydney represented it in 1679. It was at Coleshill, beneath the widely spread branches of a majestic oak, that Waller is said to have penned most of his poems; and at Chalfout St. Giles', four miles hence, the inspired Milton resided during the direful plague in 1655, and completed his celebrated poem, 'Paradise Lost.' The market, chiefly for grain, is held on Tuesday, and the annual fairs on Whit-Monday and September 19th. The parish contained, in 1831, 2,816 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,645.

**AYLESBURY,**

WITH THE VILLAGE OF WHITCHURCH AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**AYLESBURY** is a market and hundred town, and parliamentary borough, 38 miles s.w. from London and 22 E. by S. from Oxford; situated near the centre of Buckinghamshire, on a gentle eminence, in the rich and extensive tract denominated 'the Vale of Aylesbury,' and is the terminus of a branch of railway connected with the London and North-Western line. This place was originally an important British stronghold, and maintained its independence from the time of the departure of the Romans, till the year 571, when it was reduced by the West Saxons. By the Norman Conqueror it was made a Manor Royal, and parcelled out under a tenure that now appears singular, namely, that the tenants should 'find *litter* or *straw* for the king's bedchamber three times a year, if he came that way so often, and provide him with *three eels* in winter and *three green geese* in summer.' Aylesbury was made a corporate town by Queen Mary in 1556, but the corporation was dissolved not many years after the grant of the charter; its municipal government is at present vested in constables, chosen at the court leet of the Lord of the manor, the Duke of Buckingham. Assizes for the county and a court of quarter sessions are held in the county hall: and the town is included in the thirty-seventh circuit of County Court towns under the act passed August 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20—this court is held monthly. In 1554 the burgesses obtained the privilege of sending two members to parliament, which right they still enjoy; the present representatives are the Right Hon. George Lord Nugent, and Quintin Dick, Esq. Aylesbury is a polling station at the election of county members. The county gaol and house of correction is a very handsome building standing on the Light-n Buzzard road; its arrangements are upon the new model plan—having a separate cell for each offender. Opposite to the prison is the workhouse for the Union, under the Poor Law—a neat structure, convenient for the accommodation of three hundred and fifty recipients. The trade of Aylesbury is of no particular character, at the present time; but many years ago it was a principal seat of the pillow-loom manufacture, a branch which the Nottingham looms has been the means of all but extinguishing, and the business of the place is now of a local and agricultural

nature. Aylesbury is somewhat noted for its breed of ducks, of which great numbers are sent to London, and where they command high prices. A horticultural society and a mechanics' institute are well sustained here; and three newspapers, published in the town, enjoy a respectable circulation.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a large cruciform structure, with a low tower: it is now (1850) undergoing extensive reparation and improvement: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Lincoln Cathedral; the Rev. John Radcliffe Pretymann is the present incumbent. A new district church has been erected in Walton: it is dedicated to the Holy Trinity, and the living is in the presentation of the trustees of the Rev. William Pennefather. These places of worship for Baptists, Independents, the Society of Friends, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists. The free grammar school, founded by Sir Harry Lee, originally possessed but a trifling endowment; this was augmented by John Phillips, Esq. a native of the town: there is also a free Latin school, a national school, and Sunday schools connected with the places of worship. The charities dispensed to the poor of this borough are most useful; they consist in the distribution of wearing apparel annually, apprenticing boys and girls, and bestowing money upon reduced tradesmen and widows, besides several other minor benefactions to the needy. The county around Aylesbury is fertile to luxuriance—some of the best land in England lies within a short distance of the town. About two miles hence is 'Hartwell,' the seat of Dr. John Lee: it is noticed as having been the residence of Lewis XVIII, whilst sojourning in this country. The learned gentlemen above mentioned has at a great expense, and study and research, collected one of the most interesting private museums and finest selection of astronomical instruments perhaps in the kingdom. Aylesbury confers the title of Marquess upon the family of Brudenell Bruce. The mark t—the largest in the county, especially for cattle and corn, is held on Saturday. Fairs, on the first Friday after the 18th of January, Palm-Saturday, May 8th, June 14th, Sept. 25th, and October 12th,—the last two are principally for hiring agricultural servants; the others for horses, cattle, &c.: there is also a large show, called 'beef

fair, about a week before Christmas. The borough and parish of Aylesbury contained, in 1831, 4,907 inhabitants, and in 1841, 5,429.

WHITCHURCH is a parish, in the hundred of Cottesloe—the village, a considerable one, is situated about 5 miles S. by W. from Aylesbury, on the road to Winslow. Edward I. granted to the inhabitants a

charter to hold a market on Monday, which has long since fallen into disuse. The church is dedicated to Saint John the Evangelist: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Crown. A pleasure fair is held on the 6th May, and a statute for hiring servants about Michaelmas. The population of the parish in 1831, was 928, and in 1841, 930.

**BEACONSFIELD, WOOBURN AND NEIGBOURHOODS.**

BEACONSFIELD is a parish, in the hundred of Burnham—the town, which is chartered to hold a market, is 23 miles S.W. from London, 6 S.E. from High Wycombe and 8 N. from the Slough station, on the Great Western railway; pleasantly situated on a hill, and allowed to be one of the most healthful localities in the kingdom. The town is composed of four main streets, which, converging to a centre, form a convenient market place; the principal street, in which there are many well-built houses, is more than half a mile in length, and extends along the road leading from London to Oxford. Beaconsfield was formerly of considerable importance in the grain and mal trades, and its market was the resort of numerous opulent factors and dealers; but the neighbouring towns of Wycombe and Uxbridge have abstracted a great portion of its business, and invaded its prosperity very seriously; its lace trade, too, which is the only manufacture here (with the exception of paper, made in the vicinage), has latterly declined; the local trade, however, is well sustained by the inhabitants, and the respectable families of the neighbourhood. Constables and other officers are appointed at the court leet of the lord of the manor; and Beaconsfield is a polling station at the election of members to represent the county at large.

The parish church of All Saints is an ancient building, and formerly belonged to the monastery at Burnham; it is built of stone and flint, with a tower; the living is a rectory, in the presentation of the President

and Fellows of Magdalen college, Oxford; the present incumbent is the Rev. John Gould. In the south aisle is a plain mural tablet to the memory of the celebrated orator and statesman, Edmund Burke, who died at his seat, Gregories, in this parish, and was interred here. In the churchyard is a table monument of white marble, with a pyramid, to the memory of Waller, the elegant poet—he was born in this town, and died October 21st, 1687. The market, entitled to be held on Wednesday, is now unattended; two fairs, however, are still maintained, on the 13th of February and Holy Thursday. The parish contained, by the returns for 1841, 1,763 inhabitants, and by those for 1841, 1,732.

WOOBURN is a parish in the hundred of Desborough—the village is situated 3 miles S.W. from Beaconsfield, in a narrow valley, through the centre of which meanders a river, whose stream gives motion to several mills for making paper—the staple manufacture of the place and neighbourhood. The parish church of Saint Paul is a large, ancient edifice, with a handsome tower; it contains several monuments of the Bertie and Whatton families, and a curious font of antique carved work. There are places of worship for Independents and Wesleyan Methodists. A market was granted to this town by Henry VI, this has long been discontinued; but fairs are held May 4th and November 12th, for horses, cows and sheep. The population of the parish in 1831, was 1,927, and in 1841, 1,830.

## BUCKINGHAM,

WITH THE VILLAGES OF MAIDSMORETON, PADBURY, TINGEWICK, HILLERSDON, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**BUCKINGHAM**, is an ancient borough, both corporate and parliamentary, and the county town in the hundred of its name; 57 miles N.W. by W. from London 24 S.E. from Oxford, 12 S.E. from Bicester, 7 N.W. from Winslow, the same distance E. by S. from Brackley (Northampton), and 10 S. W. from Wolverton—the last-named a station on the London and North-Western railway; and the town itself is a station on the Buckinghamshire line (opened in May 1850) which communicates with the Oxford railway at Banbury, and with the London and North-Western, near Fenny Stratford. The town is situated in a valley, upon the banks of the Ouse, and by this river (which is crossed by three bridges) it is environed, except on the north. The houses are chiefly of brick, and many are well built; to regularity or uniformity in its streets, however, the place can lay but small claim, the dwellings being scattered without order over a large extent of ground. The manufactures here at the present day, are but of little consequence. The inhabitants were once extensively employed in lace-making, which has greatly declined, and is continually receding in importance. There are several maltings in the town, and two breweries, and the trade in corn and hops is of some consideration. There are several good inns; the 'White Hart', in Market square, has been long-frequented by the commercial traveller, as well as for posting. Edward III. granted to the inhabitants a charter of incorporation, which was confirmed by Henry VIII. and subsequently by Queen Mary. In 1835 the charter was remodeled by the Municipal Act, and the government vested in a mayor, four aldermen, and twelve councillors—the corporate body being styled 'the Mayor, Aldermen, and Councillors of the Borough of Buckingham.' The district bench of magistrates hold petty sessions at the town hall every alternate Saturday; the borough magistrates assemble on business connected with the borough every alternate Tuesday; and a County Court is held monthly, under the act of 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. The town hall is a neat and convenient brick building, and the borough gaol is a commodious one—the latter erected by Lord Cobham in 1748, who restored the assizes to the town, but which have since been removed to Aylesbury. The borough has uninterruptedly returned members to parliament from the time of Henry VI. I.; the present representatives are the Marquess of Chandos, and Colonel John Hall. Buckingham is a polling station at the election of county members; and it confers the title of Duke upon the family of Temple.

The most conspicuous and principal ornament of Buckingham is the church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, standing on the summit of an artificial mount, originally occupied by a castle. The building was begun in 1777, and completed in four years, at an expense of £7,000 the greater part of which was contributed by the late Earl Temple; it is of stone, and has a handsome square tower, at its western end, ornamented with pinnacles, embrasures, and a light tapering spire which rises to the height of one hundred and fifty feet from the ground. The exterior is rather plain than otherwise, but internally it is elegantly fitted up in the Grecian style, and similar to Portland chapel, in London; the living is a discharged vicarage. The Baptists, Independents, Wesleyan Methodists, and the Society of Friends, have places of worship. There

**POST, PADBURY, Receiving House** at Mary and Sarah Treadwell's.—Letters from all parts arrive (from BUCKINGHAM) every morning about eight, and are despatched thereto at seven in the evening.

are two endowed schools—one founded by Edward VI for eight boys; the other by Gabriel Newton, in 1760, for twenty-five boys. Other public schools conducted respectively upon the National and British plans, Sunday schools and almshouses comprise the other principal charities. The great object of interest and attraction in this neighbourhood is 'Stowe,' the princely residence, until lately, of the Duke of Buckingham. This noble seat is situated about two miles north-west of Buckingham, and the walk from the town to the grand entrance into the park is very beautiful. In this delightful spot every object that can contribute to picturesque and lovely scenery is to be found—wood and water, lawns, slopes and grottos, shrubs and flowers, temples, columns, and arches, are disposed throughout by the hand of taste. Another favourite walk of the inhabitants is to the village of Maidsmoreton, the road to which is planted on either side with trees meeting at the top; indeed the walks and views generally around Buckingham are of the most pleasing kind. The market days are Monday and Saturday: the first is one of the largest in the kingdom for calves; the other for articles of general consumption, is but thinly attended. Fairs, January 12th, and the last Monday in that month; March 7th the second Monday in April, May 6th, Thursday in Whitsun-week, July 10th, September 4th, October 2nd, the Saturday next after Old Michaelmas, November 8th, and December 13th; all chiefly for cattle, sheep, &c. The parish and borough of Buckingham contained, by the returns for 1831, 3,610 inhabitants, and by those for 1841, 4,054.

One mile from Buckingham is the pretty village of MAIDSMORETON (before-mentioned), containing a handsome church, dedicated to Saint Edmund, in which are three elegant stone stalls, with rich gothic canopies and the porch and belfry have gabled roofs. The population of the parish in 1841 was, 570.

About two miles and a half S. by E. from Buckingham is PADBURY village, situated on the river Ouse, and close to the line of the Buckinghamshire Railway. The parish church is dedicated to Saint Mary; the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Crown. A Wesleyan chapel and a national school are within the parish—the population of which in 1841 was, 696.

About the same distance as Padbury from Buckingham, to the west of the latter, is the village of TINGEWICK, formerly a market town, but retaining nothing at the present day to denote its early consequence. The parish church of Saint Mary (a neat structure), contains a curious brass to the memory of Erasmus Williams, dated 1608. Population of the parish in 1841, 911.

HILLERSDON (or Hillsden), is a parish in the hundred of Buckingham—the village, a small one, is situated about 4 miles S. from that town. The ancient manor house, long since demolished, held out for the King against Cromwell's forces: it surrendered in 1643 when it was plundered, and its owner, Sir Alexander Denton, was committed to prison, where he died. The parish church of All Saints is a handsome building rebuilt about 1493, and is decorated with some beautiful specimens of stained glass: the living is a perpetual curacy, in the patronage of the Dean and Canons of Christ Church College, Oxford. Population of the parish in 1841, 262.

**BURNHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

**BURNHAM**, formerly a market town, giving name to the hundred and parish in which it lies, is 24 miles w. from London, 5 s. from Beaconsfield, 4 s. w. from Windsor, and about 2 E. from the Maidenhead station, on the Great Western Railway. The village itself has no claim to particular notice, but the views and scenery with which it is environed cannot fail to arrest the attention of the traveller. As a place of trade too it is inconsiderable, possessing nothing of a business-like nature, beyond the common traffic of a country village, if we may except two brass and iron foundries, and a manufactory for agricultural implements.

The places for divine worship are the parish church of Saint Peter, an Independent chapel, and a chapel of

ease at Boveney. The living of Burnham is a vicarage, in the gift of trustees nominated by the Provost and Fellows of Eton College; the Rev. Thomas Carter is the incumbent, and the Rev. F. F. Fawkes, the present curate. Burnham is surrounded by numerous seats of opulent individuals, and amongst the varying prospects is presented many elegant mansions; the ruins of Burnham Abbey and the woods called the 'Burnham Beeches,' forming prominent features in the scenery. The market has long ceased to be attended, but an annual fair is held on the 2nd of October. The parish, which comprises several dependent hamlets, contained, by the returns rendered in 1831, 1,930 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,284.

**CHESHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

**CHESHAM** is a parish in the hundred of Burnham—the market town is 28 miles s.w. by w. from London, and 5 s.s.w. from Berkhamstead (Herts)—a station on the London and North-Western Railway. The town is pleasantly situated in a fertile valley; the country in its vicinity is well wooded, and contains many seats of the gentry, and handsome residences. The principal manufacture carried on here is that of coarse wooden ware, comprising a variety of useful articles, amongst which malt shovels are made in great numbers: the making of shors, lace and straw plat, likewise employ many hands; whilst a large stream, which rises close to the town, works corn mills and the machinery of others for making paper. The parish, which is of great extent, is parcelled into many manors, the principal and most extensive being the property of the noble family of Cavendish, whose representative holds courts annually; and Chesham is included in the thirty-ninth circuit of towns under the County Court Act, passed in 1816, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20—this court is held

monthly, at the town hall. The parish church of Saint Mary, is a large cruciform structure: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Duke of Bedford; the Rev. Adolphus Fredk. Aylward is the present incumbent. There are places of worship for Baptists (a numerous and respectable body here), a chapel for Independents, and a meeting-house for the Society of Friends. The charities comprise almshouses for four poor persons, founded in 1624 by Thomas Weedon, citizen of London, and public schools upon the British plan, and for infants. Not many years ago was discovered, near the town, a medicinal spring, the properties of which are similar to the waters at Tonbridge, and have been found, in several cases, beneficial to those afflicted with complaints for which the latter are recommended. The markets are held on Wednesday and Saturday; the first for corn; the other for straw plat, provisions, &c. Fairs April 21st, July 22nd, and September 28th. The parish contained in 1831, 5,388 inhabitants, and in 1841, 5,593.

COLNBROOK, HORTON, LANGLEY, IVER, STOKE POGES AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

COLNBROOK is a chapelry chiefly in the parishes of Horton, Iver, and Langley-Marsh, in the hundred of Stoke, county of Bucks, and extending into the parish of Stauwell, county of Middlesex—the village, formerly a market town, is 17 miles w. by s. from London, 9 E. by s. from Maidenhead, 6 s. from Uxbridge, 5 E. from Wind-or, and 3 s.e. from Slough—a station on the Great Western railway: situated at the extreme south-eastern boundary of Buckinghamshire, next Middlesex, from which county it is separated by the Colne—from this stream it derives its name. This place is of considerable antiquity, and was in existence when the Danes sustained a defeat at Farnham. It obtained a charter of incorporation in the year 1543, by the style of 'Bailliff and Burgeses'; and at the same time received the grant of a market to be held on Tuesday, and two fair in the year: this charter was renewed in 1632; the market has been discontinued some years, but the fairs are still held, one on the 5th of April and the other on the 3rd of May, for cattle. The village consists principally of one long street; the houses are, many of them, well built, and the general appearance of the place is neat and respectable. Previous to the opening of the above-mentioned great line of railway, this place derived its main business from being a chief thoroughfare between the metropolis and a number of populous towns in the west, and the consequent incessant passing of strangers. Its trade is now only of that character belonging to other small inland towns, assisted by a highly respectable and wealthy neighbourhood. There is a neat chapel, dedicated to Saint Thomas, under the establishment, and places of worship for Independents and Baptists. The population of the chapelry in 1841 was, 1,050.

Rather more than one mile south of Colnbrook is the village of HORTON. The parents of Milton resided here; and his mother, who died in 1637, is interred in the church; the poet himself passed some of his early years at this place. The parish church of Saint Michael has a doorway enriched with Saxon mouldings; and the edifice is surrounded by a Roman wall. The Colnbrook cattle fair is held in this parish—the population of which in 1841 was, 873.

Two miles north-west of Colnbrook is the village of LANGLEY, a parochial chapelry, in the parish of Langley Marsh. The village contains but little interesting to the stranger; but a degree of liveliness is imparted to it from its approximation to the Great Western railway, which passes through the parish from east to west. Population of the parish, 1,844.

IVER is a very respectable village, in the hundred of Stoke, 2½ miles N. of Colnbrook, and nearly 3 s. by w. from Uxbridge; situated on the river Colne, and near to the Grand Junction canal. The scenery of the neighbourhood is peculiarly pleasing; the entrance from Uxbridge, especially, cannot fail to attract particular attention. The parish church of Saint Peter underwent a thorough restoration at a cost of £2,800 and it is now handsome and commodious; the living is a perpetual curacy, of which the Rev. W. S. Ward is the present incumbent. A free school, founded upwards of a century ago, is now conducted upon the national plan. The market, granted at an early period has long ceased to be observed, but a small fair is held on the 10th of July. The population of the parish in 1841 was, 1,948.

STOKE POGES is a parish in the hundred of Stoke—the village is 4 miles from Burnham and Wind-or, and 5 s.e. from Colnbrook. In this village and its vicinity there are many handsome mansions; one in particular, the residence of the Honourable Henry Labouchere, is worthy of being visited. The grounds of the park are ornamented with busts and statues to the memory of those illustrious characters who have distinguished themselves in the field, or by other superior attainments. The church, a very neat structure, stands near the mansion. The churchyard possesses considerable interest, with the admirers of pure poetry, as, in it was interred the remains of the celebrated poet Gray; and here he laid the scene of his pathetic and justly admired 'Elegy in a Country Churchyard.' The late John Penn, Esq. erected a chaste monument to the memory of the poet, on a piece of ground contiguous to the cemetery. The living of Stoke is a vicarage, in the presentation of Lord Francis Godolphin Osborne, of Cambridgeshire. The parish numbered in 1841, 1,528 inhabitants.

**FENNY STRATFORD, WITH BLETCHLEY,**

AND THE VILLAGS OF GREAT AND LITTLE BRICKHILL AND BOW BRICKHILL.  
**FENNY STRATFORD** is a chapelry, partly in the parish of Bletchley and partly in that of Simpson, in the hundred of Newport; 44 miles N.W. from London, 15 N. from Aylesbury, 7 S.E. from Stony Stratford, about the like distance south from Newport Pagnell, and less than a mile from the Bletchley station on the London and North Western Railway. It lies on the main road from London to Birmingham, on the acclivity of a hill, having at its foot the Grand Junction canal and the river Lowfield, which latter is crossed by two bridges. Fenny Stratford had, from time immemorial, a market on Mondays, which was confirmed by charter in 1609. In 1665 it suffered great diminution in its population by the plague—the inns were shut up, and the thoroughfare through the town for some time took a different direction: this misfortune proved fatal to the market, which has never since flourished. It is a place of little trade; the making of lace and straw-plat employ some of the industrious females, but no great quantity of either is produced. The chapel of Saint Martin was rebuilt by subscription, chiefly promoted by Browne Willis, Esq., well known as an antiquary, who lies interred within the rails of the communion table; the first stone was laid on Saint Martin's day, in the year 1724. Mr. Willis also repaired and ornamented the parish church of Bletchley, and added pinnacles to the tower. Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists have each a place of worship, and there is a national school—the latter erected in 1817, and supported by subscriptions. The living of Bletchley is a rectory, of which the Rev. Thomas Delves Broughton is the present incumbent. The

benefice of Fenny Stratford is a perpetual curacy, at present enjoyed by the Rev. John Steward. The market has for many years ceased to be held; but there are four fairs, viz. April 19th, July 18th, October 10th and November 28th, for cattle. The chapelry contained, in 1831, 635 inhabitants, and in 1841, 763.

About three miles S.E. from Fenny Stratford, in the same hundred as that town, is **GREAT BRICKHILL**, a village and parish, containing a church dedicated to Saint Mary, chapels for Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists, and a national school. Population of the parish in 1831, 776, and in 1841, 1,033.

About two miles from Fenny Stratford is **LITTLE BRICKHILL**, which, a though now but an inconsiderable village, was formerly a place exceeding in size and population Great Brickhill, and was a market and assize town in the reign of Elizabeth. The parish church of Saint Mary is a small building: the living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury. The market has long been discontinued, but two fairs are still held—on the 12th of May and the 22nd of October. The parish contained, in 1831, 514 inhabitants, and in 1841, 563.

Nearly two miles north from Little Brickhill, and about the like distance east from Fenny Stratford, is the pleasant village of **BOW BRICKHILL**. The parish church of All Saints stands upon an eminence, from whence is obtained a remarkably fine view of the surrounding country: the living is a rectory in the gift of some private individuals. The *Wallin'-street* of the Romans passes through the parish. Population, in 1831, 475, and in 1841, 566.

**HADDENHAM** is a parish, in the hundred of Aylesbury—the village, a considerable one, is situated about a mile and a half off the main road from Aylesbury to Thame, about 7 miles s.w. from the former town, and 2 and 3 n.e. from the latter. The houses composing the village are irregular and straggling, and for the most part built of mud and roofed with thatch. The females are chiefly employed in lace-making, and the males in agriculture. The parish church of Saint Mary is a very respectable looking building: the living is a vicarage, in the presentation of the Dean and Chapter of Rochester; the Rev. John Willis is the present incumbent. There is a chapel each for Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists. The parish, by the

government returns, contained, in 1831, 1,477 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,545.

**LONG CRENDON** parish is in the hundred of Ashendon—the village is about 4 miles w. by n. from Haddenham, pleasantly and healthfully situated upon rising ground, and noticed for its extensive manufacture of needles—the which was still more prosperous in time of war. Besides the needle branch, the making of lace employs some of the females here. The parish church of Saint Mary is rather a spacious structure, with a tower rising from the centre: the living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the Duke of Marlborough. Population of the parish in 1831, 1,382, and in 1841, 1,656.

**IVINGHOE, WING AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

IVINGHOE is a parish in the hundred of Cottesloe and deanery of Nunehay—the market town, a small one, is 33 miles N. by w. from London, 21 s. r. from Buckingham, 9 E. from Aylesbury, 6 s. w. from Dunstable (Bedfordshire), and 3 1/2 s. from Tring—the last named place a station on a branch line of the London and North-Western Railway. It is situated on the declivity of a chalk hill, near to one of the ancient Roman roads, called the 'Ikenild way,' and a short distance to the east or right of the main line of railway before mentioned. The manufacture of straw plat constitutes the chief occupation of the females in the town and neighbourhood, and may be said to be the principal article brought to the market here, which is otherwise but indifferently attended, and probably would be discontinued but for the staple manufacture before mentioned.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a handsome Gothic structure, with a square tower, and contains

some very ancient monuments: the living is a vicarage, of which the Rev. William Hamilton is the present incumbent. The market is held on Saturday, and the fairs May 6th, and October 17th. The parish of Ivinghoe comprises the hamlets of ASHTON, HORTON, SEABROOK, and St. MARGARET, containing, collectively, in 1831, 1,648 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,843.

WING is a small village in the same hundred as Ivinghoe, about 5 miles N. by w. from that town, and 3 s. w. from Leighton Buzzard (Bedfordshire), situated on the road from the latter town to Aylesbury. The chief, indeed, the only ornament of this village, is its handsome church of All Saints: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of Lord Overstone; the Rev. Peter Thomas Osurey is the present incumbent. There are almshouses founded by the Dormer Family, for eight poor families, with a small weekly allowance. The parish, which is extensive, contained in 1831, 1,152 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,274.

MARLOW, GREAT AND LITTLE, BISHAM (BERKS), AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**G**REAT MARLOW is a parliamentary borough, a market town, and parish, in the first division of the hundred of D. sborough and deanery of Wycombe; 31 miles w. by n. from London, 25 s. e. from Oxford, 8 n. e. from Henley-on-Thames, and 5 n. by w. from Maidenhead;—the latter a station town on the Great Western Railway. It is situated in a beautiful part of the county, close to the banks of the Thames, which fine river is here crossed by a new and elegant suspension bridge—a feature of great improvement and ornamental to the appearance of the town, and is the means of communication with the county of Berks. Marlow consists chiefly of two streets crossing each other, with smaller ones diverging; at the junction of the two main streets are the market-house, a spacious and handsome structure, and the Crown Inn. The manufactures consist of paper and lace to a considerable extent; and rope-making, with a tolerably good trade in corn, malt and timber. Some faint traces of a corporation are found in old records concerning the town, but it does not appear that any charter was ever granted for its government—which is chiefly vested in constables. The manor, now held by Sir Wm. Clayton, Baronet, is very ancient; and previous to the Conq. st. belonged to the Earl of Mercia. The town is included in the thirty-ninth circuit of towns under the County Court Act, passed August 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. This borough sent members of parliament as early as 1299; but from 1308 until 1622, it ceased to be represented; in the latter year the privilege was restored, and it has continued to be thus distinguished ever since. The present members are Thomas Peers Williams, Esq. and Lieutenant Colonel Brownlow W. Knox: the constables are the returning officers.

The ancient church of All Saints has been superseded by a new and beautiful stone structure, with a finely decorated steeple: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Gloucester; the Rev. Thomas Tracy Coxwell is the present vicar. The sum of £2560 16s. 6d. has recently been subscribed by the inhabitants, headed by a donation of £1,000 by

the late Thomas Weathered, Esq., for endowing a curacy. A chapel for Independents, one for Wesleyan Methodists, and a handsome new stone structure for Roman Catholics, are the other places of worship. The charities consist of two free schools, others upon the national plan, almshouses, and periodical gifts to the poor, arising from donations left by benevolent individuals. The vicinity of Marlow presents scenery beautiful, picturesque and rich—Bisham Abbey is an interesting feature in the landscape, and should be visited by the stranger coming here. The river here is resorted to in the fishing season by numbers who take delight in this quiet amusement. The market, which is of but little importance, is held on Saturday, and an annual fair October 29th. The borough and parish of Great Marlow contained, in 1831, 4,231 inhabitants, and in 1841, 4,480.

About one mile and a half E. N. E. from Great Marlow, in the same hundred, is LITTLE MARLOW, where formerly was established a convent of Benedictine nuns; but at the present day is a place possessing but few claims to notice. The parish church of Saint John is principally in the later style of English architecture. The population of the parish in 1831, was 783, and in 1841, 927.

**BISHAM** is a village and parish, in the hundred of Baynhoist (Berks), and beautifully situated on the banks of the Thames, opposite to Great Marlow. The Knights Templars established a preceptory here, which was succeeded by an Augustine priory. Henry VIII. re-founded it for a nunnery, in 1536, and dissolved it two years afterwards. The abbey was frequently visited by Henry; and Queen Elizabeth resided here for some time. A small portion only can be traced of the conventual buildings; but in the mansion that occupies the site of the abbey is a large apartment, called the 'Queen's Council Chamber.' The parish church of All Saints is picturesque and pleasantly seat d close to the river, the banks of which are adorned with charming scenery, and many elegant residences Bisham parish contained, in 1831, 771 inhabitants; but at the last census (1841), the number was found to be but 659.

**NEWPORT PAGNELL,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF LATHBURY, SHERRINGTON, GREAT LINFORD AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

NEWPORT PAGNELL is a market town, giving name to the hundred and deanery in which it is situated; 51 miles N.W. from London, on the road to Northampton, from which it is distant fifteen miles, and four from the Wolverton station, on the London and North-Western Railway. The rivers Ouse and Lovett unite at the town; the former is crossed by a good stone bridge: the latter by one of iron. In a remote period this place was of feudal consequence; and the name 'Pagnell,' was derived from the Pagnels, to whom the manor descended from William Fitz-Ansculf, who possessed it from the time of the Norman survey. In the great civil war the town was held by the Parliament, and in 1645 Sir Samuel Lake, the supposed Hudibras of Butler, was the governor. The town is well built, particularly the principal street; it is gas-lighted, and the inhabitants are abundantly supplied with water. The trade here in coal, grain, malt and timber, is materially benefitted by a branch canal, communicating with the Grand Junction, which passes about two miles hence: and the rail presents now an additional and more speedy means of conveyance. The manufacture of lace at one time so extensive has greatly declined. The principal inn is the Swan, a family and commercial house, furnishing the best accommodations; it is also the office for the corn returns and for the inland revenue. The magistrates hold their meetings at the Anchor Inn every alternate week; a manorial court is held annually, when constables are appointed; and Newport is included in the thirty-seventh circuit of County Court towns, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20; it is also a polling station at the election of county members.

The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul is an ancient and spacious structure, situated on an eminence, commanding an extensive view over the surrounding country; the churchyard slopes to the river Lovett, and the visiter should pause here to read a

beautiful epitaph on a Mr. Hamilton, penned by Cowper. The living of Newport is a vicarage, in the gift of the Crown; the present incumbent is the Rev. Geo. Morley. The Independents, Baptists, and Wesleyan Methodists have a chapel each, all neat erections. The charities comprise schools, upon the national and British plans; and several well-endowed almshouses for the aged and indigent of both sexes. The appearance of the country around Newport is very pleasing; the land is rich and well cultivated; the highways approaching to the town are maintained in excellent condition, and few country towns derive more real advantages from numerous wealthy residents in its neighbourhood. The market days are Wednesday and Saturday; and the fairs February 22nd, March 21st, April 22nd, June 22nd, August 29th, October 22nd, and December 23rd, all for cattle chiefly. The parish contained, in 1831 3,385 inhabitants, and in 1841 3,569.

The small parish of LATHBURY is contiguous to, and may almost be considered a suburb of, Newport; it lies to the north of that town, and is nearly surrounded by the river Ouse. A free grammar school was founded and endowed in this parish in the reign of Elizabeth, with exhibitions; but the endowment has been long lost, and the school-room was taken down many years ago. The population of the parish is under two hundred.

SHERRINGTON is a parish in the same hundred as Newport—the village, an inconsiderable one, is situated 2 miles N.E. from that town, on the road to Olney, from which it is distant three miles south. The parish church of Saint Laud is a small building; the living is a rectory in the patronage of the Bishop of Lincoln. The population of the parish, in 1841 was 856.

GREAT LINFORD is a parish in the hundred of Newport—the village an ancient one is about 1½ mile W.S. from Newport Pagnell; and two miles from the Wolverton station, before mentioned; situated near the banks of the Ouse, and surrounded by charming

scenery, and a neighbourhood of the first respectability. Henry Andrews Uthwatt, Esq., is owner of the Linford estate, and patron of the church living which is a rectory: the church is dedicated to Saint Andrew. An almshouse for six indigent widows and widowers.

**OLNEY,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF WESTON-UNDERWOOD, EMBERTON, CLIFTON-REYNES,  
AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**OLNEY** is a parish in the hundred and Deanery of Newport—the market town is 56 miles N.W. from London, 5 N. from Newport Pagnell, and 9 N.E. from the Wolverton station on the London and North-Western railway. The town lies in the northern corner of this county, upon the banks of the Ouser: over the bed of this river are two bridges, one a handsome stone erection of five arches, the other a smaller one of two; from this latter an embankment of earth is continued across the meadows for about a quarter of a mile, and crosses a valley, which is frequently, after a few days' rain, filled with water, and assumes the appearance of a fine lake. This is the bridge or embankment mentioned in Cowper's poem of 'The Task'—

'That, with its wearisome, but needful, length,  
Bestrides the wintry flood;

The town is neat, and consists principally of one street tolerably wide, and nearly a mile in length. The manor of Olney belongs to the Earl of Dartmouth, and under him, or by his representative, courts leet and baron are held annually at the 'Bull Inn.' The making of lace has been the staple of this town and neighbourhood for more than two centuries; but the introduction of machinery applicable to this manufacture has been to Olney in this particular ruinous in the extreme.

The parish church of Saint Peter is a spacious Gothic structure, supposed to have been erected in the 13th or 14th century; it has a tower and lofty spire one hundred and eighty-five feet in height; in the tower is a ring of bells, remarkable for their sweetness of tone. The churchyard is very neatly laid out, and is worthy of attention from the epitaphs and sculpture of the gravestones—being of a character somewhat superior to those found in country cemeteries. The living of Olney is a vicarage of a peculiar kind, in the patronage of the Earl of Dartmouth, who is the lay proprietor of the tithes; the Rev. Daniel Baxter Langley, D.C.L. is the present incumbent. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents, and an episcopal chapel. The principal charities include public schools upon the British and national plan, also

for infants, and almshouses—the latter endowed by Misses Smith (two benevolent ladies of the society of friends) for twelve single women or widows. Olney is signalized as having had, for its vicars and curates, worthies of the highest literary attainments, the majority of whom have been authors of valuable pious works. Cowper the poet, too, inhaled the literary atmosphere of Olney, from whence he removed to Weston-Underwood in 1786; and the house, with its garden in the rear, and his favourite seat, is still shewn to the inquiring and classic stranger. The market, formerly held on Monday, has been changed to Thursday, and is well attended as a corn mart. Fairs on Easter Monday, June 29th, called 'cherry fair,' and October 13th. The parish contained, in 1831, 2,344 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,437.

About a mile and a half S.W. from Olney is the pretty little village of WESTON-UNDERWOOD. This is the ancient seat of the Throckmortons (a Catholic family): their descendant, Sir Robert George Throckmorton (who is lord of the manor) has fitted up a neat Roman Catholic chapel, and erected a handsome residence for the priest; a good school is also maintained in the village, by the same benevolent family. Weston was the residence of the poet Cowper before mentioned, for several years during the latter part of his life, and the vicinity of the village is supposed to have furnished many of his beautiful descriptions of rural scenery. Population of the parish, in 1841, 438.

EMBERTON and CLIFTON-REYNES are two small villages, each about a mile from Olney, the first named lying to the south of that town, the latter to the east of it. The parish church of All Saints, at Emberton, is an old structure: the living is a rectory, the Rev. Thomas Fry was patron some years since. Clifton church, dedicated to Saint Mary Magdalene, contains a few ancient and curious effigies in stone and wood, together with some monumental brasses: the living is a rectory, of which the trustees of W. H. A. Small, Esq. are, (or was some time since) the patrons. The population of Emberton and Clifton parishes respectively, in 1841, was 658 and 213.

 37 miles w.n.w. from Loudon, 26 s.s.e. from Buck-  
 ingham, and 8 s. from Aylesbury—the nearest railway  
 station : situated beneath the Chiltern hills, which are  
 here of bold but pleasing aspect, and upon the high  
 road from the metropolis to Oxford and Gloucester.  
 The town, which was anciently spelled *Risberg*, ob-  
 tained its adjunct 'Prince's' from its having been the  
 residence of Edward the Black Prince, whose palace  
 is said to have stood in a field adjoining the church-  
 yard. The manufacture of lace and paper is carried  
 on here to a limited extent, and the general trade of  
 the place is but inconsiderable. A court leet is held  
 annually, on Whit-Monday, under the Duke of Buck-  
 ingham ; and petty sessions monthly by the magis-  
 trates. The municipal officers are a headborough and  
 two constables, but the government of the place may  
 be said to be confined to a vestry.

The parish church of Saint Mary, an ancient struc-  
 ture, contains some interesting monuments, and other  
 relics of antiquity : The living is a perpetual curacy,  
 in the gift of the lord of the manor ; the Rev. Charles

Edward Gray is the present incumbent. There are  
 places of worship for Baptists and Wesleyan Metho-  
 dists, and schools conducted upon the British and  
 national plans. The market, a tolerably good one for  
 corn, is held on Thursday, and a fair on the 6th of May.  
 The parish contained in 1831, 2,122 inhabitants, and  
 in 1841, 2,206.

MONK'S RISBOROUGH is a parish contiguous to that  
 of Prince's Risborough, remarkable for a peculiar  
 feature in the landscape, considered a great curiosity  
 to the stranger—this is a huge cross, cut out on the side  
 of White Cliff Hill, believed to have been originally  
 formed to perpetuate the remembrance of a victory  
 obtained by the Christians over the Pagans. It is  
 visible from Chipping Norton, in Oxfordshire, a dis-  
 tance of nearly forty miles. By an act passed in 1830,  
 it is ordained that 'White Cliff Cross shall for ever re-  
 main and be, from time to time, renewed and repaired  
 at the expense of the lord of the manor for the time  
 being. The church is dedicated to Saint Dunstan : the  
 living is a rectory, in the peculiar jurisdiction and  
 patronage of the Archbishop of Canterbury. The parish  
 contained in 1831, 1,018 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,083.

**STONY-STRATFORD,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF OLD STRATFORD, WOLVERTON, LOUGHTON  
 AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**STONY-STRATFORD** is a market town in the  
 united parishes of Saint Mary Magdalene and Saint  
 Giles, in the hundred of Newport; 51 miles n.w. from  
 London, 14 s. from Northampton, and 2 from Wolver-  
 ton station, on the line of the London and North-  
 Western Railway. The town, which is one of con-  
 siderable antiquity, consists chiefly of a long street,  
 which is gas-lighted, and seat-d on the *Watling-street*  
 of the Romans, close to the Ouse, which river here  
 forms the boundary of the counties of Buckingham  
 and Northampton. The parishes are in two manors:  
 the west side being in that of Calverton, the property  
 of the family of Lowndes; the east side in Wolver-  
 ton manor, belonging to the trustees of the Ratcliffe  
 charity. The government of the town is in the resident  
 and county magistrates, assisted by the officers appointed  
 at the manorial courts. The Newport Pagnell  
 circuit of County Court towns, includes Stony-Strat-  
 ford in the court for the recovery of debts to any  
 amount not exceeding £20, the court is held monthly at  
 Newport. The manufacture of lace, before the intro-  
 duction of machinery, was the staple here, and furnished  
 numerous industrious females with profitable em-  
 ployment; this branch, however, has all but become  
 extinct: the town has also declined in the advantage  
 it derived as one of vast thoroughfare, before the  
 opening of the great line of railway.

The parishes had formerly a church each: the  
 church of Saint Mary Magdalene was destroyed by fire,  
 which happened in 1742, and consumed with it more  
 than one hundred houses; the tower of the church  
 escaped the flames, but the body has never been  
 restored. The remaining church of Saint Giles was  
 erected in 1451, and rebuilt except the tower in  
 1776: the living of the united parishes is a perpetual  
 curacy, in the gift of the Bishop of Lincoln; the  
 present incumbent is the Rev. Thomas Bleanire.  
 The charities comprise schools upon the British and  
 national plans, likewise for infants; a bequest of £70.

per annum appropriated to apprenticing children, and  
 several other benevolent gifts, from which the poor  
 of the town receive occasional assistance. The market  
 is held on Friday; and the fairs on the second Friday  
 in February, 1st Friday in May, August 2nd, the 3rd  
 Friday in September, the Friday next after the 11th of  
 October (a statute), and the first Friday in November.  
 The united parishes contained, in 1831, 1,612 inhabit-  
 ants, and in 1841, 1,757.

OLD STRATFORD is a hamlet, partly in the parishes  
 of Cosgrove, Furtho, Passenham, and Potters-Pury,  
 in the county of Northampton and hundred of  
 Cleley, divided from Stony-Stratford by the river Ouse.  
 The hamlet possesses no object deserving notice, and  
 is destitute of all business except that belonging to a  
 small village. Population returned with the parishes.

The parish of WOLVERTON is contiguous to Stony-  
 Stratford, but the railway station, which has been the  
 means of bringing Wolverton into notice is, as before-  
 stated, two miles from that town. The parish church  
 of the Holy Trinity is a small structure: the living is  
 a discharged vicarage, in the gift alternately of several  
 persons. Lately has been erected a new district church,  
 and dedicated to Saint George the Martyr: the living  
 is in the gift of the Ratcliffe Trustees. Schools upon  
 the British and foreign plans, and for infants have  
 been recently established in the parish—which is  
 rapidly increasing its population, in 1841; the num-  
 ber was 1,261, it now (1850), probably reaches near  
 to 2,000.

LOUGHTON is a parish in the hundred of Newport  
 —the village is situated 3½ miles s.e. from Stony-  
 Stratford, close to the line of the London and North  
 Western Railway, and a short distance off the road  
 leading to Fenny Stratford. The church is dedicated  
 to All Saints: the living is a rectory in the patronage  
 of the Master and Fellows of Trinity College Cam-  
 bridge. Population of the parish, in 1841, 361.

**WENDOVER.**

WITH THE VILLAGE OF GREAT MISSENDEN AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**W**ENDOVER is a parish, in the hundred of Ayles-  
 bury—the market town is 35 miles n. w. from London,  
 5 s. e. from Aylesbury, and 4 s. w. from Tring—the  
 latter a station on a branch line communicating with  
 the London and North Western Railway. This place,  
 which possesses but few well-built houses and is in-  
 considerable in point of trade, is seated at the foot of  
 the Chiltern hills, near to the entrance of the Vale of  
 Aylesbury. The manufacture of lace, which was for-  
 merly prosperous here, benefits now, comparatively,  
 but a few persons. Abel Smith, Esq. banker, London,  
 is lord of the manor, and proprietor of much of the  
 land in this parish; his representative holds courts for  
 the manor occasionally, and the magistrates for the

division assemble in petty session once a fortnight.  
 Wendover sent members to parliament as early as the  
 year 1300: this privilege, which was discontinued for  
 above three hundred years, was restored in the 21st of  
 James I; and the town continued to be represented  
 until disfranchised by the Reform Bill. Hampden, the  
 patriot, represented this borough in five successive  
 parliaments. The parish church of Saint Mary stands  
 about a mile from the town: the living is a vicarage,  
 in the patronage of the Crown; the Rv. C. H. Champ-  
 neys is the present incumbent. There are places of wor-  
 ship for Independents, Baptists, and Methodists, a  
 national school supported by subscription, and an in-  
 fants' school by Abel Smith, Esq. The market, now

but indifferently attended, is held on Monday, and fairs May 13th and October 2nd for cattle. The parish contained, in 1831, 2,001 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,877.

**GREAT MISSENDEN** is a parish, in the same hundred as Wendover—the village is situated on the road between that town and Amersham, about five miles from either place. The making of lace employs some of the industrious females, but the quantity produced is inconsiderable. Several seats of the gentry ornament the country round Wendover and Missenden:

**WINSLOW**

IS a parish in the hundred of Cottesloe—the market town, a small one, is 48 miles N.N.W. from London, 7 S.E. from Buckingham, and 10 N.N.W. from Aylesbury; situated on the Buckinghamshire branch of the London and North-Western Railway (opened 1st of May, 1850), in an exceedingly fertile part of the country, surrounded by land in a high state of cultivation. The town, which is of considerable antiquity, and given by King Offa to the Abbey of St. Albans, so early as 794, consists of three principal streets, gas-lighted by a joint stock company. The manufacture of lace employs some few of the female inhabitants; and there is some malting business done. The principal Inns are the 'Bell' and the 'George,' two very comfortable establishments; at the latter is an excellent bowling green, attended by a respectable body of subscribers; at the former the magistrates assemble in

petty sessions, every alternate Thursday; and at the same inn, the lord of the manor, William Selby Lownds, Esq. holds his court leet annually.

The parish church is a spacious and ancient structure, in the later style of English architecture, with a square embattled tower at its western end; the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Crown; and the Rev. W. W. McCreight is the present incumbent. There are places of worship for Baptists and Independents, and an endowed school now conducted upon the national plan. The market is held on Thursday, and the fairs February 18th, March 20th, April 20th, Holy Thurs-day, August 21st, September 22nd, November 26th, and December 9th, all for cattle; there are, besides, three statute meetings for hiring servants, in the month of October. The parish contained, in 1831, 1,290 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,434.

WYCOMBE, HIGH AND WEST, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**HIGH WYCOMBE**, or **CHIPPING WYCOMBE**, is, as its ancient Saxon name implies, a market town—it is likewise a borough, both corporate and parliamentary, in the hundred of De-borough; 29 miles W. by S. from London. 25 S.E. from Oxford, 10 N. from Maidenhead, Berks—a railway station on the Great Western line, and about 15 S. from Tring (Herts), where there is a station on a branch line in connexion with the London and North Western railway. The town is pleasantly situated in a valley, on the banks of the Wycombe stream, and is considered the handsomest one in the county. It consists of one long and spacious street, from which several smaller ones branch out. The town hall, situated in the Market place, a good substantial structure of brick, supported on stone pillars, built in 1757 at the expense of John Earl of Shelburn: in this hall are held the sessions for the town, and other public meetings; likewise the County Court, monthly, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. This borough appears to have been first incorporated in 1461, but the mayor and aldermen are mentioned in a record of the reign of Edward III. The Municipal Reform Act, passed in 1835, vested the government of the town in a mayor, four aldermen, and twelve councillors, under the style of 'the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgesses of the Borough of Chipping Wycombe, in the County of Buckingham.' The present and ex-mayor are magistrates. High Wycombe has sent members to parliament from the 28th of Edward I; those at present sitting for the borough are Sir Geo. Henry Dashwood, Bart. and Martin Tucker Smith, Esq.—the mayor is the returning officer. The trade of the town comprises the manufacture of chairs to a very great extent, and in the vicinity are several large paper mills. The valuable Wycombe stream is available to the working many mills, not only for its paper trade, but for grinding corn in large quantities. The local business of the place is generally good, and it is assisted in this particular by its situation of thoroughfare, being on the main road between the metropolis, Oxford and other large and populous towns.

The parish church of All Saints is a handsome stone building, erected in the year 1273, with a tower at its

western end one hundred and eight feet in height, adorned with roses and porcelains. The church contains several interesting monuments—some of them elegant, particularly those to the memory of the Earl of Shelburn and the Countess of Shelburn, which are very beautiful specimens of tomb sculpture. The living of Wycombe is a vicarage, in the gift of the Marquess of Lansdowne. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists, and a very neat meeting house for the Society of Friends. The grammar school, here, was endowed by a Mr. Bowdler, by bequest, in 1790, who also provided a weekly allowance for eight poor widows. There are schools conducted upon the British plan, and for infants. The principal seat in this vicinity is Wycombe Abbey, the beautiful and picturesque country residence of Lord Carington. The market, which is a very considerable one for corn, is on Friday, Fairs, the third Monday in April, for cattle; the last Wednesday in June, for wool; the Monday next before Michaelmas-day (a statute fair for hiring servants), and October 28th, for cattle. The borough and parish of High Wycombe contained, in 1831, 6,299 inhabitants, and in 1841, 6,480.

Rather more than two miles west by north from High Wycombe is the village and parish of WEST WYCOMBE, situated beneath a steep eminence partly covered with wood, whence the mausoleum and small tower of its beautiful church seem to emerge. The church, which is dedicated to Saint Lawrence, contains some interesting monuments, as does also the mausoleum; those particularly claiming notice in the last mentioned structure are, an elegant marble altar tomb, under a canopy supported by four stone pillars, erected to the memory of Sarah Baroness Le Despenser, who died 19th January, 1769; another, in beautiful marble, records the death of the husband of the Baroness; and there are others belonging to the members of the Dashwood family. The living is a discharged vicarage, in the patronage of this family. West Wycombe House, in this parish, is the seat of Sir George Henry Dashwood, Baronet, one of the members for High Wycombe. The population of the parish, in 1831, was 1,901, and in 1841, 2,202.

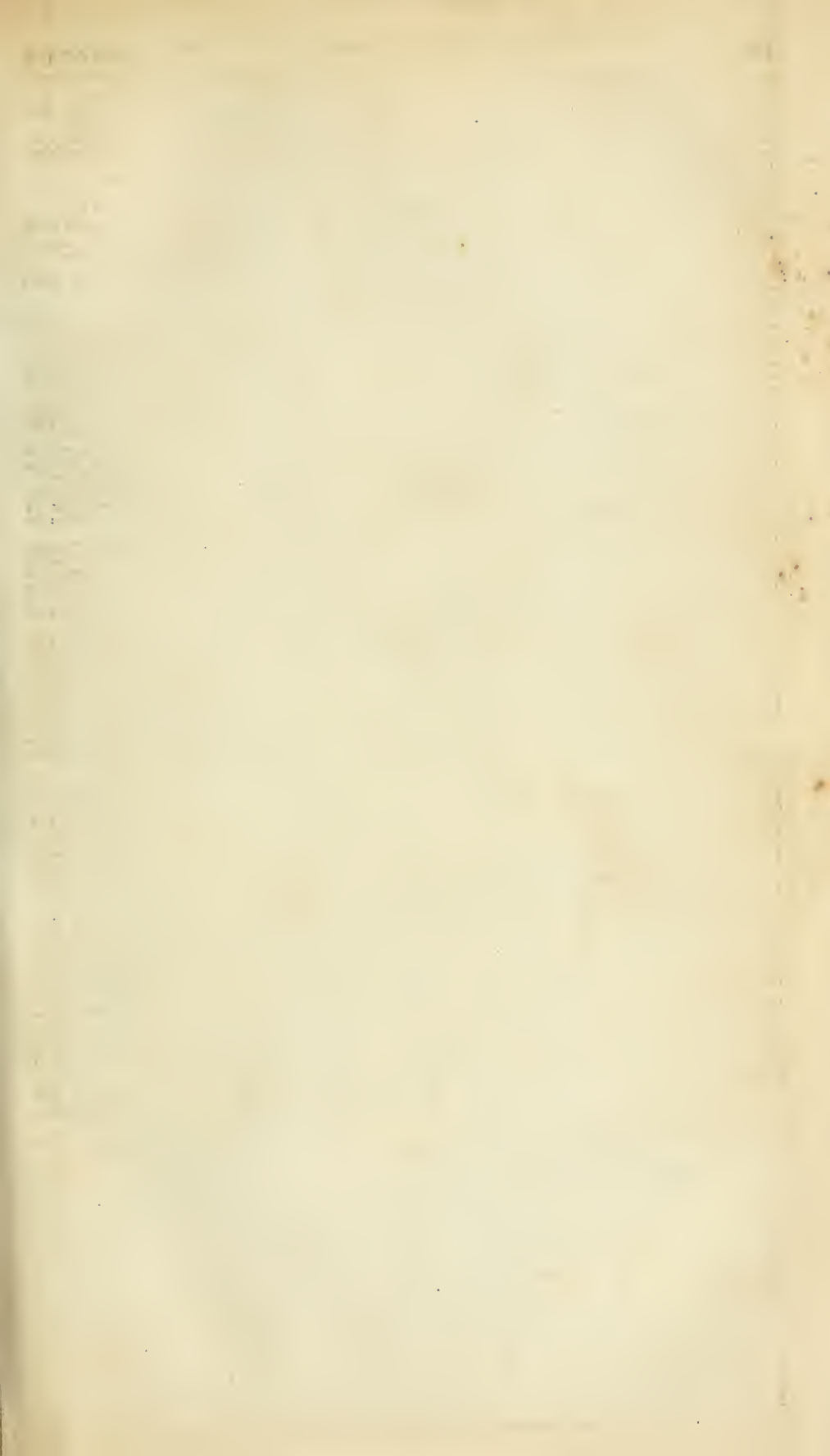

# CAMBRIDGESHIRE.

**T**HIS is an inland County, bounded on the north by the county of Lincoln; on the north-west by those of Northampton and Huntingdon; on the west by the latter county; on the south by Hertfordshire and Essex; on the east by Suffolk; and on the north-east by Norfolk. Its limits, for all the northern half, are rivers, and their communicating branches, so intermixed as with difficulty to be traced; the southern half has an indented and undistinguished boundary line on the adjacent counties. Its greatest length is nearly fifty miles, and its breadth, at the south and widest extremity, above twenty-five; in circumference it is one hundred and thirty miles, and contains eight hundred and fifty-seven square miles, or 548,480 statute acres. In size Cambridgeshire ranks as the twenty-sixth English county, and in population as the thirtieth.

**EARLY HISTORY.**—When the Romans invaded this kingdom, Cambridgeshire formed part of the *Icenii* division and was peopled by a tribe called the *Cenomanii*: when Britain was first divided by the invaders, the county was included in *Britannia Superior*—subsequently in *Britannia Prima*; and in the third and last division it formed part of *Flavia Caesariensis*. During the Saxon Octarchy it composed a portion of the kingdom of *East Anglia*: the ‘Devil’s Ditch,’ which runs across Newmarket heath, in a straight line for several miles, to Reach (where the fens were anciently marshy and impassable), Camden mentions to have been one of the boundaries of that kingdom; the earth that was dug out of the trench is thrown up, and forms a high bank on the east side, which is that next to the fens. The principal ancient roads that crossed the county were the *Ikniel-street*, which entered from Suffolk near Newmarket, and quitted at Royston; the *Ermin-street* which passed through on the line of the great North road; and the great Roman way from Colchester to Chester, which crosses the county from east to west, passing through Cambridge. The most considerable encampment is that called *Handlebury* on the highest part of *Gogmagog* hills, supposed to be of British origin. The Isle of Ely, from an early period, formed a separate district with an independent jurisdiction—being called by the Saxons *South-Girova*. After the destruction of Ely by the Danes, king Burhard annexed the isle to the kingdom of Mercia. After the battle of Hastings and the consequent advance of the Conqueror into the interior, the Isle of Ely, from its situation in the midst of fens, became a place of refuge of the Anglo-Saxon prelates and nobles; and it held out against the attacks of Hereward for more than seven years, and it only surrendered in 1074, through the treachery of the abbot and monks of Ely. During the civil wars of Stephen, John and Henry III, the county in general and Ely in particular suffered severely from the contending parties. The only historical event of importance, from the reign of Henry III to that of Charles I, is the proclaiming of Lady Jane Grey at Cambridge by the Duke of Northumberland in 1553. At the commencement of the parliamentary war this county generally, and the Isle of Ely, combined against the king’s party; the University, however, was an exception, having voted its plate to the service of Charles. In 1643 Cromwell obtained possession of Cambridge, and in 1645 he secured the Isle of Ely. In August of the same year the king marched towards Cambridge, but without attacking the town. After the seizure of the king, in 1647, by Colonel Joyce, he was conveyed to Childerley, about eight miles from Cambridge; and on the 7th of June, in that year, Cromwell, accompanied by Fairfax, waited on the royal captive, when both disowned all participation in the seizure of his person: two days afterwards the king was removed to Newmarket.

**SOIL, SURFACE, PRODUCE and CLIMATE.**—The soil is diversified, consisting principally of a mixture of clay and sand, and of a strong black mould and gravel. The rich marshes in the vicinity of Wisbeach exhibit a mixture of sand and clay, or silt—the fens, a strong black earth or moor, lying upon gravel or turf moor, very favourable for the culture of oats and colesweed. In the uplands the soils vary, being composed of chalk, gravel loam and tender clay, and clay upon gravel. Notwithstanding the immense expense and labour which have been bestowed in draining the fens, there is still a large extent in a waste and unimproved condition. In this part the application of the land is various: where the soil is preserved from the floods, or only subject to occasional inundations, it has all the fertility of water meadows—the crops of oats are particularly abundant, the produce frequently being from fifty to sixty bushels per acre. The northern part of the county, including the Isle of Ely, is mostly fen land, and quite level, intersected by numerous canals and ditches; this description of land comprises nearly half of the large agricultural district called ‘the Bedford level.’ ‘The Great Level,’ which includes a tract of 400,000 acres, has been, from an early period, divided into three districts, viz. the North Level, the Middle Level and the South Level. The surface of the county exhibits great variety: the parts adjoining the counties of Suffolk, Essex and Hertford, have gently rising hills with downs and open corn-fields, and a considerable portion of wood in the part contiguous to Suffolk; but in other parts there is a great scarcity of timber. The south-western part of the county is the most agreeable, being raised in its surface and watered by the Cam: some very fine butter is made on the dairy farms in this district and the valley through which the Cam flows, which is in much demand in London, and there sold under the name of ‘Cambridge butter.’ The vicinity of Cottenham (a village near Cambridge) is famous for a peculiar kind of new cheese, of a singularly delicious flavour; the superiority of this cheese is not ascribed to any particular mode in the management of the dairies, but solely to the nature of the herbage on the commons: in the parish of Cottenham, alone, it is said, nearly two thousand cows are kept. In this part of the county many calves are suckled for the London markets. In some of the parishes bordering on Essex saffron is cultivated. Hemp and flax are raised to a considerable extent in the parishes of Upwell, Welney, Outwell, Elm and Wisbeach, particularly in the two first; and the neighbourhood of Ely is noted for producing garden vegetables of excellent quality. The south-eastern division, reaching from *Gogmagog* Hills to Newmarket, is bleak, heathy, and thinly inhabited—being connected with that vast tract of land which, extending southwards into Essex, and northward across Suffolk into Norfolk, forms one of the largest plains in the kingdom. The southern portion of the county, consisting chiefly of elevated land, exhibits a remarkable contrast to the north division, and is productive of fine wheat, barley and oats: the heaths and commons that intersect this district furnish sustenance to many thousand sheep; the number kept in the county may be averaged at 160,000. There is some pleasing scenery about Linton, Hildersham and other villages in the valley, through which the Granta runs, between Cambridge and Bartlow, which abounds with elm trees. The views from the higher part of the Earl of Hardwicke’s park at Wimpole, are very fine. The climate of Cambridgeshire is much more salubrious than it was formerly. The air may now be said to be pure and healthy, excepting in the more northern parts, which are rendered damp by the excessive portion of fenny grounds: these tracts, however, having been extensively drained, the moistness and impurity of the air have been greatly diminished, and the climate happy and materially improved.

**MANUFACTURES** are scarcely known in this county, with the exception of a sort of white brick for cleaning iron, brass, &c., and coarse pottery ware; but the general trade of some of the towns is very considerable, and the commerce arising from agricultural produce of great importance. Wisbeach possesses a valuable trade in the export of corn, and of oil from the seed-mills, in its neighbourhood. Cambridge may be said to be sufficiently famous by its University to dispense with other distinctions. Newmarket, partly in this county and partly in that of Suffolk, is the most celebrated place in England, or even the world, for horse-races, for which its extensive and finely tufted heath is peculiarly adapted: Charles II built a seat here, for the sake

of this diversion; and the town still derives its sole consequence and support from the attendance of nobility and gentry at the several race meetings, while the agriculturists on the borders of the two counties are greatly benefited by the lively markets for horse provender. Brewing and malting are carried on extensively in several of the towns—Cambridge participates largely in these branches; and here, also, is made the delicacy called brawn, highly appreciated by the epicure, and for which a regular demand exists, especially for consumption in London.

**RIVERS, CANALS AND RAILWAYS.**—The principal RIVERS of Cambridge are the Ouse, the Cam or Grant, the Nene, and the Old and New Bedford (artificial) rivers. The Ouse enters the county between Fen Drayton and Earith: thence it runs eastward through the fens; and afterwards, taking a northerly direction, passes Stretham, Ely and Littleport, and flows into Norfolk. The Cam has three branches, the chief of which rises near Ashwell, in Hertfordshire, and enters the county to the west of Guilden Merton; thence flowing to the north-east, it receives several rivulets, and near Grantchester has its current enlarged by the united waters of its sister streams; and hence, taking a northerly course, the Cam glides through the walks of science, ornamenting the grounds of the principal colleges at Cambridge, and falls into the Ouse near Thetford. The Nene is a boundary stream between Huntingdonshire and the Isle of Ely to Moreton's Leam, whence it proceeds to and mingles with the Cross Keys wash. The New Bedford river is the principal navigation for barges passing from the upper to the lower parts of the Ouse. The Old Bedford runs parallel with the last river; it has been but little navigated (excepting the lower part of it, near Denver Sluice,) since the opening of the new rivers. The rivers abound with fish: the pike and eels are especially plentiful; and smelts of a good quality and in considerable numbers are taken in the Bedford river. The CANALS are the Vermuyden's, which commences at Ramsay; a canal from Ontwell to Wisbeach; another from Peterborough to Stanground Sluice; and some short cuts from the Ouse to Soham, Reach and Burwell. **RAILWAYS.**—The Cambridge Section of the Eastern Counties Railway enters this county a little to the north of Great Chesterford (Essex), near Ickleton Abbey, proceeding to Cambridge, Ely, March and Chatteris, and subsequently joins the East Anglian Railway. From Ely there are lines to March, Whittlesea and Peterborough; likewise to Saint Ives and Huntingdon. About three miles east of Saint Ives a branch communicates with Cambridge; while from Great Chesterford (before mentioned) a line takes the traveller to Newmarket.

**ECCLESIASTICAL AND CIVIL DIVISIONS, AND REPRESENTATION.**—Cambridgeshire is naturally divided into two parts by the river Ouse—the most northerly being chiefly composed of the Isle of Ely, in which diocese (excepting fifteen parishes in the eastern part, which are in the diocese of Norwich, and Isleham parish, in that of Rochester,) the county is comprehended. It is included in the Norfolk Circuit of the judges; and for civil purposes is divided into seventeen hundreds, namely, Arovingford, Chesterton, Chevely, Chilford, Ely, Flendish, Longstow, Northstow, Papworth, Radfield, Staploe, Staine, Threplow, Wetherley, Whittlesford, Wisbeach and Wivthford: these contain one hundred and sixty-two parishes and five parts of parishes, one city (Ely), one county and borough town (Cambridge), seven other market towns, and part of the market town of Newmarket. The whole shire returns seven representatives to the imperial parliament—thus distributed, two each for the town of Cambridge and its University, and three for the county at large: the gentlemen at present sitting for the county are, the Hon. Eliot Thomas Yorke, Richard Graves Townley, Esquire, and Lord George John Manners. Votes for county members are taken at Cambridge, Ely, Newmarket, Royston, Whittlesey and Wisbeach.

**POPULATION, &c.**—By the returns made to Government at the census of 1841, Cambridgeshire contained 81,611 males, and 82,848 females—total 164,459; exhibiting an increase over the returns of 1810 of 20,504 inhabitants. The annual value of Real Property, in this county, as assessed to the Poor Rates, in 1815, amounted to £645,554, and in 1841 to £868,681.

**BURWELL,**

**SWAFFHAM PRIOR AND SWAFFHAM BULBECK.**

**BURWELL** is a parish, in the hundred of Staploe—the village, large and populous, is 13 miles S.E. from Cambridge, 5 s. from Soham, and 4 S.W. of Newmarket; situated on the borders of an indentation of the county of Suffolk. The malting business is carried on here somewhat extensively, the timber trade is likewise of some importance, and there are several flour and meal mills. A dreadful circumstance, which occurred on the 8th of September, 1727, renders this village lamentably memorable:—a great number of persons had assembled in a barn to see a puppet show, and during the exhibition the building accidentally took fire. The rush towards the only passage of egress was consequently desperate; unfortunately the door opened inwardly, and by the pressure from within, this means of escape became impracticable; at length the door was demolished by the crowd that had assembled outside, and the surviving persons were dragged over the dead or expiring victims. Seventy-seven individuals perished by this appalling catastrophe: the bodies were all interred in one capacious grave on the

following day, they being so disfigured as to preclude recognition by their relatives. A most attractive ornament to this village is its beautiful church of Saint Mary, in the Gothic style, and scarcely excelled by any village church in the kingdom: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Earl of Guildford; the present incumbent is the Rev. J. J. Baines. There are also places of worship for Baptists, Independents and Wesleyan Methodists. A neat building for a British school was opened in April, 1846, for the education of children of either sex. Population of the parish, in 1831, 1,668, and in 1841, 1,820.

**SWAFFHAM PRIOR**, is a parish in the hundred of Taine—the village is situated 2 miles s. by w. from Burwell, in an agricultural district, noted for the growth of red wheat. In this village are two churches—the one dedicated to Saint Cyrie (or Saint Cyriac), and the other to St. Mary; the latter has long been in ruins: they are both in the same churchyard. The living of the parish is a vicarage, in the alternate patronage of the Bishop, and the Dean and Chapter of

Ely; the present incumbent is the Rev. Joseph Maddy. There is a charity school conducted upon the national plan. Population of the parish, in 1831, 1,102, and in 1841, 1,226.

About one mile from, and in the same hundred as the above village is SWAFFHAM BULBECK. From the river Cam, which partly bounds the parish, there is a branch called Swaffham Lode, navigable to the vil-

## CAMBRIDGE,

INCLUDING BARNWELL, WITH THE VILLAGES OF CHESTERTON, TRUMPINGTON, GREAT  
 AND LITTLE SHELFORD, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**C**AMBRIDGE, a University, a borough both corporate and parliamentary, and a market town, forming a hundred of itself, having separate jurisdiction, in the deanery of its name—is 51 miles N. from London (54 by rail), 27 W. by S. from Bury Saint Edmunds, 29 E. by N. from Bedford, 36 S.E. from Peterborough (45 by rail), 72 S.W. from Norwich (69 by rail), and 87 S.S.E. from Lincoln (105 by rail). It is situated in a fertile agricultural district, on the Eastern Counties railway, for which line there is a station in the town. In history it is called both Cambridge and Granbridge, and derives its name from the river Granta, or Cam, and its bridge. Much difference of opinion has prevailed with respect to its antiquity: that it was an early British settlement is highly probable. Many are of opinion that it was an ancient Roman station, and this conjecture is strengthened by the fact of various Roman coins, fragments of urns, and other relics, having been dug out of the ground at different times. Cambridge was burnt to ashes by the Danes in 871, and again in 1010. William the Conqueror, soon after his assumption of the crown, erected a strong and spacious castle here. Roger de Montorency, in the reign of William Rufus, pillaged and burnt the town, in revenge of an affront given him by that monarch. Henry I. incorporated the burgesses. In 1174 the town was almost wholly consumed by fire: Trinity church and several other churches, together with most of the houses, having been reduced to ruins. King John enlarged the franchises of the town, which, in the latter part of his reign, became the scene of warfare, the castle having been taken and the town destroyed in 1214, but the king's forces retook the castle in the following year. In the reign of Richard II, the townsmen committed great outrages on the University, for which their franchises were seized into the king's hands, and a portion of them granted to the University. In 1388 the parliament was holden at Barnwell Priory, in this town. The plague, and other epidemical disorders, formerly made frightful ravages in Cambridge, especially in the years 1349, 1389, 1485, 1529, 1550, 1610, 1625, 1629, 1630, 1637, 1665 and 1666; at the present time, however, few places excel it in salubrity. To enter into minute descriptive details of the numerous structures formed for education and piety, in this ancient and venerable seat of learning, would far exceed the limits necessarily adopted for a work of this nature; brief must be our account of them—referring those who may demand more elaborate particulars to a perusal of the various Cambridge Guides; and for a more detailed account of the history of the University and town to 'The Annals of Cambridge,' by C. H. Cooper, Esq. (the present town clerk), a work which has been brought down to 1835, and will shortly be completed. 'The Cambridge University Calendar,' published annually, may also be referred to, as containing valuable information relating to the studies of the University.

The origin of the University is, to a certain extent, enveloped in obscurity. It is generally stated to have been founded by Sigebert, a king of the East Angles, about the year 630; but there is good reason for believing that it did not exist before the reign of Henry I. It at first consisted of halls or hostels for the students, rented of the townsmen. The foundation of the first college was in the reign of Edward I., but some of the

hostels remained as late as the reign of Elizabeth. There are at present seventeen colleges, of which four are called halls—but these, unlike the halls at Oxford, differ from the colleges in name only. The number of members of the University is 6,906, of whom 3,786 are members of the senate. Each college or hall is a body corporate, and bound by its own statutes; but is likewise controlled by the paramount law of the University, the executive branch of which is committed to the following officers:—a Chancellor (His Royal Highness Prince Albert); a High Steward, who is allowed a deputy; a Vice-Chancellor, who is the head of some college or hall; two Proctors, who must be masters of arts; two Taxors, appointed to regulate the markets; two Moderators, who superintend the exercises; two Scrutators, to read the graces and take votes, &c.; a Commissary, much the same as a recorder is to a mayor or corporate body; a Public Orator, the mouth of the University; the Caput, a body of six persons, yearly chosen, who determine what graces are proper to be brought before the senate; a Librarian, a Registrar, three Esquire Bedells, &c.: there are also Professors in the several faculties, as also of the learned languages and sciences. The heads of houses—as the masters of colleges are termed, possess great powers; but the general government of the University is entrusted to the Senate, which is composed of all doctors of divinity, law and physic, and all masters of arts whose names are on the boards of any college, or who reside in the town: those bachelors in divinity who are members of this assembly derive the privilege from having previously been masters of arts. For certain purposes the Senate is divided into two houses, viz., the Regent or White Hood House, and the Non-Regent or Black Hood House. The place of assembly is the Senate House, a superb structure, built of Portland stone: the foundation was laid on June 22nd, 1722, and the edifice was completed at the expense of the University, aided by an extensive subscription: its architecture is of the Corinthian order, uniting chasteness with elegance. The other buildings connected with the University at large are—the Observatory, a fine edifice in a commanding situation, commenced in 1822, and furnished with a number of most valuable astronomical instruments; the Library, originally erected in the reign of Edward IV., by Archbishop Rotheram, to which most important and extensive additions have recently been made; the Pitt Press, a stately and imposing structure, built, from the designs of Mr. Blore, at the expense of the Pitt Club in London, by whom it was presented to the University; the Fitzwilliam Museum, erected from a fine design by the late George Bassevi, Esq., in which are deposited the inestimable works of art bequeathed to the University by the late Earl Fitzwilliam in 1816; and the Anatomical Schools, a building of unpretending exterior, but admirably adapted for the purpose to which it is appropriated. In submitting an account of the several colleges, &c., we again repeat that conciseness must necessarily be attendant upon description:—

**SAINT PETER'S COLLEGE**, or, as it is more commonly called, *Peter House*, claims early attention from its priority. It originally comprised two hostels, which were purchased by Hugh de Balsham, bishop of Ely, who, in 1284, obtained a charter of incorporation, and endowed the college with lands, and at his death



bequeathed 300 marks for its further enlargement. Since the demise of the founder, the revenues of this college have been considerably augmented by numerous benefactions. In the list of benefactors is Lady Mary Ramsey, who is said to have offered a very large property, nearly equal to a new foundation, to this college; but requiring, as an indispensable condition, the change of its name into *Peter and Mary's*, was thwarted in her intentions by the then master, Dr. Soame, who said, 'Peter has been too long a bachelor to think of a female comrade in his old age'—'a dear bought jest for so good a benefactress,' observes Fuller, who relates the story—'for Lady Ramsey, disgusted at his refusal, turned the stream of her benevolence into a different channel.' The present college consists of three courts; the buildings are neat and commodious, but present few architectural attractions. CLARE HALL was founded in 1326, by Dr. Richard Badew, the then chancellor of the University: sixteen years after its erection it was consumed by fire, but, through the assistance of Lady Elizabeth de Burgh, co-heiress of Gilbert Earl of Clare, it was rebuilt, and denominated Clare Hall: it is a very handsome structure, of Ketton stone, and comprises a court with two porticos. In 1763 the chapel was rebuilt: it is a neat and elegant edifice; the hall, combination-room and library are spacious and handsome. PEMBROKE COLLEGE, or HALL, was founded in 1343, by Mary Countess of Pembroke: it is situated on the east side of Trumpington-street, and comprises two spacious courts of equal dimensions. The chapel was consecrated in September, 1665, and is from a design of Sir Christopher Wren. From the number of prelates who have been members of this foundation, it has acquired the name of 'Collegium Episcopale;' and it is a singular circumstance that three founders of colleges at Oxford were members of this society, viz., Archbishop Rotheram, founder of Lincoln college, Bishop Smyth, founder of Brazenose college, and Bishop Fox, founder of Corpus Christi college. GONVILLE and CAIUS COLLEGE was founded by Edmund Gonville, rector of Terrington, in 1348, and augmented by John Cairns, physician to Queen Mary; and in consequence took its present name when incorporated in 1557. The building is entered by three gates, impressive from their several inscriptions—to Virtue, Wisdom, Humility and Honour. The chapel is handsome, and embellished with an altar-piece representing the Annunciation. TRINITY HALL was founded in 1351, by William Bateman, bishop of Norwich. This college is principally for students in civil law. CORPUS CHRISTI COLLEGE was founded in 1351, by two guilds of the town, under the protection of the Duke of Lancaster: it comprises a square court, on the sides of which are the master's lodge, and apartments for the fellows and students. In the library is the original manuscript of the 'thirty-nine articles;' and here are deposited the invaluable manuscripts collected by Archbishop Parker, whose munificence to this college, of which he was some time master, well entitles him to the appellation of a second founder. This college has been rebuilt; and, from the extent and magnificence of its buildings, ranks very high amongst the improvements which have contributed so greatly to the splendour of the University. KING'S COLLEGE, the most magnificent of the entire, is situated on the banks of the river, and consists of several large detached piles—and, as a whole, has a striking effect. The chapel is three hundred and sixteen feet long by seventy-eight wide, divided by a curiously carved wooden screen; the altar is embellished with a fine painting of the 'Descent from the Cross,' supposed to be by Raphael: nothing, perhaps, can exceed the august and venerable appearance of the chapel, with the large and beautifully painted windows, of which there are no less than twenty-five. This college was founded by Henry VI, and is intimately connected with Eton College, also founded by the same monarch. QUEEN'S COLLEGE, founded in 1446, by Margaret of Anjou, consort of Henry VI, is situated at the back of Catherine Hall: it is an ancient structure, supported by a fine brick gateway. It possesses a library of great value and general utility—Erasmus was some time a member of this college. CATHERINE HALL was founded in 1475, by Robert Woodlark, provost of King's College: it comprises three sides of a quadrangle, built

in a neat style, with a commodious hall, chapel, &c. JESUS' COLLEGE was founded on the site of a Benedictine nunnery, at the east end of the town, which was demolished in consequence of the licentiousness of the nuns: the present college was endowed by John Alcock, bishop of Ely, in the year 1496; the chapel (now in course of restoration), appears to have been the conventual church. This college is situated a little distance from the town, on the east; the grand front looks towards the south, and the entrance is by a fine ancient gate. Amongst its eminent members it enumerates Archbishop Cranmer, Strype the antiquary, Gilbert Wakefield, Dr. Clarke the celebrated traveller, and the poet Coleridge. CHRIST'S COLLEGE was built on the site of an hostel, called *God's House*, which had originally been settled near Clare Hall, and endowed by William Bingham, rector of Saint John Zachary, London, in 1442: it was removed here by Henry VI, who augmented the endowment; but in 1505 it was entirely refounded, under its present appellation, by Margaret Countess of Richmond, mother of Henry VII. It has a noble entrance and spacious courts, with a handsome chapel. Milton was a student of this college; and in the fellows' garden is a mulberry tree, still carefully preserved, said to have been planted by the illustrious poet. In 1509 SAINT JOHN'S COLLEGE was founded by the executors of the benevolent foundress of Christ's College, in pursuance of her will. It is richly endowed, and is second only to Trinity College, in the extent of its buildings and the number of its members: it consists of four courts, one of which is a magnificent structure, erected about twenty years since, from designs of Rickman and Hutchinson, and approached by a covered bridge over the Cam of singular beauty. MAGDALENE COLLEGE was founded in 1542, by Thomas Lord Audley, chancellor of England. The library contains the curious collection of Samuel Pepys, secretary of the admiralty, whose Diary is so well known. TRINITY COLLEGE is by far the largest in the University: the master's lodge contains a suite of apartments where the monarch resides when a royal visit is paid to Cambridge. The great court has three noble tower gateways, and is of magnificent dimensions; the hall and chapel are fine structures. In Neville's court is the library, one of the finest edifices in the University, erected from the designs of Sir Christopher Wren, and containing a valuable and extensive collection of books, and Thorwaldsen's famous statue of Lord Byron. A third court is called the King's Court, in honour of George IV, in whose reign it was erected from the designs of William Wilkins, Esq., R. A. Amongst the countless number of eminent names connected with this college may be mentioned Bacon, Newton, Barrow, Coke, Spelman, Cowley, Dryden and Byron. This college was founded in the year 1546, by Henry VIII. EMANUEL COLLEGE was founded in 1584, by Sir Walter Mildmay, chancellor of the exchequer and privy councillor to Queen Elizabeth: it is a neat and elegant structure, very pleasantly situated. SIDNEY SUSSEX COLLEGE was founded in 1594, by Frances Sidney, Countess of Sussex: some years since it received a new front, and several other improvements have been made—Oliver Cromwell was a member of this college. DOWNING COLLEGE was founded in pursuance of the will of Sir George Downing, Bart., dated in 1717. The validity of the will became the subject of legal enquiry, and, after protracted litigation, the foundation was finally approved by his majesty and the privy council, in September, 1800. The ceremony of laying the first stone took place on the 18th of May, 1807; and the college has been open for the reception of students during the last thirty years.

There are fourteen parishes in this town, and fifteen churches; but of these Great Saint Mary's, and the Holy Sepulchre alone present objects of sufficient importance for observation. Great Saint Mary's is situated in the middle of the town, and to this church the University resort on Sundays and holidays to hear sermons, but it is also free to the public: it consists of a nave, chancel and side isles. This edifice was erected by contribution, and its completion occupied nearly a century; it is surmounted by a handsome tower and lofty pinnacles. The church of the Holy Sepulchre, or the round church, is a venerable and singularly con-

structed pile: it is after a model of the church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem, and is conjectured to have been erected by the crusaders; it was restored in 1842-3, at an expense of about £3,000; several fine painted windows now light the interior. Two new churches (Christ church and Saint Paul's) have recently been built by subscription, in the populous and extensive parish of Saint Andrew the Less; and the parishioners of Saint Andrew the Great have erected a new and spacious church, in lieu of an ancient and inconvenient structure. There are several places of worship for dissenters, including Baptists, Independents, Methodists, and the Society of Friends.

Of the charitable institutions in Cambridge, and there are many, Addenbrooke's Hospital stands pre-eminent; it is a handsome edifice, situated at the London entrance to the town: its founder John Addenbrooke (an eminent physician, who died upwards of a century ago), endowed it as an hospital for the indigent diseased; the original design, however, has been changed, and it is now a general hospital: it is liberally supported by donations and annual subscriptions—about seven hundred persons are annually admitted and relieved. Comfortable retreats for aged and indigent inhabitants are afforded in numerous well maintained almshouses, which reflect a lustre on the character of the many benevolent founders and benefactors. The free grammar school, founded in 1615, by Stephen Perse, M.D., for one hundred boys of Cambridge, and the villages of Trumpington, Barwell and Chesterton, is another praiseworthy establishment, and has recently been reorganised under the sanction of the court of chancery. There are several other charity schools in the town, and many respectable private educational establishments for pupils of either sex. Near Corpus Christi college is the botanical garden, occupying about four acres of ground: it contains a large greenhouse, furnished with a great variety of valuable exotics; and in the garden are specimens of almost every plant, the whole arranged according to the Linnæan system; but it is about to be removed to a more eligible and spacious site, contiguous to the London entrance to the town. There is a philosophical society in connexion with the university, and there are several book societies. Three newspapers are published weekly—their titles, publishers, &c. may be seen in the directory. Concerts are occasionally given in the town-hall, and dramatic exhibitions are not uncommon.

Cambridge has in modern days become a considerable thoroughfare, particularly since the draining of the fens and the raising of excellent roads, towards the east and north-east coast, over places before deemed impassable, but by these improvements, its importance of transit and ready communication have been effectually accomplished by means of the Eastern Counties railway, its branches, and the lines in connection therewith, which have opened up a direct communication with the metropolis, Ely, Norwich, Yarmouth, Lynn, St. Ives, Huntingdon, Wisbeach, Peterborough, Stamford, Leicester, Boston, Lincoln and Hull. A large portion of the business carried on here is immediately or remotely connected with the University; but being the county town, and advantageously situated on the head of the inland navigation from Lynn, it secures an extensive trade in coal and corn; and a large quantity of butter, likewise, is conveyed weekly from this neighbourhood, the Isle of Ely and Norfolk, to London, where it all obtains the name of Cambridge butter. For the accommodation of the corn merchants attending the market here, a new and convenient corn exchange has been recently erected. The corporation of Cambridge consists of a mayor, high steward, recorder, ten aldermen, a town clerk, coroner, clerk of the peace, thirty councillors, a treasurer, and other officers; the number of burgesses is about 2,600. The town is divided into five wards, each having six councillors, namely, East Barwell, West Barwell, Market, Trinity and St. Andrew's. The borough returns two members to parliament, the right of election being vested in about sixty freemen and about nineteen hundred ten-pound householders; the mayor is returning officer; the present members are Robert Alexander Shafte Adair, Esq., 7 Audley-square, London, and the Hon. William Frederick Campbell, Stratheden House,

Knightsbridge, Middlesex. The limits of the parliamentary and municipal borough are co extensive. The University returns two representatives, elected by the senate; those at present sitting are the Hon. Charles Ewan Law (recorder of London), Eaton place, London, and the Right Hon. Henry Goulburn, Montague square, London. The assizes and quarter sessions for the county are held in the Shire house, a spacious and stately structure, erected on the site of the castle. The borough quarter sessions and the county court are held at the Guildhall—the latter under the new act for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £50. There are also consistory courts and visitations by the bishop and archdeacon of Ely; and a court of pleas, with very extensive powers, is held before the recorder, or his deputy, every Tuesday. Cambridge was constituted a separate Union, under the Poor Law Amendment Act, on the 19th March, 1836, and has a board of thirty guardians, of whom four are elected by the parish of Saint Andrew the Less, and two by every other parish: a workhouse, spacious and convenient, has been built for the purposes of the Union. The town had no adequate police previously to the year 1836, when, under the provisions of the Municipal Act, a police force on the metropolitan system was established by the corporate body. The borough gaol was erected in 1829, at a very considerable expense: that for the county at large is in the parish of Chesterton. There are no fewer than twelve principal inns—most of these are of the very first order of respectability, and their arrangements for families or commercial gentlemen are equally efficient. The inhabitants here are highly privileged in their walks, having those belonging to several of the colleges thrown open for their use. In 1843 a new general cemetery was opened on the Stilton road, neatly laid out, and placed under the management of eleven directors and twenty-two trustees. The market is held every day, but the principal business is done on Wednesdays and Saturdays. There are two fairs in the year—one on the 24th of June and following day, for horses and cattle; the other (Sturbridge fair) nominally commences on 18th September, but little business is done before the 25th; it formerly lasted for three weeks, but of late years its duration has been much abridged, though considerable transactions are still effected in wool, leather, hops, cheese and other commodities.

A few years since BARNWELL had the appearance of a small agricultural village; an immense number of houses have, however, been recently erected here, many of which are of a highly respectable character: the consequence is, that it now appears to be (what it always was in reality) a portion of the borough of Cambridge. The whole of the parish of Saint Andrew the Less, and parts of the parishes of Saint Benedict and the Holy Trinity, are, in the district, still popularly termed *Barnwell*.

The population of the *borough*, as returned to government in 1841, was 24,453—the number at the present time (1850) is estimated at 28,000, or thereabouts.

CHESTERTON is a parish, giving name to the hundred in which it lies—the village, large and pleasant, is one mile north from Cambridge, situated on the right of the road to Ely. The county gaol and a very spacious workhouse are in the parish; so were the remains of Cambridge castle, lately pulled down. There are several ferries across the Cam to Barnwell; and tea-gardens, bowling-greens, &c., are neatly laid out for

the Cambridge visitants. The parish church of Saint Andrew is principally in the decorated and later styles of English architecture: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Master and Fellows of Trinity College, Cambridge. Population of the parish, 1,617.

TRUMPINGTON is a parish, in the same hundred as Chesterton—the village, a pleasant one, is situated about two miles from Cambridge, on the London road. The parish church of Saint Mary and Saint Michael contains an ancient monument to the memory of Sir Roger de Trumpington, a crusader, who died in 1288: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Master and Fellows of Trinity College, Cambridge. Population of the parish, 759.

GREAT SHELFORD is a parish, in the hundred of Thripton—the village, a thriving one, and a railway station on the Eastern Counties line, is about 4 miles s. by E. from Cambridge. A trade in corn, malt and coal is carried on here to some extent, and there is a

large corn mill or two in the parish. The railway is a great accommodation to the agriculturists of this and the neighbouring parishes, and large quantities of produce are forwarded hence to London, Ware and other towns on the line. The places of worship are, the parish church of Saint Mary (said to have been built by Bishop Fordham in 1425), and a Baptist chapel. The living of Great Shelford is a discharged vicarage, in the patronage of the Bishop of Ely. A very respectable classical and commercial academy, and schools conducted upon the National and British plans, are in the village. The population of the parish as returned, in 1841, was 803.

LITTLE SHELFORD parish is contiguous to that of Great Shelford, and the village is situated about a mile from the railway station. James Edmund Law, Esq., is lord of the manor and patron of the church living—which is a rectory: the church is dedicated to All Saints. Population of the parish, 527.

## CHATTERIS

As a parish, in the northern division of Witchford hundred, Isle of Ely—the town, which in 1834, obtained the privilege of holding a market, is 71 miles S. from London (83 by rail), 28 S. by W. from Cambridge, 12 N. by E. from St. Ives, and the like distance S.W. from the city of Ely; situated on the line of the Eastern Counties Railway, for which the town is a station. Chatteris is a place of considerable antiquity: in Domesday-book it was written *Cetrix* and *Cateriz*; in some old authors, *Chateriz*; and Camden, differing from all the other authorities, writes it *Cheaterizh*. A convent of Benedictine monks was founded here about the year 980, by Alwena, niece to King Edgar, and wife of Athelstan, Earl of the East Angles: in the reign of Henry I. the nunnery was annexed to the church of Ely, and totally suppressed in 1538: the manor house, an ancient edifice, stands upon the site of the nunnery. There have been many antiquities dug up here in excavating for gravel: not many years since part of the skeleton of an elephant was found ten feet below the surface of the ground; and in 1824 an earthen vessel, containing about one thousand copper coins, was ploughed up about two miles from the village; they were of Roman origin, chiefly of the emperors Constantius and Constantine, and a few with the emblem of Romulus and Remus suckled by a wolf. Several curious relics of the same nation have been found at different periods hereabout—amongst others, celts, and a double-edged sword, the hilt embossed with figures of men fighting—this interesting antique was, when discovered, in a remarkably perfect state of preservation. In several parts of the fen lauds large

oak trees have been brought to the surface from a considerable depth. The trade of the place is almost wholly of a domestic retail character, assisted by the neighbouring gentry and farmers; besides which it is a thoroughfare town, being the direct road from Norfolk to Huntingdon and the western counties, and also lying on a fine line of road between Peterborough and Newmarket: the opening of the Eastern Counties, and other railways have, however, diminished the road traffic through Cambridgeshire, and injured the trade of some of its towns, while the rail has advanced the prosperity of others. The Bishop of Ely is lord of the manor, and a court-leet is held by him on Saint Matthew's day, when constables are appointed, and nuisances presented; petty sessions are also held at the George Inn, on the first and third Tuesdays in each month; and Chatteris is included in the March circuit of towns under the act (passed August, 1846) for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.

The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul is a handsome structure, with a square tower: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage and also present incumbency of the Rev. Michael Augustus Gathercole. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents, Calvinists, the Society of Friends, and Methodists—both Primitive and Wesleyan. There are public schools, conducted upon the British and National plans—the latter, for children of either sex, is a most efficient and useful establishment. The market is held on Friday, and the fairs on the last Friday in April and the first Friday in October. The parish of Chatteris contained in 1831, 4,177 inhabitants, and in 1841, 4,813.

**ELY.**

THIS city, the capital of the isle of Ely, is situated about the centre of the county of Cambridge; 67 miles N. by E. from London, 16 N. by E. from Cambridge, and 13 S. N. W. from Newmarket. The Venerable Bede derives its name from the vast quantities of eels taken in the low fen lands previous to and in his time, when they were not embanked or drained; and other authorities are either silent upon the subject, or acquiesce in the opinion of this ancient writer. The city stands on the Banks of the Ouse, upon an eminence, overlooking

on every side, an extensive range of country: it is clean but possesses little that can interest the stranger besides its cathedral—which forms a noble and prominent object. The town consists principally of one long street, from which other smaller ones branch; near the centre is a tolerably spacious market place, and commodious corn exchange—the latter erected in 1847. The shire hall, or court house, is a convenient building, composed of a centre and two wings; the former contains apartments for holding the courts, while the

north wing is appropriated to the purposes of an infirmary and the south to a chapel; a house of correction is behind the court house, and the common gaol is on one side of it. A very handsome building, has been erected, near the city, for the extensive Union formed in the neighbourhood under the New Poor law.

The district around Ely is strictly agricultural, and the manufactures of the city are neither various nor extensive: there are several flour and oil mills, some maltings and breweries, and a pottery. Gardening is pursued generally and prosperously; several acres of land are appropriated to the growth of that delicate vegetable, asparagus, much of which is despatched to the London market; and by means of the river Onse a considerable trade is carried on in corn and coal. The fen lands in the vicinity are preserved from inundation by artificial banks constructed along the sides of the rivers; these lands, from their improved state of drainage, are much more valuable now than they formerly were: the steam engine has superseded the employment of windmills in raising the waters from the lands into the river. The principal inns are the 'White Hart,' the 'Lamb,' and the 'Angel;' they have all an established reputation with commercial gentlemen: the first-named has a good bowling-green attached. Courts of sessions are held regularly in the shire hall; courts leet and baron are held by the bishop for his manor, and by the dean and chapter for the manor over which they have jurisdiction. The assizes for the Isle of Ely, formerly held here and at Wisbeach alternately, have been discontinued, under the provisions of a recent act of parliament: for that and many other purposes, the affairs of the Isle of Ely are merged in the general business of the county; but Ely is included in the thirty-second circuit of County Court towns, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount, not exceeding £20.—the court sits monthly in the shire hall. A Mechanics' Institution was established in 1842, and a Museum connected with it, was opened in 1849—it has also a well selected library.

A church and monastery were established here by Ethelreda, a princess of East Anglia, so early as the year 673; these edifices, and the ancient monastery of Soham (six miles distant), were reduced to ashes about two centuries after their foundation, and their religious inhabitants massacred, by the ruthless Danes. In 970 Ethelwald, bishop of Winchester, purchased the whole Isle and rebuilt the monastery; he placed some monks in it, and appointed an abbot over them: it subsequently passed through various hands, being alternately demolished and rebuilt, until the year 1541, when Henry VIII granted a charter for converting it into a cathedral, to

be dedicated to the Undivided Trinity, which was accordingly done; this charter ordained that the establishment should consist of a dean, a priest, eight prebendaries and sundry other ministers. The present establishment comprises a bishop, eight canons, five minor canons, eight lay clerks and the like number of choristers. The edifice, as it now stands, is a majestic and elegant pile, erected at different periods, and presenting a curious medley of the Saxon and Gothic-Norman styles: it is 535 feet long from east to west, and 190 from north to south; its height is 112 feet, and that of the west tower (the spire of which has been removed) 215 feet. The architecture of the interior is chaste, yet highly ornamented; it contains two chapels, which suffered injury from the excesses committed by the soldiers of Cromwell in the contest between Charles I and the Parliament. Several interesting monuments of bishops, and a tomb of one of the earls of Worcester, erected in the time of Richard III, are worth notice. The Right Rev. Thomas Turton, D.D. is the present Bishop; and the very Reverend George Peacock, D.D. (rector of Wentworth), is dean. Trinity church, formerly called Saint Mary's chapel, stands at the south side of the cathedral—indeed it has for many years been attached to, and forms part of the latter structure: its interior has been most superb; the roof is unsupported by pillars, and was at one time painted sky-blue, and studded with gilt stars, to represent the firmament. The other church—Saint Mary's, stands a short distance from the cathedral; the livings of both are perpetual curacies, in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter. There are places of worship for Baptists, the Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists, and Lady Huntington's connexion. The charitable and educational institutions comprise a national school, and a well-conducted free school—the latter founded by a Mrs. Catherine Needham, for thirty poor boys, who are clothed annually, and with each an apprenticeship fee is given: there is also a free grammar school, founded by Henry VIII, for conferring on the sons of tradesmen belonging to the city a classical education; a competent master is appointed by the Dean and Chapter of Ely; the school is, however, but thinly attended. There are almshouses for poor widows; and a considerable income, arising from estates devised by a Mr. Thomas Parson, is annually distributed among the poor inhabitants of the city; there are also other minor charities. The market is held on Thursday, for corn, cattle, seed and other commodities. Fairs, Holy Thursday and October 29th. The city, comprising the two parishes of Trinity and Saint Mary, Ely college, and Chetesham chapelry, contained by the official returns, made in 1831, 6,189 inhabitants, and in 1841, 6,825.

LINTON,

WITH THE VILLAGES OF WHITTLESFORD, DUXFORD AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

LINTON is a small market town, in the hundred of Chilford, 48 miles from London, 14 s. by w. from Newmarket, 11 s.e. from Cambridge, 6 n. from Saffron Walden, and 4 from Bourne Bridge—a station on the Newmarket branch of the Eastern Counties railway; situated on the principal road from Cambridge to Colchester. At this place were formerly two priories; the one under the abbey of Saint Jacutas de Insulabretagne, the possession of which, on the dissolution of certain alien priories, became vested in the Master and Fellows of Pembroke college, Cambridge; the other was a priory of Crutched friars, situated at Barham: the hall, chapel and cloisters of the convent are still remaining, and form part of the mansion called Barham Hall. Linton is conjectured to have been a Roman station, from the circumstance of divers coins of that people having been dug up in its grounds. The town itself possesses but few attractions; but the country around is pleasant, and interspersed with several genteel residences. The currying of leather and maiting, form the principal branches of trade here. Close to the town are beautiful and extensive nursery grounds, and fruit and flower gardens, occupying about nine acres. A court leet is held annually by the lord of the manor.

The parish church of Saint Mary, is a very beautiful structure, with a lofty embattled tower, containing a ring of sweet-toned bells. In the south aisle is a handsome marble monument, erected by Peter Standley, Esq. in memory of Elizabeth, his sister and benefactress: it represents Hope, supported by her anchor, looking upwards; on one side is a fine medallion of Mr. Standley: there are several other monuments of some local interest. The living of Linton is a discharged vicarage, in the diocese of Ely; the Master and Fellows of Pembroke hall, Cambridge, are the patrons; the present vicar is the Rev. William Brett. A place of worship for Independents, and two public schools conducted respectively upon the national and British plans, are in the town. The market, which was granted

in 1245 to William de Lay, is held on Thursday. Fairs July 31st and Holy Thursday. The town and parish contained, in 1831, 1,678 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,838.

WHITTLESFORD is a parish, giving name to the hundred in which it lies—the village is about 6 miles w. by N. from Linton, and one mile from the line of the Eastern Counties railway. A manufactory for agricultural implements, and corn and oil mills are in the parish, but the farming interest preponderates. The church of Saint Barnabas (or as some say Saint Mary) is very ancient: the living is a discharged vicarage, in the gift of the Master and Fellows of Jesus college, Cambridge; the Rev. P. C. M. Hoskin, is the present incumbent. An endowed school for boys and girls is in the parish. A market and fair were formerly held here, but they have long since ceased to be observed. Population of the parish in 1841, 579.

DUXFORD, is an extensive parish, in the hundred of Whittlesford—the village, which is situated about 2 miles from the Whittlesford station, on the line of the Eastern Counties railway, possesses little to distinguish it from other rural and agricultural villages. In the way of trade, however, we may except a considerable brewery, and as an object of curiosity, a very old inn—the Red Lion; this was formerly a priory, but by whom founded does not appear. The rafters are fancifully carved, as is an old oak table of great weight. A barn now occupies the site of the chapel belonging to the priory. Duxford is comprised in the two parishes of Saint John and Saint Peter, but the boundaries of each are not defined. The living of Saint John's is a discharged vicarage, in the gift of the Master and Fellows of Clare Hall, Cambridge; that of Saint Peter's is a rectory, in the patronage of the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi college, Cambridge: the churches exhibit nothing worthy of observation beyond their antiquity. There is a public school conducted upon the national plan. The population of the parish in 1841, was 763.

**MARCH AND DODDINGTON,**

WITH THE VILLAGE OF WIMBLINGTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**M**A<sup>R</sup>C<sup>H</sup> is a neat market town and chapelry in the parish of Doddington—79 miles N. from London (87½ by rail), 32 N. from Cambridge, 19 N. by W. from Ely, 16 S. W. from Downham Market, 18 E. by S. from Peterborough, and 24 N.E. by N. from Huntingdon; situated on the Eastern Counties railway, for which line this town is a station. It is pleasantly seated on the banks of the river Nene, which is here navigable, and furnishes the means of conveying coal, corn and timber to Cambridge, Wi-beach, Lynn, Peterborough, St. Ives, Bedford, and various other places; and previous to the opening of railways the navigable carrying trade was much more considerable than since. The town has, however, been for some years progressively improving in trade and appearance; and its thoroughfare has increased, in consequence of most of the fen roads having been rendered pass-able at all seasons of the year; indeed, they are now as good as any roads in the kingdom—a fact, not perhaps, so generally known as it deserves to be. The county around March is flat, and the land, which is chiefly appropriated to agriculture, yields heavy crops of excellent wheat. The chapelry, for the purpose of effecting a drainage of the lands, is divided into six districts, comprising in all about twenty

thousand acres; and under an excellent system, with the auxiliary power of two steam engines, much land has been reclaimed and brought into cultivation. In High-street stands the guildhall, a modern erection and a neat commodious edifice; in it the town's business is transacted, and the manorial courts held; and here sits a county court, monthly, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. Within the same building are two spacious school rooms, where children of the humbler class are taught upon the national plan. In 1696 a school was founded by William Neale for the education of eight boys in Latin and English, and endowed with lands in Whites Fen, under certain conditions of agriculture. In the spacious market place, an engine house has been erected, with a room for transacting public business (surmounted by a turret and clock); and there is also a lock-up having four wards.

The church (or chapel) belonging to the parish of Doddington, stands about a mile from March bridge, on the London road; it is dedicated to Saint Wendreda, and was erected about the year 1343: it is of gothic architecture, and consists of a nave and two side aisles, with a stone spire at the west end; under the battlements, on both sides of the church, the flint-work

forms various grotesque figures; and beneath the belfry is a large open arch, through which is a foot-path. The Baptists, Independents, Society of Friends and Methodists have places of worship—all neat structures. Several valuable charities are supported here, by which children are educated and apprenticed, the needy clothed and food periodically distributed. A house and lands were bequeathed by a Mr. Henry Wade, the rents of which are applied (under a decree of chancery, obtained in 1713) in the following manner: £20. a year to a schoolmaster, for the instruction of twenty children of March; the like sum annually for apprenticeship fees; £5. a year to decayed housekeepers; and the residue in the purchase of lieffers, on Easter Monday, for poor housekeepers. There are also some unendowed almshouses for the parochial poor. The market is held on Friday; and fairs on the first Monday before Whit-Sunday and the third Tuesday in October. Population of the chapelry in 1831, 5,117, and in 1841, 5,706.

DODDINGTON parish, comprises, as before stated, the chapelry and market town of March, the chapelry of Benwick, the hamlet of Wimblington, and the village of Doddington—the latter situated on the main road

between March and Chatteris, equidistant from each place; and is the centre of the Union for the hundred of North Witchford, for which a capacious poor-house has been erected. Sir Henry Peyton, Bart. is lord of the manor and patron of the church living, which is a rectory, and the richest in the county. The church is dedicated to Saint Mary. A free school was endowed here, upwards of a century ago, by Lionel Walden, a native of the parish, but it is only a few years that the fund has been made available. The parish contained, in 1831, 7,527 inhabitants; in 1841, 8,648, of which last number about 1,000 belonged to the village.

A short distance from Doddington, on the road to March, and contiguous to the line of the Eastern Counties railway, is the hamlet of WIMBLINGTON. A Mr. Thomas Eaton, in 1714, directed a school to be founded here, and bestowed lands of considerable value for that purpose—but, owing to vexatious and prolonged litigation in chancery, the intention of the benevolent donor was for a long time defeated; but the school is now in operation, and conducted usefully upon the national plan. The hamlet numbers about 1,100 inhabitants.

**NEWMARKET AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

NEWMARKET is a pleasant well-built market town, comprising the parish of Saint Mary, in the hundred of Lackford, county of Suffolk, and the parish of All Saint, hundred of Cheveley, county of Cambridge; 59 miles S.E. from London, 13 E. by S. from Cambridge, and the like distance S.E. from Ely; situated on the Newmarket and Chesterford branch of the Eastern Counties railway: the station of the company here is spacious, convenient and handsome. In former times this town was dependent upon Exning, once a

place of importance—having a royal residence and an established market; the latter advantage, tradition asserts, was removed from Exning, in 1227, in consequence of the prevalence of a local contagious disease—and hence the derivation of the name 'New Market.' A building, called 'the King's House,' was originally erected here by James I, for the purpose of enjoying the diversion of hunting; and the subsequent reputation of the town for horse racing is said to have arisen from the spirit and speed of some Spanish horses,

which, having been wrecked with the vessels of the Armada, reached the shore of Galloway and were brought hither. Its celebrity vastly increased in the reign of Charles II—the great patron of the turf, who rebuilt the ‘King’s House,’ which had been suffered to fall into decay during the troublous period of the civil war—and frequently honoured the races with his presence. Upon one occasion, in 1683, when a great portion of the town was destroyed by fire, Charles II, his consort and the Duke of York were in Newmarket, for the enjoyment of the races: the conflagration caused the royal party to return to London eight days sooner than they had intended, and this circumstance preserved the king from the catastrophe premeditated by the ‘Rye House’ conspirators. The palace erected by King James has been sold, and converted into shops; the one added to the original structure by Charles is still standing, and was occupied by the late Duke of York during the meetings: belonging to it are extensive stables. At the close of the civil war Charles I was removed from the house of Lady Cutts, of Childerley, to this town, on the 9th of June, 1647, and remained here about ten days.

The annals of ‘the Turf’ have long celebrated the Newmarket race-course—the finest, perhaps, in Britain: it is formed on an extensive heath contiguous to the town, on the London side. The training ground is more than a mile and a half long, on a gentle acclivity, well adapted to keep the horses in wind. There are seven meetings in the year, but those held in Easter week and in October are the most attractive and important. At these periods the liveliness of the town exceeds the expectation of the stranger: bustle and activity pervade the inns and taverns, where every bed is previously engaged; while the numerous amateurs and jockeys, who congregate here from all parts of the empire, with their ‘high mettled racers,’ give a peculiar feature to the scene. Whatever trade and prosperity Newmarket has acquired are the results of its sporting celebrity, and may be considered dependent on affairs connected with the turf. A particular source of profit, to numerous individuals, is the training of horses for the course—it is estimated that not less than four hundred horses are in the town the greater part of the

year, and their supply is beneficial both to the market and to the farmers in the neighbourhood. The accommodations at the inns, of which there are five of a superior grade, are proverbially excellent. In the centre of the town is an elegant and extensive building called ‘the Rooms,’ the property of the Jockey Club, and to which none but subscribers can obtain admission; the interior is fitted up with every convenience: here the members meet for the transaction of business connected with the turf, and where dinners are occasionally provided, for which there is every accommodation. The area in front of the edifice may be aptly termed the ‘sporting exchange,’ for it is on this spot that the betters assemble to ‘confer notes together,’ to settle their accounts, and to speculate on future ‘events.’ The Duke of Rutland is lord of the manor, and holds by his steward courts occasionally: the magistrates (in whom the government of the town is vested) assemble here every Tuesday in petty session; and a county court is held monthly, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.—Newmarket being included in the thirty-sixth circuit of towns under the act passed in 1846, for that purpose.

The churches of All Saints and Saint Mary are both handsome structures—the latter especially so, and is noticed for its beautiful tower and spire, which attracts observation for a considerable distance around. The living of All Saints is a perpetual curacy in the patronage of the Bishop of Norwich; the Rev. John Taylor is the present incumbent. Saint Mary’s benefice is a discharged rectory in the gift of the Duke of Rutland; the Rev. Francis Sands Bradshaw, is the present rector. The Independents and Wesleyan Methodists have each a place of worship; and there are two public schools—one possessing an endowment, the other conducted upon the national plan. The market days are Tuesday and Saturday—the former for corn and vegetables, the latter for articles of general consumption. Fairs, Tuesday in Whitsun week and November 8th—the latter a very extensive one for cattle, horses, hops, corn, butter, cheese, &c. In 1831 the parish of All Saints contained 714 inhabitants, and that of Saint Mary, 2,134; in 1841 the population of the former parish was 813, and the latter 2,143.

**ROYSTON,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF MELBOURN AND BASSINGBOURNE.

**ROYSTON** is a parish, partly in the hundred of Armingford, county of Cambridge, but mostly in Odey hundred, Hertfordshire—the market town is 38 miles N. from London, 13 s.s.w. from Cambridge, 20 N. from Hertford and 10 s.w. from Whittlesford, a station on the Eastern Counties railway. It is situated in the midst of an immense tract of downs, affording in its scenery but small delight to the admirers of the picturesque, or pleasure to those who are charmed by the view of a well-tilled soil; by the lover of field sports, however, this locality is well appreciated—for the amusement of such, an excellent pack of barriers occasionally 'range the downs,' and races are also held annually in May. The name of the town is conjectured to have been derived from Dame Roise or Roysia, a lady who was held in high estimation about the time of the Conquest: this lady, it appears, had caused a cross to be erected in the highway—hence the place was designated *Rosie's Cross*; at a subsequent period a monastery for Austin canons was endowed, and, for the accommodation of the religious, houses were constructed, which in progress of time increased so much in number that the name of 'Roise's Town' was bestowed upon it, and afterwards, by contraction, 'Royston.' In 1742 some workmen, who were employed near the market house, discovered a curious excavation, which communicated with a subterranean oratory, supposed by Dr. Stukely and others, to have been formed under the direction of the Lady Roise, as an oratory and burial-ground for herself. After much labour and caution had been employed in clearing away the rubbish, fragments of a human skeleton were found, which tended to confirm Dr. Stukely's opinion; texts

of scripture were rudely sculptured on the lower part of the oratory which is circular, and finished in the manner of a dome. Royston had become a considerable town in the reign of Henry IV, when it was nearly burnt to the ground; and again, in 1747, it suffered the like calamity. James I erected a house and made it his occasional residence for the enjoyment of hunting and hawking; and it was here that the Earl of Somerset, his favourite, was arrested in his presence for the murder of Sir Thomas Overbury. At the commencement of the civil war, Charles I removed to this house from Hampton Court; and here too, this misguided monarch passed two nights, in June, 1647, when a prisoner to the army, which had its head-quarters here: during the commonwealth this palace is described as having been kept in good repair, although but few vestiges of it, can now be traced. The town, which consists of five principal streets, is gas-lighted by a company established in 1836, whose works are at the northern extremity of the town. Considerable business is done here by maltsters and corn factors, the greater number of whom are respectable farmers residing in the neighbourhood, and possessing malting-houses and premises in the town. The manor of the town was originally granted by Richard I to the monastery; it is now vested in the family of Lord Dacre: the same monarch also bestowed the privilege of holding an annual fair during Whitsun-week and a weekly market on Wednesday. Royston, under the New Poor Law, has become the centre of an Union comprising twenty-nine parishes, for the poor of which there is a neat brick building, calculated to accommodate about three hundred recipients; and it is included in the thirty-

sixth circuit of county court towns, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.—this court sits monthly in a neat building, erected for the purpose on the Fish Hill.

The parish church of Saint Thomas à Becket (or as some assert Saint John the Baptist), is of great antiquity, having belonged to the monastery before-mentioned, and was purchased by the inhabitants soon after the dissolution of religious houses: it is of venerable appearance, with a low embattled tower at the west end, containing five bells, and comprises a nave, chancel and side aisles; a gallery and organ have lately been added by means of subscriptions, and it possesses a valuable library of rare works, principally in the Latin language. The living of Royston is a vicarage, in the gift of Lord Dacre. There are places of worship for Independents, Unitarians and the Society of Friends. Sunday schools are connected generally with the places of worship, and there are the church and infant working schools, maintained by voluntary subscriptions. In 1816 a subscription library was established; it contains nearly four thousand volumes; and in 1835 a reading room was added, which is well supplied with newspapers and periodical works. The market, a large one for corn, still continues to be holden on the Wednesday. Fairs on Ash-Wednesday, the Wednesdays in Easter and Whitsun-weeks, the first Wednesday in July, and the first Wed. after Old Michaelmas-day. The parish

MELBOURN is a parish, in the hundred of Armingford—the village, which is respectable and thriving, is 3 miles N. by E. from Royston, and chiefly consists of one long street, many of the houses forming which are well-built and of modern erection. The church, ancient and unostentatious in appearance, is dedicated to Thomas à Becket: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Bishop of Ely. The Independents and Baptists have a chapel each, and there are two public schools—one founded by the Rev. William Ayloff, the other upon the British and Foreign plan. An annual pleasure fair or feast is held on the first Wednesday in July. The population in 1831, was 1,474, and in 1811, 1,724.

BASSINGBOURNE is a parish, in the same hundred as Melbourn—the village, formerly a market town, is 3 miles N.W. from Royston. It was of some consequence in the reigns of Henry III and Edward III, the former having instituted its market, and the latter confirming its privileges—which have long since been abandoned. The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, is a small structure, the living is a vicarage, in the presentation of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster. There is a place of worship for Independents, and a school conducted upon the British plan. A small pleasure fair or feast is held here in July. The parish (including Kneesworth hamlet), contained in 1831, 1,446 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,774.

**SOHAM, FORDHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

SOHAM is a parish in the hundred of Staploe—the small town, which until within these few years upheld a market, is 69 miles S.E. from London, 19 N.E. from Cambridge, 8 S.W. from Newmarket, and nearly 6 S.E. from Ely—the last-named place being the nearest railway station. The town, which is situated about four miles from the Suffolk border, on the banks of the Cam, possesses but little claim to regularity in its streets or buildings. In its vicinity at one time, the fens extended over fourteen hundred acres; these, however, have been successfully drained and brought into cultivation, so that the air, which previously was considered injurious to health, is now perfectly salubrious. Gardening is carried on to a great extent, the land in this parish being now as rich as any in the kingdom; fruit and vegetables are sent from hence to London and various other places, in great quantities; there are also numerous dairies, and the cheese made in this district is rich and similar to the famed Stilton. The government of the town is vested chiefly in the magistrates for the division, assisted by a police force established here in 1817, and in the following year gas was introduced for lighting the town. Soham is included in a circuit of towns under the act passed in 1816, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20: the court sits monthly in the town hall, lately erected by subscription.

In the sixth century Saint Felix, the first bishop of East Anglia, founded a monastery here; two hundred years after the Danes laid it in ruins, and massacred

the monks; nor did the desolators stop here—about the same period they burned and demolished the church erected by Luttingen, a Saxon nobleman: a few fragments of this ore-famed edifice are still to be seen. The present church of Saint Andrew is a venerable cruciform structure, with a square embattled tower at the western end, containing a fine peal of ten bells: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Master and Fellows of Pembroke hall, Cambridge. The Baptists, Independents, Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists and Unitarians, have each a chapel; and there are some anciently-founded almshouses and an endowed free school. The market which was held on Thursday has ceased to be observed, but a fair is still maintained for cattle on the 9th of May; and a pleasure fair or feast, which continues during the week, commences on the Monday next before the nativity of Saint John the Baptist. The population of the parish, in 1831, was 3,667, and in 1841, 4,691.

FORDHAM, is a parish and village in the same hundred as, and about 3 miles S.E. from Soham; situated in an exceedingly fertile part of the country, embellished with well cultivated garden grounds, which produce abundance of almost every kind of vegetable. The places of worship are the parish church of Saint Mary, and a chapel each for Independents and Wesleyan Methodists. The living of Soham is a discharged vicarage in the patronage of the Master and Fellows of Jesus College, Cambridge. The parish contained in 1831, 1,325 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,416.

**THORNEY.**

THORNEY is a parish, in the hundred of Wisbeach—the town which is neat, and at one time had a market, is 86 miles n. from London, 32 n.w. from Ely, 35 n.n.w. from Cambridge, 7 n.e. from Peterborough, and 5 n. from Whittlesey—the two last named being stations on the Great Northern railway. It was originally called *Ankar-iz*, or *Ankeridge*—meaning in the Saxon language (as some authors assert) ‘Thorney Island’; others, however, derive the name from the circumstance of some *anchorites* residing here during the existence of its ancient abbey, which was founded by *Sesulphus*, or *Saxulphus*, first abbot of Peterborough, in the time of St. Elthreda, A.D. 662. A magnificent church, much larger than the present one, was erected in Thorney in 1128: the greater part of this structure was destroyed when the abbey was suppressed, in the reign of Henry VIII; and in 1636 the aisles were taken away, and the nave fitted up for divine service. It is dedicated to the Virgin and Saint Botolph, and, even as it now stands, is venerable and imposing. A superb

window of stained glass has lately been inserted over the altar, and the church enlarged by the addition of a transept, at the expense of his Grace the Duke of Bedford. There is no certain endowment, the living being extra-parochial; and the officiating clergyman receives an annual stipend from the Duke of Bedford, who is lord of the manor, and also proprietor of the entire parish. This nobleman benevolently provides instruction for boys, girls and infants, in three separate school-rooms.

The principal occupation of the inhabitants of this parish is agriculture. Large flocks of sheep are reared in this district: the average number annually sent to London, through this town, is about 3,000. A charter of ancient date entitles the inhabitants to hold a weekly market, but the privilege has not for some years been exercised. Fairs are held July 1st and September 21st—these are noted for the show of horse, which are brought from a great distance. The parish, contained in 1831, 2,055 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,150.

## UPWELL AND OUTWELL.

UPWELL is a parish, partly in the hundred of Wisbeach in this county, and partly in that of Clackclose, Norfolk—the village, large and populous is situated between 6 and 7 miles S.E. from Wisbeach, and on both sides of the river Nene. Domesday-book informs us, that it belonged, with Outwell, to the abbey of Ramsey, and was at that period a place of some note. With respect to general trade, it has no claim to importance; agriculture, and the attention to garden ground being the prevailing, if not the only occupation, of the inhabitants; and the produce of the land, which is of great fertility, is forwarded to various places by the navigable Nene, and by the railway from Wisbeach and March. The church is dedicated to Saint Peter; the living is a rectory, of which the Rev. William Gale Townley, is the present incumbent. The population of Upwell parish (including WELNEY chapelry), in 1831, was 4,156, and in 1841, 4,891.

Adjoining to Upwell is the parish of OUTWELL, situated similarly to the former—the Nene passing through it, and being partly in Cambridgeshire and partly in the county of Norfolk. From being seated on a river it was in past ages called *Wylla*; and in some old records it is mentioned as 'the town of *Welle*.' Near the church once stood a hermitage, dedicated to Saint Christopher; its site is still pointed out, but no remains of it are now perceptible. Agriculture is the unvaried pursuit of the inhabitants—as to general business, it is on an equality with Upwell. The village, which is long and straggling, contains a neat church, dedicated to Saint Clement, and a school supported by subscriptions. The living of Outwell is a rectory, in the patronage of the Bishop of Ely; the Rev. George Nicholas Dealtry is the present incumbent. The entire parish contained in 1831, 986 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,252.

**WHITTLESEY,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF EASTREA, COATES AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**WHITTLESEY** or **WHITTLESEA**, is an ancient market town, comprised in the united parishes of Saint Andrew and Saint Mary, in the hundred of North Witchford; 78 miles N. by W. from London, 30 N. by W. from Cambridge, and 6½ E. from Peterborough (Northamptonshire); situated on the Eastern County-railway, for which line the company have a station here. *Whitise* is the name given to it in Domesday-book, but its derivation has not been satisfactorily determined. Traces of a Roman road, existing in the vicinity, and the repeated discovery of various relics of that nation in different parts of the parish, preclude all doubt of its having been a Roman station. Around here the land is generally flat, remarkably productive; and the branches of the Nene, passing north and south of the town, tend materially to promote the fertility of the soil. John Wallbanke Childers, Esq. is lord of the manor, and holds courts leet and baron twice a year; and Whittlesey is included in the Peterborough circuit of towns, under the late County Court act, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.

Each parish has its church: Saint Mary's is a very handsome structure, but most particularly admired for its lofty and beautiful square tower, which is surmounted by a tapering spire of the finest symmetry, highly ornamented. Saint Andrew's is also a neat building, and is likewise ornamented with a very fine square tower and turrets. The patronage of Saint Mary's living is in the lord of the manor, and the Crown has the gift of Saint Andrew's. There are places of worship for

Baptists, Independents, Calvinists and Wesleyan Methodists. There are two endowed schools: one founded in 1735, by a Mr. Adam Kellfull, now conducted on the national plan; the other, founded in 1815, by John Sndbury, Esq. A library and news-room has been for a considerable time established, and is well supported by subscribers; and the Whittlesey Institution, founded in 1847, is also prosperous. Contiguous to this parish, but in the county of Huntingdon, was Whittlesey Mere, or, as it was sometimes termed, the White Sea—a fine expanse of water, abounding with fish; but this is now being drained off, and will speedily disappear. The market, held on Friday, was for several years unattended; but it has been revived, and the contiguity of the railway has imparted an impetus to its business. An annual fair is held on the 13th June, for horses. The two parishes contained, conjointly, in 1831, 6,019 inhabitants, and in 1841, 6,874.

**EASTREA**, is a small village and railway station, about one mile E. from Whittlesey. The rail has been the means of bringing the place into notice—but independent of this, it is merely a rural hamlet, the inhabitants of which are all in agricultural employment: their number is about 300.

**COATES**, is a village, about 2½ miles E. by N. from Whittlesey, and about a mile from Estrea. A neat district church was erected here in 1840, and dedicated to the Holy Trinity: it was endowed by the munificence of Mr. Childers, before mentioned. The population of the village is about 600.

**WISBEACH,**

AND THE VILLAGES OF ELM AND LEVERINGTON, WITH EMMETH AND WALSOKEN (*Norfolk.*)

**WISBEACH**, or **WISBECH**, is a large and respectable market-town and sea-port, in the hundred of its name, 18le of Ely—90 miles N. from London (93 by rail, through Ely; and 99½ through Huntingdon); 43 N. from Cambridge (42½ by rail); 31 N. N. W. from Ely (27½ by rail); situated at the northern extremity of the county, on both sides of the Nene, which is crossed by a handsome stone bridge, and on the line of the East Anglian railway. As to the derivation of its name, the opinions of etymologists are at variance. It is said to have been anciently called *Onze-beach*—being the beach, or outfall, of the river Onse; but the late Mr. William Watson, author of a history of the town, affirms that its Saxon name was *Wisebec*, and that in Domesday-book it is written *Wisebece*; he likewise states, that at the foundation of the Trinity Guild, in 1739, the name is spelt *Wysbech*, and it is so impressed on the corporate seal.—Its appellation, as now generally received, is **WISBEACH**. The origin of the town, and its local transactions prior to the Conquest, are nearly lost in obscurity; but some time previous to that event, and in the early part of the same century, it is said to have been given to the convent of Ely, by Oswy and Leofede, the parents of Alwyn (afterwards bishop of Elmham), upon his being admitted into the convent. The Conqueror, in the last year of his reign, erected a castle here, to keep the refractory barons in subjection, and to check the ravages of the outlaws, who made frequent incursions from the neighbouring morasses into the upland parts of the county;—this fortress, with the greater part of the town, was destroyed by an inundation of the sea in 1236. In the reign of Elizabeth, the castle, which had previously been reconstructed, was converted into a place of security for the confinement of state pris-

oners; and, during the protectorate of Cromwell, it was purchased by his secretary Thurlow: the remains of this edifice have gradually disappeared in the improvements of the town. Richard I, in 1190, granted the inhabitants an exemption from toll in all fairs and markets throughout the kingdom—which grant, with other privileges, was confirmed by King John, who, in 1216, visited Wisbeach, and took up his residence in the castle; and on his departure, in attempting to cross the Wash at an improper time and without competent guides, lost all his carriages, treasure and regalia, by a sudden irruption of the sea. The author above referred to says—'Wisbeach is a town which, though not able to boast of mineral productions, magnificent remains of antiquity or works of modern art, may yet justly lay claim to many charitable foundations, of extensive and permanent utility—to luxuriant pastures and rich corn-fields, spreading around in all directions—and to a poet, yearly improving in activity and importance.' As respects its present commercial importance, and the appearance of the town, Wisbeach has for many years been an improving place—indeed it may be considered the most flourishing trading town in the Isle of Ely. The inhabitants, duly appreciating the advantages of an excellent navigation, are enterprising, and carry on an extensive trade in coal, corn, timber, wool, &c., with London and other places: the aggregate tonnage of the port in 1849 was 140,120. The town is not conspicuous in manufactures: it contains some breweries of magnitude, and large maltings; and whitening is made in considerable quantities. Besides these different articles of commerce, another branch of importance arises from the gardens, many of which are of great extent, and all extremely fertile—their produce

furnishing vegetables of the finest description, fruit, &c., to the neighbouring and distant markets. In 1794 a canal was constructed, extending from the river at Wisbeach to the Old Neve at Outwell, and thence to the Ouse at Salter's Lode sluice—thus effecting a communication with Norfolk, Suffolk, and the other eastern counties. The navigation of the Neve has been materially improved by a straight cut from Peterborough, by which vessels of one hundred tons burden can with facility approach the quay, which is most conveniently and commodiously constructed; while the rail has opened up additional and more rapid means of transmitting port merchandise and the produce of the district to the metropolis and different places, by the various connected lines.

Wisbeach has been a corporate town ever since the reign of Edward VI. The 'Trinity Guild' possesses estates for pious and charitable purposes: in the reign of Henry VIII it shared the general fate of ecclesiastical foundations, but was again restored by an act passed by Edward VI, and renewed in Jan. 1610-11 at a considerable expense; they were then constituted a body corporate, by the style of 'the Burgesses of the town of Wisbeach.' The Municipal Act passed in 1835 vested the government of the town in a mayor, six aldermen and eighteen councillors, and styled the corporate body 'the Burgesses of the Borough of Wisbeach;' the same act divided the town into two wards, and conferred upon it a commission of the peace. A general assize of oyer and terminer, and a court of pleas for the trial of civil actions, to any amount, used to be held at Wisbeach, alternately with Ely; but, upon the passing of the act abolishing the secular jurisdiction of the Bishop of Ely, all aggravated cases of felony, arising within the Isle of Ely, are tried before the judges of assize at Cambridge. The quarter sessions of the peace are held at Wisbeach and Ely alternately; and the town is included in the thirty-second circuit of County Court towns, under the act (passed in 1846), for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. The borough police court is held over the police station, and here the magistrates sit every day. The lord bishop of Ely is lord of the franchise and of the manor. The town is the centre of the Wisbeach Union under the new Poor Law; and there has been erected a spacious and handsome building, on the Lynn road, for the purposes of the act. The new gaol situated in New Wisbeach, is a commodious and substantial building, on the plan of the model prison at Pentonville. Among the other public buildings and institutions, are the exchange-hall and council-chamber (originally the corn-exchange); a literary institution and museum; public baths and reading-rooms; the theatre and assembly-rooms; the custom-house, &c. A newspaper, published here monthly, is conducted with considerable talent, and enjoys a respectable circulation through the surrounding district.

Wisbeach comprises the parishes of Saint Mary and Saint Peter: the church of the former stands about two miles north-west of the town; that of Saint Peter is a spacious handsome fabric, though of a rather singular construction, being furnished with two naves and two aisles—the naves are lofty, and separated from each other by a row of light slender pillars with pointed arches; the tower, a fine one of stone, highly ornamented—is almost separated from the church, which gives it a curious appearance: the

living is a vicarage, with that of Saint Mary's annexed, in the patronage of the Bishop of Ely. The chapel of ease, in the Old Market, is a modern erection of white brick, octagonal in form: it is endowed with a lauded estate, for the benefit of the incumbent, of the value of £200 per annum, by the private munificence of Dr. Jobson, a late vicar. There are places of worship for various religious denominations; of which a list is appended, with their ministers. The public charities of this town are of importance, especially those for the education of youth: amongst these the grammar school ranks first in antiquity, having been founded in the twelfth century. This establishment, which is under the patronage and superintendence of the corporation, has the appointment of two scholarships at Magdalene college Cambridge; a classical education is afforded to all boys of the town; the Bishop of Ely is visiter.—Dr. Herring, afterwards Archbishop of Canterbury, received his education at this school; and Clarkson, the philanthropic advocate for the abolition of slavery was born here, his father being the then master of the school. An endowed school for girls, a national school for boys, and an excellent British school are well supported and attended. Several charitable societies, well-endowed almshouses, and charities of a minor extent, contribute to the assistance of the indigent. The market days are Thursday and Saturday; the former for fat stock, the latter for the usual articles of consumption—both abundantly supplied. Fairs, the Wednesday next before Whitsunday and July 25th for horses, and on the 1st, 2nd and 12th August for cattle and sheep. In 1831 the parish of Saint Peter contained 7,253 inhabitants, and that of Saint Mary 1,524; in 1841 their respective populations were 8,530 and 1,931, total 10,461; in 1850 the estimated number was about 12,500.

ELM parish is in the hundred of Wisbeach—the village, a pretty and rural one, is 2 miles s. e. from that town, on the border of Norfolk. The parish Church of All Saints is a neat edifice; the living is a vicarage in the gift of the Bishop of Ely. Population in 1841, 1,742.

LEVERINGTON village is in the same hundred as, and 2 miles n. w. from Wisbeach: it contains a very handsome church with an equally beautiful spire, excepting which the village has no claim to particular notice: the living is a rectory, in the patronage of the Bishop of Ely. The parish (including the chapelry of PARSON DROVE) contained in 1841, 1,954 inhabitants.

EMNETH is a village and parish in the hundred of Freebridge-Marsh-land, in the county of Norfolk, 2½ miles e. s. e. from Wisbeach. The church, a small edifice is dedicated to Saint Edmund: the living is a perpetual curacy, annexed to Elm. Population in 1841, 1,065.

WALSOKEN is a parish and village in the same county and hundred as Emneth, contiguous to the town of Wisbeach. The gardens in this parish are many, extensive and productive, and the pleasant walks in and around the village form the favourite Sunday promenade of the inhabitants of Wisbeach. The church of All Saints is a handsome structure, with a lofty spire, and forms a prominent and pleasing object in the distant view: the living is a rectory, in the presentation of the Allington family. Population of the parish in 1841, 2,563.

# HUNTINGDONSHIRE.

**T**HIS is an inland county, bounded on the north by the counties of Northampton and Cambridge, on the east by Cambridgeshire, on the south and south-west by Bedfordshire, and on the west by the latter shire and also by that of Northampton. The limits of this county are chiefly artificial—the river Nene, on the Northamptonshire border, with the Kings-delf, the Old West water and the Ouse river on the Cambridgeshire side, being the principal exceptions. In its general form it is an irregular square; an elongated portion on the south intersecting the counties of Cambridge and Bedford, and a prominent apex cutting into Northamptonshire on the north-west. The county extends from north to south about thirty miles, and from east to west twenty-three; its circumference is about one hundred, and its area comprises 372 square miles, or 238,080 statute acres. Both in size and population it ranks as the thirty-eighth English county.

**NAME AND EARLY HISTORY.**—This county takes its name from Huntingdon, its principal town, which is derived from the Saxon word *Huntedanscire*, signifying 'Hunter's Down-shire'—this district being at that time well adapted for the sport of hunting, as it was almost one continued forest. Under the Britons it composed a part of the extensive territory of the *Icenii*, and in the Roman division of the kingdom was included in the district named *Flavia Cesariensis*. The *Icenii* are represented by Tacitus as a brave nation; but they were subdued by the Romans in the reign of Claudius, and obliged to submit to the harsh terms dictated by their conquerors. The death of Prasutagus, their king, and the impolitic provisions of his will, by which he appointed the Emperor Nero his heir (thinking thereby to secure his kingdom from ruin), furnished the Romans with a pretext for coercive measures; and, with the most insulting rapacity, the native chiefs were deprived of their estates. The whole kingdom of the *Icenii* was pillaged by the centurions, and the house of Prasutagus by their slaves, as if it had been taken in war; his widow, the noble Boadicea, was ignominiously scourged, and her daughters were violated by the Roman soldiers. The nation, justly inflamed to vengeance by such atrocities, flew to arms, and upwards of eighty thousand of the Romans were cut off by the intrepidity of Boadicea; success, however, did not long gild the arms of the Britons, for in a sanguinary contest the Romans obtained a complete victory over them, and the *Icenii* were unknown after this time as a separate nation. According to Tacitus, Queen Boadicea put an end to her life by poison. The principal Roman stations in the county were *Durolopona* and *Durobrivæ*, the sites of which are respectively at Godmanchester or Huntingdon, and Dornford Ferry, in the parish of Chesterton. Three ancient roads intersected the county, namely, the British Ermin-street, which entered from Bedfordshire and passed through to Northamptonshire; and the Roman Ermin-street, and the *Via Devana*, from Cambridgeshire, went also through Northamptonshire. The celebrated Cars-dyke, supposed to have originated with the Romans, enters the county at Earith and falls into Whittlesea-dyke. At Ramsey, on the edge of the fens, was formerly a very rich abbey—built, like that of Crowland, in the midst of a bog: the situation of these and various other religious houses (as those of Ely and Thorney) was probably chosen as well with a view to security, from the difficulty of approach, as to the plenty of fish and water-fowl inhabiting these retreats. Kimbolton castle was the place where Katherine, the divorced wife of Henry VIII, ended her days in peaceful retirement. Hinchinbrook House, near Huntingdon, was anciently the seat of the Cromwell family, and subsequently that of the Montagues, Earls of Sandwich, and Viscount Hinchinbrook. But few military events are connected with the county in the later periods of history. In August, 1645, during the civil war, Huntingdon was plundered by the king's troops—the monarch commanding in person. The county was again the theatre of hostilities in 1648, when the Earl of Holland, the Duke of Buckingham, and others in the royal cause, appeared in arms here with a view to the relief of Colchester: on this occasion the Earl of Holland, accompanied by about a hundred horse, fled to St. Neots, in this county, where, being beset by some of the parliamentary troops, he surrendered himself without any attempt at resistance; and the Duke of Buckingham escaped by forcing his way through the enemy. At the present day the principal towns of the county are seated on the Ouse; of these, Huntingdon is the capital.

**SOIL, SURFACE AND CLIMATE, PRODUCE AND MANUFACTURES.**—The **SOIL** of this county is fertile and varied. The east and south-east parts are of a shallow staple upon limestone rock, with a small intermixture of cold woodland clayey soil. The other parts of the county, however, are made up of a strong red loam, and of a cold woodland clay; the red land is a rich sandy loam, intermixed with keal—ironstone is also found amongst it; this soil is esteemed most fertile. The under stratum of the whole county, at different depths, is a very strong blue clay. From the varieties of soil here mentioned, and part of the county being enclosed and part open fields, different modes of culture are necessarily adopted. The north-east part is composed of fens, joining those of Ely: the fens consist of about forty-four thousand acres, and perhaps ten thousand acres may be considered productive, and the lands bordering on them afford luxuriant grazing. The mode of management of the fen lands has been much improved of late years, and the fen men are considered the most expert of any in the kingdom at ploughing. The borders of the Ouse, along the south-east quarter, consist of fertile and beautiful meadows—amongst these, Portsholme Mead, near Huntingdon, is particularly celebrated; the middle and western parts are fruitful in corn, and sprinkled with woods; but, in a general view, the country may be said to be bare of timber. The **CLIMATE** is regarded as healthy—making allowance for the space occupied by the fens, and for those parts of the county that are but scantily supplied with pure waters from springs or rivers; the upland parts of the county are considered as by far the most salubrious. The breed of sheep is of a mixed description, nearly approaching to the Leicestershire and Lincolnshire species, with which the native breeds have been much crossed; the neat cattle are the refuse of the Lancashire, Leicestershire and Derbyshire breeds. From the open state of the country, dairy farming is not much followed; and in the southern district the cows are kept principally for the purpose of suckling calves, to supply the London markets. The village of Stilton gives name to a very rich yet delicate kind of cheese: it has been affirmed, however, that this generally admired article is *not* the product of that neighborhood, but of the vicinity of Melton Mowbray, in Leicestershire. **NO MANUFACTURES** are carried on in this county, and hardly anything bearing a reference to them, except woolstapling and spinning the yarn: the latter is the chief business of the women and children in the winter season; in the summer they seek a more profitable employ in the fields. The brewing trade furnishes another means of employment, though to no great extent—the produce being wholly for home consumption. There are a considerable number of corn mills throughout the county, and in all the principal towns malt is made to some extent: the tanning of leather is also a branch of some consequence, and bricks are made in rather large quantities.

**RIVERS, MERES AND RAILWAYS.**—The principal **RIVERS** connected with Huntingdonshire are, the **OUSE** and the **NENE** (or **Nen**). The **OUSE**, which is sometimes called the **Lesser Ouse**, to distinguish it from another river of the same name in Yorkshire, enters the county from Bedfordshire, between St. Neots and Little Paxton; in its course it is increased by a combination of small streams from the north-west, and finally enters the great level of the fens in the neighbourhood of Earith: this river is navigable along its whole line across the county. The **Nene** rises in Northamptonshire, and, flowing through a delightful vale, reaches Huntingdonshire near Elton—passes Yarwell and Wandsford—and, pursuing a devious course to Peterborough,

slowly winds onward to the sea. Some smaller streams water the north-east side of the county, together with several large MERES, or pools of water, namely, Whittlesea mere, Ramsey mere, &c.: of these, the first-named is by far the largest, and covers an area of several miles extent; it admits of agreeable sailing, and affords excellent fishing, and in the summer season is much frequented by parties of pleasure. Of late years most of the meres have been drained off and the beds of them applied to tillage. There is a mineral spring at Somersham, but it is not resorted to in these days—whatever might have been its repute in former times. RAILWAYS.—The Saint Ives and Huntingdon railway connects these towns with Cambridge; and the Great Northern railway passes through the centre of the county, from south to north, including in its route Saint Neots and Huntingdon—from the latter town a line is being laid which will fall into the Northampton and Peterborough railway, between Higham Ferrers and Thrapstone.

ECCLESIASTICAL AND CIVIL DIVISIONS, AND REPRESENTATION.—Huntingdonshire is in the province of Canterbury and diocese of Lincoln; is included in the Norfolk Circuit of the judges, and divided into the four hundreds of Hurstingstone, Leightonstone, Norman Cross and Toseland—containing ninety-nine parishes and six parts of parishes, one county town and borough (Huntingdon), and five other market towns. A peculiarity in the civil government of Huntingdonshire is, that it is included under the same shrievalty with Cambridge-shire, the sheriff being chosen in rotation—one year from the county of Cambridge, another year from the Isle of Ely, and the third year from this county. The whole county returns four members to parliament, viz. two for Huntingdon and two for the county at large—the Reform Bill causing no alteration in its representative system. County members are returned at Huntingdon; the only other polling station is Stilton. The gentlemen at present sitting for the county are, Edward Fellowes, of Ramsey Abbey, in this county, Esquire, and George Thornwell, of Deddington, Saint Neots, Esquire.

POPULATION, &c.—By the returns rendered to Government at the census of 1841, Huntingdonshire contained 29,072 males, and 29,477 females—total 58,549; exhibiting an increase over the returns of 1831 of 5,400 inhabitants. The annual value of Real Property, in this county, as assessed to the Poor Rates, in 1815, amounted to £320,188, and in 1841 to £317,718.

**HUNTINGDON AND GODMANCHESTER,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF BRAMPTON, HARTFORD AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**H**UNTINGDON, the capital of the county of its name, is a borough both corporate and parliamentary, having separate jurisdiction, locally in the hundred of Hurstingstone—59 miles N. from London (77 by rail), 40 E.N.E. from Northampton, 18 s. by E. from Peterborough, and 16 S.W. from Cambridge; situated at the terminus of the East Anglon branch of the Eastern Counties railway, on the northern bank of the Ouse. It consists of one main or principal street, extending, in a north-west direction, from the river side to nearly the distance of a mile, with several smaller ones branching off at right angles. The houses, for the most part, are well built, and many are handsome; the streets are well paved and gas-lighted, and the inhabitants are plentifully supplied with water. Cowper, the elegant and pious poet, who resided in this place two years, in writing of it, says, 'Huntingdon is one of the neatest towns in England. The country is fine for several miles about it; and the roads, which are all turnpike, and strike out four or five different ways, are perfectly good all the year round.' This is not a manufacturing town, nor does it possess any prominent trade; but being a principal thoroughfare to the north, it formerly had a good road business, which has much declined since the formation of the railway. The London and York, or Great Northern line, however, now in progress, will form a direct communication between the town and all the important places in the north of England, and it is expected that considerable benefit will accrue to the neighborhood on its completion. The inhabitants are supplied with coal, wood, &c. by barges, and other small craft, from Lynn Regis, and return laden with corn and other produce of the adjacent fertile district.

Previous to the operation of the Municipal Act, passed in 1835, the town was governed under the provisions of a charter granted by Charles I. The body corporate, under the new bill, consists of a mayor, four aldermen and twelve councillors, with the usual assistant officers, under the title of 'the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Huntingdon.' The county assizes are held twice annually; general

sessions of the peace quarterly; and a court for the recovery of debts to an unlimited amount, is entitled to be holden once in three weeks—but this latter is rendered inoperative or unnecessary by the sitting of the new county court, held monthly, under the act passed August, 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. The town hall is a commodious and handsome building, erected in 1745; it stands on one side of a spacious square, and contains the usual courts, over which is a suite of assembly-rooms. A new prison has been erected on the western side of the great north road, with convenient wards for the classification of prisoners. A literary and scientific institution was established here in 1841—the building, situated in the High-street, is noble and spacious, and one of the greatest modern improvements to the town; it comprises a well-selected library, museum and lecture rooms, with every convenience for public meetings, concerts, &c. The inhabitants first sent members to parliament in the reign of Edward I; and the Reform Bill included Godmanchester within the parliamentary borough; the present representatives are Colonel Jonathan Peel, Park-place, Hyde Park, London; and Thomas Baring, Esquire, Charles-street, Berkeley-square, London. The mayor is the returning officer. Huntingdon confers the title of earl upon the distinguished family of Rawdon Hastings.

In former times Huntingdon enjoyed ecclesiastical importance of much greater extent than now belongs to it: it had fifteen parish churches—in Leland's time four only were remaining, and of these two were destroyed during the parliamentary war. The borough, at the present time, comprises the parishes of All Saints, Saint Benedict, Saint John the Baptist, and Saint Mary. The churches now standing are those of Saint Mary and All Saints. The former, which is the corporation church, appears, from the dates over the north doorway, to have been rebuilt during the reign of James I: it consists of a nave, chancel and aisles, with a handsome embattled tower at the west end, having strong buttresses, with ornamental niches at



the angles: the area is well pewed, and across the west end is a large gallery, containing a good organ. This church has, within these few years, been repaired and beautified: the living is a rectory, united to that of Saint Benedict, in the patronage of the Crown. All Saints' church stands on the north side of the market-place; its architecture and ornaments are in the style that prevailed in the time of Henry VII: it is an embattled structure, consisting of a nave, chancel and aisles, with a small pinnaced tower at the north-west angle. The church was repewed and embellished, and the vestry enlarged, in 1837: the living is a rectory, united with that of Saint John the Baptist, in the gift of the Crown. There are likewise places of worship for Baptists, Independents, Wesleyan Methodists, and the Society of Friends. A small and handsome chapel, called Christ Church, stands on the site of the theatre: it was erected in 1846, at the sole expense of Lady Olivia Sparrow. The interior is fitted up with great neatness, having galleries, communion table, &c. It was originally intended to be connected with the Established Church, but was never consecrated, and it is now open to all denominations, without respect to creed. The public educational establishments comprise a free grammar school, founded in the reign of Henry II, by David, Earl of Huntingdon, for the sons of all natives of the town—it has two exhibitions; a free school, called Walden's charity, (or the Green Coat school,) founded in 1736, for thirty boys and twelve girls, who are clothed and educated; and National, British and Infants' schools. The free grammar school has acquired some celebrity from its having been the seminary in which Oliver Cromwell, who was born in this town, received his education. There are several charities by which the poor are benefitted, including bequests by benevolent individuals, almshouses and apprenticeship funds. The market is held on Saturday, and the fairs on the Tuesday before Easter, the second Tuesday in May, the Saturday before Michaelmas-day, and the third Saturday in November. The borough of Huntingdon contained, in 1831, 3,267 inhabitants, and according to the census of 1841, 3,507.

GODMANCHESTER is an ancient corporate borough and parish, in the hundred of Toseland, situated on the southern bank of the Ouse, which is crossed by a bridge and short causeway, forming a communication with Huntingdon, to which town it may be considered a suburb, and, as before stated, is included in that parliamentary borough. This place was formerly the

residence of numbers of yeomen and farmers, who are stated to have been possessed of extraordinary teams of horses; they were wont to receive the sovereigns who visited this district with a display of their agricultural implements—exhibiting to James I, when he at one time passed through it, no less than nine score of ploughs, adorned with trappings, &c.: in this respect, however, a great alteration has taken place. Godmanchester was incorporated in 1605, and its government vested in two bailiffs and twelve assistants, with a recorder, &c. The Municipal Act recognises it as a borough, and adds four aldermen to the corporate body, which it styles 'the Bailiffs, Assistants and Commonalty of the Borough of Godmanchester.' A count of pleas, for the recovery of debts under forty shillings, was formerly held every three weeks, but this is rendered nugatory by the operation of the new County Court, held monthly, (distinct from that at Huntingdon,) for adjudicating claims not exceeding £20. The parish church of Saint Mary is a commodious light edifice, comprising a nave, chancel and aisles, with an embattled tower, surmounted by a spire, at the western end: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster. There are places of worship for Independents and Baptists; a free school, founded in the reign of Elizabeth, and a school of industry. A fair, chiefly for horses, is held on Tuesday and Wednesday in Easter Week. The parish contained, in 1831, 2,146 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,152.

BRAMPTON is a parish, in the hundred of Leightonstone—the village, scattered over a considerable extent of ground, is about two miles w. from Huntingdon. The parish church of Saint Mary is deserving notice for its beautiful south porch, decorated with elegant tracery: the benefice is a discharged vicarage, in the presentation of the Prebendary of Brampton in Lincoln cathedral. The parish contained, in 1831, 1,064 inhabitants—being precisely the same number as was returned at the census ten years previously, and, in 1841, 1164.

Rather more than one mile E. by N. from Huntingdon, and in the same hundred as that town, is the neat little village of HARTFORD, containing a very pretty church, the architecture of which is an admixture of the Norman and Saxon styles; it is dedicated to All Saints, and the living is a discharged vicarage, in the patronage of the Crown. In 1831 the population of the parish was 452, but in 1841 only 380.

KIMBOLTON

Is a parish in the hundred of Leightonstone—the market town, small and neat, is 63 miles N.N.W. from London, 12 w. by s. from Huntingdon, 8 s.w. from St. Neots, and about equi-distant (12 miles) from the Huntingdon station on the East Anglian line, Thrapstone, on the Northampton and Peterborough branch of the London and North Western, and Bedford, on the Bletchley branch of the same railway. This place, anciently called *Kimabantum*, is situated on the borders of Bedfordshire, in a pleasant part of the county, agreeably diversified by gentle hills and fertile valleys; the former being ornamented by fine woods. The principal seat, and chief object of attraction in this neighbourhood, is Kimbolton Castle—the seat of the Duke of Manchester; the mansion is an ancient and beautiful stone building, situated in an extensive park. This castle was the jointure, and became the retirement of Queen Katherine, after her divorce from the sensual and inconstant Henry VIII.: it was here she died, on the 6th of January, 1536, and was interred in Peterborough cathedral. In this parish are the remains of Stonely priory, a convent of canons of the order of St. Augustine, dedicated to the Blessed Virgin, by William de Mandeville, Earl of Essex, about the beginning of the twelfth century. The inhabitants are chiefly employed in agriculture; some of the

females are occupied in lace making, and there is a little malting business. Kimbolton confers the inferior title of Baron on the Duke of Manchester; this nobleman is lord of the manor, and his representative holds a court leet and baron, at which a constable is appointed. The first Earl of Manchester was a native of this place, and a parliamentary general in the civil war.

The parish church of Saint Andrew is a handsome building, with a lofty spire: the living is a vicarage, in the archdeaconry of Huntingdon, in the presentation of the nobleman before mentioned; the rev. Thomas Ainsworth, is the present incumbent. The Moravians and Wesleyan Methodists have each a chapel, and the Baptist and Independents' worship in one building, called the Union Chapel. The free grammar school here was endowed in the reign of Edward VI.: lately has been connected with it an Agricultural College of great utility, and being conducted with great ability by the present superintendent and masters, has become one of the most flourishing establishments of the kind in the county. The market is held on Friday, and the fairs on the Fridays in Easter and Whitsun-weeks, the first Friday after Michaelmas-day, and December 11th. The parish of Kimbolton, contained in 1831, 1,584 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,634.

## RAMSEY,

WITH THE VILLAGES OF BURY AND WARBOYS AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**RAMSEY**, one of the most extensive parishes in the county, is in the hundred of Hurstingstone—the market town is 68 miles N. by W. from London, 15 S. E. from Peterborough, 12 N. from Huntingdon, 9 N. by W. from St. Ives, and the same distance S. from Whittlesey (Cambridge)—the three last named places being railway stations in connexion with the Eastern Counties line. The town is situated at the foot of a hill, on the border of the fens; and for several centuries it was widely famed for its abbey, which obtained the appellation of 'Ramsey the Rich' on account of its extraordinary wealth and extensive possessions: it was consecrated in 992, and dissolved in 1540. The abbot of this great establishment was mitred, ranked with the nobility, and sat in the house of lords as Baron of Broughton: he possessed, besides, many other and great privileges, conferred by charters from several successive sovereigns, and extending over a district of country called the 'banhen,' or liberty of Ramsey, comprising the parishes of Ramsey, Bury, Upwood, and Great Raveley, and part of the parishes of Wilstow and Woodwalton. The seat of Edward Fellowes, Esq. occupies part of the site of the old abbey, and the materials with which it was built formed a portion of that structure; and the entrance is by the original gateway, still in high preservation, and presenting a fine specimen of decorated English architecture; in the mansion is a statue of Earl Ailwine (who founded the abbey in the year 969), which is supposed to be one of the most ancient pieces of English sculpture now to be found. The above-named gentleman is lord of the manor, and the owner of all the property that belonged to the abbey within the parish: as the grantee of the Crown, he is entitled to a great variety of manorial rights; he appoints a coroner and steward of the court of pleas for the liberty, and in this court debts to a limited amount may be sued for; but the new County Court now absorbs all proceedings for debts not exceeding £50. The annual court leet is held in May or June, at which three or four constables are appointed. The numerous meres or lakes formerly within the parish long gave celebrity to this place for the goodness and variety of its fresh-water fish and wild-fowl; these meres are now, however, all drained, and the ground they covered is tilled to advantage. The greater part

of the fen land is reclaimable, and, when prepared for the seed, generally yields large crops of wheat and oats. The high grounds are all appropriated to grazing.

The parish church of the Blessed Virgin (or as some authorities say, Saint Thomas à Becket), is partly Norman and partly in the early style of English architecture: the living is a perpetual curacy in the gift of the lord of the manor. There are places of worship for Baptists, Unitarians and Wesleyan Methodists. The charities comprise two public schools, several sets of almshouses, and a fund for apprenticing poor children, besides parochial gifts to the poor. The market is held on Wednesday, and a fair for cattle, earthenware, toys, &c. on the 22d of July. The population of the parish in 1831, was 3,006, and in 1841, 3,680.

About one mile south from Ramsey, in the same hundred as that town, is the small village of Bury, pleasantly situated on an eminence, and with its ancient church has an exceedingly picturesque appearance when viewed from Ramsey. The bank or causeway, which runs nearly in a direct line from Ramsey abbey to Bury church, was formerly the only road connecting the island of Ramsey, as it was once designated, with Bury and the adjacent country, and is the oldest embankment, probably, existing in this neighbourhood. The parish church of the Holy Cross, is of great antiquity, and once formed the eastern part of a large cruciform pile—erected, it is presumed, about the same period as Ramsey abbey. Some few years since two noble arches were discovered, which had been concealed by plaster and boards. The living of Bury is a perpetual curacy, in the gift (or was lately) of the family of Manle. The population of the parish in 1831, was 358, and in 1841, one more.

Wannos, rather an extensive parish, is in the same hundred as Ramsey—the village is about 4 miles S.E. from that town, and 3 S. from Bury, situated on the roads leading to Huntingdon and to Saint Ives. The parish church of Saint Mary Magdalene had, some years since, its number of sittings increased, by means of aid from the society for enlarging churches &c.: the living is a rectory. The Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists have each a chapel, and there is a National school. Population of the parish in 1831, 1,550; in 1841, 1,800.

**ST. IVES,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF OVER, FEN-STANTON, HEMINGFORD-ABBOTS, HEMINGFORD GREY, HOUGHTON, WITTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

ST. IVES is a parish in the hundred of Hurslingstone—the market town is 59 miles N. by W. from London (71 by rail), 12 S. W. from Cambridge, and 6 E. from Huntingdon; situated on the Eastern Counties railway, at the junction of the East Anglian line. This town was by the Saxons called *Slepe*, and in Domesday-book it is mentioned by that name; and there is a manor in the parish to which this designation is still applied. It appears that it obtained the name of St. Ives from Ivo, a Persian archbishop of peculiar sanctity, who is said to have travelled through England, about the year 600, preaching the gospel with extraordinary zeal and

perseverance. The town is seated on the north bank of the river Ouse, which is crossed by a good stone bridge; the approach to the bridge from the London road received great improvement in 1822, by the construction of a causeway supported upon arches, and reaching a considerable distance; by this means a free passage is afforded at periods when the river overflows—an occurrence not unrequent. The streets are well paved, and gas-lighted from works erected in 1838; and the inhabitants are amply supplied with water. It is intended to erect a statue of the Protector Cromwell—Saint Ives being his place of residence at the



commencement of his public and eventful life; and his signature may still be seen upon the church books here. The 'New Institution,' a building lately erected by public subscriptions, is for literary and scientific purposes, besides being adapted for public meetings, lectures, concerts, &c. The town comprises two manors—that of Slepe before mentioned, and the manor of Burstellars: for these a court baron and a customary court are held, twice annually, under the Duke of Manchester. The magistrates for the division assemble every Monday, and a county court under the new act is held monthly for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £50. Saint Ives is the centre of an extensive union under the new poor law, for the purposes of which there is a poor-house, in an agreeable situation, within about two hundred yards of the Cambridge and Wisbeach road. No particular branch of manufacture is connected with Saint Ives, but the trade of the town is considerable in malt, corn and coal; and by means of the navigable Ouse a commercial intercourse is maintained, to some extent, with Bedford, Lynn and other places, and the railway effects additional facility for communicating with the distant provinces and the metropolis. There are several respectable breweries in the town, and many flour mills in its vicinity.

The parish church of All Saints (or according to some authorities Saint Ivo), is a handsome building, light in appearance, but evidently of considerable antiquity, with a tower surmounted by a lofty spire: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of certain trustees. There are places of worship for Independents, Baptists, and Wesleyan Methodists. A Cemetery has recently been opened on the North side of the town, with adequate ground for enlargement if required: it is very

tastefully arranged, with lodge, &c. The market, a very large one for corn and cattle, is held on Monday; and the fairs on Whit-Monday for horses and cattle, and Michaelmas-day for horses, cheese, &c. The population of the parish, in 1831, was 3,314, and in 1841, 3,514.

OVER is a parish in the hundred of Papworth, county of Cambridge—the village, a considerable one, is situated about 4 miles E by S. from Saint Ives, Huntingdon, near to the boundary of the two counties, and the river Ouse. The parish is strictly an agricultural one, and the inhabitants of the village are in occupations connected with that interest. The places of worship are the parish church of Saint Mary, a handsome building, and chapels for Baptists and Methodists. The living of Over is a vicarage in the gift of the Masters and Fellows of Clare Hall, Cambridge. The parish contained, by the returns for 1831, 989 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,119.

Rather more than 2 miles s. from Saint Ives is the village of FEN-STANTON, situated on the main road leading from Saint Ives to Cambridge; the parish is intersected by the river Ouse. About the like distance west from Saint Ives is HEMINGFORD ABBOTS; a short distance to the east of the latter place is HEMINGFORD-GREY; about a mile to the north-west is HOUGHTON; and adjoining to Houghton is WITTON. These are all inconsiderable villages and parishes, destitute of commercial importance; they are in the same hundred as Saint Ives, and have each their pari h church. Their population respectively by the returns for 1841, was as follows:—FEN-STANTON, 1,032; HEMINGFORD-ABBOTS, 564; HEMINGFORD-GREY, 910; HOUGHTON, 422, and WITTON, 257.

**ST. NEOTS.**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF EYNESBURY, EATON SOCON, BUCKDEN AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

ST. NEOTS is a parish, in the hundred of Toze-  
 land—the market town is 56 miles N.N.W. from Lon-  
 don, 9 s. from Huntingdon, 18 w. from Cambridge,  
 and 12 miles N.W. from the Bedford station on the  
 Bletchley branch of the London and North Western  
 Railway. The town is situated on the east bank of the  
 Ouse, in a level part of the country, with but little  
 variation of scenery. The name of the place is de-  
 rived from 'St. Neot,' a christian missionary, in honour  
 of whom a monastery was here founded, which after-  
 wards was endowed by Earl Leofric and made subor-  
 dinate to Ely, but was subsequently rendered inde-  
 pendent and existed till the time of Henry VIII, when  
 it shared the fate of other religious establishments.  
 After the death of Charles I., the Earl of Holland  
 mustered a force here in favour of the royal cause; but,  
 being defeated in a battle by Cromwell's soldiers in 1648,  
 and afterwards taken prisoner, without resistance, at  
 St. Ives, he suffered on the scaffold. The town con-  
 sists of three principal streets, and an extensive mar-  
 ket place; the high roads from Biggleswade to Hun-  
 tingdon, and to Cambridge, passing through the main  
 thoroughfares. The greater part of the town being  
 only a few feet above the ordinary level of the river,  
 inundations were formerly consequent upon sudden  
 thaws, or very heavy rains, to such an extent, as to  
 render a navigation of the streets not merely prac-  
 ticable but necessary; but great improvements having  
 been effected, in the construction of the bridges, to-  
 gether with drains, this evil is, in a great measure,  
 remedied. The only manufacture here, except that of  
 malt, is paper, for which latter there is an extensive  
 mill upon the river, with Foudrinier's patent ma-  
 chines for making that article. The river Ouse is  
 navigable from the port of Lynn to this place, and  
 thence to Bedford; and a trade of some consequence  
 is carried on upon it, in corn, wine, coal, iron, timber,  
 groceries, &c., for the consumption of the town and

neighbourhood. The Great Northern railway, now in  
 progress, will have a principal station here, and when  
 in operation will open up a communication through  
 Saint Neots with the northern and manufacturing dis-  
 tricts, and the metropolis. The Earl of Sandwich is  
 lord of the manor, and his representative holds a court  
 annually: Saint Neots is included in the thirty-  
 second circuit of County Court towns, under the act  
 passed August, 1846, for the recovery of debts to any  
 amount not exceeding £50.—the court is held monthly,  
 in the new room.

The parish church of Saint Mary is an elegant spec-  
 imen of that light airy Gothic style, which attained  
 its greatest excellence in the reign of Henry VII: it has  
 a beautifully proportioned tower, and the interior of  
 the church, which has been lately renovated and re-  
 peved at a considerable expense, is embellished with  
 some ancient screen work. The living of Saint Neots  
 is a discharged vicarage, in the gift of the Crown.  
 There are places of worship for Baptists, Independ-  
 ents, and Wesleyan Methodists, and a free school—  
 the latter founded by Loftus Hatley, in 1736, and the  
 endowment augmented by Alderman Newton, and  
 other benefactors: by means of this charity, thirty-  
 five poor boys are clothed and educated. The market,  
 held on Thursday, is a considerable one for corn.  
 Fairs, Holy Thursday, another three weeks after, and  
 a third on December 17th. The parish of Saint Neots  
 contained, in 1831, 2,617 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,123.

Adjoining to the parish of Saint Neots is that of  
 EYNESBURY, which village may be almost considered  
 as a suburb to Saint Neots—the only line of separa-  
 tion being a small brook. The parish church of Saint  
 Mary was erected in the reign of James I: the living  
 is a rectory, in the patronage of the family of Palmer.  
 Population of the parish, in 1831, 957; in 1841, 1,003.

About a mile or rather more from Saint Neots, in  
 the hundred of Barford and county of Bedford, is the

village and parish of EATON SOCON, situated on the western bank of the river Ouse, on the main road from London to the north; and before the opening of railways, was a place of great thoroughfare, and flourishing. There was formerly a castle belonging to the Beauchamps, and a priory founded by one of that family; of the latter, the only portion remaining is the refectory, now converted into stables. The church is dedicated to Saint Mary: the living is a discharged vicarage, in the patronage of John Hill Day, Esq. The parish (including WYBOSTON) contained, in 1831, 2,490 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,600.

BUCKDEN is a village and parish, in the same hundred as Saint Neots, situated about midway between that town and Huntingdon, on the great north road.

This is a place of considerable antiquity, and at one period of some consequence. There are fragments of a monastic building, and an episcopal palace—the latter a venerable structure, formerly the residence of the bishops of Lincoln, to one of whom, the abbot of Ely, in the reign of Henry I. granted the manor of Buckden. The church of Saint Mary (which contains the remains of some of the bishops), is a neat edifice, with a tower, surmounted by a light and elegant spire. The living is a discharged vicarage, in the gift of the See of Lincoln. There is a place of worship for Wesleyan Methodists, and a charity school—the latter founded and endowed by Dr. Greenlate, bishop of Lincoln, in 1778. Population of the parish, in 1831, 1,095, and in 1841, 1,209.

## SOMERSHAM, AND BLUNTISHAM WITH EARITH.

**SOMERSHAM** is a parish in the hundred of Hurstingstone:—the village, neat and small, formerly holding a market, is 64 miles N. from London (77 by rail), 10 E. N. E. from Huntingdon, and 5 S. N. E. from Saint Ives; situated on the line of the Eastern Counties railway, in a very agreeable and fertile part of the county, well watered, and abounding with springs of remarkable purity, some of which are said to possess medicinal properties. It was formerly called *Summersum*, and derived that name (according to Mr. Faux) from a neighbouring hill—the summer camp of the Romans. The foot causeways, and the stone bridge, at the extremity of the village, are constantly kept in excellent repair, by means of the rental of a house and land bequeathed for that purpose by William Harvey, Esq., who died in 1549. The only article manufactured here is wicks for rush-lights, which are sent in large quantities to various parts of the kingdom.

The parish church of Saint John the Baptist, which stands in the centre of the town, exhibits nothing remarkable; the living is a triple rectory, comprising the hamlets of Colne and Pidley-cum-Fenton, attached to the Regius Professorship of the University of Cambridge, now held by the Rev. Dr. Olyvan. There are places of worship for Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists, and a public school conducted upon the national plan. A market, formerly held on Friday, has long ceased to be observed: two fairs are maintained on 23rd June and 12th November. The parish contained, in 1831, 1,402 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,517.

The Dean and Chapter of Ely are in possession of a manor here, for which they hold courts occasionally. The parish church of Saint Mary, stands midway between this village and the hamlet of EARITH, a chapelry to Bluntisham parish: the living is a rectory, in the gift of the Bishop of Ely. In the church-yard (which commands an extensive view of Cambridgeshire and the towers of Ely cathedral), is interred Adrian Luens—a celebrated prize-fighter and wrestler, who died in 1672: his tomb, which has been repaired and beautified by some gentlemen of the 'fancy,' is much visited by strangers come into the county: it bears the following singular inscription—

"Here lies the conqueror conquered,—  
Valiant as ever England bred,  
Whom neither art, nor steel, nor strength  
Could e'er subdue, till death at length  
Threw him on his back; and here he lies,  
In hopes hereafter to arise."

There are places of worship for Baptists, the Society of Friends and Methodists. The poor are benefited by several benefactions periodically distributed: and the instruction of the humbler class of children is provided for in two or three public schools within the parish. Fairs, chiefly for cattle and horses, are held at Earith, in the months of May, July and August. The parish of Bluntisham with Earith contained in 1831, 1,381 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,457.

**YAXLEY AND STILTON.**

**YAXLEY** is a parish, in the hundred of Norman Cross—the village, formerly a market town, is 73 miles N. by W. from London, 14 N. by W. from Huntingdon, 12 N.W. from Ramsey, and 4 S. from the Peterborough station on the London and North Western railway, at its junction with the East Anglian and Great Northern lines. The village, which is large and irregularly built, exhibits nothing deserving of particular notice but its church and Whittlesy Mere—the latter situated a short distance to the east, is one of the most extensive sheets of water in the kingdom; it covers a surface six miles in length and three in breadth, and abounds with fish. The neighbourhood produces a great quantity of reeds and reeds, in the preparation of which many persons find employment.

The church, dedicated to Saint Peter, standing on an elevation, at the western extremity of the town, is a handsome building, principally in the later style of English architecture, with a tower surmounted by an elegant spire, crocketed and supported by flying buttresses: the living is a discharged vicarage, in the patronage of the Crown: the Rev. Charles Lee is the present incumbent. The Unitarians and Wesleyan Methodists have each a place of worship, and there is a free school endowed by Jane Proby, in 1712. A fair is held on Holy Thursday, for cattle. The population of the parish in 1831, was 1,140, and in 1841, 1,211.

**STILTON** parish is in the same hundred as Yaxley—the village being situated about 3 miles S.S.W. from that village on the Huntingdon road, and on the Roman Ermin-street. Though now of but comparative insignificance, it was formerly a market town, and well frequented. Stilton gives name to the famous cheese so called, of which considerable quantities are sold here, although it is made in the neighbourhood of Melton Mowbray, Leicestershire. The places of worship are the parish church of Saint Mary, and a Wesleyan chapel. The living of Stilton is a rectory, in the gift of the Bishop of Lincoln; the Rev. James Sheridan is the present rector. The parish contained in 1831, 793 inhabitants, and in 1841, 817.

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# NORFOLK

IS a maritime county, comprising one of the finest and most important districts in this island: it is terminated on the north and north-east by the German Ocean; on the south, and for a short distance on the south-east, by the county of Suffolk; on the west by the Lincolnshire Washes, and by part of Lincolnshire and Cambridgeshire. It is almost entirely unindented by the sea and by the rivers, which later form its internal boundary. Its figure is very compact, presenting an almost unbroken convexity to the ocean, and a curve somewhat indented to the land—thus nearly forming an oval, of which the diameter from north to south is forty-five miles, and that from east to west about seventy; its circumference is about one hundred and seventy miles, enclosing an area of 2,024 square miles, or 1,295,360 statute acres. In size it ranks as the fourth English county, and in population as the tenth.

**NAME AND EARLY HISTORY.**—This county derives its name from the Saxons, it forming the northern district of East Anglia, and having the Saxon compound *North folc*, signifying the 'northern people,' or the 'northern folk.' In the time of the Romans it formed a part of that warlike kingdom of the ancient Britons, the *Cenomanii*, a tribe of the *Icenii*. The Romans found in the aboriginal inhabitants of this county a race of heroes who spurned the idea of captivity, and who, with the illustrious queen Boadicea at their head, defeated their proud and cruel oppressors, and made a horrible carnage among their troops; the unfortunate sequel, with the subjugation of the ill-fated Britons, and the abandonment by them of their ancient province to their conquerors, are too well known to require repetition. The geographical position of Norfolk, with reference to Denmark, laid its coast open to the barbarous incursions of the Danes; and Sweyn, King of Denmark, availed himself of this facility to avenge the treacherous massacre of his people by Ethelred II; he landed on the coast, and, marching his troops into the interior, burnt the cities of Norwich and Thetford. In the reign of William Rufus, Roger Bigod, Earl of Norfolk, taking part with Robert, Duke of Normandy, against William, Norfolk sustained great devastation in the conflicts that ensued. In the reign of Richard II, during the rebellion headed by Jack Straw and Wat Tyler, the standards of these leaders were joined by numerous of the lower orders in this county, and Norwich was invested by the insurgents; but they dispersed upon the capture and condemnation of their leader. When Lambert Simnell, counterfeited the person of Edward Plantagenet, and as such was crowned in Dublin, Henry VII. went in person through the counties of Suffolk and Norfolk, and kept his Christmas at Norwich. In the reign of Edward VI, at the era of the Reformation, a dangerous and alarming insurrection broke out in Norfolk, conducted by Ket, a tanner, of Norwich; the pretext for this rebellion was the dissolution of the monasteries and the alienation of the church lands. Ket acted as supreme administrator of affairs, and, being seated under a stately oak in the vicinity of Norwich (since designated 'the Oak of Reformation'), he issued his decrees with all the authority of a sovereign dictator; John Dudley, Earl of Warwick, afterwards Duke of Northumberland, soon, however, marched against the insurgents, and easily dispersed them—Robert Ket was hung in chains, on the walls of Norwich castle. At the commencement of the civil war Norfolk took an active part against Charles, and at no period of the struggle did the royal forces obtain much advantage in the county; Lynn, it is true, was at first taken possession of by the king's adherents, but it was quickly besieged and taken by the Earl of Manchester's troops.

**SURFACE AND SOIL, CLIMATE AND PRODUCE.**—The face of the county of Norfolk varies less than in most tracts of equal extent in the kingdom: not a single hill of more than moderate height is to be seen, but its surface, is in many parts, broken into gentle undulations, the hills and valleys being diversified by woods, coppices, hedge-rows and plantations. In some parts the hedge-rows abound with trees, which at a distance have the appearance of extensive woods; but in others, the great expanse of heath and bare unenclosed land, has a dreary aspect, especially on the south-western side of the county. The soil of the county is known to have a greater variety in it than is found in any other in England, and may be separated into five sorts or qualities. The district round Norwich consists of a sandy loam, and also of stiff wet land, composed of a mixture of sand and clay; and to the west and north-west of the city a light sandy ground prevails. Marsh land may be considered a fifth district by itself, consisting of ooze, formed by depositions from the sea. There are large tracts of swampy ground in the vicinity of Ludham, frequently inundated by land-floods, and producing little else than sedge and reeds. Several of the western hundreds, from Thetford northwards, are open and bare, consisting of extensive heaths, having a light sandy or gravelly soil. In the south-westernmost part of the county is an extensive tract of level land, forming part of the great fen district, which also includes large portions of the counties of Suffolk, Cambridge, Huntingdon, Northampton and Lincoln. The district called Marshland, is one of the richest in the kingdom; it extends also into Lincolnshire, and forms an immense salt-marsh. The climate of the county, allowing for its contiguity to the ocean, and its particular exposure to north and north-east winds, is more healthful, serene and mild, than might be expected. The inhabitants near the coast are sometimes afflicted with ague: with the exception of this disease, which is not so prevalent in the interior of the county, the air of Norfolk is highly salubrious and pleasant. Although by nature sterile, superior cultivation has rendered Norfolk one of the most productive counties in the kingdom.

Its **AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE** comprises all sorts of grain in abundance, and natural grasses; peas, beans, vetches, cole-seed, clovers and other artificial grasses; burreet, cock-foot, chicory, cabbages, mancel-wurzel, lucerne, carrots and potatoes—it is only of late years that the latter valuable root has been adopted as a field-course. Among irregular crops may be included mustard; saffron, likewise, is grown in many parts; flax is cultivated about Downham, and hemp near Old Buckenham. By the patriotic exertions and laudable example of the late Earl of Leicester, every modern improvement in agriculture is fairly and experimentally laid open to the whole county. The fenny districts supply great quantities of butter, which is commonly sent to London, under the name of 'Cambridge' butter. The arable lands form about two-thirds of the entire county. From the prevailing system being arable, the grass lands, perhaps, have been too generally neglected, though some have been greatly improved by the practice of marling, and by under draining. The quantity of upland, meadow and pasture, has been estimated at about 127,000 acres; and that of the marsh lands at somewhat above 63,000. The manures employed are various; a great proportion of manure and river production. At Wallington, is a remarkable bed of oyster-shells, extending for ten miles in the sea mud, from which the farmers in the neighbourhood obtain a great quantity for their lands. The sheep are a hardy, active and rather small breed, much valued for their mutton; and innumerable Scotch and other beasts are fattened for the metropolitan and home markets. A peculiar custom exists in Norfolk, respecting the grazing of sheep on commonable lands—which is, that the lord (as he is called) of every township orders how many and what sort of sheep the people shall have, where the walks shall be fixed, both in summer and winter, on what spots they shall be folded, and how they shall be driven from place to place. One of the richest tracts of grazing land in the county, is the marshy district, lying to the south of Lynn. Of the cattle, the native cow, is of small size; those fed for the market are chiefly brought from Scotland. The horses, native or cross, are a hardy and active race, well adapted for the purposes of husbandry and the road. Turkeys are reared here to a larger size than in any other county in England, and form an article of considerable profit to the smaller farmers; they are much esteemed in London, and bring very high prices, particularly about the festive season of Christmas, at which period immense numbers are forwarded to the capital. Rabbits are

extremely numerous on the sandy heaths; and game of all kinds abounds throughout the county, especially pheasants, which are bred and preserved to such an extent as to prove a great annoyance to the farmer. There is not a county in England so distinguished for the industry of its inhabitants, nor is there one superior for the beauty and neatness of the farms. The NORFOLK FARMER exhibits, both in himself and his farm, characteristic traits of excellence; industrious, economical, yet hospitable; habitually neat in his person; and presenting in his farm everything that can evince the most sedulous attention, and comprehensive judgment, with respect to its agricultural condition. A celebrated topographer, in eulogising Norfolk, justly says,— 'Whether we survey this county with respect to its climate, its population, its trade and commerce, the character of its inhabitants, the diversified beauties of prospect which embellish it, or especially with respect to the improved state of agriculture, it may, with propriety, be denominated THE GLORY OF ENGLAND.'

The MANUFACTURES of this county, although of a most important and extensive character, are nevertheless confined to a small space—Norwich may be considered the nucleus of the prosperous trade arising from the labours of the loom. The fabrics chiefly consist of bombasins, camlets, crapes, poplins, and other articles made from wool, mohair and silk. Many diversities of shawls are likewise manufactured here, also damasks, cotton and woollen goods to a small extent, and a variety of fancy articles; the weaving of broad silks has been introduced by some spirited manufacturers; and it is anticipated that this branch must ultimately succeed to a considerable extent in this part, from the facility existing in machinery, and the number of expert artisans. The manufacture of bombasin and crape, has, of late years, been seriously affected by the introduction of other articles as substitutes; and, the teal 'Norwich shawl,' at one time so much in demand, has given place, in a great measure, to other designs and differently constructed fabrics. An article, called paramatta, since its recent introduction, has experienced a very brisk demand. Yarmouth enjoys considerable consequence, in the double capacity of a port and fishing-town; from its herring fishery, especially, and the peculiar and unrivalled mode of curing that fish, it has long enjoyed great prosperity and fame. The mackerel fishery is likewise of great importance, and the ports of Norfolk, participate generally, in the Greenland fishery. Other towns have their several advantages, but no particular branch of manufacture is prominently exhibited, or can be particularized. The trade usually found in provincial towns flourish in this county—maltngs, breweries, tanneries, rope-walks, &c. may be recognized as furnishing employment for capital and subsistence to the industrious workman.

RIVERS and MINERAL SPRINGS, CANALS and RAILWAYS.—The principal RIVERS, which have their source in this county, and others that pass through it, are the GREATER OUSE, the LESSER OUSE, the NEN, the WAVENEY, the WENSUM, the YARE, the BURE and the NAR. The Great Ouse rises in Huntingdonshire, and after passing Huntingdon, Saint Ives and Ely, enters this county on the south-west, and, running north-east, falls into the German Ocean below Lynn Regis. The Little Ouse rises about the middle of the Suffolk border, and, separating the two counties as it flows north-west, becomes navigable from Thetford, and empties itself into the Great Ouse not far from Downham. The Nen, rising in Northamptonshire, passes the towns of Northampton, Thrapstone, Oundle, Peterborough and Wisbeach, and forms the western boundary of this county; and, after communicating by several channels with the Ouse, falls into the sea at the Lincolnshire Washes. The Waveney has its source separated from that of the Little Ouse by a causeway only, and, running north-east, forms the remainder of the Suffolk boundary—being navigable from Bungay to its junction with the Yare, a little above Yarmouth, where it falls into the North sea. The Yare rises near Stippham, in the centre of the county; and being joined by the Tase on the south, and the Wensum on the south-east of Norwich, flows on to Yarmouth, near which it receives the streams of the Waveney, Burc and Thyrne. The Bure, joined by the Thyrne and other smaller streams from the north-east, meets the Yare to the north-west of Yarmouth; it is navigable to Aylsham. The Wensum has its source at West Rudham, in this county; it environs the city of Norwich, and falls into the Yare. The Nar rises at Nitcham; it is navigable as far as Narborough, and falls into the Greater Ouse. The smaller streams, flowing through an almost level country, are slow in their course, and frequently diffuse themselves over the lower tracts in their progress, forming shallow lakes, here called 'broads,' which are plentifully stored with fish and water-fowl; on some of them are decoys for wild ducks. There are but few mineral waters in this county, and none that are celebrated for resort: Thetford, at one time, enjoyed repute from its spa, and a pump-room and public baths were erected by a gentleman of the town; but little encouragement, however, was given to the establishment, and the building was finally closed.—CANALS: The inland navigation of this county is upon a small scale, and the construction of railways presents an obstacle to its ever becoming of much greater extent. A canal runs from Wisbeach, in Cambridgeshire, to Outwell Creek and Salters Load, in Norfolk, its extent being about six miles. In 1795, an act of parliament was obtained for cutting a navigable canal from the Eaw Bank to Lynn Regis, and in 1805, another act was passed for amending the former one.—RAILWAYS: The Norfolk Railway enters the county about ten miles north-east of Ely, and proceeds by Attleborough and Wymondham to Norwich and Yarmouth: from Wymondham there is a Branch to East Dereham, which will be confined to Fakenham, Walsingham and Wells. The East Anglian Railway enters from Cambridgeshire, and goes to Downham Market and Lynn Regis, with an extension to Swaffham and East Dereham. From Bunton station on the Downham section of the East Anglian line, a branch is laid to Wisbeach, which will communicate with the Great Northern line. The Ipswich, Bury and Norwich Railway (or the Eastern Union) enters this county at Diss, and terminates at Norwich.

ECCLESIASTICAL and CIVIL DIVISIONS, and REPRESENTATION.—Christianity was introduced into this part of East Anglia at a very early period: Felix was constituted bishop, and fixed his residence at Dunwich, in Suffolk; the diocese was afterwards divided into two districts, Dunwich, and North Elmham, in Norfolk; the episcopal see was subsequently translated from Elmham to Thetford, and from thence to Norwich, where it now remains. The first bishop of Norwich was Hebert Luzigna, who died in 1119; the present bishop is a baron of the realm, and sits in the house of peers—also a titular abbot of Saint Bennet's, in Holme, the only abbot now in England. Norfolk is in the province of Canterbury and diocese of Norwich, and gives name to a Circuit of the judges. The marine government of the county is vested in a naval officer of high jurisdiction, who is styled 'Vice-Admiral of Norfolk.' The county is divided into thirty-three hundreds, namely—

These contain seven hundred and twenty-nine parishes and five parts of parishes, one city and county town (Norwich), and twenty other market towns. The whole county returns twelve members to parliament, namely—four for the county at large, two for the city of Norwich, and two each for the boroughs of Lynn Regis, Thetford and Yarmouth. Previous to the passing of the Reform Bill, Castle Rising returned two members, but by its provisions was disfranchised; two additional county members however, being conferred: the total number of representatives continue the same. The Boundary Act divides the county into two parts, respectively named the 'Eastern Division' and the 'Western Division;' the return of members for the former

is made from Norwich, and for the latter from Swaffham. The eastern division polls also at Yarmouth, Reepham North Walsham and Long Stratton; and the western also at Downham, Fakenham, Lynn Regis, Thetford and East Dereham. The gentlemen, at present sitting for the Eastern Division are, Edmund Wodehouse, Esq., and Henry Negus-Burroughs, Esq.; for the Western, William Bagge, Esq. and the Hon. Edward Keppel-Coke. Norfolk confers the dignity of Duke upon the ancient, noble and long-distinguished family of Howard.

POPULATION, &c.—By the returns rendered to government in 1841, Norfolk contained 199,101 males, and 213,563 females; total, 412,664; exhibiting an increase over the returns of 1831, of 22,610 inhabitants.—The annual value of Real Property, in this county, as assessed to the Poor Rates, in 1815, amounted to £1,540,952, and in 1841, to £1,893,824.

ATTLEBOROUGH.

WITH THE PARISHES AND VILLAGES OF BESTHORPE, GREAT AND LITTLE ELLINGHAM, THE ROCKLANDS, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

ATTLEBOROUGH, popularly called ATTLEBURGH, is a parish in the hundred of Shropham—the market town, small and ancient, is 93 miles N. E. by N. from London, and 14 S. W. from Norwich; situated on the road between the last named city and Thetford, and on the line of the Norfolk Railway, for which there is a handsome station contiguous to the town, and a newly-built commodious inn. The name is derived from *Atheling* or *Atinge* a Saxon prince, by whom it is said to have been originally founded; and from *burg* or castle, by which it was formerly defended from the attacks of the Danes: and it was formerly not only a city, but the metropolis of the county; although but little now remains by which its extent or importance, at that time, can be judged of. In its days of grandeur it was the seat of the Mortimer family; and in the reign of Henry IV. the executors of Sir Robert Mortimer, knight, according to his will, built a chantry or college, appropriated to the Exaltation of the Cross, and assigned the same for a master and four secular priests. The church, which is dedicated to Saint Mary, is in the collegiate style, with a square tower at the intersection of the transepts: parts of this edifice have been long destroyed; the remains exhibit a nave with its aisles, a north and south transept, and a handsome porch on the north side. In this church are interred many persons of distinction, belonging to the Mortimer and Ratcliffe families. The living is a rectory, in the presentation of Sir Edward B. Smyth, the present lord of the manor. The other places of worship are for Baptists, the Society of Friends, and Methodists.

This is a town of but little trade: its inhabitants are chiefly employed in agriculture, and enjoying some advantages from the market and fairs, as well as from the passage of travellers between the capital of the county and some of the large towns in Suffolk. Attleborough is included in the thirty-third circuit of County Court towns, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20: the court is held monthly, on Wednesdays, in the

national school room. The market is held on Thursday; and the fairs, on the Thursday after Holy Thursday and August 15th, for cattle, toys, &c. The parish contained, by the returns made in 1831, 1,939 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,959.

BESTHORPE parish, is in the same hundred as Attleborough—the village which is situated rather more than a mile E. by S. from that town, contains little of anything worthy of notice. The church of All Saints is an unpretending structure: the living is a discharged vicarage in the patronage of the Earl of Winterton. Population of the parish, in 1841, 536.

GREAT ELLINGHAM parish and village is in the same hundred as, and about 2½ miles W. by N. from, Attleborough. The parish church of Saint James is a low building, constructed of flint and square stones, in the chequered style: the living is a discharged vicarage in the gift of the present incumbent, the Rev. Samuel Colby. Population of the parish, in 1841, 839.

LITTLE ELLINGHAM, about a mile and a half from Great Ellingham, though but an inconsiderable country village was, as it is recorded, at the time of the Conquest, a town three miles in length: its church of Saint Peter is very ancient; the living is united to that of the other Ellingham. The population of the parish is under 300.

THE ROCKLANDS comprise the three parishes of All Saints, Saint Andrew, and Saint Peter, all in the hundred of Shropham; extending from about 3½ to 4½ miles, west from Attleburgh. The village long and irregular, is chiefly in All Saints' parish, where also is situated the Union poor-house, a commodious building. All Saints and Saint Peter's churches only remain—that of Saint Andrew having only a portion of its tower standing. The livings of the three are discharged rectories—Saint Andrew's being united to All Saints' parish: the Rev. Henry Bird is patron and incumbent of the benefices. Population of Rockland, All Saints' parish, 352; Saint Andrew, 154; Saint Peter, 392.

Letters from HINGHAM and BUNWELL arrive every evening at half-past seven, and from BUCKENHAM and ECCLES at half-past eight, and are despatched at half-past six in the evening.

**AYLSHAM, CAWSTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

AYLSHAM is a parish in south Erpingham hundred—the market town, neat and small, is 119 miles S.E. by N. from London, and 12 N.N.W. from Norwich (the nearest railway station); situated in a fine part of the county, on a gentle eminence whose base is watered by the Bure: this river is navigable to Yarmouth for craft of fourteen tons burden; upon its stream are several corn-mills. This was formerly one of the principal manufacturing towns in the county, and was celebrated for its linen, called 'Aylsham web': upon the decay of this branch the manufacture of woollens and stockings was introduced, which flourished until machinery caused it to decline; a few looms only being

employed now for the Norwich houses. The principal trade at present is in corn and timber. The parish of Aylsham extends over three manors, viz. Aylsham on the part of Lancaster, of which the Dowager Lady Suffield is the owner; Aylsham Wood manor, possessed by Robert Copeman, Esq.; and Aylsham vicarage, of which the vicar of Aylsham, for the time being, is the lord: the whole was originally held under the duchy of Lancaster, it having been granted by Edward III to John of Gaunt, Duke of Lancaster. Courts are held occasionally for business connected with the several manors, and a County Court monthly, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20;

Aylsham being included in the circuit of towns under the act framed in 1846. The meetings of the board of guardians for the Aylsham Union, comprising forty-seven parishes, are held at the Black Boy Inn, every Tuesday.

The parish church of Saint Michael, which was erected by John of Gaunt, is a fine old building, having a nave, two aisles, two transepts, and a chancel adjoining; it has a square tower, in which is a peal of ten musical bells: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Norwich; the Rev Edmund T. Yates, M.A. is the present incumbent. There are places of worship for Baptists and Methodists; and a national school. The country about Aylsham is extremely beautiful, and the land very productive; it is richly wooded with fine old oaks; the views are extensive, especially from the churchyard, from whence may be obtained an unobstructed prospect of great diversity. There are several handsome seats in the vicinity of the town; the principal one is 'Blickling Hall,' the seat of Lady Suffield, about a mile and a half distant, in the midst of one of the most extensive and beautiful parks in the county; the mansion is an ancient building of brick, re-erected

about the year 1628 by Sir John Hobart: in the original mansion, it is said, Queen Anne Boleyn was born, and Henry VIII married her from this house. About a mile from Aylsham is a spa, formerly very celebrated, but for many years fallen into dis-use. The market, which is a tolerably good one for corn, is held on Tuesday, Fairs March 23rd, and the last Tuesday in September. The parish contained in 1831, 2,334 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,448.

CAWSTON is an agricultural parish in the same hundred as Aylsham, and the village is situated 4 miles S.W. from that town. It contains nothing of particular interest, nor any building of consequence but its parish church of Saint Agnes, which is rather a handsome edifice: the living is a rectory, in the gift of the Master and Fellows of Pembroke hall, Cambridge; the Rev. Augustine Earl Lloyd Bulwer is the present incumbent. This place has a charter to hold a weekly market; but the inhabitants do not avail themselves of such privilege otherwise than to preserve the right, which is effected by holding one annually on the last Wednesday in April. Fairs, February 1st for cattle, and the last Wednesday in August for sheep. The population of the parish in 1831, was 1,110, and 1841, 1,103.

BUCKENHAM, NEW AND OLD.

**NEW BUCKENHAM** is a parish in the hundred of Shropham,—the village, once a market town, is 98 miles N.N.E. from London, 16 s.s.w. from Norwich, and 5 E. S. E. from Attleborough; situated near the source of the river Waveney, in a flat, fertile and agricultural country, on the line of the Eastern Union Railway. The inhabitants possess some ancient privileges, among which is that of exposing goods for sale at any market or fair in the kingdom, free of toll; of holding a mercate court and a market; and the lord of the manor claims the right of officiating as butler at the coronation of the kings of England. The only object inviting the attention of the curious, in the neighbourhood, is the citadel and keep of an ancient castle, supposed to have been built by Sir Walter Knyvett in the 14th century. A high bailiff is chosen annually at the 'Portman' court; courts baron and leet are held by the lord of the manor, the Rev. J. F. Francklin, and the town is included in the Attleborough circuit, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.

The parish church of Saint Martin, was founded in the fifteenth century by a celebrated priest, named Thomas de Bokenham, from whom the town obtained

There is a place of worship for Methodists; and the charities comprise a free school for a limited number of boys, and an almshouse for four aged persons. The weekly market, entitled to be held on Saturday, has fallen into disuse, and only now observed annually on the last Saturday in May—it is a large one for general articles of consumption and wear: there is also a fair held on the 22nd of November. The population of the parish, in 1831, was 795, and in 1841, 716.

**OLD BUCKENHAM** is a parish and village in the in the same hundred as, and about two miles from New Buckenham. The village, which is straggling, but picturesque, and encircles a piece of common land of about twenty acres, exhibits nothing worthy of notice but its neat church: the living is a perpetual curacy, in the patronage of the parishioners; the Rev. Thomas P. Slapp is the present incumbent. Contiguous to the church gates stands the national school, a commodious brick building. Population of the parish in 1831, 1,201; in 1841, 1,255.

**BURNHAM MARKET AND OTHER BURNHAMS,**

WITH NORTH AND SOUTH CREEKE AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**BURNHAM MARKET** (or **BURNHAM-WESTGATE**) is the principal of six other Burnhams, distinct parishes and small villages adjoining to each other, all in the hundred of Brothercross. The first-named village is 12½ miles N.N.E. from London 36 N.W. from Norwich, 10 N.N.W. from Fakenham (the nearest railway station), and somewhat above 2 miles from the sea; situated on the small river Burn (from which it is said to derive its name). The place enjoys a trade in corn, has two iron foundries, and a manufactory for agricultural implements; but the weaving of hempen cloth, at one time of consequence, is no longer pursued. The government of the Burnhams is delegated to constables, elected at the several courts held under the lords of different manors. The seven parishes have their several respective churches; but none of these are worthy of descriptive notice except that of Burnham Market: this is dedicated to Saint Mary, and is a neat structure of stone and flint, with an embattled tower; and in the chancel are some interesting monuments: the living is a rectory, in the patronage of the Master and Fellows of Caius College, Cambridge. The Independents, Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists, have each a chapel in the parish; and there are almshouses for the aged poor. **BURNHAM THORPE**, a mile distant, claims mention as being the birth-place of the naval hero, Nelson, and the church of Saint Peter, contains several marble tablets to the memory of the Nelson family. The neighbourhood around here is considered as beautiful as any in Norfolk—the land exceedingly fertile, and in a superior state of agriculture. Many handsome residences of opulent families embellish the district, the grounds of which are laid out with taste and agricultural skill so eminently characteristic

of the Norfolk estates. Two annual fairs are held in Burnham Market, for toys and sundries—one on Tuesday in Easter week, the other on the 1st and 2nd of August. The parish contained, in 1841, 1,126 inhabitants.

The following comprise the other BURNHAMS, with the distance of each from the principal parish of Burnham Market; and its population at the last census, viz.—**BURNHAM DEEPPALE** is two miles and a half N.W., with a population of 109 inhabitants; **BURNHAM NORTON**, one mile, population 166; **BURNHAM SUTTON** and **BURNHAM ULPH**, adjoining Burnham Market, population 355; **BURNHAM THORPE**, about a mile E. by S., population 336; and **BURNHAM OVERY**—the last named is a small sea-port, two miles north of Burnham Market, communicating with the sea by an arm or creek about a mile and a half in length. Its trade is in corn and coal, and a portion of the inhabitants derive their subsistence from oyster-dredging; population 613.

**NORTH AND SOUTH CREEKE** are two villages and parishes in the same hundred as the Burnhams; situated from two to four miles from Burnham Market. The villages are straggling, and the houses composing them have no pretensions to elegance; nor is there anything of consequence belonging to the parishes but their agricultural prosperity. The places of worship are a church each at North and South Creeke, both dedicated to the Virgin Mary, and a Baptist chapel at South Creeke. The living of North Creeke is a rectory, in the presentation of the bishop of Norwich; that of South Creeke is a vicarage, in the gift of the Rev. Henry Goggs. The population of North and South Creeke respectively, in 1841, was 648 and 940.

**CLEY AND BLAKENEY.**

CLEY is a parish, in the hundred of Holt—the vil-  
lage, which is entitled to hold a market, is 123 miles  
N. N. E. from London, 25 N. N. W. from Norwich, and  
four N. N. W. from Holt; situated upon the northern  
coast of the county; and is a place of little consequence  
in mercantile affairs, save what is derived from the  
importation of coal and exportation of barley and malt;  
it is also frequented, in the summer season, by many  
persons for the purpose of bathing; and a large quantity  
of fine fish is caught off the coast by the inhabitants.  
The railway, for which an act has been obtained, from  
Fakenham to Wells, will if completed, branch off from  
the latter town coastwise to Cley.

The parish church of Saint John is a spacious struc-  
ture, in the early style of English architecture: the  
living is a rectory, in the patronage of the lord of the  
manor; the Rev. Charles Codd, is the present incum-  
bent. There is a place of worship for Wesleyan Metho-  
dists. The market, entitled to be holden on Friday,  
has become of little or no importance, and the fair for  
horses, on the last Friday in July, is but thinly attended.  
Population in 1831, 827, and in 1841, one more.

BLAKENEY is a small sea-port town and parish in  
the same hundred as, and about a mile or somewhat  
more, from Cley; consisting principally of one long  
street, commencing on an elevation, and descending  
towards the harbour—which is a very excellent one,  
opening to the North Sea, and well situated as a refuge  
for vessels. The staple articles of commerce are grain  
of various kinds, oil-cake, coal, timber and wool: with

They have each their parish church—that of Great Hautboys is dedicated to Saint Theobald; that of Little Hautboys to Saint Mary: they exhibit nothing meriting particular notice: the livings are both discharged rectories, of which the Rev. Jix Blake is the incumbent. Population of Great Hautboys parish 162, and Little Hautboys with LAMMAS, 299.

**CROMER.**

IS a parish in the hundred of North Epsingham—the town, which had once a market, is 130 miles N.N.E. from London, 22 N. from Norwich, and 10 N. from Aylsham. This now well-frequented bathing place, is situated on the north coast of Norfolk, and was accounted for, in the survey made by William the Conqueror, under the town and lordship of Shipdon, which has long since been swept away by the sea. In the summer season this town is resorted to by many fashionable visitors, the beach being one of the finest on the coast, and the rides and views in the neighbourhood are of great diversity, and some charmingly picturesque. The inns are good, and the lodging houses convenient—many of the latter are delightfully situated, having a free and unobstructed view of the German Ocean. Various improvements have been effected of late years; and the inhabitants, in order to afford their visitors every amusement in their power, have established regattas, balls and other entertainments, which are well attended—more especially the regattas, when the beach presents a lively and animated scene. The Cromer cliffs are bold and precipitous, and intersected in various directions, by convenient paths leading to the beach: there is likewise a jetty, which, at high water, forms a delightful promenade. At a short distance to the east of the town, stands the lighthouse, serving also as a conspicuous landmark by day: and between Cromer and Yarmouth are no fewer than three others—this being a very dangerous part of the coast. A life-boat, and Captain Manby's apparatus for the preservation of shipwrecked persons, are in constant readiness. Large quantities of fine fish are caught

here, consisting of herrings, cod, turbot, and lobsters; the latter are highly estimated for their superiority of flavour. There is one great singularity attending this place—the sun may be seen to rise out of and set in the sea, this of course is ascribable to the formation of the county, in connexion with the waters that nearly surround it.

The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul is much admired as a very beautiful specimen of flint and freestone building: it is an embattled edifice, and has a tower 159 feet high: the living is a vicarage, in the presentation of the heirs of George Thomas Wyndham Esq.; the Rev. William Sharp is the present incumbent. A free school for boys, founded and endowed in 1505, by Sir Bartholomew Rede, goldsmith, and citizen of London, has subsequently been re-endowed by the Goldsmiths' Company with additional funds, and a large school-room has been erected: a free school for girls has also been established, and is supported by voluntary subscriptions. Adjoining Cromer in a beautifully wooded park, stands 'Felbrigg-hall' the seat of Mrs. Windham. 'Cromer-hall,' in the vicinity, is a fine modern mansion, erected by the late George Thomas Wyndham, Esq. There are also several very handsome houses in the neighbourhood, inhabited only during the bathing season. Cromer had once a weekly market, which has ceased to be held for many years, but the town is well supplied with all sorts of agricultural produce daily, and abundantly with fish. A fair is held on the Monday and Tuesday in Whitsun-week. Population of Cromer parish in 1831, 1,232 and in 1841, 1,240.

**DISS** is a parish, giving name to a hundred—the market town 9½ miles N. E. from London, 27 N. from Ipswich, 2¼ N. E. from Bury Saint Edmunds, and 21 S. from Norwich (all rail distances); situated on the line of the Eastern Union Railway, on the verge of the county abutting upon Suffolk, from which it is separated by the river Waveney. The principal streets are spacious, gas-lighted, and macadamized: many of the houses surround a piece of water, called the 'Mere,' covering about five acres. The parish extends over four manors, namely: the manor of Diss, of which Thomas L. Taylor, Esq. is the owner; Heywood, belonging to the Earl of Albemarle; the manor of 'Heywood Hall,' under the trustees of the late Charles Taylor, Esq.; and the 'Rectory Manor,' of which the Rev. William Manning is the proprietor. Courts are held for the respective manors, and the magistrates sit upon business connected with the hundred on the first and last Monday in every month; and on the Friday week before the quarter sessions. The chief constables of the hundred are selected from among the inhabitants. Brewing, malting, and grinding corn, are amongst the prominent branches—employed in the latter are several windmills in the neighbourhood, and near to the railway station is an extensive flour mill worked by steam.

The parish church of Saint Mary stands on the north side of the Market-place, and is an ancient building in the early and decorated style of English architecture, with a square embattled tower, containing a clock, eight bells and set of chimes. T. Skelton, pre-laureat to King Henry VIII, was the rector about 1500; he was remarkable for his satire, which was especially employed in lashing the vices of the clergy; and his wit was exercised severely upon the Dominican friars. Richard Nix, Bishop of Norwich, cited him to appear to answer a charge of keeping a concubine, which being proved, he was suspended. He was subsequently persecuted by Cardinal Wolsey, and forced to take sanctuary in an abbey, where he died June 21st, in the year 1529. Erasmus styled this divine 'the light and ornament of English scholars.' The living of Diss is now private property, enjoyed by the Rev. William Manning. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents, Unitarians, the Society of Friends, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists. The first-named denomination are numerous and highly respectable in this town. The principal charities are some almshouses, a school of industry; one upon the national plan, and a provident society for the relief of industrious labourers. A philosophical and mechanical institute was established some years since, and connected with it are a museum and library. There is a book club which has existed for nearly a century. The country for five miles round Diss, is one level plain; the soil on the north side is very heavy, on the south it is light and mixed, but the whole being well cultivated is in the highest degree fruitful. The market is held on Friday; and the fairs on the first Friday in July, for lambs and other stock; the third Friday in Sep-

tember, for pedlary and hiring of servants; and the 8th of Nov., for various commodities. The parish contained, in 1831, 2,934 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,205.

ROYDON is a small village and parish, comprised within the manors of Roydon Hall and Tufts, and Gissing Hall—the former belonging to Mr. Samuel Brook, Diss; the latter to the Right Honourable J. H. Frere, who is also patron of the church living—which is a rectory. The parish church of Saint Remigius—a small ancient building, is one mile and a half from Diss. The population of this and the following parishes is stated after the notice of STUSTON.

THELVETON, popularly called *Thelton* is a small parish—the centre of which is about two miles E.N.E. from Diss: it is the property of Thomas Havers, Esq. Thelton Hall. The parish church of Saint Andrew has lately been renovated and beautified: the living is a rectory, in the gift of the Crown.

SHELFHANGER, an inconsiderable village, is two and a half miles N. from Diss. The Duke of Norfolk is lord of the manor and patron of the church living—which is a rectory: the church is dedicated to All Saints. The Baptists have a place of worship in the parish.

SCOLE, or OSMONDISTON (the first its more popular name), is a pleasant village about 3 miles E.S.E. from Diss; situated on the confines of Norfolk and Suffolk, at the junction of the roads leading from Ipswich to Norwich, and from Diss to Bungay and Yarmouth. Thus located, it is a place of great thoroughfare, and, before the opening of the Eastern Union Railway, which passes by Diss, was of much greater importance and more thriving in this particular. It still supports two good public establishments—namely, the 'Scole Inn' and the 'Greyhound'—the former well-known to all travellers, through the counties before named and the more northern ones, is a large brick building, erected in the seventeenth century, by a merchant of London. Sir Edward Kerrison, Baronet, is lord of the manor and patron of the church living—which is a rectory; the church, dedicated to Saint Andrew, has recently been thoroughly repaired. A fair for horses, toys and pedlary, is held in the village on Tuesday in Easter week.

BURSTON is a small village, 3 miles N.N.E. from Diss, situated on the line of the Eastern Union Railway, for which this place is a station. The parish church of Saint Mary is a small structure, with wooden bellfry: the living is a rectory in the gift of the Crown.

SHIMPLING is a parish, inconsiderable both in extent and population, lying between, and adjoining to, those of Burston and Dickleburgh 3½ miles N.E. from Diss. The parish church, dedicated to Saint George, was erected early in the thirteenth century—but the people, probably at even an earlier period. A representation of Saint George and the Dragon, and the arms of the Shimplings, are carved on the front of it. The living is a discharged rectory, in the gift (or was lately) of the family of Harrison.

DICKLEBURGH is rather a considerable village, 5 miles N. E. from Diss, situated on the road leading to

Ipswich and Norwich. A very extensive steam mill is established here for grinding corn and dressing seeds, &c.—the proprietor is Mr. W. Smith. The Earl of Orford is lord of the manor, but the parish is chiefly copyhold, subject to fines. The places of worship are the parish church of All Saints—a large building with a tower, and a Wesleyan chapel. The living of Dickleburgh is a rectory, in the patronage of the Master and Fellows of Trinity College, Cambridge. There is a national school in the village, and within the parish is the hamlet of SEMERE, which record states to have been a large town at the time of the Conquest.

PALGRAVE is a small irregularly-built village, in the hundred of Hartismere, county of Suffolk—one mile and a half s. from Diss. This lordship anciently belonged to the abbey of Bury Saint Edmunds, and the western part of the parish was a chapel or cell subor-

dinate to the monastery. The parish church of Saint Peter is a building small and ancient, with a square tower: the living is a rectory, to which the lord of the manor, Sir Edward Kerrison, Bart. presents.

STUSTON is in the same county and hundred as Palgrave—the village small and straggling, being situated about 2 miles s.e. from Diss, and 3 n. by w. from Eye. The parish church of All Saints is venerable and simple in aspect, being clothed with ivy and having a thatched roof. The living, a discharged vicarage, is in the same gift as that of Palgrave.

**DOCKING, SEDGEFORD, HEACHAM, RINGSTEAD,**

**SNETTISHAM, HUNSTANTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

**DOCKING** is a parish in the hundred of Smithdon—the village, a considerable one, is 17 miles N.N.E. from King's Lynn, 11 N.W. from Fakenham, and 6 S.W. from Burnham Market. At one time it was called *Dry Docking* from the great scarcity of water that prevailed here; this inconvenience seems to have been in some measure remedied by a charitable lady, named Henley, who about eighty years ago caused a well to be sunk seventy-four yards deep, which she gave to the parishioners. A large workhouse under the poor-law union was erected here in 1836, at cost of £9,000, including the necessary fittings and furniture; it will accommodate upwards of five hundred recipients. The magistrates for the division meet here in petty session on the last Monday monthly. The places of worship are the parish church of Saint Mary, and chapels for Primitive Methodists. The living of Docking is a vicarage and rectory; the former in the gift of the diocesan Bishop, the rectory is the property of the Rev. Humphrey John Hare. The parish contained, in 1841, 1557 inhabitants.

**SEDFORD** is a stragling village situated between Docking and Heacham, 3½ miles W. from the former place. The parish church of Saint Mary is ancient, with a tower, round at its base, and octagonal above; the living is a vicarage in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Norwich. The Wesleyan Methodists have a place of worship here, and there is a national school. The population of Sedgeford and the following parishes, is given after the notice of HUNSTANTON.

**HEACHAM** is a charming and respectable village, about 4 miles W. from Docking, and one from the shore of the German ocean. The principal trade of the place is in coal, and vessels discharge their cargoes on the beach, the harbour being much out of repair. The places of worship are the parish church of Saint Mary, and chapels for Independents and Methodists. The living of Heacham is a discharged vicarage, in the patronage of the Rev. Strickland Charles N. Rolfe.

**RINGSTEAD GREAT AND LITE**, are two parishes adjoining each other, the village of Ringstead is 5 miles

N.W. from Docking, 3 N. by E. from Heacham, and 2 S. by W. from Hunstanton. Each parish had formerly its church, namely, Saint Peter's and Saint Andrew's, but when the livings were consolidated 1771, Saint Peter's was pulled down. The benefice is a rectory.

**SNETTISHAM** village, formerly a market town (at that time called *Snettham*), is situated 6 miles W. by S. from Docking, and about 2½ S. from Heacham. It is a cheerful, pleasant little place, and its church of Saint Mary is a picturesque object in the scenery around the village. There are places of worship for Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists. The living of Snettisham is a perpetual curacy, in the presentation of H. L. S. Le Strange, Esq. Petty sessions are held here on the second Monday monthly.

Hunstanton is a pleasant village and sea-bathing place, 6½ miles N.W. from Docking, nearly 3 N. from Heacham, and 10 W. from Burnham Market, charmingly seated on the coast, having a firm sandy beach, and an expansive view of the German ocean, while inland the scenery is remarkably beautiful. There are presented no mean temptations as a place of summer resort, but its accommodations for visitors are limited, especially from the paucity of lodging houses; there is however a good inn, and Henry Le Strange, Esq. (the lord of the manor) has lately erected an hotel for visitors, during the bathing season. The lighthouse here, erected in 1847, by the Trinity House, rises forty-nine feet to the focus of the light, and from the elevation of the cliff on which it stands, its bright red light is cast across the broad Wash, and to a great distance at sea. The parish church of Saint Mary, is a large regular structure, with a substantial tower rising from the west end of the aisle: the living is a discharged vicarage in the patronage of the Bishop of Ely.

The inhabitants of the foregoing parishes, which are all in the hundred of Smithdon, are for the most part in agricultural employment—their number, according to the returns for 1841, was as follows, DOCKING, 1557; SEDGEFORD, 669; HEACHAM, 811; RINGSTEAD, 526; SNETTISHAM, 1,151; HUNSTANTON, 527.

**DOWNHAM MARKET,**

WITH THE PARISHES AND VILLAGES OF DENVER, WIMBOTSHAM, STOW-BARDOLPH, FORD-  
HAM, HILGAY, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**D**OWNHAM MARKET, is a parish in the hundred of Clackclose—the town, which as its name implies, holds a market, is 86 miles N. by E. from London, 42 w.s.w. from Norwich, and 15½ N. from Ely (Cambridge); situated on the East Anglian Railway, for which line there is neat station here; and on the declivity of an eminence to the east of the Ouse—over which river and the neighbouring country, is a fine uninterrupted view. The town takes its name from its site—a *ham* or 'dwelling,' on a *dun*, 'down' or 'hill'; and Spilman says the 'market here was of such antiquity that he finds it confirmed by Edward the Confessor.' The principal manor, with the hundred of Clackclose, was given by King Edgar to Ramsey abbey; and it appears that King John, in his 6th year, granted or confirmed a fair here to the abbot; and the privilege of having a gallows for hanging malefactors was allowed him in the time of King Henry III. Since the dissolution, this manor has passed through several hands to the family of Hare—Sir Thomas Hare, Bart. of Stow cottage, being the present lord. Near the wooden bridge which crosses the river here, the butter market, once so celebrated, used to be held. Within the last comparatively few years, the town has been much improved—the principal streets are well paved, and gas has lately been introduced for lighting them. Messrs.

Ward & Co. carry on an extensive business here, as mustard manufacturers, millers, seed crushers, brewers and coal merchants; and in the vicinity are several maltings and corn mills. The county magistrates meet in petty session for the division weekly; the lord of the manor holds a court baron four times in the year; and Downham is included in the thirty-second circuit of County Court towns, under the act passed in 1846 for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.: the court, the jurisdiction of which extends over twenty-seven parishes, is held monthly, at the Crown Inn. Downham is also a polling station at the election of members to represent west Norfolk in Parliament; and it is the centre of a Union of thirty-four parishes, under the new poor law: the work-house, a commodious and handsome structure, with two octagonal towers, stands a short distance off the Denver road.

The parish church of Saint Edmund is an ancient edifice, built of ear or rag stone, stuccoed. It comprises a nave, north and south aisles, and a chancel: at the western end rises a square tower, embattled, and surmounted by a spire. The interior of the roof is of oak, and the venerated wood-work of the gallery is much admired. The living of Downham is a rectory, within the diocese of Norwich. There are places of worship



for Baptists, Independents, the society of Friends, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists. The principal charity is a school, founded in 1808 by the late Mr. Clarke, for sixty-five boys. The market, held on Saturday, is chiefly for corn. Fairs, March 3rd, May 8th, and November 13th; and a statute for hiring servants on the last Saturday in September. Downham parish contained in 1831, 2,198 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,953.

DENVER is a neat little village, about one mile south from Downham, on the road to Ely. The parish church of Saint Mary is built of rough stone, with a square embattled tower: the living is a rectory, in mediæties, viz. Saint Peter's Easthall, and Saint Michael's Westhall, in the gift of Edward Roger Pratt, Esq., who is lord of the manor, and of the adjoining one of Ryston: the church of Saint Michael stands on the edge of the park. The population of Denver and the following parishes, is given after the notice of HILGAY.

WIMBOTSAM is a very inconsiderable village, about 1½ miles N. by E. from Downham, situated on the road to Lynn: it is solely inhabited by farmers, and labourers, employed by them, with their families, and contains no object deserving notice but its parish church—an ancient building, dedicated to Saint Mary: the living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of Sir Thomas Hare, Bart.

STOW-BARDOLPH, with STOWBRIDGE, form a long irregular village, about 2½ miles N.E. from Downham,

on the Lynn road, and extending down to the river. Sir Thomas Hare, Bart. is lord of the manor, and patron of the church living. The church, which is dedicated to the Holy Trinity, has just undergone a complete repair.

FORDHAM is a small village, three miles s. from Downham. Edward Roger Pratt, Esq. is lord of the manor, and patron of the church living—which is a curacy, annexed to that of Wimbotsham. The parish church of Saint Mary is a small building.

HILGAY village is four miles s. by E. from Downham and about two from the Ooze Bridge station, on the East Anglian Railway. The Wissey here is crossed (coming from Downham), by an iron bridge: the river is navigable for lighters, and coal is brought in them from Lynn to the quay, here, at which they discharge their cargoes, and re-load with corn, &c. At the foot of the bridge is an excellent inn, the 'Pratt Arms'. The parish church of All Saints' is a stone edifice embattled, with a square tower: the living is a rectory, in the patronage of the Rev. William J. Parker. The church is approached through a fine avenue of trees, which in summer furnishes a cool and refreshing shade.

The above-described parishes are strictly agricultural: they are all in the hundred of Clackclose, and the number of inhabitants in each was, in 1841, as follows—DENVER, 910; WIMBOTSAM, 582; STOW-BARDOLPH, 1,076; FORDHAM, 219; HILGAY, 1,515

**EAST DEREHAM,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF BEETLEY, GRESSENHALL, SWANTON, SHIPDHAM, ELMHAM, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**E**AST DEREHAM is a parish, in the hundred of Mitford—the market town is 101 miles N.E. by N. from London, 16 W. by N. from Norwich, 10 S. from Ingham, and the like distance N. by E. from Watton; situated at the junction of the East Anglian and the Eastern Counties Railways, and at a point whence branches a line to Fakenham. It is a flourishing little place, and within the last century has been so much

improved as to render it one of the handsomest towns in Norfolk; and it is seated in a fertile and delightful part of the county, nearly in its centre. The place strictly exhibits no pretensions to excel in manufactures; iron and brass founding may, however, be noticed as employing a few hands—in malting and brewing some or others are engaged, and there are several corn mills; but the general business is of a

retail character, well sustained by the inhabitants, and the farmers and country people who attend its markets and fairs, and the gentry of this respectable neighbourhood. Edmund Cooper, Esq. is lessee of the manor under the Crown, and holds a court leet annually, when constables (the only municipal officers) are appointed. Dereham is a polling station at the election of members to represent West Norfolk; and it is included in the thirty-third circuit of County Court towns under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.

The parish church of Saint Nicholas, is a very ancient and uniform structure, with a tower rising from the intersection, and open to the body of the church, after the manner of the old cathedrals: it has four chapels, two on the north and two on the south, and a remarkably sweet-toned organ; this fine instrument is noticed by Dr. Burney, in his history of music, as a great curiosity; it was built by Schmidt in 1666 and enlarged in 1827. In the north transept is a monument of white marble, by Flaxman, to the memory of the elegant and pious poet, William Cowper, who died and was interred here in 1800. There are two tablets, also, to the memory of Mrs. Unwin and Miss Perowne, whom the poet termed his 'best and dearest friends'; some beautiful lines on these affectionate memorials are from the pen of Hayley. The living of Dereham is divided into a vicarage rectory and a vicarage, in the gift of the Crown. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists; and schools for children of either sex, conducted upon the national plan. The market, held on Friday, has lately attained great importance, and is numerously attended by the opulent farmers and dealers in the country around: very considerable business is transacted in corn and cattle, and this market is esteemed as one of the best in the county for pigs. Fairs, the Thursday next before Old Midsummer-day, and the Thursday before the 9th of September. The parish of Dereham, with DILLINGTON hamlet, contained in 1831, 3,946 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,834.

BRETLEY is a small parish, nearly 4 miles N. by W.

from East Dereham, in the same hundred; situated on the road to Fakenham. The parish church of Saint Mary, is a small old building: the living is a discharged rectory, in the patronage (or was lately) of the Rev. C. Mannings. Population of the parish under 400.

GRESSENHALL, is a parish in the same hundred as the above-described places—the village, nearly 3 miles N. W. from Dereham, is rural in appearance, and strictly agricultural in its character. The parish church of Saint Mary, is a large cruciform building, having a tower rising from the intersection: the living is a rectory, in the patronage of the family of Hill. A collegiate chapel was founded here in the reign of Henry III, the remains of which now form a portion of the house of industry erected here in 1776. The workhouse of the Union, under the new poor law, is situated in this parish. The population of the parish, in 1831, was 924; in 1841, 957.

SWANTON, or SWANTON MORLEY, is a parish and village—the latter near four miles N.E. from East Dereham, in the same hundred. The parish church of All Saints, a handsome structure, stands on an eminence in the centre of the village: the living is a rectory, with that of Worthing annexed, in the incumbency of the Rev. Henry Tracey. Population of the parish, 779.

SHIPDHAM, is a parish in the same hundred as Dereham—the village, a pretty rural one, is situated 5 miles S. from that town, on the road to Watton. The parish church of All Saints is a neat building, with an embattled tower, surmounted by a handsome turret: the living is a rectory, in the gift of the Rev. Benjamin Barker. A fair for cattle and sheep is held on the 29th of June. In 1831, the population of the parish was 1,889, and in 1841, 1,861.

ELMHAM, or NORTH ELMHAM, is a village and parish in the hundred of Launditch, 5 miles N. from Dereham. The parish church of Saint Mary, has a tower at the western end, surrounded by a lofty spire: the benefice is a discharged vicarage, in the patronage of the family of Mills. A fair is held on the 6th April. Population of the parish in 1831, 1,153; in 1841, 1,219.

**FAKENHAM.**

WITH THE PARISHES AND VILLAGES OF HEMPTON, SCULTHORPE, COLKERK,  
 AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

FAKENHAM is a parish in the hundred of Gallow  
 —the market town is 108 miles N.E. from London, and  
 25 N.W. from Norwich; situated on a branch line com-  
 municating with the East Anglian and Eastern Coun-  
 ties Railways, at East Dereham, (12 miles to the south),  
 and on the acclivity of a hill, washed by the Wensum,  
 a tributary stream to the Yare river. Formerly salt  
 was made from the pits here, but this trade has dis-  
 appeared for many years, and the inhabitants at the  
 present day derive their main support from the nume-  
 rous corn growers and merchants who attend the market,  
 at which large quantities of grain are sold by sample.  
 The inhabitants claim exemption, by charter, from  
 serving on juries, at assizes or sessions. Sir Wil-  
 loughby Jones, Bart., is lord of the manor of Faken-  
 ham Lancaster, and holds courts leet and baron an-

nually at Midsummer; and a court is likewise held  
 for Fakenham Rectory manor, by the Rev. Philip Hig-  
 man, or his steward. The county magistrates meet  
 monthly in petty session upon business connected with  
 the hundred; and Fakenham is a polling station at the  
 election of members for West Norfolk.

The parish church of Saint Peter is a commodious  
 and handsome building with a lofty stone tower: the  
 living is a rectory in the gift of the Master and Fel-  
 lows of Trinity College, Cambridge. The church is  
 furnished with an excellent organ, the magnificent gift  
 of the late rector. There are places of worship for  
 Baptists, Independents and Methodists; and public  
 schools—some of the latter conducted upon the national  
 plan, and others wherein the children are clothed as  
 well as educated. The market which is held on Thurs-

day, is one of the best for grain in the county. Fairs, Ash Wednesday, and November 11th. The parish of Fakenham Lancaster, (with ALETHORPE hamlet), contained, in 1831, 2,085 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,158.

About a mile s. w. from Fakenham, in the same hundred as that town, is the small parish and village of Hempton; neither of which presents any object worthy of remark, except the fairs which are the largest for stock in the county, and are held on the Tuesday in Whitsun-week, the first Wednesday in September, and November 22nd, and two following days—the September fair has been lately established. The parish church fell to decay many years ago, and has never been restored. The population of the parish in 1841, was 447.

SCULTHORPE is a parish in the same hundred as Fakenham—the village is situated 2 miles n. w. from that town. The parish church of All Saints', was

**F**OULSHAM is a parish, in the hundred of Eyns-  
ford—the village is 112 miles N.E. from London) 17  
N.W. from Norwich, and 5 W. by N. from Reppham;  
pleasantly situated about a mile and a half from the  
river Wensum, and about 3 miles from the Fakenham  
branch of the East Anglian Railway. In 1770 this  
town, which had then a prosperous corn market, was  
almost totally destroyed by fire: it has been rebuilt in a  
superior manner, and now contains many good dwell-  
ing houses, but its market has never been success-  
fully revived, and the place exhibits now the character of a  
rural agricultural village. The parish church of the

Holy Innocents is an ancient and noble structure, with  
a tower 90 feet high, ornamented with pinnacles, and  
the church contains some curious monuments—one  
especially, to Sir Thomas Hunt, who is represented in  
armour, with the figures of his three wives kneeling, is  
deserving notice. The living of Foulsham is a rectory,  
in the patronage of the family of Astley; the incum-  
bent is the Rev. Henry Mills Astley. There is a place  
of worship for Baptists. A fair is held on the first  
Tuesday in May for cattle, &c. The population of the  
parish, by the returns rendered in 1831, was 952, and  
in 1841, 1,048.

**HARLESTON, WITH REDDENHALL & NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

**HARLESTON** is a respectable market town in the parish of Reddenhall, and hundred of Earsham—190 miles N.E. from London, 20 s. from Norwich, 7 s.s.w. from Bungay, 10 e. by N. from Diss, and 30 N.E. from Bury St. Edmunds—situated on the high road from the latter town to Yarmouth, and about a mile from the river Waveney. It was anciently called *Herolvestone* or *Heroldstone*, a name derived from that of a Danish chief, who is said to have encamped here. The town, which is gas-lighted, and remarkable for its cleanly aspect, consists principally of two streets, running parallel to each other. The scenery, as viewed from several situations in the parish, is highly picturesque; and the land, which is a mixture of arable and pasture, is exceedingly productive. The trade of the place is chiefly of a general and retail character, depending for support on the resident population, together with the attendance of farmers and others at the market. The Duke of Norfolk is lord of the manor, and holds courts occasionally; and Harleston is included in the thirty-fourth circuit of towns under the County Court act passed in 1816, for the recovery of debts not exceeding £20—the court is held here monthly at the Swan Inn.

The parish church, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, stands about a mile and a half from the town; it is in the later style of English architecture, and consists of a nave, chancel, and two aisles, with a richly ornamented and much admired steeple, containing a peal of almost matchless bells. In the church are deposited the remains of the celebrated families of Wogan and Kerlidge, to whose memory several superb monuments grace the interior; there are also, on stained glass, well executed coats of arms of the Wogans and Gawdys. The living of Reddenhall is a rectory, in the patronage of the Duke of Norfolk; the venerable Archdeacon Armerod is the present rector. The places of worship in Harleston are a chapel of ease, and others for Independents and Wesleyan Methodists. A national school, supported by voluntary contributions, is the principal charity. The market is held on Wednesday, and the fairs on the 5th and 6th of July, for hiring harvest-men, the sale of horses, &c., and on the 9th and 10th September, principally for sheep. The parish of Reddenhall and Harleston town, contained, in 1831, 1,784 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,662.

**HARLING, EAST AND WEST,**

WITH THE PARISHES AND VILLAGES OF QUIDDENHAM, ECCLES, KENNINGHALL, GARBOLDISHAM, BANHAM, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**EAST HARLING** or **MARKET HARLING**, is a parish in the hundred of Giltcross—the market town, a small one, is 90 miles N.E. by N. from London, 22 S.W. from Norwich, and 9 N.E. from Thetford; situated about a mile and a half from the line of the Eastern Counties Railway, on the banks of a stream tributary to the Waveney. This place, was at one time, noted for the manufacture of yarn and linen cloth; but, at the present day, except a considerable iron foundry, the interest of the inhabitants is confined to agriculture, and the produce of the land, which in this locality, is of great fertility. Connected with the foundry before-mentioned, is a manufactory for agricultural implements, and the proprietor, Mr. Loveday, has obtained great repute throughout the county, for his improved portable thrashing machines. A court of petty sessions is held by the magistrates on Thursday (monthly), at the Swan Inn; and the town is within the circuit of the Attleburgh County Court, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts not exceeding £20.

The parish church dedicated to Saint Peter and Saint Paul, is a handsome building, with a square embattled tower, surmounted by a spire. The interior of the church is ornamented with a richly carved screen, and the chancel windows with ancient stained glass; there is likewise a beautiful altar tomb, with recumbent figures in marble, of Sir Robert Harling and his lady: the living is a rectory, in the gift of Mrs. Wilkinson. There are places of worship for the Society of Friends, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists. The market, principally for corn, is held on Tuesday. Fairs, May 4th and October 24th for cattle, and the first Tuesday after the 12th September, for sheep; the latter is a large one. The parish, contained in 1831, 1,031 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,162.

**WEST HARLING** village, a small one, is about 2 miles W.N.W. from East Harling. The parish church of All Saints, is charmingly situated, in an extensive and finely-wooded park, within a short distance of Harling Hall, the seat of Lord Calborne, who is patron of the church living, which is a rectory. The population of West Harling, and that of the following parishes, is given after the notice of **BANHAM**.

**QUIDDENHAM**, is a small picture-que village, 2 miles E. from East Harling. The seat of the Earl of Albemarle, Quiddenham Hall, is in this parish, and a short distance from it, stands the parish church—the latter entered by a lofty porch of Norman style: the interior, which is neat and well kept, contains a handsome monument to a daughter of the Earl before-mentioned: the living is a discharged rectory, in the presentation of the same nobleman.

**ECCLES**, is a very inconsiderable village, 2½ miles N.E. from East Harling. Sir Thomas Beevor, Bart., is lord of the manor and patron of the church living.

which is a rectory. The church, dedicated to Saint Mary, is a small neat building, with a round tower. Eccles Hall, the seat of Sir James Flower, Bart., in this parish, is an ancient mansion.

**KENNINGHALL**, formerly called *King's Hall*, and once a market town, is 3 miles E. by S. from East Harling. It was formerly a place of some note, having a royal palace, and was the ancient seat of the Howard family, and continued so till the middle of the 16th century; and at a more early period is said to have been the seat of the courageous and unfortunate Queen Boadicea. Some immunities are still preserved to the inhabitants, such as being exempt from tolls, stallage, and serving on any jury out of the lordship; and the office of chief butler at the coronation of English monarchs, is claimed in right of this manor, of which the Duke of Norfolk is the lord. The workhouse for the Giltcross Union, under the New Poor Law, stands in an open and beautiful locality, about a mile and a half south of the town: it is a commodious building, affording accommodation to the poor of twenty-two parishes, over which the union extends. The places of worship are the parish church of Saint Mary (a handsome building), and Baptists' and Methodists' chapels. The living of Kenninghall is a vicarage, in the gift of the Bishop of Ely. The market, entitled to be held on Monday, has not been attended for some years, but there are cattle fairs July 18th and September 30th.

**GARBOLDISHAM** village, is 4 miles S. from East Harling, situated near to the border of the county next that of Suffolk. It presents nothing meriting special notice but its church—which is indeed an imposing structure, with a fine square tower, the top ornamented with ancient carvings in stone. The interior, which is well kept, contains some handsome monuments of the Montgomerie and Scott families: the living is a rectory, and the church is dedicated to Saint John the Baptist.

**BANHAM**, is a pretty village, 5 miles E. by N. from East Harling, and 2 N. from Kenninghall, situated between the latter village and New Buckenham. The church, which stands on one side of the square formed by the village, is approached by an avenue of lofty trees, and is a fine structure, with a square tower, surmounted by a leaden spire. The altar-piece, which is of oak, beautifully carved, formerly belonged to the cathedral at Bristol, and was placed in the church by the Rev. John Suttee, the present incumbent: the church is dedicated to the Virgin Mary, and the living is a rectory, in the gift of the Crown.

*Population, &c.*—The foregoing are all agricultural parishes: with the exception of Eccles, which is in Shropshire hundred, they are in the hundred of Giltcross: and their population, respectively, in 1841, was as follows—**EAST HARLING**, 1,162; **WEST HARLING**, 117; **QUIDDENHAM**, 83; **ECCLES**, 124; **KENNINGHALL**, 1,389; **GARBOLDISHAM**, 777; **BANHAM**, 1,165.

**HINGHAM, HARDINGHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

HINGHAM is a parish, in the hundred of For-hoc—the market town, a small one, is 98 miles N.E. by N. from London, 14 w. by s. from Norwich, and 3½ miles from the Hardingham station, on the Norfolk Railway; pleasantly situated near the source of the river Yare; neat in appearance, and containing some good houses. It is part of the ancient demesne of the Crown, and the inhabitants are in consequence exempt from serving on juries at the assizes and sessions. General courts baron and customary courts are held annually for the manors of Hingham, Hingham Gurney, and Hingham Rectory; and the magistrates assemble in petty sessions at the White Hart Inn, on the first Tuesday in each month. Agriculture is the chief occupation of the inhabitants here; and they derive some trifling advantage from the passage of persons to and from Norwich and Watton, and Attleborough and East Dereham—this source of profit, however, has been diminished by the opening of railways through the county.

The parish church of Saint Andrew, is a very fine structure, with a large and lofty tower; it was erected

in the reign of Edward III: on the north side of the chancel is a noble canopied monument, richly ornamented, erected to the memory of Thomas, Lord Motley, who died in the reign of Henry VI. The living of Hingham is a rectory, in the patronage of the Right Hon. Lord Wodehouse; the Hon. and Rev. William Wodehouse is the rector, and the Rev. Henry Moseley, his present curate. The free grammar school here was founded by William Parlett, in 1727, and well endowed: there is another school conducted upon the national plan. The market is held on Tuesday; and the fairs are March 7th, the Tuesday in Whitsun week, and October 2nd. Hingham parish contained, in 1831, 1,539 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,691.

HARDINGHAM is a parish, in the hundred of Mitford—the village is situated about 3 miles N.E. from Hingham, near the line of the Norfolk Railway. The church is dedicated to Saint George: the living is a rectory, in the presentation of the Master and Fellows of Clare Hall, Cambridge. Population of the parish in 1841, 602.

**HOLT,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF LETHERINGSETT, HUNWORTH, BRISTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**H**OLT is a parish, giving name to a hundred—the market town is 119 miles N.N.E. from London, 21 N.N.W. from Norwich, and 12 N.E. from Fakenham—the last named the nearest railway station; pleasantly situated about four miles from the sea, on rising ground, surrounded by a fertile district, justly styled the 'Garden of Norfolk.' Holt is a place of considerable antiquity, and is conjectured to have been a station or encampment of the Romans: this opinion being strengthened from the circumstance of a *quern*, or hand corn mill, having been ploughed up some few years since, from an eminence, called 'Cromwell's hill,' a short distance hence. The town is irregularly built; the streets gas-lighted, contain several excellent houses, and some of the shops are handsome and well furnished. The parish comprises four manors, viz. Holt Manor, Holt Market, Holt Hales, and Holt Peereys; the lords of which are Hindson Gurney and Richard Hanbry Gurney, Esqrs. Alice Peereys, the celebrated mistress of Edward III, was the family to which the latter manor belonged; the Greshams afterwards possessed it, and in the manor house, Sir Thomas, and his brother Sir Richard (who were lord mayors of London), were born. Sir Thomas converted it into a school-house, endowing it with this manor, for the education of fifty boys, to be chosen from the town and neighbourhood, leaving the patronage and government of it to the Fishmongers' Company of London: a scholarship in Sidney College, Cambridge, belongs to this school, and a fellowship there to the same company: over the principal door of the building are the arms of the Fishmongers' Company, and those of the Gresham family. A court leet is held annually on Saint Thomas' day, at which constables, pindars,

and some other parochial officers, are appointed; and Holt is included in the thirty-third circuit of County Court towns, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20: this court is held monthly, in the Shire-hall.

The places of worship are the parish church of Saint Andrew, and chapels for Baptists, the Society of Friends and Wesleyan Methodists. The living of Holt is a rectory, in the presentation of the Master and Fellows of Saint John's college, Cambridge. A free-grammar school and one conducted upon the national plan, are the public educational establishments. The market, chiefly for corn, is held on Friday. Fairs, April 25th and November 28th. The parish of Holt, contained, in 1831, 1,622 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,604.

Rather more than a mile from Holt, in the same hundred, is the village of LETHERINGSETT, situated on the Glaven, the stream of which turns a corn mill; and there is a brewery on its banks. The church is dedicated to Saint Andrew: the living is a rectory, in the gift of the Rev. Charles Codd. The population of the parish is under 300.

HUNWORTH, is a small parish and village, in the same hundred as, and about 2½ miles s.w. from Holt. The parish church of Saint Andrew (or as some authorities state, Saint Lawrence). is a small building: the living is a discharged rectory, united to that of Stody, in the patronage of Lord Suffield. Population in 1841, 234.

BRISTON, is a parish in the same hundred as Holt—the village being situated 4 miles s. from that town. There is no business connected with the parish, but what may be traced to agricultural operations. The parish church of All Saints is a small structure: the living is a discharged vicarage. Population in 1841, 963.

**LODDON, CHEDGRAVE AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

**LODDON** is a parish giving name to a hundred—the market town, small and pleasant, is 111 miles N.E. from London, 10 S.E. from Norwich, and 15 S.W. from Yarmouth; situated on the declivity and summit of an eminence, washed by an incon-iderable stream which mingles its waters with the Yare, at Yardley Cross; and on the road from Norwich to Beccles. The magistrates meet in petty session at the Swan Inn, on the first and third Wednesdays in every month. This is not a place of extensive trade—there are some malting- and two or three flour mills, but the prevailing occupation of the inhabitants of the parish is agriculture.

The parish church of the Holy Trinity, is a large and handsome stone structure, surmounted by a well-proportioned tower: in the chancel is a marble altar tomb of the Hobart family, one of whom founded the church in the reign of Henry VII., there are likewise some other monuments deserving inspection. The

organ, one of a very fine tone, was presented to the church by Mr. Thomas Reynolds, schoolmaster, in 1821. The living of Loddon is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Bishop of Ely; the Rev. John Smith is the present incumbent. The Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist have places of worship, and there is a national school supported by subscription. In the town is a private lunatic asylum. The market, principally for corn, is held on Tuesday; and fairs, for stock, on Easter Monday and the first Monday after November 22nd. Population of the parish in 1831, 1,175, and in 1841, 1,197.

**CHEDGRAVE** is a small parish and village in Loddon hundred, about a mile to the north of that town. The parish church dedicated to All Saints, has a fine Norman doorway: the living is a discharged rectory, in the patronage of the family of Proctor. Population of the parish, in 1841, 348.

**LYNN REGIS, CASTLE RISING & NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

LYNN REGIS, or, as it is commonly called KING'S LYNN, is a sea-port, market town, and borough, both corporate and parliamentary, having separate jurisdiction, locally in the Lynn division of the hundred of Freebridge; 99 miles S. by E. from London, 47 N. from Cambridge, and 44 W. by N. from Norwich; situated on the line of the East Anglian Railway, for which there is a station in the Blackfriars road. It is seated on the eastern bank of the Great Ouse, very near its confluence with the Wash, the common receptacle of this river and the Nene, and about ten miles from the German Ocean. At one period it was called Bishop's Lynn, from having belonged to the bishop of Norwich; but being alienated to the crown in the 29th of Henry VIII. the name was changed to that which it now bears. Lynn is a very ancient town, and is recorded to have been a place of considerable commerce as early as the Norman Conquest. The town is upwards of a mile in length and half a mile in breadth, and is intersected by four rivulets, termed 'fleets,' over which are many bridges. There are three principal streets that take nearly a parallel direction, from which smaller ones diverge; they are well paved, and gas-lighted; and the inhabitants are plentifully supplied with excellent water, brought from Grimstone, a distance of about seven miles, and conveyed into an aqueduct belonging to the corporation. Exclusive of those for the purpose of religion, the following are the principal public buildings. The guildhall is a fine old structure, erected about the time of Elizabeth, it comprises a hall of justice and various offices for the transaction of public business, together with elegant assembly and card rooms. The West Norfolk and Lynn hospital, a new and elegant building, was erected in 1835, at a cost of upwards of £2,500. The theatre is handsome, and its internal decorations appropriate. A subscription library was established in 1797; it contains about seven thousand volumes, amongst which are many valuable and rare works of genius: there is also a mechanics' news-room and library, and other news-rooms. A *conversazione* has been established here for a number of years; there are several classes in connection with it, the principal of which are for chemistry, mathematics, law, and general discussion. A newspaper is published in Lynn weekly; it is a journal conducted with considerable talent, and enjoys a good circulation.

The first royal charter extant is that of the 14th of John; this, however, from its tenor, appears to be a confirmation and extension of former privileges. The town has always been distinguished for loyalty to the sovereign, and has been rewarded by not fewer than

nineteen royal charters, which confer very considerable rights and powers; amongst these the most important is that of holding quarterly sessions of the peace, with authority to try all actions, civil and criminal, except for high treason. Previous to the operation of the Municipal Reform Act Lynn was governed by a mayor, recorder, twelve aldermen, and eighteen common councilmen: the corporation, under the new act, consists of a mayor, recorder (who presides at the quarter sessions), six aldermen and eighteen councillors, with the usual assistant officers; the style of the corporate body is, 'the Mayor and Burgesses of the Borough of Lynn Regis.' The borough is divided into three wards, and provided with a commission of the peace, under which the usual courts are held, and the magistrates sit in petty sessions every Monday and Thursday. Lynn is included in the thirty-second circuit of County Court towns, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. Lynn has returned two members to parliament from a very early period; the present representatives are Viscount Lord Jocelyn and the Honourable Edward Henry Stanley. The town is a polling station at the election of members to represent West Norfolk; and it is the centre of an Union under the new poor-law; the workhouse, formerly a church, dedicated to Saint James, is situated within the borough. The trade of the port is very considerable; about one hundred and seventy sail of vessels belong to Lynn, and much business is also done in foreign bottoms, chiefly Dutch and French. Till recently very few harbours in the kingdom possessed a better corn and coal trade coastwise, Lynn having an extensive command of inland navigation. Its foreign commerce is principally with Norway and the Baltic ports, and its transactions with Portugal in the wine trade are of some importance; the commercial prosperity of the port has experienced, however of late years, considerable depression.

There are several places of worship under the establishment, as well as for various religions denominations—their names, situations, and officiating ministers are given in a list at a subsequent page. The church of All Saints is an ancient cruciform structure, prior to the dissolution attached to the monastery of White Friars; the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Bishop of Ely. Saint Margaret's is one of the largest parish churches in England; it is a plain edifice, but handsomely and commodiously fitted up, and is furnished with a very fine organ and a peal of eight bells. This church was founded by Herbert de Lozing, last Bishop of Thetford and first of Norwich,

in the year 1100: the living is a perpetual curacy, with that of Saint Nicholas annexed, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Norwich. The church of Saint John the Evangelist is a beautiful structure, in the style of the thirteenth century, and contains upwards of eight hundred free sittings. Its erection was effected by voluntary subscription, assisted by funds from the commissioners for building churches and chapels. Saint Nicholas' chapel is a very elegant Gothic building, much admired for its fine oak roof, and distinguished as the most spacious one-aisle church in the kingdom. The Baptist and Independent Chapels are handsome and spacious—they were erected at a cost of about £3,000 each. The charitable foundations and institutions are numerous. The free grammar school was founded in the reign of Henry VII.; it is under the patronage of the corporation, and has scholarships to various colleges. Eugene Aram was usher at this school when he was apprehended, in 1759, on a charge of murder, committed fourteen years previously, and of which he was found guilty and executed. The charity schools are of various descriptions, parochial, national and otherwise. There are almshouses in which nearly fifty poor persons are maintained, and many charitable bequests alleviate the indigence of others. There are several remnants of architectural antiquities, the most conspicuous of which are 'the Chapel of Our Lady on the Mount,' a most unique specimen; and the Grey Friars' steeple; the latter presents an excellent landmark for shipping coming to the port.

The market days are Tuesday and Friday—the former is a large one for corn and cattle. Fairs, February 14th, October 17th, and the second Monday in April and November. The population of the borough and parishes, in 1831, was 13,370, and in 1841, 16,039: the population at the present time (1850) is estimated at about 19,000.

**CASTLE RISING** is a parish in the hundred of Freebridge—the village, now but an inconsiderable one, was formerly a market town, and previous to the operation of the Reform Bill was a parliamentary borough: it is 4 miles N. from Lynn, and was formerly a sea-port inferior only to that town and Yarmouth. It now attracts attention chiefly on account of its castle, the remains of which are very extensive; the keep is nearly entire, and the whole forms a most imposing relic of feudal grandeur. It was in this castle that Isabella, the wife of Edward II. was confined by her son, after her separation from her paramour, Mortimer. The parish church of Saint Lawrence is an ancient building, and a fine specimen of the Norman style of architecture, with a square tower rising from the centre. The entrance is enriched with mouldings, and the font is highly ornamented. The living is a rectory, in the presentation of the Honble. Mrs. Mary Howard. An endowed school, and a hospital for twelve aged women, are the principal charities. The population of the parish, in 1831, and *likewise* in 1841, was 358.

**NORTH WALSHAM,**

WITH THE VILLAGE OF WORSTHEAD AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**NORTH WALSHAM** is a parish in the hundred of Tunstead—the market town, inconsiderable in size, but ancient and respectable; is 123 miles N. E. by N. from London, and 14 N. from Norwich (the latter the nearest railway station); situated on the high road between Norwich and the northern coast of the county. The town is clean, but irregularly built; and consists of one leading street and several smaller ones diverging from it, most of which are well paved and gas-lighted. The market cross, erected in the reign of Edward III. was injured by the great fire, which nearly destroyed the town, in 1600; it was subsequently repaired, and is an attractive object. This neighbourhood is the residence of many genteel families, and is embellished with some handsome seats. In the vicinity of the town the country is flat; but further eastward, towards the coast, it is more varied, bold and picturesque: indeed this district is equal in beauty to any part of the county, and the land is fertile. About a mile from Walsham, in the direction of Norwich, on the road side, is an ancient stone cross, commemorative of a battle, fought in 1382, between Spencer, bishop of Norwich, and Lytster, the dyer. Walsham is a place of respectable local trade, but destitute of

manufactures. A very good inn, the 'King's Arms,' is well known as a comfortable commercial house, as well as an efficient posting establishment. The North Walsham and Dilham canal passes a short distance north-east of the town, and is a continuation of the Bure, which is navigable to Yarmouth; an extensive granary and coal wharf have been erected at the basin, at Auntingham, by Lord Suffolk. This nobleman holds a court baron annually, as does the Bishop of Norwich; the magistrates assemble here weekly in petty session, upon business connected with the hundred; and Walsham is included in the thirty-third circuit of County Court towns, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. The town is a polling station at the election of members to represent East Norfolk.

The parish church of Saint Mary is spacious, but possesses nothing to attract attention, except a fine monument, in the chancel, to Sir William Paston, Knt.: the living is a vicarage, of which, by virtue of his abbacy, the Bishop of Norwich is patron. Independents, Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists, and the Society of Friends, have their respective places of worship. The principal charitable institution is a

free grammar school, endowed by Sir Willam Paston, above mentioned, in 1660, for forty boys from certain hundreds of the county; it is an ably conducted establishment: the late Admiral Lord Nelson received his education at this school. A library, left by the Rev. — Benney, for the use of professional gentlemen of the town and neighbourhood, is under the care of the governors and master of the school. A Sunday school, conducted upon the national plan, is supported by subscriptions, and there is another school upon the British plan. The market is held on Thursday; a fair for cattle and pedlery on the day before Holy-Thursday, and statutes for hiring servants twice a year. The parish contained, in 1831, 2,615 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,655.

WORSTEAD is a parish in the same hundred as Walsham—the village is somewhat above 2 miles s. by e. from that town, pleasantly seated on a small stream that runs into the Thurne; and the navigable canal, which enters the sea at Yarmouth passes through the parish. It was formerly a market town, and held

some celebrity as the place where the twisted yarn called *Worsted* was first manufactured—the name of the place having been anciently spelled the same way as that material. Manufactures have long been unknown here, and there is no establishment of any consequence in business, unless a good inn may be considered an exception. A manorial court is held annually, at which constables and other officers are appointed. The parish church of Saint Mary is a spacious and truly handsome structure, with a lofty square tower crowned with pinnacles; the chancel is adorned with richly carved screen work, and the font is highly ornamented: the living is a discharged vicarage, in the presentation of the Dean and Chapter of Norwich. There is a place of worship for Baptists; and the charities consist of a school for poor children, supported by subscription, and alm-houses for six indigent persons. The market has for many years been discontinued; but a fair is held on the 12th of May, for stock, horses and pedlery. Population in 1831, 830; in 1841, 834.

**NORWICH,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF TROWSE NEWTON, THORPE AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**NORWICH** is a city, the capital of Norfolk, and of the East Anglian district; it is a county of itself, locally in the hundred of Humberleyard; situated in the eastern division of the county, about twenty miles west of the German Ocean. It was created a port by parliament, in 1827, after an expense of £25,000 incurred, in obtaining the act, for that purpose. The entrance to the port commences at Lowestoft (Suffolk), a distance (by rail) of 22½ miles. The city, is 113½ miles N.E. by N. from London, by way of Ipswich, and 126 by Cambridge, 68½ N.E. from Cambridge, 53½ E. by N. from Ely, 48½ E. by S. from Lynn Regis, 48½ N. from Ipswich, and 20 W. from Yarmouth—these distances are by rail. The Saxons, probably, first applied the term from which the present name of the city is derived—*North Wic*, signifying a 'Northern station,' castle or town. Its origin, with respect to its first foundation, is uncertain, but conjectured to have been about the year 575, in the reign of Uffa, a king of the East Angles, by whom it was strongly fortified and made a place of defence, with a royal castle. It was subsequently improved by Alfred the Great, but entirely destroyed by Sweyn, the Dane, in 1004, and rebuilt by his son Canute, about 1010. The castle is situated on the summit of an immense artificial mound or hill, the formation of which tradition ascribes to the first or aboriginal inhabitants of this island—and possibly, it may have been one of those 'high places,' on which, not only the people of Palestine, but the Greeks and others, worshipped their deities. At the Conquest, the castle was besieged and taken by William, who gave it, and the earldom of the city, to Ralph de Guader. Richard I, in 1189, created Roger, son of Hugh Bigod, Earl of Norfolk, who increased the strength of the fortifications—that was considered impregnable. Prior to the year 1135, it was made a place of confinement for state prisoners and, in 1339, Edward III, granted it to the sheriff of Norfolk, for a public school. Many improvements have been effected, both on the castle and the hill; and the summit of the latter has become a favourite promenade, which, from its position and central situation, commands a good view of the city and neighbourhood. Norwich was formerly enclosed with walls, which had twelve gates and forty towers; some remains of the walls and towers are still visible.

The city, previous to 1835, was governed by a mayor, twenty-three aldermen, two sheriffs, and sixty common councilmen, who had a recorder, steward, town clerk, chamberlain, sword bearer, sergeants at mace, marshals, &c. The style of the corporate body, under the Municipal Reform Act, is the mayor, citizens, aldermen and commonalty of the city of Norwich: there are sixteen aldermen, and forty-eight councillors, with a sheriff, and the usual assistant officers: the mayor (who is chosen from among the aldermen) is a magistrate by virtue of his office, and

for the year succeeding that of his mayoralty. Under the ancient charter, the mayor was constituted a justice for life, and was the president of the court of quarter sessions, assisted by the recorder; the recorder is now the sole judge. The new act divided the city into eight wards, and conferred upon it a separate commission of the peace. The assizes for the city are held before the judges on the Norfolk Circuit, under separate commissions from those for the county. The guildhall court or court of record for the trial of causes of every description and to any amount, is held at the guildhall, within the first twenty-one days of every alternate month, the practice in which, is similar to that of the superior courts of law, at Westminster. The County Court, under the late act is held monthly in the guildhall, and is for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. The ecclesiastical government of the city is under the Lord Bishop of Norwich, who holds his consistorial court in the chapel of Saint Mary the Less, within the cathedral church. The military government is regulated by the lieutenant of the county of Norfolk, who receives his appointment from the Crown. The city first exercised the elective franchise in the 23rd of Edward I, since which time it has uninterruptedly returned two members to parliament; the sheriff is the returning officer: the present representatives are the Marquess of Douro, eldest son of the Duke of Wellington, and Samuel Morton Peto, Esq. At Norwich the return is made of members to represent the eastern division of the county.

The manufactures of this city consist principally of bombasins, crapes, camlets, paramattas, poplins, and some other articles made from worsted, mohair and silk; many shawls, also damasks, cotton and woollen goods, and a variety of fancy articles; and there are yarn and power-loom factories. There are several agricultural implement manufactories, extensive iron foundries, breweries and snuff-mills, vinegar manufactories on a large scale, and corn-mills of great magnitude and power. The manufacture of shoes is a branch of considerable consequence here. The river Wensum runs through the city from east to west, after which it joins the Tese and Yare, and is navigable to Yarmouth, for steam packets and wherries. In the system of railways, Norwich is extensively interested—the Eastern Union line, in its junction with the Eastern Counties, opens a direct communication, by Ipswich and Colchester, with the metropolis; while another line attains the same point, by Ely, Cambridge, &c.; the Norfolk line joins the East Anglian, with a branch to Fakenham, and other lines proceed to Yarmouth and Lowestoft. The railway station is most conveniently situated in the high part of the city, and within five minutes walk of the castle, corn and provision markets, as well as all the principal hotels.

The public buildings of this city are numerous, and most of them very ancient—the one eminently conspicuous is the castle before noticed. The shire hall, erected in 1822, is situated in the inner vallum of the castle, on the north-east side, and is a handsome edifice of brick, cased with cement; the county sessions were held in it, for the first time, in October, 1823. Saint Andrew's hall was formerly a church, belonging to a monastery of Black Friars; at the dissolution it was given to the Mayor and citizens, 'for a hall to repair unto as a common assembly.' In the centre of the east end of the nave is a handsome clock, over which is a figure of Justice, richly gilt; under the clock are the royal arms of England; and the whole of the walls are adorned with historical paintings of acknowledged merit, and portraits of many gentlemen who have filled the different civic offices. At the west end is placed a beautiful organ, used at the musical festivals held in this hall triennially. An admirable picture of Admiral Lord Nelson, by Sir William Beechey, presented to the corporation in 1804, graces the east end. This hall is an ornament to Norwich, and forms one of the leading attractions of the city. The guild-hall, a capacious building of black flint, stands in the Market-place; it formerly was the common gaol of the city, but for many years the court of assize and city quarter sessions have been held in it; the elections of the mayor, aldermen and common councillors, and of representatives in parliament also take place here. The council-chamber, in this edifice, particularly claims the notice of the lover of ancient art: it contains many fine and curious portraits of eminent men, and worthies of Norwich; the room is commodious and elegantly fitted-up, and at the east end is a beautiful window of stained glass. This chamber is the depository of the sword of Don Xavier Francisco Wintulsen, the Spanish admiral—presented by Lord Nelson, accompanied by a letter in his own hand-writing; both are enclosed in a well-executed mural naval trophy, in honour of the Hero of the Nile. The new city gaol (commenced in 1824, and finished in 1827), is situated outside the walls, near Saint Giles' gates, and is most admirably constructed and well regulated; the front elevation is massy, and assimilates with the purpose for which it is intended; the erection cost £30,000. The corn-exchange, which ornaments a new street leading from the Market-place, was opened on the 8th November, 1828: it is of noble dimensions, ninety-six feet in length by eighty-five in width, and twenty-seven feet in height; and the interior forms one of the largest apartments in the kingdom. In Broad-street, Saint Andrew's, is the museum, a neat and spacious new building, erected on a piece of ground purchased from the Duke of Norfolk, and stored with an immense number of subjects of natural history, minerals and works of art from all parts of the world: the school of design is in the same street. The public subscription library, erected on the site of the old gaol, at the north end of the Market-place, is an elegant structure, furnished with nearly twenty thousand volumes, together with a valuable collection of rare books, the property of the corporation. Near Chapel-field are the assembly rooms, planned and executed about the year 1754, occupying part of the site of the ancient college of the chapel in the fields: the theatre is in the same street. In the parish of Saint Andrew is an old building (formerly used as a prison, but since converted into an extensive tobacco and snuff manufactory), that attracts much notice, from the singular construction of its north wall, which is faced with flints, so admirably squared and scientifically adjusted, as scarcely to admit the edge of a knife between the joints. The peoples' college has recently been founded by the munificent liberality of Edward Lombe, Esq., for the purpose of giving instruction, &c. by classes, lectures, debates, a library, reading-room, &c.: the fees are low, and, in the words of the admirable prospectus, 'a higher department of professional instruction awaits the institution if the valuable life of its founder be spared and the students avail themselves of the advantages now placed at their disposal.' There are other institutions of a literary, scientific and philosophical character; the most prominent of these is the Norfolk and Norwich literary institution, formed in 1822: and there are several others whose objects are

equally liberal and laudable. The agricultural society held its eleventh county meeting here, in July, 1849, when immense quantities of farming stock and implements connected with husbandry, were exhibited and tested, and various prizes awarded. Three newspapers are issued from the press of Norwich, weekly—their titles, proprietors, &c. are stated under their proper head: they are all edited with considerable talent, and enjoy a well merited circulation, throughout Norfolk and the neighbouring counties.

The introduction of Christianity into this island occurred at a very early period, and there is evidence that the *Icenii*, the ancient inhabitants of East Anglia, were converted during the third century. The cathedral was founded by Herbert de Lozigna, in 1096, and is one of the finest remains of Norman architecture in Great Britain. It is four hundred feet long from the entrance at the west door to the east end; there are four painted windows at the east end of the choir—one representing our Saviour's transfiguration, and the others the apostles, evangelists and prophets; the monuments, both ancient and modern, are numerous. The tower springs from the centre of the church, and is crowned on the top with a battlement and four small spires, in the middle of which rises the beautiful commanding spire; the entire height from the ground is three hundred and six feet: in the tower are five musical bells. The cloisters form a square of one hundred and seventy-four feet within the walls. The chancel formerly was surrounded by chapels, several of which are still standing. Saint Peter's (Maucroft) is the most capacious and handsome parish church in the city: it is built of freestone—the material used in the erection of nearly all the other churches is flint. It has an elegant altar, adorned with an excellent painting of the angel delivering Saint Peter out of prison; and above this is a beautiful window of stained glass: the tower is large, and contains twelve musical bells. There are upwards of forty other churches, none of which require particular notice; also places of worship for nearly every religious denomination, including Unitarians, the Society of Friends, Roman Catholics and Jews; many of these merit descriptive notice greater in extent than can be devoted to them in this work. The charities of Norwich are numerous; under the head of 'Public Buildings, Institutions, &c.' will be found a list of them, and the valuable educational establishments, for the gratuitous instruction of children, are given in their proper department of the directory. There are societies likewise, for promoting Christian knowledge, and auxiliary bible and church missionary associations; several friendly societies, and another for the relief of distressed travellers, and the detection of vagrants. The management of the poor in the city of Norwich is vested in the court of guardians, by virtue of a local act, and confided to persons chosen on Easter-Monday, by the different parishes.

Norwich has been the birth-place of some eminent characters—Matthew Parker, second protestant Archbishop of Canterbury, was born in Saint Stephen's parish, in this city, August 6th, 1504, and interred at Lambeth palace, in his own private chapel, in the 72nd year of his age; Sir Thomas Browne, an eminent physician and antiquary, author of the 'Religio Medicæ' and other curious works, died in Norwich, and was buried in Saint Peter's (Maucroft) church; the Rev. William Beloe, B.D. F.R.S., author of 'Anecdotes of Literature,' and other valuable volumes, was born here in 1758. The country around Norwich is very fertile, and the views are highly pleasing, particularly across the river towards Thorpe; the surface is generally flat, and the land extensively devoted to agriculture, notwithstanding the gravelly quality of the soil, which industry and skill have, however, effectually ameliorated. In the vicinity there are a number of tasteful private residences, and several elegant streets.

The markets are held on Wednesday and Saturday—the latter is the principal. Fairs, on the Thursday before Easter-Monday, Monday and Tuesday in Easter week, Monday and Tuesday in Whitsun week; and Toulband fair, for horses and cattle, the day before Good-Friday. The population of the city of Norwich, in 1831, was 61,110; in 1841, that of the city and county of the city of Norwich, was 62,344; but, including the



suburbs, the population of Norwich may be reckoned at about 75,000, and in 1850, to perhaps 85,000 or more.

Trowse, is a parish in the hundred of Henstead—the hamlet of Newton, or as it is called Trowse Newton (to distinguish it from numerous other Newtons), is situated about a mile, or rather more, south-east from Norwich. It is a genteel little place, and the neighbourhood around it is embellished with many tasteful villas. The river Yare, which passes close to the village, has been deepened and made navigable for barges; it drives a very extensive corn-mill. The parish church of Saint Andrew is a neat building: the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Norwich. The population of the parish, in 1841, was 562.

THORPE is a charming village, in the parish of Thorpe Saint Andrew—the latter partly within the city of Norwich, but chiefly in the hundred of Blofield, about 2 miles east from Norwich; situated on the line of railway running from the city to Yarmouth, and on the banks of the river Yare. This pleasant village, which possesses many attractions, is the holiday resort of the inhabitants of Norwich. It also is the head quarters of the Norwich yacht club, and, upon the river here, many rowing and sailing matches are contested. A short distance from the village stands the county lunatic asylum. The parish church of Saint Andrew, is an ancient structure, with a tower: the living is a rectory. The parish contained in 1841, 2,197 inhabitants.

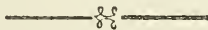

Reepham was once remarkable for having three churches erected in the same churchyard, viz. one each belonging to the parishes of Reepham, Witwell and Hackford; the two former are still standing, and present a singular appearance, being joined together—

STOKE FERRY,

WITH THE PARISHES AND VILLAGES OF WEREHAM, BOUGHTGN, WRETTON, WEST DEREHAM, OXBOROUGH, NORTHWOLD, FINCHAM, SHOULDHAM, MARHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**STOKE FERRY** is a market town, 88 miles N.N.E. from London, 38 w. by s from Norwich, 14 s.s.e. from Lynn, and 10 N.N.W. from Brandon (Suffolk); situated on the north bank of the river Stoke, and 7 miles from the Downham Market station on the East Anglian Railway. The malting business is carried on extensively in this neighbourhood—at Whittington, Messrs. Whitbread and Co., the great brewers of London, have very large kilns, and cisterns capable of steeping seventeen hundred bushels of barley at one time. In the same locality, has lately been erected, by Mr. Bird, a powerful and handsome steam flour mill, with machinery of a very superior description. Lime of a capital quality, is obtained in the vicinity of the town, and is applied to agricultural purposes. The land around here is remarkably fertile, and in a fine state of cultivation.

The parish church of All Saints has lately undergone complete restoration and repair, and is now a neat little building: the living is a curacy in the gift of the Crown. J. B. S. Bradfield, Esq. is lord of the manor: his father, the late James Bradfield, Esq. founded a school here for twenty-five poor children of this parish and that of Wretton. In the 32nd year of Henry III, the prior of Shouldham abbey obtained a grant for holding a fair and market in this town, which grant was subsequently confirmed by Henry VI: it suffered from disuse for a long period, but within these few years has been revived, and now enjoys (proportionate to its size and population), an excellent corn market on Friday. A fair is held on the 6th of December, for cattle.

The population of Stoke Ferry parish, and that of the following ones, is given after the notice of MARHAM.

**WEREHAM** village is about 2 miles N.W. from Stoke Ferry, situated on the road to Lynn. A Benedictine priory was founded here in the reign of John, by the Earl of Clare, and was given in 1321, to the abbey of West Dereham. The parish church is dedicated to Saint Margaret: the living is a perpetual curacy, with that of Wretton annexed. There is a public school in the parish, conducted upon the national plan.

**WRETTON**, is situated about a mile west from Stoke Ferry: it contains the parish church of All Saints, and a Primitive Methodist chapel. The living of Wretton is annexed to that Wereham.

**BOUGHTON**, is a very considerable parish and village—the latter about a mile and a half north from Stoke Ferry, containing a church dedicated to All Saints: the living is a discharged rectory, in the gift of the family of Hunt.

**WEST DEREHAM**, is a village, somewhat more than 3 miles W. by N. from Stoke Ferry, lying on the road to Downham Market. An abbey for premonstratensian canons was founded here, in honour of the Virgin, in 1188, by Hubert, Dean of York, afterwards Archbishop of Canterbury; at the dissolution its revenues were found to be very considerable. Interesting remains of this once stately structure are still to be seen—particularly the gate-house, a lofty quadrangular embattled pile, with towers at the angles. The parish church of Saint Andrew is an ancient building, with a tower at its western end: the living is a perpetual curacy.

**NORTHWOLD** village, is rather more than 4 miles S.E. by S. from Stoke Ferry; situated on the road to Brandon (Suffolk), and the river Wissey or Stoke, runs through the parish. The parish church of Saint Andrew was erected in the reign of Edward IV—it is rather an imposing structure, with a fine quadrangular tower, constructed of flint, embattled and crowned with richly carved pinnacles: the living is a rectory, in the patronage of the Bishop of Ely. There is a national school in the parish.

**FINCHAM** is a village, formerly comprised in the two parishes of Saint Martin and Saint Michael, 5 miles E.N.E. from Downham Market, situated on the road to Swaffham, from which it is nine miles distant. The places of worship are the parish church of Saint Martin, and a Wesleyan chapel. The living of Fincham is a discharged vicarage, in the patronage of the Crown and a private family, alternately. A fair, for Lorses and toys, is held on the 3rd of March; and there is a show of horses in August.

**SHOULDHAM**, is 6½ miles N.E. from Downham Market. A Gilbertine priory was founded here in the time of Richard I. by Jeffrey F. B. Piers, Earl of Essex, the revenues of which, at the dissolution, were considerable. There were formerly two churches here—All Saints and Saint Margaret's: the latter, after the dissolution, was suffered to fall to decay: the living of All Saints is a perpetual curacy, in the patronage of Sir Thomas Hare, Bart. There is a place of worship for Wesleyan Methodists, and a free school.

**MARHAM** is a village, 3¼ miles E. by N. from Shouldham, and 7½ W. by N. from Swaffham; situated on the road to the latter town. The Countess of Arundell, in the middle of the thirteenth century, founded a Cistercian nunnery here, of which there are no remains. The church is dedicated to the Holy Trinity: the living is a discharged vicarage, in the gift of the Master and Fellows of Saint John's College, Cambridge.

**OXBOROUGH** village, is 3 miles E.N.E. from Stoke Ferry, situated on the road to Swaffham. This village is well deserving notice from its church—which is a spacious structure of flint and stone, with a square tower embattled and surmounted by a lofty spire. The east window contains richly stained glass, delineating a portion of our Saviour's history, &c.; and the roof of the church is of oak, curiously carved. A chantry, in the south aisle, is partly enclosed by a stone screen of Grecian architecture. The church is dedicated to Saint John the Evangelist: the living is a discharged rectory, with the vicarage of Foulton annexed, in the patronage of the Master and Fellows of Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge. Edward I. granted a market, several fairs, and various other privileges, to the manor of Oxborough, long since fallen into disuse. The mansion house, which is said to resemble Queen's College, Cambridge, is a fine specimen of the style of architecture that prevailed in the time of Edward IV.

**SWAFFHAM.**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF SPORLE, CASTLE-ACRE, NEWTON AND NEIGHBOURHODS.

SWAFFHAM is a parish, in South Greenhoe hundred—the market town is 96 miles N.N.E. from London, 28 w. by n. from Norwich, and the same distance east from Wisbeach, (Cambridge); situated on the East Anglian Railway, which communicates with the Norfolk, Norwich and Yarmouth, and the Eastern Counties lines. Its locality is healthful and pleasant—its site that of a gravelly soil, and a fine open country spreads around. The air is remarkably dry and elastic, strongly recommended by medical men, and this place has been by some styled 'the Mountpelier of England.' On the north-west side of the town is a spacious heath, some thousand acres in extent, and famous for horse-racing and coursing matches, and is generally esteemed, by gentlemen of the turf, equal if not superior (at or Newmarket) to any race ground in England. The streets of the town are spacious, gas-lighted, and the houses are generally well built, the use of flint prevailing in their construction. The market cross, which was erected by the Earl of Orford in 1783, has a light and elegant appearance: it consists of a round dome, covered with lead, supported by eight pillars, surmounted by a figure of Ceres, the entire enclosed with iron railings. An assembly-room was erected in 1817, on the west side of the Market-hill, in which assemblies are held during the winter months: it has a respectable book club, and reading room are well supported by subscribers. There are no manufactures belonging to the town: malting and the trade in corn is of some consideration, and there are several flour mills, one of which is worked by steam power. General sessions are held here quarterly by adjournment from Norwich; the county magistrates assemble in petty sessions every alternate Saturday; and manorial courtsleet and haion are held annually, in April or May. Swaffham is a polling station at the election of members to represent west

Norfolk; and it is included in the thirty-second circuit of towns under the County Court Act, passed in 1816— for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20: this court is held monthly in the shire hall. The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, is a magnificent and venerable pile. It was commenced about the end of the reign of Edward IV. but not finished till that of Henry VII. or, according to Britton and Gough, it was built in the year 1474. Like cathedrals, it is cruciform, and consists of a nave and north and south aisles. It has a square embattled tower, surmounted by a handsome spire, which, from its elevation, is easily seen for many miles round: in the tower are eight musical bells. The roof of the church is of oak, neatly carved, and supported by angels with expanded wings. Throughout the building are numerous monuments, gravestones and inscriptions worthy the notice of the curious. The north aisle is said to have been built by John Chapman, a tradesman of the town, and who was churchwarden in 1462: according to the custom of those days of expressing names by rebusses (which custom descended to us from the Greeks and Romans), his name as a benefactor to the church, was exhibited in different parts of the building, by a figure with a pack on his back—thus representing a peccar or *chapman*; some of these figures are still to be seen. The living of Swaffham is a vicarage with the rectory of Thrixton annexed, in the patronage of the Bishop of Norwich. There are places of worship for Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists; the chapel of the former is a neat edifice, and the congregation most respectable. There are some public schools, they are respectisely conducted upon the national and British plans, for infants, and a grammar school; the latter founded by the late Nicholas Hammond, Esq., for the education of twenty boys. The market granted by King John, is held on Saturday, and celebrated for its

butter. Fairs, May 12th, July 21st, and November 3rd. The parish of Swaffham contained, in 1831, 3,285 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,358.

**SPORLE** is a parish in the same hundred as Swaffham—the village is 2½ miles N.E. by E. from that town; situated on the road to East Dereham, and the line of the East Anglian Railway. A priory of black monks, subject to the Abbey of Sammen in Anjou, was founded here in the reign of Henry II., and was granted by Henry VI., towards the endowment of Eton college. The parish church of Saint Mary is an ancient and somewhat spacious building of flint, with a western tower, embattled. In the chancel are many old grave-stones, from which their brasses have been stripped, and on the north side is a small chapel separated from aisle by screen-work. The living of Sporle is a vicarage in the gift of the Provost and Fellows of Eton College. The population of the parish, in 1831, was 746; in 1841, 773.

**CASTLE-ACRE** is a parish in the hundred of Free-bridge Lynn—the village, populous and rather extensive is 4 miles N. from Swaffham; pleasantly situated on a rising ground, at the foot of which runs the river Nar, formerly navigable to within two miles of this place, but now only from Narborough to Lynn. In this village are the ruins of a priory of Cistercian monks, founded by William De Warren: the west front is by

far the most conspicuous, interesting, and picturesque part; it is a very noble Norman facade—and, though not entire, there is enough to convey an idea of what it was when perfect; there are many other parts of the building, though much dilapidated, still standing, and by their extent a tolerably just conception may be formed of the wealth and magnificence of their former possessors: the structure was commenced about the year 1078, and dissolved in 1553. A little towards the east of the priory, on a rising ground, stood the castle, the seat of the Earls of Warren. The parish church of Saint James, is a large regular building, with a nave, north and south aisles, and chancel; at the west end is a lofty square tower, with five bells: the living is in the gift of the Earl of Leicester; the R.v. John Hague Bloom, B.A., is the present vicar—this gentleman has published a faithful and interesting history of the parish of Castle Acre. Fairs, for toys and pedlery, are held on Saint James day and August 5th. The parish contained, in 1831, 1,333, inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,495.

**NEWTON BY CASTLE ACRE** is a small parish, lying about 4 miles N. by E. from Swaffham. The church is an ancient building with a low square tower; it is dedicated to All Saints, and the living is a discharged vicarage in the gift of the Bishop of Ely. The population of the parish does not exceed one hundred.

**THETFORD,**

WITH THE VILLAGE OF CROXTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

THETFORD is a market town, and borough both corporate and parliamentary, possessing exclusive jurisdiction, locally in the hundred of Shropham, county of Norfolk, and extending into Lackford hundred, county of Suffolk; 78 miles N.E. from London, 29 s.w. from Norwich, and 12 n. from Bury St. Edmunds (Suffolk); situated on the Eastern Counties and Norfolk Railways, for which lines there is a convenient and neat station contiguous to the town. The river Thet (from which the town takes its name) and the Onse have their conflux close to the town: the latter river divides the counties of Norfolk and Suffolk, and is navigable to Lynn; it abounds with pike, eels, &c. and is crossed by a handsome iron bridge, erected in 1829. The town formerly occupied the Suffolk side of the river, which part at present has but few houses; on the Norfolk side are five principal streets, in which are many well-built houses, also a town hall, borough gaol, &c. Few towns in England have higher claims to antiquity than Thetford: it was in the possession of the Romans till the year 435, and in the time of the Saxons was the metropolis of the eastern portion of

the Heptarchy. At one period the place numbered twenty churches, eight monasteries, besides other religious foundations; and there likewise was a mint here. It was honoured with the presence of the first and second Henry, as also with that of Queen Elizabeth and James I., who made it one of their hunting seats; and the latter monarch had a palace here, which, though long since converted to different purposes, is still called the 'King's house.' In 1849, the Norfolk and Suffolk Archaeological Societies, held a meeting here, to inspect these relics, when some interesting ruins known as Saint Mary's Priory were cleared of their rubbish, and the flooring and foundation of this once noble pile, was found to be in a traceable condition, and nearly perfect. At the same time, many of the surrounding gentry, who felt an interest in this work sent in what coins and relics they had collected, and a lecture was given by one of the society. The numerous ruins and relics of monastic grandeur spread over this neighbourhood, together with the castle hill, and the formidable outworks, embankments and ditches surrounding, said to have been thrown up



against the town by the Danes, furnish subjects replete with interest to the antiquary. The principal manufacture carried on here is that of paper, the mills for which (Messrs. Munn and Co.'s) are very extensive, and employ a number of hands. The importation of coal, and exportation of corn, malt, seeds, flour, and wool form the chief commerce of the town. In 1573 Thetford was incorporated by Queen Elizabeth; her charter continued in force until the passing of the new Municipal Act in 1835, which vested the government in a mayor, four aldermen and twelve councillors, with a recorder and the usual assistant officers, styled 'the Mayor and Burgresses of the Borough of Thetford.' The borough was first represented in parliament in the reign of Edward I. and has continued to return two representatives ever since; those at present sitting are the Earl of Euston and the Hon. Francis Baring; the mayor is the returning officer. The town is a polling station at the election of members to represent West Norfolk; and it is included in the thirty-fourth circuit of towns under the County Court act, passed in 1816, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. The jurisdiction of this court, (which is held monthly) is co-extensive with the poor-law Union, which comprehends thirty-two of the surrounding parishes. The workhouse situated a short distance from the town, on the Suffolk side of the river, is a convenient building, and will accommodate four hundred recipients.

Thetford comprises the parishes of Saint Peter, Saint Cuthbert, and Saint Mary the Less, the benefices of all which are in the patronage of the Duke of Norfolk. Saint Peter's, commonly designated 'the black church,' from its being built of flint, is the principal, and consists of a chancel (in which is a beautiful window of stained glass), a nave and two aisles, with a tower: the living is a rectory, in the incumbency of the Rev. Thomas Sworde, who is also curate of Saint

Cuthbert's, which is a plain edifice, with a square tower. The church of Saint Mary the Less stands in the county of Suffolk, and possesses nothing deserving particular notice; the living is a perpetual curacy, of which the Rev. William Collett is the present incumbent. There are places of worship for Independents, Wesleyan Methodists, the Society of Friends, and Roman Catholics. The charities comprise a free grammar school, founded and well endowed by Sir Richard Fulmerstone; a national school on Dr. Bell's system; Smith's clothing charity; Sir Joseph Williamson's charity for apprenticing children, and many fixed charities to the poor, in clothes, bread, coal, &c. In the vicinity is a spa, similar in its properties to the water of Tonbridge Wells; a handsome pump-room and public baths (the approach to which is by pleasant gravel walks, planted with trees, by the river side), were erected by R. Munn, Esq.: these agreeable and valuable acquisitions have, however, failed to receive encouragement, and the pump-room and baths have in consequence been closed for some years. The celebrated Tom Paine was born in a house which is still standing, in White Hart-street, in this town. There are excellent estates surrounding Thetford, in the highest state of cultivation, and game is abundant. The air of this district is dry, and eminently salubrious. The market is held on Saturday, and is a large one, for corn especially. Fairs, May 14th, August 2nd, 3rd, and 16th, and a wool fair July 30th. The borough and parishes contained, in 1831, 3,462 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,934.

CROXTON is a parish in the hundred of Grimshoe—the village, a small one, is 2 miles N. from Thetford. The church is dedicated to All Saints: the living is a discharged vicarage, in the gift of the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge; the Rev. Henry S. M. Hubert is the present incumbent. Population of the parish in 1841, 330.

THORNHAM AND BRANCASTER.

**THORNHAM** is a parish, in the hundred of Smithdon—the village, a considerable one, is about 6 miles w. by s. from Burnham Market; situated near the salt marshes of the coast, of which about sixty acres, contiguous to the village, were enclosed some years since. The parish, which extends to the sea shore, belongs partly to William Hodge, Esq. of Lynn. At the head of a small creek, which is navigable to the sea for light craft, is a staith or wharf, with warehouses, and vessels hence are employed in the exportation of corn and importation of coal and sundries. The parish church of All Saints, is a spacious, ancient structure, with a tower: the living is a discharged vicarage, with that of Holme annexed, in the patronage of the Bishop of Norwich. The Rev. Nicholas J. Raven, is the present vicar. The Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists have each a place of worship in the parish— which contained in 1841, 790 inhabitants.

BRANCASTER village, in the same hundred as Thornham, is 3 miles e. therefrom; situated near the bay of its name, and on a creek of the German ocean. The site of the Roman station *Brannodunum* was at this

village, to the westward of which stood the castle. A considerable portion of the materials of this fortress, it is said, was removed on the erection of a very extensive malt-house, supposed to be the largest in the kingdom, and capable of wetting upwards of four hundred quarters of barley weekly. The village, as well as that of Thornham, enjoys a tolerable trade in corn and coal, but the majority of the inhabitants of both parishes are engaged in agricultural pursuits, and the handicraft trades connected with them. There is an almshouse for four poor prisoners, and also a free school for the education of the poor children belonging to Brancaster, Thornham, Titchwell and Burnham Deepdale, both founded by Robert Smith, in the year 1593. The parish church of Saint Mary has a square embattled tower, containing four bells: in 1823 the church was repaired and new pewed, and it is now a neat edifice: the living is a rectory, in the patronage of the Duke of Beaufort; the Rev. Otho Sadler is the present rector. The Primitive Methodists have a place of worship. The population of the parish in 1841 was 913.

**WALSINGHAM, GREAT AND LITTLE, WIGHTON,  
WARHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

**LITTLE WALSINGHAM** is a parish, in the hundred of North Greenhoe—the village, once a market town, is 113 miles N. N. E. from London, 28 N. W. from Norwich, and 5 N. from Fakenham—the last named a railway station on a branch line connected with the East Anglian Railway. This place, sometimes called New Walsingham, is the principal of the two Walsinghams, and was of great celebrity for many centuries as the site of the shrine of the Virgin, or our Lady of Walsingham, founded in 1061 by the widow of Ricoldi Faverches, whose son added a monastery for Augustine Canons, with a conventual church. This institution became immensely rich, and at the dissolution its revenue was valued at nearly £500—a large sum in those days. The venerable remains, of this once noble and extensive pile, are situated in the pleasure grounds of D. H. Lee Warner, Esq.: there are also many other interesting remains in the neighbourhood. Walsingham confers the title of baron on the family of De Grey. Quarter sessions are held here, by adjournment from Norwich; and petty sessions at the Black Lion Inn, once a month; and a court under the County Court act, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20—this court, which includes eighty of the surrounding parishes, is held monthly, in the shire-hall, as are likewise the session courts.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a handsome and spacious structure; it contains some interesting monuments, an ancient and beautiful font; and the church is embellished by some beautiful architectural ornaments. There are places of worship for Independents and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists. The living of Walsingham is an advowson donative, in the gift of the lord of the manor, the Rev. Daniel Henry Lee Warner. The free grammar school here was founded by Richard Bond, who endowed it with an estate in Great Snoring, but is rendered ineffective by the injudicious directions of the founder, and the pertinacity of the feoffees in abiding by them; these directions are—to teach *Greek and Latin* to thirty children of poor

*inhabitants* of Little Walsingham; no child has been sent to this school for upwards of *thirty years*!—partly because of the expense of purchasing the necessary instructive books in those branches of learning, and partly from such education not being suitable to the objects intended to be benefited. 'It is to be regretted (observes an intelligent inhabitant) that this sinecure is not abolished, by converting the school into one for teaching writing, arithmetic and English.' The market formerly held here was removed to Fakenham, many years ago. An annual fair is held on the fourteenth day after Whit-Monday, for farming stock and peellery. The parish of Little (or New) Walsingham contained in 1831, 1,004 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,155.

The village of **GREAT WALSINGHAM** is one mile north from Little Walsingham: it was formerly called Old Walsingham, and at one time was of considerable importance, having contained three churches: only one remains—that of Saint Peter, an ancient edifice, in the English style of architecture with a tower: the living is united to Little Walsingham, and is in the same patronage. The population of the parish does not exceed 500.

**WIGHTON** is a parish, in the same hundred as the Walsinghams—the village being situated about 2 miles N. by E. from New Walsingham, on the road to Wells. There are the remains of a Danish encampment near the village; and many ancient coins have been dug up, at various times, in the neighbourhood. The parish church of All Saints is a large structure, with an embattled tower: the living is a discharged vicarage, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Norwich.

**WARHAM** is a village, comprising the parishes of All Saints and Saint Mary, 4 miles N. from Little Walsingham, and 2½ S. E. by E. from Wells. All Saints church is a small structure, surmounted by a turret: Saint Mary's is a large and handsome building, with a tower: the livings are united for all parochial purposes, but separate for ecclesiastical matters. Population of All Saints parish in 1841, 337; Saint Mary's, 75.

**WATTON,**

WITH THE PARISHES AND VILLAGES OF SAHAM-TONEY, OVINGTGN, GRISTON, MERTON,  
CARBROOKE, CASTON, THOMPSON, CRESSINGHAM (GREAT AND LITTLE),  
AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**W**ATTON is a parish in the hundred of Wayland—the market town, a small one and well-built, is 91 miles S.N.E. from London, 21 w. by s. from Norwich, 12 N. from Thetford, and 10 S. from East Dereham—the two last-named places are railway stations respectively on the Eastern Counties and the East Anglian lines. The town, which is situated in an open part of the country, is one of some considerable thoroughfare, and before the opening of railway lines was of more importance in this respect, and the inhabitants derived, and still derives advantage from this circumstance. There are three principal inns, the 'Bull,' the 'Crown,' and the 'George'; these are excellent establishments, and their internal arrangements are equally conducive to the comfort of families and commercial gentlemen—they are also posting-houses. The town sustained great damage in 1673, from an extensive fire, that destroyed property to a very large amount. Wayland Wood, near the town, which gives name to the hundred, is the place where the sheriffs' court was anciently held; and is supposed to be the scene of the tragical tale, or legend of the 'Babes in the Wood.'

The parish church of Saint Mary is a small structure, said to have been originally built in the reign of Henry I.; the tower, which contains three large bells, is of a singular construction, being circular at the bottom, but octangular above: the living is a vicarage. There is an excellent national school here. The market, a good one for corn, is held on Wednesday. The ancient fairs are held July 10th, October 11th, and November 8th; so more recently established are on the first Wednesday in July, and the first Wednesday

after September the 4th—these two latter fairs are chiefly for farming stock. The parish contained, in 1831, 1,027 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,188.

SAHAM-TONEY is an irregular but remarkably pleasant village, nearly  $\frac{1}{2}$  miles N.W. from Watton; situated on the road to Swaffham, in the midst of charming scenery, interspersed with hill and dale, woods and plantations. The parish church of Saint George is a building of flint faced with stone, with a well-proportioned tower, containing a clock and bells: the interior has been renovated and thoroughly repaired, the ceiling renewed, and a beautiful stained glass window inserted in the chancel representing the 'Last Supper.' The entire expense of these valuable alterations has been defrayed by the munificence of the present rector, the Rev. William Parker—who is also patron of the living.

The population of Saham-Toney and the following parishes, are given after the notice of CRESSINGHAM. The small village of OVINGTON is situated nearly 2 miles N.N.E. from Watton, on the road to Dereham. The parish church of Saint John the Evangelist is built of flint, with a square tower and a Norman doorway: the living is a discharged rectory in the patronage of the Chancellor and Masters of Cambridge University.

GRISTON, a small village, is 2 miles S.E. from Watton, situated on the road to Attleborough. The church, a plain structure, with a square tower, was anciently dedicated to Saint Margaret, but in 1477 it was rebuilt and dedicated anew to Saint Peter and Saint Paul. On the tower are seen the emblems of the cross keys and swords, and the northern end of the church is lighted

by a stained glass window: the living is a discharged vicarage, in the gift of the Bishop of Ely.

MERTON is rather more than 2 miles s.w. from Watton, on the road to Thetford. Merton Hall is a beautiful mansion, of great antiquity. The parish church of Saint Peter, a low building with a round tower, stands in the park, a short distance from the hall: in the chancel are several monuments and brasses to the family of De Grey, one of whom, the Hon. and Rev. Thomas de Grey, is patron of the living.

CARBROOKE is a rural village, nearly 3 miles e.n.e. from Watton. A preceptory of Knights Templars was founded here by the Earl of Clare, in 1173, and adjoining it was a chapel; they both stood in the present churchyard, but there are not any remains traceable of either of them. The church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul is a good building of flint, with a square tower: the interior is lofty and well lighted, and the chancel, which is enclosed by a carved screen, contains several stalls and ancient monuments: the living is a discharged vicarage in the gift of Richard Dewing, Esq.

CASTON is a small village, 3 miles s.e. from Watton, situated on the road to Attleborough; it contains the parish church of the Holy Cross, and a Wesleyan chapel. The living of Caston is a rectory, with those

**WELLS,**

WITH THE VILLAGE OF HOLKHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**WELLS** is a parish and sea-port town in the hundred of North Greenhoe, 118 miles N. E. from London, 32 N. W. by N. from Norwich, and 10 S. from Fakenham—the last named is at present the nearest railway station, but an act of parliament was obtained in 1845, for continuing the line to Wells. The town is situated on a creek of the German Ocean, and consists principally of two streets leading to the quay, and some smaller ones; lately they have been partially lighted with gas, and some of them macadamized. The harbour has been much injured by the accumulation of sand, and its shifting rendered it somewhat difficult of access; and when a north or north-east wind blows violently the safety of vessels at its mouth is greatly endangered. Within the last few years, however, the harbour commissioners have effected considerable improvements, and a new stone quay has been erected two hundred and thirty yards in length, and a new road opened communicating with it. The trade of the port is of some importance in the exportation of grain and malt, and importation of coal, tiles and deals: many of the inhabitants are employed in the fishery, and the oysters taken from the beds here are of an excellent quality. The parish of Wells comprises four manors, three of which belong to the Earl of Leicester, the other to Sir Robert John Harvey, Bart., as lessee of the Bishop of Norwich. The steward of the Earl holds courts leet and baron annually, and the magistrates of the hundred assemble here in petty session once a fortnight.

The church dedicated to Saint Withlurge, is situated on elevated land, to the north of the town, and its tower, which is massive, quadrangular and embattled, serves as a land mark: the Earl of Leicester is patron of the living; the Rev. Alexander Napier is the present incumbent. There are several almshouses, schools, and other charities, by which the poor of the parish are benefitted, supported by the munificence of the nobleman before mentioned—his princely seat, Holkham Hall is here: in the park a monument has been erected by subscription in honour of the late (and first) Earl of Leicester, one hundred and forty feet in height. The population of the parish in 1831, was 792, and in 1841, 731.

The parish church of Saint Nicholas is rather a handsome structure of flint, with a lofty embattled tower: the living is a rectory in the gift of the Rev. Robert John Hopper; the Rev. Valentine Hill is the present incumbent. There are places of worship for Independents, the Society of Friends, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists. A school here, for children of either sex, and for infants' is entirely supported by the Earl of Leicester. A fair is held on Shrove Tuesday, but for the purposes of trade, or advantage to the inhabitants, it is of but little consideration. **WYMONDHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

WYMONDHAM is a parish, in the hundred of  
Forehoe—the market town is 100 miles N. E. by N.  
from London, 12 s.s.e. from East Dereham, 26 s. s.e.  
from Fakenham, 20 N.E. from Thetford, and 9 W.S.W.  
from Norwich; situated on the high road between the  
two last named towns, on the Norfolk line of railway,  
and the East Dereham and Fakenham branch joins the  
main line at this town. It is provincially pronounced  
Windham, and is said to derive its name from the  
Saxon words *W'in Munde Ham*, signifying a pleasant  
village seated on a mount, or elevated site. In the  
year 1615 a dreadful fire (said to have been caused by  
incendiaries), destroyed three hundred houses; and in  
1631 it was visited by the plague, which carried off a  
great number of the inhabitants. The corn and malt  
trade is of some consequence here; there is a very  
considerable brewery belonging to Messrs. Cann and  
Clarke, and several flour mills are within the vicinity  
of the town. The Rev. Henry Charles Hobart is lord  
of the manors of Gresham and Cromwells, and holds  
a court annually, when constables are appointed; the  
County Court under the late acts is held monthly, for  
the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding  
£20; and the magistrates sit here on the third Tues-  
day in every month. The two Ketts, who disturbed  
this county in the reign of Edward VI, were natives of  
Wymondham; they were accustomed to assemble their  
followers under an oak standing in the vicinity of the  
town. After their defeat by the Earl of Warwick, the  
elder was hanged in chains on the castle of Norwich,  
and the younger upon the steeple of the church here.  
A short distance from the town is Stanfield hall, the  
scene of a dreadful murder, perpetrated 28th Nov. 1848,

by James B. Rush, when Mr. Jermy, recorder of Nor-  
wich, and his son, were shot dead by Rush, and Mrs.  
Jermy and Eliza Chestney, her maid (who acted with great  
intrepidity) were fearfully wounded. The lives of Mrs.  
Jermy and Eliza Chestney were for a considerable time  
in imminent danger, but they both finally recovered,  
and the latter is now residing in this town carrying on  
the business of a milliner and dress maker. Rush,  
after a trial of six days, during which he conducted his  
own defence, was convicted, and he was executed at  
Norwich on the 21st. of April.

The parish church, dedicated to the Virgin Mary,  
constituted a part of the Benedictine priory: it con-  
sists of a nave with aisles, a large tower at the western  
end, and another springing from the intersection of  
the nave with the transepts. It contains a large font,  
richly ornamented, and elevated by steps, and a fine  
toned organ—the latter presented to the parishioners in  
1793, by Mrs. Ann Farmer, cost £800: the living is  
a vicarage, in the gift of the Bishop of Ely; the Rev.  
Theyer Townsend Smith, is the present incumbent.  
There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents,  
the Society of Friends, and Wesleyan Methodists. The  
charities are a free grammar school, founded by Queen  
Elizabeth in 1559, and two public schools supported  
by subscription. The market, a large one for corn,  
is held on Wednesday. Fairs, February 14th, May 17th,  
and September 17th, for lean stock, horses and ped-  
lery. The parish of Wymondham is comprised in the  
divisions of Downham, Market Street, Sutton, Town  
Green and Wattle field; which collectively contained,  
by the returns rendered in 1831, 5,485 inhabitants, and  
by those in 1841, 5,170.

**YARMOUTH,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF CAISTOR, GORLESTON, SOUTH TOWN AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

YARMOUTH, or GREAT YARMOUTH, is an important sea-port a market town, and a borough both corporate and parliamentary, having separate jurisdiction, locally in the division of East Flegg; 124 miles N.E. from London (133½ by rail, through Colchester and Ipswich, and 146 through Ely), 18 E. by s. from Norwich (20 by rail), 54 N.N.E. from Ipswich (65½ by Norwich and rail), and 59 N.E. from Bury Saint Edmunds; situated at the eastern extremity of the county, on the east bank, and near the mouth of the Yare, from which the town takes its name. The rivers Yare, and Waveney and Bure, fall into the Breydon, a large piece of water, to the west of the town, and the mingled streams thence proceed to the sea, under the name of the Yare. This river, which is a boundary stream to the counties of Norfolk and Suffolk, is navigable to Norwich, the Waveney to Bungay, and the Bure to Aylsham. A handsome suspension bridge was thrown across the Bure, in 1827, constructed by the late Thomas Cory, Esq., from which a new turnpike road was laid, reducing the distance between Yarmouth and Norwich four miles. A portion of this bridge fell in on the 2nd of May, 1845, at a time when it was crowded with persons to witness some aquatic exhibition, and three hundred men women and children were precipitated into the waters below—of these seventy-nine were drowned. After this fearful accident a temporary wooden bridge was built, and this was replaced towards the end of the year 1849, by one of iron. Another bridge of the same material crosses the river about one hundred yards lower down, and connects the railway with the quays, affording every facility for conveying goods to and from the shipping, the trucks, being by this means, taken alongside the vessels, and their cargoes distributed to all parts of the interior by the Norfolk and other connecting lines of railway.

The town, which occupies an area of upwards of one hundred and thirty acres, extends along the river from north to south, for more than a mile, and is nearly half a mile in breadth. On the east, north and south, it was formerly encompassed by a wall, 2,240 yards in length, having sixteen towers and ten gates; some of the former remain, but little altered from their original appearance; and considerable portions of the walls are still standing. Some old houses exhibit good specimens of the decorative carving prevalent in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, especially the

'Star Hotel,' formerly the property of the Bradshaw family, and the house of Charles J. Palmer, Esq., once the residence of the granddaughter of Oliver Cromwell—both on the quay. The western part of the town is bounded by the Yare, which separates it from South Town, and is crossed by a temporary draw-bridge, which is about to give place to a very handsome one of iron, designed by Mr. Walker. The principal streets pass in the direction of north and south, with the exception of Regent-street, before the erection of which, in 1810, there were no cross streets for carriages, others than Fuller's-lane, at the north, and Friar's-lane, at the south end of the town. There are upwards of one hundred and fifty lanes or alleys, here, called 'rows,' which cross the streets at right angles, and are no otherwise designated than by numbers attached to them. The market-place is extensive, having a well-paved area of about three acres; and on the west side of it is a range of handsome, well furnished shops. The air of this locality is pure and bracing: either beach is well adapted for sea-bathing, for which purpose Yarmouth is much frequented. The hotels and inns are well adapted to various grades of visitors, as are the numerous lodging-houses—while the libraries and reading-rooms are well furnished with the necessary literature, and are cheerfully and pleasantly situated. The public library, on the Quay, contains several thousand volumes; and Sloman's library and reading-rooms, in King-street, is an establishment in great repute: there is also a commercial club-house on the Quay.

Yarmouth is advantageously situated for commerce, particularly that connected with the north. Its principal foreign connection is with the Baltic and the Mediterranean, and its trade in coal, corn and other merchandise coastwise, is very extensive; it also possesses a facility of communication with the interior by means of the navigable rivers Yare, Bure, Waveney and Wensum, and the railways before mentioned. The haven and pier commissioners are conservators of the rivers to Norwich, Bungay, Beccles and Aylsham. The number of registered vessels belonging to the port is about five hundred and fifty, exclusive of fishing smacks and other small craft, of which there are about two hundred. The crews rank among the most expert seamen on the British coasts. Ship building is carried on to a great extent, and the artificers in the yards have long been esteemed as eminently skilful. There are

several private bonding warehouses, and one on the South Denes belonging to the custom-house. On the North Denes are large silk-mills: several maltings are in the town, and many flour-mills in its immediate vicinity. The trade for which Yarmouth has been so long noted is its extensive fisheries, which are a continual source of wealth and employment to its inhabitants. The mackerel fishery commences early in May, and terminates in the second week in July; that for herrings begins about Michaelmas, and finishes at the close of November: during the continuance of the latter more than sixteen hundred fishermen are engaged, and from six to seven hundred men and women employed in the curing houses, exclusive of many others in making nets, baskets, rope and twine, and cooping. The quay, at which the shipping load and unload, is considered the longest and finest in England, being, in the widest part, about one hundred yards in breadth, and containing in its centre a delightful promenade, planted with a double row of trees, and protected from the eastern blast by a handsome row of well-built houses—presenting, on the whole, a scene of commercial animation and ornamental beauty, that cannot be excelled. The town hall stands about the centre of the Quay, and has a well proportioned portico, supported by pillars of the Tuscan order; spacious elegant ball-rooms extend along the entire front, and over the chimney-piece is a full-length portrait of George II. The north front contains a police-office, where the mayor and magistrates sit daily. The custom house, is a large building, on the South Quay; but a short distance from it is the town-house, where the port dues are collected: behind the latter is the public library, containing about four thousand volumes. The theatre, erected in 1778, is attended by the Norwich company, and is open during part of the summer months. The bath-house, situated on the beach, was built in 1759, and in 1788, a large, pleasant public room was added, where balls are occasionally held: hot and cold sea-water, and other baths, are here kept in constant readiness. A jetty, twenty-four feet wide, and projecting five hundred and twenty feet into the sea, on piles of wood, forms a favourite promenade. To the south of the jetty a paved walk, in front of a range of buildings, principally hotels and lodging houses, leads to the Victoria Esplanade, which was formed in 1841, by a company of gentlemen desirous of promoting the prosperity of the town, by the erection of a class of houses fit for the reception of families of rank. A range of houses, called Brandon Terrace, fronting the south, and another row, named Kimberley Terrace, fronting the east, command magnificent views of the German Ocean, which is here constantly animated by vessels passing close in-shore. At the south extremity of the esplanade is the Victoria Hotel, also erected by the company, and fitted up in a very superior manner. During the summer months a band-plays on this walk, which is then much frequented. Beyond the esplanade is Telegraph House, for some time the residence of the late Earl of Abergavenny, now the residence and property of Lady King. Still further to the south, is the royal military lunatic asylum, beyond which is the South Denes and race-course, extending to the haven's mouth. The races, established in 1810, are held annually in August, and the course is now an excellent one. To the north of the jetty there are hotels and lodging-houses extending to a terrace lately formed, called Britannia Terrace, which commands expansive and delightful sea views. Near the centre of the South Denes is a majestic naval pillar, erected in 1817, to the memory of Lord Nelson; its altitude, from the surface of the ground, is one hundred and forty feet, the diameter of the column or shaft is twelve feet six inches, the pedestal twenty-three feet square and twenty-seven feet high. Amongst the peculiarities of Yarmouth is the general use of a low narrow cart, well adapted to the confined narrow lanes or rows through which it has to pass; it is drawn by a single horse, and chiefly employed in conveying goods to and from the shipping: in no other place in England are these singularly constructed carriages to be seen.

Prior to the reign of John, Yarmouth was governed by a Provost appointed by the Crown; that monarch granted to the inhabitants a charter; but the one by which the town was governed immediately previous to

the passing of the Municipal Act was conferred by Queen Anne. Under the new enactment the corporation consists of a mayor, twelve aldermen and thirty-six councillors, with a recorder and the usual assistant officers, under the style of 'the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgesses and Commonalty of the Borough of Great Yarmouth, in the county of Norfolk'; the same act divided the borough into six wards, and provided for it a separate commission of the peace. The borough formerly enjoyed more privileges than any other in the kingdom. It had a separate admiralty jurisdiction, and the power of life and death, in all criminal cases. It has still a court of record, called the borough court, for the trial of all causes, to any amount; but the business of this court has greatly diminished since the operation of the County Court Act, passed in 1846, for adjudicating debts and claims to any amount not exceeding £20. The usual borough courts are held, and sessions, quarterly. The town-council appoint the coroner, and the county magistrates have no jurisdiction within the borough. The inhabitants are exempt from serving on any jury out of the town, and the ship-owners from paying harbour dues at Dover, Rye, Ramsgate, Scarborough, and other ports along the coast. Yarmouth has sent representatives to parliament from the 28th of Edward I; the mayor is the returning officer: the present sitting members are Charles Edmund Rumble, Esq. and Joseph Sandars, Esq. Yarmouth confers the title of Earl upon the Marquess of Hertford.

The parish church of Saint Nicholas, was founded in the early part of the twelfth century by Herbert de Losinga, bishop of Norwich; it is a stately cruciform structure, presenting many interesting peculiarities, and is one of the largest parish churches in the kingdom. Upwards of £5,000 has been recently raised by subscription, and expended in the restoration of this noble edifice, which now affords sittings for three thousand persons. The present spire, which has superseded the ancient one, is one hundred and sixty eight feet in height; the organ is one of the finest and most powerful in the kingdom: the living is a perpetual curacy, in the presentation of the Dean and Chapter of Norwich. Saint George's chapel of ease, erected in 1714, is an edifice of brick and stone, surmounted by an octagonal turret and dome: the living was in the patronage of the corporation, of whom it has been purchased by the present incumbent. Saint Peter's church is a structure of white brick and stone, erected in 1833, at a cost of £12,000, principally defrayed by the church commissioners: the Dean and Chapter of Norwich are the patrons. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents, Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists, Unitarians, the Society of Friends, and Roman Catholics—the last-named have recently erected on the Regent-road, a very handsome church and priest's house, of squared flint with stone dressings in the perpendicular style. There are several valuable charities belonging to Yarmouth, including almshouses, periodical gifts, &c. A hospital for the sick was built in 1842, and is supported by subscriptions and donations. An endowed school (formerly Saint Mary's hospital) is vested in the charity trustees. There are several public schools, upon the British, national and congregational plans, also one of industry, and others for infants. A new workhouse, for recipients under the Poor Law Union has been erected near the north entrance of the town: the corn exchange is on the Quay. The markets are held on Wednesday and Saturday. Fairs, on the Friday and Saturday in Easter week, and Shrove Monday and Tuesday. By the returns for 1831, the borough and parish contained 21,115 inhabitants, and in 1841, 21,086.

CAISTOR SAINT EDMUNDS, is a parish in the same hundred as Yarmouth—the village of Caistor, pleasant but irregularly built, is about 3 miles N. from that town. Formerly it was a town of good dimensions and some consequence, and had two churches—one dedicated to Saint Edmund, the other to the Holy Trinity; some ruins, which now are all that remain of the latter, form a picturesque object in the general scenery, as also do the remains of a castle, built about 1420, by Sir John Fastolf, knight. Saint Edmund's church is a plain fabric, with a square tower: the living is a rectory, in the gift of some private families.

About two miles from Yarmouth is the village of GORLESTON (*Suffolk*), in the hundred of Mutford and Lotingland—seated upon the crown of a hill overlooking the river Yare, which flows in a rapid stream near its foot. Almost every part in this parish commands fine marine views, and it is much frequented in the season for sea-bathing. There is a very fine pier at the haven's mouth, upwards of eighteen hundred feet in length, to protect the entrance of the river. Gorleston is within the parliamentary borough of Great Yarmouth. The parish church of Saint Andrew, is a spacious pile, with a *thatched* roof, having a substantial square embattled tower, strongly buttressed at the angles, and containing a peal of six bells: the living is a vicarage, endowed by prescription. There are places of worship for Independents and Wesleyan Methodists. The parish contained in 1841, 2,355 inhabitants.

SOUTH TOWN, or *Little Yarmouth*, is a hamlet in

the parish of Gorleston, but is incorporated with Great Yarmouth. The turnpike road leading through it from Yarmouth-bridge to Gorleston, is one of the best in England; on both sides it is embellished with lines of very handsome private residences, for more than half a mile. The river bank is occupied by docks, bonding warehouses, timber wharfs and ship-building yards, which give employment to a large number of shipwrights and artisans. The Yarmouth proprietary grammar school, situated near the bridge, was erected in 1833, by a company of shareholders; it is conducted by a head and second masters, who have assistants, with a French teacher. Near this school is a chapel of ease, dedicated to Saint Mary, erected in 1831, for the convenience of the inhabitants of South Town. Further to the south is the royal armory, built in 1806. The hamlet, which was returned as a distinct parish in 1831, contained at that period 1,304 inhabitants; the population is now (1850) about 1,500.

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# OXFORDSHIRE.

**T**HIS is an inland county, bounded on the north and north-west, by Warwickshire, on the north and north-east by Northamptonshire, on the east by Buckinghamshire, on the south and south-west by Berkshire, and on the west by Gloucestershire. On the north-east, the river Charwell separates the county from that of Northampton, and the Isis is its boundary to Berkshire on the south. This county is of a very irregular figure: near to Oxford it is not more than seven miles across; yet in the more northern part, at no great distance from that city, its diameter is thirty-eight miles: proceeding northward, it assumes the resemblance of a cone, and terminates at what is designated the 'Three-Shire Stone,' in a complete point or apex. Its more elongated part is comprised in the space above Oxford, on the north-west, to Caversham, on the south—the whole of which portion is inserted between the counties of Bucks and Berks. Its greatest length is forty-eight miles, and its circumference about one hundred and thirty—containing seven hundred and fifty-six square miles, or 483,840 statute acres. Both in size and population, Oxfordshire ranks as the thirty-first English county.

**NAME AND EARLY HISTORY**—This county receives its name from the city of Oxford, generally supposed to have been derived from the Saxon word *Oxenford*, a 'ford or passage for oxen' over the river here; some writers, however, advance the conjecture that the original name of the city was *Ouseford*, a 'ford over the Ouse.' Oxfordshire was anciently inhabited by the *Dobunii*; but on the conquest of Britain by the Romans, it became a part of the province styled *Britannia Prima*. A Roman military way leads into this county, pointing towards Uxchester; and the present village of Dorchester stands on the site of the station *Duro-cornovium*. The *Itinerary-street* crossed the southern part of the county from north-east to south-west. Of the vicinal ways, the *Akemam-street* was the principal; it entered from Buckinghamshire, at Ambrosden, and proceeded through Blenheim Park into Gloucestershire. At the period of the general dissolution, the number of religious houses in the county, exclusive of the colleges at Oxford, was about forty, including hospitals, &c. The principal relic of monastic buildings is Saint Frideswide abbey church, now the cathedral of Oxford. Amongst the parochial churches are some interesting specimens of Saxon or early Norman, and many fine examples of English architecture. During the Heptarchy this district belonged to Mercia, and suffered greatly from the Danes; the most memorable battles recorded in the annals of this county are those that were fought between that people and the English, in 914, at Hooknorton (or Hogsorton), in which the latter were totally defeated—and between the Yorkists and Lancastrians, in 1469, at Danesbury, near Banbury, when the former, under the Earl of Pembroke, were completely routed by Sir John Conyers, and the Earl was made prisoner. One of the earliest transactions connected with the great Civil War occurred at Chalgrove Field, in this county, when that celebrated patriot, John Hampden, on the 15th of August, 1642, appeared in arms to enforce the militia ordinance, and whose firm resistance to the arbitrary measures of the court was the principal cause of the war: and it was on the same spot, on the morning of the 18th of June, 1643, that, at the head of a body of parliamentarians, he attacked Prince Rupert, when the former were repulsed, and the illustrious Hampden was mortally wounded. Charles established his court at Oxford for nearly the entire duration of the civil strife, whence the city became, as it were, a kind of centre of various military exploits that occurred in this and the surrounding counties. On the 26th of April, Woodstock manor-house, after a vigorous defence, surrendered to the parliamentarian force; and the next day the king left Oxford to surrender himself to the Scottish army besieging Newark. On the 24th June, Oxford, which had held out against Fairfax for several weeks, surrendered at the king's command. At the time of the rebellion in 1715, several partisans of the Stuart family were seized at Oxford.

**SOIL, SURFACE, AND CLIMATE**.—The soil of Oxfordshire may be considered, for the most part, extremely fertile, yielding abundant crops of corn and grain: it is naturally dry, and entirely exempt from fens, bogs and stagnant waters. The north corner is chiefly strong deep land, partly arable and partly pasture; the south-west contains the forest of Whichwood, a great part of which is woodland. About Oxford the soil is various—some parts of it being light and sandy, and others deep and rich; and on the banks of the Thames it is chiefly in pasture. In the extensive bed of gravel on which Oxford stands, and which forms one of the geological features of England, are found many extraordinary fossils, peat-earth, occasionally, is met with: quarries of free-stone are numerous; limestone is plentiful; and slate, fit for roofing common buildings, is obtained in several parts. At Shroton, an ochre is found of a most excellent quality. The general aspect of the county may be considered as very pleasing. There are not any high hills except the Chiltern range; the rest are only gentle eminences, which tend to diversify the landscape without obstructing tillage. Oxfordshire may be reckoned a well-wooded county, excepting in the northernmost part; there is, however, but comparatively little oak, and coppices are not numerous; but there are extensive artificial plantations, ornamental to many localities. In number, taste and magnificence, the public and private buildings of Oxfordshire, may be said to rival any other county in England, Middlesex alone excepted. Blenheim, the princely seat of the Duke of Marlborough, is well known for its superb mansion and delightful grounds. There are many other residences of the nobility and gentry, of great beauty and grandeur, both of exterior appearance and interior decoration: among the principal are Ditchley park, the seat of Viscount Dillon; Nuneham Courtney, the Earl of Harcourt; Wroxton Priory, the Earl of Guildford, &c. The climate of this county is considered as healthful as that of any other in England, and the quick and limpid streams render the air clear and wholesome. It is colder upon and near the Chiltern hills than in other parts, but not so severe as to effect health; there is also greater humidity at the southern extremity of the county; and the frosts are perceived to take effect sooner in this part, and continue longer.

**PRODUCE AND MANUFACTURES**.—The system of agriculture is in general good; that of Norfolk is well understood and is in prevalent practice. On the grass farms much cheese is made, of a good quality, though chiefly of the thin kind called 'toastin' cheese. The cows are principally of the old Gloucester kind, and the South Down sheep, have begun to exclude the long-woolled breed; many boars are fed for the purpose of making brawn and sausages, which form a considerable article of trade at Oxford and other parts of the county. Much butter is sent to the London dealers, particularly from the vicinity of Bicester; and around Thame, many calves are fattened for the same market. The corn crops commonly cultivated, are wheat, barley and oats; and peas and beans are frequently sown together, and produce good crops. Some of the best grass land in the country may be found in Oxfordshire, and in the rich district near Thame, the meadows are mown twice a year. The manufactures are those of blankets, at Witney; paper, at Bulford and other places; plush, or shag, at Banbury, and likewise an article of pastry, for which it has long been famous, called 'Banbury cakes.' The melting trade is carried on extensively, in several towns; and at Woodstock are manufactured gloves, and some articles of polished steel; the former branch still exists, but the latter is almost lost, owing to the cheapness of the Birmingham and Sheffield wares. In the southern part of the county, lace is made by some of the industrious females; but this article is of little consequence in the scale of manufactures, and it is annually diminishing.

**RIVERS AND MINERAL SPRINGS, CANALS AND RAILWAYS**.—The rivers of Oxfordshire form the most pleasing feature of it: each valley of length has its stream, and no district in England is better watered. The Thames, the Isis, the Cherwell, the Evenlode and the Windrush claim the first rank; but the great pride of the county is that confluence of the former two which constitutes the magnificent Thames. The Cher-

well rises in Northamptonshire, enters Oxfordshire near Claydon, and falls into the Thames or Isis a little below Oxford. The Evenlole has its source in the north-east part of Worcester-shire, enters Oxfordshire near the 'Shires' Stone, and is lost in the Thames about four miles below Oxford. The Windrush originates in the Cotswold Hills, in Gloucestershire; enters Oxfordshire near Burford, and, passing Witney, falls into the Thames five miles west of Oxford. The Thame rises near Tring, in the county of Hertford, and, crossing Buckinghamshire, touches the borders of Oxfordshire at Thame. There are numerous small streams, all of which fall into the rivers before-mentioned. The MEDICAL SPRINGS are numerous, though but little (if at all) resorted to for their virtues; the greater number are the various kinds of chalybeate. CANALS.—The Oxford canal, before railways intersected the county, was of immense importance to its trade, by opening a communication, through other canals, with Birmingham, Manchester, Liverpool, and the Wednesbury collieries: this canal commences at Longford, in the northern extremity of Warwickshire, and passes, near Woodstock, on to the city of Oxford, where it communicates with the Thames navigation, and, consequently, with the metropolis. RAILWAYS.—The Great Western Railway touches the southern limb of this county, and runs parallel with the Thames from the parish of Whitechurch to that of Stoke—a distance of about five miles: from the Didcot station on this line, there is a Branch to Oxford, passing by Abingdon. From Oxford the Junction railway runs north—near the towns of Woodstock, Deddington and Banbury. The Cheltenham and Oxford railway will connect these towns; and a line from Oxford will run into the Worcester and Wolverhampton railway. The Buckinghamshire railway proceeds from Oxford, and mites with the London and North-Western at Fenny Stratford (whence a branch runs to Bedford); and the Oxford Junction joins the same important line at Rugby.

ECCLESIASTICAL AND CIVIL DIVISIONS, and REPRESENTATION.—Oxfordshire is in the province of Canterbury and diocese of Oxford; it forms an archdeaconry, and gives name to a Circuit of the judges. The county is divided into the hundreds of Bampton, Banbury, Binfield, Bloxham, Bulington, Chadlington, Dorchester, Evelme, Langtree, Lewknor, Pirton, Ploughley, Thame and Wooton; containing two hundred and sixteen parishes, and seven parts of parishes—one city and county town (Oxford), and ten other market towns. The county returns nine members to parliament—viz, two for the city of Oxford, two for the University, one each for the boroughs of Woodstock and Banbury, and three for the shire. Previous to the passing of the Reform Bill, Woodstock sent two representatives, and the county two—so that the total number of members remains the same. The gentlemen at present sitting for the county are Lord Norreys; George Granville Vernon Harcourt, Esquire, and Joseph Warner Henley, Esquire. The return of members to represent the shire at large, is made from Oxford; and the other polling places, beside that city, are Deddington, Witney, and Nettled.

POPULATION, &c.—By the returns made to Government at the census of 1841, Oxfordshire contained 80,436 males, and 81,297 females—total 161,643: exhibiting an increase over the returns of 1831, of 9,917 inhabitants. The annual value of Real Property, in this county, as assessed to the Poor Rates, in 1815, amounted to £713,147, and in 1841, to £695,752.

BAMPTON AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

BAMPTON (formerly called *Bampton-in-the-Bush*) is a small market town in the parish of Bampton-with-Weald, and hundred of Bampton; 71 miles w.s.w. from London, 13 w. by s. from Oxford, and 9 n. from Faringdon (Berkshire), which latter town is about five miles and a half north of the line of the Great Western Railway. This, a neat little town, situated on a stream which discharges itself into the Isis, was at one time noted for fellmongers' wares—no other in England having such a trade in leather jackets, gloves, &c.; but at present the inhabitants depend principally upon agriculture and the branches therewith connected. A neat town hall has been lately erected by public subscription; in it the magistrates for the division hold their meetings, and public assemblies occasionally take place. The government of the town is vested in the

magistrates, assisted by constables, by them appointed.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a spacious structure, with a lofty spire; in the belfry is a fine set of bells: the living is in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Exeter cathedral. The free grammar school here was founded by Robert Vesey, and endowed with lands of about £40 yearly value. The only emblems in this neighbourhood are the remains of an old castle, built by Aymer de Valence in 1321; and a house at Old Shifford (a hamlet to Bampton), wherein, it is said, Alfred the Great held his first parliament. Phillips the author of the 'Splendid Shilling,' was born in this parish, 1676. Fairs, March 26th, and August 25th, and following day—the last a large one for horses. The parish contained, in 1831, 2,514 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,734.

**BANBURY,**

**WITH THE VILLAGES OF ADDERBURY, BLOXHAM, WROXTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

BANBURY is a respectable market town, and a borough both corporate and parliamentary, having separate jurisdiction, locally in the parish and hundred of its name; 75 miles n.w. from London 28 s. from Coventry, the same distance s.w. from Northampton, 17 w. by N. from Buckingham, and 9 w. by N. from Brackley; situated close to the verge of the county abutting upon Northamptonshire, on the banks of the Oxford canal and the river Charwell—the latter rising a few miles from the town. It is a place of considerable thoroughfare, the streets being disposed on the roads which lead to Warwick, Southam, Daventry, Brackley, Oxford and Chipping Ongar. With Coventry and Oxford a communication is effected by means of the canal before-mentioned; and the imports and exports of the town, consisting of various commodities are facilitated by this navigation; but the railways now in progress, and nearly completed, will include Banbury in their route, and furnish additional and more speedy means for the transmission of merchandise—these lines the 'Buckinghamshire,' and the 'Oxford and Rugby,' will open up a communication with the metropolis, as well as all parts of the north and west of England. Banbury has long been noted for its plush and girth-web manufactures,—and (though, perhaps, a production of inferior importance), it is no less famous for its cakes, which latter are sent to the metropolis in large quantities, as well as to other parts of England. Two iron foundries are in operation here, and furnish employment to many industrious hands—at one of the establishments, the Britannia Works, agricultural implements are manufactured of great excellence. Camden notices this town as reputed for cheese and ale, and there are at this day several good breweries: the hop and seed business exists here to some considerable extent, as does that of malting; and there are several corn mills on the river.

The town received considerable improvements under an act, passed in the reign of George IV, for paving, lighting and cleansing it. The buildings erected since the period referred to have been many and handsome, and the roads are kept in excellent repair—indeed Banbury may be pronounced one of the cleanest and best regulated towns in the county. The inhabitants received a charter of incorporation from Mary, which was enlarged by George I, and superseded by the Municipal Reform Act passed in 1835, which vested the government in a mayor, four aldermen and twelve councillors, with the usual assistant officers, including a recorder, who presides as judge in a court, held weekly, wherein debts can be sued for to any amount under £40.; and sessions of the peace are held four times a year. The business of the debt court, however, is now very limited, Banbury being included in the thirty-seventh circuit of towns under the County Court Act, passed in 1846, for adjudicating claims to any amount not exceeding £20. The elective franchise was granted to the burgesses in the reign of Mary, since which time the borough has uninterruptedly returned one member; the mayor is the returning officer; and the gentleman at present sitting is Henry William Tancred, Esq.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a spacious and handsome structure, rebuilt, at a great expense, after the design of Saint Paul's, London, in 1797: the living is a discharged vicarage, in the gift of the Bishop of Oxford. There are places of worship for Baptists, Unitarians, Independents, Wesleyan Methodists, the Society of Friends and Roman Catholics. There are public schools upon the British and national plans—the latter was originally established by subscription in 1705, as a blue-coat school. Almshouses for twelve indigent widows, appointed by the corporation; a society for visiting and relieving the sick and distressed

poor, and some other benefits periodically distributed, comprise the other public charities. The vicinity of Banbury is enriched with several noble mansions and elegant seats; those meriting particular notice are Wroxton Abbey, the residence of Colonel North, and Wykham Park, the seat of John Webb, Esq. The market, a considerable one, is held on the Thursday; the fairs, which are numerous, are held on the first Thursday after Twelfth-day, the third Thursdays in January, March and April; Holy Thursday, and the third Thursdays in June and July, for cattle and wool; the third Thursdays in August and September, the Thursday next after Old Michaelmas-day (for cheese and hiring servants); the third Thursday in November and the second Thursdays before Christmas-day. The borough and parish of Banbury contained, (including Neithrop hamlet) 5,906 inhabitants; and in 1841, 6,753.

EAST ADDERBURY, an agricultural parish in the hundred of Bloxham, is about 3 miles s. by e. from Banbury on the road to Deddington. The parish church of Saint Mary is spacious, and contains some interesting specimens of ancient sculpture: the living is a vicarage, in the presentation of the Warden and Fellows of New college, Oxford. In the parish are places of

worship for Independents, and Wesleyan Methodists, a national school, and another endowed, free for fifty boys. The parish (which comprises the township of WEST ADDERBURY, the chapelry of BARFORD ST. JOHN and BODICOTT, and the hamlet of MILTON) contained, in 1831, 2,473 inhabitants, and, in 1841, 2,525.

Nearly 4 miles s.s.w. from Banbury, in the hundred of its name, is the parish of Bloxham: in the village is the parish church of St. Mary and a Baptist chapel: the living of Bloxham is a discharged vicarage, in the presentation of the Provost and Fellows of Eton college. The parish, with the chapelry of MELCOMBE, contained, by the Government returns in 1831, 1,573 inhabitants, and, in 1841, 1,543.

WROXTON is a parish in the hundred of Bloxham—the village, a small one, is 3 miles n.w. from Banbury: it is deserving notice as containing an ancient abbey, founded in the reign of Henry III. now the residence as before-mentioned, of Colonel North. The places of worship are the parish church of All Saints, and chapels for Methodists and Independents. The living of Wroxton is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Baroness North. The population of the parish in 1841 was, 819.

OR BENSON, is a parish partly in the hundred of Dunchester, but chiefly in that of Ewelme—the village is between 11 and 12 miles S.E. from Oxford, the same distance north west from Henley, and 4 1/2 miles N. by E. from the Wallingford road station on the Great Western Railway; situated close to the eastern bank of the Thames, a little below the junction of that river with the Isis, and contiguous to the borders of Berkshire. Until the opening of the great line of railway, before mentioned, this village derived advantage and some degree of importance from being seated on the great road between London and Oxford, and the

inns and inhabitants prospered by the passage of numerous travellers. The chief consequence of the place now consists in its being included within the parliamentary borough of Wallingford (Berks.)

The parish church of Saint Helen, is a neat building; the living is a perpetual curacy in the patronage of the Dean and Canons of Christ Church, Oxford. A hospital here, called 'God's House,' was founded by William de la Pole, the master-ship of which belongs to the regius professor of divinity in Oxford University. The parish contained, in 1831, 1,266 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,254.

**BICESTER,**

WITH THE PARISH OF LAUNTON AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

**BICESTER** is a parish in the hundred of Ploughley—the market town is 55 miles N.W. from London, 12½ N. E. by N. from Oxford, and 10 s. from Brackley (Northamptonshire); situated on the line of the Buckingham railway, which communicates with the London and North-Western, and the Oxford Junction lines. The name 'Bicester' is said to be derived from the Saxon *Burancaster* and *Bernacaster*, both implying 'a fortified place.' Antiquarians agree that Bicester either occupies the site of a Roman station, or that a fortification belonging to that nation was established contiguous to the town: this opinion is strengthened by the discovery, at different periods, in the town and its vicinity, of numerous Roman coins and other relics: an artificial mound on the west side of the town, called Castle Hill, was the site of the fortress or castle. A priory for canons of the Benedictine order, the remains of which are still to be seen, was founded here in 1182, and dedicated to Saint Eadburg. The town consists chiefly of two long and irregular streets, called Sheep-street and Market end; and the parish is divided into two townships or manors, namely, King's-end and Market-end. Courts are held annually for the respective manors; petty sessions on the second and last Friday monthly, and a court under the County Court Act, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20—the latter is held monthly at the Black Boy Inn. Bicester is surrounded by a flat country, of rich arable and pasture land; the air is exceedingly salubrious, and the water pure. No manufacture of any importance is carried on here now; the females of the poorer class are principally employed in making pillow lace, and the men in husbandry. The

place has long been noted for its malt liquor, and the inhabitants derive considerable benefit from its markets and fairs.

The parish church of Saint Eadburg, which stands at Market-end, was rebuilt in 1420, on the site of a former structure: it is a spacious and handsome edifice, with a lofty tower, containing a peal of sweet-toned bells. The interior of the church is ornamented with some antique sculptures, and there are several interesting monuments: some few years since it received extensive repairs: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Dowager Lady Page Innes; the present incumbent is the Rev. John William Wats, M.A. The Independents and Wesleyan Methodists have each a place of worship; and there are four public schools, one of which is partly supported by property funded by Mr. Walker, for instructing and clothing thirty boys; the others are conducted respectively upon the British, national, and diocesan plans. For the purpose of the Bicester Union, which comprises thirty-eight parishes and hamlets, a handsome and commodious poor-house has been erected, about half a mile from the town. The market, well attended, is held on Friday. Fairs, the first Friday in June, and August 6th; there are also three statute fairs, two in October, and one in December. The parish of Bicester contained, in 1831, 2,868 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,002.

LAUNTON is a parish in the same hundred as Bicester—the village, a small one, is nearly two miles east from that town. The parish church is a building of unpretending appearance: the living is a rectory, in the presentation of the Bishop of London. Population of the parish in 1841, 619.

## BURFORD AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

**B**URFORD is a parish in the hundred of Bampton—the market town, a small one, is 72 miles w.n.w. from London and 18 w.n.w. from Oxford; agreeably situated on a gentle ascent near the Windrush, upon which river are some corn mills, and one for making paper. The town contains many good houses, of which the most respectable are built of stone; and the inhabitants are well supplied with water. Henry II conferred a charter on Burford, by which the inhabitants obtained all the privileges of the townsmen of Oxford; and although the town has lost most of them, it still possesses a body corporate, which consists of an alderman, a steward, two bailiffs and twelve burgesses. The town is within the jurisdiction of the county magistrates, who sit here in petty session for the division; a court leet and court baron are also held annually.

The parish church of Saint John the Baptist, is a capacious and elegant edifice, in the Norman, and later English styles of architecture, with a tower surmounted by a fine spire; the west entrance is formed of a beautiful Norman arch, and the south porch, which is in the

**CHARLBURY,**

WITH THE PARISHES OF SPELSBURY AND CHURCH ENSTONE; THE HAMLET OF NEAT ENSTONE AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

CHARLBURY is a parish partly in the hundred of  
 Babury and partly in that of Chadlington—the town,  
 which formerly held a market, gone to decay, is cen-  
 trically situated between Burford, Chipping Norton,  
 Woodstock and Witney, about seven miles from either  
 town, 69 n.w. from London, and about 14 n.w. from  
 Oxford—the last named at present the nearest railway  
 station; but the Oxford, Worcester, &c. line, now in  
 progress, will pass near to the town. Upon the river  
 Even-deitch which runs through the parish are some  
 flour mills. At one time the making of locks employed  
 many of the inhabitants; this branch is nearly lost,  
 and the manufacture of gloves to a limited extent has  
 taken precedence. The government of the town and  
 parish is vested mainly in the magistrates, and officers  
 appointed by the manorial lords (Lord Churchill and  
 Lord Dillon), who hold their respective courts annu-  
 ally, on Easter Monday.

The places of worship are the parish church of Saint  
 Mary, and chapels for the Society of Friends and  
 Wesleyan Methodists. The living of Charlbury is a  
 vicarage, with the curacy of Shortampton annexed,  
 in the gift of the President and Fellows of Saint John's  
 College, Oxford. The free grammar school here was  
 founded and endowed by Mrs. Ann Walker, the Prin-

ci-pal and Fellows of Brazen-nose college are the visitors.  
 No market is now held, but the following fairs are  
 still attended—January 1st, the second Friday in Lent,  
 the second Friday after 12th of May, and October  
 10th: besides these, a pleasure fair is held for two days,  
 generally about the middle of September, in Which-  
 wood forest, within a mile of the town, which is re-  
 sorted to by great numbers from all parts of the country  
 for many miles round. The parish of Charlbury con-  
 tained, in 1331, 3,037 inhabitants, and in 1811, 2,982.

About a mile north from Charlbury, in the hundred  
 of Chadlington, is the village of SPELSBURY—the only  
 object connected with which, worthy of notice, is its  
 small parish church of All Saints, wherein are in-  
 terred the remains of the witty but licentious Rochester,  
 and those of the Lichfield family; the living is a  
 vicarage, in the presentation of the Dean and Canons  
 of Christ church, Oxford. The population of the parish,  
 in 1841, was 597.

CHURCH-ENSTONE is a parish in the hundred of  
 Chadlington, nearly four miles north from Charlbury.  
 The parish church is dedicated to Saint Kenelm: the  
 living is a vicarage, in the gift of Lord Viscount Dil-  
 lon. The parish, (including the hamlet of NEAT  
 ENSTONE) contained, in 1841, 1,121 inhabitants.

**CHIPPING NORTON,**

WITH THE HAMLET OF OVER-NORTON, THE PARISH OF HOOK-NORTON & NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**CHIPPING NORTON** is a parish, having separate jurisdiction, locally in the hundred of Chadlington—the market town, is 74 miles s.w. by w. from London, and 18 n.w. from Oxford; situated on the brow of an eminence, between three and four miles from the verge of the counties of Gloucester and Warwick, and between six and seven miles north of the line of the Worcester and Wolverhampton Railway now being laid down. This is a regular well built little place, principally comprised in one long and tolerably handsome street. Its name is derived from the Saxon word *Ceapen* or *Ceping*, signifying 'a place of market,' or 'cheapening,' and *Norton*, implying the 'North Town,' from which it appears to have been a place of some consequence in the time of the Saxons. Its trade, at the present day, is merely that of other inland towns surrounded by an agricultural district—it we may expect the considerable manufactory of Mr. Bliss for horse cloth, kersey, elastic tweed, press bagging, &c. Chipping Norton sent members to parliament in the reigns of Edward I and III, but it does not appear to have enjoyed that privilege at any subsequent period. The government of the town is regulated by the provisions of the Municipal Reform Act of 1835; the corporate body consists of a mayor, four aldermen and twelve councillors, with the usual assistant officers; the town council are lords of the manor, and hold courts accordingly; and the corporation have power by their charter, granted by James I, to hold a court of requests for the recovery of debts under £1, but for many years this right has been virtually relinquished, or at least not exercised; and the new County Court Act for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20, has rendered application to the ancient court unnecessary. In 1842, a handsome and convenient town hall was erected; it affords accommodation for the meeting of magistrates, for occasional public assemblies, and the general business

of the town; here also is held the county court, monthly.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a beautiful edifice, exhibiting specimens of exquisite workmanship, particularly in the centre aisle and the windows; some years since it was repaired and renovated, at a very considerable expense: the interior contains numerous sepulchral brasses, some of them dating so early as the fourteenth century. The windows of this church excite the admiration of the curious in ecclesiastical embellishments. The living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Gloucester Cathedral; the present incumbent is the Rev. Robey Edridge. There are places of worship for Baptists, the Society of Friends, Wesleyan Methodists, and Roman Catholics. The free grammar school here is an ancient establishment—it was refounded by Edward VI. National and infants' schools, and some almshouses, are the other charities. The market is held on Wednesday; and the fairs on the last Wednesday in every month for cattle and horses, and a dramatic meeting at Michaelmas. The parish of Chipping Norton (including the hamlet of OVER-NORTON), contained, in 1831, 2,637 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,031.

**HOOK-NORTON** is a parish, in the same hundred as Chipping Norton—the village a considerable one, is 5 miles N. from that town; situated near to the edge of the county abutting upon Warwickshire. The parish church of Saint Peter, is a spacious building, with a finely proportioned tower: the living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the Bishop of Oxford. The Baptists, Society of Friends, and Wesleyan Methodists have each a place of worship. A private lunatic asylum has been for some years established in this village, with considerable credit to its conductors. The parish of Hook-Norton (including the township of SOUTHOPE) contained, in 1831, 1,506 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,525.

DEDDINGTON

As a parish in the hundred of Wootton—the market town, small and ancient, is 63 miles s.w. from London, 16 s. from Oxford, and 2½ miles from the Aynho station, on the Buckinghamshire branch of the Oxford Junction, and the Great Western railway lines; pleasantly situated upon an acclivity, near the river Cherwell and the Oxford canal; upon the banks of the latter there is a good wharf. The inhabitants enjoy a tolerable trade in corn and malt, and there is an extensive manufactory of patent axletrees. The town sent members to parliament in the reign of Edward, but in no succeeding reign has it enjoyed that distinction. A bailiff is appointed annually, by the lords of the manor. The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, is a commodious and handsome edifice, with a substantial embattled tower, containing a peal of bells: the living is a discharged vicarage, in the gift of the Dean and Canons of Windsor; the present incumbent is the

Rev. James Brogden. The Independents and Wesleyan methodists have each a chapel for their worship. A public school, conducted upon the national plan, for children of either sex, and almshouses for eight aged men and women are the charities. Within the circuit of a few miles are some elegant seats of the gentry—amongst these will be noticed Aynho Park, three miles to the east, the seat of Sir Thomas Cartwright, one of the manorial lords; Aston Park, two miles south, the property of Colonel Charles Bowles; Great Tew Park, somewhat more than four miles west, M. W. P. Boulton, Esq. &c. The market, held on Saturday, has for some time been but very indifferently attended. Fairs, August 10th, the Saturday next after the 11th of October, and November 22nd, for cattle of all kinds. The parish of Deddington (which includes the townships of CLIFTON and HEMPTON) contained, in 1831, 2,078 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,025.

**DORCHESTER AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

**DORCHESTER** is a parish, giving name to a hundred—the village formerly a market town, and one of great antiquity, is 50 miles N.W. from London, between 8 and 9 S.E. from Oxford, and about 4 miles from the line of the Great Western Railway; situated on the banks of the Thames, which river, near its confluence with the Isis, is crossed by a handsome stone bridge. Dorchester is supposed to have originally been a British town, and afterwards a station of the Romans, called *Durocoroniovum* or *Durocina*; and Roman coins and medals have frequently been discovered in and about the place. Subsequently Dorchester became a bishopric, founded by Cynoglis, King of Wessex; and Birinus, an Italian priest, was its first ordained bishop. Soon after the Norman Conquest the bishopric was removed to Lincoln, from which time the town rapidly declined in importance. In its days of ecclesiastical prosperity there were, besides the cathedral, three other churches,

and an abbey of Augustine canons. The present and only church, anciently the cathedral, and attached to the abbey, is dedicated to Saint Peter and Saint Paul: it is a large, venerable, and very curious structure, with a low tower at the west end, a remarkable Norman doorway, some stalls with rich canopies, and remains of fine stained glass in the windows. Among the monuments are some of very remote date; and the font, which is of lead, is a curious relic. The living of Dorchester is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of certain trustees. A portion of the conventual buildings is still standing in the churchyard, and is used as the grammar school, which was founded in 1656, for the education of six boys. The trade of the place is quite unimportant; manufactures there are none, and the market has for a long period been lost. A fair is held on Easter Tuesday. The population of the parish (including the hamlet of BURCOTT) in 1841, was 1,078.

**HENLEY-UPON-THAMES,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF REMENHAM, NETTLEBED AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**HENLEY-UPON-THAMES**, is a market town, a borough corporate, and parish, having separate jurisdiction, locally in the hundred of Binfield; 35 miles w. from London, 23 s.e. from Oxford, 16 w. by n. from Wind-or, 9 w. from Maidenhead, 8 n.n.e. from Reading, 7 s.s.w. from Marlow, and 5 from the Twyford station, on the Great Western Railway. This, one of the neatest and cleanest towns in the county, is pleasantly situated on the high road from London to Oxford and Cheltenham, on a gentle ascent, rising from the western bank of the Thames, which here forms the boundary of the counties of Oxford and Berks. A noble stone bridge, of five arches, erected in 1786, bestrides the river: the sculpture on the keystones of the centre arch was from the chisel of the Hon. Mrs. Damer. The town is surrounded by well-wooded hills, interspersed with elegant villas and extensive plantations—the scenery altogether around here being remarkably striking. The hills giving name to the Chiltern hundreds form a ridge extending from Henley to Tring; the nominal office of 'steward of the Chiltern hundreds,' under the Crown, by the acceptance of which members of parliament vacate their seats, is derived from these hills. There are four principal streets, which are well paved and gas-lighted; and at the intersection is a plain stone cross and conduit. The town hall is an ornamental building, and the market-house is commodious and well constructed: these, with the church, and the bridge before-mentioned, are the most prominent public edifices. By means of the Thames a considerable trade in corn, malt, flom and timber, is carried on hence to London and intermediate places. Henley was first incorporated by Elizabeth, and another charter was granted by George I: the corporation consists of a mayor, high steward, ten aldermen, two bridesmen and sixteen burgesses, with a recorder, town clerk and inferior officers; the mayor, recorder and two senior aldermen are justices of the peace. Quarter sessions of the peace are regularly held here; and Henley is included in a circuit of towns under the County Court Act, passed August, 1816, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.

The parish church of Saint Mary, situated near to the bridge, is a capacious and elegant structure, chiefly in the decorated and later English styles; the fine and lofty tower, which was raised at the expense of Cardinal Wolsey, contains a peal of excellent bells; and in the church are some interesting and beautiful monuments. The living of Henley is a rectory, in the pres-

entation of the Bishop of Rochester. The other places of worship are Trinity church (or chapel), a very neat building, lately erected on Gray's hill, and chapel for Baptists, Independents and the Society of Friends. The royal grammar school here, was founded by James I., for educating twenty-five boys in Latin and Greek; and the blue-coat school was founded by dame Elizabeth Periam, for educating and clothing twenty poor boys, and apprenticing the four seniors. A green-coat school, for six boys and a like number of girls are now taught at the national school. A British and infants' schools supported by subscription; several almshouses, respectively endowed, and various benefactions, to a considerable amount, for the relief of the poor are the other charities. For many years a number of friendly and other societies have been established; and there is a savings' bank. The market, a large one for corn (which is 'pitched'), seeds, poultry, vegetables, &c., is held on Thursday. Fairs, March 7th, Holy Thursday, and the Thursday next after Trinity Sunday, all for cattle, there is, besides, a pleasure and statute fair on the Thursday next after the 21st of September. The parish of Henley contained, in 1831, 3,618 inhabitants; and in 1841, 3,622.

About a mile and a half n. by e. from Henley, in the hundred of Beynhurst, county of Berks, is REMENHAM a village and parish—the latter intersected by the river Thames. Park Place, in this parish, was formerly the residence of General Lord Conway: the cultivation and distilling of lavender was established here by this nobleman, and there is still much of this fragrant plant grown in the neighbourhood. The parish church is dedicated to Saint Nicholas: the living is a rectory, in the presentation of the Principal and Fellows of Jesus College, Oxford. Population of the parish in 1831, 463; in 1841, 485.

**NETTLEBED** is a parish in the hundred of Ewelme—the village pleasant and rural, is situated 5 miles n.w. by n. from Henley on the main road to Oxford. This village is a polling station at the election of county members—independent of which it presents nothing meriting particular notice. The parish church of Saint Bartholomew was rebuilt by subscription in 1846, and opened on the 3rd of December in that year: it is a handsome structure in the early decorated style: the living is a perpetual curacy. The Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists have a chapel each, and there is a public free-school for girls belonging to the parish—the population of which in 1831, was 618, and in 1841, 690.

**OXFORD,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF HEADINGTON, IFFLEY, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

OXFORD.—This beautiful city, the See of a bishop, possessing separate jurisdiction, is locally in the hundred of Wootton; 54 miles N. N. W. from London ('63 by rail), delightfully situated on a gentle eminence, rising from amidst verdant meadows. The Thames, rounding the Wytham hills, which form the northern extremity of Berkshire, flows in a southerly direction towards Oxford: the Cherwell, flowing from the north, and passing beneath the groves of Magdalen College, at the eastern entrance to Oxford, enters the Thames a quarter of a mile below the city: the local name of the Thames is the Isis, which has sometimes led to the erroneous conclusion that the Thames and the Isis are two rivers; they are, however, identical. The history of this justly famed University is involved in much obscurity—an incontestible proof of its great antiquity. The

illustrious King Alfred was born at Wantage, and tradition makes him to have resided here with his three sons, and to have founded three schools for philosophy, grammar and divinity: it is, however, supposed to have been a seminary of learning even prior to the time of Alfred, although his exertions renovated its institutions, and augmented its consequence; and it certainly was a place of study at the Norman invasion. At a remote period it was a city, well fortified with walls, and defended by a strong castle; the latter, or rather its tower, now forms a part of the county gaol. The boundary of New College, on the north and east, is formed by the city walls, which, with several bastions, may there be seen in a good state of preservation. It is renowned as a seat of royalty and of erudition, many of our monarchs having for a time resided here, and

summoned hither their parliaments. On the western side of the town, there were a few years since, some remains of a palace erected by Henry I.; in this palace was born Richard, surnamed 'Cœur de Lion.' The western extremity of a new street called Beaumont-street, after the palace, now stands upon its site.

Including its suburbs, Oxford is more than a mile in length from east to west, and as much in breadth from north to south. The principal streets from, intersecting each other at right angles, are remarkably grand, being adorned by the fronts of many elegant colleges and handsome houses; and are clean, well paved, and brilliantly lighted with gas. An air of monastic opulence pervades the whole city, and the general effect is considerably heightened by the spacious and beautiful approach over its fine bridge. The High-street is one of the most noble streets in Europe, presenting, in pleasing succession, from its great length and easy curvature, many of the stately and venerable public edifices for which Oxford is so peculiarly distinguished. To give a lengthened description of the various churches, colleges, halls and other public buildings which, in every quarter of this interesting city, attract the admiration of the stranger, would not accord with the plan of this work; we can only notice those that particularly claim distinction.

UNIVERSITY COLLEGE is situated on the south side of the High-street; it is supposed to have been founded by Alfred the Great, in 872—though some authorities ascribe its foundation to William of Durham, who died in 1249: its magnificent front extends full two hundred and fifty feet; the hall and chapel form the south part of the building, which comprises two courts, and contains some excellent specimens of sculpture and painting; among the former, an elegant monument to Sir W. Jones, the eminent oriental scholar, and a medallion of Alfred. BALIOL COLLEGE was founded about 1263 by Sir John Baliol, father to the King of Scotland of that name; it consists of one spacious court, to which several new and elegant erections have been attached: in the library of this college are a few rare and curious manuscripts. Two particular facts give a special interest to this college. Wycliffe, appropriately called 'the Morning Star of the Reformation,' was, for some time, its master, and there is a very characteristic portrait of him in the hall of the college: and immediately in front of Baliol the fires were kindled, by which the martyrs were consumed, in the reign of Queen Mary. MERTON COLLEGE, situated on the south side of the city, in St. John-street, is formed of three quadrangles. The chapel is considered one of the finest in the university; its windows are of fine stained glass, and its handsome tower is embattled and pinnacled. This college was founded by Walter de Merton, Bishop of Rochester, about the year 1274. Anthony Wood, the antiquary and historian, of Oxford, is buried in the chapel of this college, where are also monuments to Bodley and Saville. EXETER COLLEGE, founded in 1314 by Walter Stapledon, Lord Treasurer of England and Bishop of Exeter, stands in the Turf, and consists of a spacious and handsome quadrangle, the gateway leading to which is surmounted by a tower. Oriel COLLEGE was founded in 1326, by license of Edward II. to his almoner, Adam de Broune: the buildings consist of a capacious quadrangle; and a neat library having been added to two lateral ranges of buildings on the north side, completes a second quadrangle, in which was formerly the garden. The entrance to the principal quadrangle from the street is through a tower gateway. QUEEN'S COLLEGE, situated opposite to University College, is an elegant and magnificent structure, occupying a space of three hundred feet in length, and two hundred and twenty in breadth; and comprises two handsome courts, divided by the hall and chapel. This college was originally founded in 1340, by Robert Eggesfield, confessor to Queen Philippa, in honour of whom the founder adopted its name. NEW COLLEGE, situated on the north-east side of the last mentioned, was founded in 1379 (or 1386) by William of Wykeham, a native of Hampshire; the interior of the chapel is much admired for its beauty. The garden has an additional interest from the fine remains of the city walls, which form its boundary. The Wykeham motto, in gold letters over the garden gate, arrests attention,—

'Manners maketh the man.' LINCOLN COLLEGE, consisting of two quadrangles, stands betwixt All Saints' church and Exeter college; it was founded in 1427 by Richard Fleming (a native of Yorkshire), Bishop of Lincoln, from which See it takes its name. It was this bishop who caused the remains of John Wycliffe to be disinterred, and cast into the brook near the place of his burial. JOHN WESLEY was some time Fellow of this college. ALL SOULS' COLLEGE, situated in the High-street, a little to the west of Queen's College, was founded by Henry Chichele, a native of Northamptonshire, and an Archbishop of Canterbury, in the year 1437; an excellent library of books and manuscripts belongs to this establishment, and the chapel is an interesting edifice. Contrary to the express intentions of the founder, this college has come to be an academical institution, and its members rarely reside in Oxford. MAGDALENE COLLEGE is situated at the east entrance of the town, and is the first object that attracts attention when entering from the London side; it was founded by William of Waynflete, Bishop of Winchester, in 1456. The elegance of the chapel, with its beautiful stained glass windows, is generally extolled. Among the members of this college have been three men of great eminence, but of widely different characteristics—Wolsey, Hampden and Addison. BRAZENOSE COLLEGE forms the west side of the Radcliffe-square, and comprises two neat courts, founded in 1509, by Richard Smith, Bishop of Lincoln, and Sir Richard Sutton, of Prestbury, in Cheshire. It is said to derive its name from the circumstance of an iron ring, fixed in a nose of brass, being knocker to a gate of one of the original halls. CORPUS CHRISTI COLLEGE is composed of one handsome quadrangle, to which are attached some elegant modern erections; it is situated at the back gate of Christ church, and was founded in 1516, by Richard Fox, Bishop of Exeter, Bath, Wells, Durham, and Winchester, and lord privy seal during the reigns of Henry VII. and VIII. In the chapel is a very fine altar-piece of the 'Adoration,' by Rubens. CHRIST CHURCH COLLEGE consists of four large squares: the cathedral is a venerable pile of architecture; the tower, above the western or grand entrance, contains the bell called 'Great Tom,' the weight of which is seventeen thousand five hundred pounds. This college was originally founded by the celebrated Cardinal Wolsey, in 1525. TRINITY COLLEGE, originally founded and endowed by Edward III.; ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE, founded by Sir Thomas White; JESUS COLLEGE, founded by Queen Elizabeth; WADHAM, by Nicholas Wadham; PEMBROKE, by Thomas Tesdale; and WORCESTER, by Sir Thomas Cooke—are all noble structures: the dates of their foundation appear in the appended list. Besides these colleges, there are five halls, namely, Saint Alban's, Saint Edmund's, Saint Mary's, New Inn, and Magdalene—each of which have similar privileges, and are governed by the same rules. A new and elegant structure, called the Taylor Buildings and Randolph Gallery, has recently been erected, with a front towards Beaumont-street, and a fine eastern elevation towards the beautiful suburb of Saint Giles. It is a whole made up of three harmonious parts, in the Italian or Palladian style; it is the product of the architectural skill of Mr. Cockerill, and one of the most striking ornaments of Oxford. The object of Sir R. Taylor, the founder, was to promote the study of modern languages in Oxford, and should the nobility, or any of the separate colleges, afford encouragement to this course of study, the institution will prove of great value. The Randolph Gallery contains the whole of the medals of the late Sir J. Chantrey, which were presented to the University by his widow.

Oxford was erected into a See by Henry VIII. who appointed the conventual chapel of the abbey of Saint Frideswide the cathedral church: it is a capacious cruciform structure, in the Norman or early English style of architecture, with a central tower, surmounted by a spire. The exterior is concealed by the college buildings, with which it is surrounded. The interior contains many interesting, beautiful and singular specimens of sculpture and architecture; together with numerous ancient and curious monuments, shrines, canopied stalls, and chapels. Many of the windows were demolished during the civil war; in those that

were spared there are some devices in stained glass—the east window, particularly, has a fine representation of the 'Nativity.' There are no fewer than fourteen churches; of these the most deserving notice are Saint Mary's, All Saints', Saint Peter's and Saint Martin's. The north end of the first-named has been lately taken down, for the purpose of constructing an aisle, to be called the 'Martyrs' Aisle;' and at the extremity of the churchyard, towards Saint John's college, has been erected a memorial to commemorate the sufferings of Cranmer, Ridley and Latimer, in 1555 and 1556: the style of the monument is that of the decorated gothic, and is a reproduction of the beautiful and highly decorated crosses of the best period of gothic architecture. In richly decorated and canopied niches are statues of the martyrs, by Weekes. The first stone was laid on the 19th of May, 1841. Saint Mary's is designated the University church, from being the temple of worship for the vice-chancellor, the heads of the University, and the students. The church of Saint Martin is called the City church, and is that in which the mayor and corporation attend. The benefices of the churches are mostly vicarages and curacies, and the colleges are impropriate rectories. The Baptists, Independents, Society of Friends, and Methodists have places of worship; and in the suburbs is a neat chapel for Roman Catholics. Beside the colleges and churches there are other edifices of architectural excellence which adorn this city, and numerous establishments for benevolent and scientific purposes. On the south side of the High-street, and opposite to Magdalene college, is the Botanical Garden, instituted in 1632, by the Earl of Danby; in this garden are reared specimens of almost every kind of plant, whether exotic or indigenous. The Radcliffe Library, founded in 1737 by the celebrated physician of that name, and who is among the most distinguished of Oxford benefactors, is situated in a handsome square, in the vicinage of Saint Mary's church; it is a noble pile of architecture, and is furnished with a valuable collection of books and manuscripts, chiefly relating to natural history and medicine. The Bodleian Library, also, is a spacious and lofty quadrangular building, erected principally at the expense of Sir Thomas Bodley, who likewise bequeathed to it a large collection of books, &c.; this library is said to contain more books than any other in Europe, that of the Vatican excepted. The schools of divinity, jurisprudence, medicine, music, and other arts occupy the ground floor, or substructure of the Bodleian Library. But the professional or university system having been superseded by the collegiate system, these 'schools' have fallen into disuse. The Sheldonian Theatre is opposite to the Divinity School; it is adorned with Corinthian pillars, surmounted by grotesque heads: in it are celebrated the public arts, an annual commemoration of benefactors, and an occasional ceremony for conferring honorary degrees, with some other solemnities. The Ashmolean Museum, founded by Elias Ashmole, Windsor herald in the reign of Charles II, stands west of the theatre: it contains a vast number of books and rare curiosities, both natural and artificial; of these not the least precious is an ornament bearing an inscription stating in quaint Saxon that the great king Alfred had it made. The old Clarendon printing office, a massive structure, by Vanburgh, nearly adjoins the theatre, whence for many years issued the Oxford Belles, and classical works. It is one hundred and fifteen feet in length, consisting of two stories: it was erected in 1741, by the profits of Lord Clarendon's 'History of the Rebellion'—hence it took its name; it is now used partly as a geological museum, and for committee rooms. The erection of the new University printing office was begun in 1826, and business was commenced in it as early as the autumn of following year; it is an elegant building, of the Corinthian order: on the ground floor is the press room (the largest in the kingdom), two hundred feet long and twenty-eight wide; above this extensive room are two stories, divided into apartments for compositors, drying and gathering rooms, &c. In the front and the south wing bibles and common prayer books only are printed; the north wing is appropriated to the printing of classical and other learned works: it is situated in the north-western suburb of Oxford. The town hall, where the city

sessions are held, is in Saint Aldate's; it is a commodious stone erection, completed in 1752, chiefly at the expense of Thomas Rowney, Esq., formerly one of the members for the city: public assemblies, and concerts are occasionally held in it. The county or shire-hall, is situated at the western part of the city, adjoining the castle gaol, where the assizes and county sessions are held: this is a very elegant structure, completed in 1840. The gaol, or city bridewell, is a large substantial building of much older date. The Radcliffe Infirmary, at the northern, or Woodstock entrance to Oxford, is an elegant edifice and well arranged establishment, well supported by subscription. The Astronomical Observatory stands to the north of the infirmary: it is copied from the ancient temple of the eight winds at Athens. There are various free schools, almshouses, and a house of industry. A commodious and airy lunatic asylum was a few years since erected by subscription, between the celebrated walk called Headington Hill and the Cowley road.

The style and title of the corporation is 'Mayor, Sheriff, and Community of the City of Oxford, in the County of Oxford:' as a municipality, it ranks next to the city of London. The mayor, for the time being, officiates in the buttery, at the coronation of the monarchs of England, and has a superb gilt cup or bowl and cover for his fee. The corporate body (as regulated by the Municipal Reform Act, passed in 1835), consists of a mayor, ten aldermen and thirty councillors, with a recorder and the customary assistant officers: the new act divided the city into five wards, and provided for it a commission of the peace, under which regular courts are held. The University is governed by a chancellor (who is always a peer of the realm), chosen by the students in convocation, and continues in his office for life: a vice-chancellor (who is always in orders, the principal or warden of some college) appointed by the chancellor and approved by the university; and two proctors, who are masters of arts, and are chosen annually in rotation, out of the several colleges or halls. Sessions are held quarterly, before the mayor, recorder and magistrates, at which they have unlimited power to try every description of indictable offence; there also is a court, termed the mayor and bailiffs' court, held once a week, and another, called the mayor's court, every Friday—the latter possesses very extensive privileges. There is, likewise, a vice-chancellor's court, for pleas of debt, to any amount; and Oxford is included in the thirteenth circuit of towns under the County Court Act, passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. The city has regularly sent two members to parliament from the reign of Edward I; the right of election is defined by the Reform Bill; the mayor is the returning officer: the present representatives are James Houghton Langston, Esq. and William Page Wood, Esq. The university received the elective franchise by charter of James I, since which time it has uninterruptedly returned two representatives; they are chosen by doctors and regent masters in convocation, from those who are or have been members of their body; the candidates are put to no expense; the gentlemen now sitting for the University are Sir Robert Harry Inglis, Bart. D.C.L., and the Right Honble. William Ewart Gladstone. Oxford confers the title of Earl, on the family of Harley.

Oxford, once enjoyed a considerable inland trade, by means of its canal, which communicates with the Birmingham, Warwick and Coventry canals, and by the Thames river with London and the neighbouring counties: convenient wharfs and quays have been constructed at a considerable expense; but new modes of transit have materially altered the character of this trade, and turned it into different channels. Its corn and coal trade is extensive, and it has long been noted for the curing of brawn—a delicacy in high estimation, and of which large quantities are weekly sent to the metropolis, which is now communicated with, direct by rail. The regular market days are Wednesday and Saturday—the latter is also for corn, which is sold by sample. Fairs, May 3rd, the Monday next after the 1st of September, and the Thursday next before the 29th of September.

The city and University of Oxford, contained in 1831, 20,434 inhabitants, and in 1841, 23,824, of which last

number, 1,629 were returned for the University. In 1849, the population of Oxford, &c. according to certain parochial returns, was as follows:—

Oxford. There are some valuable stone quarries within the parish, and from their produce many of the public buildings of Oxford, including the colleges, were built. Bricks, are also made in large quantities here. The church is dedicated to Saint Andrew: the living is a vicarage, in the gift (or was lately) of the family of Whorwood. Population of the parish in 1841, 1,668.

IFLEY parish is in the same hundred as Headington—the village is nearly 2 miles S.E. by S. from Oxford; situated between the stream of the Isis and the road to Dorchester. The parish church of Saint Mary is principally of Norman architecture, having a low square tower between the nave and the chancel, with a handsome south porch and a finely-embellished door-way on the west: the living is a vicarage, in the presentation of the Archdeacon of Oxford. There are a few charities belonging to the parish, by means of which some poor children are educated and others apprenticed. Population of the parish in 1841, 958.

## THAME,

WITH THE VILLAGES OF TETSWORTH AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

THAME is a parish in the hundred of its name—the market town, a small one, is 44 miles N.W. by W. from London, 12 E. from Oxford, and 9 S.W. from Aylesbury (Bucks)—from which last-named town proceeds a branch line to the London and North-Western railway. The town is cheerfully seated on the banks of the river from which it takes its name, and immediately upon the border of the county next Buckinghamshire. It appears that this place was of some consequence during the incursions of the Danes, as they erected a fortification here, which was afterwards surrendered to the arms of Edward the Elder. In the reign of Henry III, the great road leading to Aylesbury was brought through the town—a circumstance which tended considerably, at that period, to increase its trade and since the construction of the railroad above-mentioned some trifling additional advantage has accrued; but the main business of the place is confined to supplying general necessaries to the inhabitants, who are also benefited to some extent by its weekly markets and well attended fairs. Thame is included in the thirty-eighth circuit of towns under the County Court Act, passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a large and handsome cruciform structure, in the early English style of architecture, with an embattled tower rising from the intersection, and supported on four massive pillars: the living is a discharged vicarage, which is at present enjoyed by the Rev. James Prosser. In the chancel of the church is a tomb of white marble, with an effigy to the memory of Lord Williams, who bequeathed estates for the foundation of a free grammar school, erected by his executors in 1569, for the instruction of twenty-five boys: for many years, however, the founder's benevolent intentions were not carried out; and

it was only upon the death of the late incumbent, who was the schoolmaster, and occupied the school-premises (but *not* as a school), that the establishment was re-opened in 1842, and bids fair, under the superintendence of the present able master, Dr. Fooks, to attain that celebrity it formerly enjoyed. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents and Wesleyan Methodists. There are National and Baptist schools, almshouses for five poor men and one woman, an apprenticeship fund, and some benefactions to the poor in clothing, bread, &c. The mutual improvement society recently established, consists of about one hundred members, who have a well selected library of five hundred volumes. The society hold meetings for the delivery of lectures, discussions, &c. The land around here is very fertile and well cultivated, and some pleasing scenery presents itself, especially that obtained from a gentle eminence near the town, which commands a fine view of the Chiltern hills. The market, which is held on Tuesday, is well supplied with corn, cattle and poultry. Fairs, Tuesday in Easter-week, the Tuesday before Whit-Sunday, the first Tuesday in July, and October 11th for fat cattle. The parish contained in 1831, 2,885 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,060.

TETSWORTH is a parish, in the same hundred as Thame—the village is 4 miles S. by W. from that town; situated on the great road from London to Oxford, Cheltenham, &c.: it consequently occupies a position of some consequence, and, before the opening of railways, derived no inconsiderable advantage as a thoroughfare village. The places of worship are the parish church of Saint Giles (a small building), and a chapel for Independents. The living of Tetsworth is a curacy, enjoyed at present by the Rev. John Peers. Population of the parish about 600.

## WATLINGTON, EWELME AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

WATLINGTON is a parish in the hundred of Pirton—the market town, a small one, is 45 miles W.N.W. from London, 18 S.E. from Oxford, and 8 N.E. from Wallingford (Berks)—a station town near the line of the Great Western railway. The ancient British mode of constructing their dwellings, with *watling*, or wicker-work, is deemed to be the origin of the name of this town: if this be the true etymology, its existence must be of high antiquity. It had anciently a castle, of which there are now no vestiges. The town situated at the base of the Chiltern hills, is irregularly built; it is not animated by factories (if we except a rather considerable trade in shoe making, lately sprung up), but derives its principal support from agriculture. Two corn mills are propelled by a stream that issues from the adjacent hills. The manor is held by the Earl of Macclesfield and E. H. Hulston, Esq.: the lords, alternately, hold courts leet twice in the year, and the magistrates for the division sit in petty session here once a fortnight.

The places of worship are the neat little parish church of Saint Mary (or as some assert Saint Leonard) and chapels for Independents and Methodists: the living of Watlington is a vicarage, of which the Rev. William Langford is the present incumbent. The free grammar school here was originally founded by Thos. de Stonor, in 1644, and formerly was one of the best

grammar schools in the neighbourhood. Watlington Park, the seat of T. S. Carter, Esq., Shirburn Castle, that of the Earl of Macclesfield; and Swincombe House, the Rev. C. E. Keene, are beautiful residences in the neighbourhood. The small market, held on Saturday, is chiefly for corn. Two fairs (or more correctly, statutes—being principally meetings for hiring servants by the neighbouring farmers) are held on the Saturday before and the Saturday after Old Michaelmas-day. The parish contained, in 1831, 1,833 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,855.

EWELME is a parish, giving name to a hundred—the village is about 3½ miles S.W. from Watlington; situated on the road to Wallingford—from which it is about 4½ miles distant. This place, commonly called *Newelme*, is of considerable antiquity, and was formerly of some consideration. In 1437 William de la Pole, Duke of Suffolk, erected a mansion, a neat hospital, and a church—in the latter, which is dedicated to Saint Mary, his lady was buried, beneath a beautiful tomb, enriched with numerous alabaster figures of angels: the living is a rectory, annexed to the *Regius* professor of Divinity at Oxford. The hospital, called God's House, which still exists, was for two priests and thirteen poor men—the patronage is in the same as that of the church living. The parish contained, in 1841, 663 inhabitants.

**WITNEY,**

**WITH THE VILLAGE OF ENSHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

**W**ITNEY is a parish in the hundred of Bampton—the market town 65 miles w.n.w. from London and 11 w. from Oxford; situated on the river Windrush, which is crossed by a substantial stone bridge of three arches, erected in 1822. Oxford is at present the nearest the nearest railway town, but the line from that city to Cheltenham will, when opened, pass through or contiguous to Witney. This was a considerable place before the Conquest; after which the number of its inhabitants increased so rapidly, that it received summonses to send members to parliament in the reign of Edward II, which it continued to do till the 33rd of Edward III, and no longer. The town is neat, well built, and clean in appearance, consisting principally of two streets, disposed on the side of the road from Barford to Oxford. The popularity of the Witney blanket renders it needless to publish that this comfortable article is the staple of the town. Formerly this manufacture was subdivided amongst numerous small masters—but it is now chiefly in the hands of a few spirited capitalists, and gives employment to more than two thousand hands—the annual consumption of wool being upwards of six thousand packs. There is also a manufacture of feltings, used

by paper makers—likewise tilts, and rough coatings. The glove trade is carried on here to some extent, as are woolstapling and maling; and the brewers of this town have long been noted for producing excellent ales. Queen Anne incorporated the blanket weavers, under the style of 'the Masters, A-sistants, Wardens and Commonality of the Blanket weavers of Witney.' A handsome blanket hall was erected in 1811; but the charter and its provisions being incompatible with the welfare of the trade at the present day, they may now be considered merely as a dead letter. The water of the river Windrush is said to possess a peculiar nitrous quality, well adapted for the purpose of scouring the blankets. The town is governed by two bailiffs, assisted by constables, tything-men and other inferior officers, elected by the jury of the court leet for the borough, held annually at Michaelmas. The Duke of Marlborough is lord of the manor of Witney, as lessee under the Bishop of Winchester: a court leet for the manor (which is co-extensive with the borough and parish) is held twice a year; and Witney is included in the thirty-eighth circuit of towns under the County Court Act, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a spacious and elegant cruciform edifice, with a central tower, surmounted by a lofty and richly ornamented spire: within the church are a number of very ancient tombs—in the transepts especially, and in the chancel (the windows of which are embellished with elegant tracery,) is a piscina of beautiful design. The living is a rectory, in the patronage of the bishop of Winchester; the Rev. Charles Jerram is the present incumbent. The other places of worship are Trinity church, (a chapel of ease to Saint Mary) erected on Wood Green, in 1849; and chapels for Independents and Methodists. The free grammar school was founded in 1663, by Henry Box, Esq. a native of this town. A free school was founded in 1723 by Mr. John Holloway, for instructing, clothing and apprenticing several youths as weavers; and the same benevolent person built and endowed almshouses for six poor widows. Thirty girls receive instruction by means of an endowment by Mr. William Blake; and there are national schools for children of either sex. The market, which is well attended, is held on Thursday. Fairs, the Thursday in Easter week, the Thursday next after the 9th of July, August 24th, September 14th, the Thursday

before the 10th of October, and the Thursday after the 1st of December. The parish of Witney (including the hamlets of CRAWLEY, CURBRIDGE, and HAILEY, contained, in 1831, 5,336 inhabitants, and in 1841, 5,707.

ENSHAM is a parish in the hundred of Wootton—the village, large and populous, is 6 miles W. by N. from Oxford, and about 5 E. from Witney; situated on the main road between the two towns, and near to the western bank of the Isis, over which river is a good stone bridge. Formerly it was a Saxon frontier and royal town, then called *Egouesham*, of which the present name is obviously an abbreviation. At one period it was famed for its abbey, the revenues of which must have been of great amount, as at the dissolution they were valued at no less than £441: of the edifice, which is recorded to have been magnificent, there are few if any vestiges. Ensham Hall, the fine seat of the Earl of Macclesfield, is in this vicinity. The church of Saint Leonard, a handsome structure, and a Baptist chapel, are the places of worship. The living is a discharged vicarage. An endowed school, originally founded in 1700, is for the instruction of a limited number of boys. Population of the parish, in 1831, 1,858; in 1841, 1,893.

**WOODSTOCK AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

WOODSTOCK is a respectable market town, and borough both corporate and parliamentary, having separate jurisdiction, locally within the liberty of the city of Oxford, 8 miles N.W. therefrom, and 62 W.N.W. from London; pleasantly situated on an eminence at the eastern bank of the Glyme, which expands into a lake in Blenheim park. The streets are clean and spacious, and the houses, which are chiefly of stone, are for the most part handsome. Woodstock has been the residence of several English monarchs: Henry I took great delight in the palace here, and in 1145 enclosed the park with a lofty stone wall; and Henry II resided in this palace in 1163, when Rice, Prince of Wales, came to tender his homage: but what rendered this place most famous was a labyrinth, said to

have been planted by Henry, called 'Rosamond's bower,' with a house in it, to secrete his beautiful mistress, Rosamond Clifford, from Eleanor, his queen: there are no traces left, however, of the palace or the bower. Woodstock to this day, is a place of considerable interest and curiosity in several points of view, but more particularly as having contiguous to it BLENHEIM, the superb seat of the Duke of Marlborough. To give a meagre description of this proud monument of British valour and Marlborough's ability would be derogatory, and our space is not ample enough for an adequate one: suffice it, then, that is worthy of the victory it commemorates, and of the nation that caused its erection. As if Blenheim were not sufficient to perpetuate the high interest that surrounds 'Wood



stock, the magic pen of Sir Walter Scott has, in his delightful novel of that name, carried back the imagination to those early scenes and days when kings and knights and ladies revelled in its bowers, and chivalric pomp was encouraged and upheld by some of the most august and gallant characters of English history. Woodstock was first incorporated by Henry VI, whose charter was confirmed and enlarged by succeeding monarchs—the last of whom, Charles II, granted that under which the corporation now govern. This body consists of a mayor, four aldermen, a high steward, a recorder, two chamberlains, seventeen common councilmen and a town clerk: the corporation are lords of the manor, and hold a court leet annually, and Woodstock is included in the thirty-eighth circuit of towns under the County Court Act, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20—this court is held monthly, in the town hall. The burgesses have been entitled to send members to parliament from a very early period, and from the 13th of Elizabeth down to the passing of the Reform Bill they returned two, but the new charter reduced the number to one: the present representative is the Marquess of Blandford. Woodstock carries the inferior title of Viscount on the Duke of Portland. The principal, indeed the only manufacture now existing is that of gloves, and even this has sadly fallen off from its former prosperity. Articles of cut and polished steel at one time conferred no little celebrity upon the place. For some speci-

mens of the Woodstock steel, the prices obtained, at one time, will convey an idea of the labour and skill bestowed: a chain, weighing only two ounces, was sold in France for £170 sterling; a box, in which the freedom of the borough was presented to Lord Clifden, cost thirty guineas; and for a garter star, made for the Duke of Marlborough, fifty guineas were paid. This branch gradually declined, and is now extinct.

Woodstock, though for all civil purposes a parish, is only a chapelry to the rectory of Bladen. The chapel of Saint Mary, is a neat edifice, most of it rebuilt in 1785, when a tower was erected: the living is in the presentation of the Duke of Marlborough. There are places of worship for Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists. The free grammar school, founded and endowed in 1585 by Richard Cornwall, a native of the town, has lately been revived upon liberal principles. Another school, founded by Sir Robert Cocks, in which sixteen boys and girls are educated and clothed, an apprenticeship fund; a range of almshouses, erected and endowed in 1793 by Caroline Duchess of Marlborough, for six poor widows; and some minor benefactions to the poor, comprise the charities. The market is held on Tuesday; and the fairs, on the first Tuesday in February, the first Tuesday in April, Tuesday in Whitsun-week, and the first Tuesdays in the months of August, October, November and December. The borough and parish contained in 1831, 1,380 inhabitants and in 1841, 1,412.

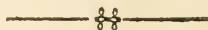

# SUFFOLK

Is a maritime county, bounded on the north by Norfolk, from which it is separated by the Little Ouse and the Waveney rivers; on the south by Essex—the river Stour forming the division; on the east by the German Ocean, and on the west by Cambridgeshire. Its figure is an irregular oblong, measuring from Aldborough, on the east, to Newmarket, on the borders of Cambridgeshire, on the west, about forty-seven miles, and from north to south about twenty-seven: its circumference has been estimated at one hundred and forty-four miles; and its area to comprehend one thousand five hundred and fifteen square miles, or 969,600 statute acres. In size it ranks as the twelfth English county, and in population as the eighteenth.

**NAME AND EARLY HISTORY.**—In the time of the Romans the inhabitants of this part of the country were called the *Icenæ* or *Cenomanni*, descended from the *Cenomanni* of Gaul. Under the Roman dominion it was included in the province of *Flavia Cæsariensis*. Within the limits of the county there were three or four Roman stations—namely, *Ad Ansam*, at Stratford, on the borders of Essex; *Cambretonium*, at Brettenham; *Garianonum*, at Burgh Castle; and *Sitomagus*, at Woolpit, near Stowmarket. Remains of Roman military works are traceable in different parts of the county; and numerous domestic and sepulchral relics of that people have been dug up in various places—these consist of pavements, coins, medals, urns, rings, &c. That stupendous work of human labour, the ‘Devil’s Ditch,’ on Newmarket Heath, is supposed to have served as the line of demarcation between the kingdoms of Mercia and East Anglia. Under the Saxons it formed a part of the kingdom of East Anglia, and was designated Suffolk from *Sud-folk*—literally ‘southern folk’ or ‘people.’ The whole of this and some of the adjacent counties experienced little respite from foreign and domestic depredators till some time after the death of Edward the Confessor: this county, in particular, suffered much from Sweyne, King of Denmark, who spared neither churches nor towns, unless redeemed by the people with large sums of money; though, to compensate in some measure for this cruelty, Canute, his son and successor, shewed it particular kindness. When William the Conqueror was settled on the throne of the kingdom, he divided the manors of Suffolk among his officers. Some of the towns of this county are of great antiquity, and the remains of its once massy castles possess high interest with the antiquary. Bury Saint Edmunds is supposed to have been the *Villa Faustini*, or ‘the seat of Faustinius;’ by the Saxons it was called *Beoderie Weord*, or ‘the Court of Beoderiens;’ this town is famous for its abbey, which, when in its splendour, is said to have exceeded all other establishments of the kind in England, Glastonbury excepted. Ipswich (or, as it is written in Domesday-book, *Gyppeswicz*), was originally fortified, and enclosed by a rampart and ditch, which was broken down by the Danes when they pillaged the town in the years 991 and 1,000. Dunwich, now an inconsiderable village, was once a most important Roman station: in 630 it was an episcopal see; and it is recorded by tradition that at one time it had *fifty-two churches and monasteries*—all of which, but one, have been swallowed up by the sea! During the intestine broils between King Stephen and the barons, Buneay castle, erected by the Bigods, Earls of Norfolk, was so strongly fortified by Hugh Bigod (a turbulent nobleman) against his sovereign, as to be rendered almost impregnable. In the reign of Richard II, when Wat Tyler rebelled, many of the men of Suffolk joined the Norfolk insurgents, in their formidable revolt, which was at length suppressed by the exertions of Spenser, the *warlike* Bishop of Norwich. In 1665 the memorable engagement between the English and Dutch fleets, in which the latter was defeated, occurred off Lowestoft; and in 1667 the Dutch landed three thousand men under Felixtow cliff, but were put to flight, after an ineffectual attempt upon an adjacent fort. Southwold bay was the scene of an obstinate conflict between the united fleets of England and France, on the one side, and the Dutch fleet on the other; the French soon left the English to bear the brunt of the action, which terminated without any decided advantage being obtained by either the English or Dutch. Suffolk was one of the eastern counties that were associated in the cause of the Parliament against Charles I, and placed under the command of the Earl of Manchester: there were a few influential gentlemen of the county who endeavoured to raise a force to secure it for the king, but were surprised and reduced to obedience by Cromwell. The number of religious houses of all denominations was fifty-nine, including four Alien priories. Some of the most remarkable churches are those of Alderton, Ashfield and Barham, all in ruins; of Beccles, remarkable for its noble steeple; Blythborough; Saint Mary, and Saint James, at Bury; Buxlow, in ruins; Creeting; All Saints, and Corton; also Dunwich, Flixton, Fordley and Haslewood, all in ruins: there are two or three at Ipswich of great antiquity; and Lavenham church is remarkable for its beauty. Several others, interesting to the antiquary, of which only the ruins remain, are pointed out to the tourist, in different localities.

**SOIL, SURFACE AND CLIMATE.**—There is in this county a very great variety of soil; the whole, however, may be conveniently divided into four sorts—clay, sand, loam and fen. The first description of soil comprehends the whole midland part of the county, through nearly its entire extent from east to west, and forms about two-thirds of the land: the district over which this soil prevails is called ‘High Suffolk.’ The next sort of soil consists chiefly of sand, and lies in opposite sides of the county—some in the maritime part; much of this district is highly cultivated, and is one of the most profitable; the rest of the sand district lies on the western side of the county, and comprises nearly the whole of the north-western angle; it contains a few spots of such rich sand-lands as are found on the coast, but abounds with warrens and poor sheep-walks: towards the borders of Norfolk it is very light and blowing. The third district, that of loam, forms but a small portion of the county, and is not so clearly discriminated as the others: it is composed of a vein of friable, putrid, vegetable mould, of extraordinary fertility. The fen division is merely the north-west corner: its surface, to some depth, is common peat-bog, and in different places is under water, though much expense has been incurred for draining.—The **SURFACE** of Suffolk does not exhibit any remarkable features. Fifty years ago the amount of waste lands was nearly one hundred thousand acres—the greatest extent spreading over nearly all the country, from Newmarket to the confines of Norfolk, approaching the towns of Theiford and Brandon, and the lands lying between Woodbridge, Orford, and Saxmuhham on the eastern part of the county; besides numerous heaths, in various parts, which are used as sheep-walks. The roads in every part of Suffolk are excellent, the improvements on them, within the last few years, being almost inconceivable. The woods hardly deserve mention, except for the fact that, in general, they pay but indifferently; and nothing but the expense and trouble of grubbing prevents large tracts of land, thus occupied, from being applied much more beneficially. Many modern enclosures have been made by acts of Parliament, and these examples will no doubt be followed in favourable times, the success having been such as to encourage the practice. The **CLIMATE** of this county has long been noticed as the driest in the kingdom; the frosts, also, are severe, and the north-east winds, which prevail in spring, are generally sharp: but though, like the western extremity of this island, Suffolk is not calculated to favour the weak and consumptive stranger, it is, upon the whole, extremely healthy, which has been proved by calculating the average mortality of the county for ten years.

**PRODUCE and MANUFACTURES.**—The agriculture of this county approaches more nearly to perfection than, perhaps, any other in the kingdom: in the lighter lands the Norfolk system is pursued; and in the heavier, beans and wheat, cabbage and other vegetables, are grown in rotation. The farming stock is highly valued—the cows being excellent milkers, and the horses strong, active, and capable of vast exertions. By a spirited cultivation, and the free use of clay, much valuable land has been reclaimed in the north-west part of the county. Hemp is cultivated in the district extending from Eye to Beccles, spreading to the breadth of about ten miles—which oblong part of the country may be considered as its seat: land for the growth of this useful article is in the hands of both farmers and cottagers; but it is very rare to see more than five or six acres in the occupation of any one person; it is singular that no weeding is ever applied to it, the hemp destroying every other plant: the fabrics wrought in this county from its own hemp have great merit. The grass lands are not remarkable for excellence or extent, and the dairy farms are not so numerous as might be expected in so fertile a district: still large quantities of butter are made for the London market, and large tracts of grass land are mown for the supply of the towns with hay. The crops, commonly cultivated, are wheat, barley, oats, beans, peas, and almost all kinds of vegetables, also hemp and hops. The culture of carrots, in the sand districts, is a very ancient practice, and potatoes are grown in every part of the county. The Suffolk cows, although not large, yield a considerable quantity of milk, but which is not remarkable for richness. The number of sheep kept is very great, and the breed of horses is very celebrated. There are many rabbit warrens in the western district, and poultry is exceedingly plentiful—especially turkeys, for which this county may be said to almost rival Norfolk.—The manufactures of Suffolk are not extensive or various—light stuffs, buntings, crapes and yarns, being the principal under this head, with hempen cloth for home consumption; and the combing and spinning of wool likewise prevail to some extent. The sea-ports depend much on the exportation of malt and corn: some are noted for making fine salt, burning lime from fossil shells, &c.; other maritime towns derive advantage from the mackerel and herring fisheries, and in the Orford river there are considerable oyster beds. The curing of fish employs great numbers of the inhabitants, of both sexes, in several towns on the coast, especially at Lowestoft, upon which branch the prosperity of that town may be said mainly to depend.

**RIVERS, CANALS and RAILWAYS.**—Water is very plentiful all over this county; for there are not only rivers in every part, but a great number of fine springs and rivulets. The principal rivers are, the STOUR, the LESSER OUSE, the WAVENEY, the ALDE, the BLYTHE, the DEBEN, the GIPPEN or ORWELL, the LARKE and the ORE. The Stour rises from two sources, at Great Bradley and at Withersfield; it passes Haverhill, Clare and Sudbury—at the latter town it becomes navigable; thence pursuing its course to Nayland, and afterwards meeting the Orwell at Harwich, it falls into the German Ocean: during its whole course the Stour forms the south boundary of the county. The Lesser Ouse rises on the north boundary of the county, near the source of the Waveney, from which it is separated only by a causeway; it passes the town of Thetford and Brandon, and forms in its course the north-west boundary of the county, till it empties itself into the Great Ouse. The Waveney pursues a north-east direction, and is the boundary on that side of Suffolk; it waters the towns of Harleston, Bungay and Beccles, meets the Breendon water near Yarmouth, below which town the German Ocean receives the united streams. The Alde has its spring at Brandon, and, flowing past Aldborough, falls into the German Ocean at Orford bay. The Blythe is formed of several springs; when united it passes Halesworth, and mingles with the Ocean at Southwold. The Deben rises above Debenham, flows past Wickham and Woodbridge, and unites with the sea near Felixstow. The Gippen is formed by the confluence of three rivulets at Stowmarket, from which place it was made navigable in 1793; it takes a south-easterly course by Needham Market to Ipswich, below which town it assumes the name of the Orwell, expands into an estuary, and continues its course to its junction with the Stour, opposite Harwich. The Orwell is navigable for vessels of considerable burden, up to Ipswich; the scenery on its banks is very charming. The Larke rises in the s.w. part of the county, and flows northward to Bury Saint Edmunds, within a mile of which town it is navigable: below Mildenhall it becomes the western boundary of the county, and joins the Little Ouse. The only ARTIFICIAL navigation is that formed in the channel of the Gippen from Stowmarket to Ipswich, opened in 1793, and rather more than sixteen miles in length. **RAILWAYS.**—The Eastern Union (a continuation of the Eastern Counties), enters the county from Manningtree, and goes to Ipswich, Needham Market and Stowmarket; at Diss, it leaves the county, and proceeds through Norfolk to Norwich. Between Manningtree and Ipswich there is a branch to Hadleigh; and from Stowmarket a line proceeds to Bury Saint Edmunds. The north-western horn of the county is traversed by the Eastern Counties line, from Newmarket to Thetford. Other lines, for which acts of parliament have been obtained, are now progressing; but it would be premature to state their routes.

**ECCLESIASTICAL and CIVIL DIVISIONS, and REPRESENTATION.**—Suffolk is in the province of Canterbury and diocese of Norwich, and is included in the Norfolk Circuit of the judges. The most general division of the county is into two parts—one denominated 'the Franchise of Liberty of Saint Edmund;' the other containing the eastern portion, called 'Gildable Land:' each part furnishes a distinct grand jury at the county assizes. There is another general division of the county, into 'High Suffolk' and 'Low Suffolk;' and it is further divided into twenty-one hundreds, and subdivided into five hundred and four parishes, and five parts of parishes: these contain one county town (Ipswich), and twenty other market towns.—**REPRESENTATION.** Previous to the passing of the Reform Bill, Suffolk returned sixteen members to parliament, viz. two for the boroughs of Aldborough, Bury Saint Edmunds, Dunwich, Eye, Ipswich, Orford and Sudbury, and two for the county at large. The new charter disfranchised Aldborough, Dunwich (and Orford); while Sudbury was disfranchised, upon petition in 1841: it restricted Eye to the return of one member but bestowed two additional ones upon the county—so that the number of representatives is reduced from sixteen to nine. The county is divided into two electoral parts, called the 'Eastern Division,' and the 'Western division;' the return of members to represent the former is made from Ipswich, and for the western, from Bury Saint Edmunds: the eastern division polls also at Beccles, Framlingham, Halesworth, Needham, Saxmundham, and Woodbridge; and the western at Botesdale, Hadleigh, Lavenham, Mildenhall and Wickham Brook. The members now sitting for the eastern division are Lord Rendlesham, and Edward Sherlock Gooch, Esq.; those for the western are, Henry Spencer Waddington, Esq., and Captain Philip Bunnell. Suffolk gives the title of Earl to the family of Howard.

**POPULATION, &c.**—By the returns rendered government at the census of 1811, Suffolk contained 154,095 males, and 160,978 females; total, 315,073, exhibiting an increase over the returns of 1831, of 18,769 inhabitants. The annual value of Real Property, in this county, as assessed to the poor rates in 1815, amounted to £1,127,404; and in 1841, to £1,297,956.

ALDBOROUGH,

A PARISH in the hundred of Plomesgate, contains the market-town and small sea-port of its name, (frequently written ALDERBURGH,) 94 miles N.E. from London, 24 N.E. from Ipswich, and 5 N. from Orford; situated on the shore of the German Ocean, in the valley of Slaughden, having the river Alde on the west, and south-west. The town, at one time, consisted of three streets, but the encroachments of the sea have reduced them to two—these are of considerable length, and contain some well-built modern houses. Aldborough is reckoned by physicians one of the most healthful places along the coast, being benefited by cooling and refreshing breezes from the sea. Of late years it has been the resort of many genteel families in the summer, for the purpose of sea-bathing, for which the shore is admirably adapted by its evenness and gentle declivity, for the bathing-machines. For the recreation of visitors there are libraries, a neat theatre and billiard-rooms, and assemblies are held occasionally at one of the principal inns. The trade of the port consists in its fisheries; the curing of herrings and sprats for the home and Dutch markets; in exporting corn and wool, and importing coal. The harbour—safe and commodious, is protected by a battery;

and near the quay is the custom-house, a convenient building. Charles I granted the inhabitants a charter, which vested the government in two bailiffs and ten capital and twenty-four inferior burgesses. The bailiffs are justices of the peace, and hold a session annually in September. Elizabeth conferred upon the borough the right of returning two members to parliament, which privilege it was deprived of by the Reform Bill.

The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul stands on the summit of a hill; it is an ancient structure of flint and free-stone, with a square embattled tower surmounted by a turret, affording a conspicuous landmark for mariners. The living is a vicarage, in the gift of Vernon Wentworth, Esq.; the present incumbent is the Rev. Henry Dowler. The Baptists have a place of worship; and there is a public school supported by subscriptions, and conducted upon the national plan. A neat market-place was formed, a few years since, in the centre of the town: the market held on Wednesday, had fallen into disuse, but it has been revived, and another is also now held on Saturday. Fairs, March 1st and May 3rd. The borough and parish contained in 1831, 1,341 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,557.

**BECCLES,**

WITH THE VILLAGE OF GILLINGHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**BECCLES** is a parish in the hundred of Wangford—the market-town, a borough corporate, is 108 miles N.N.E. from London, 40 N.N.E. from Ipswich, 18 s. e. from Norwich, 14 s. by w. from Yarmouth, 10 w. s. w. from Lowestoft, and nearly 7 s. from the Haddiscoe station, on the Lowestoft branch of the Norwich and Yarmouth railway. The town is charmingly situated on the Waveney (navigable to Yarmouth), and surrounded by a fertile and beautifully wooded country, in a fine state of agriculture. A remarkably pleasing feature is the extensive and finely stocked nursery grounds of Mr. Laws, and the pretty residence attached, called 'Shrubland Cottage.' The town consists of several well-paved and gas-lighted streets, which centre in a spacious area, where the market is held. It has a town-hall (a commodious building) and a gaol—the latter enlarged, repaired and improved some years since. Elizabeth granted to the inhabitants a charter of incorporation, which remained in force until the passing of the Municipal Reform Act of 1835, which vested the government in a portreeve or mayor, four aldermen, and twelve councillors, under the style of 'the Portreeve, Surveyors and Commonalty of the Fen of Beccles, in the County of Suffolk.' A court of session is held here quarterly; the lord of the manor (the Earl of Gosford) holds a manorial court occasionally; and Beccles is included in the thirty-fourth circuit of County Court towns, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20: it is also a polling station at the election of members to represent East Suffolk. A very considerable trade in corn and malt is carried on; and by the navigation, coal, groceries and other commodities are supplied to a populous neighbourhood. The railway is, likewise, a means of transit, advantageous to the general trade of the district; and this benefit will be increased by the opening of other lines now in progress, with which Beccles will be interested. There are two principal inns—one of which, the 'King's Head,' in the New Market, is an

excellent family and commercial house, as well as a good posting establishment. Races are held annually—the course, which is on the common, is said not to be surpassed by any in the kingdom.

The parish church of Saint Michael, is a fine old Gothic structure, with a noble tower, containing an excellent peal of ten bells; its being detached from the church presents a singular appearance: the living is a rectory in the gift of the Earl of Gosford; the present incumbent is the Rev. Dr. Owen. The view from the church-yard is much admired; it is one of the most expansive, and embraces a beautifully verdant country, rich in woods, with the prospect varied and enlivened by the windings of the Waveney river. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents, and Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists. The charities are a free-school for forty-eight boys, founded and well endowed by Sir John Leman, knight, in 1631; a free Latin and Greek grammar-school, founded by a Dr. Henry Fauconberg, in 1712; national and British schools; and a certain land called 'foffment land,' producing a rental of about £250 per annum, which is distributed amongst decayed tradesmen and poor persons residing in the town. The market, for corn and every other marketable commodity, is held on Friday: the principal annual fair is on Monday in Whitn-week, and there is a statute for hiring servants held on the 11th of October. The population of Beccles parish, in 1831, was 3,862, and in 1841, 4,086.

GILLINGHAM is a village comprised in the united parishes of All Saints and Saint Mary, in the hundred of Clavering; rather more than a mile N. by W. from Beccles. The church of St. Mary is principally of Norman architecture; that of All Saints was taken down in 1748, except the tower, which still remains, and being covered with ivy, presents a venerable and pleasing appearance. The livings united, form a discharged rectory, with Winston and Winsdale annexed; the Rev. John Lewis is the present rector. Population of the united parishes, in 1841, 404.

## BILDESTON, HITCHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**BILDESTON**, by some improperly spelled and provincially pronounced. *Bilson*, is a parish in the hundred of Cosford—the village is 53 miles N. E. by N. from London, 11 W. N. W. from Ipswich, 5 west from Lavenham, and the same distance N. N. W. from Hadleigh—the last named, a station on a branch from the Eastern Union railway. Bildeston was once noted for its manufacture of blue cloth and blankets, but these branches are no longer known here. There is a little maling business, but the inhabitants chiefly depend on agricultural occupations.

The parish church of St. Mary, a handsome building, stands on an elevation on the west side of the village: the living is a rectory, in the patronage and present incumbency of the Rev. Joseph Gedge. The baptists

have a place of worship here. There was formerly a chapel dedicated to St. Leonard, in which was a chantry called 'Erdington's,' where, long after the Reformation, divine service used to be performed, on account of the distance of the church from the town. Formerly a market was held on Wednesday, which has ceased to be observed, but two fairs are still attended, viz. on Ash-Wednesday and Ascension-day. The parish contained, in 1831, 836 inhabitants, and in 1841, 857.

**HITCHAM** is a parish, in the same hundred as Bildeston—the village, being situated nearly 2 miles N. N. W. from that town, on the road to Stowmarket. The church is dedicated to All Saints: the living is a rectory, in the patronage of the Crown. Population of the parish, in 1841, 1,065.

## BOTESDALE, REDGRAVE AND RICKINGHALL.

**BOTESDALE** is a village and chapelry in the parish of Redgrave, 88 miles N.E. by N. from London, 26 N. N. W. from Ipswich, 27 S. S. W. from Norwich, 16 N. E. from Bury Saint Edmunds, 6 S. by W. from Diss, and 4 W. from Melbis station on the Eastern Union railway. This place, at one time a market-town, was formerly called *Botolphsdate*, from Saint Botolph's chapel, and the date in which it is situated. The chapel was for many years disused, but afterwards substantially repaired and fitted up for divine service, and is now the only place of worship here under the establishment, the mother church being at Redgrave. The Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists have each a chapel here; and there is a free-grammar school, founded by Sir Nicholas Bacon (father of the Chancellor), about the year 1756; the Dowager Lady Suffolk has the appointment of the master. There are no manufactures or particular trade here, agriculture being almost solely the support of the inhabitants. Botesdale is a polling-station at the election of members for West Suffolk. The market has now fallen into disuse; but a fair on Holy Thursday, and a statute for hiring agricultural servants, on the Thursday before the 11th of October, are maintained. The parish contained, by the returns rendered in 1831, 655 inhabitants, and in 1841, 633.

**POST OFFICE**, BOTESDALE, Benjamin Taylor, *Post Master*.—Letters from all parts arrive every morning at seven, and are despatched at a quarter before seven in the evening.

About 2 miles N. by E. from Botesdale, is the village of REDGRAVE, pleasantly situated near the sources of the rivers Waveney and Little Ouse. It contains the parish church of Saint Botolph—deserving the notice of the stranger, as containing some monuments which, for beauty of marble and sculpture, are scarcely exceeded by any in the kingdom: the principal are one to the memory of Sir Francis Bacon and Ann his wife—date 1616; and another to that excellent judge Sir John Holt—date, 1709. The living is a rectory, in the gift of George St. Vincent Wilson, Esq., who is also lord of the manor; the present rector is the Rev. Thomas D. H. Wilson. The Wesleyan Methodists have a small chapel in the village; and there is a national school, established in 1815. Cardinal Wolsey, the disgraced favourite of Henry VIII, was sometime a rector of this living. Redgrave parish (independent of Botesdale) contained, by the parliamentary census for 1831, 712 inhabitants, and and by that for 1841, 719.

**RICKINGHALL**, Inferior and Superior, are two parishes contiguous to Botesdale. They have each their parish church, both of which are dedicated to Saint Mary, and are alike discharged rectories. Inferior Rickinghall contained in 1841, 432 inhabitants; and the Superior parish, 768.

## BRANDON, MUNDFORD, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**BRANDON** is a parish in the hundred of Lackford; 80 miles S.E. from London, 41 N.W. from Ipswich, and 6 W. by N. from Thetford (Norfolk)—the market town, a small one, is situated on the Brandon and Norwich section of the Eastern Counties railway, and on the banks of the Little Ouse, which is navigable to Lynn and Thetford: the river is crossed by a bridge, and a mile lower down is a ferry for conveying goods to the Isle of Ely. The town is well built, and previous to the introduction of the percussion lock, was remarkable as being the seat of a peculiar trade—the manufacture of gun-flints, which, especially, during the war, was carried on here to such an extent, that the refuse, which was thrown together at the end of the town, formed such heaps as would astonish a stranger by their magnitude: this article is exported to all parts of the globe—and this is the only town in England, and indeed in the world, where such a manufacture exists, so as to afford employment to several persons. Another particular branch is that derived from extensive rabbit warrens in the neighbourhood, which contribute largely to the supply of the London market: one of these

warrens alone is said to furnish forty thousand rabbits annually; and the skins being dressed here, afford another source of employment to great numbers of the poor. The transmission of game in general to the London market is also very great. There are several whiting manufactories; and the trade in corn, coal, and timber, on the Ouse, is of some consequence.

The places of worship are the parish church, of Saint Peter, and a chapel for Wesleyan Methodists. The living of Brandon is a rectory, in the presentation of George St. Vincent Wilson, Esq.; the Rev. Charles Johnson Cartwright, is the present incumbent. A rent charge of £30. given by Robert Wright, is applied to the instruction of children belonging to Brandon and certain adjacent parishes. The market is held on Thursdays, but very little business is done, except in corn, of which a considerable quantity is exported hence. Fairs, February 14th, June 11th, and November 11th. The parish contained in 1831, 2,065 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,002.

MUNDFORD is a parish in the hundred of Grimshoe, county of Norfolk, bounded on the north by the river

Wissey, which is crossed by a bridge a short distance from the village—the latter is situated about 5 miles from Brandon, on the Swaffham road. The parish church of Saint Leonard is built of flint, having an

embattled tower at the west end: the living is a discharged rectory of which the Rev. John Raven is the present incumbent. The population of the parish in 1841, numbered about 400.

**BUNGAY,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF DITCHINGHAM, EARSHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**B**UNGAY is a market town, comprised in the parishes of Saint Mary and the Holy Trinity, in the hundred of Wangford; 108 miles N.E. by N. from London, 40 N.E. by N. from Ipswich, 20 S.W. from Yarmouth, 14 S.S.E. from Norwich, and 17 N.E. from Diss—the last named a station on the Eastern Union railway. The town, which is pleasantly situated on the river Waveney (navigable thus far for barges, &c.), was destroyed by fire in 1688, when the loss was computed at £30,000; after this period it was nearly rebuilt. The principal streets, which are broad, well paved, and gas-lighted, branch out from the market place towards the great roads leading to Norwich, Yarmouth, Bury, Ipswich, Beccles, and Lowestoft; and each of these being terminated by a handsome edifice, produces, at first sight, a very favourable impression. The Theatre has lately been converted into a handsome Corn Exchange—a great convenience to the corn dealers attending the market. Upon the Waveney, which nearly surrounds the town, a considerable trade exists in corn, malt, flour, coal, lime, &c. Among the other prominent trades are an extensive letter-printing establishment and stereotype foundry, a paper mill, and a silk crape manufactory—the latter at Ditchingham. In ancient times the river Waveney was a much broader stream than it is at present, and Bungay was then called *Le-Bon-Eye*, or the 'Good Island,' being nearly surrounded by water—as it still is on three sides. It was granted, with numerous other manors, by William the Conqueror, to Roger Bigod, who afterwards created Earl of Norfolk: he is supposed to have built Bungay Castle, which, from its commanding situation, on a bold eminence overlooking the river Waveney, and the great strength of its fortifications, was boasted of by Hugh, the next Earl, as being impregnable; but in 1140 it was stormed and taken by King Stephen, though the refractory Earl had said—

"Were I in my Castle of Bungay,  
Upon the water of Waveney,  
I would ne care for the King of Cockney"

The form of the castle appears to have been octangular: the ruins of two round portal towers, and portions of the west and south-west angles are still standing, as also are three sides of the great tower or keep, the walls of which are from seven to ten feet thick, and from fifteen to seventeen feet high. Within the walls are gardens belonging to the King's Head Inn, and part of these walls have been converted into a terrace, from whence there is a fine and commanding prospect of the town and fertile country surrounding it: this is a spot much resorted to by the inhabitants of Bungay in the summer time. Between the two churches ap-

pear the ruins of a Benedictine nunnery, founded by Roger de Glanville, and the Countess Gundreda, his lady, in 1160, to the honour of God, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and the Holy Cross. His grace the Duke of Norfolk is lord of the manor; and the municipal officers of the town are those appointed at his court leet and baron, held annually. The county magistrates sit in petty sessions here every Thursday; and Bungay is included in the Beccles circuit of County Court towns for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20.

The places of worship are, the two churches of the parishes already named, and chapels for Independents, Wesleyan Methodists, and Roman Catholics. Saint Mary's Church is a very handsome structure, and, with its fine tower, is a great ornament to the town. It is constructed of flint and freestone, and was chiefly rebuilt after the fire of 1688, by which it was reduced to ruins, some of which still remain at the east end of the present building. The church of the Holy Trinity is a small ancient edifice, with a round tower, embattled, and bearing several shields with the arms of Thomas de Brotherton, Earl of Norfolk, and the Montacute, Bigod, Beauchamp, and other families. The living is an unappropriated vicarage, leased by the Bishop of Ely to the Rev. Thomas Collyer, the present incumbent. The charities comprise a free grammar school; public schools, conducted upon the British and National plans, and for infants; a dispensary, and some almshouses. There are a great number of beautiful seats, within a few miles of Bungay, placed in delightful situations. The market place is ornamented by a butter cross, built in 1690, and covered with a leaded dome, surmounted by a fine figure of Justice. The market is held on Thursday; a considerable cattle fair on the 14th of May, and a statute meeting on the 25th of September. By the returns for 1831 the parish of the Holy Trinity contained 1,663 inhabitants, and that of Saint Mary 2,071; in 1841 they contained respectively 1,864 and 2,248.

Separated from Bungay by the Waveney is the village and parish of DITCHINGHAM, in the hundred of Loddon and county of Norfolk, containing a parish church, dedicated to Saint Mary, a silk mill as before stated, and a population of 1,124 inhabitants.

Rather more than half a mile from Bungay, in the hundred of its name and county of Norfolk, is the village and parish of EARSHAM. The neat church of All Saints contains some handsome mural tablets of the Windham family, a font curiously carved, and the windows are enriched with some beautiful stained glass. Population of the parish 731.

**POST OFFICE,** Earsham street, Matthias Abel, *Post Master*.—Letters from all parts arrive every morning at ten minutes before seven, and are despatched in the evening at half-past six.

*Post Office Orders* are granted and paid from nine in the morning till five in the evening.

## BURY SAINT EDMUNDS AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

**BURY SAINT EDMUNDS** is a market town and borough, both corporate and parliamentary (comprised in the parishes of Saint James and Saint Mary) having separate jurisdiction—locally in the hundred of Thingoe; 72 miles N.E. by N. from London (94½ by rail); 26 N.W. from Ipswich (26½ by rail); 14 E. from Newmarket; 27 E. by N. from Cambridge; and 42 S.S.W. from Norwich (43 by rail); situated on the Bury branch of the Eastern Union Railway, and on a gentle eminence on the western bank of the river Lark (or Bourne), in the centre of an open and richly cultivated district, abounding with interesting scenery. The streets are spacious and clean, the houses for the most part uniform and handsomely built, and there are many elegant and well-furnished shops; the town is lighted with gas, and the inhabitants are plentifully supplied with water. The origin of Bury has formed what may be termed the 'debateable ground' of antiquaries; by some it is held to be the *Villa Faustini*, or the seat of Faustinus; others adopt the Saxon designation, *Beoderic Weord*—the villa of Beodericus, his court or farm; the latter appears to be the more natural derivation—this place having been the seat or residence of Beoderic, who was proprietor of the land where the abbey and town were subsequently erected. In succeeding years it received the name of *Burgh*, signifying 'a strong hold or town,' which in time was modulated to *Bury*; Beoderic bequeathed it to *Saint Edmund*, the king and martyr, and thus it gradually acquired its present appellation. That Bury was a Roman station of some consequence, has been conceded by almost every historian; and in the spring of 1783, the fact was placed beyond doubt, by the discovery, where the botanic garden (formerly the garden of the abbey) is now laid out, of some ancient sculptures, which proved to be representations of Roman divinities. Of the magnificent abbey all that now remains is the western gate, which formed the grand entrance: this venerable remnant, still in a state of preservation, almost perfect, was built in the early part of the fourteenth century. A tower that stands opposite to the west end of the abbey church, to which in former ages it served as an appropriate portal, is considered one of the noblest specimens of what is termed Saxon architecture in the kingdom; it is eighty feet in height, of a quadrangular form, and remarkable for the grand simplicity and massive solidity of its construction: this tower, though thirty feet distant from the church of Saint James, serves as a steeple to that edifice. In its present state, the west end of the conventual church exhibits a very singular appearance: an octagonal tower is still standing, the lower part of which has been converted into a stable; three arches, once the stately entrances to the aisles, have been filled up with modern brickwork, and transformed into suitable portions of neat dwelling-houses. The ruins of Saint Saviour's hospital, formerly the most celebrated establishment of the kind in Bury, are near the Northgate: this building is alleged to have been the place selected for the murder of Humphrey the Good, Duke of Gloucester, and for some time Regent of England, in 1446. There are many other vestiges of ancient structures, to which the antiquary will attach considerable interest.

The following are the principal public buildings, exclusive of those appropriated to divine worship. The shire-hall is a modern erection, comprising two convenient courts for the trial of civil and criminal causes. The guild-hall is for the town court of sessions, and the transaction of the general business of the borough. The concert-room is an elegant building; and there is a handsome corn-exchange. The county gaol, erected in 1803, at an expense of £39,000, is calculated to contain one hundred and forty prisoners, with a separate bed for each: it stands on the London road, nearly a mile from the centre of the town, and presents a handsome stone front. The borough bridewell is situated in the Market-place—the ace of its erection is obvious from its circular windows. The theatre, a neat structure, in the southern part of the town, was opened for dramatic performances in October, 1819. The subscription rooms were completed in 1804, in a

superior style of elegance, at an expense of nearly £5,000: they occupy the south side of Angel-hill, and comprise ball, billiard, card, coffee, supper and reading rooms. The Suffolk public library, kept in the Guild-hall, has about one hundred subscribers, and contains many valuable books. The botanic garden, the entrance to which is under that magnificent ruin, the Abbeygate, is an important acquisition to this branch of scientific study, as well as a most agreeable and favourite promenade. The general Suffolk hospital is a handsome structure, in an open and healthful situation. Two weekly newspapers are published in Bury—the 'Bury and Norwich Post,' and the 'Bury and Suffolk Herald.' The spinning of yarn was formerly the principal means of employment for the industrious class, and the halls in which the wool was deposited, are yet standing; no particular branch of manufacture is now carried on. The local and retail business of the place is in general flourishing; being well sustained by a large and respectable population, and the numerous wealthy families in the immediate neighbourhood. The town is also one of considerable thoroughfare, and supports no fewer than seven principal inns.

James I granted to the inhabitants a charter of incorporation, which was extended by several succeeding monarchs. The corporate body under the Municipal Reform Act, consists of a mayor, six aldermen, and eighteen councillors, with the usual assistant officers—styled 'the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of Bury Saint Edmunds, in the County of Suffolk:' the same act divided the borough into three wards, and provided for it a commission of the peace. Sessions for the borough, and also for the county, are held quarterly; assizes for the liberty and county twice a year, and a court meet annually under the lord of the manor. Bury is included in the thirty-fourth circuit of County Court towns, under the acts passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts and damages to any amount not exceeding £20—this court is held monthly, in the shire hall. The borough has uninterruptedly returned members to Parliament from the 4th of James I; the present representatives are the Earl Jernyn and Sir Edward Herbert Bumbury. The return of members to sit for West Suffolk is made from Bury.

The places of worship are the three churches, and chapels for Baptists, Independents, Unitarians, Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists, the Society of Friends and Roman Catholics—the chapel of the latter a modern erection. Saint Mary's church is an elegant structure, divided into three aisles by two rows of beautiful slender columns; the roof particularly excites admiration by its tasteful lightness. Saint James's is a fine specimen of the Gothic style—the west end is particularly handsome: the interior consists of side-aisles, a nave and a chancel, and a gallery over the west entrance; the window of the chancel, formerly belonging to the abbey church, is of beautiful stained glass; and the organ is a sweet-toned and powerful instrument. Saint John's is a handsome modern brick edifice, with a fine proportioned spire: the living of each parish is a donative, in the gift of the corporation. Amongst the charitable institutions of Bury, are, the Suffolk general hospital, before mentioned, respectfully supported by voluntary contributions; Clopton's hospital, a neat brick edifice, founded and endowed in 1730, as an asylum for twelve poor men and women, widowers and widows; and several other munificent charities that are blended into one trust, called 'the guildhall bequest,' the annual income of which exceeds £1,200. Contiguous to the Suffolk hospital is the poor-house of the Thingoe Union, comprising forty-six parishes; the building was erected in 1837. The borough of Bury is not comprised in the Union, its parochial affairs being managed under the provisions of a local act. The educational institutions are numerous. The free grammar school was founded by Edward VI, for the sons of all inhabitants: at present, nearly one hundred scholars are on the foundation, and the number of private pupils is considerable. There are, also, a free-school for forty boys, and two others for fifty girls, besides infants' schools, one of industry, and others conducted upon

the national plan. The markets are held on Wednesday and Saturday; the former, the most considerable, is for corn and cattle—but both are amply supplied with every necessary. The advantages arising from a cattle market, purchased by the old corporation, and renewed by the new, have rendered this, as a market town, superior to any in the eastern district, Norwich

only excepted. Fairs are on the Tuesday, and two following days in Easter week, the 2nd of October and the 1st of December; the October fair is the principal one, and continues about three weeks. By the returns made to government in 1831, the population of the borough and parishes was 21,436, and by those for 1841, 12,538.

## CLARE

Is a parish in the hundred of Risbridge—the market town, a small one, is 56 miles N.E. by N. from London, 18 s. by w. from Bury Saint Edmunds, and about 10 w. by s. from Sudbury, which last named town is at present the nearest railway station: it is situated on the Stour, which river separates this county from Essex on the south; and was formerly a place of considerable note and extent, having a collegiate church, a monastery of regular canons, and a strong castle. The latter building, once so celebrated, stood on the south side of the town, and, from the few remaining vestiges, does not appear to have been inferior in grandeur to any of the feudal mansions in the kingdom. A narrow path, winding round a hill, leads to this relic of antiquity, which, when surrounded with verdure, forms a picturesque object. Clare is a place that cannot boast buildings of architectural merit, or consequence derived from manufactures; there is a little traffic on the Stour in corn and coal, and several mills are worked by its stream for grinding the former article. In 1848 a handsome corn exchange was erected here by Mr. James Fenner. The municipal officers

are two headboroughs and two bailiffs for the honour of Clare; the former are appointed at the courts leet and baron of the lords of the manor: a court is held here for the Dutchy of Lancaster, and the magistrates meet in petty sessions for the division. The parish church of Saint John, is an ancient and beautiful structure, with a square tower; and is at present the principal ornament of the town. Among other persons of note interred here is Edmund, son of Roger Mortimer, Earl of March, and next heir to the crown after Richard II. The living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the Crown; the Rev. George Wightman, D.D. is the present vicar. The Baptists and Independents have a chapel each. The charities comprise a free-school for ten boys, having a small endowment, under the will of William Cadge, who also bequeathed a sum towards the maintenance of eight poor widows; National and Sunday schools; and several bequests for distribution amongst the poor. The market is held on Monday; and two fairs, for toys, on Tuesday in Easter week and the 26th of July. The parish of Clare contained, in 1831, 1,619 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,700.

**DEBENHAM**

IS a parish, in the hundred of Thredling—the market town, an inconsiderable one, is 83 miles N.E. by N. from London, 13 N. from Ipswich, 12 N.E. from Needham Market, and 10 E.N.E. from Stowmarket: the three last named places, all railway stations on the Eastern Counties line. The town, which is clean, and surrounded by an exceedingly picturesque country and land highly cultivated, is situated on a hill, which rises near the source of the Deben, whose stream propels several flour mills. The roads leading to Debenham have, of late years, received considerable improvements; and the one through it, being the nearest from Norwich to Ipswich, is the cause of some traffic, but the chief support of the inhabitants is derived from agricultural occupations. The manor is divided

property, in the possession of Lord Henniker, — Mills, Esq. and the corporation of Ipswich. The government of the town, is vested in a magistrate, assisted by three constables.

The parish church of Saint Mary, is rather a handsome building, spacious and well kept, and contains some ancient monuments: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of Lord Henniker; the Rev. James Bedenfield is the present incumbent. The Independents have a place of worship, and there is a free school now conducted upon the National plan. The market is held on Friday; and the fairs June 24th, for toys, &c., and August 8th for cattle, sheep and lambs. The population of the parish, by the returns rendered in 1831, was 1,629, and in 1841, 1667.

**EYE,**

WITH THE PARISHES AND VILLAGES OF YAXLEY, MELLIS, HOXNE, OAKLEY, BROOME, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**EYE** is a market town, and borrough both corporate and parliamentary, in the hundred of Hartismere, 90 miles N.E. by N. from London, 20 N. from Ipswich, 5 S.S.E. from Diss (Norfolk), and 3½ E. from Mellis—the last named a station on the Eastern Union railway; situated in a valley at the confluence of two clear rivulets, and surrounded by a fertile and pleasant country. That this was a station of the Romans is more than probable—for, in 1781, in digging up a field near this place, some labourers discovered a leaden box, containing some hundreds of Roman coins and medals, all of the purest gold, chiefly of the emperors Honorius and Arcadius, well executed and in high preservation; their

value was about eleven shillings each; near them lay a quantity of human bones. In July, 1818, a considerable number of Roman urns were dug up, of different size, shape and ornamental marks, all filled with calcined bones. Prior to the suppression of religious houses some importance was attached to Eye: it had a Benedictine monastery, with large possessions, founded by Robert Mallet, a Norman baron, who also built the castle: the monastic ruins are to be seen on the east side of the town, and the dilapidated walls of the castle stand near the east end of the church. Like most other towns in a district entirely agricultural, this has few pretensions to manufacturing celebrity; its business is

of a retail domestic nature, and some of the humbler class of females exercise their industry in lace making. Agricultural implements and machines are manufactured here to some extent—those made at the foundry of Mr. Garrod are upon the most approved principles. The town hall is a spacious edifice, in the centre of the town; the lower part has been fitted up as a corn exchange. The inhabitants received a charter from King John, which was confirmed by Queen Elizabeth, and remained in force until superseded by the Municipal Reform Act of 1835—under which the corporation consists of a mayor (or bailiff), four aldermen and twelve councillors, with the usual assistant officers, styled 'the Bailiff, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the Town and Burgh of Eye.' The county magistrates have concurrent jurisdiction within the borough, for which sessions are held. The corporation have power to hold a court of record for the recovery of debts of unlimited amount, but no process has issued of late years; and now the provisions of the new County Court Act passed in 1846, have rendered the ancient court unnecessary: the new court is held monthly in the town-hall, and takes cognizance of debts and claims to any amount not exceeding £20. The elective franchise was conferred in the thirteenth of Elizabeth, since when, until the passing of the Reform Bill, the borough returned two members; but the new charter restricted it to one: the present representative is Lieut. Gen. Sir Edward Kerrison, Bart. K.C.B., G.C.H., who is also lord of the honor of Eye. The municipal borough comprises only the parish of Eye; but the parliamentary borough, as defined by the Boundary Act of the Reform Bill, includes ten surrounding parishes.

The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul is a spacious and handsome building, with a fine square, lofty tower, in the later style of English architecture: in the chancel is a very ancient tomb, so much defaced as to render its date uncertain, and in the north aisle is a curious piece of sculpture representing the Good Samaritan: the living is a vicarage in the gift of Sir Edward Kerrison, before-mentioned. There are places of worship for Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists. Among the charities are two public schools—one with exhibitions to Cambridge, the other conducted upon the National plan; almshouses for indigent agent women, &c., and periodical gifts to the poor. In a fine healthful situation on the Castle-hill, stands the Hartismere Union Workhouse, and at Worthen, six miles from Eye, is another poor-house belonging to the same Union—the former chiefly for the reception of able-bodied poor and infants—the latter for boys and girls who are employed in making shoes, clothing, &c. The market is held on Tuesday, and an annual fair on Whit-Monday. The borough and parish of Eye contained in 1831, 2,313 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,493.

YAXLEY is a small scattered village nearly two miles west from Eye, on the Norwich road. Yaxley Hall,

the seat of P. R. Welch, Esq., is a large and handsome mansion in the Elizabethan style, surrounded by extensive plantations and pleasure grounds. The parish church of Saint Mary is an ancient structure, with a remarkably fine porch and a tower: the living is a vicarage in the gift of Robert Knipe Cobbold, Esq.

The population of Yaxley and the following parishes is given after the notice of Broome.

About a mile and a quarter west from Yaxley, and three from Eye, is the pleasant village of MELLIS, the houses forming which, partially surround a cheerful green or common, and over it runs the road to Botesdale. The Eastern Union railway passes through the centre of the parish, on its route from London to Norwich, and here is the station of the company for Eye. Mellis Hall, now a small farm-house at the west end of the green, is all that remains of the once large mansion, Pountney Hall, the ancient seat of the Clarkes'. The parish church of Saint Mary the Virgin is a building of early date; its tower fell down in 1735, and was never restored: the living is a rectory, in the patronage of the Crown.

HOXNE village, pleasant and well built, is 3½ miles N.E. from Eye, 5 E.S.E. from Diss (Norfolk), and 6 s. w. from Harleston; situated near the confluence of the Dove and Waveney streams, and on a line of railway, now constructing, from the Eastern Union to Yarmouth, through Bungay. Oakley Park, formerly called Hoxne Hall, has been chiefly rebuilt by Sir Edward Kerrison, the present proprietor. The mansion is elegant and spacious, in the Grecian style of architecture, and the park is extensive, and finely studded with oaks, beech, &c. The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul is rather a handsome building: the living is a vicarage, with that of Denham annexed, in the gift of the baronet above-mentioned.

Adjoining Hoxne, is the parish of OAKLEY, the village of which is small, and presents nothing worthy of mention but its church—an unpretending and ancient edifice, dedicated to Saint Nicholas: the living is a rectory, united to that of Broome.

BROOME parish is contiguous to that of Oakley; the village being situated 2 miles N.E. of Eye, on the Norwich road. Broome Hall, the residence of Edward Clarence Kerrison, Esq., is a fine old family mansion, with curiously ornamented chimneys, said to have been built by Sir Thomas Cornwallis, who died in 1590; and the Church of Saint Mary contains some handsome monuments to members of that family. The living of Broome is a rectory, with Oakley annexed, in the gift of Sir Edward Kerrison.

The parishes above-mentioned (except Hoxne), are in the hundred of Hartismere, and all are included in the parliamentary borough of Eye: their population in 1841 was as follows:—YAXLEY, 507; MELLIS, 532; HOXNE, (in the hundred of its name), 1,333; OAKLEY, 355; BROOME, 610.

FRAMLINGHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

FRAMLINGHAM is a parish, in North Lowes hundred—the market town, a small one, is 87 miles N.E. from London, 18 N.E. by N. from Ipswich, and 8 E. from Debenham; pleasantly situated on an eminence, near the source of the river Ore. The town which contains several well-built houses, and some respectable shops and inns, is of great antiquity—its name being composed of the Saxon words *fremdling* and *ham*, meaning the habitation of strangers or foreigners. Its principal ornaments are the church and the ruins of its ancient castle—the latter situated on a clay hill, on the north side of the town, having on the west side a mead, or marsh, formerly a lake. Of the outer wall, yet standing, it has been justly remarked, that it still looks more like a castle than the ruins of one. It is supposed to have been erected by Redwald, the most powerful king of the East Angles; its form is rather an irregular curve, approaching to a circle. The walls are forty-four feet high and eight thick, flanked with thirteen square towers, fourteen feet higher than the ramparts; and these, together with the battlements, remain in sufficient perfection to afford a tolerable idea of the whole. It was one of the seats of St. Edmund, the king and martyr; and to this fortress he fled, in the year 870, from the relentless Danes; from whence, being hard pressed, and without hopes of succour, he endeavoured to escape, but was overtaken in his flight, and put to death by these invaders. To this castle Queen Mary, of ruth-

less memory, retired on the death of her brother, Edward VI. Framlingham is a polling station at the election of members to represent East Suffolk; and it is included in the thirty-fourth circuit of County Court towns, under the new act for adjudicating claims to any amount not exceeding £20—the court is held monthly.

The parish church of Saint Michael is a stately and capacious structure, built entirely of black flint, with a square tower, ninety feet high, embattled and strengthened with buttresses, and contains a clock and musical-chimes. The interior is kept in excellent condition, and there are many monuments, of great antiquity; in a fine state of preservation—some of these to the memory of the earls and dukes of Norfolk, and others of the nobility, are full of interest. The living is a rectory, in the gift of the Master and Fellows of Pembroke Hall, Cambridge. The Rev. George Attwood is the present incumbent. There are places of worship for Independents and Wesleyan Methodists, and a chapel of ease at Saxtead, in this parish. The charities consist of some almshouses founded by Sir Robert Hitcham, and others by Thomas Mills, a free school, founded by the first-named gentleman, for forty poor children, and an apprenticeship fund, attached to the school. The market is held on Saturday, in a spacious area. Fairs Whit-Monday and October 10th. The parish contained, in 1831, 2,445 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,523.

**HADLEIGH AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

**HADLEIGH** is a parish, in the hundred of Cosford—the market-town is 64 miles N. E. from London (69½ by rail), and about 9½ w. by s. from Ipswich (12½ by rail), and is situated on a branch (7½ miles in length) which joins the Eastern Union railway at Bentley. The town, which is seated in a valley, on the river Breton, was formerly a corporate one, governed by a mayor, aldermen and common council; but a *quo warranto* being brought against them, they surrendered their charter in the reign of James the II, and it has never been restored. The county magistrates now possess the municipal jurisdiction, and hold petty sessions for business connected with the town and division: courts baron are held for the manor; and Hadleigh is included in the thirty-fourth circuit of towns under the County Court act, passed in 1846, for adjudicating claims and debts to any amount not exceeding £20; this court is held monthly. Hadleigh is a polling station at the election of members to represent West Suffolk. The only branch now existing here under the head of manufactures, is that of silk-throwing, by a firm which has been established for some years. Malt is made here in large quantities, and there are four flour mills doing a good business.

The principal ornament of Hadleigh is its church of

**HALESWORTH**

IS a parish in the hundred of Blything—the market town is 100 miles N.E. from London; 31 N.E. by N. from Ipswich; and 18 S.S.W. from Lowestoft—the last-named is at present the nearest railway station; but a line is being constructed from the Norwich and Yarmouth railway to Halesworth by way of Beccles. The town is situated in a valley, on the banks of the river Blyth, which is navigable for barges hence to its mouth at Southwold. Though a place of considerable antiquity, it contains nothing worthy of notice excepting its handsome church and a chantry. Malting is carried on here extensively, there are several breweries, and a good business is done in corn on the market days. The magistrates of the hundred hold quarterly meetings here, and manorial courts are held occasionally. Halesworth is a polling station at the election of members to represent East Suffolk; and is included in the thirty-fourth circuit of towns, under the County Court act, passed in 1846, for adjudicating claims and debts to any amount not exceeding £20.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a noble edifice, constructed of flint, with a low but handsome tower, in which is a beautiful clock. The church, a few

years since, received an addition of more than two hundred sittings, the expense of which was partly defrayed by the incorporated church society. The living is a discharged rectory, with the vicarage of Chediston annexed; the Rev. Joseph Badeley is the present incumbent. The Independents have a place of worship; and there are almshouses for fourteen poor widows. The principal seat in this neighbourhood is 'Heaveningham Hall,' belonging to Lord Huntingfield: the mansion is a magnificent edifice two hundred feet in length, adorned with Corinthian columns and other chaste ornaments; and being seated on rising ground, appears to great advantage from various parts of the extensive park: the latter is clothed with fine plantations; and the avenue that leads to it from the porter's lodge is of great length and beauty. A fine sheet of water is spread out in front of the building; and the interior is embellished by a valuable collection of pictures, chiefly of the Dutch and Flemish masters. The market is held on Tuesday; and an annual fair for cattle on the 29th of October. The population of the parish in 1831 was 2,473; and in 1841, 2,662.

**HAVERHILL**

IS a market-town and parish—the latter chiefly in the hundred of Ris-bridge, Suffolk, and a small part in the hundred of Hinckford, Essex, being also situated close to the border of Cambridgeshire; 59 miles N.N.E. from London, and 34 w. from Ipswich. It was formerly a place of much greater consequence than at present, having had two churches and a strong castle—of which latter but few if any vestiges remain. The principal street is spacious, and nearly a mile in length; but the houses are indifferently built. The land about here, as is the general portion of this part of Suffolk, is in a fine state of agriculture: the scenery is too little contrasted for the views to be considered striking, though partaking of all the beauties to be discovered in well-cultivated districts. There are several tasteful residences in the neighbourhood of Haverhill, some of which are in delightful situations. The principal trade and manu-

facture of the town, is weaving a coarse description of twilled cotton cloth, called drabbet, used principally for wagners' froeks; there is also a silk manufactory on a small scale. Sir George H. W. Beaumont, Bart., is lord of the manor, and holds courts leet and baron; at one of the former, constables and other officers are appointed annually.

The present church, a large and ancient structure, is dedicated to Saint Mary: the living is a vicarage in the gift of the lord of the manor; the present incumbent is the Rev. Robert Roberts. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents and the Society of Friends. A national school, erected in the year of Jubilee, is well supported by subscriptions. The market, now but indifferently attended, is held on Friday. Fairs, May 12th and August 26th, for cattle, toys, and pedlery. The parish contained in 1831, 1,758 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,451.

## IPSWICH AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

IPSWICH is a market town and port, a borough both corporate and parliamentary, the county town, and a liberty of itself; 69 miles N.E. from London, 54 S.S.W. from Yarmouth, 43 S. from Norwich, 24 N.N.W. from Harwich by land, and 12 by water, and 18 N.N.E. from Colchester. The following are rail distances—from London 68 miles, from Norwich 45½; from Bury Saint Edmunds, 26½, from Diss, the same, from Colchester, 16½, and from Stowmarket, 12. The town is pleasantly situated on an acclivity, washed on the west and south by the river Orwell, over which is a handsome iron bridge, and another at the entrance into the town from the London road. It is a principal station on the Eastern Union Railway, and by means of this line holds immediate and rapid communication with the metropolis and the southern and western parts of the kingdom, and with Norwich and Yarmouth on the north; while, in connexion with the Eastern Counties Railway, an intercourse is effected with the North Western lines of railway, and the distant districts in that direction. The name of the place is obtained from the river Gyppen or Gipping, which empties itself into the Orwell just above the town; and in Domesday-book is written *Gyppesvid*, *Gyppesriz* and *Gyppeswic* which, by dropping the guttural, was pronounced *Ypswiche*, and subsequently Ipswich. The original defences of the town were destroyed by the Danes, but were restored by King John, and portions of the latter still exist. The walls were provided with four gates, named after the cardinal points; and from the gates the four wards into which the town was divided obtained their appellations. The more ancient streets are not formed with regularity, and, being likewise rather narrow, do not impart a favourable impression; but many of the shops are elegant; the town is well paved and gas-lighted; while the formation of some handsome new streets has added much to the uniformity of its general appearance. The river Orwell is navigable to the sea at Harwich, and affords to the inhabitants a delightful aquatic excursion, through varied scenery, abounding with charming seats and elegant mansions: in England, perhaps, there is not another river of its extent that can equal it in beauty, being wooded on each side to the very water's edge.

The public buildings of Ipswich, exclusive of the churches, are numerous; the following are the principal.—One of the most beautiful edifices here, formerly, was Saint Mildred's church, once parochial; the principal part having been taken down, the remainder was converted into a town-hall: it is situated on the Corn hill, and contains a sessions hall, in which the borough courts are held, a spacious council chamber, with rooms for the magistrates, grand jury, officers, &c. The police station is also within the building, and the upper story is occupied by the Ipswich Literary Institution. The custom house, on the quay, is more useful than ornamental. The corn exchange on Corn hill, is conveniently fitted up with stands. The barracks, situated on an eminence, are healthful and commodious; this is, occasionally, the head-quarters of troops, stationed in the eastern counties. Immediately in the rear of the barracks is the 'East Suffolk Hospital and Dispensary,' a handsome structure and a valuable institution, well sustained by voluntary contributions. In 1810 the present market-place was constructed at a short distance from the old one; it con-

sists of an outer and inner quadrangle, each of which is encircled by a range of buildings, supported on stone columns: the entire cost about £10,000; adjoining is an enclosed cattle market. The county gaol and house of correction (erected in 1786), is judiciously arranged, as regards both the morals and health of the prisoners: near the same spot stands the borough gaol. One of the greatest improvements made to the port, was the construction of the wet dock, which was finished in 1842, at a cost of £125,000: its surface presents an area of thirty-two acres, with a depth of fourteen feet of water, and a quay 2,780 feet in length and thirty feet in breadth. Communication with London by water is maintained by both steam and sailing vessels; and as the means of transport have increased, the trade and prosperity of the town have been proportionably augmenting. The facility of railway communication has been previously adverted to. The antiquary, amongst the many relics that must arrest his attention in this place, will feel peculiar interest in viewing a remarkable dwelling occupied by Mr. Sparrowe, in the Old Butter-market; it was built in 1567 by Robert Sparrowe, Esq., and has never been inhabited by any other than persons of that name; its exterior is ornamented with figures symbolical of Europe, Asia, Africa, and America, and a variety of other emblematical decorations, rudely sculptured; the royal arms of Charles II, executed in a better style, are on the front of the house. A tradition exists in the family, that, for some time after the disastrous battle of Worcester, that monarch was secreted in an apartment in the roof of the house, the entrance into which was ingeniously concealed by a sliding panel. The ancient gateway, the only remaining portion of Wolsey's college, likewise will attract the observation of the curious: the cardinal was a native of Ipswich.

About the middle of the seventeenth century, from the loss of its manufactures of woollen and sail cloth, &c. Ipswich suffered many reverses both in trade and commerce; but, towards the close of the last century, it recovered from the shock, and has since continued rapidly to increase in importance and population, and now, by means of the capacious wet dock, hundreds of vessels can be accommodated with floating berths at all times of tide. The principal commerce of Ipswich is in corn and coal, and large quantities of grain and malt are forwarded to the metropolitan market. The number of registered vessels belonging to the port in 1847, was 181, of the aggregate burden of 14,611 tons, and employing about 960 men. During the year 1847, there were imported 101,493 tons of coals, coke and cinders, and nearly 50,000lbs. of tea; the customs duties, paid during the same period, amounted to £30,406. About 300,000 quarters of corn are exported annually to London and other markets, besides malt and flour to a very large amount. A general foreign trade of considerable extent is also carried on: and, since Ipswich has become a bonded port for foreign timber, the trade with the Baltic has considerably improved. The manufactures of the town are also on the increase, and prospering. The oldest and largest in the town is carried on by Messrs. Ransomes and May, consisting of an iron foundry, engine works, and the largest agricultural implement manufactory in England, giving employment to upwards of one thousand persons. There is also another large foundry—

that of Messrs. Hurwood and Turner, employing a great number of hands in the manufacture of agricultural implements. Another important establishment, is that of Messrs. Ransome and Parsons, patentees for the manufacture of artificial stone—an invention which is likely to become of great consequence, and is now extensively used for grindstones, architectural ornaments, mouldings, chimney-pieces, floorings, statuary, &c. The finer description of paper is also extensively made here by a company, using Ransome's patent, sizing, parting and drying machines, and worked by powerful steam machinery. There are also several breweries in the town, two extensive ship-building yards, with patent slips, an oilcake manufactory, several corn mills; and the malting business is, perhaps, of greater importance and extent here, than in any other town of its size in England.

King John, in the first year of his reign, granted the original charter of incorporation to Ipswich, bearing date May 25th, 1199; by it the burgesses were exempted from the payment of tolls and customs in the different parts of the kingdom—a privilege enjoyed to this day, by such masters of vessels as are free of the borough; but as the immunity extended only to such taxes and customs as were then in force, it is now comparatively valueless. Edward I, in the 13th of his reign, seized the borough; but afterwards, receiving some service from the ships furnished by the town, confirmed the charters of King John and Henry III: these were renewed by succeeding monarchs; and Charles II, in consequence of some jealousies among the inhabitants, granted them another charter, which remained in force, until the passing of the Municipal Reform Act, in 1835, which vested the government in a high steward (elected for life), a mayor, ten aldermen and thirty councillors, assisted by a recorder and the other usual officers, under the style of 'the Bailiffs, Burgesses and Commonalty of the Town or Borough of Ipswich': the same act divided the town into five wards, and provided for it a special commission of the peace; under the latter there were nine local justices, and the corporation have an efficient police force. The county courts, erected in 1836-7, are in front of the county gaol, in Saint Helen-street, and, being built of white brick, in the Tudor or Gothic style, with towers and embattlements, form a remarkably attractive object amongst the buildings of the town. In the centre is the main entrance to the prison, while the wings contain the criminal and the Nisi Prius courts, in which are held the summer county assizes. The sessional business for the county is likewise transacted here, in January, April, June and October; and the County Court is held monthly, under the act passed in 1846, for adjudicating claims and debts, to any amount not exceeding £20. The borough first returned members to parliament in the 23rd of Edward I, and from that period it has uninterruptedly exercised that privilege: the present representatives are, John Chevallier Cobbold, Esq, and Hugh Edward Adair, Esq. The return of members, to represent East Suffolk, is made from this town.

Ipswich comprises twelve parishes, and there are as many churches, besides a chapel of ease; to some of them are attached interesting features, architectural or sepulchral—but our space will not admit of a detailed notice of the several attractions. They are respectively dedicated to Saint Clement, Saint Helen, Saint Lawrence, Saint Margaret, Saint Mary-at-Elms, Saint Mary-at-the-Key, Saint Mary Stoke, Saint Mary-at-the-Tower, Saint Matthew, Saint Nicholas, Saint Peter, Saint Stephen, and the Holy Trinity—the latter a chapel of ease to Saint Clements. There are also places of worship belonging to various religious denominations, including Baptists, Independents, Unitarians, Methodists, the Society of Friends, Roman Catholics and Jews—a list of these, with their ministers, will be seen in the directory, and of all other public edifices, institutions, educational establishments, &c. In its charitable and scientific institutions Ipswich cannot be excelled by any place of similar prosperity and population. The grammar school, a magnificent foundation, is mentioned so early as the 17th year of Edward IV. The grey-coat boys' and blue-coat girls' was established in 1709, for educating and apprenticing the pupils. There are several other public schools, parochial and otherwise, and one for qualifying girls to become useful servants. Tooley and Smart's foundations, as they are called, are for the support of persons maimed in the king's service or otherwise. Christ's hospital is for the relief of aged individuals and children. There is an excellent charity for the relief of poor widows and orphans of clergymen of the established church; with various other charities of minor importance, all tending to alleviate the sufferings and diminish the wants of the indigent. A society for literary purposes was formed by some gentlemen in 1818, under the name of the 'Philological Society.' Among the places of amusement may be mentioned a small theatre, erected in 1805; assembly rooms opened in 1820, and the Ipswich museum in 1847—the latter furnished with a great variety of specimens in natural history, &c. with a library of valuable works. In 1824 a mechanics' institution was established, which is flourishing, and has a good library and a museum: it occupies a large building in Tavern street, containing a spacious lecture room, reading room, committee and class rooms. Three newspapers are published in Ipswich weekly—their titles, publishers, &c. are given in the Directory; and there are several excellent libraries, subscription as well as circulating. The markets are held on Tuesday and Saturday; the first is for corn and cattle, in which very considerable business is transacted; the latter for provisions of all kinds. Fairs May 4th, called St. George's fair, for cattle and toys; August 22nd, for Lambs, and September 25th, for cheese and butter. The lamb fair is the largest of the kind in the kingdom; from 100,000 to 130,000 are annually exhibited in the field, and the fair is attended by all the great dealers in the surrounding counties. The population of the borough and parishes, in 1831, was 20,454, and in 1841, 25,384.

**IXWORTH, PAKENHAM, STANTON,**

**AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

IXWORTH is a parish in the hundred of Blackbourn—the town small and neat, and formerly having a market, is 78 miles N.E. by N. from London; 9 w. s. w. from Botesdale; 10 s. s. E. from Thetford (Norfolk); and 7 north-east from Bury Saint Edmunds—the last named the nearest railway station. It is a place of little trade or note and only remembered by the antiquary, from there having been a religious house founded here in 1100, in a pleasant valley by the side of the small river Thet. The Norton family afterwards built a neat mansion upon the site of the ancient priory, which is now occupied by Richard Norton Cartwright, Esq., the lord of the manor, for which courts leet and baron are held occasionally; and the magistrates sit in petty sessions here every Monday.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a small structure with a tower; several handsome monuments impart interest to the interior of the church, which is neat and clean: the living is a perpetual curacy in the gift of the lord of the manor; the present incumbent is the Rev. Samuel Blackhall. The Baptists and the Wesleyan Methodists have each a place of worship; and there is a national school lately opened. About

one mile hence dwelt Anne Ravner, the distracted girl of Ixworth Thorpe—celebrated in a poem by Bloomfield, with all the pathos, and perhaps more naive interest about it, than even characterizes Sterne's Maria. The market of Ixworth is now scarcely observed, but an annual fair is held on the 13th of May. The number of inhabitants in the parish in 1831, was 1,061, and in 1841, 1,064.

PAKENHAM village is about 2 miles s. from Ixworth. The parish church of Saint Mary is a neat building with the tower rising from its centre: the living is a discharged vicarage in the presentation of Lord Calthorpe; the present incumbent is the Rev. Chas. Jones. Population of the parish in 1831, 979; in 1841, 1,102.

STANTON is a village, comprised in the united parishes of All Saints and Saint John the Baptist, 3 miles N.E. from Ixworth, in the same hundred as that town. There are still two churches, but for all ecclesiastical and parochial purposes the benefices are united in one rectory, having been consolidated since 1457, and is within the diocese of Norwich. A pleasure fair is held here annually on the last day in May. Population of the joint parishes in 1831, 1,035; in 1841, 1,029.

**LAVENHAM**

As a parish, in the hundred of Babergh—the town, which at one time enjoyed a tolerably frequented market, is 63 miles N.E. from London, between 16 and 17 w. by N. from Ipswich, 8 s. from Bury Saint Edmunds, 10 N.W. from Hadleigh, and 7 N. from Sudbury: the last-named a station, on a branch line communicating with the Eastern Counties railway. The town is agreeably seated in a salubrious valley, nearly surrounded by hills, except on the south, and on a branch of the river Brit, from whence the town has a gradual ascent. It consists of nine small divisions or streets, the houses composing which are old and ill-built; but the market-place is spacious, and has a stone cross in its centre. Lavenham was once famous for its manufacture of blue cloths, and afterwards yarn from wool was made here, also says and calimancoes; at present the only manufacture is that of worsted yarns, and silk throwing. The town was formerly governed by six capital burgesses, who were chosen for life, assisted by inferior officers; but their municipal power has long since ceased, and the local and county magistrates are now the chief authorities. Lavenham is a polling station at the election of members to represent West Suffolk.

The principal, indeed, the only ornament of Lavenham is, its church, of Saint Peter, justly accounted one of the most beautiful fabrics of its kind in the county. The greater portion is of freestone, the remainder being of curious flint work. The steeple, admirable both for its strength and beauty, is one hundred and forty feet high; it contains six powerful bells, much admired by the curious, particularly the tenor, which, though it weighs but 23 cwt., is in sound, equal to one of 40 cwt. The roof of the church is finely carved, and the windows embellished with beautiful stained glass. The living is a rectory, in the patronage of the Master and Fellows of Caius College, Cambridge; the present incumbent is the Rev. Richard Johnson. There are places of worship for Independents and Wesleyan Methodists; a free grammar school, founded in 1647, by Richard Peacock, Esq.; a National school, and almshouses, sustained by some old town lands. The market, which is entitled to be holden on Tuesday, has almost fallen into disuse: there are, however, two annual fairs; one for butter and cheese, which commences on the 10th of October, and lasts four days; the other for horses, on Shrove Tuesday. The parish contained in 1831, 2,107 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,871.

**LONG MELFORD**

Is a parish, in the hundred of Babergh—the village large and populous, is 59 miles N.E. by N. from London, 22 w. from Ipswich, 13½ s. from Bury Saint Edmunds, and 3 N. by W. from Sudbury—the last-named a station on a branch communicating with the Eastern Counties railway at the Mark's Tey Junction. The village, which consists principally of one long street, nearly a mile in length, is seated in a district, perhaps, the most fertile in the county; and the scenery around is pleasingly diversified and picturesque: it is washed by a branch of the Stour, which is crossed by a bridge of three arches, and the stream propels the machinery of several flour mills. The manufacture of horse-hair seating, employs several of the inhabitants; but the majority are occupied in agricultural pursuits. Sir Hyde Parker, Bart., of Melford Hall (a fine old seat in this parish), is lord of the manor, and holds a court baron annually; and the magistrates assemble in petty sessions here once a fortnight.

The parish church of the Holy Trinity, stands upon an eminence, at the north end of the village: it is a beautiful specimen of the architecture of the fifteenth century, but the small square tower is of later date. In the church are several monuments to distinguished individuals, who formerly resided here—one of these, to Sir William Cordell, is an elegant piece of tomb statuary: he was the speaker of the House of Commons, in the reign of Mary, and a member of her privy council. He founded the hospital here, and endowed it for the support of a warden, and twelve poor men and two women—old and decayed housekeepers. There is a place of worship for Independents, and two public schools—one of the latter endowed, the other conducted upon the National plan, and both for children of either sex. A considerable cattle fair is held on Thursday in Whitsun-week. The parish contained, by the returns made in 1831, 2,514 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,597

**LOWESTOFT,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF PAKEFIELD, KIRKLEY AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**LOWESTOFT** is a parish, in the hundred of Lothlingland, containing the market town and sea-port of its name, 114 miles N.E. by N. from London (136 by rail), 224 E.S.E. from Norwich (by rail), 10 s. from Yarmouth (184 by rail), and 45 N.E. by N. from Ipswich. It is the terminus of a line from the Norwich and Yarmouth railway, and is situated at the most easterly point of land in England, upon the summit of a cliff, commanding an extensive prospect of the German Ocean; and as beheld from the sea, presents the noblest and most beautiful appearance of any town upon the coast. It is chiefly composed of an extensive arrangement of houses, whose line of direction is nearly north and south, and consequently faces the ocean: the soil upon which it stands is dry, and by skillful industry has been converted into delightful gardens. The marine Esplanade (for which the Messrs. Lucas and Son, were the contractors), erected at the south end of the town, contains many handsome residences, principally in the Italian style of architecture, and have been expressly built for the accommodation of visitors, during the summer months. The royal hotel, situated at the north end of the esplanade, close to one of the piers, is an elegant building, fitted up in the most modern style, and contains reading and billiard rooms, with hot and cold sea-water baths, &c.

The commerce of Lowestoft depends mainly upon the herring fishery; and the quantity of this fish cured here, for home consumption and exportation, is very great. The London fishmongers are said to prefer the Lowestoft herrings to those cured at Yarmouth, though they are generally retailed under the name of 'Yarmouth herrings.' From the mackerel fishery, in which the Lowestoft boats participate, the principal advantage derived is the employment of the fishermen until the herring season. The Norwich and Lowestoft navigation is of essential benefit to the commerce of the port, as it opens a direct water communication with the city of Norwich, and the towns of Bungay and Beccles, to the sea, for vessels of moderate burden. The construction of a safe and capacious asylum harbour, to which shipping may resort during adverse winds and stress of weather, instead of being exposed, as formerly, to the diluvial and dangers of the open roadstead has lately been accomplished. The outer harbour is formed by two stone piers, and encloses a space of about twenty acres—this is connected with the inner one, by a lock fifty feet wide, and crossed by a handsome swing bridge. From the railway station here, there are branches to the quays, so that vessels can load and discharge their cargoes with perfect convenience. The harbour is defended by a fort, at the south end of the beach, another at the north

end, and a battery near the Ness. The shore gradually descends to the sea; the water is clear, and covers a firm pebbly bottom—circumstances that render bathing on this part of the coast peculiarly delightful. The air is decidedly salubrious; and the accommodations and amusements provided for visitors, in reading rooms, assemblies, regattas, races, the theatre, baths, and excellent hotels, cannot well fail of giving satisfaction to the most fastidious. The races are held on the Downs, northward of the town, which form an excellent course; the cliffs, rising in a gentle acclivity, present a natural amphitheatre, sufficiently extensive for the accommodation of almost any number of spectators. The county magistrates hold petty sessions weekly, and the lord of the manor courts occasionally; and Lowestoft is included in the thirty-fourth circuit of County Court towns under the acts, passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount, not exceeding £20.

The parish church of Saint Margaret, is a large and handsome structure, with a tower, terminated by a spire; in the chancel is a fine window of stained glass; a large brazen eagle, in this sanctuary, was formerly used as the reading desk. Lord Chief Justice Holt was buried in this church, and there is an elegant monument to his memory. The living is a discharged vicarage, in the patronage of the Crown. Saint Peter's, a chapel of ease, is a handsome building of Gothic architecture, erected partly by subscriptions, aided by the commissioners for building churches and chapels: it has accommodation for a congregation of twelve hundred. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents and Wesleyan Methodists. Amongst the charitable and educational institutions are two free schools, of ancient foundations; others upon the National plan, and for infants; almshouses for aged fishermen; a dispensary; an infirmary, and several other charities, by which the poor of the parish are assisted. The market is held on Wednesday; and the fairs, May 12th, and October 10th. The parish of Lowestoft, contained in 1831, 4,238 inhabitants, and in 1841, 4,647.

About two miles south from Lowestoft, in the same hundred as that town, are the two small fish-ing villages and parishes of PAKEFIELD and KIRKLEY, the latter not so distant as the former. Although mentioned as a distinct parish, Kirkley, is generally understood to be under Pakefield, the living of which is a rectory, in the presentation of the Earl of Gosford. Through the benevolence of the Rev. Francis Cunningham, children of either sex, and infants likewise, are instructed in their respective schools. The population of Pakefield, and Kirkley parishes respectively, in 1841, was 495 and 433.

**MENDLESHAM** is a parish, in the hundred of  
Harrismere—the town, which formerly had a market,  
is 81 miles N.E. from London, 15 N.W. from Ipswich,  
about 7 N. from Stowmarket, and 3 S.E. from Fin-  
ningham—the two last named stations on the Eastern  
Union railway. It is situated in a deep miry soil, near  
the source of the river Deben, and consists of two  
principal streets, the houses of which are but ill-built;  
and the town in general, as well as the approaches to  
it, are by no means prepossessing. The inhabitants are  
mostly employed in agriculture, the land in the neigh-  
bourhood producing heavy crops of beans, wheat and  
oats. Charles Tyrrell, Esq. is lord of the manor: two  
constables, the only municipal officers, are appointed  
at his court.

The parish church of Saint Mary, was given by  
William Rufus, to the abbott and convent of Battle, in  
Sussex: the living is a vicarage, of which the Rev.  
Robert Field, is the patron, and the Rev. Thomas  
Henry Day, L.L.D. is the present vicar. There are  
places of worship for Independents, Baptists, and  
Wesleyan Methodists, and a free school, with a small  
endowment. Towards the end of the seventeenth  
century, an ancient silver crown, weighing about sixty  
ounces, and supposed to belong to one of the Kings  
of the East Angles, was found here. A fair is held on  
the 2nd and 3rd of October, principally for pleasure,  
pedlary, &c. The population of Mendlesham parish,  
by the returns rendered in 1831, was 1,233, and in  
1841, 1,340.

**MILDENHALL** is a market town in the parish of Mildenhall St. Andrew, and hundred of Lackford; 72 miles N.E. from London, 38 N.W. from Ipswich, 22 N.E. from Cambridge, 15 E. by S. from Ely, 9 N. from Newmarket, the same distance by W. from Brandon, and between 11 and 12 miles S.W. from Thetford (Norfolk)—the two last-named places, stations on the Eastern Counties Railway. The town is pleasantly situated upon the river Lark, which, being navigable for barges to Lynn, has considerably added to its trade and prosperity, and created a tolerable business in grain and coal for the supply of places inland. The town consists of several streets, some of which form detached portions, and extend towards the fens in the east. Sir Henry Edward Bunbury is lord of the manor, and holds a court as occasion requires; and Mildenhall is included in the thirty-sixth circuit of County Courts, under the new act for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20. A high constable is appointed annually; but the town is within the jurisdiction of the county magistrates, who meet here for the despatch of business. This place is a polling station at the election of members to represent West Suffolk; and it is the centre of the Mildenhall Union of thirteen

parishes, formed under the provisions of the New Poor Law.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a large, handsome structure, with a roof of wood, richly carved, a spacious nave, two side-aisles, and a chancel. The entrance is through a fine Gothic porch, and the interior contains several handsome monuments to the family of the Norths: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of the lord of the manor; the present incumbent is the Rev. Samuel Banks. There are places of worship for Baptists and Wesleyan Methodists; a National school supported by subscriptions; and an almshouse for four widows, founded in 1722, by Sir Thomas Hanmer. The market is held on Friday, an annual fair on the 11th of October, and a statute for hiring servants in the beginning of the same month. The parish contained in 1831, 3,267 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,731.

About a mile south-east from Mildenhall, in the same hundred, is the village and parish of BARTON MILLS, containing a church, dedicated to St. Mary, and a Baptist chapel. The living is a rectory, in the gift of the Crown: the present incumbent is the Rev. Charles Chichester. The population of the parish, in 1831, was 591, and in 1841, 640.

## NAYLAND, STOKE, BURES AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**NAYLAND** is a parish in the hundred of Babergh—the small town, formerly possessing a market, is 57 miles N.E. from London, 16 s.w. from Ipswich, and about 6 s.w. from Colchester (Essex)—a station on the Eastern Union Railway; seated on the north bank of the Stour, over which is a large bridge of one arch, leading into Essex. This town was once famous in the clothing line, and had many wealthy resident manufacturers; but it has long since lost that trade, and is now undistinguished by any other—agriculture being the general pursuit of the inhabitants. One Abel, a cloth-worker, is said to have built the handsome porch of the church, in the wall of which he has a monument—and to signify his name, as also to make up his coat of arms, the letter 'A' and the figure of a 'bell' are cast upon the monument. The church, which is dedicated to Saint James, stands in the middle of the town, and with its spire steeple is the principal ornament of it. Nayland formerly a chapelry under Stoke-juxta-Nayland, is now a distinct parish. The market has been long discontinued, but there is still a fair on the first Wednesday after the 2nd of October. The parish contained in 1831, 1,047 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1 114.

**STOKE-BY-NAYLAND**, is a pleasant village, 2 miles N.E. by N. from Nayland, and 6 s.s.w. from Hadleigh. The church of Stoke, is a spacious structure, with a lofty tower, which may be seen as far off as Harwich,

a distance of twenty miles: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of Sir J. R. Rowley, Bart.; the Rev. Charles M. Torlesse, M.A. is the present incumbent. On Leaven heath, near the site of an old burial ground, formerly used by the Society of Friends, a neat chapel of ease was erected a few years ago for the accommodation of the western parts of the parish. A Roman Catholic chapel, and a National school are in the village, and another of the latter on Leaven heath. Sir Joshua R. Rowley, Bart. (before named), of Tending Hall (a beautiful seat, near Stoke), is lord of the manor, and holds a court leet annually at Easter. Population of Stoke parish, in 1831, 1,447, and in 1841, 1,362.

**BURES** is a village, situated on the borders of Suffolk and Essex, in the parish of Saint Mary, which is partly in Hineckford hundred, Essex; about 4½ miles w. from Nayland, near the banks of the navigable Stour, and on the Stour Valley railway, which communicates with the Eastern Counties line at Coggeshall. The making of malt, at one time, was carried on here extensively, and it is now the leading branch. The parish church of Saint Mary boasts high antiquity: the living is a vicarage, of which Osgood Hanbury, Esq. is patron, and the Rev. Arthur Hanbury the vicar. The Baptists have a small chapel here. A fair is held on Holy Thursday. The parish of Saint Mary contained, in 1831, 1,559 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,596.

**NEEDHAM MARKET,**

AS its name implies, is a market town, and, though locally situated in the hundred of Bosmere and Claydon, in the county of Suffolk—is, in fact, a chapelry in the hundred of Barking, Essex. It is 71 miles N.E. from London (76½ by rail), 36½ s. from Norwich, 8½ N.N.W. from Ipswich, and 17½ E.S.E. from Bury Saint Edmunds (all rail distances) situated on the line of the Eastern Union Railway. The river Gippen and the Stowmarket and Ipswich canal pass near to the town; and there is a lake called Bosmere in the vicinity, which gives name to the hundred. It is a tolerably well-built place—the houses are in general neat and many of them handsome: the surrounding country is pleasant and abounds in agreeable walks. Needham was formerly a place of consideration from its woollen manufactures: this branch has entirely disappeared, and the produce of the land is now its staple. The Earl of Ashburnham is lord of the manor, and holds, by his steward, courts leet and baron annually, when constables and other officials are appointed. Needham is a polling station at

the election of members to represent the eastern division of the county.

The places of worship are the chapel of ease—of Saint John, an ancient edifice, a handsome chapel for Independents, erected in 1837, and a meeting house for the Society of Friends. The living of Needham is a perpetual curacy, and the appointment of the minister is vested in the inhabitants; the present incumbent is the Rev. George Alexander Paske. The Free Grammar School here was founded under the provisions of the will of Francis Theobald, Esq., and endowed for the education of twenty-one poor children. An almshouse for eight aged and indigent persons is the only other charity. The principal seats in this neighbourhood are Barking Hall, the property of the Earl of Ashburnham, and Shrubland Park, the seat of Sir William F. F. Middleton. The market is held on Wednesday, and a fair October 28th and the two following days. The chapelry contained in 1831, 1466 inhabitants, and by the returns for 1841, 1,353.

## ORFORD

IS a parish in the hundred of Plomesgate—the town, a borough corporate, and formerly holding a market, is 88 miles N.E. by E. from London, and 19 E. by N. from Ipswich; situated at the south-eastern extremity of the county, on the banks of the Ore, where it flows into the German Ocean; and from which river the name of the place is said to be derived. At a former period, this place must have been of much greater extent and consequence than it is now—for, it is stated, by early historians, to have at one time contained twelve churches: at this day its appearance is nothing more than that of a scattered fishing village; and the only objects attached to it, that can be likely to interest the stranger or tourist, are some pleasing marine and land views, and the imposing ruins of its ancient castle. This fortress stands upon an eminence westward of the town, and the spot is said to have been once the centre of the place: the ruins, as they now stand, form a good sea-mark for ships coming from Holland. The decline of Orford is ascribed to the loss of its harbour from the retiring of the sea, and a dangerous bar thrown up at its mouth by the action of the waves. The inhabitants received a charter of incorporation prior to the reign of Richard III, and their privileges were confirmed by that monarch and by Elizabeth and James. The corporate body consists of a mayor, eight portmen, and twelve capital burgesses, assisted by a recorder

and other officers. The mayor and two portmen are justices of the peace, and are empowered to hold sessions twice a year. The burgesses returned two representatives to Parliament from the time of Henry VII until the Reform Bill passed, when the borough was disfranchised. Orford confers the title of Earl upon the family of Walpole.

The church, which is dedicated to St. Bartholomew, was, when entire, a spacious and imposing structure of great antiquity, with a square embattled tower. The chancel, now in ruins, appears to be more ancient than the rest of the building. The porch is curious and decorated with escutcheons, and the windows contain some beautiful tracery. In the church is a font, of elaborate workmanship and great antiquity. The columns, arches, and general architecture, is in the Norman style. The living is a perpetual curacy, with the rectory of Sudbourn annexed, in the gift of the Crown; the Rev. John Maynard is the present incumbent. There is a place of worship each for Independents and Primitive Methodists. At SUBBOURN, to the north of Orford, is Sudbourn Hall, a seat of the Marquess of Hertford's, surrounded by a fine park. The market is no longer attended, but a fair for toys and pleasure is held on the 24th of June. The parish contained by the returns made in 1831, 1,362 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,028.

**SAXMUNDHAM,**

WITH THE VILLAGES OF KELSEALE, LEISTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**S**AXMUNDHAM is a parish in the hundred of Plomesgate—the market town, small and neat, is 89 miles N.E. from London, 21 N.E. by N. from Ipswich, and 7 S.W. from Aldborough; seated in a valley, near a rivulet that runs into the Alde. It consists chiefly of one street, running from north to south, the houses of which are, for the most part, modern erections—the town having been much improved throughout within the last fifty years, and nearly all the habitations rebuilt or new fronted. Saxmundham is a polling station at the election of members to represent East Suffolk. The town is not benefited by any manufacture, unless that of malt may be mentioned, several persons being engaged in that branch.

The parish church of Saint John, is a neat edifice, situated a little to the south of the town, in a rural spot, embosomed in trees. Some few years since, it underwent a thorough repair, when nearly two hundred new sittings were added, partly at the expense of the church commissioners: the living is a discharged rectory, in the presentation of William Long, Esq., who is lord of the manor; the Rev. Lancelot Browne is the incumbent, and his present curate the Rev. Robert Mann. An endowment, by a rent charge, was made by William Corbold, for the instruction of a limited number of poor children of the parish. The surrounding grounds, belonging to the manor house, are justly admired, and contribute highly to the beauty of the

southern entrance to the town; the northern approach is also very fine, and the park, river and plantations present themselves to great advantage. The market, which was granted in the 4th of Edward II, is held on Thursday, and is a tolerable one for grain and cattle. Fairs, Tuesday in Whitsun week, and the first Thursday in October. The parish contained, in 1831, 1,048 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,097.

About one mile north from Saxmundham, in the hundred of Hoxne, is the village and parish of KELSEALE, strictly of an agricultural character. The church is dedicated to Saint Mary: the living is a rectory, consolidated with Carlton, in the patronage of the family of Bence. A free school, supported by various grants, is conducted upon the National plan. Population of the parish in 1831, 1,103; in 1841, 1,156.

LEISTON parish is in the hundred of Blything—the village is situated about 4 miles E. from Saxmundham, and about two from the sea-shore. A considerable iron foundry and manufactory of agricultural implements has been prosperously carried on here for several years, furnishing employment to many hands, and to the village an interest of which it would otherwise be destitute. The church is dedicated to Saint Margaret, the living is a perpetual curacy in the presentation of the Haberdasher's Company, London. The parish. (including SIZEWELL hamlet,) contained, in 1831, 1,070 inhabitants, and in 1841, 1,171

**SOUTHWOLD, DUNWICH, WANGFORD****AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

**S**OUTHWOLD is a market town, sea-port, and borough corporate, having separate jurisdiction, locally in the hundred of Blything; 105 miles N.E. from London, 36 N.E. from Ipswich, 31 S.E. from Norwich, 23 S. from Yarmouth, 13 S. from Lowestoft, and 10 E. from Halesworth—the two last named are the nearest railway towns. It is seated on an eminence that overlooks the German Ocean, and nearly encompassed by the Blyth river, over which a bridge leads into the town; although thus environed, and subject to the action of the tide, yet there are many fine springs, from which a large fleet may at any time be watered. The town obtained its name, probably, from the wood near it, as the appellation of 'Wood's-end Creek'

is still given to the western precincts. Formerly a few fishermen's huts only occupied the shore; but in proportion as the prosperity of the inhabitants increased good houses were erected, until it ultimately attained, a consequence equal to other places of more ancient significance upon the coast. From the eligibility of its situation, and the beach being admirable adapted to sea-bathing, Southwold has for a considerable time become the resort of visitors for that purpose, in the usual season. It has a fine promenade, a reading-room called the 'Casino,' an assembly room, and two principal inns—that of the Old Swan, in the Market-place, is a comfortable boarding and commercial house. On a cliff called the 'Gun Hill' is a battery, mounting,

six 18-ponnders; and under the cliff is a breakwater, extending upwards of three hundred yards into the sea. The public buildings, exclusive of the church, are the guildhall and the new gaol. Some years since the trade of the port was limited to the exportation of salt, herrings, sprats and beer; but the Blyth having been rendered navigable, an import trade of some importance, chiefly for the supply of the inland towns, has been created: it also derives some benefit from its connexion with the port of Yarmouth, of which it is a member. Several charters of incorporation have been granted to the inhabitants: that by William and Mary remained in force until 1835, when the Municipal Reform Act vested the government in a mayor, four aldermen, and twelve councillors, under the style of 'the Bailiffs, Aldermen and Buresses of the borough of Southwold.' Sessions are held for the trial of felons and other offenders; a court of record, for the recovery of debts to any amount, sits weekly; and there is a court of admiralty, at which the bailiffs preside. The operations of the new County Court, have, however, in a great measure, rendered applications to the old record court unnecessary.

The parish church of Saint Edmund is a very elegant edifice, with a tower steeple one hundred feet in height, composed of freestone tastefully intermixed with flint of various colours. It was originally a chapel of ease to Reydon, but in 1751 was made a distinct curacy, and endowed with Queen Anne's bounty; latterly it has become a vicarage, and the benefice is in the presentation of the Earl of Stradbroke; the Rev. Henry Birch is the pre-ent vicar. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents and Wesleyan Methodists. The market, held on Thursday, is abundantly supplied with all kinds of provisions; and there is a fair held on Trinity-Monday and the day following, for toys, pedlary, and pleasure. The parish contained in 1831, 1,875 inhabitants, and in 1841, 2,186.

market town, in the same hundred as Southwold, is nearly 5 miles s. from that town; situated on the summit of a loose cliff, and, from the encroachments of the sea, is reduced to the rank of a mere fishing village. That it was a Roman station is evident from coins and other relics of that people found here, and in 630 it was an episcopal see, Sir Henry Spelman in his account of Dunwich, reports that it once contained fifty-two churches and monasteries: all these have been engulfed, except one church, and that from its insecure and delapidated state, must, it is feared, ultimately share the fate of other buildings which the waters have carried into their depths. Edward I, in the 23rd year of his reign, created Dunwich a parliamentary borough—but it was disfranchised by the Reform Bill. It was established as a corporate borough by King John; and is now governed by two bailiffs, two assistant justices, twelve capital burgesses and assistant officers. The corporation are empowered to hold courts of assize and session, and a court of admiralty. The most anxious solicitude was evinced by Colonel Barne, some few years since, to preserve from utter destruction what still remains of this fallen city; and the cliff has been crowned with flourishing plantations by Mr. Robinson. For a more detailed account of this interesting locality, we refer the reader to 'Excursions in Suffolk,'—contending ourselves with repeating, that of this once magnificent and wealthy ecclesiastical town, and prosperous sea-port, all that remains is but an inconsiderable village—the borough and parish containing, by the returns for 1841 only two hundred and thirty seven inhabitants.

About 3½ miles N.W. from Southwold, in the same hundred, is WANGFORD parish and village—the latter situated on the main road from Yarmouth and Lowestoft to Ipswich. The parish church is dedicated to Saint Peter: the living is a perpetual curacy, in the patronage of the Earl of Stradbroke. The population of the parish of Wangford (including that of the hamlet of HENHAM), amounted in 1841, to 818.

**STOWMARKET AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

**STOWMARKET** is a parish in the hundred of Stow—the market town, flourishing and respectable, is 75 miles S.E. from London (80 by rail), 33½ from Norwich, 14½ E. S. E. from Bury St. Edmunds, 12 S. N. W. from Ipswich, and 3½ S. N. W. from Needham market; situated on the line of the Eastern Union Railway, nearly in the centre of the county, at the junction of the three rivulets which form the River Gipping—two of these wash the east side of the town, and the other meets them at the south end of it, near Combs Ford. The Stowmarket canal, completed in 1773, and communicating with Ipswich, was, previously to the opening of the railway, of great advantage to the carrying trade of the district. A very considerable business is done in the corn, coal and timber trades; that in barley, especially, is very extensive; there are several large maltings; and hops are cultivated to advantage in this vicinity. Formerly bombasins and stuffs were manufactured here; but these branches have become extinct; and those now most prominent, are two foundries where agricultural implements are made; extensive brick and tile works in the vicinity, and a large tannery at Combs, about a mile and a half from the town. The market of this town is frequented by numerous farmers, and well attended by purchasers, from a great distance round. Being centrally situated, the county meetings are chiefly held in Stowmarket, and three magistrates meet every alternate Monday: a court baon is also held annually under R. Marriott, Esq. the lord of the manor; and the town is included in the thirty-fourth

circuit of the County Court towns, under the act passed in 1846, for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20—this court is held monthly at the King's Head Inn. A new police station is about to be built in Tavern street, with a large room over it for the magistrates; and the county court will also sit here when the premises are completed.

The parish church of Saint Peter and Saint Mary, is a spacious and handsome building, with a square tower, and slender spire of elegant and light appearance, one hundred and twenty feet in height. In the church is a monument to Dr. Young, once vicar of this place, and tutor to Milton the poet. The contiguous parish of Stow-Upland (which has neither church nor chapel), is consolidated with Stowmarket: the living is a vicarage, in the gift of Miss Bovan; the present vicar is the Rev. Arthur G. H. Hollingsworth. There are places of worship for Baptists, Independents, and Primitive Methodists; National and Sunday schools; and several charitable institutions for the relief of the poor. The principal seat in the neighbourhood is Great Finborough Hall, the residence of Capt. Robert Bussell—standing in one of the most delightful situations in the county, and surrounded by a beautifully laid out park of upwards of two hundred acres. The market, which is a large one for corn and cattle of all kinds, is held on Thursday. Fairs, July 10th for toys, and August 12th for lambs. The parish contained by the returns made in 1831, 2,672 inhabitants, and in 1841, 3,136.

**STRADBROOK.**

WITH THE VILLAGE OF HORHAM AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**STRADBROOK** is a parish in the hundred of Hoxne  
 —the market town, a small one, is 96 miles N.E. from  
 London, 9 s. from Framlingham, between 6 and 7 E.  
 from Eye, 24 N. from Ipswich, 28 s. from Norwich,  
 and 7 s. from Harleston; situated within about four  
 miles of the northern border of the county abutting  
 upon Suffolk. There are no manufactures belonging  
 to the place, and the little trade it enjoys is entirely of  
 a local nature. Petty sessions are held here every  
 alternate Tuesday; and it is a polling station at the  
 election of members to represent East Suffolk.

The places of worship are the parish church of All  
 Saints, and a Baptist chapel: the living is a discharged  
 vicarage, in the patronage of the Bishop of Ely; the  
 present incumbent is the Rev. John Taylor Allen, M.A.  
 The charities connected with this place are the Hoxne  
 Union workhouse, and some funds of small amount  
 by means of which a few children are educated and  
 apprenticed. Robert Copley, the learned and pious

Bishop of Lincoln, who died in 1253 was born here.  
 He made himself so obnoxious by his opposition to  
 the measures of Pope Innocent IV., that his Holiness  
 endeavoured to get his body exhumed, for the purpose  
 of being burnt. Stradbroom confers the title of Earl  
 upon the family of Rous. The market is held on Tues-  
 day, and a fair on the third Monday in June, also a  
 statute for hiring servants on the 2nd October. The  
 population of the parish, in 1831, was 1,527, and in  
 1841, 1,637.

**HORHAM** is a parish in the same hundred as Strad-  
 brook—the village, a small and rural one, is 2 miles  
 S.W. from that town, on the road to Eye, from which  
 it is between four and five miles distant. The places  
 of worship are the parish church of Saint Mary and a  
 Baptist chapel. The living of Horham is a rectory in  
 the gift of the Rev. William Mack: the present in-  
 cumbent is the Rev. William Bumpstead Mack. Popu-  
 lation of the parish, in 1841, 442.

**SUDBURY,**

WITH THE VILLAGE OF BALLINGDON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

**S**UDBURY is a market town and corporate borough, having separate jurisdiction, locally in the hundred of Babergh, 55 miles N.E. by N. from London (58 by rail); 22 w. by s. from Ipswich (33½ by rail); 16 s. from Bury Saint Edmunds, and 58 s. w. from Norwich (78½ by rail); situated on the Stour Valley branch of the Eastern Union railway, which joins that line at the Mark's Tey junction. The town, which is seated on the banks of the Stour (over which river is a bridge leading into Essex), was anciently called *South Burgh*, to distinguish it from Norwich, then designated *North Burgh*; and it is stated that at that time, Sudbury was the principal town of the county. The streets are irregularly formed, and the greater part of the houses have an antiquated aspect; but within the last thirty years the general appearance of the town has received considerable improvement: it is now well paved and lighted, and a handsome building, in the Grecian style of architecture, appropriated to the uses of a town-hall and gaol, has been added to its public structures: the internal arrangements of this edifice are well adapted to the purposes for which it was erected, and its exterior is an ornament to the town. A handsome corn exchange has also been lately erected on the south side of the Market-hill. Symon de Theobald, archbishop of Canterbury, had a noble palace here, the gateway of which is still standing; but on the remainder of the site has been erected, at a cost of about £14,000, an extensive workhouse—Sudbury being the centre of a Union under the New Poor Law comprising forty-two parishes. This was one of the places assigned for the residence of the Flemings, whom Edward III. induced to settle in this country, to instruct the English in the various branches of the woollen trade: this manufacture formed the staple for many years, and was succeeded by those of silk goods, says, crapes and buffings, which branches still continue to exist. The Stour is navigable hence to Manningtree, in Essex and large sums have been expended in the

improvement of this navigation; but since the opening of the railway before-mentioned, the traffic on the river has been greatly diminished. The inhabitants received their first charter of incorporation from Queen Mary, which was confirmed by Elizabeth; another was conferred by Cromwell, and a third by Charles II; this latter remained in force until the enactment of the Municipal Reform bill, in 1835, which vested the government in a mayor, four aldermen and twelve councillors, with the usual assistant officers; the same act provided a commission of the peace, under which borough sessions are held quarterly; and Sudbury is included in the thirty-fifth circuit of County Court towns under the new act for the recovery of debts to any amount not exceeding £20—this court is held in the town hall monthly. The borough returned members to parliament from the first of Elizabeth until 1811, when it was disfranchised. Sudbury confers the inferior title of baron on the Duke of Grafton.

Sudbury comprises the parishes of All Saint, Saint Gregory and Saint Peter. The churches are all of considerable antiquity, and are commodious and handsome structures. That of Saint Gregory was formerly collegiate; it contains a superb font; and in the vestry room, behind an iron grating, is a human skull, said to be that of Symon de Theobald, before mentioned, who was beheaded by the mob in the insurrection under Wat Tyler. The free grammar school here was founded in 1491 by William Wood, and endowed with a farm in Essex: there are but few pupils on the establishment. National, British, and Church of England schools are open for the education of children of the humbler class; and there are some bequests by which the poor are benefited, in clothing, &c. The market is now held on Thursday; and the fairs, March 12th and July 10th. The population of the three parishes, together with the hamlet of BALLINGDON, (which was included within the parliamentary borough), in 1831 was, 4,677, and in 1841, 5,085.

**WICKHAM MARKET AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.**

WICKHAM MARKET is a parish in the hundred of Wilford—the village formerly a market town, is 81 miles N. E. from London, 12 N. S. E. from Ipswich, 8 s. w. from Saxmundham, and 5 N. from Woodbridge; situated on the river Deben, and chiefly on a pleasing eminence, commanding an extent of landscape which, for richness in wood, general fertility and seats of the gentry, is not surpassed perhaps in the county. This place was at one period entitled to far more consideration than now belongs to it—besides its market, there was a shire-hall, where the quarter sessions were held: the building was taken down some years since by the lord of the manor, but the spiritual courts for the archdeaconry of Suffolk are still held here. The principal branch, connected with manufactures, carried on in the vil-lage, is that of windmills and mill machinery, by

Mr. John Whitmore, who has exported extensively to Australia. The other business is of a retail and domestic nature, mainly supported by the landed interest and farmers of the district, assisted also by travellers in passing between Ipswich and Yarmouth.

The church of All Saints stands upon an eminence; the spire steeple, though not above seventy feet high, is a conspicuous sea-mark, and commands a prospect so extensive, that on a clear day no fewer than fifty churches may be seen from it. The living of Wickham is a vicarage in the gift of the Crown; the present incumbent is the Rev. Weeden Butler. A place of worship for Independents and two public schools, respectively conducted upon the British and national plans, are in the parish—the population of which in 1831, was 1,202; and in 1841, 1,400.

## WOODBRIDGE,

WITH THE VILLAGE OF MELTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

WOODBRIDGE is a parish in the hundred of Loes  
 —the market town, a considerable one, is 77 miles  
 N. E. by E. from London, and 8 N. E. from Ipswich—  
 the latter, at present, is the nearest railway station, but  
 an act has been obtained for a branch therefrom to  
 Woodbridge. The town is situated on the direct road  
 from London to Yarmouth, and on the north bank of  
 the Deben, which river discharges itself into the sea,  
 about ten miles below, and is navigable up to the town.  
 A wooden bridge, that formerly crossed a hollow way,  
 gives name to the place; and not far from this spot  
 stands a house still designated 'Dry-bridge'. The  
 situation of Woodbridge is remarkable for its salubrity  
 —in evidence of which it may be mentioned, that  
 during the late alarming prevalence of cholera in many  
 places, not a single case occurred in this town or its  
 vicinage. The streets are not spacious, but they are  
 clean, well paved and sewered, and are quickly puri-  
 fied by a slight shower of rain, whilst the appearance  
 of the houses indicates the enjoyment of comfort and  
 respectability by the inhabitants. Upon the rivers'  
 banks are convenient wharfs and quays, and Parliament  
 has sanctioned the port as one for bonding timber, wine,  
 &c. The trade in corn, coal and general merchandize  
 is considerable; of the former large quantities are  
 exported for the London, Liverpool, Newcastle and  
 other markets. This place was formerly noted for the

manufacture of sackcloth and the refining of salt;  
 but these branches, as well as spinning wool (which  
 formed the principal occupation of the industrious  
 classes), have entirely disappeared. The government  
 of the town, is chiefly vested in the parochial officers  
 and resident magistrates—the latter assemble in petty  
 sessions here every Wednesday; and sessions for the  
 liberty of Saint Ethelred and certain contiguous hun-  
 dreds, are held quarterly. Woodbridge is included in  
 the thirty-fourth circuit of County Court towns, under  
 the act for recovering debts to any amount not  
 exceeding £20; and it is a polling station at the elec-  
 tion of members to represent East Suffolk. The shire  
 hall is a handsome brick building; beneath it is held  
 the corn market; the bridewell now serves the pur-  
 pose of a police station.

The parish church of Saint Mary is a truly noble  
 structure, it was erected, according to received opinion  
 in the reign of Edward III, by John Lord Seagrave  
 and his Countess—the tower and north portico in the  
 reign of Henry VI; the former, remarkably handsome,  
 is composed of flint-work in beautiful compartments;  
 it is one hundred and eight feet high, and perceptible  
 at sea at a great distance. The interior is spacious,  
 and consists of a nave, two aisles and a chancel;  
 the living is a perpetual curacy, of which the Rev.  
 Thomas William Meller, is the present incumbent.

the other places of worship are Saint John's church (or chapel), and chapels for Independents, Baptists, the Society of Friends and Wesleyan Methodists. Several important charitable institutions are sustained in Woodbridge. The free grammar school was founded in 1662; ten boys are instructed upon the foundation, and an additional number of day scholars, besides accommodation for boarders. There are public schools upon the national and British plans; and Sunday schools attached to most of the places of worship: but the most valuable charity, is that founded in 1587 by Thomas Seckford, Esq., and still bearing his name, for twenty-eight aged and decayed tradesmen of Woodbridge, and four women, to act as nurses. This charity is supported from the produce of an estate in Clerkenwell, London, called Woodbridge-street; and a very considerable increase in the value of the property having taken place, from the falling-in and renewal of the leases, the trustees have been enabled to augment the number and the comfort of the recipients, and

new almshouses have lately been completed. This neighbourhood is embellished by several elegant seats, and the country around is in the most perfect state of cultivation. The market, held on Wednesday, is a very considerable one for corn and cattle. MILTON is a parish in the hundred of Wilford—the village, pretty and rural, is about a mile from Woodbridge, on the road to Yarmouth—it has therefore the advantage of a considerable thoroughfare, which creates a business of some little importance. The parish church is dedicated to Saint Andrew: the living is a discharged rectory, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Ely. The lunatic asylum, for the eastern division of the county, is situated within the limits of this parish—the population of which, in 1841, was 980.

Is a parish in the hundred of Blything—the village, a remarkably pleasant one, is 93 miles N. E. from London, 4 north from Saxmundham, and 23 N.
