## Music and Musicians in Carmel This Summer

Carmel-by-the-Sea, which has a reputation the world over as a permanent art center, will this summer take unto itself another distinction.

Doctor Warren D. Allen, of the music department of the College of the Pacific, is to maintain here for several months this summer a school of music.

The entire lower floor of the Hotel Carmel is to be made into a spacious auditorium. It will be used for public concerts, lecture room, and instruction and study room. The upper part of the building will contain sleeping rooms for as many of the students as can be accommodated. Other students will live at the hotels and in private homes.

Professor Allen will soon issue a prospectus, giving details as to length of course, tuition fees, public entertainments etc.

About May 1st many eminent singers and musicians from all quarters of the globe will for several months abide in Carmel. Already a number of cottages have been secured for from one to six months.

### A Criticism of American Novel Writing

In most American novels, vivid and graphic as the best of them are, the people are segregated if not sequestered, and the scene is sparsely populated. The effect may be an instinctive response to the vacancy of our social life, and I shall not make haste to blame it.

There are few places, few occasions among us, in which a novelist can get a large number of political people together, or at least keep them together. Unless he carries a snap camera his picture of them has no probability; they affect one like the figures perfunctorily associated in such old engravings as that of "Washington Irving and his Friends."

Perhaps it is for this reason that we excel in small pieces with three or four figures, or in studies of rustic communities, where there is propinquity if not society. Our grasp of more urbane life is feeble; most attempts to assemble it in our pictures are failures, possibly because it is too transitory, too intangible in its nature with us, to be truthfully represented as really existent.—W. D. Howells (1891).

He is yet but a name to hundreds here, but those that understand, and the trees, and the hills, will never forget."

## The Place of Poets and Dreamers

Among eminent persons, those who are most dear to men are not of the class which the economist calls producers: they have nothing in their hands, they have not cultivated corn, nor made bread; they have not led out a colony nor invented a loom. A higher class, in the estimation and love of this city-building, market-going race of mankind, are the poets, who, from the intellectual kingdom, feed the thought and imagination with ideas and pictures which raise men off of the world of corn and money, and console them for the shortcomings of the day and the meanness of labor and traffic. Then, also, the philosopher has his value, who flatters the intellect of this laborer by engaging him with subtleties which instruct him in new faculties. Others may build cities; he is to understand them and keep them in awe. But there is a class who lead us into another region—the world of morals or of will. What is singular about this region of thought is its claim. Whenever the sentiment of right comes in, it takes precedence of everything else. For other things, I make poetry of them; but the moral sentiment makes poetry of me.—Emerson.

The sale of MS. of "Isabella; or, The Plot of Basil," which has come on to the London market, is an interesting event to all-lovers of Keats. This rendering of Boccaccio's story, of such perfect literary beauty, caught the conscience of Keats' critics, who, up to the time of its publication, had shown themselves possessed neither of literary judgment nor of common justice. In the heart of this humble cockney boy there welled a spring of beauty which flowed in streams of such crystal loveliness that it crowned the English Nineteenth Century poet with the myrtle of ancient Greece.—Christian Science Monitor.

The Carmel Fire Department held its regular monthly meeting last night. The annual meeting and election of officers takes place the second Wednesday in April.

## Notice to TAXPAYERS

All taxpayers are required by the constitution to annually make and deliver to the Assessor a statement, under oath, setting forth specifically ALL the real, personal, or other class of property, owned by such persons, or in their possession, or under their control, as the same stands of record at 12 o'clock Meridian on the first Monday of March.

The Political Code provides, that all property must be assessed at its "full cash value," and defines "full cash value" as being "the amount at which the property would be taken in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor."

### Unsecured Personal Property

The taxes on all unsecured personal property are due and payable assessment is made.

### Exemptions

Any person or association, claiming any property to be exempt from taxation, MUST make the claim and affidavit, for such exemption, every year, in the manner provided by law. This applies to the \$100 allowed on personal property of householders; the \$1000 allowed soldiers, sailors, marines, etc., and property used solely and exclusively for religious worship.

### Assessments

Any information desired relating to assessments will be gladly furnished on application, and all objections should be made before the Board of Equalization adjourns, instead of waiting until it is time to pay taxes.

Remember, that if you fail to make a statement you fail to comply with the law and you law yourself liable to arbitrary assessment, which is expensive to yourself and causes much trouble to others.

#### INDEPENDENCE CAKE

Measure 1 pound of risen bread dough; into it work 2 cupfuls brown sugar, 1 cupful butter, 3 un-beaten eggs, and 2 tablespoonfuls cream. Beat to a smooth batter.

baking soda dissolved in 1 table-spoonful warm water; add half pound each seeded raisins and currants, and 1 teaspoonful each cloves and grated nutmeg. Turn into a well-buttered pan and set in warm place to rise for 20 minutes. Bake in moderate oven. Decorations and icing can be done as desired.

This is a recipe dating from the Colonial period, hence its name.
