**City of Carmel-by-the-Sea a Year Old**

With last Tuesday evening's meeting of the City Trustees, Carmel-by-the-Sea enters upon the second year of its municipal life, the first trustees' meeting having been held on November 6, 1916.

Ordinance No. 18, providing for a city board of health, was given its second reading.

The resignation of W. P. Evans as City Recorder was presented and accepted, and the appointment of a successor was deferred.

G. F. Beardsley, Health and Safety Commissioner, reported that Ed. Romandia, garbage collector, desired to quit his job, and the matter of employing another collector was put in the hands of Mr. Beardsley.

The Tax Collector reported receipts amounting to \$256 to date.

A letter was read from surveyor Howard S. Cozzins, which resulted in the passage of the following resolution:

*Be it resolved that the Board of Trustees of the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea that H. F. Cozzins be ordered to make the storm water survey and maps and the street survey.*

Bills amounting to \$829.30 were approved.

**Small Town Mail Delivery**

In reply to numerous inquiries concerning the matter of mail delivery, the Pine Cone presents the following information:

The Postoffice Department is authorized to establish village delivery service in towns having postoffices of the third class.

Before the service is inaugurated it is required that certain civic improvements be provided, such as sidewalks and house numbers.

It is not the practice of the department to grant this service to towns in which the postoffice receipts are less than \$5000 a year. The receipts of the Carmel office are close to this amount.

Patrons of the service must agree to provide private mail receptacles.

At the beginning of the service carriers receive \$600 a year.

## Songs

A musician who has sung in various soldiers' training cantonments has remarked upon the preference of "the boys" for the simple familiar songs of home and mother. Away from home, preparing for an unknown issue in war, the heart turned to thoughts of places and loved ones left behind.

Hamlin Garland, writing of his early life in the Middle West after the close of the war between the States and in the early seventies, mentions the songs that were at that time favorites among the pioneers. Then there were few musical instruments in the great West, the phonograph had not yet come, so the people relied upon their voices for music.

Mr. Garland also wrote that the songs enjoyed by the early settlers were nearly all reminiscent and sad. The spirit of the pioneers, despite their hardihood and courage and hopefulness, has always been affected by separation from former ties. Their choice of songs was indicative of their intense feeling for home, an emotion which today's men in khaki share.

Jas. Weldon Johnson names the slave songs of the Negroes as "one of the things artistic" that have sprung from American life. In them, he continues, "the Negro sounded the depths, if he did not scale the heights, of music."

As the poetry that touches us most deeply is the simplest in sentiment and expression, just so the songs of a nation, those which the common, or musically uncultured, people love best are apt to be simple, pathetic and melodic.

### Our Weekly Recipe

#### Stuffed Onions

Remove the skins and cut one slice from the top of a sufficient number of onions; parboil ten minutes, in (ham or veal will do as well), after which remove the centers. Fill cavities with the following mixture: Equal parts of cooked chicken finely chopped, stale bread crumbs, onion which was removed from the center, and one third cupful of chopped canned mushrooms. Season with salt, pepper and parsley, chopped fine, moisten with cream or melted butter and place in well greased gem cups, sprinkling with bread crumbs on top and bake in a moderate oven until tender and crumbs are brown.

**Have You Signed

Hoover Pledge?**

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 29. — An appeal to the men and women of the State "as Americans, as Californians, and as lovers of your Nation and of humanity" to sign the food pledge was made today by Governor Wm. D. Stephens.

The proclamation reads: "Urged by my sense of patriotic duty to support every effort toward the Nation's victory in the struggle now being waged on land and sea, I appeal to the women and the men of California to at once sign the food pledge of the Federal Food Administration.

"These pledges will be presented at every door, they will appear in the newspapers, they will be spoken of in the churches, theatres and moving picture house. Every agency—Federal, State, county, municipal, public and private, will be used to bring these pledges to your notice. Every woman and every man in California should sign.

The pledge is a simple one. It merely states that the signer is glad to join the Federal administration in the service of food conservation of our Nation and that the signer accepts membership in the United States Food Administration, pledging herself or himself to carry out the directions and advice of the food administrator in the home, so far as circumstances permit.

The pergola at La Playa will be moved to the six stone pillars nearer the street, and a French door, all glass, will take the place of the vestibule.
