

LOS ANGELES, March 9.-Caught in high seas, 100 men and women, all deathly seasick, were marooned today two miles off Redondo Beach on a fishing barge, where they had been held prisoners by rough water since Sunday afternoon.



ABOLISH SHORT SESSION

As Congress adjourns again we hear the usual criticisms of the accomplishments of that body and the general agreement that the short session contributes nothing to the smooth running of the machinery of government-rather the reverse. The session is too short for the members to finish what they started, and for the same reason many needful things are not started. The Congress which has just adjourned left the air defense situation as well as the farm-aid question up in the air. If a special session is called to complete matters taken up in the short session it is largely composed of different men and so the deliberations of the first body have been very largely

Another objection is that the short session is composed of members of both houses who have been defeated at the November election or who have not been candidates for re-election, and so the control of Congress may be in the hands of the party beaten at the polls. It is absurd that a party defeated by the people should continue to legislate and govern for four months longer while the newly elected members of Congress

The proposal that the short session be abolished, that the terms of Congressmen begin January 1, and that the President and Vice President be inaugurated at that time, has everything in its favor and nothing against it but precedent.

GARDEN WEEK

The week of April 27 has been set aside by the National Federation of Woman's clubs as National Garden Week. While the date is a little late for us here in Southern California to plant our gardens, still any time is planting time with us, and there is every reason for us to cooperate with people in other parts of the country where spring comes later than it does



Scientist Describes Place Where Air So Dry Skin Cracks

By CHARLES A. SMITH or International News Service. LONDON, March 9 .- Remarkale natural life on the mountainous Tibetan plateau, 20,000 feet above sea level—where the atmosphere is so dry and rarified hat the skin and nails split and the ordinary decomposition of flesh is prevented—was described to famous naturalists and scientists by Major R. W. C. Hingston at the Royal Geological society

Major Hingston was the official naturalist to the 1924 Mount Everest Expedition, which came so near to conquering the world's highest mountain.

Small spiders, which live at 27,000 feet above the sea and which prey upon each other to live, were among the phenomena described by Hingston, who, in referring to them, said that this was the highest altitude at which any life is known to exist. These were found 4,000 feet above the last vegetable growth and far above the Himalayan snow-line.

"We found grasshoppers at 18,000 feet, nearest the farthest limit of vegetable growth," Hingston told his audience. "We frequently saw the magnificent lammergeyer (the Tibetan vulture) soaringg around the mountain at 20,000 feet, while we found bees, moths and butterflies at 21,000 feet, spiders at 22,000 feet and choughs at the immense height of 27,000 feet."


Major Hingston described to his audience how the mammals of the mountain were protected by thicker coats of hair than those of the plain, which was very necessary because of the terrifically high wind which sweeps across Everest at all times. There were herds of goats, with hanging coats of hair, like kilts, around their legs, while at 12,000 feet up there were pigs covered with

Butterflies haunted the passes up to 17,000 feet. Their wings were stiff and rigid and not easily orn, and their bodies were furry. When resting they pressed their wings close against the ground to avoid the wind.

Instead of waiting for the child's body cells to manufacture this antitoxin and running the risk of death before sufficient can be manufactured, we inject an antitoxin manufactured by the body cells of healthy young horses and immediately the poisons in the child's body begin to be neutralized.

The degree with which the poisons are neutralized depends largely upon the time at which the antitoxin is given. If it is given before the toxin has had time to make a firm combination with the




