



Sudan Grass

A New Forage Crop of Immense Value to the Middle West.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture introduced this new forage plant into the United States in 1909, the seed being brought from Sudan, Egypt, and seed produced was distributed the following year to Experiment Stations of the different states. The fifth crop has been grown in the U. S. under widely varying climatic conditions. The results have been so satisfactory that it is now established as one of our permanent forage crops.

Sudan is a tall, annual grass, reaching a height of from seven to nine feet when planted in rows and allowed to mature for a seed crop; broadcasted and cut "in the bloom" for hay, about four feet.
