A valuable negro slave was crushed to death yesterday by the wheels of one of the rail road cars passing over his hody. The frequency of these canuaities call loudly for the interfer ence of the public authorities.

It is with pain we mention a repetition of similar cruelite to those committed by Madame Lalaurie, on the person of a little negro slave, the property of a Mrs Pardoe living in the lower part of the city. This unfortunate victim exhibits all the marks of a most revolting crucity. Several of her teeth have been, it seems, extracted for the purpose of appearing the demoniac resentment of her mistress. The Mayor, up the facts coming to his knowledge, promptly issued a warrant for the slave, and she is now detained in the police jail until further inquiry is made.
